As the 2013 pitching season comes to an end for many Charters, I hope everyone had a great season of horseshoe pitching. I know many Charters have hosted their State Tournament Labor Day weekend. Congratulations to all those State Champions.

Just a reminder, elections are open for Secretary-Treasurer, 2nd VP and 4th VP positions. Per the By-Laws, candidates for NHPA office must announce their candidacy in writing to be received by the President and the Horseshoe Pitching Newsline Editor no later than February 1, 2014. The NHPA Council has approved a job description outlining the requirements for members interested in running for the Secretary/Treasurer position. The Council feels this is a critical position and wants to make sure we get qualified applicants to run. The job description will be sent out via Charter Communications and will also be in this issue of Newsline.

Each year the NHPA votes to award an individual the Arch Stokes award. This is the NHPA's most prestigious award and is awarded to an NHPA member who has done the most during the preceding three to five years to promote, foster and build the sport. We also vote to award NHPA Achievement awards to members who the Council feel have worked at promoting and growing the sport of horseshoes. Just a reminder for Charters who have members that they feel are worthy of one of these awards, please contact me and I will send you a nomination form or you can find it on our NHPA website. The deadline for the Stokes Award is March 31, 2014 and the NHPA Achievement Award deadline is, March 1, 2014. One other nomination for members to consider is the NHPA Hall of Fame. If any of you have an individual who you feel is a candidate, please contact myself or Vicki

Winston at horshuvicki@socket.net for a nomination form. Nomination forms must be received by Vicki Winston by January 31, 2014.

The 2014 World Horseshoe Tournament will be held July 14–26, 2014 at Buffalo, NY. The NHPA trailer has already arrived from St. George. Jerry LaBrosse and I will be performing a site tour the week of December 12th. We will be reviewing the court layout at the Fairgrounds along with finding a location for the NHPA Hall of Fame banquet. We will keep you posted on the results of our trip.

The NHPA will be having our winter meeting January 23-25, 2014. We have two days scheduled to meet on various topics. This is also the time we go over comments and suggestions received from St. George

in an effort to keep improving our world tournament.

As part of my duties as World Tournament Coordinator, I will be attending the 2013 TEAMS (Travel, Events, and Management in Sports) Conference November 5th - 9th in Salt Lake City, UT. The purpose of this meeting is to get groups of planners and sports organizers together to TEAMS with businesses on either hosting a meeting or a sporting event. Last year over seven hundred planners and sponsors attended this conference. For two days, I will be having appointments with sites all over the US and Canada. Interest remains high with many organizations wanting to host the world tournament. I believe these types of meetings benefit the sport of horseshoes, not only to draw interest in sites bidding for the world tournament, but also to raise awareness to the various sports marketing groups that horseshoes are played at a competitive level.

For the Regional Directors; you may be contacted by your local CVB/Tourism group as I provide them your name to start the communication. I have encouraged them to team up with their local horseshoe clubs before starting the bidding process as I have found that teams comprised of both horseshoe and tourism groups seem to be more successful during the bidding process.

In conclusion, I would like to thank all the delegates at St. George for allowing me another term as your President; as promised, I will continue to work hard to grow and promote this great sport we all have come to love. I want to wish everyone the happiest Holidays.

REGIONAL DIRECTORS REPORT by Debby Michaud, NHPA 5th VP

Hello everyone! This is my final column as your NHPA 5th VP – I have to say that I will miss the interactions with so many of you hearing the questions, the complaints, and the concerns, receiving your comments on everything from good pitching conditions to great pitching shirts! Bill Marvin will be continuing this column in the next issue - I wish him the best and know that he will enjoy working with all of you as much as I have.

My first thing is to apologize to the Senior Women's and Senior Men's 2013 World Champions - for some reason I left them out of my last column and that was strange because I really enjoyed watched them. Congratulations to Ron Deckard for his toughness in winning that last match with Tom Gallina AND congratulations to Sheila Shepard for her consistent and high percentage performance at this year's World Tournament. exemplify what is different about our sport - that pitchers of almost ANY age can compete at a high level.

My second thing is to relay a report from Phil Plotke, the RD Wyoming is a state that is well off financially (unusual for these times) and the horseshoe pitchers were able to take advantage of that to run a program for juniors. put in a request for funds from the Recreation Division of their county (something anyone can do) and did receive 2/3 of what they requested. With that money, they bought 24 pairs of horseshoes plus calipers and then ran a horseshoe program for high school They coordinated with the Phys. Ed. Teachers to bus students from the school to their horseshoe courts where they taught them how to pitch, different formats for pitching, and the safety rules for pitching. The first year there were four students that stuck with it but this past year, that number increased to 16. They were also able to hold an evening youth league, playing singles and doubles in a handicap format. With the money left over, they bought some NHPA membership cards for some of these young people. This is a good report of some progress for juniors in Wyoming.

Another idea that they use because of the long distances that their pitchers have to travel is to hold TWO tournaments at each site on one weekend. I think this is also done in Northern California, but it is something to think about trying. In our area, the six New England states, many pitchers are scrambling to get in enough tournaments so they can attend the 2014 World Tournament in Buffalo, NY, so this might work for us.

