

The National Horseshoe Pitchers Association is celebrating the 100th Anniversary of its World Horseshoe Pitching Championships, July 27 through August 8, 2009 at the Prairie Capital Convention Center in Springfield, Illinois.

We are pleased and happy to report a total of 1,330 entrants for the 2009 World Tournament.

Here are a few WT odds and ends.

2009 WT cash prize fund: Championship Classes, \$52,510; All Class Play, \$112,900; TOTAL \$165,410.

Youngest pitcher: Keith Jones, Springfield, IL, Cadets, just 6 years old.

Oldest pitcher: Donald Boyer, Martinsville, IL, Sr. Men's 92 years old and still pitching 40 feet.

There are 538 pitchers that are pitching in their first World Tournament this year.

A reminder to all Charter Presidents: The Charter President must provide to the NHPA President, at least 72 hours prior to the start of the convention, a written and signed list of delegates which names the delegation Chairman. I will accept a list of your delegates by e-mail provided it is sent by the Charter President. I will be leaving for Springfield, on July 23rd. If submitting your list by US Post mail, please allow sufficient time for the mail to reach me before my departure date. Once again, you can e-mail your delegates list to me at nhpapaul@yahoo.com at least 72 hours prior to 8:30 AM on August 2nd.

Times and dates for all meetings; Regional Directors, State Officers, Club/League Directors meeting, will be posted on location at the tournament. Church services are scheduled for 3:00 pm on Sunday afternoon August 2nd and the location will be posted at the tournament. Everyone is welcome and we look forward to having you at our World Tournament Church services this year.

Plan to attend the NHPA Hall of Fame Awards Banquet the evening of August 2nd. Ticket cost is \$30 a person. Purchase tickets at the tournament up to 72 hours prior or contact the NHPA office to reserve tickets for later pickup. All tickets reserved are considered sold and must be paid for whether you attend or not. This year's event will be held at the President Abraham Lincoln Hotel. Awards will be presented at our annual Hall of Fame Awards Banquet. This year's awards are as follows: The Stokes Award will be going to Kurt Whaley, of South Dakota; the President's Award will go to Bill Marvin, of Illinois; and Achievement Awards will be going to Tina Press, of Illinois and Leonard & Georgia Burke, of Oklahoma. Membership and league awards will be announced at the banquet. The Regional Director of the Year Award is listed in Dan Sander's article in this issue of Newsline. This year's Hall of Fame inductees are: Joan Elmore, of Tennessee; Frank Bohun, of Pennsylvania; and Jack Freeman, of Tennessee/Kentucky.

For all of you attending this year's World Tournament either as a player or a fan, we are excited that you're coming! As always we hope and pray that your journey to and from the tournament is a safe one and wish each of you not only success on the courts but an unforgettable visit to Springfield, Illinois.

NEWS VIEWS & DONATIONS

Clubs or Charters that hold benefit tournaments for the NHPF provide an enormous service for the Foundation. It is especially so during times of economic hardship when many of our members have to make some tough financial decisions. Like any charitable organization, the NHPF needs donations to function. If you cannot send an individual check, take part in an NHPF benefit tournament where much of the proceeds are sent to the Foundation. If your club or charter doesn't have an annual benefit tournament, ask the officers to schedule one.

While several states have had fund-raisers for the NHPF, three charters are worthy of mention for holding annual tournaments that benefit the NHPF. The Dogwood Tournament in Statesville, NC, under the direction of Paul Stewart and the Emerald Club in Eugene, OR, with its annual NHPF Benefit Open under the direction of Jerry Gorton, have each contributed over \$5,000. For the past two years, a major NHPF benefactor, Tim Woodden, has been matching the total raised by the Emerald club. Three clubs of the Northern California Charter, Gold Country, Sonoma County and Tri-Valley have combined to also donate over \$5,000 raised through NHPF benefit tournaments.

At the Springfield World Tournament, the NHPF will have available a limited quantity of a special towel commemorating the 100th anniversary of the W.T. These 15" x 18" towels, with a hook and grommet attachment will be available to individuals who make a \$10 donation at the NHPF booth. Also available for cash contributions of a smaller amount will be two or three commemorative items from the NHPA Hall of Fame. Be sure to stop by the NHPF booth to select the item of your choice.

