

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As I am writing this article, I am flying back from an Advisory Meeting which Collinson Publishing sponsored and invited me to attend. The meeting was held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The meeting with Collinson consisted of a team of twelve Sporting Event Organizers (like myself) looking at ways of changing Collinson education seminars and appointments at their Connect Marketplace Conference which is being held this August in Louisville, KY.

During the one day meeting, I was able to capture some new ideas for promoting our sport which have been very successful with other Sport Organizers. The world is a changing place and I feel we all need to be flexible and change with the times. There are many different kinds of communication tools that exist to better enhance the way we communicate. Bottom line is "if we want this sport to grow, we all need to communicate better". To do this, I will be working with Tina and Jerry to get their ideas on the best method to apply these communication tools. Dick Hansen reported to the Council that adult membership has dropped 3.76% since last year. We lost four hundred and forty-five adults and thirty-six juniors. This is very disturbing to me, which is why I would like all of you, when you start getting your leagues established, to sign up at least one new member. Can you imagine if everyone signed up one new

member, we would end up doubling our membership? Wouldn't that be great for horseshoes! With the weak economy, the rising cost of fuel and the fact horseshoes is a reasonable family sport, there should be no reason why we cannot grow our sport. There are many people looking for something to do, why not horseshoes?

Some of the other things I learned in talking to other Sporting Organizers is that over the past six years of attending TEAMS and CONNECT Conferences many groups don't even know we exist! Why is that? My thoughts are we are not doing a good job of promoting our sport. Tina Hawkins your Promotions Director has begun creating promotional material which

she plans on sending out to all Charters upon request. I am expecting the Charter Presidents (if you do not have a promotional person in place) to make sure this material gets out to the local clubs. Awareness is the key and it is up to each of us to make this happen.

Not only is the NHPA supplying the needed materials to promote and grow the sport, Jerry LaBrosse has been working at establishing communications with the fifty-two Charter Presidents. If we're going to be successful, we need to hear back from you on what you want the NHPA to be doing. I have suggested setting up objectives with timelines to make sure we have a way to measure the success. This will be discussed more at the State Officers meeting at the World Tournament.

Speaking of the World Tournament, it is just around the corner and it will be here before we know it. You need to get your four sanction tournaments in to qualify for this event. Entry forms are out. Ralph Palmer, Host Director and also the President of the Ar-Jay Center at Cedar Rapids, Iowa will be the facility hosting this event starting July 26th – August 7th. The same pitching format will be used as last year. Two ice hockey arenas will be utilized

We will soon be approaching the summer horseshoe season. It is the time of the year that we all look forward to; the clang of the horseshoe. With the start of leagues beginning, remember to get your membership reports in as soon as possible, so that your club is covered by the NHPA insurance. I am glad to report that for the 2009 season we were up in league pitching. We had a total of 4,936 pitchers pitching in leagues. That is up 76 pitchers from 2008. Hopefully, in 2010 we can increase our league members another 76 pitchers. The Valley Horseshoe Club of Connecticut had the most pitchers. They had 152 pitchers in their league. The Quail Ridge Club of Missouri, home of the NHPA Hall of Fame had 133 pitchers. In Minnesota, the North Mankato Club had 126 pitchers. The largest all women's league was First Capitol Women's, from Missouri with 53 women pitching on their league. And the Liberty Junior League, from Missouri had the most juniors, with 21 pitching. These clubs have done a great job promoting horseshoes.

I received two letters from juniors that were recipients from the League Scholarship Program.

Dean E. Curry

Lewiston, Idaho

Dean E. Curry passed away Monday. January 11, 2010 at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston, Idaho; he was 85 years of age. Dean was born April 10, 1924 in Winchester to Matthew and Mabel Scott Curry. His family moved to Clarkston in 1931 and Dean attended Clarkston schools, graduating in 1942. While in school he was a three-year letterman in basketball and baseball.

After high school Dean joined the U.S. Army and served as an engineer in the South Pacific during 1943-1945. He was honorably discharged as a sergeant.

After the war, Dean went to work for Potlatch Forests Inc. where he was employed from 1947 to 1987 when he retired. He was married in 1946 and later divorced; they had four children.

