Just a reminder, elections are open for President, 1st VP, 3rd VP and 5th VP positions. Per the By-Laws, candidates for NHPA office must announce their candidacy in writing to be received by the President and the Horseshoe Pitching Newsline Editor no later than February 1, 2013.

During the 2012 World Tournament in Knoxville, TN, the NHPA Council recognized many individuals with awards at the Hall of Fame Banquet. Gary Roberts received the Stokes Award, Jeanette Claas received the President's Award, a special award was presented to Lorraine Sternberg for her many years of service as the 3rd VP on the NHPA Council. Ronnie Miller received the Gene & Mary Van Sant Memorial Award, and two Achievement awards were presented to Jerry Smith of Idaho and Gary Buehler of Missouri. Congratulations to allow of these individuals for their hard work and dedication to the Sport of Horseshoes.

If you have anyone in your Charter who you feel is worthy of one of these awards, please email me with a note and I will send you a nomination form. The deadline for the Stokes Award is March 31, 2013 and for the Achievement Award, March 1, 2013. One other nomination for members to consider is the NHPA Hall of Fame. If any of you have an individual who you feel is a candidate, please contact myself or Vicki Winston at horshuvicki@socket.net for a nomination form. Nomination forms must be received by Vicki Winston by January 31, 2013.

The 2013 World Horseshoe Tournament will be held July 22^{nd} – August 3^{rd} at St. George, UT. The NHPA trailer has already arrived and in talking to Kevin Lewis (Sports, Events, and Adventure Director), they have it parked in a location that is visible for everyone to see. He also informed me that he become a NHPA member and plans on getting his four sanctioned tournaments so he can participate in the 2013 World Tournament. I think this is the first time I can remember that a person associated with the local Tourism has participated in this event. "Good Luck Kevin."

The NHPA Council will be having our annual winter meeting January 31st – Feb 2nd at St. George so everyone can see firsthand the Dixie Center and everything the town has to offer. We are excited about this next year's event in that we will also have pitchers from the country

of Namibia participating. We have not confirmed at this time if South Africa will be attending.


As part of my duties as World Tournament Coordinator, I attended the 2012 TEAMS (Travel, Events, and Management in Sports) which was held October 1st – 4th, 2012 in Detroit, MI. The purpose of this meeting is to get groups of planners and sports organizers together to TEAMS with businesses on either hosting a meeting or a sporting event. Seven hundred forty seven planners and sponsors attended this year's conference. Along with meeting groups, TEAMS had many keynote and general sessions to attend. At these sessions you got to listen from many athletes who found success through sports. For two days, appointments were scheduled with groups interested in hosting our event. Interest remains high with many organizations wanting to host the world tournament. Sites expressing an interest (but have not signed a contract) in bidding for the 2015 events include Charleston, WV (2nd time competing), Mobile Bay/Montgomery AL, Toronto, Ontario Canada, Lebanon MO, Tulsa OK and Evansville

I believe these types of meetings benefit the sport of horseshoes, not only to draw interest in sites bidding for the world tournament, but also to raise awareness to the various sports marketing groups from all over the US that horseshoes are played at a competitive level.

For the Regional Directors, you may be contacted by your local CVB/Tourism group as I provided them your name to start the communication. I have encouraged them to team up with their local horseshoe clubs before starting the bidding process as I have found that teams comprised of both horseshoe and tourism groups seem to be more successful during the bidding process.

REGIONAL DIRECTORS REPORT by Debby Michaud, NHPA 5th VP

My first order of business this month is to make an announcement. I thought that if I made the announcement in the middle of the column, many might not read it at all so here it is right up front! The announcement is that I have made the decision to NOT run for NHPA office in 2013. It will be four years that I will have been the NHPA 5th VP and, on many levels, I have enjoyed it tremendously. Now that I'm retired, you might think I have MORE time to spend on horseshoes, which is true, BUT I have decided that I will have more flexibility in my own life, if I spend more time at the local and regional levels of horseshoes. I am getting this news out there to give any aspiring officers a chance to think more seriously about running for office. If any of you have questions about the duties and commitments of an NHPA officer, please write to me or call me. I will be glad to give you as much information and encouragement as I can.

The second order of business is that we plan to run the Red, White, and Blue Walking Doubles at Quail Ridge on Saturday, January 19th, 2013. We didn't have enough entries to warrant the expense of running it last July. There were also several conflicts with some big and established tournaments in the nearby states. It seems as if pitchers want to pitch OUTSIDE in the summer, heat and all, and would rather pitch inside in the winter only. We DO know that doubles are very popular and are becoming more popular. The maximum combined ringer percentage will still be 120%, but we WILL have classes based on ringer percentage, just as in a regular tournament. I do NOT want to handicap this tournament and will only do that if I really have to. The entry fee PER TEAM will be \$50.00 and the prizes will be mostly cash prizes. Red, White and Blue will be the theme so dress accordingly! Any questions, call me at: 508-822-9610 or write to: loonpond@verizon.net This will give pitchers who are in the winter doldrums a chance to get out and to see the NHPA Hall of Fame building AND pitch with some new friends. I haven't seen the Earl Winston Theater yet and look forward to seeing that. The deadline for entry is December 31, 2012.

