

There is no better way to get the creative juices flowing than to gather with a group of people who share your passion!

Start that enthusiasm going within your own charter by holding an informal "kick-off" meeting, where members can visit with each other and with your Charter Officers about all the things they like and even the things they DON'T like.

Start off with a pot luck dinner so everyone is happy and satisfied – hungry people are not the most productive!

Be sure to invite prospective members, as well. This is a great setting for them to get to know your existing members in a noncompetitive setting. Pass out membership forms, rules books and tournament schedules. You could even show one of the great horseshoe pitching videos available through NHPA Game Related Sales.

Did you know that many states hold their Senior Games in the springtime? Some even include horseshoe pitching events. If yours does not, contact them and see how you can get our sport on their schedule. If they already offer horseshoe pitching, ask to help and to distribute information on NHPA membership.

This is also the best time to promote the World Horseshoe Championships, to be held in St. George, Utah, July 22 thru August 3. The entry form is now available on the NHPA website, www.horseshoepitching.com. With a May 16 deadline, there is plenty of time to get even the brand new members qualified with four sanctioned events!

You won't want to miss this World Tournament! The St. George area is teeming with great family-style activities, including the Zion National Park just one hour away. Also in the vicinity are Bryce Canyon, Arches, Canyonlands and Grand Canyon National Parks.

Not sure where to go? Perhaps Southern Utah Scenic Tours can help. They offer specialty tours, group tours, day tours, and so much more, taking you to areas you will not be able to drive during the summer months. Group tours with special World Horseshoe Tournament pricing will be available during our event. Look for more information at the tournament site or visit their website at utahscenictours.com. Of course, for the adventurous souls, hiking and biking are also options!

If you are looking for ways to offset your travel expenses to the World Tournament, remember that score keeping and judging during competition can be a profitable experience, as well as quite helpful! Our St. George hosts are planning a "Market Place" at the tournament site, where you will be able to shop local offerings. The "crafty" folk among you may be interested

to know they intend to include a consignment booth, where you will be encouraged to put your own wares up for sale, giving the locals a chance to sample items from other areas as well.

Many new and exciting improvements are planned for the growth and promotion of the NHPA this year. Designs are underway for a trailer wrap on both the large NHPA equipment trailer and the smaller electronics trailer. This will transform both vessels into travelling billboards for the NHPA, and with the large trailer making the journey all the way to Buffalo, NY; this is a perfect time for maximum exposure!

# THE TOLL OF TIME

Edward A Domey Sutton, MA



Edward A. Domey, 78, died January 7, 2013 at his home. Ed is predeceased by his wife, Anne, in 2000. He is survived by three children, all of whom pitched horseshoes as juniors in the NHPA. They are Paul Domey with whom he lived, Barbara Heller and her husband Jack in Texas and Janice Walckner and her husband Jim in Shrewsbury. He leaves four grandchildren, Chris Domey, Ben Domey, Andrew Sickenberger and Danny Heller and one great grandson Carson Domey. He also leaves behind a

brother Bob Domey and many nieces and nephews.

After graduating from South High School in 1953 and East Coast Arrow Tech in 1955, Ed built his home in Sutton and lived there for more than 50 years. He was the former chairman of both the Central Mass Regional Planning Board and the Sutton Planning Board where he served for 15 years. Ed founded Domey Construction in 1957 and in 1973 opened Heritage Pools. The business went on to be a leader in the industry for its knowledge and quality construction. Ed was a charter member of St. Marks Church in Sutton.

Ed was an avid horseshoe pitcher. He won four Massachusetts state championships and the New England championship in 1975. In both 1975 and 1976 he was the 13th best horseshoe pitcher in the world. In 1987, Ed was inducted into the New England Horseshoe pitching hall of fame. In 1987 he was inducted into the National Horseshoe pitching hall of fame as both a player and an organizer. He was also the recipient of the Arch Stokes award in 1994 for the person who contributed the most to the advancement of the sport. Ed was a fifty year member of the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association, New England Horseshoe Pitchers Association and the Massachusetts Horseshoe Pitchers Association.

Ed was the person behind setting up Game Related Sales, heading it up for 20 years, changing it to organize it as a business with some profit for the NHPA. Profits from GRS bought some of the first computers that the NHPA used.

