Congratulations to all of these individuals for their hard work and dedication to the Sport of Horseshoes.

The deadline for the Stokes Award is March 31, 2012 and for the Achievement Award, March 1, 2012. One other nomination for members to consider is the NHPA Hall of Fame. The 2012 World Horseshoe Tournament will be held July 30<sup>th</sup> – August 11<sup>th</sup> in Knoxville, Tennessee. The NHPA trailer has already arrived and they are excited about beginning preparations. Knoxville looks like a fun city with lots of things to do. I hope all of you can find time in your busy schedules to attend this tournament. It will be held at the Knoxville Convention Center. This facility is air conditioned and located in downtown Knoxville.

As part of my duties as World Tournament Coordinator, I attended the 2011 Connect Marketing Meeting which was held August 25-27, 2011 in Chicago, IL. The purpose of this meeting is to get groups of planners and sports organizers together to Connect with businesses on either hosting a meeting or a sporting event. Over 700 planners and sponsors attended this year's conference. Along with meeting groups, Collinson hosted many educational seminars to train organizers in the field of planning and executing events. Collinson had a booth for all the meeting planners, including one for the NHPA. For two days, appointments were scheduled with groups interested in hosting our event. Interest remains high with many organizations wanting to host the world tournament.

Sites expressing an interest (but have not signed a contract) in bidding for the 2014 events include Charleston, WV, Pleasanton, CA, Mobile Bay AL, Jackson, MS, State of Missouri, Albuquerque, NM, and Fargo, ND. Cost to attend this conference is minimal to the NHPA because Collinson Publishing agrees to pay the majority of my travel costs (airfare, hotel and registration). In exchange for this, I serve on their Advisory Council.

I also attended another Sports Marketing Conference in October which is TEAMS (Travel, Events, and Management in Sports) Oct 3<sup>rd</sup> – 7<sup>th</sup> in Las Vegas, NV. I believe these types of meetings benefit the sport of horseshoes, not only to draw interest in sites bidding for the world tournament, but also to raise awareness to the various sports marketing groups from all over the US that horseshoes are played at a competitive level.

For the Regional Directors, you may be contacted by your local CVB/Tourism group as I provided them your name to start the communication. I have encouraged them to team up with their local horseshoe clubs before starting the bidding process as I have found that teams comprised of both horseshoe and tourism groups seem to be more successful during the bidding process.

By the time you receive this issue of Newsline, the holiday season will be upon us. I'd like to take a moment to wish each and every one of you a happy holiday season and I look forward to seeing you in 2012.

## NHPF NEWS VIEWS & DONATIONS by Dave Loucks

This is the last issue of 2011 and a good time to recap a bit of the NHPF activity for the year. While there is still three months to go as I write this, the last quarter of the year has historically been among the slowest for the National Horseshoe Pitchers Foundation.

Only three horseshoe clubs applied for an NHPF grant this year and all received the maximum \$1,500. The Greater Detroit Club (MI) and the Lisbon Left Hand Club (ME) both received their checks in April. In September, the Lake Isabella Club (CA) was sent a check to assist in the addition of six new courts so the club could handle the 2012 California State Championships. While they did not apply for a grant, the NHPF Directors unanimously agreed and \$2,000 was sent to the Quail Ridge H.C. to assist in the purchase cost of an electronic scoring system for all 16 courts of the Wentzville facility. The NHPA and the QRHC will be sharing the remainder of the equipment cost. The system is expected to be operational by November and will truly make our Hall Of Fame facility state of the art.

Most of you know that South Africa was represented at the 2011 World Tournament by four pitchers, a first for them and the NHPA. As that country strives to introduce and build the sport in their homeland, a call for donated used horseshoes was put on the NHPA website forum. Pitching shoes are only available from the States and the cost of shipping to South Africa is very expensive. It is not known how many may have answered this request, but at least 21 pair were donated by Northern California members and given to Casey Sluys who arranged to package and ship them to South Africa. The NHPF is paying the shipping charges as

this easily falls under one of the purposes of Foundation Bylaws, to promote and advance the game of horseshoes within the United States and internationally as an amateur and recreational sport.

In late September, the last bricks ordered for 2011 were engraved at the Jack Freeman Memorial Plaza. To date, a total of 1,094 bricks have been engraved but there are many more available. During 2011, only 70 brick orders were processed, far fewer than previous years. Keep in mind that buying a brick is a great way to honor family, friend or a special occasion. It's a gift that will remain visible beyond our lifetime and the cost is just \$100 for a small or \$200 for a large brick. Forms to order a brick can be found and printed out by going to the NHPF link under the NHPA website.

Contributions to the NHPF are recognized by the IRS as taxdeductible donations and should be sent to the NHPF, P.O. Box 1628, Penn Valley, CA 95946. The Foundation extends its thanks to those mentioned below for the brick orders, contributions and delayed 2011 World Tournament income that was received during August and September totaling \$9,556.

# **PUBLICITY PROMOTION**

The 2011 horseshoe pitching season is nearing its end. It's time to kick off your 2012 membership drives. Nobody can reach the people in your community better than YOU!

Membership cards became available for the new season October 1<sup>st</sup>. That means every new member you sign will in essence be getting three extra months of sanctioned horseshoe pitching benefits!

