At nine years old, Brianna fell in love with the game of horseshoes from her aunts, uncles, and cousins and it has stuck with her ever since. She has many hobbies including reading, hunting, fishing, and being with friends and family, but horseshoes is definitely at the top of her list.

As an 18 year old graduate from Bristol Vermont, Brianna had the privilege of experiencing her last days of high school a semester before some of her classmates. She accomplished this by taking extra classes her sophomore and junior years and by taking an Independent Study project of horseshoes! She received credit from her school for pitching horseshoes by writing six papers, having 40+ hours invested, and by making a scrapbook type log book of all of her patches, round robin cards, and pictures. As any new graduate, Brianna is excited to be finishing school, but even more so for the upcoming horseshoe season.

Brianna has been the New England Cadets Champ for one year, the Vermont Cadets State Champ for two years, the New England Girls Champ for the past six years, the Vermont Jr. Girls State Champ for the past seven years, and was the 2012 Jr. Girls World Champ. With as much experience as Brianna has had, she is definitely excited for world as it looks like the junior girls will be a good class again; but you never know who may step up their game. When asked what she likes most about being a junior pitcher, she gave a reply that most juniors can agree with. "You get to meet new juniors and make new friends. It's fun to play against adults and beat them. I had to gain respect from a lot of the adult pitchers over the years and prove that I am as serious about this sport as they are." REGIONAL DIRECTORS REPORT by Debby Michaud, NHPA 5th VP

First, our hearts and thoughts go out to all of the people across the country who have endured some real tough circumstances - the Boston Marathon bombings, the tornadoes in Oklahoma and all of the mid-West. Horseshoes has made friends for all of us in all parts of the country and every time some difficulty hits an area of the country, we hope and pray for the safety of all of our horseshoe friends and their families in that area. We are with you! Stay Strong, Stay Safe!

As the summer season of horseshoe pitching moves into high gear, many of us are also into our busiest time of year. The planning for the tournaments is done - now the summer pitching starts. Most Regional Directors, before and after pitching themselves, keep an eye out for court conditions as they hope for happy and satisfied horseshoe pitchers. It is hard for an RD to just attend a tournament without taking a measure of the facility. Sorry! We just get into that habit! Thanks to all of the clubs who are continually upgrading and improving their facilities. Keep up the good work!

Little things crop up and pitchers have questions. Those questions often come to a Regional Director or to one of the NHPA officers. A recent question had to do with a tournament that was rained out after three games were completed in a six-person round robin schedule. The rule states that this IS a completed tournament as more than half of the games were completed. What happened was that one of the pitchers in the class was undefeated and two of the pitchers in that class had one loss. However, the ringer % for the undefeated player was lower than the ringer % for the two pitchers who had one loss. The tournament director determined that the undefeated player came in third and that the other two pitchers, each with one loss, finished in first and second place. This decision "flummoxed" me and I want to hear from others on what they think. One of the reasons given for this decision was that the undefeated player was behind by one point in the incomplete fourth game this game was called a "loss" even though it was incomplete and that "loss" put him in a tie with the other two pitchers. His lower ringer %, they reasoned, put him in third place. I don't agree that the incomplete game was a game but, I would like to hear from others. It is sometimes hard for a tournament director to make decisions on the spot, but I do think this particular decision was incorrect. It is always good to share notes and learn from each other, though.

We have had no further possible candidates for the position of NHPA 5th VP, but the two candidates that we do have are both excellent people who work hard and love horseshoes. It is good to know that there are folks out there who have the NHPA's best interest at heart. I will not announce the names of the two people who are interested in case we have other potential candidates, to avoid giving anyone an advantage.

Preparations are also moving into high gear for this year's World Tournament in St. George, Utah. We have over 1,000 entries and the schedule is being published TODAY – as I write this. Time to get excited! We have several entrants from S. Africa and Namibia in addition to one entry from Norway and, of course, several from Canada. Definitely check out the NHPA website for more information on what to see and do in and around St. George while you are there. And look forward to the Jukskei competitions while you are there. They will be held the first week and announcements will be posted.