From 1973 to 1983, Ed was the owner of Heritage Recreation Center in Sutton, MA, the first indoor horseshoe pitching facility established in the country. The facility first contained eight indoor courts, then was expanded to 14 indoor courts, with all of the amenities and room for spectators. Heritage was open from 1973 - 1983 and some of the best horseshoe pitchers in the world pitched there. Ed invited one superstar each year to pitch in a tournament; all expenses paid. Some of the pitchers of note were Carl Steinfeldt, Elmer Hohl, Walter Ray Williams, Mark Siebold and Red Henton, all World Champions. There may have been others that I can't recall right now. Ed himself was an excellent horseshoe pitcher, once stringing several 80% tournaments together.

Ed had a good memory to the end. He was a tremendous influence in New England horseshoes and definitely helped modernize the NHPA in his time. He was a Lifetime member of the NHPA, as he started pitching when a teenager.

Ed was able to stay at home for seven years after his stroke due to the wonderful staff at Blackstone Valley Home Care who were so kind and caring. Ed was also able to be a regular at Summit Eldercare where he was able to share his wit and humor.

## SANCTIONED CLUB/LEAGUE REPORT by David Sidles

A new year is upon us and already the first 2013 sanctioned league has reported stats. As I begin the second year of my term, I want to thank all the league directors and players for all their input, suggestions, help and assistance. I'm looking forward to another busy season of league horseshoe pitching. One of the things I enjoyed most was the Sanctioned League National Championships in Wentzville. I hope many of you consider participating in this event in October.

The NHPA council recently had an opportunity to visit the site of the next World Tournament. You will no doubt find in this issue what others thought of this venue. I will only add that in my opinion, this has the potential to be one of the best World Tournaments ever. The St. George-Zion National Park area is without a doubt one of the most unique and beautiful parts of our country.

One of the items discussed at the winter meeting concerned Top Ten awards. Out of 300 reported leagues, 228 played count-all scoring and out of those 128 played 50 shoe games compared to 61 that played 40 shoe games. Sometime this year, League Directors of 50 shoe count-all leagues will receive a survey form from me. The purpose of this survey will be to examine whether a change to the Top Ten awards criteria is in order. As most of you probably know, all of the points based award categories require leagues to pitch 50 shoe games. The question is; are they doing this just to be eligible for these awards. I know of at least one league that is. Hopefully enough information will be gathered from this survey to determine if this change should even be considered. I first tried to see if I could gather a sufficient amount of response from the NHPA website forum. It's obvious that I couldn't. A lot of league directors will get this survey by e-mail. Those that don't have e-mail will get a paper form in the regular mail.

One of the features of the NHPA Sanctioned League Program is the awarding of approximately \$1,500.00 in Junior Scholarships each year. One of the things asked of the recipients is that they write a short essay on their participation in the sport. Two of these were received and it's my privilege to share these with you.

From Courtney Lampkin, Nelson County HPA (KY) "For me, pitching horseshoes is my escape. It is my way of relaxing

and having fun. I have been pitching since I was nine and even though I have had my faults, I feel I have improved over the years. My dad, Buddy Lampkin, got me started pitching because it was a way we could spend time together. Over the years as I began to rise above him, I could always count on my dad to help me through anything. My dad has helped me through so much as far as horseshoes and I know I can count on him, he is my inspiration.

Since I first started, I have continued on to claim five Junior State Championships and place in two categories in the World Tournament. This past summer in Knoxville, I placed 2<sup>nd</sup> in my B Class, pitching the best game I have ever thrown, a sixty percent. I continued on to the A class round and placed 3<sup>rd</sup> of the best junior girls in the world. I have never felt so accomplished. Now as a fifteen year old I long for summer to start again so I can pitch with all the friends I have made.

As a Kentucky girl, I feel horseshoes is a great sport for any girl to get involved in because not many girls pitch horseshoes. In the state of Kentucky, I have been the only girl pitching at many tournaments even though in recent times we have had a few girls try the sport. I would have to say this is what depresses me most about the sport; the fact that I have no competitors at this time. I hope in years to come this will change. "

From Christina Heinritz, Heinritz Homestead HSL (WI)

"My name is Christina Heinritz and I have been pitching horseshoes for 6 years. I started pitching when I was 7 because I thought it would be a fun sport to try out. It's also a family tradition that my grandpa, uncles, siblings, dad, and cousins have all participated in. I have competed in 2 World Tournaments, one in Iowa and the other in Louisiana. I have also pitched in 6 State Tournaments. I hope to pitch in the upcoming World Tournament in Utah this summer. I have met many nice people through horseshoes. We have a new member on the NHPF Board of Directors. Phyllis Quist of Ferndale, WA, has replaced Barry Chapelle who has stepped down due to some medical issues. As we welcome Phyllis to the board, let me express our gratitude to Barry for his many years of service to the NHPF.