We do have two new Regional Directors to report - in South Dakota, Clint Bryson has been an RD for a long time and was ready to step down. He deserves to relax now! Thank you to Clint for his long service - it was a pleasure to work with you as your work ethic is obvious. His replacement will be Tom Dunham has stepped down - his role will now be filled by John Wellsand, Jr. who, again, has also already begun his duties. Thank you for your years of service, Jim, and thank you to Tom and John for jumping in to work for the NHPA. In Maryland, Don Lawyer, ready to retire, has resigned as RD, but no replacement has yet been appointed. Diana Ratliff, charter secretary, is filling in for now. We also have no RD in TN as Craig Schadler resigned due to work issues (thank you for your work, Craig and Don!) but they are almost ready to appoint someone to fill Craig's shoes. TN's charter secretary, JoAnn Stanford, is also filling in for now. Can't say enough about charter secretaries - they "earn" their money OR maybe just lots of appreciation from the pitchers.

We also received a report of a new membership program in Indiana which seems to be working. I'll let John Wellsand's words explain.....


"At last year's meeting in Kokomo, our plan to rescue a rapidly declining membership was aimed at bringing in new members and pitchers who haven't pitched in INHPA since 2008. How was this done? By our treasury paying for their 2013 membership dues. Stipulations: They must sign up to pitch in an INHPA sanctioned league or tournament, complete 100 shoes, or pitch at least 400 shoes in a non-sanctioned league. They will be issued a temporary number for their first tournament. Then, after the tournament, a permanent card will be sent to them. This prevents our treasury from paying for someone's card who never uses it or only plays out of state.

The whole purpose is that we have a great product - INHPA sanctioned tournaments and sanctioned leagues. We want to do our very best to hook them into INHPA. At this writing, we have over 80 new members who pitched at least one tournament under this program. Finally, the key for success of the free membership program will be how many will return in 2014."

Hopefully, there will be a good follow-up report on this next year. Thank you, John, for that update.

Have a great winter, everyone. Those of you who can pitch in the winter are indeed lucky. At the six indoor courts in E. Hartford, CT, they are over-full in entries for their first three tournaments. They are adding another pitching time so will have 84 pitchers pitching in each of the first three indoor tournaments. Can't beat it, no sun, wind, or cold, AND computerized scoring - how much easier can it be?? The new tournament directors there, Jim and Deb Scully along with New England HPA president John Hamilton, are to be commended for jumping in to fill the big shoes of Don Maine, who has had some medical issues and is recovering nicely.

PUBLICITY / PROMOTION by Tina Hawkins

Cooler weather is now upon us and for many that means the end of the horseshoe pitching season.

It does not have to mean the end of HORSESHOES, though!! There are many "off season" activities to fill the winter months.

This is the ideal time to hold a score keeping clinic! Teach all your NEW members (and the OLD ones who still don't know!) how to keep score - on paper as well as with HS Scorekeeper. That software is available for download on the NHPA website, www.horseshoepitching.com. Many people - perhaps some from YOUR club - received expert HS Scorekeeper instruction during the World Tournament and could probably assist with your clinic.

Clubs with access to indoor facilities (or with milder weather) can hold horseshoe pitching clinics to help new members with their game, as well as teach them proper game etiquette. Several horseshoe pitching videos are available through NHPA Game Related Sales that could be used for instruction. Don't have indoor courts? Take one portable horseshoe court to a barn, garage or warehouse for just one day to get this done!

Another option to keep the game alive is to talk with your local high school's booster clubs. Setting up a portable court at a football game will gain exposure for your club, and could also be utilized as a fund raiser for the boosters! Simply collect a couple of dollars from game-goers to throw a few shoes and split the proceeds between the booster club and the person who scored the most points! It could be a sideline activity that grows and grows each week! Take along lots of contact information to hand out to interested pitchers.

Clubs can stay active in horseshoes by building a float for their local Christmas parade. It doesn't have to be elaborate to attract attention. The portable courts on wheels shown in the last issue would certainly draw people's eyes. If you have access to a flat bed trailer, such as a car hauler or even a golf cart trailer, you can add a few people, signs and banners, cardboard cutouts of horseshoes – or hang REAL horseshoes around for decoration! The bed of a pickup would work just as well, if there is not trailer handy. Be sure to have some of your members walking the parade route handing out contact information!

Speaking of Christmas... What better gift for your child or grandchild (or brother, sister, aunt, uncle!) than a brand new NHPA membership card! Add a pair of new horseshoes, a carry bag, and measuring tool and you have the beginning of a brand new horseshoe pitcher!

If you do not have a local club, this is the perfect time to talk to your city planners about BUILDING some! Budgets will be forming for the upcoming year – get your project on the bill, so construction can begin and be complete before pitching season is in full swing!

The time is NOW for adding your events to community calendars, as well. Be sure to list league nights and contact information, in addition to tournaments and horseshoe pitching clinics.

However you chose to spend your "off" season, make an effort to keep horseshoes ALIVE, so you will be excited and ready to hit the courts when springtime rolls back around!