Don't forget that men who become eligible to move up to the Elder's pitching distance in 2012 are able to purchase their new cards and begin pitching at that distance NOW. (*The only way you can move up early is to purchase your 2012 card early.*)

Fall is a great time to take horseshoe pitching to the younger crowd. A school carnival would be an ideal locale for a "pitchn-win" event! Contact your local school administration for details on adding a horseshoe toss to the list of carnival activities and games. It is not necessary to have two ends of a horseshoe court. Gamers can throw shoes to the peg and booth workers will bring them back. Ringers can be rewarded with carnival prizes. Be sure to have information on hand for the parents when they ask about organized events and membership! Stress the NHPA junior league scholarship program.

Many church affiliations offer organized league competitions between area churches. When you see a church league advertised, contact the organizer and ask about including horseshoe pitching with the basketball, volleyball and softball that most churches rally teams for.

It is time to start thinking about Holiday parades, as well. There are not many better opportunities to present your club and contact information to an entire community. Consider having a short horseshoe court on a flatbed trailer with members tossing shoes at each pause along the route. Or construct a float with giant horseshoes cut from plywood to attract attention. Use your imagination for an eye-catching, creative display, even if it is just loading the float with pitchers and trophies! Members can take turns walking beside the float, handing club contact information to the parade viewers.

We are always searching for new ways to promote the NHPA and horseshoe pitching. I have engaged the Marketing Department of the University of Central Oklahoma with the prospect of developing a nationwide marketing strategy for our association.

The goals we hope to achieve through this plan are increased awareness of the association, growing our general membership numbers, and attracting younger pitchers to the sport.

Another action being taken for the purpose of increasing our youth exposure is to join the National Council of Youth Sports. The NCYS membership represents more than 60,000,000 registered participants and 44,000,000 actual boys and girls participating in organized youth sports programs.

This association stresses healthy lifestyles and activities for youth. Membership will bring the benefits of networking with such groups as the Boys and Girls Clubs of America, Boy Scouts of America, YMCA, the Amateur Athletic Union, and many U.S. Olympic Committee National governing bodies, just to name a few. Among all the other benefits, we will be kept abreast on trends and participation in organized youth sports. The National Horseshoe Pitchers Association will also be listed on the NCYS website.

More information will be shared in future Newsline publications. In the meantime, if you have a success story to share about drawing new members into the NHPA, we all want to hear about it! A recent Forum thread on the NHPA website was involved with what types of horseshoes pitchers use at the World Tournament. Thinking that this might represent what is used in ALL clubs and horseshoe groups across the country, I will repeat the information I wrote there:

The most pitched single style of shoe in all classes were the Ted Allens - 123 pitchers used them - this brand only has one model which

makes that number seem even larger. Second most popular were various models of the Snyder horseshoes – 72 pitched the EZ Grip I, 58 pitched the EZ Grip II, while 9 pitched the Flip Grip. As you might imagine, these are more popular with pitchers who pitch the Flip and, therefore, more popular with women. Third most used are the Dead-Eyes – 58 pitched the EZ Grip, while 35 use the Clydesdales. Fourth were the M & M's - 48 pitchers used this, again with only one model while fifth were the Original Imperials - used by 46 pitchers. Other Imperial models were used by 41 pitchers. Sixth - The tried and true Diamond Tournaments were used by 45 pitchers, the Diamond Super Ringers by 14. Seventh - the Francis Signature at 42 pitchers (used more by the higher % pitchers) - other Francis 'shoes were pitched by 18 pitchers. There were over 50 types of horseshoes used in the 2011 World Tournament - some are VERY old and some are light. Most brands of horseshoes brought by ONE pitcher were four - I imagine carrying all of them helps keep him fit as well! He wasn't sure which kind he would use and said he would decide during his warm-up.

On that note, it sure is fun to meet all the pitchers as they come through the "shoe-check" line on their first day of World Tournament competition. We see excitement, feigned boredom, real nervousness, real calmness, everything. Thanks for sharing your emotions with us!

As I write this, the 2012 patches have just arrived. We begin the cycle again for the next year. Good luck to all charters to increase their memberships which will make it necessary to send out MORE patches!

In closing, I do want to mention one man from Louisiana who was at the World Tournament almost all day of every day, from the first day of set-up through the last day of the World Tournament. Ron Smith was everywhere, helping in every category, taking the initiative to learn about the electronic scoring so he could man the training station for electronic scoring. It was a pleasure to meet him and to watch his energy. Great job, Ron.

Hard to believe that we are almost finished with 2011. It has been a wild year for many parts of the country with many challenges, even for horseshoes. Some tournament sites were flooded out and could not run their tournaments; others had flooded roads and couldn't get to tournaments. Let us hope for a quieter weather year in 2012, with increased participation in tournaments across the country. Take care!!

# SOUTH AFRICA HORSESHOE PITCHING by Casey Sluys

As many of you know our grandson, Travis, and I traveled to South Africa to promote horseshoe pitching and participate in their game called Jukskei, a precision throwing sport. We went with five other NHPA members from throughout the country.

This proved to be a fruitful recruiting effort. For the first time in our one hundred year history, we had four South Africans pitching in the 2011 World Horseshoe Pitching Championships (WT) in Monroe, Louisiana. Not only did they pitch but also, two came in first and one came in second. Their names are Thomas Venter, Nic Van Stryp, Helgard Hansen, and Francois Van Zyl.

Our experience in South Africa showed us that the people were very gracious and went out of their way to accommodate

us. Therefore, we felt that we should reciprocate that hospitality. That being said we traveled to the 2011 World Tournament three days early to be able to pick these gentlemen up from the airport in our van. We acted as their taxi, chaperone, guide and coach, in all aspects particularly getting them familiar with the concept of pitching a round robin format in the WT. It was perhaps the most rewarding experience we have had at any of the 23 consecutive WT's we've attended.