News from Steve Summerlin, RD in Michigan:

I am very pleased to inform you that we have been able to add a new club to our pitching facilities this year. The name of this facility is the Hillsdale Fairgrounds Horseshoe Club and it has six sand courts. The stakes are removable as this is in a multi-use building at the Hillsdale Fairgrounds. It is a lighted area and the ceiling height is 14 ft. Snow fence will be used during horseshoe events, also because it is a multi-use building. During the Hillsdale Fair, the FFA kids show their cattle in the same area. They will hold their first tournament on July 20, 2013.

Great news, Steve. Every area in the country could use this kind of boost!

Back to a more serious note, an issue that has been brought to my attention is the matter of drinking alcohol on or near the courts and the behavior changes that occur with it. (This is probably an on-going issue in many charters.) If the drinking is in excess and especially if it is being done by league or state officers, it becomes an even greater concern. When people in charge are setting a negative example, it becomes harder for the rest of the pitchers to overcome that visual and auditory impression. Newer pitchers especially may assume that drinking is an accepted practice in our sport if they see the "officials" doing it. What to do? Someone in the league is often "appointed", either by default or by actual discussion, to talk to the person who is setting the bad example. Bringing up the RGS ruling on unsportsmanlike behavior and appealing to the person's common sense may work OR it may bring on a defensive attitude - this whole topic has to be approached carefully and is best attempted by a trusted friend of the person. Every case is so individual that no one approach will work 100% of the time. I write this hoping to reach people who may recognize this behavior in themselves or in their friends and who might make the choice to modify their drinking behavior on their own. It is a BIG concern of mine and not something I really understand. Horseshoe pitching is such a great competitive sport - drinking alcohol while pitching horseshoes during any level of competition would be like drinking alcohol while trying to thread a needle or while competing in a putting contest in golf – something that people who sew or successful golfers would recognize as counter-productive.

I want to wish everyone the BEST for this pitching season, at your local and regional courts AND at the World Horseshoe Pitching Championships in St. George, Utah. Stay focused, enjoy your games, and make many new friends!

Kenny Pogue September 24, 1930 - May 10, 2013

Kenneth W. Pogue passed away on May 10, 2013 from complications of a severe stroke at Jefferson Memorial Hospital in Festus, Missouri at the age of 82. Kenny traveled across the United States with his wife, Ann, and a pair of horseshoes for over 30 years. No matter wherever Kenny pitched, he brought an aura of excitement, lively conversation and good, friendly, but

serious competition.

Kenny was a late bloomer when he began pitching horseshoes at the age of 47. While working in St. Louis a fellow worker named Joe Douchant got him interested in horseshoes. Kenny bought his first pair of horseshoes, a pair of Gordon's that had been cracked and welded down the middle, from Joe for \$5. Kenny joined the Illinois Tri-County Horseshoe League in 1977. Just how much did Kenny love pitching shoes? He would drive 125 miles weekly from his home to Cahokia, IL to pitch in a horseshoe league.

He developed his own unique pitching style, starting off on the wrong foot, holding his shoe somewhat differently, but for Kenny it worked. He never realized his type was so wrong until he began entering tournaments and noticed how the other fellows pitched. By this time, he was already pitching 50%. "Why change now?"

Kenny would go on to win many trophies, patches and awards during his horseshoe career. He qualified and pitched in the Men's Championship Class for many years. He never captured the title, but

was runner up in 1992 with a 70.67%. Kenny was on the 1990 Team World Championship Team in Beloit, WI along with Vicki Winston, Sam Carter and Stan Griggs. It was the only time that Missouri won that event.

Kenny pitched with and won against many World Tournament Champions including Alan Francis, Walter Ray Williams, Jim Knisley and Curly Siebold, just to name a few. In 1986 Missouri's 18-year-old Alan Francis moved from the Junior Division to the Men's Division in State Tournament competition. Kenny would be his first opponent in this division. Kenny won that game. From that point on Alan never lost another game in Missouri competition and would go on to be a 17 times Men's World Champion.

He was instrumental in getting the Festus Horseshoe Club and the

Mineral Hills Area Club started. He was a past member of the Greater Horseshoe Club of St. Louis. He joined the New Melle Horseshoe Club in 1994 and remained a member of the Quail Ridge Horseshoe Club up until the present time. When Kenny turned 80 he was made a Lifetime Member of the QRHC. A brick is being placed in his honor at the Jack Freeman Memorial Walkway in front of the NHPA Hall of Fame facility. For his talent and skill in playing the game and for the contributions Kenny made in horseshoes, he was inducted into the Missouri State Horseshoe Hall of Fame in 2007, an honor that he so well deserved.