The NHPF, which owns the production rights, recently up-dated and converted to DVD, the Basics of Horseshoe Pitching video. This DVD is for the relatively new pitcher as it covers all the fundamentals of the game and shows in slow motion, how to hold and throw the flip, 1-1/4 & 1-3/4 turns. Every club is encouraged to purchase this DVD to lend out to new pitchers or have on hand when giving demonstrations to schools or others not familiar with the sport. It is a valuable training tool available from your favorite GRS distributor for the very modest price of \$14.00.

A monetary contribution sent to the NHPF is tax deductible if you itemize and you will have the satisfaction of knowing that you are giving back something to the sport and association. Send your contributions and/or brick orders to the NHPF, P.O. Box 1628, Penn Valley, CA 95946.

Ralph Milton Warthen, 87, of Caldwell, Idaho entered into rest on March 26th, 2009. Ralph was born on April 11th, 1921 in a farmhouse in Hubbell, Nebraska to Laura Ada Corwin and Charles Calvin Warthen. Ralph was known as Mr. Horseshoes and was the backbone behind the building of the 18 court complex in Caldwell, ID at Memorial

Park. Ralph, after retiring from Bayview Lumber Company of Washington State in 1982, moved him and his wife LaRene to Caldwell.

One of the first things Ralph did after his move to Caldwell was to look for a park with a horseshoe court and he found one. Ralph recalls while he was pitching a guy came along who was cutting the grass and asked if he would like a box around the pits to keep the sand in and he replied yes. He suggested Ralph talk to Kevin Holley who was running the parks department at the time. During conversation Ralph mentioned that he had been pitching horseshoes for over 40 years. Upon hearing that, Kevin said "You're the man for running our 4th of July tournament" and when asked if he would, Ralph replied "Yes". Ralph was also asked to draw up some plans for some new courts and they were then constructed. Ralph started the Monday night league officially in 1983 and the club has hosted three to four tournaments per year since that time and also two State tournaments.

Ralph had mentioned at the peak of his competition years he averaged around 70%. Ralph had pitched for 70 years and made many friends through the sport and was liked by all. Ralph is survived by three daughters; Connie Oberly and son-in-law Skip of Mesa, Arizona; Gayle Towery and son-in-law Randy of Caldwell, Idaho and Barbara McKnight and son-in-law Paul of Caldwell, Idaho. He also leaves behind 16 grandchildren and 44 greatgrandchildren.

Ralph will be missed by all who knew and loved him; he was a gentleman of the highest caliber.

COLORADO

Colorado's latest Double Ringer newsletter has several paragraphs on Colorado horseshoe history dating back to 1920. It traces the origin of some of the clubs – the Denver Metro Club was formed PRIOR to 1920 and the first state championship was held in 1921. Ted Allen won the first of his ten state titles at the age of 14 in 1922 and then began his World Tournament victory march in 1933. Paul LaCrosse started a horseshoe league in the Denver area in 1974 - it is a guess, but this league may have been the first league of sanctioned pitchers in NHPA history and was one of the charter members of the NHPA Sanctioned League program in 1978. The historic paragraphs flow through the newsletter: they chronicle the start of the CO Hall of Fame in 1982, the beginning of the indoor Knaub arena in 1985, some Colorado milestones, and several of the awards that have been initiated over the years. Also, in 88 years, there have been only 30 presidents in the Colorado Association. It is a fascinating newsletter to read.

facility has full length walkways with the concrete being poured a full eight inches thick throughout. Don states he has been waiting three years for this to become a reality. The new facility is in Settler's Park in Meridian, Idaho and will feature several tournaments throughout the year along with lifetime sports horseshoe pitching classes held by Don. To date Don has had nearly 200 high school kids participate in his program, four schools have been involved in this program and two of the four have committed for the next school season as well. A new tournament called The Treasure Valley Open will be one of the main attractions this summer and will include added money. They will also host the state singles tournament there in September. The new complex is being touted as the nicest facility in the Northwest.

NEW YORK

An interesting photo was sent to me – in a 2008 doubles tournament in Lockport, NY, a 40 ft. pitcher's 'shoe hit a horseshoe in the pit and bounced up to rest, or hang, on the top of the horseshoe stake. It stayed there long enough for everyone to see and for photos to be taken. Paul Thomas has been in horseshoes for 50 years and had never seen anything like this.