We always hope to run a good, smooth tournament and always receive comments, some positive and some This year there were MANY more positive comments than I ever remember. Thank you! The note below is typical:



(Just a note - Rick is Rick Wright, president of the Minnesota charter and he is one of the capable helpers/ volunteers that help us out by running shifts).

Also, thanks to NHPA 4th VP Jerry Labrosse and his crew, "captains" Bill Marvin and Ron Smith, who supervised and helped to set the courts up and who make sure, EVERY day, that those courts are lined up. Sleep does not seem to be an option for these tireless men!

And it is PATCH TIME again! I did hand out several packages of 2013 NHPA patches to folks right at the World Tournament. And orders are already coming in almost daily, even before I sent out the order form. Thank you to all of the Regional Directors who put in time and effort all year long. A special thanks, AND congratulations go to Melvin Jeardoe of Kansas who, this year, is the recipient of the Gene and Mary Van Sant Regional Director of the Year award. Melvin consistently goes above and beyond the call of duty - I only hear good things about his work in horseshoes from his cohorts in the Kansas area. I have chosen three RD's of the Year during my "tenure" - it is SO hard to make that decision as there are many who deserve to be recognized.

Horseshoe Types! People want to know what is pitched the most at the World Tournament. Ted Allens still 185 pitchers used rank # 1, as a stand-alone model. Ted Allens. Others that are gaining popularity are, in The Snyder EZ Flip 2, the Dead Eye EZ Grips order: and Diamond Tournaments (tied), the original Imperials, the Snyder EZ Flip 1 and the Francis Signature (tied) and then the Mustangs and the M & M's. Not as many shoes had to be ground down this year and most were just the mushrooming out of the tips. Only one single shoe was out of spec and that was a very old Ted Allen whose owner said there were "millions" of ringers thrown with this shoe! Looking at the shoe, I believed him, for sure!



REGIONAL DIRECTORS REPORT Continued

This is news from Coyce Allen, RD of Texas – some more good news!

"We added a new club in Texas this year and they have their first sanctioned tournament scheduled for September 22nd. The new club is in the small East Texas community of Chandler, Texas. From the time I met w/city officials to the time we completed the courts was less than ninety Their plans include adding lights and a 20 x 20 pavilion w/storeroom. Now they need to concentrate on building up their membership.

I will be the TD for their first tournament and will teach them how a NHPA sanctioned tournament is typically set up. I believe they have scheduled three sanctioned events next year and, since it is 2-1/2 hours away from me, I hope they can find someone that will be the TD moving forward." (We hope so, too, Coyce!)

And more news from Hal Griswold, RD and Secretary/ Treasurer of Southern California. They are upgrading the horseshoe courts in Balboa Park in San Diego and are making some courts compliant with ADA (American Disabilities Act) guidelines.

See what he wrote:

"We are close to the final chapter in our ADA compliance adventure and here is what was negotiated with the City of San Diego Parks and Recreation Dept. The club wants to upgrade the courts with full walkways. The facility is made up by four areas and each area has three to eight courts. To make things a little more complicated, each area is at different elevations (a few feet) with concrete walkways and stairs connecting them. One of the areas is converted from an old shuffle board courts layout where the pits are cutouts in the concrete. Since these courts are full concrete end to end, they are all ADA compliant. However, the City would not accept the fact that the other three areas were being upgraded without ADA compliant walkways.

It was finally agreed to upgrade at least one court in each area with ADA compliant (3' wide) walkways initially and promise to eventually (within 5 years) make all courts ADA compliant. This promise is renewable every 5 years. Plus, install wheelchair ramps over the steps connecting the areas. The club can live with this agreement and all the courts may be upgraded to be ADA compliant someday."

This shows what can be done with diplomacy and patience - what a great facility that will be when it is completed. And to accomplish it in steps is admirable, and do-able. I love hearing this!

We have a new Regional Director. Denise Braga from Maine will now be the Regional Director for the Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont charters. Michaud will keep the Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Connecticut charters. Denise has been given her "starter pack" and will jump in with the patches this fall.

Now that the championships have been decided, it is time to buckle down and start building for NEXT YEAR!! 2013 membership cards are already available in most charters and are a great selling point for your fall leagues.

While you are recruiting your brand new members, why not start off with a horseshoe pitching clinic? Many people are reluctant to try something new, simply because they are not sure how to do it. But a few seasoned "coaches" can help alleviate that concern by demonstrating the proper way to pitch, where to stand, game etiquette, etc...

If you are uncomfortable giving pitching instruction, hold a video night and show one of the excellent "how to" videos that are available through Game Related Sales.

Don't forget to teach your new members how to keep score!! While you are at it, teach some of your OLD members! EVERYONE who pitches competitively should be able to keep score.

Are you wondering where to locate all those new members you are supposed to recruit? A holiday parade is an excellent place to make first contact with people from all age groups and all walks of life!