NHPF NEWS VIEWS & DONATIONS by Dave Loucks

To preserve the history, showcase the present and build the future of horseshoe pitching is the mission statement of the National Horseshoe Pitchers Foundation. You've probably read this statement before in many of the Newsline articles written by Jeanette Claas as she almost always ends her column with the mission statement that follows a plea for a contribution to the NHPF.

Regrettably, member contributions have been in a steady decline since the opening of the NHPA Hall of Fame & Museum building in October 2007. As of this writing, 2013 donations are on pace to end the year with member contributions being about 15% of the total seven years ago. The decline is alarming because it directly impacts the ability of the NHPF to meet the part of its mission statement that says, "build the future of horseshoe pitching".

The Foundation obviously has to provide the funds to maintain and support needed improvement and repair to the Hall of Fame facility. In September, the NHPF paid a bill of \$48,500 for a special recoat and sealing of the metal roof on the building. During heavy rains and wind in the area, numerous water leaks were being dealt with and after some half-dozen inspections by various contractors, it was agreed that only a recoat along with a 10 year no-leak guarantee would prevent the damage to the interior. That \$48,500 bill was more than the combined total contributions and brick orders of the membership over the past three years.

Fortunately, the NHPA contributes one dollar per year per adult membership and the Quail Ridge Horseshoe Club contributes \$1,000 per month for use of the facility. This is the bulk of income to the NHPF but with expenses like the one mentioned above,

it does not allow the Foundation to expand on its modest grant problem or assume a level of responsibility to financially support junior pitching which would be a first step toward the third part of our mission statement.

If you love horseshoe pitching and want to see the goals of our mission statement met, it will take the involvement of you and many more members. NHPF fund-raising needs are ongoing as we have a million dollar Hall of Fame & Museum facility to maintain, grants to be made and future goals to be met. You can help by sending a tax-deductible contribution to the NHPF, P.O. Box 1628, Penn Valley, CA 95946. Orders for commemorative bricks should also be sent to this address. Brick order forms and contribution details can be found on the NHPF link of the NHPA website.

SANCTIONED LEAGUE by David Sidles

The NHPA takes great pride in being able to offer young people a venue where they can participate in a sporting activity in which they can achieve world championship recognition. But the NHPA also recognizes the importance of achieving a good education. In order to promote success in the classroom, the NHPA has established the Sanctioned League Junior Scholarship Program. This program is open to any NHPA Junior member that participates in a junior or adult sanctioned league and observes the 27 foot foul line. Awards are given annually and are based equally on both academics and league participation.

To be eligible, a junior must be in grades 7th through 12th in a Middle, Junior or Senior high school. An equivalent home school may also qualify. Juniors must also be a minimum of 12 years of age and no older than 18 years of age the year they apply for a scholarship. The junior must maintain a grade point average of 3.00 or higher on a 4 point scale, 85% or higher on a 100% scale, or the equivalent of a "B" letter grade or higher. Honors class grades are also considered in grade point determination. This grade point must be maintained for an entire school year.

All qualified applicants will be recognized as either a member of the NHPA Honor/Scholar Society or as a NHPA Scholar/Trust Fund Pitcher. Scholarship amounts are determined by the NHPA Council. Recognition includes a scholar certificate, a junior scholar patch, a junior scholar plaque, and or a scholarship to be held in the NHPA trust fund until such time the student has successfully completed high school.

All Scholar/Honor Society winners shall be listed and published in the NHPA Newsline magazine. NHPA Scholarship Trust Fund Pitchers shall provide a photo of themselves with their plaque, along with an article detailing their horseshoe pitching activities to the National Sanctioned League Director for publication in Newsline.

To apply for a NHPA scholarship, juniors must submit by November 15th of each year, all the necessary forms for the school year completed that year. For example, a junior pitcher applying on November 15, 2013, would submit an official transcript for the entire 2012/2013 school year. Also required are a copy of the pitchers birth certificate or other proof of age, and the official NHPA Scholarship Application which is available on the NHPA website under the Leagues tab.

Lastly, a reminder. The deadline for submitting league stats for any Top Ten Award eligibility is December 15th. I am very pleased to announce that 40 shoe count-all leagues as well as 50 shoe count-all leagues are now eligible for the National Top Ten points based awards. In order to qualify for one of these awards, a player must have first been listed on a league membership report, and the league stats report must have been completed accurately and with all information relative to the award. Some leagues have been submitting stats which indicate that partial games were played. In other words, the number of shoes per game does not divide evenly into the number of shoes pitched. This affects a player's true points or ringers per game average. Because of the accuracy required to calculate who earns these awards, any players reported with partial games played will not be considered for Top Ten awards. Another issue that arises on stats reports is the accuracy of current high points or high ringer percent games. Many reported high point games aren't even possible based on the high percent game that's reported. This also affects eligibility for an award. I will do everything I can to make sure deserving players receive the awards they earn and may be contacting league directors to verify some results.

Although all the leagues have yet to report their final results, I would say this was another successful year of sanctioned league pitching. Eleven new clubs were formed in 2013. I'm looking forward to another two years as National Director beginning in January. Many thanks to the entire staff of league Directors for the work you do to promote the game at this level.