Their experience with pitching consisted of three to six months of intermittent practice, 500 shoes to establish a pitching average, and a long, costly flight to the U S to participate. Their averages were: Thomas 10.5%, Nic 5.0%, Helgard 10%, and Francois 29%. All four of them pitched in the WT warm-up on the Saturday

before the WT began. Helgard swept everyone with an amazing 35% average. He humbly approached me saying that he was here to make friends and not necessarily win everything and asked if he could be moved up a few classes for the WT. We spoke with Dick Hansen the NHPA Sec/Treas and tournament director. He had an opening in a 25% class so we all agreed that that would be a better spot for Helgard. He went 2-3 the first day, was somewhat frustrated but, and then practiced for a few hours and went on to win his last ten games for a 13-2 record with a 37% average to WIN that class also. Nic won his class, going 12-1 with 18.65% with Thomas coming in second at 11-2 and 18.46% and Francois coming in 11th in his class. Helgard is a superb athlete playing Rugby, Jukskei and golf all at levels unprecedented for a 22 year old. This young man has the potential of becoming the South African equivalent of Alan Francis.

One more note; they soaked up any and all instructions to become better pitchers. It was extremely rewarding for us to watch them excel at "our game" We can only hope that this international competition with blossom into a full-fledged charter in South Africa. The neighboring country of Namibia also has shown interest and we hope in future years that they will be able to participate also.

South Africa is in desperate need of horseshoes though as there

For the past three years they have assisted the Orange County Senior Olympics' horseshoe pitching event conducted at the Orange Horseshoe Club. They consider these services as terrific opportunities to promote horseshoes around the Southern California area.

### Northern CA - Casey Sluys

We attended the 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Guardsmen SF Horseshoe Tournament & BBQ. It was a great tournament and the San Francisco Horseshoe Pitching Club would like to become part of the NCHPA! This means we are back pitching in San Francisco! The NCHPA would like to thank current men's World Champion, Brian Simmons for taking part in the initial sanctioned tournament for The San Francisco Horseshoe Club two years ago.

At the 91st California State Championships, sponsored by the NCHPA, in Bakersfield, 160 pitchers participated. There were 87 NCHPA pitchers and 73 SCHPA pitchers. Rick Bermingham repeated as Men's State Champion. Bernardo Navarro III won the Cadet State Championship. Kimmy Stockli won the Women's State Championship.

We have held 103 NCHPA tournaments. In those tournaments, 2,126 pitchers made 144,216 ringers while pitching 509,252 shoes, for an average of 28.32%. We also had a total of 83 members pitching in 22 tournaments outside the NCHPA area. These members pitched in Southern California, Arizona, Nevada, Hawaii and Louisiana. In those tournaments, our members made 6,488 ringers while pitching 22,594 shoes for an average of 28.72%.

# JUNIOR SPOTLIGHT Written by Robert Taylor & Submitted by Justin Sipma



**Tyler Howard** 

At thirteen years old, Richmond, Kentucky's Tyler Howard is already nine-year veteran of the sport he loves. Tyler became interested pitching horseshoes when he was four years old, through seeing his father Omer participate in the local Madison County Horseshoe League and numerous KHPA tournaments. Tyler became an NHPA sanctioned junior horseshoe pitcher the following year in 2003 and competed in his first Kentucky State

Tournament averaging an impressive 24%. If the terms "natural talent" and "child prodigy" were ever used to describe a youth in the sport of horseshoes, they most certainly would fit Tyler Howard.

In 2004, his first full year of competition as a Junior Cadet, Tyler would push his percentage over the 50% mark and become Kentucky's first Cadet State Champion. A 50% average at only the age of five! Tyler would be crowned Kentucky State Cadet Champ from 2004-06. Tyler would move into the 30 foot Junior Boy's Division for the 2008 season, holding up his percentage well with the added distance. Over the next two years his NATSTATS average did nothing but climb as he was averaging a 43.68% in 2008, a 56.67% in 2009, a 64.87% in 2010, and a 65.06% in 2011. Tyler captured four straight Junior Boy's Kentucky State Titles from 2008-2011.

Tyler made his first World Tournament appearance in 2009, winning first place in the Junior's "B" Class. He qualified for the Boy's Championship Class where he posted a fifth place finish with a 57.99% average. Then in the 2011 World Tournament, Tyler again qualified for the Boy's Championship Class and placed sixth with an average of 60.66%. In 2010, Tyler's horseshoe progress would leap three more hurdles in the July third Jim Noble Memorial at Elizabethtown, Kentucky. There, Tyler won his first Class "A" regular season tournament, pitching his highest tournament percentage to date at 70.3% and achieved two 80%+ games, all amongst some of Kentucky's stiffest competition.

Speaking of his horseshoe style, Tyler has a natural knack for horseshoes and his ability to learn the game. He is equally skilled with the Single Flip, Double Flip, and 11/4 Turn. He throws an Imperial Original horseshoe right-handed with a quick aim and short delivery. He is frequently spotted on the courts emulating his favorite players and exhibiting his skill of multiple flips and turns. Tyler's Awards include Kentucky's Most Improved Player-2004 and Kentucky Horseshoe Pitcher of The Year- 2005.

Tyler states his horseshoe goal as "to get as good as Alan Francis" and if he has any advice to pass on to an incoming junior player, it would be "practice makes perfect." Tyler can be found most every evening practicing horseshoes on his backyard court during the summer months and pitches one night a week in the Madison County Horseshoe Club League in Richmond.