I don't know how many of you have had the opportunity to visit the Wentzville, MO, horseshoe pitching Hall of Fame and Museum facility, but if you haven't yet, be sure to put it on your bucket list. Once there, you'll be able to view photos and written history of hall of fame members and legends of the game. There are numerous display cases full of interesting memorabilia, walls full of pitching shoes from the ancient to the modern and a DVD viewing room where you can sit for hours looking at old & recent film of some of the great champions & near champions as you choose to select on a touch screen monitor.

The Hall of Fame room is just one attraction of the Wentzville facility. There are also 16 climate controlled indoor pitching courts for you to test. There's a full service concession area run by the Quail Ridge Horseshoe Club where you can purchase food & drinks. NHPA game related products and Hall Of Fame souvenirs are also available for sale. Just outside the front building entrance, you will find the commemorative brick plaza where some 4,000 bricks were placed for engraving your name and/or message with the purchase of a brick.

The National Horseshoe Pitchers Foundation (NHPF) built this facility and maintains it with the support you provide through donations and brick purchases. The Quail Ridge Horseshoe Club provides daily upkeep within the building. Major building maintenance, improvements and equipment service needs are paid for by the NHPF. Just as your financial support enabled the facility to be built, we need contributions from members such as you to maintain it. An easy way for you to help is to make an annual contribution and/or purchase an engraved brick. Some 1,160 bricks have already been sold, but there are plenty more still available. The brick plaza is laid out so each state has its own section and with a brick layout guide just inside the front door of the building, finding your state section is no problem.



# NATIONAL HORSESHOE PITCHERS HALL OF FAME & MUSEUM by Jeanette Claas

#### Let the Chips Fall (in the Museum)



Something new and exciting was recently added to the NHPA Hall of Fame Museum. Gary Proof, horseshoe pitcher and woodcarver from Mineral City, Ohio donated woodcarving depicting two world horseshoe champions in a championship playoff game at the 2011 World Horseshoe Tournament in Monroe, Louisiana. The game itself, was to be one of the greatest horseshoe games ever played and would be everlasting in the minds of all those who witnessed

it. Alan Francis, Ohio, was trying for his 17th World Championship Title, while Brian Simmons of Maine was hungry for his third World Championship Title.

Gary Proof attended the 2010 World Tournament in Cedar Rapids, where he met and talked with both pitchers. In his mind he felt a profound connection. Gary was born in New Hampshire, but was raised in South Berwick, Maine where Simmons once lived. With Francis living in the same state of Ohio where Gary now resides, he felt a bond and compelled to honor these two world champions in his own way.

Gary had always been an artistic person and this talent would play a major role in his life. As a child he was always caught sketching in class when he should have been studying causing him to get into some trouble. He began developing his artistic talents early in life with drawings and oil paintings. After his high school years, Gary joined the U.S. Army serving from 1966-69 during the Vietnam War. During this time, he would sketch his buddies' girlfriends from pictures that were sent to them. He would get about \$25 for a pastel chalk drawing. This helped him to pass time while he enjoyed what he was doing and also gave him some extra spending money.

Returning home after military duty, Gary married and started a family in 1972. He gave up art and concentrated his efforts towards making a living as a carpenter. In 1980 his creative juices began flowing again when watching "The Nightly News" with Tom Brokaw. At the end of the broadcast a contest was announced on that program which involved carving wooden hunting duck decoys. While he didn't enter the contest, it piqued his interest and "it inspired me to start," he said. He soon found that woodcarving came quite naturally and fit in well with his talents as a carpenter.

He began carving with a couple of carpenter's chisels, some regular files and a couple of screwdrivers that he shaped and sharpened. Now he has 18 to 20 different chisels and 10 to 12 knives. Proof says he carves primarily in walnut but has used basswood quite a bit. This type of wood comes from the linden tree. He has also carved Honduras mahogany and poplar, but prefers the harder wood of walnut, which results in a better finish. Some of this wood he chops down himself on land close by, with the owner's permission, of course.