Dean was a member of the National Horseshoe Pitcher's Association from 1964 to 2006.

Between 1964 and 1992 Dean won the Idaho State Horseshoe Championship 14 times. He was a member of the Moose Lodge in Clarkston and the Eagles Aerie in Lewiston. Dean loved to fish for Steelhead with his son Mike.

Surviving Dean are son, Mike Curry of Lewiston; son, Darrel Curry and wife, Vicki of Lakeview, Oregon; son, Steve Curry of Lewiston; daughter, Monica Sticker-Terry of Clarkston; and sisters, Kathryn Dickamore of Lewiston and Joy Van Cleave of Seattle.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Matthew and Mabel Curry; a brother Dale Curry and a sister, Ruby Mc-Murray.

Oregon's horseshoe community has lost a man always willing to go the extra mile for the goal of enhancing our sport in so many ways. After a lengthy illness and a brave fight with colon cancer, Lee Wallace left our midst March 5th. A private family memorial service was held in his hometown of Dallas, OR, attended by a National Honor Guard in honor of his military service.

Lee Wallace was the one to go to if you needed an idea - if a project needed a boost - if you needed information - good conversation- a laugh - an encouraging word. Lee has been described by friends as "honest as the day is long, always has a smile for everyone, courteous, honest, lovable, caring......" "Lee always has a good attitude and is upbeat. He is always doing something to entertain. Being around him just makes you feel good all over! He is just a wonderful man!" The accolades could go on as we remember a man much loved in Oregon - and by his many friends and associates in the NHPA and NHPF.

Lee's career as a veterinarian led him to the Bend area and friendship with a group of men who became charter members of the Central Oregon Horseshoe Club. Our Oregon State Men's Champion, Bill Graham, Jr., was quoted in a recent Oregon newsletter article about Lee Wallace: "He is a rare man - there should be more Mr. Lees. Lee is a young man of life, not age, because he is ageless." Bill, Jr. recalls, "Every time I am with Lee it is a wild and crazy time. He is one of my very best friends, though nearly 30 years my senior, but it's as if we are the same age. Guess we will never grow up!"

Two of Lee's enduring contributions to horseshoes in Oregon have been in helping to develop our Traveling Museum and procuring his large and impressive horseshoe collection, which he has passed on to Bill Graham, Jr. to continue. Bob Dunn, a fellow horseshoe collector, wrote, "Lee and I were good friends and met several times at World Tournaments to co-show the Horseshoe Traders. Just this past week I was in Wentzville tending to some tasks. He never made it to see the new NHPA Hall of Fame." And indeed, Lee was an enthusiastic supporter of the NHPF and the Hall of Fame.

Wallace was a memorabilia nut at heart and enjoyed searching out military items to add to his fantastic collection of uniforms and equipment. He compiled albums for each Oregon horseshoe club, with pictures he

had taken at tournaments, and served for several years as curator of Oregon's museum collections.

This was Lee's 30th year of membership in OHPA and NHPA. He served our organizations well. Lee leaves to his loving wife of 60 years, "Ginny", and their children the legacy of a good man who lived a good life and was loved by all who knew him. His sense of humor and 'that Lee Wallace smile' will be missed but we each will carry memories in our hearts of how he made us feel. Goodbye, Mr. Lee Wallace, - you are a treasure.

Wayne H. Luoma, Sr.

Ohio

Wayne H. Luoma Sr., 82, lifelong resident Burton Township, died January 18th. The prized horseshoe courts at the Geauga County Fairgrounds were named for Wayne, an inductee into the Ohio Horseshoe Hall of Fame. He pitched numerous times in the World Horseshoe Tournament throughout the United States. His basement is full of trophies from many regional tournaments.

Born November 28, 1927, Wayne was the son of the late Solomon and Evelina (nee Hilla) Luoma. Wayne was the maintenance supervisor for Burton Rubber for 23 years, retiring in 1986. Later he became well known as a beloved Amish taxi driver in the Geauga County area.

Wayne served in the U.S. Merchant Marines and the U.S. Army, the latter during WWII in Italy and the Ko-

rean War. He also enjoyed being a pilot, owning his own plane, playing baseball, coaching, spending time with his family and socializing at the Geauga County Senior Center.