This is the time to start planning and building a float for your local holiday parade. It does not need to be elaborate – just to get the point across. A trailer full of horseshoe pitchers with a large sign will get the job done. If you don't have access to a trailer, some of your members could WALK through the parade

carrying a club banner or poster. Some clubs have placed a portable court on a trailer and actually tossed a few shoes on the parade route!

Be sure to print business cards or flyers with your league or club contact information to hand out. If candy distribution is allowed in your parade, tape a small piece of paper with those details to the treats before tossing! Don't forget to take some Juniors along to help attract FAMILIES to the club.

On the subject of families - First contact has been made with a large group of them across the country. NHPA junior league and scholarship information was sent to Home School Associations in every state. SANCTIONED CLUB/LEAGUE REPORT by David Sidles

I began writing this issue's article and was going to mention some things about some Sanctioned League year-end chores and it became obvious that the year will probably be over before any of this gets read. But I'll mention a couple of things about leagues anyway.

If you are a league director, or even a league member, and haven't taken a look at the "Red Book" lately, I would highly encourage you to do so. This small booklet is described as the Complete Guide to the Sanctioned Club/League Program. The answer to almost any question about leagues; from forming a league, to filling out yearend reports is in there. If you would like copies to distribute to your members, I would be happy to send you some. Just let me know.

Speaking of league reports, there are a couple of important dates that should be pointed out. December 31st is the deadline for submitting a final stats report each year. While it would nice to have everyone comply with this, there are some that come in later, and in a few cases, much later than that. In either case, you run the risk that there will be no league patches left for that year. We will still get your stats to NATSTATS. The Red Book also states that a membership report for your league must be received by September 15th each year.

It further states that anyone not listed on a membership report is not eligible for any league awards. Without going to extraordinary measures of reporting and monitoring, this is something that would be difficult at best to me to administer. Many leagues are not submitting any membership reports at all. As a league director, it is up to you to see that you are conforming to the guide book. There is also a deadline date for the Top Ten Awards forms to be submitted. But as I mentioned 'earlier, I can pull these names out very easily and I wanted to make sure that these players are recognized for their achievements. Of course, the Top Ten awards are based on the scores you report as a league director and accuracy is at a premium here. you submitted a Top Ten form, I will certainly make sure that I did not miss any of your players.

My biggest challenge so far is trying to make sure that the player data that I get from you matches the NATSTATS

data. If I could ask league directors to do one thing to help me, it would be to make sure you have the correct player information on your stats sheet. Many times, I have to look up and verify card numbers, ask about name changes, category changes, etc.? If your league changes directors, please make sure I get your new contact information. If you are using HSMaster to create year end reports, make sure you are printing the Final Stats sheet, not the weekly sheet. I consider all of us to be a team in running the league program and I want it to be as simple as possible. I certainly appreciate any suggestions you may have. A suggested change in the patch order form was implemented in one day.

I've nearly completed my first full year as National Director and I've thoroughly enjoyed it. It was wonderful being able to put a few names to faces at the World Tournament in Knoxville and I hope to see many more of you in St George. I know what's involved in being a league director and how much goes into it. I just want to say to all league directors, all the work you do is very much appreciated.



NHPF NEWS VIEWS & DONATIONS by Dave Loucks

Among those who contribute financially or provide a service to help others, there is a popular saying, "pay it forward". It basically means that those who have been the beneficiary of some form of help can repay the gesture by doing something similar for others. Dr. Jack Freeman who had his medical schooling paid for by the town in which he grew up not only repaid the town, but he paid it forward by donating the better part of his Joelton, TN, land and horseshoe pitching complex to the NHPF. It was this gift that provided the first funds initially needed to start construction of the NHPA Hall of Fame & Museum in Wentzville, Missouri.

Before Jack's demise, the NHPF directors agreed to do their best to "pay it forward" by issuing grants to clubs in financial need to build or refurbish horseshoe courts on public property. The modest NHPF grant program was started in 2003 and since then, 43 of 46 grant requests have been approved and just under \$50,000 paid out.

The latest recipient of a grant is the City of Ames, Iowa, who will work with NHPA members to replace nine old courts with 12 new courts built to sanctioned specifications. As all grant recipients are told, there is no legal obligation to pay back the grant money. The NHPF does however ask that they pledge to hold at least one annual fund-raiser for the NHPF so that the Foundation can count on some funds to help other clubs who will need assistance in the future. Unfortunately, only 22 of the 43 grant recipients have made an effort to return some of the funds.

Any charter or club can schedule a fund-raising tournament. All one needs to do is designate an annual tournament for the benefit of the NHPF. Perhaps the club will pay no prize money for that event and send the proceeds to the NHPF. Funds from a raffle or dinner might be included. Of course, there is always the simple and easy process of just sending in a contribution check or purchasing a commemorative brick that would remain for years as a visible banner of your support.

In the Hall of Fame itself, major benefactors to the NHPF, those who have contributed \$500 or more, are recognized by having their name, city and state engraved on an individual plate that is on one of several benefactor plaques. As of this writing, 190 clubs, charters or individuals have a plate. The latest six to reach the \$500 level are Leo & Deborah Bratland, IL; Jack McKinney, NE; Little Elm H.C., TX; David & Carla Sidles, NE; Goldendale H.C., WI; and the Sodbusters H.C. VT.