IDAHO

Meridian, Idaho is the newest horseshoe pitching site in Idaho with its new 16 court complex. Don Titcomb has been instrumental in getting the courts built by the Meridian Parks & Recs. with help from Jerry Smith and Gary Opper. This site recently held the Don Titcomb Grand Opening tournament to kick off the new facilities. The complex features twelve sand and four clay courts and has synthetic turf covering the entire area within the fences which are not concrete. At a cost of over \$600,000.00, phase 1 includes two shelter houses and two tennis courts. Phase 2 will feature overhead covers for ten of the courts along with lights. The



THE NATIONAL HORSESHOE PITCHERS HALL OF FAME & MUSEUM

JACK FREEMAN'S MEMORIAL BRICK WALKWAY PLAZA

As you can tell by the picture, the Jack Freeman Memorial Walkway is surrounded by beautiful landscape which flowers from early spring until the frost bites late in October. Even in the winter time it is impressive with the American and NHPF Flags waiving in the breeze with a constant light shining upon it. At tournaments held by the QRHC and weather permitting, we sometimes gather around the flagpole to hear our National Anthem sung by someone's beautiful voice.

Some of the bricks are very unique. Some are purchased as a memorial to a horseshoe pitcher or to a loved one of a horseshoe pitcher. I counted 28 bricks dedicated to the memory of Burly from Iowa. What a wonderful tribute to him! Some bricks are quite humorous, one reading: "Owen Moore and Paying Less". Another reads: "Just Pitchin' My Life Away for a Six Pac". A lot of them are honoring Hall of Famers, or someone who has dedicated a lot to the sport of horseshoe pitching. We have some Happy Birthdays,

some Happy Anniversaries and Happy Father's Day bricks.

The brick plaza was an idea that Dave Loucks and Joe Faron came upon while Dave was visiting Missouri in 2005 looking for potential sites for the Hall of Fame. At the St. Charles County Amateur Sports Hall of Fame complex, they noticed their brick walkway and they quickly decided that would be a good thing to have one at the new NHPA/ NHPF site. After some investigation with different brick companies, it was decided to work with St. Louis Monu-

ments (STM). The bricks are all in place, all they need is an order for engraving. Once Dave receives a minimum of 25 brick orders, he prepares two lists: one for small bricks (\$100) and one for the larger bricks (\$200) by state. That list is faxed to STM who in turn works the engraving into their schedule, weather permitting. They must have dry conditions so all moisture is out of the clay bricks, meaning that virtually no engraving takes place at the plaza during winter months when snow and frost is in the ground or during a weather pattern that is bringing in rain.

The brick plaza contains approximately 4,000 bricks, some 3,300 small 4"x 8" and 700 large 8"x 8". There are 38 different sections within the plaza, each assigned to different states. In the center is a large horseshoe shaped design of some 540 bricks, about one-third being the large size. The bricks in this horseshoe design are for orders from three states, Missouri, Wisconsin and California as it was initially projected that members from these states would send in the most orders, especially for the larger bricks. That has held true for MO and CA who are the number one and two buyers of large bricks. Missouri also leads in number of small bricks sold with Minnesota #2 and California #3. Most of the other sections have nine large reddish color bricks surrounded by some 90 small bricks. There are four sections of 18 large bricks. These are assigned to IL, PA, NC, and TX. Three states MI, FL and OH have sections with 30

large bricks. Thirteen sections are set up to be shared by two states.

As of today May 5, 2009, 852 bricks have been purchased, 838 of which are already engraved. Oregon is the first state to purchase all of the large bricks in their section. There is an overflow section to catch any more large brick orders from this state or others that fill-in their section. Three states (AK, MS, NM) have yet to purchase their first brick. Four others (DE, HI, ME, RI) have purchased only one brick. Twelve states have purchased fewer than five bricks. The top five states in total bricks purchased are Missouri 156, Minnesota 91, California 73, Illinois 38 and Wisconsin 37.

We had some visitors from South Dakota, the Jacksons, who came to Kansas City to visit relatives. Mr. Jackson, a horseshoe pitcher, wanted to see the new NHPA Hall of Fame. His son drove him the extra 250 miles to visit it. He was overjoyed by what he saw. The QRHC hostess for the day was JoAnn Wall, who took him to the brick walkway. Mr. Jackson couldn't believe all the people that he knew as he was glancing over the engraved bricks. He hadn't purchased a brick but he said, "I will be purchasing one in the near future." He wanted to be a part of the brick walkway as his friends were.

