






Those who ARE competing in the 2014 event will be able to enjoy indoor, air-conditioned pitching comfort during their competition, as well as for practice! There are plans for a secondary building with practice courts – with all the comforts of the main arena!

The final entry count for this year's event is 1,264, so your cooperation and common courtesy will be appreciated to help keep the practice area an enjoyable benefit for ALL.

Things you may expect to see to improve your overall experience while onsite for the tournament include:

- pitching schedule and court layout to help you locate those you wish to watch
- schedule of events and meetings
- message board
- score keeping and judging classes

It's exciting to see new leagues being formed all around the country, especially Junior leagues, and also to have former leagues renew their sanctions after a short absence.

Don't forget the Club/League Player National Championships this fall in Wentzville, MO. With the new team member requirements it hopefully will be easier to put together a 3-man team. Team members no longer have to all be from the same club/league. Instead, a team can be comprised of players who participated in any sanctioned league in either 2013 or 2014. They must however, all be members of the same charter. The tournament will once again be strictly limited to 20 teams. Get your entries in early to guarantee a spot. The two years I've been associated with this tournament have been exciting to say the least with both having very close finishes. And with record prize money, thanks to support from White Distributors and Thoroughbred Horseshoes, the NHPA and with a slight adjustment to the handicap system, this year could be the most exciting and closest yet. Two years ago, nine different states were represented. Hopefully it will be more than that this year. 2,980 NHPA members are eligible to pitch in this tournament. There's only room for 60. Entry forms are available on the NHPA website under Coming Events.

I mentioned the World Tournament above. As you probably already know, I am a candidate for the position of NHPA Secretary/Treasurer. I would like to take this opportunity to extend an invitation to any and all of you should you have any questions, concerns or just want to talk to me about my candidacy. A LETTER FROM IRELAND

Dear Paula,

My name is Michael Bolger and I am chairman of the Kildare & District Horseshoe Pitching League here in Ireland. I am in receipt of your publication, Horseshoe Pitching Newsline; the subscription was paid to you by Inge Byrkjerand from Norway who took part in the 2013 World Tournament and performed very well. Your publication is very very good and certainly promotes the game very well and shows the scale of the organization as a whole in the US.

We play the game here on a Club and individual and doubles basis and to a lesser degree, county games. Our league will commence in early May and conclude in July with various other competitions until about mid September. Several of our players are farmers and as harvest time comes around about August time, we have to have most games concluded by then. The season concludes in October at our annual dinner dance and prize giving. We play different rules, to yourselves. Our playing distance is eleven yards or thirty-

three feet and we play only on grass. And scoring is closest to spike. But we have ringers games during the season.

Also Inge has suggested to me we should have a European Championship. It would be difficult to organize, but could be done and he has also suggested we send Irish players to the World Tournament in Buffalo in 2014. Were this to happen what would the cost of accommodation be, etc.? At the end of the day it all comes to cost. If you have any information maybe you could let me know. It would, I am sure, be memorable if some of us could attend. I would like to purchase some American Horseshoes. Are there any particular ones you would recommend and prices if possible?

I will close for now, once again congratulations on your publication and to your organization a great credit to all concerned.

FOR A HEALTHY PITCH by Debby Michaud, RN, B.S., Ex. Physiology

Gotta say - good hydration is just dear to my heart! In my many years as a nurse and as a horseshoe pitcher, I have seen many examples of how dehydration can affect people negatively. In many of those instances, the person affected had no idea that dehydration was contributing to their problem.

The first problem for many is that they do not FEEL thirsty. The thirst mechanism is not that good. Ironically, as a person learns to drink more, and more often, that thirst mechanism is awakened. But if a person is chronically dehydrated, and as people get older, that thirst mechanism may not be trustworthy.

The symptoms can vary from just feeling a little fatigued or sluggish all the way to acute dizziness/lightheadedness or even passing out, a condition that can land a person in the hospital. High heart rates, feeling very warm and having a hard time cooling off, and feeling sluggish mentally can all be signs that your body does not have enough fluid on board. Think of your body as a car engine - it needs enough oil to lubricate all the parts. If you find out that you are a pint low on oil in your car, you do not hesitate to put some oil in. We humans need a dipstick!

Every cell in your body has fluid in it and every cell in your body receives nutrition and oxygen from your blood which, of course, is also mostly fluid. First, picture sludge trying to pass through a pipe and then picture water passing through that same pipe. Which type of flow would you like in YOUR blood vessels? I'm sure that most of us want our blood to flow freely and smoothly. If cells are slightly "starved" for nutrients and oxygen, of course they will feel stressed and fatigued. If THEY feel fatigued, YOU will feel fatigued. The racing heart

rate, the dizziness or lightheadedness and the inability to cool off are all potentially serious issues, especially if you have other medical issues already.