He overcame many obstacles in his lifetime. In 1988 he fought a

battle with kidney cancer. In 1992 while attending the Las Vegas Open Tournament he collapsed on the courts suffering a heart attack and underwent open heart surgery. In 2006 Kenny was involved in a tractor accident that nearly killed him. He was like a cat with nine lives, always came bouncing back, itching for a new opponent, another challenge, another game. But a severe stroke hit him the first part of May, and it was too much for him to survive.

Kenny had a gift of gab and we enjoyed many conversations with him. Probably every horseshoe pitcher who came in contact with Kenny will always remember him. His presence on the courts will be sadly missed by all but his lively spirit remains.

Dick Bauer Delaware

Our sympathy goes out to his wife, Joan, and to his family and friends of the Club's eldest statesman, Dick Bauer. At age 82, he passed peacefully in his sleep Sunday morning, May 5th.

This year would have been his 10th year with the First State Horseshoe Club. One of Dick's sons, Ben, as well as his grandson Ben, Jr., are past members of our Club. Within the prior two weeks, Dick had purchased a longer pick-up stick and some lighter-weight horseshoes. He had showed up for practice at the Senior Center on the Friday before his passing.

He served for years in the government of New Castle County as the Director of Planning & Zoning Dept. After retirement, Dick became a dedicated volunteer delivering "Meals On Wheels" for many years. He always made sure his clients were OK, and helped them if they needed any small things done at their homes.

His biggest joy, however, was playing horseshoes. He won many trophies in various leagues in Delaware and Maryland and topped off his horseshoe career with the 2012 Gold Medal in the 80 to 84 age group in the Delaware Senior Olympics. He had represented Delaware in the National Senior Olympics...he was very proud... and his family and friends will remain proud of him. Our club members will remember; whether win or lose, Dick was always a gentleman.

(Remember, you will likely be driving through desert – proper engine cooling is ESSENTIAL!)

Also, do not take chances with your fuel tank. You may be able to travel 400 miles on a tank of gas in your home territory, but the fuel mileage will change in higher elevations and hilly conditions. Not knowing where the next fueling station is can be rather unnerving when your gage is nearing the EMPTY mark!

Be careful, be aware and BE SAFE!!

NHPF NEWS VIEWS & DONATIONS by Dave Loucks

The National Horseshoe Pitchers Foundation was incorporated on 9/25/1996 in the State of Tennessee.

The affairs of the Foundation are managed by a Board of Directors comprised of four elected directors and the NHPA president who serves as a fifth director, ex officio. Each elected director serves a term of four years with elections staggered so that two directors are elected every other year. Officers of the Foundation are elected annually by the Board of Directors and serve one year terms. A Board member may also serve as an officer though an officer need not be a director. Only Foundation directors can vote upon any matter presented to them by officers or other directors.

As all directors and officers serve the NHPF without compensation, it is sometimes difficult to find new candidates to serve on the Board or as an officer. However, the challenge is there for those who love horseshoe pitching and want to see the history and future of the sport not only preserved but also advanced. Like any charitable organization, the NHPF cannot exist without financial support. While the Foundation succeeded in raising the funds necessary to construct the 21,000 sq.ft. Hall of Fame, Museum and indoor pitching courts in Wentzville, we still look to solicit gifts, bequests and contributions needed to maintain the facility. So, if you feel you'd like to help and perhaps serve, please let us hear from you. The next election of directors and officers will take place at the annual NHPF meeting held during the W.T. in St. George, Utah.

As I wrote in this column for the last issue, contributions and brick orders from individuals or clubs are at an all-time low. We realize that the economy has not yet fully recovered, but there are many ways to provide financial support beyond a cash donation or brick purchase. You can convey real estate, stocks, securities, commodities and personal property either directly or through an after death bequeath. People tell us that they love visiting the Hall of Fame and pitching at the facility and are full of suggestions to improve, expand and hold more tournaments. Wonderful ideas, but without greater financial support from the members, maintaining is about the best we can do.