The 1951 World Horseshoe Tournament

This issue, we will revisit a World Tournament from over 50 years ago. To most readers there may not be great interest in reading the names that few of us remember, but that is not the significance of this 1951 event. A whole book could be written on this tournament alone – I will spare you and try to simply highlight what this tournament means to present-day members.

Back in the day, pitchers qualified on site to earn their way into the championship competition. There was no pre-registration, no listing of ringer averages, and believe it or not, no Class B, Class O or Class Z. A player traveled hundreds of miles on the chance that he would pitch potential in the qualifying, score among the top 36 players to gain seeding into the Championship Class, or simply have to turn right around and go back home. So for all those NHPA members that have participated in recent World Tournaments, there has been tremendous change to the tournament format that enables any pitcher who wishes, at any skill level, to simply register and be scheduled to participate in the showcase event of our sport. Anyone who has felt the need to voice complaint or argue about how the current World Tournament is conducted should really take a good look at how it used to be and then re-think their position.

The first article reprinted from the February 1951 issue of THE HORSESHOE PITCHER announces that the 1951 event will include a Class B. This was a beginning to the format the NHPA presents today. It is mind boggling that it took over three decades to include more classes than the Champion Class. But this tournament didn't stop there, a Junior Boys Championship was also held. Why should this be big news, there are Junior divisions every year? Not so. In 1951, the first Junior Boys championship was held since 1924. That's a span of 27 years. In fact, just one Junior championship was held prior to 1951, that being the 1924 event. No Junior Girls competition was held in 1951, or previously; the first event was still 16 years in the future. No Junior Girls World Championship was held until 1967. Today's World

Tournaments are looking better all the time!

The winner of the Junior Boy's Champion is also a significant piece of information. The 1951, as well as 1952 and 1953, Junior Boy's World Champion was none other than our recently retiring NHPA President, Dave Loucks.

The results article is reprinted as it appeared in September issue of THE HORSESHOE PITCHER.

THE 1951 WORLD TOURNAMENT

First an editorial comment by editor and NHPA Vice President Byron Jaskulek....

EDITORIAL

Have attended every world's championship since 1946. Each year there appeared a glaring injustice to dozens of prospective pitchers who in some instances traveled thousands of miles to try to qualify as an entrant, only to fall short of a few points that caused their traveling and expense to be for naught. This gave rise to much bitterness. Now, thanks to your officers and particularly our First Vice President, Arch Stokes, this situation will not occur this year. There will be a "B" tournament. Due to this fact, I am sure we can look forward to many more entries than we ever had before. And there will be also a teen-age tournament and Ladies tournament.

The dates for the tournament have also been changed so as to enable a man to use only two weeks instead of the three weeks it usually took to cover the one-week of play. An expression of thanks is due our officers and the good folks of Murray who have made these plans for our enjoyment. And there will be eighteen scoring devices, made by Mr. E.O. Beller, which were purchased by the same good folks of Murray who are furnishing the prize money of \$5,000.00. All this should tend to really place horseshoes on the map of Sports.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE (NHPA)

It is now possible for you to begin to make plans to attend the national tournament. The date has been tentatively set from August 8 to 14. Beginning the

tournament in the middle of the week will give the eastern pitchers an opportunity to travel and play in the tournament without taking more than two weeks of their vacation time. And in addition, a day of rest during the tournament will be provided, as we will not play Sunday, August 12.

Tentative plans include a more varied program for this year. We would like to have a tournament for teenagers, women, Class B and Class A groups, so that there will be a greater opportunity for participation. It seems a shame that many good players have traveled

thousands of miles to come to the tournament and failed to qualified and have been eliminated from play because we have no B tournament. A teenager tournament is a necessity if we are going to encourage more young people to enter the game. There is a great need to encourage youth if we wish to continue to increase our activities in the game in the years to come.

Naturally I am looking forward to seeing all of you at Murray for our biggest and best horseshoe tournament.

We know it's time for another exciting Six Pac Invitational Tournament. Thirty-two of the top horseshoes pitchers traveled across the U.S. to meet at the Crossroads of the Nation – Home of the National Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame. It is the scene of excitement and the sound of horseshoes ringing as the pitchers warm up the courts in anticipation of the \$6,225 prize money. The greeting of old friends and the meeting of new friends – what horseshoes is all about.