SO, what to do? Drink several glasses or cups of fluid every day. Drink BEFORE you feel that you need to drink. Drink a cup of water before breakfast and you might feel better just from that (remember you have been fasting for 8 hours during sleep!). Prior to any physical endeavor, like a horseshoe tournament, drink AT LEAST a pint of fluid, then drink at LEAST another two pints of fluid during the matches. More fluid will not be a problem. If it is hot and sunny, you will need more, probably a cup OR TWO of fluid every match. What is the best fluid? Water, water, water!! Alcohol and caffeine can dehydrate you so they are not the best choices. But a big tall Iced Tea or Iced Decaf coffee will do wonders for you as will a tall cool "low sugar" lemonade. Energy drinks are OK during a tournament but it might be better to dilute that energy drink for your body to absorb it easier. Soda is packed with sugar so it is not really a good choice during a tournament carbonated water might work better as some studies indicate carbonation speeds up absorption in the body.

How do you know if you are drinking enough during a tournament and every day? If your urine is very light, almost clear, you are good to go! (Yes, check the color of your urine!!) (smile) If your urine is orange or dark yellow, you are dehydrated. Give this a try and note how you feel. For many of you, any increase in the amount of fluid you take in will be an improvement - I can almost hear all the cells in your body cheering! Good luck this year - stay healthy!

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I always knew that my Dad, Claud Bray, had been bitten by the "horseshoe bug" early in his life. He is now 89 and pitches league 2 days a week. If there is a tournament anywhere close to Wichita, he's there, no matter what else is going on. He pitches in the State tournament every year, is a past State winner in Arkansas, and is in the Arkansas Hall of Fame. He can't wait for next summer when the World Tournament will be in Topeka. That's the closest it will be to Wichita, and he'll be there. When he can't pitch in a World tournament, he is constantly asking me to give him the daily reports from the website. He's always willing to help newcomers to the club and volunteers to help get the pits ready for play. He taught me to pitch and coached me to a Kansas State Tournament win.

But, I really knew he was bitten by the bug, when I received

a call from him last November. He told me he was in an ambulance on the way to the hospital. He had been crossing the street and was hit by a car. The next thing he said could only come from someone who lives and breathes horseshoes. While I'm wondering how hurt he is, he said, "I don't think I'm going to be able to make the horseshoe tournament." He was right. He didn't pitch for several months, waiting for the pelvic fracture to heal. Even though he couldn't pitch, he went to watch on league nights. He's doing fine now and practicing for the State tournament in the horseshoe pits my husband built for him in our backyard. We'll visit the National Horseshoe Hall of Fame in August on our way home from a family reunion. Of course, he has a brick, and we'll finally get a picture of him standing by it.

HORSESHOE PITCHING FACTS

AND FOLKLORE by Bob Dunn NHPA Historian

Carl Steinfeldt

With the 2014 World Horseshoe Pitching Tournament being held in the state of New York, this couldn't be a better time to look back at the career of pitching great Carl Steinfeldt. Twenty-two times he qualified for the Men's Championship Class in World Tournaments (1953-1987), and even more astounding, twenty of those times he had top ten finishes, including placing runner-up five times. And of course, he did win the Men's World Championship in 1976. To go with those great statistics, he also was the Senior Men's World Champion times times, 1988, 1990 and 1991. And if that isn't enough, in 1978, he won the Intermediate Men's World Championship with a ringer average of 85.30%, which will stand forever as the highest average ever pitched in that division.

Maybe even more incredible, is that he has won more state championships than any other pitcher; twenty-two state titles in New York and 14 in Florida. His first championship in New York was in 1939 at age 22. His last championship in Florida was in 1998, at age

Carl Steinfeldt was inducted to the National Horseshoe Pitcher's Hall of fame in 1972 and was inducted to the New York Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame as a charter member in 1974.

The October 1939 Horseshoe World had an article covering Steinfeldt's very first state championship. That article is reprinted here:

Rochester, N.Y., defeating the defending state champ, young Bill Hamann in the finals, although Hamann won more games and had a higher ringer percentage than our new champion. The outstanding games of the tournament were three by Bill Hamann

The New York State Horseshoe Pitching Tournament which was held at Playland Rye Beach September 2, 3, 4, was won by Carl Steinfeldt,

and one by Al Cape. Hamann's ringer percentage in the three games were 84.6, 86.9 and 89.9. Cape's 86.8.

There is also to be remembered, the 15-year-old boy, Tommy Brownell, of Gloversville, N.Y. who made a great showing at the tournament and looks like a coming champion.

A lot of credit must be given to the sponsor, Gus Rasacco; Playland; the Tournament Committee; Frank T. Hanlon, chairman; B.C. Hamann, statistics; Miss Doris Russell; John Thompson; Worth Johnson, asst. statistician; Page Schavel, field supervisor; Andy Seaman, referee; Oliver Louis; Fred Egger, host; and Paul Morris, publicity, who all worked hard to make the tourney a success.