WORLD RECORDS By Mel Yockstick - The Statman

This year while attending the World Tournament in Knoxville, Tennessee, Paul Stewart suggested I gather statistics for pitchers who exceeded their entry averages during World Tournaments. I compiled World Tournament results for each open class from 2012, 2011 and 2010. The information pointed out that the top three or four finishers of each class pitched above their percentage average. It goes without saying that the top finishers are normally going to pitch their average percentage or above. Since the World Tournament uses their highest top three tournament percent pitching average (NATSTAT) and not their overall averages, it challenges the pitcher to make his or her entry average. The survey showed that only 26.90% of all pitchers actually made their average. This data indicates that the World Tournament pressure affects the percentage results. In the 2012 World Tournament, more players pitched over their percent average than in the previous two years. Could the facilities be the reason? I know the NHPA has done their best to keep the courts

consistently the same each year. Outdoor facilities have not been reviewed at this time. (See Open Class World Tournament Above and Below entering % Averages)

The World Championship finals for 2012 showed a higher result, 47.67% of all the players pitching over their entry percentage. The entry average comes from the A1 or A2 preliminary actual open class results, which produces a more accurate pitching percentage for the tournament. Evaluating the three years of Championship division's finals shows the lower number of pitchers seeded in the finals tends to bring up the % over average. I also believe strong competition brings the best out of most pitchers. (See Championship Finals World Tournament Above and Below entering % Averages)

HORSESHOE FACTS & FOLKLORE by Bob Dunn, NHPA Historian

Alvin Dahlene is not as well known as some of the other good pitchers of the 1940's and 50's, but he was a good pitcher and a hard working promoter also. He should be known as a pitcher of longevity, pitching competitively for over 60 years and also being an active and productive promoter for all those years. Dahlene pitched in 42 Kansas State Tournaments, winning state titles in 1941 and 1942. He qualified for several World Tournaments, with a high finish of 5th in 1941, averaging 72.2%. Alvin Dahlene was elected NHPA Vice President in 1939 and served several years as a Regional Director.

Here is an article he wrote to express his feelings on the 1948 World Tournament and also provided some other interesting tidbits of information about what probably is the most ever controversial World Tournament. Remember that through the 1930's and 1940's, the rules called for a 12-inch height on stakes. It was not until 1950 that the stake was raised to 14 inches.

As printed in the January 1949 THE HORSESHOE PITCHER...

KANSAS By Alvin Dahlene

How about a standard height on horseshoe stakes at the next National Meet? In the recent National Event, I measured several of the stakes and they varied from ten inches in height to seventeen inches. In fact, most of them towed around the fifteen inches. Maybe that is the answer to all records broken at Milwaukee. It is much easier to hit a peg that is fifteen inches high than one that is only twelve inches in height.

At a recent State Meet in the Midwest, a new one hundred shoe pitch qualifying record was set – the stakes being seventeen inches high. The old record that was broken had been made on standard twelve-inch stakes. This was an injustice to the pitchers performing on the shorter stakes.

A record cannot really be official if different heights of stakes are going to be used here and there. In basketball, you have a definite circumference for the ring and the ball, and the height of the ring. In bowling, you have certain size pins and length and width of alleys. In fact, every sport that is worthy of mention has a definite set of rules and regulations that are adhered to. When are we going to quit "pussy footin" and get down to business?

The referee at any National or State meet should see to it that the stakes are of a definite height. I sincerely hope that I will never attend another event such as the one in Milwaukee with its towering totem poles. That isn't horseshoes in my book. How about it boys, do you want twelve inch stakes or shall we invent a telescope stake that can be raised or lowered to any height suitable to the whim of each individual pitcher.

If a man can't qualify on a twelve-inch stake let him stay out of the tournament. I recall how one such pitcher raised the stakes in a recent meet so that he could "get in." Whenever I get to a place that I can no longer qualify on a twelve-inch stake, I will gladly drag my decrepit bag of bones off the courts and make way for those who can.

In November issue of THE HORSESHOE PITCHER, Mr. Henry Schief asked the whereabouts of a few top-notchers of years ago. I think I can enlighten him on a few of them. C.C. Davis was at Moline in 1935 in which he tied for third place with Guy Zimmerman. Each won eighteen and lost five. Davis had 73.6% and Guy had 73.3% ringers. Davis' last horseshoe tournament was the K.C. City Meet, in the late thirties (38 or 39) in which he defeated his opponents to win the title. Since then, Davies has retired from pitching and now resides in Kansas City, Mo. Frank Jackson is or was in Florida in 1946. Burt Duryee, a one-time Kansas great, participated in his last National in 1935. He failed to qualify. He has since suffered a nervous breakdown and has been confined to a sanitarium for several years. Lyle Brown of Iowa, died in 1942. Blair Nunamaker passed away in recent years also.