The 16th Annual Six Pac Tournament was made possible by the generosity and sponsorship of Harvey Wobbe, owner of the Six Pac Horseshoes, and the Holiday Inn Express – O'Fallon. Tournament Directors Joe Faron, Gary Buehler, Tim Henderson, Bob & Rose Diekamp made introductions of each participant as Harvey Wobbe placed a medallion around each contestant's neck. Special guests included: Paul Stewart, NHPA President; Dave Loucks, NHPF President and Bob Dunn, NHPA Historian.

Those participating in the 40 foot contests were: Alan Francis OH 89.56%; Jim Walters OH 77.77%; Elbert Shifflett MD 73.22%; Gale Green VT 65.96%; Charlie Webb IL 72.12%: Tom Williams MI 71.58%; Rick Howe MA 66.27%; Walter Ray Williams FL 72.68%; M.O. Turner MO 71.37%; Tom Westbrook SC 67.30%: Art Tyson NY 65.80%, Gary Roberts OH 66.94%; Chan Herrell MD 66.57%%; Lester Dumstorff IL 68.76%, Raymond Bedard MA 68.81%; Larry Joe Lucas MO 66.94%. All the way from California to New York to Florida they came representing 13 states. "It's like a mini World Tournament," was a comment made by many of the spectators.

71.05%; Barbara Taylor SC 68.91%; Rick McEntire MO 68.44%; Jim Spidle IL 68.25%; Amy Francis OH 68.10%; Mary Lee Claise IN 67.04%; Elizabeth Furner MO 66.17%; Terry Beagle MI 65.71%; Dennis Reid IL 64.56%, Dave Loucks CA 62.92%.

Making their first appearance in the Six Pac Tournament were: Lester Dumstorff, Gary Roberts, Joe Lucas, Barbara Taylor, Jim Spidle, Mary Claise and Elizabeth Furner. After introductions, Jim Kinney, of Drexel, MO, volumsciously sang the National Anthem, and, now, it was time to "Play Shoes!"

The format of the two-day tournament was a 16-man round robin for the 40 footers – and the same for the 30 footers. Eight games were pitched on Saturday. At the conclusion of the Saturday competition, three pitchers in the 40' contest were undefeated: Alan Francis, Jim Walters and Charlie Webb. Leading the pack for the 30 footers and undefeated were: Sue Snyder, Joan Elmore, and Marlene Ray.

The Reno Family, of Ohio, traveled to the Hall of Fame for their first time and put on a great horseshoe exhibition that was enjoyed by all the spectators. A lot of daring shoe tricks was done by family members, Ottie Reno, Gary

Roberts, Karen Dudley Reno, Lorna Hawk, Josh Brooks, and Blake Roberts. The different styles of turning shoes were demonstrated by Gary Roberts, who was also a participant in the Six Pac competition. A story of the Reno Family will be featured at a later date.

The Quail Ridge Horseshoe Club members brought in covered dishes for a delicious smorgasbord Saturday evening meal and served approximately 100 guests for a small donation. After the meal, Jeanette Claas, president of the QRHC, introduced Ray Nadler, a QRHC member and WW II Veteran, as he recited several long poems by memory that left the audience spellbound. It was an enjoyable, relaxing evening for all.

Back to the Holiday Inn Express for a good night's rest and it was time for the final completion of the tournament to be held on Sunday. Once again the National Anthem was sung by our MO baritone, Jim Kinney, and it was time for the "shoes" to get underway.

In the 40 foot competition, Francis and Walters' met in the final game of the day. Walters missed the first two shoes – score Francis 6-0. Walters retaliated by pitching 28 consecutive ringers while Francis pitched 27/28 – score 6-3. At the end of 30 shoes the score was tied 6-6. After 32 shoes, Francis had nine, Walters six. After 34 shoes Walters gained the lead of 10-9. At the end of 50 shoes Francis had 12 points, Walters 13. From that point until the

end of the game Walters would not capture the lead again. Final score after 92 shoes - Francis 42, Walters 22. Francis had an 86.95% while Walters pitched an 80.43%.