At his young age, Tyler has represented the sport of horseshoes well and never seems to get discouraged with the game. He is full of energy and enjoys every minute of his time in competition and comradery on and around the courts. Tyler plans to attend the 2012 World Horseshoe Tournament in Knoxville, Tennessee and should continue to be a force to be reckoned with on the state and national horseshoe scene in the years to come.

# HORSESHOE FACTS & FOLKLORE by Bob Dunn

Harry "POP" Woodfield



President "Pop" Woodfield of the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association, Washington, D. C., made a trip to Des Moines in December. He consulted with horseshoe leaders in a number of places, making plans to keep the game as intact as possible during the war.

Harry "Pop" Woodfield was one of our great presidents, one of our most ambitious workers and a truly great leader. He was inducted to our NHPA Hall of Fame in Why don't we know more about him? Well, he lived a long time ago, being born in 1877, which is almost within ten years of the end of the Civil War. He was elected President in 1941 and endured the toll that World War II had on our sport and on the whole country. At that time the NHPA was rather depleted of momentum and membership (1941 NHPA membership was 1,297). It was a tough

time to get things done, and there were little to no funds to attempt much of anything. Conducting World Tournaments was difficult and to make things more difficult, for most of the time there was no organizational magazine. He may have been one of our hardest working presidents and has maybe the least to show.

There was a World Tournament held in Des Moines, Iowa in 1941, but then no event until 1946, when the annual event was again held in Des Moines. In these events, there was competition for men only.

No women's competition, in fact no women's competition had been held since 1936. And no Junior competition had been held since 1924. But Woodfield was working on the situation and recognized a group called the Woman's National Tournament Committee, headed up by Virginia Coker and Katie Gregson, both of California. Women's competition in the World Tournament was re-established in 1947, Woodfield's last year as President, and has been held each year ever since. The Junior Boys competition was revived in 1951, a couple years after Woodfield left office, and that is another matter that he had been working on.

The fact that the 1947 World Tournament was held in Murray, Utah was another bold move on Woodfield's part. Smart also. Whether it was Woodfield's decision or shared by the NHPA council's, following the lead of the great promoter, Arch Stokes, and accepting his invitation to come to Utah become a very

historic era of the sport of horseshoe pitching. Twelve of the next thirteen World Tournaments were held at the Murray County Courts and the NHPA grew and prospered into the 1960's and into today.

For the most part, we don't know much about Harry Woodfield because there was poor documentation during the years of his seven-year administration. The long time publication *Horseshoe World* terminated in 1943. There was a span of over five years with absolutely no organizational publication until Woodfield himself started the mimeographed *Horseshoe News* newsletter. Because of the newsletter type quality of this publication, few copies still exist, and being the editor, Woodfield wrote little about himself. So what we do know about this great man is limited to a very interesting and informative obituary that Hall of Fame member, Leland S. Mortenson wrote for the January 1951 *Horseshoe Pitcher*...

OVER THE COFFEE CUP By Leland S. Mortenson

Harry Thorpe Woodfield 1877 - 1950

"Harry Woodfield was born in Washington D.C., January 21, 1877 and he departed this life December 6<sup>th</sup>, 1950, at 4002 Oliver Street, Hyattsville, Maryland, where he was living with one of his children.

Mr. Woodfield was born in a stone house, which was located on the site where now stands the great Walter Reed Hospital. His parents were Henry and Mary Woodfield. He was an early apprentice in the plumbing trade and shortly after having become a master plumber; he conducted an extensive business of his own for many years. He retired from active participation in this business, some years ago.

He had always been interested in sports. As a young man, he belonged to a famous bicycle club in Washington D.C. and he was a member of a troupe of amateur acrobats. They were known as

the DelRoys and they preformed at many places for several years. He was the "strong man" of the outfit and he was called upon to hold five men on his shoulders at one time in what was called the "pyramid act." He also turned somersaults, feet to feet, holding a twenty-five pound dumb bell in each hand!

For over fifteen years, he had been interested in the sport of horseshoe pitching, published a magazine about this game for a short time, served several years as President of the National Horseshoe Pitchers' Association and was Honorary President at the time of his death.

While drinking a cup of coffee and reading a newspaper on the morning of December 6<sup>th</sup>, he was suddenly seized with a congestive heart attack and death followed immediately. He had not been ill previous to this time.

Mr. Woodfield leaves four children: Wm. H Woodfield and Harry Woodfield, Jr., both of Washington D.C., Mrs. F.W. McDaniel, Hyattsville, Md. and Mrs. J. Birney Linn. Monticello, Florida. He had eleven grand children and three great grand children. His wife, Inez, preceded him in death, many years ago.

His funeral was attended by a great many of his friends, including close followers and active participants of the horseshoe pitching sport. Many beautiful floral pieces from horseshoe clubs, groups and individuals from all over the United States. The Metropolitan Area Horseshoe Club of Washington D.C. sent a large floral horseshoe composed of red carnations on a green background. The pall bearers were Rod Thomas, national known sports writer; Clayton "Boo" Henson, famous horseshoe pitcher and a former officer of the National Association; Walter Haley, Everett Clift, Dale Carson and Woody Wilson.

The Woodfield family, wishes to express, through the medium of *The Horseshoe Pitcher*; its appreciation to the many followers of the horseshoe game who expressed their sympathies with flowers, letters, cards and telephone calls.

While we cannot, in any way, cover Mr. Woodfield's vast service to the horseshoe sport in this short article, we can glance over it in outline form.