PLAYING RULES AND BYLAWS by Dan Sanders

<u>Use of Hand Signals for Cancellation Scoring - Update</u> <u>Information and some Diagrams</u>

In earlier Newsline articles I have discussed the use of hand signals, which may be used in addition to 'called' scores, and which help to ensure that verbal calls are more fully understood by the scorekeepers. Several basic signals have been used by many of us through the years, but to my knowledge, there has never been a published series of hand signals and diagrams that were readily available for pitchers to learn and use. We have recently created a series of hand signals, for each of the ten possible calls, and which were presented to delegates in attendance at the NHPA Convention held earlier this year in St. George, UT. I am including this same set of hand signals here (see below), for your information and consideration.

Since the Convention, I have received some additional hand signal suggestions from our members, but which have not yet been incorporated into the diagrams presented here. One noteworthy suggestion was for the '2 dead' and '4 dead' hand signals. For '2 dead', two fingers are held in a downward position (down is dead). This could be followed by the 'no score', '1 point', or '3 points' hand signals; whichever might apply. For '4 dead', four fingers are held in a downward position (down is dead). This could be followed by the 'no score' hand signal. The use of either two or four fingers held downward eliminates the need for using an additional signal for 'dead', and therefore may be a better option for hand signals involving 'dead' scores.

If, after reviewing these diagrams, you have other hand signals that you may like better, please contact me with your suggestions. Please note that the hand signals presented here are based on the ten 'recommended calls', which can be found in the RGS Book on pages 29-30 under GUIDELINE 2, Section A. You may also want to begin using some of these various hand signals and ask the scorekeepers which ones they prefer to see being used. Any feedback to me about this would be greatly appreciated. Eventually, there will be an NHPA Recommended set of hand signals that will be printed in the next revision of the RGS Book, following the Recommended Calls. But the recommended hand signals will not be voted on by our NHPA delegates until 2015, so there is still plenty of time for experimenting with these various suggested hand signals!

Proposed NHPA Bylaws Changes

Just another reminder that next year (2014) is our scheduled year for proposed Bylaws changes. Please read through our current NHPA Bylaws booklet (light blue in color, and available upon request) and consider any passages that you feel may be improved by your suggested changes. All proposed changes will be considered, and delegate voting will take place at the 2014 annual NHPA Convention, to be held in Buffalo, NY. Your Bylaws change proposals can be sent to me now at 42 Scioto Street, Powell, OH 43065, but according to our current Bylaws, must be postmarked no later than December 31, 2013.

When a teenager is expecting a phone call they will sit by the phone until it rings, but not a certain 16-year-old from Duncan British Columbia. When I called Lindsay Hodgins for this interview she was out in the yard practicing in the horseshoe pits her grandfather made and put in. Even though there are no more tournaments for Lindsay this year, she still practices about two and a half hours a day, even in the rain.

Lindsay first started pitching when she was only 13 years old. In only three short years she has won the Junior Girls 2012 Canadian title, 2012 and 2013 British Columbia title, 2012 and 2013 Island title and the 2013 World title. She would like to win as many titles as she can and to try and beat as many top people as she can. Her grandfather said that in most tournaments she is ranked in the top class with some of the best Men and Women pitchers in Canada. When asked what her main focus is when she pitches and what she thinks about she replied, "I just go with the flow and try to beat people."

Competition in St. George, Utah at the world tournament was her first time pitching in clay. She liked it a lot better because it was harder to knock off well placed shoes. She made a lot of new friends and had fun. She enjoyed pitching in the junior division against other juniors her age because it seemed more relaxed. When I mentioned that a lot of spectators were surprised at how well she pitched at the tournament her reply was that she thinks nobody checked the Canadian Stats and that everyone should watch out for her next year.

Lindsay may be a typical 16-year-old teenager going to secondary school with a job and papers to write, but she is also a gifted young girl. Lindsay has Autism, but it has made her excel in all aspects of her life including the sport of horseshoes. Her grandfather describes Autism as that when she pitches, she only focuses on the game and how she herself is pitching. She doesn't let anything distract her. When she finds something she loves, she will do it for as long as she can. As Lindsay described the game of horseshoes, it is her heart and soul and she will keep pitching for as long as she can.

HORSESHOE PITCHING FACTS

AND FOLKLORE by Bob Dunn

How Horseshoe Pitching Came to Neosho, Missouri

John Elkins was a championship class pitcher from Missouri, born September 29, 1909. His state tournament career began in 1937 and continued through 1963. In that time, he won six Missouri state championships and came in runner-up five more times. His high State Tournament was in 1952 when he averaged 73% ringers and went undefeated in seven games. Five times John qualified for the Men's Championship Class in the World Tournament; 1949, 1952, 1956, 1958 and 1959, and that was back when a player actually qualified at the World Tournament. He averaged 70.2% in 1958 and placed eleventh and placed 15th in 1952 as he averaged 70.90%.

In 1982, John wrote Gary Kline a letter giving a few highlights of his career and many interesting memories. At the time, Kline was NHPA Historian, and the letter was filed in one of his many folders to be found later and at this time is being reprinted for us to enjoy. John Elkins pitched and gabbed with all the greats of his time, and that was quite an era in our sport.