The Foundation will have a booth at the World Tournament in St. George. We will be selling 2014 W.T. Experience raffle tickets as well

as some NHPF memorabilia. Please stop by to purchase a brick and/ or make a donation for which you can receive a gift. Contributions to the NHPF are recognized by the IRS as tax-deductible and can be sent to the NHPF, P.O. Box 1628, Penn Valley, CA 95946. During the two months of April and May, the NHPF received only eight donations and orders for five bricks. The total funds received were \$1,770. During the winter time before leaving for Phoenix, he travels approximately 70 miles to the city of Jackson which has an indoor horseshoe facility. During the summer this enthusiastic couple travels to weekend tournaments across Michigan; in fact last summer this included 32 tournaments! Since joining the NHPA in 2010, their lives are filled with horseshoe activities. They love the camaraderie of meeting new friends. They say', "We are doing something different in our lives; we enjoy the competition and just knowing that you can work to get better has brought on an additional excitement to our lives."

The Drakes were anxious to see their new granddaughter, Skylar when arriving home in Michigan. They have one son, Jason and wife, Tracy, who will be looking forward to their return home. Before leaving the Drakes bought some Hall of Fame souvenirs to take home with them. RULES AND GUIDELINES by Dan Sanders

Use of Hand Signals for Cancellation Scoring - Another Update

Since my earlier request for ideas and information about the use of hand signals for cancellation scoring (see the May/June Newsline Magazine article), I have received several helpful responses from our members. Thanks so much for this input! As a result, we are now in the process of reviewing all of the possible options and will be making decisions about which ones may be best to recommend for use by you and your fellow Charter members. Earlier, a suggestion was made that some kind of handsignal presentation be made to our World Tournament Delegates, at the WT Convention in St. George. And so we are planning to present these hand signals at that time and, based on input from our delegates and other WT pitchers, we'll then make final selections for these recommended hand signals. Eventually, they will be published for all to see, learn, and use during tournament play. Of course, there will never be a requirement for pitchers to use hand signals. The intent here is that these signals should be helpful to the scorekeepers, who may have trouble hearing called scores, for a variety of reasons.

A Current Rules Question/Response

Hi Dan,

It has been (our Charter rule) that when a tournament is rained out, the entries get credit for that tourney. Due to scheduling conflicts, tourneys cannot be re-scheduled. We require 4 tournaments to pitch in our state tourney. Can this canceled tournament (rain out) also apply for the NHPA?

Response:

Thanks for your question about sanctioned tournament 'credit'. Actually, according to our NHPA Bylaws, your Charter Bylaws/Rules cannot be 'in conflict' with existing NHPA Rules (and they may not be in conflict in this case), but you haven't provided here any specific 'details' of what does 'count', in the case of your sanctioned tournament rain-outs. Certainly your Association wouldn't want a local tournament to 'count' towards qualifying for your State Tournament, but 'not count' for the 4 events required for WT competition, for example. Anyway, here

are the current NHPA requirements for submitting tournament results, for NatStats credit (also see RGS Requirement 2, Section E, page 23):

Section E - Tournament Credit (from RGS Book)

1. For singles and doubles events, a contestant must have pitched a minimum of 100 shoes to receive NatStats credit.

There is some additional information included here that would apply for Team Tournaments and also for Elimination Tournaments. But to answer your question... "Can this canceled tournament also apply for the NHPA?", the answer would depend upon whether or not a minimum of 100 shoes had been pitched, for each of these contestants who were 'rained out'. If less than 100 shoes has been pitched, the contestants do not qualify for their stats to even be submitted for NHPA NatStats credit. In these cases, most TDs will refund the entry fee, unless otherwise specified in Charter Bylaws, or with advance notice in pre-published/posted information, or as a verbal announcement before tournament play begins. I would suggest that your Charter requirement for rain-outs/tournament credit (for pitching in your State Tournament) should be in agreement with this new NHPA 'minimum of 100 shoes pitched' Requirement.

Hope this answers your question.