The high game in the 40 foot division was 96.42% pitched by Jim Walters against Lester Dumstorff, score 45-3. Walters pitched 27 ringers/28 shoes. Francis had the second high game of 94.25%. At the conclusion of the 40 foot competition, Alan Francis captured his 12th Six Pac Title with a record of 15-0 and a tournament average of 86.05%. During the 40 foot competition there were 12,120 shoes pitched, 7,867 ringers, for a total average ringer percentage of 64.90%!

In the south courts the 30 footers were "pitching a fit." Sue Snyder threw the high game of the 30 foot tournament with a 91.66% against Mary Lee Claise pitching 44 ringers/48 shoes. Marlene Ray pitched the second high game with an 89.28%. The TN Twins had a most exciting game as the sisters competed against each other. The final score - Maxine 40 and Marlene 39 – giving Marlene her first loss in the tournament. Each threw the same amount of ringers (54) for a ringer percentage of 69.23%. Amazing how identical they really are! Marlene Ray and D.W. Story were battling it out on Court 9 pitching the longest game of the tournament - 102 shoes. Marlene had 87 ringers while

D.W. had 82 ringers, 85.29% and 80.39% respectively. The final score was 40-25. Joan Elmore sailed through the tournament with a record of 15-0 with the high percentage tournament average of 80.25% to capture her 3rd Six Pac Championship Title. The twins, Marlene placed 2nd and Maxine placed 3rd. In the 30 foot competition there were 12,292 shoes pitched, 8,285 ringers were recorded. The average ringer percentage was 67.40%!

For the grand finale, a bragging rights game between the two division winners took place between the 2007 World Champion Joan Elmore from TN and the current 2008 World Champion Alan Francis from OH. The game was played to 40 points, cancellation scoring. Each player pitched 86 shoes, both players had 61 cancelled ringers. Francis had 14 live ringers for a total of 42 points and Elmore had seven live ringers and two single points for a total of 23 points. That win extended Alan Francis's winning streak at the Six Pac Tournament to 132 consecutive games going all the way back to the eleventh game in the 2001 Six Pack Tournament held at New Melle, MO.

At the completion of the tournament it was time for the raffle drawing. Joe Faron had made and donated the beautiful walnut mantel clock and the horseshoe pitcher silhouettes. The Beagles from Michigan were the lucky winners of the clock for the first drawing. Don Claas of MO won the "horseshoe box" for the 2nd drawing. During the 3rd drawing, the lucky Beagles were howling with joy as they also won the horseshoe silhouette. Carol Howard won the 4th place drawing and took home the 2nd

horseshoe pitcher silhouette. Our thanks to Joe Faron for his handcrafted items.

events? The answers to these questions are based on how tournaments are sanctioned. All Charter tournaments are assigned a different sanction number, which is included in the stats report for the event, so even though a pitcher may have pitched in two different classes, it is still considered the same event. And for reporting to NatSats, the total number of ringers pitched and shoes pitched, for the two classes, should be added together. As for pacers, these stats cannot be included since they were not officially entered into that class.

If you have any other questions that you cannot find the answers to, please contact your Charter Regional Director. I hope to see many of you at this year's World Tournament in Springfield, Illinois.

Sanctioned Events and Reporting

Have you ever pitched in two different classes at the same tournament? Is this allowed? Well, there's nothing in the RGS book about this, but if there is a "no show" in a certain class, a pitcher who has already entered the tournament can be allowed to pitch in this vacant spot if his NatStats ringer percentage is lower that all others in that class. And if they are willing to pay the additional entry fee for that class, they should also be eligible for any prize awards. Otherwise, this pitcher would be considered as a "pacer".

But what about the stats? Since this person has pitched in two different classes, can it count as two different


A NEW OPPORTUNITY

Looking for a way to increase interest in horseshoe pitching, particularly with the younger set? Well here's a way. Let me start in the beginning. I first met Don Titcomb (you knew his name had to come up when talking about promoting horseshoes) back in the mid 1980s. I watched him pitch, served under him as an officer in the NCHPA (Northern California), and listened to him preach endlessly about promoting the sport. He moved east and I moved north and we didn't see each other until 2004 at the World Tournament in Pocatello. He asked me to send him some housing information for the Treasure Valley in western Idaho so I did. He moved to Meridian in 2005 and immediately started working on getting the Parks Department to build new facilities which is another story, one that I will report about at a later time when the facility is complete. Don set up five temporary courts in a local park and began giving lessons and holding a weekly league of sorts. He began bowling in a couple of afternoon leagues and as always was looking to spread the word about his and our favorite pastime, horseshoe pitching. One afternoon he noticed a group of young people gathered down the alleys and was beginning to bowl some games. Since it was during school hours. Don wandered over to see what they were doing. He talked to the adult that was leading the group and she informed Don that it was actually a school activity, a class called "Life Time Sports".