Mr. Gary Kline, Neosho, MO May 18, 1982

I bought a copy of "History of the NHPA World Tournament 1909 to 1980" from Earl Winston. I enjoyed reading it very much, brought back memories of C.C. Davis and Ralph Spencer having a four out of seven game match at Fall Harvest Show in 1923. Spencer had won 3 in a row from C.C. and a friend of mine said he will take Davis. Durwood Dorsey who ran a grocery store by where they were pitching said no, he had \$50.00 that said Spencer would not win another game. So they bet and old C.C won the next four games. That is how and when horseshoe pitching started in Neosho.

Spencer lived in Picher, Oklahoma, about 40 miles from Neosho and was here several times, he died in 1950 at 56 years of age.

Now a word about O.S. or Sidney Plott. He grew up and went to school here. We went to the State meet in Sedalia in 1933 and other years in the 1930's.

Ted Allen and Fernando Isais were there. I remember Ted coming out with Gordon Spin On and tossing 23 double ringers in a row, then threw 5 doubles left handed and then stopped. We kidded him about that at Murray. He said he would have missed the next shot.

I have a letter that was written by Frank Jackson in Zephyrhills, Florida that tells why Allen changed from Gordon to Lattore shoes. It was all because John Gordon not paying as committed in the 1934 World Tournament. Jackson went on to say in the letter that about 2 weeks before he threw 23 straight doubles against his oldest son's, which was Carroll Jackson's wife Grace. Jackson would have been 65 years old at the time. The letter was written to Clarence Townsley of Blue Mound, Kansas. Blue Mound is about 100 miles from Neosho.

At the 1956 World Meet, Ted Allen and Don Titcomb were playing a best 2 of 3 for the championship. Ted won the first game and Titcomb won game two. In the third and final playoff game, Don had Ted Allen down 46 to 28, when John Gordon punched with his elbow and said, "MO", old Don has won her this time. Well Allen kept climbing until they 49-49 and Allen in first pitch threw a ringer and a close shoe. Don's first shoe was a perfect ringer but left his second shoe cleared the stake by about the thickness of a shoe. Gordon jumped about a foot high and said G-D, I told him not to throw that shoe there and he hadn't said a word for at least 10 minutes. Earl Winston can vouch for that.

I happened to be on the next court over when Titcomb had 97 out of 100 in

middle of a 200-shoe (qualifying) pitch. Oh yes, in 1958, he (Titcomb) had 10 on out of first 12 shoes, then threw 21 doubles in a row at me, for 52 out of 54 shoes.

Well anyway I had a lot of fun in those meets from 1949 to 1959.

I had the pleasure of beating Dave Baker, who was out there (Murray, Utah, 1958) with Earl and I in the semi-finals, he was about 20 year old at the time (actually 18 year old) and tied for 5th place with Curt Day, Floyd Toole and Glen Anderson. It was decided by ringer percentage: Baker had 78.1%, Day 78.8%, Toole 76.8% and Anderson 73.5%. Louis Dean was 9th with 76.0%; Robert West 10th, 77.1%; I had 70.2% and a 4-9 record for 11th; Dale Dixon 69.8% for 12th and Roger Vogel 2-11, 66.4%. Maurice Tamboer went home and forfeited his position. I think he was disgusted with his pitching. He was a very good pitcher and a good person.

Earl and his father kidded Dave on the way home that I could have dropped my game in the final to him and it would have made him \$78.00 more prize money and wouldn't have changed mine. Ha.

Gary, do you know which president of the NHPA didn't have a card at the convention and resigned and Jack Claves took over for the balance of the

Here are some who I think should be in the Hall of Fame. First – L.E. Tanner, who Lee Rose says in the 1940 Horseshoe Compendium that Tanner kept the game alive during the trying years from 1933 to 1939. Second - Jake Jaskulek, editor of the Horseshoe Pitcher until his death in 1956 when Ellis Cobb took over.

In his letter, John Elkin named several all-time greats of the game that he played against and rubbed elbows with. Some of you may have heard those names before, some of our newer members may not be aware of the folks that John named, but nearly all are NHPA Hall of Fame inductees. Let's take a quick run down the list:

First to be mentioned was the game between C.C. Davis and Ralph Spencer. C.C Davis was just featured in this series back in at the beginning of this year, if you wish to read more about him. Davis was a five-time world champion and should be considered the best pitcher of the first decade of our sport. That is quite a statement considering that Frank Jackson also was

considered the greatest at that time and was viewed as the "Babe Ruth" of horseshoe pitching which is interesting from the standpoint that Jackson knew Babe Ruth and pitched game against him in exhibition. Never-theless C.C. Davis was the more talented pitcher and here is the point to remember. Frank Jackson never won a World title in a tournament that C.C. Davis pitched in.

Ralph Spencer was inducted to the National Hall of Fame in 2006, C.C. Davis in 1969 and Frank Jackson was a charter inductee in 1966.

John Gordon is probably a familiar name as everyone has heard of Gordon horseshoes. That is the one and the same Gordon. John was inducted to the Hall of Fame in 1971.