Demonstrating a deep commitment to bettering his community, Wayne earned Burton's "Man of the Year Award". He will be remembered as a devoted husband, father, grandfather, brother, uncle and friend.

Wayne is survived by his wife of 60 years, Coralyn (nee Sawyer) Luoma; daughter Marie (Dennis) Wilmot; sons Wayne (Georgia) Luoma, Larry (Amanda) Luoma and Glenn Luoma; brothers Kit (Evie) Luoma and Ed Luoma; sister Anna Hollo; 12 grandchildren and five great grandchildren.


Red enlisted in the Army in July of 1940 and was at Pearl

NHPA RULES COMMITTEE REPORT

The Enforcement of our Playing Rules at the Local, State and National Levels

In some recent correspondence on our NHPA Forum (see www.horseshoepitching.com), a series of questions about our Playing Rules was asked by "Pitcher" (those who participate here in questions/responses may choose to remain anonymous). These are all very good questions that all of us should be concerned about, and since our Forum has a somewhat limited number of followers, I thought that including these questions, responses, and references here would reach more of our members. Here are the questions, followed by some answers. You may also want to read other questions and responses on the Forum. Hopefully, this information will be helpful to all pitchers, local clubs, Tournament Directors/Committees, Charter officers and Regional Directors; in all of our Charters. As with any set of rules, they become worthless if they are not enforced. We should all assume some of this responsibility.

Please note: page references, below, are for the recently Revised January 1, 2010 RGS Book.

Questions (with some edits):

- What should happen if the NHPA rule book (the RGS Book) is not followed in any state?
- Who is responsible to see that the rule book is followed... Any pitcher? The Tournament Director? The State Officers? The NHPA Council?
- What should happen when rules are not followed by a pitcher, tournament director, and/or the state officers, especially if they are aware of rules violations and may "look the other way"?
- Who should you go to/what can you do, to ensure that rules are followed by the state?

Response (some referenced information is included here):

Pitcher... Thanks for your questions about the Playing Rules and their enforcement. As has been pointed out by others in this thread, the ultimate responsibility for the enforcement of rules lies with the Charter Officers, and the penalties for their failure to insure that the rules are enforced can be found in Requirement 3, Section D, on page 25, as follows: Each Charter must comply in all ways with The Official Playing Rules, Requirements, Guidelines, and Specifications, and with the Bylaws of the NHPA. Any deliberate violation of same will be cause for possible NHPA suspension of Charter Officers, the revocation of the Charter, or both. This responsibility is, in turn, placed upon the Charter Tournament and League

Directors/Committees who are appointed, designated, and/or approved by the Charter Officers.

Perhaps even more importantly, all Charter Tournament Directors/Committees are to appoint a qualified judge(s) to monitor and enforce the playing rules, to assist pitchers with measurements, to explain the rules when appropriate, and to help run the tournament in other important ways. Please read/review Rule 5, Section B on Enforcing Violations (page 13), and Guideline 4 - Judging (see Responsibilities, Expectations and Duties on pages 31, 32). The importance of having a judge(s) on duty cannot be emphasized enough. Their visible presence on the courts alone will help to ensure that pitchers will be at least thinking more about rules and violations. In some cases the judge can/should issue warnings before enforcing a violation. Of course, the pitchers are also responsible for knowing and following the rules, and I don't think (for the most part) that pitchers purposely violate the rules (stepping on/over the foul line, for example). In most cases, pitchers are unaware that they are breaking a rule (or may not know the rule), and a polite reminder from the judge is usually sufficient.

And so the greatest responsibility for enforcing the playing rules lies with the judge. Also, according to the rules, *some rules violations can only be called by a judge* (see Rule 5, Section B.1 on page 13). Unfortunately, there are many local tournaments where a judge may not even have been appointed by the TD, and at some tournaments it may be difficult to find someone who is qualified and willing to judge. If so, this is unfortunate and is an area that many Charters should take a closer look at and attempt to improve upon.