Additional comments: This past year (2012), there were a number of proposed NHPA rules changes that were approved by our Charter delegate voting in Knoxville, TN. The proposed rules that 'passed' were published here in Newsline Magazine following the Convention, for your information, and with the hope that all Charter officers would check to see if any of these rules changes would change or supersede any of their existing Charter Bylaws or Charter Rules. In some cases, I'm sure that some adjustments have been made, but I'd guess that some Charter Rules/Bylaws have not yet been updated, based on these recent rules changes. The general 'rule of thumb' here is that Charter Rules/Bylaws may be more restrictive than NHPA Rules/Bylaws (upon Charter-member approved voting), but cannot be less restrictive than our NHPA Rules/Bylaws. If any Charter officers or members may have specific questions about this, please contact me.

Prize money of \$4,000 was given to each division. Beside the cash money, the winner's names in each division would be placed on the stationary trophies which stay on display at the NHPA facility.



HORSESHOE FACTS & FOLKLORE by Bob Dunn, NHPA Historian

Even though Lee Rose passed away several years ago, in this issue he will be our guest writer. Lee Rose kept a journal of his horseshoe pitching career from 1924 through 1955, writing out six journals in all. In the previous Newsline issue we read about the A.A.U. getting into the sport of horseshoe pitching, holding national championships and read about the initial nation amateur championship in 1937. The 1944 national event was held in Detroit, Michigan and that meant having the Michigan native, Lee Rose participating in the tournament and Lee wrote quite an account of the event and his winning performance. The following is a chapter out of a book in progress, "A.A.U. NATIONAL HORSESHOE PITCHING CHAMPIONSHIP." Lee Jacobs, a 1984 inductee to our National Hall of Fame, was the subject of our history series article back in July-August 2010, so I may not need to remind you that Lee Jacobs was not necessarily the most modest person, but he was great for our sport, great for our organization and a championship pitcher.

1944 - On to Detroit - Lee Rose "The Flower of Detroit" is the Winner

Yes, Lee Rose wrote about the 1944 championships, but not only did he write a very complete review as a participant, he won the national title. Michigan, at the time, was a very competitive area for horseshoe pitching. That is somewhat obvious as pitchers from Detroit win two consecutive national amateur titles. In fact as we read on in the next chapters, three different Michigan pitchers won three titles in a four-year period.

This is a most unusual chapter, not only do we have a participant's first hand account of the event, we have the champion's version of the coverage. Lee Jacobs, his actual name and as he was known in later years, was one of the sport's best historians. He never had that title officially, but he did have a knack for recording his involvement in horseshoe pitching for over a 30-year period in incredible detail and in 1940 produced one of the sport's finest history book's — The Horseshoe Compendium. Jacobs served one year as NHPA Secretary-Treasurer in 1940, and it was during that year that he produced the book, one of very few in the sport. His book has been scanned and can be found in its entirety on the NHPA website - horseshoepitching.com.

Lee Rose may not have been well liked by fellow players, he might have been easier to get along with on days when he was winning rather than days when he was losing as he had an extreme desire to win. He had a tremendous stem of self-confidence as he termed himself "The Flower of Detroit" a derivative of his assumed name of Rose. But he also displayed strong promotional skill and efforts and for five decades contributed to the promotion and organization of horseshoe pitching. One of the reasons that Michigan was a powerhouse in the sport at the time was due to Lee Jacob's effort to promote horseshoe pitching at all levels of the sport. Even in the 1920's he made distinctive efforts to establish teams and league competition and local league efforts and then grow that into local and state competition. Besides being a national officer, he also served 25 years as the Michigan State Association Secretary-Treasurer from 1935 to 1960. Those efforts were recognized by his

induction to the NHPA Hall of Fame in 1984. Of course he is also a member of the Michigan Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame. Lee Jacobs lived to be 92 years old, passing away in 1998.

Having the opportunity to have read his journals of his entire pitching career in detail and all the tournaments that he participating in; the question again comes up to what determines an amateur pitcher. By 1944, he was nearly a 20 year veteran of the sport, Michigan state champion in 1933 and again later in 1944 and 1955, twice qualified for the Men's Championship Class at World Tournaments (1927, 1928) and at the 1935 World Tournament, missed the Championship Class cut off, but qualified for Class B (known as the Dispatch Tourney) and earned \$5.00 for 11th place. That \$5.00 or any other prize money he may have won

doesn't make Rose a professional or non-amateur any more than any of the rest of the good pitchers of that day. There were very few trophy only tournaments and most of the events needed to have a little bit of a cash purse if they were to draw any good pitchers. But that is another story and the issue will pop up later in this chapter.