I might say in closing, these were fine pitchers, but most of them were past their prime when Isias, Allen and Jones came along. Having seen Allen pushed to the limit to beat Davis, four to three, in Kansas City in 1934. Only the youth, on Allen's side, saved him from defeat. These men were great in the day, but the 1948 records show that the game of horseshoe has improved year after year. I can remember when 70% was superb pitching. Now-a-days you can't qualify in a National with that, or even come close. It has become a sport of intense concentration in which 90% games are common among such men as Isais, Allen, Zimmerman and Jones. These men are to pitching, what Ruth, Gehrig, Cobb, Speaker, etc. were to baseball. Given the right weather and other conditions we will some day see a 90% winner at the National.

Folklore Jottings By Bob Dunn

Remember that we are now nearing the end of 2012 and if you haven't sent in a contribution to NHPF this year, that is something you need to consider.

Also, as we approach the Christmas season, there is a new book released this year. Jerry Smith has done a very fine job of making the coverage of past World Tournaments (Men's Division) available to us in a book form by his producing The History of World Tournaments Volume II (1981 - 2011). He has followed Gary Kline's style in Volume I and brings the last 30 years of coverage up to date. The book can be purchased on line, by going to the NHPA website and key on Historical/Books/History of the NHPA World Tournament Volume II. This can be a great, inexpensive gift for that someone who doesn't quite have everything yet.

GATE CITY CLANGERS HORSESHOE CLUB

DOUBLES IN SIZE by Leonard "Nick" Nichols - Club President



Greeley Park, Nashua, New Hampshire -Gate City Clangers Horseshoe Club's 2012 membership has hit 69 card holding members; up from 31 members in 2010. On a side note we had nine pitchers last year that didn't return this year for one reason or another. We hope they return next year, maybe push us over 80 pitchers for 2013. Club members travel as far as 35 miles to pitch. Not bad considering we don't advertise

and it's all by word of mouth and people stopping by to see what's

The club started in 1996 with 14 members. We pitch Tuesday evenings beginning early May and ending late September. There are 24 sanctioned clay courts with a clubhouse, spectator bleachers and lights for night pitching. We pitch 'Walking Singles' four pitchers to a court on Tuesday nights starting at 6:30 p.m. using a handicap system. Thursday nights are reserved for Tuesday rain outs. We pitch four games, count all scoring, 30 shoes per game.

Our Organizer and Statistician, Phil Bergeron maintains each player's statistics which include, current handicap, Ringer %, Point %, Point average, Win/loss % and their best game points and ringer %. These stats are handed out to each pitcher with their pitching card each week. Teams are randomly selected by computer each week. Money

prizes are awarded for highest scoring team each week and a player rewarded for best overall performance each week.

A few years ago we had a difficult time having courts turned and ready for play on time. We instituted an "Adopt A Court" program. Any pitcher that wanted to



arrive early and prepare their own court could "adopt" the court and have their name on a Placard at the far end or the court. Their names are also flagged in the computer to assure they pitch most of their games on their own court. We currently have 12 courts that have been adopted. Players without adopted courts just help out turning the remaining courts needed for the night.

We host a minimum of two sanctioned New England tournaments per season starting with the 'Past Pitchers Memorial' in late May and the 'Nashua End of Year Open' in September. We rotate hosting the 'New Hampshire State' tournament showcasing New Hampshire's finest pitchers with the Keene Horseshoe Club and the Andover Horseshoe Club. Also have a club tournament and cookout in August.

We are suffering growing pains, but it's pain worth suffering. Everyone seems to be having a great time. Hope everyone enjoyed the summer and see you on the courts.

HALL OF FAME & MUSEUM by Jeanette Claas

"A Big Howdy from Texas"

It was another hot dry day in July as Ron and Nancy Maroon paid their first visit to the NHPA Hall of Fame facility, bringing some long overdue rain with them, "Thank you very much!"

The Maroons of Houston, Texas were on their way to a relative's wedding in Springfield, Illinois and wanted to include a visit to the Hall of Fame in their travels. The Maroons had previously done some horseshoe business with Bob and Rose Diekamp, distributors of the QRHC

GRS, and had made previous arrangements for their visit. Arriving in the parking lot, they

noticed the Jack Freeman Memorial Walkway and quickly found the state of Texas recognizing many of their friends/fellow pitcher's engraved bricks. They also found the Greater Houston brick that their horseshoe club had purchased.

As Bob gave them a personal tour through the Hall of Fame room, a little bit of Texas appeared before them. Looking at the Hall of Fame Wall of Inductees, they spotted Ed Arionus, inducted in 2010. Ed is a seven-time World Champion and one of only three players that have won titles in three different division: 1991 – Intermediate Mens Champion; 1996 & 1999 – Senior Mens Champion; 2001 – won his first of four Elders Mens Title and repeated as Elders Mens Champion in 2006, 2008 and 2010. The Maroon's are acquainted with Ed, and needless to say, quite proud of him.

Later, they pitched a few shoes in the north courts. Right away they noticed the Kentucky blue clay. "The biggest difference for horseshoe pitchers in Texas is they pitch in sand," said Ron. "The clay will take some getting used to." They weren't sure what to expect at the Hall of Fame, but the facility certainly met all their expectations. They were so impressed with the horseshoe courts itself and the size of the arena. "Just amazing," they exclaimed.