For those, like yourself, who are concerned about playing rules violations that may be ignored, I would suggest that you start at the local level. Insist that there be a judge for your Class, and if none is provided, report this to your Regional Director and/or to all of your State Officers, in writing, and request a written reply/explanation. If the judge isn't doing his/her job, report this as well. After a meeting and/or discussion, perhaps the Charter Officers will consider a replacement for the current Tournament Director, if responsible judges are not provided for future tournaments. This should solve, or at least help to solve, the problem. Also, please consider volunteering to be a tournament judge, during a session when you are not pitching.

Thanks again for your questions/concerns. If these suggestions don't result in some improvement within a reasonable period of time, please keep us informed.

With new computerized scoring and "almost new" professional courts and walkways, we are hoping that this pitching experience will be one of your most fun and competitive tournaments.

As you know (if you have attended a previous World Tournament), the Regional Directors are responsible for the 'shoe check and check in procedures for each group of pitchers as they sign in for the first time. That first time is either a Monday or a Thursday of the first or second week.

For new pitchers, the procedure is this: All the pitchers in one flight line up to enter the check-in room.

What you will need to do is:

- 1.) Show your NHPA card
- 2.) Show your pitching shirt with your last name and the name of your state on the back of it. The name and state should be in clear letters big enough to see from a distance.
- 3.) Have your horseshoes (all of the ones you might use) weighed and measured. If they are too heavy or do not fit the specifications, they might have to be ground down the NHPA will do that for you. (A good idea would be to have your 'shoes checked before you go to the World Tournament.)
- 4.) Then you will move on to the persons who will ask you what kind of horseshoes you have. We keep records of all the horseshoes that are pitched, we check that they are sanctioned shoes, and we also keep track of which shoes are most often out of spec. So please determine what brand of horseshoes you are using and know that before you get in that line it will just help expedite the process.
- 5.) You will also have your hook checked to determine that it is acceptable according to the NHPA RGS booklet.
- 6.) After your brand of 'shoes is recorded, you will go to the table where you will pick up your permanent name paddle and your pitching schedule for that day. If you need reading glasses to read moderately small print, I suggest you bring your reading glasses with you to the competition!

7.) The final step is to go to the photo/waiting room to have group photos taken, to receive some final instructions, and to await the word that you may go to the courts and BEGIN your competition!

So, Bottom Line: Have everything with you that you will need to pitch INCLUDING your NHPA card, your pitching shirt, all the horseshoes that you plan to use and any accessories that you normally carry PRIOR to checking in. Arrive early and enjoy your three day competition!

To the Regional Directors: Good work with all of the patch orders. Orders are still coming in for extra patches so I am thinking that participation might be UP this year. I have been intrigued by the different formats that areas of the country use. In some areas, doubles competition is the "king", others have several leagues, and still others are mostly singles competition tournaments. Remember, next year is the "re-sanction your courts" year, so check your court facilities to see what might be needed to keep them in good shape so that pitchers will enjoy competing. I have already received one form from an RD that is getting a jump on this process and doing it a little early – good idea!

Ron Taylor, RD of South Carolina, has informed us that he will be hanging up his RD "hat" this year. Ron has put in many hours for horseshoes – he has served as president of the SC association, as RD, and as the "go-to" guy on the Horseshoe Pitching Pro Tour. We thank him for all of his work for our sport and hope he enjoys this "retirement". He will continue to be an "address" for RD questions in SC until a new RD is officially appointed. Thank you for all you have done, Ron!

Some of the RD's already know this, but I will be compiling a booklet for RD's, especially new RD's, to use as a guideline. It will have all the paperwork that we use throughout the year and will have a chronological "guide" for what we are supposed to do during the year. RD's fulfill many roles including communication between the NHPA and their pitchers, promotion, and court/tournament sanctioning. I will accept any and all suggestions for what to put in this booklet and how to organize it. I hope to make it easier and simpler for all of us to do our jobs. Having said this, I am sure that many

of you have already made your own booklet or folder and that will continue to work for you. This booklet is by no means mandatory but will, hopefully, be a help to RD's now and in the future. There are MANY things RD's do, day in and day out, that they don't even remember that they do – they are a real boon to the NHPA.

In closing, let us continue to grow our memberships by increasing awareness of our sport (Horseshoe Pitching is Fun! Month, charity tournaments, publicity, etc.) and let us have a great 2010!