She went on to explain the program. It is a class for juniors and seniors in high school and they participate in sports that the kids can enjoy the rest of their lives, unlike basketball, football, baseball and the normal high school sports that tend to run their course for the average person shortly after high school or college. Some people continue these sports, but most do not. The "Life Time Sports" class exposes the kids to many other activities such as; golf, bowling, tennis, jogging and what ever else the teacher can find or dig up. This was like throwing gas on a bonfire for Don. He invited the class out to the courts for exposure and lessons. The teacher was ecstatic and a marriage was formed. The school bussed the class over to the courts twice and Don and members of the Treasure Valley Horseshoe Club brought pairs of shoes and helped the teacher introduce the kids to horseshoes. Don gave a short demo and explained the rules. We then divided the kids into doubles teams and pitched shoes for an hour or so. We used a "king of the hill" format where the winners move to the right and the losers move to the left. The kids loved the class and the competition and were encouraged to pitch in our weekly leagues. This coming year, Don has four high schools lined up and we hope to get more schools involved.

The effort consists of a few hours of time by a few members with about 12 to 15 pairs of shoes. The school must commit to transporting the kids, but that goes with the class. If "Life Time Sports" or whatever it may be called in your area exists, it is an easy way to expose a lot of interested kids to horseshoe pitching. Check into it, it could be the spark our sport needs.

CONNECTICUT

Although a small state, Connecticut is large on horseshoe pitching with leagues in New Haven, Shelton, Norwich, Danbury, Thompson, Windsor and Morris. Each club has sanctioned courts for league and tournament play. Most have twelve or more courts with the exception of Morris with only six. The Valley HS League (Shelton) has over 175 players making it the country's largest horseshoe club. The outdoor season is from April until October with twelve scheduled tournaments including one Junior Tournament.

East Hartford is the home of the Central CT HS Club with six indoor courts having computerized scoring. From November to April there are nightly leagues. Tournaments are held every other weekend. The CCHC attracts players from all over New England, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, and Maryland.

Connecticut is a member of the New England Horseshoe Pitchers Association which holds a championship tournament annually on Labor Day weekend, attracting up to 360 players who compete on 24 courts at the Keene HS Club in Keene, New Hampshire.

Normand Rioux had been the perennial state champion, winning the title thirty three (33) times from 1970 to 2006. Norm and his family relocated to Florida in 2007. The current state champion is Bill Navratil.

The CTHPA Hall of Fame was founded in 1991 and boasts some of the pioneers of horseshoes such as Sam Bartram and Lester Lane and also some contemporary greats such as Norm Rioux, Jim Pagliarulo and Catherine Hansen.

All are welcome to pitch in one of our tournaments.

CONNECTICUT LEGEND (in his own time)

Normand Rioux (Norm) has been pitching horseshoes in Connecticut since 1960, pitched in the champion class 44 times and won his first state championship in 1970. He was state champion a total of 33 times until he retired and moved to Florida in 2007.

The most memorable match was against Art Tyson in 1974, winning a playoff game with 15 straight doubles and averaging 88%. Tyson averaged 76,6% and there were 23 "four-deads" in the game. Rioux has been New England Champion eight times with seven second places and six third place finishes. Norm was also CT Moose Champion and World Moose Champion. He is a charter member of the Connecticut HPA Hall Of Fame.

He has a great sense of humor, even on the courts, but when the match gets close, he stares through his horseshoe, taps his foot, steps off on his right foot "bocci style" and throws another ringer. Off the courts he can be seen wearing a long, ponytail wig or silly hat and is constantly telling stories and jokes to his circle of friends.

Norm worked as a short order cook at Vic's Restaurant for most of his adult life, cracking and flipping millions of eggs. In his spare time he pitched countless horseshoes in the pits out back of the restaurant. Since Vic's closed, Norm has worked as a baker and auto salesman and is now retired.