Ron and Nancy grew up in southern Illinois. Ron pitched horseshoes as a teenager with his Dad, and Nancy also threw shoes at different family functions as well. They married and moved to Houston, Texas in 1974 where Ron found employment at the Burgess Specialties Fabricating Co., a sheet metal fabricating and machine shop. He has always enjoyed this field and is currently co-owner of the company.

In 1982 they joined the Greater Houston Horseshoe Pitchers Association, located at Bear Creek Park. They began with eight courts and two years later the facility expanded to 20 lighted courts. There are about 30 official club members at this time. Ron has served as president of the Houston club, off and on for about ten years and Nancy has been active as secretary. Their son, Brandon, participated in tournaments, winning his Junior class several times in the 1980's. It was definitely a family affair to travel all over Texas to pitch in sanction tournaments. Meeting wonderful people along the way, with a common interest, is what kept them interested and involved.

Due to the warm climate in Houston, the club's league begins in March and runs through October on Tuesday evenings. They also hold four sanction tournaments during the year. In February of each year, the city hosts the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo which lasts three weeks. Since 1984, the GHHPA has organized a one day non-sanctioned horseshoe tournament at the Rodeo which brings in about 60 top county horseshoe teams for some tough competition! An occasional local celebrity pitch has taken place at the Rodeo in the past, such as Earl Campbell and Giff Neilson.

This October the Greater Houston Horseshoe Club will host the Texas State Horseshoe Tournament. They are expecting approximately 160 participants during the three-day event. The Club hosted the Texas State Doubles Tournament this past April, which consisted of approximately 24 teams.

Ron and Nancy are proud of their son, Brandon, who graduated from the Air Force Academy in Colorado. Major Brandon Maroon is currently serving in Japan as he continues in his military career. Young Maroon got to share his past Texas horseshoe pitching experience with fellow soldiers while serving in Iraq in 2009, as they arranged a fun pitch in their down time. Most had

never heard of "organized/ sanctioned" horseshoe pitching tournaments and were surprised to hear that it was one of the sports of his youth!

The QRHC members certainly enjoyed this "Big Howdy" couple from Texas. The Maroons are great horseshoe enthusiasts and have done their share of promoting and organizing events for

THE DUMPSTER TROPHY by Dale and Lee Estep



The horseshoe pitchers of the Dallas Area Horseshoe Club live a good distance from most of their Pennsylvania brothers, and for many years club members have traveled to New York State for competition. In the 1980's the competitions became known as the "NY/PA Challenge" and the events became more structured. Summer competitions took place at Radman's Saloon in Binghamton, NY, while the winter matches took place in a boiler room in Scranton, PA.

As the challenge matches became more popular, the competitors decided they needed a trophy to show "who kicked whose butt" in the latest event. Tom Hager, owner of the Radman Saloon, one day mentioned he had just thrown away an old sponsors trophy. John Martin from Binghamton, NY went dumpster diving and recovered the abandoned trophy. John refurbished the three-foot-high prize and it became the symbol of the annual competition. In the early 1990's, after nine years of NY/PA Challenge matches, the Radman Saloon closed and the NY/PA Challenge Match series ended. John Martin stored the well traveled trophy in his attic and it was forgotten.

Nineteen years later, stories about the challenge matches surfaced while pitching in the beautiful indoor facilities in Groton, NY. By then there was a strong bond between the Groton, NY club and the Dallas, PA club. Members of the Dallas Area Horseshoe club, and other Pennsylvania pitchers, regularly attended the sanctioned tournaments held in Groton the first Saturday of each winter month. Each year more and more NY pitchers attended summer tournaments in Dallas.

September of 2006 saw the NY/PA Challenge competition renewed. The location was the Dallas, PA facilities at the Luzerne County Fairgrounds. Eight New York challengers arrived for a 10:00 am start on a gorgeous fall day. The format was round robin, with handicap.

Halfway through the first renewed event, with PA slightly ahead, we broke for lunch. Famous Grotto Pizzas were delivered and the New Yorkers brought out soups and desserts. After lunch we resumed the competition and the Pennsylvania folks narrowly won the challenge event. After the competition, Peanuts Long of Dallas was heard to say "this was the best tournament of the year; it was like pitching in the back yard with friends".

After proudly holding the challenge trophy in Dallas for a year, the Pennsylvania team, with trophy in hand, went to Groton, NY the following October to defend the title. The New York team beat the Pennsylvanians soundly. The Pennsylvanians had to relinquish the trophy back to their New York friends.

After seeing the challenge trophy displayed in Groton at the November, December, January, February,



March and April tournaments, Pennsylvania pitchers were determined to bring the trophy back to Dallas. The 2008 challenge event was held in Dallas in early October, and once again the weather was great.

Pennsylvania won the challenge event and the trophy was proudly displayed at the Dallas, PA clubhouse.

In 2009 the Pennsylvania crew, with trophy in hand, journeyed back to Groton to defend the challenge trophy but the New York team beat the Pennsylvanians once again.