NHPA INSURANCE PROGRAM

The NHPA Insurance Program is a \$3,000,000 liability policy that is provided by American Specialty Insurance & Risk Company in Indiana. This company also provides the insurance for the NHPA Hall of Fame building as well as an NHPA Officers and Directors policy.

The liability policy covers all NHPA Sanctioned Events, provided all NHPA rules and guidelines are followed. The policy covers you as a member or tournament director from lawsuits should someone get hurt by a horseshoe that goes over the fenced-in area of the courts. It will also cover property damage. Person injury cases are handled on a case-by-case basis.

It is important to remember that if you are pitching and/or in the confines of the court area and get hit by a horseshoe, in most cases this policy does not cover you. It is assumed that if you enter the court area as a pitcher or scorekeeper, you do so at your own risk. However, even some of these cases have been covered by the company in the past.

This policy is renewed annually the first of the year. At that time a certificate listing the Charter as the insured is sent to each Charter along with other claims forms that are provided by the insurance company. In some cases a Parks & Rec. Dept. where the courts are located may require that they be listed as co-insured. This the company will do at no cost to the club or the NHPA. A form is provided for this and can be obtained from the NHPA Secretary/ Treasurer. The form is then sent direct to the insurance

company. Contact information is at the bottom of the form.

New this year, the insurance company has agreed to cover NHPA Promotional Events, provided the setup of the horseshoe courts follows NHPA Rules and guidelines. Clubs or Charters can set up courts at stores or shopping malls and give demonstrations and even have non-members try the sport and the liability insurance will cover you. This is a big benefit to help recruit new members. This new policy is intended for Promotional Events only. All NHPA Sanctioned leagues and tournaments must still be 100% NHPA members to be covered.

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NATSTATS

Here we are in another new year/season of horseshoe pitching. There are still several states with some tournament results not accounted for.

I need to know if those tournaments were cancelled or what? I track each state from tournament 001 thru 100 – or however many tournaments are scheduled for your state. I need either results or a note stating that tournament was cancelled. In checking your state on the NHPA website under NATSTATS – REPORTED EVENTS – there will be a blank space for any results I have no information for.

One BIG PROBLEM. Would someone write up an explanation for an Newsline article for those using the HSMASTER program on how to submit tournament results to Natstats? I believe there are several ways of making a file of tournament results, and people keep sending me the wrong file. There is one file that doesn't even give the

pitcher's name, just a code. So I have to write back asking for the correct file. Sometimes this can take place on the day or two before I am sending out averages for the NHPA website update, so by the time I do receive the correct file the information may not be posted until the next week which makes for averages not being current for those people that pitched in those tournaments.

For all those new pitchers or even the experienced ones - we update pitchers averages usually every Wednesday evening and the Individual Search files usually twice a month. Go to horseshoepitching.com - click on Statistics - click on natstats or Stat Search.

Also, there are many tournament/ league results being submitted several weeks or even months after the event was pitched. This makes for many people not having current averages. I wish each state would have a designated person to check the NHPA web site under Reported Events to see that their states results are being reported and reported promptly. Like I have said in past years, reporting results late does not hurt me at all; it only hurts those pitchers that are being placed in "wrong" groups in a tournament because of results not being submitted promptly to update a pitchers average.

And lastly, I do keep a binder of all pitchers that have died and do have a pitching record within the past two or three years. So anyone that knows of a death, please forward any information on to me. I will make a printout of their current pitching record and place it in my State "Toll of Time" albums. I do get some information from Newsline articles, but not everyone is reported in Newsline.

Thanks - and good pitching - see ya at the World.



NHPA PUBLICITY AND PROMOTION

By the time you receive this issue of NEWSLINE, many of you will be well into your 2010 horseshoe pitching seasons and it will be time to hold your "Horseshoe Pitching IS FUN" event. This will be a great opportunity for you to increase the membership in your clubs, leagues and charters, increase awareness of the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association and add some new faces to the NHPA family.

Here is a great piece of news for those who are planning a FUN DAY or other promotional event! NHPA insurance now covers promotional events with participants who are NOT members of the NHPA provided all requirements of a normal sanctioned event are followed – including having the pitching area fenced off. (NOTE: The insurance policy still requires ALL participants of sanctioned events to be NHPA members.)