There are a couple short newspaper articles tacked in his journal, but most of this chapter is his recording...

National A.A.U. Tournament Held at Northwestern Field Sept. 16-17,

"On September 15, the evening before the big meet, I went over to Northwestern Field for some practice and there was Sgt. Breen warming up. I played him 2 practice games and really poured it on him. I hit around 90% to drop him 50-18 and overcame him in another games 50-33, which must have gone 140 shoes, with me still crowding 90%.

September 16 was the qualifying and the doubles. I warmed up a while and then qualified with a 256, 80 ringers to tie Breen's National record. Latzko hit 79 ringers and 255 points.

Koppitch and I teamed up in the doubles, and only bad luck stopped us from taking the title! We just couldn't get started against Yorkison & Fagan and lost out. (Games were 50 shoes, count-all system). After beating Breen and Manker, we lost a hard-luck game to Middletown & Sheppard. Then we went to town and knocked off 4 good teams — Lundgren & Otto, Lindquist & Grosselin, Latzko & Woodward and Kelly & Getz. We wound up tied for 1st with Latzko & Woodward. The playoff game was played under the lights and Koppitch and I were beaten.

Several of the pitchers were entertained by me at my house that evening, and most of the night.

Everything was set for the big finals on September 17. Sixteen pitchers faced the barrier in 50 shoe count-all games. The day was hot and almost no wind at all - - - - just perfect for the 'tiger.'

A large crowd was on hand, even before play opened and heated speculation ran rampant as to who would win the meet. Chief choices were Latzko, Rose (or Jacobs, as he is known in A.A.U. circles) and Lundgren, Breen and Lindquist.

Rose opened with Sheppard and had no trouble in coming out ahead. The second game with Manker of Ohio was just as easy. In the third game against Yorkison, Rose hit the high game of the entire day, scoring 133 points with 43 ringers out of 50 shoes. Grosselin was easy and then Rose struck his first snag in Middleton. Rose trailed most of the way. The game was played on the first court with people running through and interfering, making it very hard to rally. Rose tied the score on the last throw by hanging a double ringer over Middleton's leaner. The game went four extra innings. Rose galloped away with 4 straight doubles and finally won. An hour of rest for lunch was called here and only Rose and Latzko

Come back from a light lunch, Rose had to face Arner Lindquist! Lindquist jumped right off in front and his slow way of pitching made it difficult to rally against him. Rose however, never wavered and even when things looked almost beyond recall, he kept bearing down. Then, near the end, Lindquist weakened and the Detroit ringer machine was quick to slip ahead and squeeze out a win, 103 to 101.

The 7th game, against Hirschman, was easy after 20 shoes and then came Breen. Rose tore into Breen early and ran up a lead and then sat back and defended it stoutly against the soldier's desperate rallies. Breen fell just a little short. Lindquist upset Latzko in this round and Rose stood alone at the top.

Kelly was the next victim of Rose, being powered under early by a flood of doubles. Rose was really going to town as he scented a national title in the offing. He met Getz in the 10th game and Getz jumped off to a lead at the start. Photographers were trying to snap pictures of Rose as he tried to catch up and that made things almost bad enough to cause Rose to blow up. But he didn't blow

--- instead, he came on with a consecutive drive of doubles that soon caught Getz and snowed him under.

Lundgren fired a broadside at Latzko in this round and bounced him down. This left Rose 2 games in front and 5 to go.

An immense crowd surrounded the courts. Persons who hadn't been around for years were to be seen. Harold Arold, Joe Galesky, Ed Levagood and Sherer showed up. Stanley David and Johnny Schultz were there. Fitzgerald and Konz of Toledo were there. Greenfield, Goodell, Ingraham and others from Clark Park were there. Even E.L. Holmes, a schoolteacher back in Western High in 1921-25 came around to say hello.

Pekkala was easy in the 11th game and then came the Rose-Latzko clash. Latzko pitched a very good game, the game of a man who is very desperate and getting a early lead over Rose, he clung to it all the way and won out.

This enlivened the situation to a great extent as Rose now had Miller, Lundgren and Otto to play and had to win them all to keep out in front. The story of these last three games Rose played cannot adequately be put into words! With an immense following crowded around his court and following his every pitch, the "Flower of Detroit" put on a show that has few equals in history.