The 2010 Challenge match was held in Dallas, PA. The weather was great and the competition was fierce. At the end of 64 games, the score was tied at 32 wins each. Having anticipated the possibility of a tie, the Challenge Match rules stated that team captains would each select a player for a one game winner-take-all tiebreaker. Pennsylvania had a problem. Even though the tournament had ended in a tie, the New York team captain, Eric Conrad, was pitching beautifully, and had won each of his eight games. Anticipating someone would have to play Eric, a quick team meeting was held to decide who would be Pennsylvania's representative. Eric Conrad walked in with a proposition. He suggested that each team select a player with the same average and let them decide the Challenge Match winner. Joel Hines from New York and Steve Swisher from Pennsylvania were chosen to break the tie.

What a game! The lead swung back and forth and the playoff game eventually tied at 39 all. Both players threw a ringer and a close shoe on their final pitch. Calipers were needed to determine the winner. Pennsylvania won by a millimeter, but they will never forget the sportsmanship that their New York friends demonstrated in trying to make the final game as even as possible.

For 2011, the PA/NY Challenge Match was once again held in Groton, NY. After six years of

alternating ownership of the Dumpster Trophy, Pennsylvania did the unthinkable and actually won a challenge match in NY!

The 2012 challenge event was scheduled for the last Saturday in September. Fall weather can be iffy in Northern Pennsylvania but the day dawned with a heavy cloud cover and beautiful fall foliage. By 10:00 am all contestants had arrived and the 2012 challenge began.

By round three New York was ahead 13-11. Evidently, the arrival of Grotto Pizza, the smell of homemade lasagna and wimpies distracted the New Yorkers and Pennsylvanians won seven of eight games in round four to take a 18-14 lead before lunch. By the end of round seven, Pennsylvania led 31-25, but New York could still win with a strong round eight showing. It was not to be. Pennsylvania won seven of the eight final games and finished the tournament with a 38-26 victory.

The annual Challenge Match continues to be the highlight pitching event of the year for many of the competitors. The 2013 "who kicked whose butt" event will be held in Groton, New York and rumor has it that the New York team has already dusted off a spot in their lounge for the dumpster trophy.

The relationship between the Groton and Dallas clubs continues to grow with a number of pitchers proudly holding memberships in both clubs. Not the 128 miles, inclement weather or a state line, keep these horseshoe pitchers from "pitching in the backyard, with friends" whenever possible.



NHPA RULES AND BYLAWS by Dan Sanders

You may recall that one of the Proposed Rules Changes that was voted on at the Knoxville Convention earlier this year had to do with Pacers. Since the Convention, I have received several questions from various Charters about the use of Pacers in sanctioned tournaments. The following questions and answers should help in a better understanding of this Rule and also about when Pacers should or should not be used. You may also want to refer to Rule 7, Sec D, (page 16) and Guideline 5, Section A, (page 32) of the current RGS Book for more specific information.

Q – What was the proposed change about Pacers?

A — Well, essentially, the change would have allowed Pacers to pitch first in innings where they scored points, if this was agreeable to the scheduled opponent. But this proposal did not pass.

Q – And so with the current Rule, the Pacer must always pitch last, in every inning of the game. But why is this a good Rule?

A – This Rule was passed to make it more fair for all of the pitchers of any given Class. When a TD may decide to use a Pacer in place of a 'no show', or to replace a pitcher who has had to drop out of the tournament, it is quite possible that more than one Pacer will 'fill in' for this missing person over the course of the round-robin schedule. This is especially true for large Classes of 12 or more pitchers, as these large Classes may have to pitch over two or three days, and with a different Pacer often being used for each of those days. Though less likely, this can also happen for six or eight-man Classes. The problem is that these different pacers will most likely have different ringer percentages than the 'Class spread', and it isn't fair for some pitchers in the Class to have to pitch against a high-average Pacer while others would

be pitching against a low average Pacer. For example, a high-average Pacer, vs a low-average scheduled player, is likely to score more often and, and without this Rule, would get first pitch more often. Just the opposite would be true for the scheduled pitchers who were pitching against a low-average Pacer. And so the best solution here is to have the Pacer always pitch last.

Q – But doesn't the Pacer always lose the game?

A-Yes, it is true that the W/L record will not be affected, but a pitcher who may have to pitch their shoes on top of the "steel" of a higher average pitcher can lose more ringers and his/her overall ringer percentage for the tournament can be affected. If he/she is pitching first for each inning, this cannot happen. Each contestant will always 'have the mud' when pitching against any Pacer.

Q – Since Pacer games and Bye games are always 'Wins' for the scheduled pitcher, which is best for a Tournament Director to use? What is the difference between Bye games and Pacer games?

A – Bye games do not have to be pitched, and the scheduled pitcher 'sits out' for that scheduled game. Sometimes a Bye game cannot possibly be pitched (against a Pacer) as no court may even be available... having a seven-man round-robin competition of three courts, for example. If a Pacer is being used, that game should be pitched before it can be considered a Win for the scheduled pitcher. This may be most important in 'shoe games', where all contestants are expected to pitch the same number of shoes. It is recommended that a Pacer be used in cases where a contestant must have to forfeit games or drop out of the tournament.

and Elna van der Berg. Namibia; Gieliana Boshoff, Francois Boshoff, Erik Strauss and Johan Botma. United States; Gary Roberts, Travis Sluys and Casey Sluys. A side note: all three of us had met these people on our trip to South Africa in 2011 when we participated in their Jukskei Championships.