A simple fence – even temporary construction site fencing can help prevent accidents or injury from an errant horseshoe or an inattentive pedestrian and give you the added security of being covered by insurance.

In the event the site you are planning to use requires proof of insurance before allowing you to hold a promotional activity, there are two different actions you could take.

Ask for a copy of the NHPA insurance certificate from your Charter Secretary. In many cases, this will satisfy the property owner. If they require more, your Charter Secretary can provide a copy of a "Request for Certificate of Insurance" form that you can fill out for your particular event and send to the insurance company. Once it is reviewed and approved, a certificate will be sent back to you.

I have already heard from many of you who are planning to hold FUN DAY events. Hopefully, there are many more that I HAVEN'T heard about! This is an excellent opportunity to get the NHPA in the public eye and put a horseshoe in the hand of many, many people. YOU are our best ambassadors! You are the ones who can introduce our sport to your community and encourage your friends

and neighbors to give it a try. Make a point of telling somebody about horseshoe pitching TODAY!

Not sure where to hold your event? Check with your local elementary school for end-of-year game days. Many institutions hold "Olympic" days when winding down the school year. They are always looking for events to fill the day and would probably welcome an offer to provide this event. (Don't forget the fence!)

Churches are a great place to hold pitching activities, as well. Many churches are using a country theme for Vacation Bible School this summer - mine already has plans to include horseshoe pitching. Church picnics offer a wonderful venue for children and adults alike.

If you have not received the printable FUN DAY materials from your Charter President, Regional Director, or Publicity Coordinator, ask them for it – or go to www. horseshoepitching.com and download your own. They can be found under the Publicity/Promotion link with the title of "Pitching is Fun."



CHARTER COMMUNICATIONS

Here we are at the start of another great season of horseshoe pitching after a long tough winter. I hope you all weathered it out ok. There are a lot of good things happening around the NHPA and the world tournament in Cedar Rapids, and I'd like to highlight just a few.

Electronic Scoring

As you may have already heard, we are going to be expanding our electronic scoring demonstration at the world this year. The plan is to set up one full bank of eight courts using the new system. Traditional paper scoresheets will also be used on these courts. The two systems will be run side by side. One scorekeeper should be able to do both systems for two courts. This has been tested and doesn't seem to be a problem for most scorekeepers. It does require that the scorekeeper focus on the two games and be aware of when the scores will be called. It also will require the players to be "in tune" with the scorekeeper and make sure they received the called score.

The system will feed the data into the main server wirelessly by the scorekeeper at the end of the games. All data will be refreshed automatically, and the current results will be scrolled on a large monitor in the main lobby, which will look out over the eight courts in play through a glass wall. We are also exploring the possibility of displaying the championship class standings on the big jumbotron monitors in the arena, so we hope that is possible. We are also planning to have advertising displayed on these monitors. If your club, charter, or personal business is interested in purchasing advertising space on these monitors, contact myself or Dick Hansen.

There will be scorekeeper training workshops during the tournament. Both basic scoring and electronic scoring instruction will be available. Watch for notices on the times and locations of these workshops. As always, your help with keeping score is always appreciated, and needed.

Equipment update

There will be another modification made to the new NHPA equipment this year. The full length rubber walkways will be cut down into 16 foot segments, and taped down to the floor at each end of the courts. The reasons for this change are very logical and proven to be better. First, there will be less weight in the NHPA trailer. Also, it will be much easier to maintain the perfect distances between the foul

lines. The reason for this is that the full length rubber strips are very vulnerable to expansion and contraction from the wide range of temperatures they encounter throughout the year in the trailer. Lastly, the setup is a bit easier in the handling of the smaller pieces. This idea has been implemented in MN and worked perfectly. Anybody who would like to see the photos of the Mn State Tournament setup can view them at http://minnesotahorseshoes.com/links.php

The pieces we cut out of the middle of this matting will be sold at the tournament. We should have approximately 100 pieces of material 3 ft X 14 ft for sale. Price has not yet been determined. If you're interested in purchasing any of this material, contact myself or Dick Hansen to be placed on a priority list.