Sometimes he researches what he intends to carve by finding photographs or drawings at the library. Other times he will sketch what he intends to carve first. In addition to relief carvings, he also does statues and canes. Canes, he added, are quite popular- so popular in fact that he can't keep any on hand. "When I finish a cane," he adds, "it seems someone around here buys it and I can't keep an inventory." He sells the canes for \$60, but it takes about 40 hours to make one "so I don't really make any money on it."

Proof has won many awards at woodcarving shows. He taught his wife, Carol, the finer points of woodcarving and says she also has won some awards at carving shows. Mrs. Proof says she's not as good at it as her husband, but enjoys sharing his hobby. "He has a gift, a special talent that comes natural to him," she adds.

About five years ago, Gary joined the NHPA pitching with the Canton Horseshoe Club and is still an active member. Ray Welsh, president of the club, says "Gary is my right hand man." The day before Gary was to replace Welsh as president of the horseshoe club in 2009, a misfortune occurred. At the age of 62, Gary had a brain aneurism, came close to death, and was pretty much out of touch with horseshoe pitching and woodcarving for over a year. He is on disability now, unable to return to work, but is enjoying his retirement years. With his faith in God, Gary is back on the courts and carving once more.

He participated in the 2012 World Tournament in Knoxville for

the first time and won Mens "D" Class with a record of 11-4, pitching 40.82%. It was there that he brought his impressive woodcarving of Simmons and Francis to the NHPF booth that Gail Sluys was manning while the NHPF officers were having a meeting. She was so excited by it she couldn't wait for the officers to return. Soon the two world champions stopped by the NHPF booth to see it and were amazed by its finest details. Joe Faron brought the art piece back to Wentzville with him. He and Bob Cutright began making a beautiful case for it. With the approval of the



NHPA officers it now hangs on the wall in the Hall of Fame Museum and catches many a visitor's eye as they come through. Gary has plans for several more projects in the future.

All across the USA, the NHPA is loaded with horseshoe pitchers of many talents, Gary is "100% Proof" in this area; dedicating many hours of his talent by adding his creations to the history of horseshoes. He learned the thrill of bringing a block of wood to life and of the satisfaction it gives not only to him, but to others.

When you are traveling through Missouri stop by the NHPA Hall of Fame and see this new piece of artwork which adorns the wall of the Hall of Fame room. # HORSESHOE FACTS & FOLKLORE by Bob Dunn, NHPA Historian

Although Leland Mortenson never was appointed NHPA Historian, he served the NHPA well by recording countless interesting stories of our sport's history. No one did more than he in writing about and promoting our sport; and of course he is a Hall of Fame member (1971). There were a few others that also gave major contribution in this effort without the title of historian. First would be Raymond Howard, who founded the NHPA magazine Horseshoe World which recorded the first 20 years of our sport's history. There also would be D.D. Cottrell, who did have a title of Statistician and his World Tournament entries in the Horseshoe World still are providing us with precious records. Lee Jacobs, who served as NHPA Vice President in 1940 under the assumed name Lee Rose, produced the Horseshoe Compendium, which filled a big gap in the time sequence of recording our history. We also are blessed to have Ottie Reno as a member, who never was known as historian, but provided us with three tremendous books that captured a considerable amount of history. His books: "The Story of Horseshoes," "Pitching Championship Horseshoes," and "The American Directory of Horseshoe Pitching," are still available through our NHPA Game Related Sales folks. Then we can remember Gary Kline, who did serve for thirty years as Historian and gave us the "The Official History of the World Tournament 1909-1980." That book is also available from our GRS distributors.

For this issue, we are reprinting an article that Mortenson wrote for the December 1952 *Horseshoe Pitcher* about one of the great characters of our sport, one of the players that Mortenson had as a frequent subject and one of our favorites to read about — Putt Mossman. This is a perfect case in point. His article is an Iowa update that just focused in on Mossman. And then to follow, in a later Iowa update, (January 1956), Mortenson announced the death of the first pitching star of our sport — Frank Jackson.

Iowa By Leland Mortenson

"The most important horseshoe activity by far during the fall of 1952 is the sensational exhibition invasion by Putt Mossman. Since about Labor Day, Putt has put on about one hundred exhibitions at Iowa grade and high schools. He has shows booked into late December when his schedule calls for him to head toward California and he has return engagements for the Spring and Fall of 1953. His present exhibitions generally include trick and fancy pitching, acrobatic performance, a lecture about his world travels and experiences, instruction on how to pitch and how to keep healthy and a period of questions from the students and the teachers.