Carroll Jackson and his wife Grace were briefly mentioned. This couple was quite a team on the exhibition circuit, which raises the question, were they good pitchers? The answer is yes, in fact all of Frank Jackson's sons were champion class pitchers. It is almost a certain fact that the Jackson brothers are the largest number of siblings to qualify for a championship class in World Tournament competition. Even more astounding, they all accomplished the feat in the same tournament as all three brothers (Carroll, Hansford, Vyril) and dad (Frank) were in the top 12 final places in the 1928 World Tournament.

Don Titcomb, who just passed away, was mentioned in John's letter. Don, a great pitcher, was the first pitcher to win World titles in three different divisions; Men's (1960), Intermediate Men's (1988) and Senior Men's (1995). Titcomb, also a great promoter of the game and was inducted to the Hall of Fame in 1977.

Elkins letter told a neat story of the three folks from Missouri attending a World Tournament in Murray, Utah. Nearly every one of us is aware of the great Hall of Fame career of Earl Winston and the decades of service given by Earl to our sport. Yet, few may have heard of Dave Baker, who was probably the best pitcher in that car. Dave was just 18 years old for the tournament in 1958 and that was not his first World event. Dave Baker first qualified for the Championship Class in 1955 at age 16. An interesting story telling how that came to be is reprinted here from "The World Champions of Horseshoe Pitching:

There was one other youngster from out of state, that may have put a clinker in the string of Utah based Junior Champions had he pitched as a Junior. Dave Baker of Missouri was 15 years old and averaging over 80% from 30'. He had also practiced from 40' as the lure of a cash payday

seemed brighter than the opportunity to win just a trophy. At the time back home, Baker was working on a produce farm picking tomatoes for \$28.00 a week. If he qualified for the Men's Championship Class he would be assured a \$45.00 prize even if he didn't win a game. He decided on trying for the Men's Championship Class, and he did qualify, even if just barely and then went on to win 8 games, averaging 64.9% to place 34th, earning \$47.00, nearly two weeks pay, and leaving the Junior Championship in Utah."

Dave Baker, a 15 time Missouri state champion is not in the National Hall of Fame, although he has been nominated and should soon appear on the ballot. He qualified for the Men's Championship Class eight times at World Tournaments and won 130 games which ranks 69th on the All-Time Wins List.

One player named in Elkins letter that probably is not familiar to anyone is Glenn Anderson. Glenn was an up and coming star from Illinois, when he was sadly killed in a one car accident in 1958. Anderson qualified nine times at the world tournament and had four top ten finishes that included a 76.6% tournament in 1954. Glenn won 161 games to rank 48th on the All-Time Wins List.

Who was the NHPA president who could not be allowed to head up the Convention because he did not have a current NHPA membership card? This event is mentioned in several old documents and actually happened in 1940 in Des Moines, Iowa, but was never fully explained. LeRoy Page, a resident of Des Moines, was president at the time, but did not have a current membership card and was not allowed to conduct the 1940 convention. Jack Claves, a NHPA Hall of Fame inductee, conducted the convention and was elected president for the next year. One can only assume it was an oversight, rather than some form of protest.

And here is something else from back in the 1950's, as printed in the Horseshoe Pitcher's News Digest. Just maybe you didn't know:

"Miss Ringer" of 1959 Gains Prominence In Miss America Contest

It may never have occurred to the many pitchers that played in the 1959 World Tournament held in Murray, Utah that the girl who was the "Miss Ringer Queen" at that tournament would turn out to be the runner-up in the 1961 "Miss America" beauty pageant. Her name is Miss Carolyn Lasater of Salt Lake City, Utah. She gained the right to represent her state by winning the "Miss Utah" title. Shortly after the Miss America pageant she appeared on Red Skelton's show.

NHPA SECRETARY/TREASURER POSITION JOB DESCRIPTION

As you all know, Dick Hansen is retiring from the position of NHPA Secretary/Treasurer, which he has honorably held since 1995. Dick and Paulette Hansen deserve our gratitude for doing a great job all these years.

Now we begin the process of finding a replacement. The NHPA council has created a written "job description" for anyone who may be interested in seeking this position.

According to the NHPA Bylaws; Article 5: Officers - SECTION 7. Candidates for NHPA office must announce their candidacy in writing, to be received by the President and the Horseshoe Pitching Newsline Editor no later than February 1st.

The election for this position will be held at the World Tournament Annual Convention in Buffalo, NY this coming summer.

NHPA Bylaws description under Article IV, Section 2 - C (see 2012 revision):

C. The Secretary-Treasurer shall:

- Be custodian of all funds, property, records and other NHPA-owned assets except those of the game-related sales program, which are under the direction of the National Buyer.
- 2. Keep records of all monies received and disbursed, provide a monthly written statement of same to the Executive Council and to *Horseshoe Pitching Newsline* editor, for publication.
- 3. Pay all bills for routine supplies and all special purchases that have been approved by the Executive Council.
- 4. Annually, by April 15, submit required books and records of the previous April 1 to March 31 fiscal year to the NHPA auditor, for the year-end report.