NEWS VIEWS & DONATIONS

It's hard to say whether it's the economy, the long and lousy winter season or just plain apathy, but something is having an affect on contributions sent in by individuals, charters and clubs. In 2007, this group sent in over \$59,000. In 2008 it dropped to a bit more than \$28,000 and last year another drop to just under \$24,000. The decline has continued into 2010 with just a bit more than \$4,700 being received during the first quarter. These amounts include orders for commemorative bricks.

The Commemorative Brick plaza just outside the Wentzville Hall of Fame building is comprised of some 4,000 bricks placed in State sections. In the center of each section is a block of 9-36 large 8"x8" bricks and these are surrounded by approximately 100 smaller 4"x8" bricks. From the beginning, NHPA charters were encouraged to purchase a large brick in their section thus showing their support for the Hall of Fame project. A majority of charters have done this though some opted to buy only a small brick. A few charters have yet to purchase their first brick. There a more than a few sections that are becoming quite noticeable for their lack of engraved bricks in comparison to surrounding sections. I won't name them here but will say that to date, you will find less than five engraved bricks purchased by charters, clubs or members in 15 different state sections.

Buying an engraved brick is a great way to support the Hall of Fame. The funds generated by brick purchases and donations go a long way toward the upkeep of the Wentzville facility. Last year the NHPF paid out \$15,421 for building upkeep, \$10,350 for cleaning equipment and \$4,154 toward taxes & insurance. These combined were \$29,925 of the total \$52,192 the NHPF had in 2009 expenses. Fortunately, the NHPA was able to make three very generous contributions that enabled the Foundation to show a gain for the year. But, members should realize that the National Association has its own financial concerns and cannot be expected to contribute in such a manner every year. Additional details of 2009 income and expense can be found in the "Five Year NHPF Financial Report" printed elsewhere in this Newsline issue.

In the month of March, the NHPF directors reviewed three applications for grant money. Two were approved. The third application lacked sufficient detail for the directors to reach a favorable decision so it was suggested that they reapply for the September voting session. The Clarence H.C. of Clarence, MO, and the Truman Lake H.C. of Warsaw, MO, each received a \$1,000 check

Don't forget that proceeds from your contribution or brick order not only help support the Hall of Fame but also provide grant money for clubs in need of improving their courts on public land. They pitch in a round robin format and compete with each other. Jerry Stephenson was decidedly the "Most Improved" and all



agree that Mike Cook is the "Best Pitcher" of all. They claim the guy keeping the score usually wins the game. One of the fellows says he plays because, "I like to lose." The camaraderie among them is what they most enjoy. Even their wives are grateful that they have a place to go during the winter months. As golf season is right around the corner there has been some indication that they just may continue their horseshoe pitching as they are having such a good time.

"The Quail Ridge Horseshoe Club has welcomed us to join in a club membership. We appreciate all they have done to make our weekly outings a fun time," says Aubuchon. They all agree 'Tee Time has become Shoe Time.'

Shoe Time is always fun at the NHPA facility, whether it be golfers, tournament time or league play. We hope that you can find time to stop by and visit this wonderful facility and to enjoy it as we do at Quail Ridge. 

For you "over 70" golfers out there (or even some approaching 70 years of age) who are finding your game going downhill or your joints not liking the stress of the golf swing anymore, what might be another physical activity to challenge you and keep you moving? Something inexpensive would be nice and of course you still want to be around some fun people. This is where I found myself, coming home from the golf course being asked: "how's the golf game?" My response more and more often was "in the pits."

Since I frequently was walking past horseshoe pits in the park I lived at in Yuma, Arizona, I saw a new challenge begin for ne at the age of 78. And, I have had 10 great years in this sport and want all of us to promote horseshoes as "a great sport for the elderly."

You're never too old to accomplish anything if you put your mind to it. I chose to compete in tournament pitching and became a pretty good pitcher. By 2002 my average climbed to 57.5% and I pitched in the World Tournament in Alberta, Canada. My career high game of 82% occurred

If it wasn't for the 30 foot status I wouldn't be telling this story today. Now, I can't pitch as much as I used to, but I can be a spokesman for our seniors.