He first promoted and directed local tournaments in and around Washington D.C. in the late 1930's and was successful in getting an unusual amount of newspaper publicity. At about the same time, he became a reader of the Horseshoe World and became interested in the game's possibility from a national and worldwide scope, point of view.

In 1940, he attended the World's Championship Tournament and convention and was appointed Publicity Director by President Page. In 1941 at the World's Tournament and National Convention, he was elected President. He was re-elected in 1946 and again in 1947. In 1948, he was elected Honorary President for life.

Mr. Woodfield's achievements in promotion were many. A few were: He had Gene Tunney come down and pitch the first shoe in one of the local Washington, D.C. tournaments; he had officers from the Athletic Headquarters of the Army visit him at the Washington D.C. courts and discuss promotion with him; he got the Army to include horseshoes as one of its major sports in World War II; he built the horseshoe courts at the White House for President Truman; he improved upon the horseshoe courts used by the Washington D.C. Horseshoe Club. 'Tis said that when President Truman was taking one of his walks one day, he stopped at the courts, saw one of the club members pitching into a hole, whereupon he picked up a spade, leveled the court, smiled and hurried away.

He had a lot to do, along with Arch Stokes, in getting Murray, Utah, first interested in a national tournament in 1947. He furnished the information for Frank Menke's chapter on horseshoe pitching in the "Encyclopedia of Sports," and he furnished a diagram of a modern horseshoe court for Tunis' "Sports for the Fun of it," the first edition of which sold out almost immediately after it came off the press.



Within the past few years, Mr. Woodfield has interested a national boys club in horseshoe promotion. At the time of his death, he had recently arranged for a conference with the officials of the A.A.U. about securing their cooperation in trying to get the Army to again get behind the game. He was also in correspondence with the State Department in a program to disseminate horseshoe news to the military service men."

### **LETTER TO THE NHPA**

Where have all the older lady horseshoe pitchers gone? My name is Gloria Smith and I have been pitching horseshoes since the early 1980's. I have pitched in the Wisconsin State and World Tournaments since 1989. I am 82 years young and for the past few years have been having a hard time getting the shoe to the stake. My shoes are about one inch short-open but not close enough to measure a ringer! I enjoy the game, people and friends I have met over the years. I do not want to quit pitching shoes.

I have talked for years of someway to allow women over 70 to move closer to the stake. Men, at age 70 can move up; why not women over 70? We only need a step. I have heard the main cause of concern was too many foul lines. I would be willing to wear a patch on my shirt or have a different colored name tag that would give me an OK to step over the present foul line. One step for any lady over 70 would keep us pitching and smiling. While at the World Tournament in Cedar Rapids, I heard some of the older women talking to one of the NHPA officers about the possibility of moving up. It was suggested the change may begin at the local club level. The NHPA and WHPA are concerned with the loss of membership and we need to do something to keep the older ladies to continue pitching. There seems to me there is a bit of discrimination where the older men and women pitchers are concerned.

It is my plea to everyone on all levels—local, state and national - to think about and try to determine a plan to keep our elderly women pitchers. There might have been quite a few elderly men leaving the game of horseshoes if they were not permitted to move to a shorter distance. Thank you for listening, reading and perhaps making changes.



# NHPA RULES AND BYLAWS by Dan Sanders

"Moving Up" this year? Some important information to be aware of...

You may recall that in September of 2009, the NHPA Council enacted a change to Rule 1 Section E – Elder Men, which allows qualifying men to move into the Elders Division when membership cards become available in October of the year preceding their 70th birthday. This Rule was nearly unanimously enacted by the vote of delegates at the 2010 NHPA Convention in Springfield, Illinois. This change allows for a smoother transition for pitching in most Winter leagues (not having to change pitching distance in the middle of the league season, after January 1<sup>st</sup>), and also allows several additional months for Elders to complete the four sanctioned events that are required for entering the World Tournament.

An Important Question and Interpretation about this new Rule

Since the above rule change was enacted, I have received several questions from our members for an interpretation of our current Rule in RGS Section E, 1. which reads: Once a member declares himself a short distance pitcher, he must remain a short distance pitcher for that entire calendar year. The question being asked by these mostly 69-year-olds is... "If I purchase my 2012 card in October of 2011, and notify my State Secretary (as required) that I want to change my pitching distance to 30 feet at that time, can I change back to 40 feet at the end of this calendar year (3 months later)?" The interpretation and answer is "no" as the additional three months (October through December of 2011) is actually a backwards extension of 2012, when this pitcher will become 70 years of age. And so the earliest that this pitcher could return to the 40-foot pitching distance would be when the 2013 cards become available, sometime in October of 2012. And so there will be a proposal to change the wording of the sentence in Section E, I (see above) to: Once a member declares himself a short-distance pitcher, he must remain in that Division until the next year's membership card becomes available. In other words, the time for changing one's pitching distance will be tied to the year printed on the card, rather than to the calendar year. Until this proposed change can become officially enacted at our 2012 NHPA Convention in Knoxville, Charter Secretaries should follow the above interpretation and proposed wording when issuing new cards to all qualified men who may be changing their pitching distance. The 30-foot pitching distance should also be circled on this newly-issued card so that Tournament Directors can easily verify the pitching distance of the entrant, at the time of sign-in.