The information below is a more detailed explanation of the above NHPA Bylaw as it relates to the current duties of the Secretary/Treasurer. Please note that the amount of compensation for this and other NHPA positions can be found in Article IV, Section 3 of the Bylaws booklet, or on the NHPA Website at www.horseshoepitching.com.

A. Business/Financial Duties to include:

- 1. Receiving and processing all membership dues
- 2. Maintaining all necessary bank accounts
- 3. Maintaining all official business and financial records
- 4. Coordinating with Game Related Sales
- 5. Coordinating all major assets: Equipment, trailers, policies, investments, etc.
- 6. Paying all bills and approved expense claims, and coordinating special purchases
- Maintaining financial records and providing monthly reports to the NHPA Council
- 8. Providing necessary information to the NHPA Auditor by

- April 15th, annually
- 9. Providing complete and current financial reports and forecasts to the NHPA Council, at the winter meeting
- 10. Processing all *Horseshoe Pitching Newsline* magazine subscriptions

B. Secretarial Duties to include:

- 1. Maintaining the official NHPA Office and phone line
- 2. Arranging for taking all meeting minutes
- Arranging for the world tournament banquet and Junior party
- 4. Setting up and staffing the world tournament NHPA office
- 5. Creating the world tournament pitching schedule
- Arranging for world tournament trophies, plaques, and other awards
- 7. Arranging for the world tournament convention
- 8. Communicating with Charter Secretaries and other Charter officers as needed
- Maintaining current contact information for Charter Presidents and Secretaries
- Arranging for any other world tournament needs, as required

C. Suggested Job Requirements:

- 1. Should be at least a 5-year veteran member of the NHPA, and must be in good standing.
- 2. Should be retired, or semi-retired. This job requires full-time hours at certain times of the year.
- 3. Should have had experience in financial operations and with handling large sums of money.
- 4. Should have internet/e-mail access and must be proficient with basic computer operations.
- 5. Should have good organizational skills.
- 6. Should have good writing skills and good verbal communication skills
- 7. Must be available to attend the annual winter meeting and must be present for the entire world tournament.
- 8. Should have attended/participated in at least three world tournaments.
- 9. Should have experience as a secretary/treasurer, board member, or officer of a notable organization.

If you are interested in this NHPA Secretary/Treasurer position, notify NHPA President Stu Sipma as soon as possible, and then prepare a candidacy letter for publication in Newsline Magazine. Meet 91-year-old Anthony Lombardi. His friends call him Tony and I'm pleased to be his friend. Tony has participated in sports all of his life. Early in his life while growing up in Montclair,



New Jersey, he was an avid baseball player. Pitching was his specialty position. Tony was the pitcher for the Babe Ruth League team that won the annual playoff tournament-his first championship! An awards ceremony was held and Babe Ruth himself attended and presented an autographed baseball to Tony. Well, what does a 13-year-old boy do with a Babe Ruth autographed baseball? He put it to good use on the ol' baseball diamond. He says that his team played that ball until the cover came off, was taped back together, and came off again. His high school did not have a baseball team; so,

he joined the track team and put his good throwing arm to use by taking up the javelin throw. He was the first sophomore to win New Jersey's state javelin title. And, then the next year, he broke the state's javelin record. He also played football and was captain of the 1939 team. Tony continued athletics after high school. He played football on a Green Bay Packers farm team, won a Golden Gloves boxing championship, and the Dodgers invited him to try out for their baseball team. However, in the early 40s when World War II was heating up, Tony joined the Marines. Tony volunteered to be a scout for his Marine Company in several notoriously vicious Pacific theater battles before an enemy grenade caught up with him, seriously wounding him, and sending him home with a welldeserved Purple Heart. NATIONAL HORSESHOE HALL OF FAME & MUSEUM by Jeanette Claas

Preserving Horseshoe History of the Past

The NHPA Hall of Fame & Museum room located at the "Crossroads of the Nation" in Wentzville, Missouri has seen many changes since its opening on October 5, 2007. During those six years I have enjoyed giving many tours to visitors from across the country, and some even from outside of the country. Our guestbook estimates approximately 20,000 visitors and horseshoe pitchers have passed through its doors during this time. These new additions, changes and improvements have been brought about by many people.

In the beginning several design companies were contacted to submit a bid to design the Hall of Fame. After much thought and consideration, the bid was awarded to Ginkgo Design, the owner being Bob Rogers. After several meetings, Joe Faron discovered that Bob lived in the New Melle area which made it convenient for everyone involved. Bob was to spend many hours of his time before and after the opening of the Hall of Fame Room. Enough could never be said about Bob's vision and initial brilliant design for the Hall of Fame. Since then Bob, who knew very little about the sport of horseshoes, became an advocate of the game and joined the QRHC. Bob has been most helpful throughout the years with his expertise in many different events.



New to the Hall of Fame room is the Arch Stokes Memorial Award. This display shows a picture of Mr. Stokes and an explanation of how the Arch Stokes Award came about. Also there is a list of all recipients of this award since 1958 up until the present day. At the 2013 World Tournament in St.