This new turn in exhibitions in our schools is most welcome to those of us who would like to see school children and teachers become interested in horseshoe pitching. Many of the principals and coaches have talked with Mossman as to how a general program could be put into effect whereby the schools could decide their champions and runner-ups who could go some final tournament for the state title. Putt has invited the Iowa Horseshoe Pitchers Association to get into a huddle with him about the matter, but the desired huddle much less a workable plan, have not materialized. Of course, this would cost a lot of money, but the writer is definitely of the opinion that the boys should get together with Putt.

Putt Mossman assures us that horseshoe pitching, except on special occasions, has always been one of the main attractions of his sport show regardless of whether it was before a small group of school pupils in Iowa or before the Emperor of Japan. The activity of Putt Mossman from 1924 to 1933 is generally known but from 1933

to 1952 it has been much in the dark. All in all it has been a hard rough life in which Putt, like Charles S. Chapman of the movies, was the promoter, manager, star, owner of the company, the director and about everything else. We have just one criticism to make about his activity; for nineteen years he was making news and headlines, which could have been used to advantage by the officers of the NHPA. What wouldn't the late Harry Woodfield have done with weekly reports from Putt Mossman during that time. Putt let himself lose contact with his horseshoe pitching buddies. He promises to not let this happen again. Following is a general outline of his travels since 1933.

After the Chicago World Tournament of 1933, he traveled for George Hammid, big Eastern booking agent and appeared in horseshoe pitching, motorcycle and trick shooting exhibitions.

For most of the year of 1934, he starred in personal appearances at Paramount Theatre in horseshoe pitching and acrobatics.

In 1935, he headed his own sports troupe and went to Japan. For sixty days he and the troupe appeared daily at the Yokohama Exposition in horseshoe pitching, tumbling, high kicking, motorcycle trick riding and racing. The Emperor as well as a million other persons who paid admission watched his performances. Again in 1935, he organized another sports troupe and started for a round the world exhibition tour. This trip took him to the Tahitian Islands, the Cook Islands, New Zealand. Waikiki Island, then Australia, Ceylon, up through the Suez Canal and finally to Southampton, England. He played sixty shows at Southampton and staged other attractions throughout England at Birmingham, Oxford, Liverpool, Manchester and at Wimbledon Stadium in London.

At Wimbledon, he rode his motorcycle off the grand stand into a tank of water five feet deep, ten feet wide and fifty-three feet long with his machine rocket propelled and with his clothes on fire. He then went Paris, France for exhibitions and then returned to England for more shows and then returned to America.

At Gilmore Stadium in Hollywood, California, he drove up a plank on the rear of a car moving about twenty-five miles per hour and down and over a plank on the front end of the car.

In 1936, he started another trip around the world and this time he went to Africa and Spain. The writer admits that here he lost the continuity of the story except that from 1939 to 1943 Mossman was in Africa and lived in Johannesburg and Durban and he appeared in horseshoe pitching show at the Africa Consolidated Theatres. He rode his motorcycle through Central Africa from North to South and had breath-taking experiences on the trip. He claims to have been the first motorcycle rider to cross the Sahara Desert. He has seen and talked to pigmies and cannibals, has been blocked on the trails by lions and a python and he came near going swimming in a river thickly populated with alligators. He has talked to missionaries who claimed that the graves were guarded for two weeks after burial to prevent cannibals from robbing the graves and eating the corpses. Mossman says he has been the special guest of tribal chiefs.

On May 6, 1940, he married an English girl in South Africa and a boy was born to this union. He hopes to bring the boy to America soon. Putt hunted in Africa and shot a wild boar, a buffalo and a zebra. He played exhibitions at the gold fields of Johannesburg and the diamond mines at Kimberly. On his return from Africa he went to South America. For a short time during the war he served with the Merchant Marine.

Mossman has tentative plans to publish a book about his life and horseshoe pitching activities and he also plans to again manufacture his own pitching shoes. He believes there is a large potential market for both of these in the public schools where he appears."

Iowa

"The death of Frank Jackson occurred December 27, 1955 at the age of 85, in Tampa, Florida.