Rose showered on 40 out of 50 to run a hard fighting Miller to the ground, then hit 39 out of 50 to swamp Lundgren. Then back to the hazardous 1st court, he tossed a thunderous barrage of 41 out of 50 to smash down Otto and become the NATIONAL CHAMPION!!!

In all these last games, Rose was the perfect horseshoe machine and indeed all through the tournament, never once gave vent to any temperamental outburst that had distinguished him in the past.

His manner was outwardly a cool, collected, icy-cold, machine-like attitude, fortified by a never-say-die quality that kept him coming over the rough spots. Mechanically, his pitching was beautiful, a high wobbly shoe that just seemed to adore the stake.

A just reward for a great pitcher!"

(Newspaper clippings) 'Shoe' Title Stays Here

"Lee Jacobs, who began pitching horseshoe 25 years ago when he was 13 years old, finally crashed the elusive national championship circle yesterday, winning the A.A.U. singles title at Northwestern Field.

A lathe operator at the Ford Motor Co., Jacobs triumphed in 14 of his 15 matches, edging out Joseph P. Latzko, Flint, by a margin of one match. The latter, who handed the new champion his lone setback, won 13 and lost two.

Third place went to Arner Lindquist, while Carl Lundgren, last year's titleholder, took fourth place from Sgt. Frank Breen, after the two had finished in a tie.

Sixteen contestants out of a field of 23 qualified for the finals. The competition was staged under the direction of George D. Chumard, Cincinnati, A.A.U. horseshoe chairman.

Championship medals were presented to the first three place winners."

Horseshoers Called Pros


"Professionalism charges were brought against Lee Jacobs of Detroit and Joe Latzko after they placed one-two in the National AAU horseshoe pitching tournament at Northwestern Field Sunday.

It was charged that Jacobs, who won 14 and lost 1 yesterday, had played in a tournament in Port Huron a month ago. Latzko is second with 13 and 2 was in the same meet, it is said.

Arner Lindquist of Morgantown, W.Va. and Frank Breen, of Elgin, Ill., were tied for third with 11 and 4 and will play off for the title if Jacobs and Latzko are disqualified. Jonas and Carl Lundgren, both of Detroit were next with 11 and 4.

Joe Kelly of Saginaw and Otto Woodward of Flint also are charged with playing in the pro-meet."

Similar charges may have been made in previous contests or events that followed in future years, but this is the first and only documented case that has turned up in research. Interesting that Rose thought enough of the article as to clip it out and tack it in his journal. Also interesting is the question of who brought the charge forward? Doubtful it was a player that had participated in the event as they no doubt would have brought the charge forward when Rose entered the contest. Doubtful that it was any of the leading players, as they were from out of the area and would not be aware of what tournaments Rose or any other Michigan players had participated in. Never-the-less, nothing must have come of it as Rose is still listed as the winner, and was

allowed to participate in other later A.A.U. tournaments, as well as Latzko who not only played in other events, but won the national championship in 1946. And then consider that Carl Lundgren was the 1943 National A.A.U. Champion, that being three different Michigan players winning national titles in a four year period, just further defines Michigan at the time, as a nation power in the sport and subject to close scrutiny. That newspaper article is not accurate as far as the final standings, but that will be clarified in the official final stand report coming up next.

As a lot of conversations begin, I'm going to reference the weather once again. Our summer league here in Omaha got off to a slow start with all the rain we've been having. But after a couple of makeup nights, we're back on schedule. As well are many other leagues around the country, as evidenced by the membership reports that have been coming in. These reports are a requirement of the Sanctioned League Program and it's important that league Directors get these turned in as soon possible after your league begins play. And you will need to submit additional reports if new players participate in your league after the start of the season.

The annual NHPA Sanctioned League Tournament will again be held this year at the Quail Ridge Horseshoe Club in Wentzville, MO. The dates are October 5th and 6th. First place prize money has been increased to \$750.00. Last year, nine states were represented by a total of 22 teams. Remember, the field for this tournament is filled in the order entries are received. No more than two teams per club, please. Entry forms with full tournament details are available on the website.

And as I looked over to next column, there was another familiar name at the top of the Frank Jackson Open results held