George, Utah I was honored to be the latest recipient, but I was delighted to meet some of the Arch Stokes family members. Adjacent to the display is a story, A Leader of Our Past, written by Dave Loucks who knew Mr. Stokes when he was pitching as a youth in Murray, Utah.

A scaled model of the entire NHPA facility was built in explicit detail by several QRHC members, Joe Faron,

Bob Cutright and Bob Rogers. The model is approximately 44"x 44" wide, 10" high with a clear acrylic dome covering the display. There are four six-foot wings on the four sides that are removable for transporting. Upon



the display model's completion, it made its debut at the 2011 World Tournament held in Monroe, Louisiana. Its motto is: "If you can't come to see the NHPA Hall of Fame & Museum, we will bring it to you".

A framed glass case, initiated by Bob Dunn, NHPA Historian, displays many historical documents. The history of horseshoes that has been recorded is mainly due to the vast period that the NHPA published monthly



newsletters/booklets starting with The Horseshoe World in 1922, followed by The Horseshoe Pitcher, and The Horseshoe Pitcher's News Digest until the present day, Newsline Magazine which started with its first issue in January, 1989 by Dave Loucks.

When the Hall of Fame opened in the Year 2007, 135 inductee pictures graced its walls. A new panel was installed to allow future inductee pictures. Since 2007 ten new additional inductees have been installed. Built by several more QRHC members is a 42" x 42" wide and eight feet in height stand located in the midst of inductee pictures with a brief paragraph of the accomplishments made by each inductee.


The display case of Vicki Winston was installed with many pictures of her past including three members of her family who were also inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame: her father, Cletus Chapelle, her brother, Barry Chapelle, and her late husband, Earl Winston. Vicki holds the record of being the only woman to have earned



the Women's World Championship Title ten times, the first time in 1956 and her last title in1981. This record still stands today. Her horseshoes and the 1981 trophy are included in this display.

Adjacent to Vicki's display, you will see a video room which includes a Touch Screen Monitor for visitors to view over 120 CD's and is user friendly for all. This room was dedicated to Earl Winston and is now referred to as the Winston Theatre. Earl was a walking encyclopedia on horseshoe history. He collected and preserved much horseshoe memorabilia throughout the years until a permanent home was found in Wentzville.

A unique quilt made from World Tournament T-shirts using their logos from that site was quilted by Ellen Beaver, a Missouri horseshoe pitcher. She donated and presented this quilt to the NHPA at the 2008 World Tournament in York, Pennsylvania.

Gary Proof, a horseshoe pitcher of the Canton Ohio Horseshoe Club, has supplied the HOF room with some beautiful wood crafting items. One is a carving of Alan Francis and Brian Simmons depicting the final game in the Men's A Class at the 2009 World Tournament in Illinois giving Alan his 16th Men's World Tournament Title. The game lasted 140 shoes. Alan had 126 ringers-90% and Brian had 125 ringers for an 89.28% ringer percentage. An outstanding horseshoe game!

A list of Men's World Champions was compiled from 1909 until its present day by Mel Yockstick of Colorado, the NHPA World Records Statistician. The Women's World Champions is located next to it beginning from 1922 through 2013.

The Men's and Women's World Championship Trophy is now being displayed in the Hall of Fame room. The Men's trophy, which was donated by Leo McGrath, depicts the names of the champions from 1980. The Women's Trophy was donated by the great state of North Dakota and presented to the NHPA at the 2002 World Tournament in Red Deer, Alberta, Canada in honor of Vicki Winston.

A Photo Carousel includes 60 pages of historical pictures of the past hangs on the wall for you to view. Bob Dunn suggested that this would be the best way to display these pictures. Bob inserted and assisted to identify those in the photos. Since Bob replaced Glenn Jamison in 2008 he began working on this project. All pictures and items in the collage are documented and recorded by QRHC member Gary Buehler.



You will also notice three life-size statues of three world champions, Alan Francis, Brian Simmons and Joan Elmore standing in the Hall of Fame room. In the same area is a picture from the previous World Tournament designating eight horseshoe pitchers who were declared as champions in the eight categories of Men, Senior Men, Elders, Women, Senior Women, Junior Boys, Junior Girls and

Cadets from the previous World Tournament. These pictures are updated each year.

We would like to acknowledge these men who are responsible for decision making changes and additions to the Hall of Fame room that are required. Bob Dunn of Minnesota travels to Missouri, making two trips yearly, to update and change inventory. Bob Roger's job is always ongoing as he updates winners and other memorabilia. Joe Faron is always kept busy in designing display units. His skillful carpentry, assisted by Bob Cutright and John Setzer is noted not only in the Hall of Fame room, but throughout the entire facility. Gary Buehler received an Achievement Award in 2012 for

his work in categorizing all items in the NHPA. These men generously spend numerous hours to keep the NHPA Hall of Fame Museum a state of the art museum preserving horseshoe history of the past.

As you can see the Hall of Fame & Museum is



surely an ongoing project. There are still plenty of items in the storage office that needs to be itemized, categorized and displayed. There are more surprises to come in the near future. Whatever you do, if you are a horseshoe enthusiast you need to make plans to see all the new updated displays that are in the Museum. Put this on your "bucket list!"