Frank Jackson was the first world's champion horseshoe pitcher. He moved away from Iowa in late 1933 and apparently since moving away, he lost complete touch with all Iowa horseshoe pitchers and with about all of the nationally known horseshoe pitchers. I had hoped to see him sometime and get information from him regarding the world championship tournaments held between 1909 and 1919, all of which he won (some ten of them). He was born October 1, 1870 and he could have told a lot about horseshoe from 1880 to 1920. When I was seeing him annually from 1927 to 1933, it didn't occur to me to get all of that interesting information from him. Now that Jackson is dead, I doubt if anybody will ever obtain such needed information. We really needed that information to complete the modern day history of horseshoe pitching.

Jackson was a healthy, rugged pitcher. He was hardened to play a long time without getting tired. His face was tanned brown – a fellow once remarked that his skin looked tanned like leather. Even as late as 1933 at the age of 62 when he last played in Des Moines and took second to C.C. Davis in a mid-west meet, he showed no signs of wearing out.

I think that he should be entered into the Iowa Hall of Sports Fame. I wonder if he won't soon be – I hope so.

He laid claim to being the first man in tournament play to complete a 50-point game with all ringers. He once threw 68 ringers without a miss."

#### MAN ABANDONS FARMING TO PITCH HORSESHOE

"Lamont, Iowa — Because he can make more money pitching horseshoes than he can farming his 160 acres, Frank Jackson, state horseshoe champ and former national titleholder, has sold him farm and stock near here.

"I can make lots more money pitching shoes than I can farming," Jackson told friends."

This is how Jackson's obituary appeared in a Tampa, Florida newspaper...

Horseshoe Champion Dies at 85

"Frank Elray Jackson, who held the world's horseshoe pitching championship 13 times since 1908, died Tuesday night in a Tampa hospital. He was 85.

Mr. Jackson claimed to have been the only man who ever played a complete 50-point game with all ringers. He held a record of 68 ringers without a miss and another record of 76.3 per cent ringer average for a tournament.

He staged demonstrations of his horseshoe pitching skill on occasion, by showing bystanders how he could light a match placed by a stake with a horseshoe pitched from 40 feet, ring a stake hidden

from his view by a blanket and ring the legs of a chair on which another person was sitting.

#### Retired Farmer

He was a retired Iowa farmer and had lived in Tampa for several years at 712 Stratford. He was born in Kellerton, Iowa.

He was an honorary member of the Sunshine Pleasure Club of St. Petersburg and of the Sulphur Springs Tourist Club of Tampa. He was also a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Vera Blount and Mrs. Corda Townsley, both of Kansas; three sons, Carrol E (Jack), Tampa; Hansford E., Los Angeles, Calif.; Vyrl D., Los Angeles; a brother, Fred, Los Angeles; 11 grandchildren; 30 great-grandchildren and two great-grandchildren."

Thorough Mortenson's writing we can know a bit more about one of the greatest pitchers of all-time. Jackson did have an incredible career. Maybe the competition was not the keenest in the first few years, but it was all-relative and after 1920 when the field became competitive every event still achieved a top five finish, year after year. Remember the hooked pitching shoe was not fully developed until 1932 and then his last two tournaments, at well past 60 years of age, were over 70% ringers. One thing Mortenson did not mention was that Frank Jackson did not take a stride in his delivery, he stood stationary. And when Jackson began competitive pitching he wrapped his forefinger around the point of the heel and pitched like a two and a half turn. It was not until 1926 that he converted to the 1¾ turn. Here is Frank Jackson's World Tournament career record:

# A PITCH FOR HEALTH Debby Michaud

HYDRATION:

Summer will be here before we know it and we all want to be in good shape. In the southern states, they are already pitching. What does "in good shape" mean? Part of that, for horseshoe pitchers, is to be strong enough and to have enough endurance to pitch a full tournament without feeling tired, weak, or over heated. Preventing fatigue may be as easy as taking a walk everyday and stretching after that walk as well as stretching after pitching - more on that another time. But, just as important is to maintain good hydration. Would you run your car with only half the amount of oil that it requires? Probably not - the car doesn't run as well nor as smoothly as it should, in fact may not run at all, with only Similarly, without enough fluid on board, YOU don't "run" as well as you should. A car low on oil soon burns out or wears down its components. Your joints, ligaments, and tendons are your components - "running" them without enough fluid will also wear down YOUR components because they are not being lubricated even while you ask them to work at the same motions for 3 - 4 hours, almost continuously, in a tournament. In addition, fatigue will set in much sooner when you are dehydrated. Many Americans are chronically dehydrated - that IS changing as carrying a reusable water bottle is "IN"! And that is a good thing!