More information and reminders to our older male pitchers (and league/tournament directors): If you will become 70 years of age at any time during 2012, you qualify for moving into the Elders Division and can "move up" to the shorter-distance foul line upon purchasing your 2012 NHPA membership card, which becomes available from your State Secretary, *this* October. This move-up is not a requirement, so if you want to continue pitching from the full distance, that is

your option. A reminder that if/whenever you may decide to change to the Elders Division, you cannot move back to the full distance Men's Division (very few pitchers ever do this) until you purchase your 2013 (or next) membership card. Also you will be required to make some official changes, as follows:

- 1) Notify your State Secretary of this change when you purchase your new membership card. Your State Secretary will then notify NatStats that you are entering the Elders Division so that your 40-foot pitching stats can be changed. Your new card will also be marked with your new pitching distance, so that Tournament Directors can verify this official change.
- 2) Re-qualify at this new distance in one of the following ways:
- A) If your first sanctioned event at this new distance is *league play*, your new, shorter-distance ringer percentage will be established via league play and can be used as your current ringer percentage (for tournaments), if/when a minimum of 400 shoes have been pitched. Please note that this new league ringer average will *not* be reported to NatStats until *after the end* of the league season/session.
- If your first sanctioned event at this new distance is a tournament, you must establish your new, short-distance ringer percentage by pitching 100 consecutive shoes on a sanctioned court. This qualifier must be scored in writing and witnessed by two NHPA members no more than 30 days before the tournament entry deadline (see RGS Book, Rule 11, Section D.l). This dated and signed, official scoresheet can then be sent to the Tournament Director and will be used for seeding purposes. A reminder that if you are already participating in league play and wish to enter a tournament, your current league average (if based on 400 shoes or more) can be used for tournament seeding purposes, instead of the 100-shoe qualifier. However, this league average will have to verified, in some official way, by the tournament director, as NatStats will have no record of your league play until after that league season/session has been completed. A telephone confirmation between the league director and tournament director is recommended.

If you do not have a copy of the current RGS Book, it can be found on the NHPA Website, or a copy can be requested from your Charter Secretary or from our National Secretary, Dick Hansen. Please send your proposed changes to me by e-mail or by US mail (see addresses on page 3). I would like to have all proposed RGS changes by December 31st of this year. ### **NEED A NEW BUILDING FOR YOUR CLUB -**

# GO TO SCHOOL by Phil Plothe, RD Wyoming

All you clubs in the country that may be in dire need of a new building to use as your tournament/league or office/storage facility, pay attention to this. Two years ago, our club like many others, had a building that was used as the club office and storage for shovels,

brooms, rakes, tables, chairs, lawn mower, computers, etc. And, if your building is as crowded with stuff as ours was, you have to unload most of the equipment before you can even get in to use it.

Our club desperately needed more room. We thought we could build one using club members, but that idea was quickly shot down. So, we checked into buying a pre-built shed from one of the local companies and soon found ourselves looking at a \$1,200 to \$1,600 bill for the size shed we wanted. Like most clubs, we were short on funds and decided to have a fund raiser to get enough cash to buy a shed to use for storage and free up our existing building. Our fund raiser was selling raffle tickets on "booze baskets." That's right, booze. People like booze. We begged, borrowed or stole enough bottles of all kinds of

alcohol from club members and alcohol distributers to make four large baskets full of assorted booze. We sold approximately \$1,300 in chances so we were very close to our goal. We drew out four names from the bucket and made four people happy. Surprisingly, the booze basket idea went over much better that we originally thought. People were very eager to take a

chance and buy a ticket, especially when told them that it was a fund raiser for our club.

Fortunately for us, we have two pitchers in our club, Bill Kern and Robin Matti, who work for a company called Contractors Supply Inc. Between the two of them, they have many great contacts with local builders in Gillette. Robin is the store manager and has been very generous with keeping our club supplied with horseshoe pitching related supplies from his company.

While the booze basket promotion was going on, Bill in conversation with customers at work, discovered that each

year the local high school's building/craft department took on a class project that covered everything from building a new house or remodeling an old one, to building storage sheds.

Bill contacted the high school teacher in charge of that department to see what we needed to do to have the class build our shed for us. He was told that they were currently involved in a large project and if there was time at the end of the school year, he would get the class to build one for us. All we had to do was give them the size we wanted and supply the

materials. We raised \$1,300 from the booze basket raffle so we had enough money to get started. We figured that we would have tap into our already stressed bank account in order to buy the materials needed.

Now, you would have to know Bill to really appreciate this next move. Bill wasn't satisfied with using our money; he felt pretty sure that he could convince one of the building supply centers to donate to our club the materials needed for the project. And that slick tongued rascal did just that. Not only did they agree to donate the materials, they used their large truck to move the shed from the school to our court location. All we had to do was prepare a pad for the shed to sit on. We laid down weed block material, landscaping timbers and a truck load of rock (donated) for the pad.

The kids at the school did a good job of assembling the building. After the shed arrived, there were some finishing touches we needed to make. The shed was leveled, trimmed with 1x4"s, locks installed, we put vents on each end because we keep our lawn mower inside, and it needed a good coat of paint. This work was done by club members. All in all, our out of pocket expense for the project was less than \$300. We now have a large storage shed for all our accessories.

The moral of this story is: explore all possible avenues; don't be afraid to ask for donations from local businesses. Remember - you start at NO, anything beyond NO is a bonus; check with various local entities like a high school, building contractors, contractor supply centers, etc., to see if they have similar capabilities and are willing to donate materials.

Oh, by the way, it sure helps to have a Bill and Robin in your club.

### 2011 NHPA BUSINESS MEETING MINUTES

July 24, 2011 Civic Center, Monroe, Louisiana

President Stu Sipma had a few announcements to make before the meeting: James Mayo, Mayor of Monroe welcomed the delegates and visitors. He gave a brief presentation about the economy of Monroe. Also, thanks to the VTB (Visitor, Tourism Bureau.)