FACTS AND FOLKLORE

1957 LADIES WORLD CHAMPION

For nearly two decades in the 40's and 50's, our NHPA News Digests did not feature a cover picture as had been the practice of most Horseshoe World magazines in the 1920's and 1930's or in all recent decades. The Horseshoe Pitcher done by NHPA Hall of Famer Bryon Jaskulek, did have a facsimile of a sanctioned horseshoe and I add, no doubt produced by a company sponsoring that month's issue. The Horseshoe Pitcher's News Digest by Ellis Cobb, also a Hall of Fame inductee, for the first couple years did not have a cover picture, except for this issue of June 1958.

Having a cover page picture was a novelty at the time and seeing articles and coverage of women champions was nearly just as novel. The women's division was not as established as we have grown so used to expect in the last few decades. The picture is of Gertsie Lou Selby (Law) of Bolder Colorado. Shelby won the 1957 world title in a playoff while averaging 41.5%. Few members will recall the name or that she was a world champion at the age of 18, or that she was the sister-in-law of Ted Allen!

What is also very interesting, the very next ladies world champion is the one responsible for setting the surge in the women's competition – Vicki Chapelle Winston. Vicki set new standards and many women pitchers followed, having maintained incredible performances over the past fifty years.

This is the story that accompanied the News Digest issue in June 1958.

"OUR COVER PICTURE - The blonde, vivacious young



lady whose picture graces the cover of this month's 'Digest' is none other than Gertsie Lou Selby who will be defending her World's title as Ladies' Champion at Murray, Utah in July. She is eighteen years old and graduated from Longmont, Colorado High School this year. She is a lover of sports and participants in many and is a protégé of Ted Allen, World' Champion in the men's division. It is him

from whom she has copied his style and technique. Ever traveling with her sister and Ted, her former brother-in-law, on exhibition tours. Her future interests are possible modeling, of which she has had some experience in downtown stores in her hometown or a career as an airline stewardess and college. The NHPA is proud to have such a lovely lady as it Ladies' World Champion."

Here are a couple more trivia questions:

Name two Junior Girl's World Champions that went on

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to win Women's World Championships. There are also two other Women's World Champions who pitched in the Junior Girls Division but did not win a Junior Girl's Championship, name them.

Three players pitched in the Junior Boy's Championship Class, did not win a Junior title but went on to win Men's World titles, name those three players. On the easier side, three players that won Junior Boys Championships have gone on to win a combined 22 Men's World Championships. Name those three players.

And there is more! Talking about folklore! Back when this series started in 2004, there was conversation and some searching about where did the term "Four-Dead" originate? That question has not been answered but in the back of my mind, I was so sure I had heard the story from Earl. Well, while looking for something else, the information just popped up. In 1991, Jack Claves was inducted to the NHPA Hall of Fame. Earl Winston, then Chairman of the Hall of Committee, wrote a very nice review for Newsline. There is an incredible number of different bits of history in just this one brief bio...

Jack Claves – St. Louis, Missouri (1991 Promoter): "Jack was a horseshoe promoter from the early 1930's

until his death in 1946. More than once he had Fernando Isias and Ted Allen stop in the St. Louis area for show and pitching exhibitions. He ran the St. Louis Municipal Horseshoe League for many years. As an occupation Jack was caretaker of a large cemetery called Sunset Burial Park. He coined the popular phrase we all now use as "4-Dead" when he used to say, "'four dead' for Sunset Park."

Jack seemed to be in demand as an after dinner speaker and did a lot of mike work at exhibitions and during World Tournaments. In the early 1930's he took over the management of the Missouri State Championships, held at the fairgrounds in Sedalia. World Champion C.C. Davis had won the state title in 1934 and 1935. Mr. Claves then barred all national or ex-national champions for his state title competition so entries would increase, which they did.

After declining the NHPA presidency in 1935, Jack was elected vice president of the NHPA in 1939. At that same convention, a LeRoy Page was elected president. It was later learned that Mr. Page was not even a member of the NHPA, so Jack Claves served as President of the NHPA until the 1940 Convention."

Now we all know the complete story!!


INTRODUCING MS. GOODY TWO-SHOES!