How do you insure that you will be well enough hydrated for a

whole tournament? Well, you might think that your sensation of thirst will tell you when to drink fluid. Unfortunately, the thirst mechanism is not too efficient AND it becomes less efficient as we get older. Often we are already a pint or two low by the time we feel thirsty. What we need to do is to take in fluid BEFORE we sense that we are thirsty. We need to PLAN to drink instead of waiting for our bodies to tell us when to drink. One or two cups of water prior to beginning a tournament is a good way to start. On a hot day, it would be wise to drink at least one more cup of fluid with each game, yep, you read that right - EACH game. Drinking cool water will also help your core temperature stay normal. Some studies have shown that carbonated liquid is absorbed more quickly so soda, or carbonated, water might help. Soda is acceptable, but has other drawbacks such as giving you empty calories and the dreaded stomach bloating and gas! Diluted sports drinks are OK to alternate with water but water, all by itself, is usually the best option. Forget the salt tablets as those might defeat the purpose of hydration and you might get sick to your stomach - NOT!

So set up another way to improve your game - plan your fluid intake before and during practices and tournaments. We all want to pitch better; this is one more way to help that happen!! Good luck, stay warm, and start getting ready for a good year of pitching.

# RULES AND BYLAWS by Dan Sanders

Our recent NHPA Officer's winter meeting in St. George, Utah was a very memorable and productive event. Our tour of the up-coming World Tournament facilities was excellent, and if you can make it to this event, I promise that you will not be disappointed! All of the air-conditioned courts will be under the same roof, and there are in-ground practice courts within ten minutes of the arena. Not only is this facility 'first class', but the City of St. George, and surrounding area, offers a little bit of something for everyone. This is also an ideal 'vacation spot' with three near-by National Parks within a two or so hour's drive. These include Zion, Bryce Canyon, and Grand Canyon National Parks. Also, the city of Las Vegas is less than two hours away and may offer some very reasonable airfares, with advance planning. And so we are all hoping that you will plan to attend this World Tournament event!

As you may know, this is an 'off year' for any Bylaws or Rules changes, so I will be spending some of my time working on some other 'projects'. During the World Tournament in Knoxville last year, I spent quite a bit of time talking with several of the Tennessee horseshoe pitchers, and during one of our conversations, the subject of using hand signals while 'calling the score' came up. As you may have experienced, there are several situations where hearing the call is difficult. These include large arenas where the acoustics is not good, or at any outside facility where it may be a windy day, for example. Also, with the average age of our pitchers increasing, it may be more difficult for some of our older scorekeepers to hear/be sure of the calls, especially when the pitcher calling the score is not facing them directly. This idea of using hand signals may not be new to most of you who have pitched for any length of time,

and some of these 'signs' may even be used by you or by your friends. The problem is that there is currently no consistency with the use of hand signals, especially from state to state. Also, the use of different hand signals by different pitchers only adds to the problem of calling/understanding scores, especially at our larger tournaments (like State Tournaments, Regional Tournaments, or the World Tournament) where pitchers from wide-spread areas are meeting to compete. And so it has been proposed that the NHPA should develop and approve a set of standard hand signals; one for each of the ten possible scores that could be called during cancellation play. Of course, the best scenario would be when an audible score and hand signal are both given at the same time, so there would be very little question, from the scorekeeper, about the call that was made. So far, I have received suggestions from several pitchers about what the 'best' hand signals should be for the various possible calls. Another important part of this learning process will be some good drawings, for each one of the calls/signals, which any person can look at and study for the learning of these hand signals. And just what are these ten (10) possible calls that we need hand signals for, for cancellation play? If you haven't already figured them all out by now, you can find them in the RGS Book under Guideline 2 - Calling The Score, on pages 29 and 30. This same information can also be found on the NHPA Website at www.horseshoepitching.com under Guidelines. If any of you have any good ideas for hand signals and drawings that you can contribute to this project, please send them along to me either by e-mail or by 'snail mail' (both of these addresses can be found on page 3 of Newsline Magazine). Thanks in advance for any help that you can send along, and be looking for more on this subject in a future issue.