Although we had anticipated being able to showcase our sports for multiple days, we were only able to do so for one complete day at two different venues; the second of which was an hour bus ride away and in a different city of Radviliskis. This second venue proved to be more popular with the citizens of Lithuania than the first. The first venue was at the stadium in Siauliai where multiple other countries delegates had a chance to pitch horseshoes of play Jukskei. We had Japanese, Russian, Polish, Australian, Romanian, Swedish and various others pitch a few horseshoes. Each participant was handed an NHPA brochure and an NHPA pin, as were many others who did not participate.

TAFISA is high on ceremony and their grand opening was a spectacular show. Their closing ceremony was grand also with Lithuanian ceremony, costumes and dance.

My personal opinion is that the participants in TAFISA are mainly representatives of their respective countries. Whether it was ceremonial dances or

HERE'S SOMETHING ABOUT JOHN SYLVESTER by Thomas J. Latino

John was born in Whitesville, Louisiana on June 22, 1929. He spent his youth doing the normal things like playing ball, running with the guys and OH YEAH, catching and skinning five-foot alligators on the Bijou.

In 1948 he decided to join the ARMY so off he went. During his ARMY duty he was given the opportunity to attend an Advanced Engineering Training Program with the Air Force. After the program ended in 1956 and after four years in the ARMY and



four years in the Air Force he decided to take his discharge and head to California. During those years he'd been to almost every Military Base in the United States and the Pacific. He speaks French fluently and hoped to get to France, but he was never sent to Europe.

Upon his arrival in California he went to work for the Louisiana Pacific Lumber Company. He also started to pitch horseshoes in the Bar Leagues. During

his time at the Mill he learned the lumber business and became a wood grader. After 33 years with Louisiana Pacific he retired as Shipping Superintendent. While he was working there he also met the likes of Willy Bradford, and another character, Richard McCutcheon. We'll get to them later.

John was playing in the Bar Leagues when his good friend Willy said to him. "John, you're a pretty good pitcher. Why don't you join the Nationals?" He told Willy he didn't even know such a thing existed. So in 1970, Willy signed him up, as he was already a member of the NHPA.

John was a pretty good Horseshoe Pitcher when he joined the organization. He still only knew Willy though. That changed quickly when two of the top pitchers in the game, Emmett Schroeder and Monte Latino met him and took him under their wings. The three remained friends till the end. John and Emmett traveled together to more tournaments than most of us have ever played in. And John will tell you that after Monte quit pitching he would still go to the tournaments to watch. He says proudly, "I was the first person Monte would come to see when he got there".

Well that was the beginning of his 41 years pitching horseshoes and he ain't done yet. Over the years our friend has collected a few trophies, and awards along the way.

During that time he did sneak out of California a couple of times. He came in second at the Nevada State Tournament twice. He won the Nevada Balloon Race Tournament in 2007 and 2008. In 1991 he won the Nevada State Doubles Tournament. He and Richard McCutcheon were the Nevada Doubles Champions. The two remain close friends.

Back to California...

Well the Ol'Boy lives in Palermo. He's got a nice place with lots of land. He enjoys his dog Blade who's smarter than most people. He's got a garden that would make the produce department jealous. And he's got olive and nut trees, walnuts and pecans galore. Sounds like a lot of work, and it is, but at 83 he can still outwork most young folks. One other spot at his place is pretty special too, the kitchen, cause man this guy can cook. He should have opened a restaurant. Really. no kidding...

He's been Feather River and Willows Club President.

Attended five World Tournaments; Pleasanton, CA; Bakersfield, CA; Ainsworth, NE; Pocatello, ID and Gillette, WY.

Five times Senior State Champion, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2008; with three-second place finishes along the way.

Seven time Pitcher of the Year, from 2001 to 2007.

In 2004 he became the newest member to be inducted into the NCHPA Hall of Fame.

In 2006 he was the State Men's Class Champion. He had to beat Rick Bermingham to get that.



In 2009 he picked up a couple more trophies; The Top Gun Award and a special award for pitching an 80% game at age 80. He threw that game at Mel Long; I think Mel only said, "one lousy point" a couple of times.

John's highest percentage game so far happened in Greenville. He threw an 87.5% at Gus Martin. Who's next, and by how much?

To top off his collection, there are eleven complete NCHPA plaques on his wall. That's 231 first and second place finishes. He's almost done with plaque #12. It's still sitting on the table.

There are so many trophies and awards at his place that you couldn't possibly list them all. Many of his accomplishments have probably been missed here. And if we listed anymore it would probably just embarrass him. There are so many things to say about John that you just couldn't possibly cover them all here, it'd take more pages than this issue.

Most all of us in California know and care a great deal about Mr. Sylvester, but if you don't know him, or haven't met him and would like to meet a great horseshoe pitcher, and a great man, stop by and introduce yourself to him, you'll be glad you did.