At 8:35 President Sipma called the convention to order. Ken Heinritz, NHPA Chaplain, gave the opening prayer. Casey Sluys, former NHPA VP led the Pledge of Allegiance. The convention meeting rules were approved. President Sipma, announced the minutes approval committee consisting of Jerry LaBrosse (MN), Phyllis Quist (WA), and Jane Smith (WI.)

Sipma read the Credential report consisting of 128 total votes (of which 16 votes were absentee ballot), making it a total of 112 delegates signed in, with 74 votes being a 2/3 majority and 57 a simple majority.

The Financial report was read and approved.

The two sites for the 2013 World Tournament (WT) gave their presentations with York winning the flip and presenting 1<sup>st</sup>. Their dates were subject to change depending on the delegates. Representatives from the Visitors/Tourism bureau, Laura and Steve, and EPHPA pitcher, Dave Halliday described the pitching, meeting, camping, and motel areas. Questions were answered before the St. George, Utah representatives presented their site. Again dates were flexible, the site air conditioned as was York. All tournament events would take place at the Civic Center. Dennis Ohms was the horseshoe pitcher representing the area and helped answer questions directed to the St. George Visitor/Tourism spokespersons. With presentations completed the NHPA delegates voted on the site with St. George, Utah winning the 2013 WT.

Brian Fisher gave some sound travel suggestions for both the 2012 and 2013 sites.

Dan Sanders presented the By Law changes as written in the NHPA Newsline. All by laws were unanimously approved.

Candidates for the 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice Presidency, Donna Bastel and David Sidles, gave short presentation asking delegates for their support. A vote was taken and Dave Sidles will take over the 3<sup>rd</sup> VP from Lorraine Sternberg on January 1. All other officers- 1<sup>st</sup> VP Dan Sanders and 5<sup>th</sup> VP Debby Michaud up for election ran unopposed so were declared winners.

Dick Hansen reviewed the changes the computerized scoring has made in the cost and efficiency of running the WT. Suggestions from last year, such as seeding of the Juniors, seemed to be a success as was the increase in the number of elders moving into the Championship Division. He asked for suggestions to improve the WT in future years. Several suggestions were given and will be given consideration.

The NHPA Officers each gave short presentations on the activities they are responsible for. Dan Sanders mentioned e mail was the most efficient to reach him for Rule and By Law changes. Changes must include a reference to the current rule, the rewritten suggestion and reason for the suggested change. For rule changes this must be accomplished by December 31, 2011. Once he receives the suggested change, he shares them with his committee who must approve them before they are presented to the executive council and finally the delegates.

Tina Hawkins listed several publicity items available to clubs and charters, such as rack cards, bumper stickers and ink pens, and reminded everyone of the "Horseshoe Pitching is Fun" printable materials that are still available on the website. "The Daily Shoe" publication during the World Tournament and plans to contact a marketing group following the World Tournament for ideas to promote awareness of the NHPA and make it appeal to the younger generations.

Lorraine Sternberg wished Dave well when he takes over in January. She has enjoyed working with and meeting so many dedicated horseshoe pitchers.

Jerry LaBrosse, Charter Communications, thanked those purchasing courts and a special thanks to Kurt Whaley for his time and dedication to the HS Master program. He also urged the horseshoe population to purchase raffle tickets for the 2012 WT experience.

Debby Michaud thanked the RD's for their help in the sanctioning of the courts and helping with the shoe check at this WT. Very special thanks to Vicki Winston for her Hall of Fame work and to Ann and Rob Hagman for their computer expertise.

Stu Sipma disclosed that there were several sites interested in the 2014 WT: Alabama, California, Missouri, New Mexico, and Toronto Canada. He attends several different conventions trying to attract interest in our event.

Dick Hansen reminded the delegates of the Hall of Fame Banquet Sunday evening. He also corrected a misconception. Casey Sluys is taking over Dick's position as director for the National Horseshoe Pitchers Foundation (NHPF). Dick is still our NHPA Sec-Treas.

Gary Roberts reported on the NHPA trip to South Africa with Debby Michaud, Casey and Travis Sluys, and two Ohio and Virginia NHPA members. It was a great trip which resulted in four South Africans pitching in this years WT.

Don Titcomb gave suggestions for promoting our great game of horseshoes mentioning that this may be his last "active" tournament.

Jerry Smith is working on the History of WT champions from 1990 to the present.

Barry Chapelle urged charters to host a horseshoe event to benefit the NHPF.


There were several (Rob Hagman, Joe Faron, Jerry LaBrosse) requests to continue donations to the NHPF. This is our organization and we need to support it.

# RECEIVES LIFESAVING EQUIPMENT FROM PROGRESS WEST HEALTHCARE CENTER by Jeanette Claas

Many wonderful and exciting times happen at the NHPA Hall of Fame facility, but perhaps the story you are about to read is one of the most rewarding moments we have experienced since the opening of the new public building.

At the April 2011 Quail Horseshoe Club meeting, the members voted to purchase a defibrillator. We began researching the item and cost to purchase this lifesaving device. Joyce Mauzy, a member of QRHC and a retired administrative assistant from Christian Hospital NE, had an idea. She contacted Progress West HealthCare Center to see if they would be interested in donating a defibrillator to this public facility. After going through proper channels, Joyce was notified by Progress West that they would be happy to donate the AED device as part of their Community Benefit Program. Progress West HealthCare Center and Christian Hospital are members of BJC HealthCare.



On August 4, 2011 representatives of Progress West HealthCare Center came to the NHPA Hall of Fame in Wentzville to present an AED (defibrillator) to Quail Ridge Horseshoe Club. "We're happy to provide this AED as a community benefit to this active and vibrant club," said Barbara McLaurine, manager of marketing & physician services. "In addition to the AED, we are ensuring members who volunteer know how to use the AED and

administer CPR." Linda Canoy, RN, clinical nurse at Progress West, will train and certify over 40 QRHC members with a  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hour CPR and AED training course.

Upon accepting the AED device Jeanette Claas, president of the QRHC, acknowledged, "On behalf of the NHPA/NHPF please accept our sincere thanks for the donation of the AED defibrillator to be used at the NHPA Hall of Fame facility in Wentzville. It will be a great asset to our organization that will be used for the welfare of the horseshoe members and visitors that come to this public facility. In appreciation the NHPA/NHPF will be placing a commemorative brick in the Jack Freeman Brick Memorial Plaza." Joe Faron, vice president of the NHPF represented the national organization.

Five training sessions were set for the month of August at the NHPA facility at no cost to the participants. The first of five training sessions began immediately after the presentation. "It was such a great learning and valuable experience to know that we have the knowledge to possibly save a life if the need would ever arise," said Jeanette Claas upon receiving

her official card.
"Hopefully, we will never have to use it, but we are now aware of what we can do if and when an emergency does occur."



Although the e q u i p m e n t

was purchased by Progress West, the QRHC will receive ownership and have it registered to receive a policy and will be fully maintained by the horseshoe club. The club will notify the fire and ambulance service in the Wentzville area that we have the equipment on hand in case of emergencies. A monthly checkup sheet to monitor batteries and supplies will be part of the maintenance program.

Not too soon after all members were certified, we received a message from NHPA President Stu Sipma, that the company which he is employed, the Tesoro Corp. Mandin-ND would like to donate the cabinet where the AED will be stored. Within a week the cabinet arrived. Our carpenters Bob Cutright and Joe Faron installed the cabinet inside the entrance to the north and south courts. Linda Canoy, our CPR instructor will be delivering the other necessities that will be needed.

The Quail Ridge Horseshoe Club would like to acknowledge its member, Joyce Mauzy for her effort, time and follow through to make this a successful transaction. We are thankful for the 40 wonderful volunteers who made time for the training course and to the Tesoro Corp for its contribution of the cabinet. A memorial brick is now in place at the Jack Freeman Memorial Brick Walkway to show our deep gratitude to the Progress West HealthCare Center for their generous gift.

The QRHC is always looking for ways to improve the facility to make it the nicest and safest place to pitch horseshoes. We hope that you can find time in your life to come and see the facility and pitch a few shoes. You can rest assure that we will know what to do if you should have an emergency. ### FRANK FOSTER EACHUS: FATHER OF THE

# OPEN-SHOE by Frank Hull Eachus



horseshoes from a 1922 magazine article about him.

Nearly 3,000 fans cheered as though they were at big league baseball game as Frank Eachus. of Gallipolis, Ohio, threw ringer after ringer during his bid for the 1916 State of Ohio Horseshoe Championships. Eachus won every game he pitched and ended his streak by winning four in a row in the final match against runner-up Joe Bricker, of Canton.

The tournament was Frank Foster Eachus pitching held at The Ohio State Fair. Each county held a tournament to decide the county representative

to the State Tournament. Eachus won the right to represent Gallia County. At the state tournament, Eachus was the only pitcher who was throwing the "open shoe."

According to an article appearing in the September, 1930 issue of "The Horseshoe World," "Back in 1916 at the state horseshoe tournament at Columbus. one of the contestants stood out from all the others. While they were tossing their shoes at the stake with indifferent success, he was scoring ringers with a then unheard-of frequency.

That player was Frank Eachus, Gallipolis barber, the father of the open shoe, a development that has made of horseshoes a scientific sport instead of the back alley game it used to be. Needless to say, he won the state championship that year."

Eachus loved the game of horseshoes, so he practiced continuously. He built his own horseshoe court behind his barbershop on 37 Court Street in Gallipolis. The locals would joke; no matter how long the line was for a haircut, if Eachus was in the middle of a game of horseshoes, the line would just have to wait. Around 1915, Eachus discovered that if he held his shoes on the side instead of hooking his finger around the end, as was the norm, he could control the number of revolutions of the shoe. By adjusting the grip, he found he could spin the shoe one and one-quarter turn, or a one and three-quarter

Through the years 1914 – 1921, Eachus was recognized a one of the top horseshoe pitchers in the nation. He gained national recognition when the Saturday Evening ran an article which proclaimed Eachus as the inventor of the open shoe style of pitching.

Eachus was born November 30, 1872 at Patriot, Ohio. He lived his entire life in Gallia County. Truly a man-about-town in Gallipolis, his barbershop was always abuzz with the latest news, and gossip, of the day. Known as Gallipolis' most famous barber, mainly due to his horseshoe pitching prowess, he

also played the banjo and performed as a comedian in black-face minstrel shows.

There is some controversy concerning the true inventor of the open shoe. It has been said that most historians give the nod to George May, of Akron, Ohio, as the inventor of the Further open shoe. research would indicate

differently. By his own admission, it was after the 1920 World Championship that May decided to change his grip. This is when he claims he "discovered" the one and one-quarter turn.

The earliest, documented, open shoe was thrown by Eachus during the Ohio State Tournament in 1916. He was the only player at the tournament who was throwing the open shoe. Frank Foster Eachus deserves the title "Father of the Open Shoe."