On Sunday evening, September 3, a meeting was held of all the horseshoe pitchers that had come to the tournament from all parts of the state, at the Recreation Hall, at White Plains. It was decided that no convention be held until the 1940 state tournament.

The Class B was won by Al Halzhauer, of Schenectady.

The summaries:

LaRose and Harrision tie for 10th place and played a two game playoff to break the tie of who was seeded in Class A.

That may seem to be a bit much, especially compared to today's methods and process. In 1939, all tournament games were 50-point games and no ties were decided by ringer percentage or who-beatwho. Back in the day, pitching in a tournament could be difficult to endure. This event is a good example as all players pitched 27 50-point games over the three days. There was no comment about qualifying, but no doubt here were more than 20 players entered

in the tournament. Each player pitched 100 shoes and the top 20 made the preliminary round robin and the rest of the players had the choice of staying on to observe or go home. Sounds rather mean, but that was the process in 1939. In today's manner of conducting tournaments, the round robin probably would determine the state champion, not in 1939. Another round of nine 50-point games was played! And then playoff games were played to break any ties!

There are a couple of other names in this competition that need mention. Both of these pitchers are in the New York Hall of Fame. Vito Felicca, one of New York's all-time great pitchers was a two-time New York State Champion, first in 1936, with a record setting 75.2% and in 1949 pitching 73.8%. He was inducted to the New York Hall of Fame as a charter member in 1974.

Also a New York Hall of Fame member is Tommy Brownell, just 15 years old at the time of this 1939 event. Tommy went on to win six state championships (1941, 1949, 1953, 1954, 1955 and 1956). He was inducted to the New York Hall of Fame as a charter member in 1974. Brownell went on to star in the famed World Tournaments of the 1950's in Murray, Utah. His record is shown here:

Due to those performances, Tommy Brownell was inducted to the National Hall of Fame National in 2007.

Folklore Jottings By Bob Dunn

In the previous Newsline, hopefully you noticed the ad for a recent book published, "AAU National Amateur Horseshoe Pitching Championships." The Amateur Athletic Union (AAU), which is the grass roots to our Olympic system, had a 40-year partnership with the NHPA to conduct national amateur championships. The book tells the story of the tournaments and champions during those 40 years (1937-1977).

In May, I attended the Hall of Fame Invitational Tournament in Wentzville, MO and the Team World event in Beloit, WI, promoting the book. As folks came by the table to check it out, I mentioned that no one is aware of the AAU involvement in our sport and that is why I wrote the book. That is until Saturday morning in Beloit. Guy Modde of Elgin, IL stopped by my table. The best way to put this is "I stand corrected." As I said no one is aware of the AAU involvement in horseshoe pitching, he said, "Oh, I'm aware of the AAU." I hesitated, looked at him waiting to hear his next comment, and then he said he knew Frank Breen and pitched horseshoes with Frank Breen. You could have knocked me over with a feather. He went on to explain that he was from Elgin, IL, (the home town of Breen).

There was no doubt he knew what the book was all about. Frank Breen was one of the AAU national stars of the sport in the 1950s, and won more medals than any other individual pitcher.

That was a very enjoyable conversation for me. In the two years of researching for this book, I talked to a handful of pitchers that had participated in AAU events, only one had met Breen, a couple had heard of the three time national champion.

When I mentioned that Jack Stout was also an Illinois pitcher that had a couple national championships, Modde said," Jack Stout gave me my first pair of horseshoes." Wow!

Guy bought a copy of the book, and so should you. It is an interesting story that "few know about." You will be surprised to read some familiar NHPA names and Hall of Fame members that actually got their start in the sport from the AAU events and then later joined the NHPA. A few are: Ralph Dykes, Bob Pence, Arlo Harris and others.


Keeping It Cool

What do the Minnesota Vikings and LeBron James have in common? Not much, except that they are both liked by 15 years old, from Marshfield Wisconsin, Gunnar David. Even though he lives in Wisconsin, Gunnar is a true Minnesota Vikings fan. He has been a Viking fan ever since he was able to understand the game. He is currently a student at Marshfield Senior High where he hangs out with his friends and loves to hunt, fish, go camping, and play horseshoes.

Gunnar was five years old when he was at a State tournament watching his older brother pitch, there he bought his first pair of horseshoes and decided he wanted to pitch as well. Though his brother doesn't pitch in competition anymore Gunnar still pitches alongside his Mom and Dad. When asked if he prefers to pitch against other juniors his age or against adults, he replied "I like to pitch against adults. When I travel to different tournaments I hardly pitch against the same group of adults every time, whereas it's usually the same juniors." He likes the change in competition which keeps him on his toes.

Even through the cold, Gunnar tries to go out and practice once a week in the pits he has in his backyard. He gets his motivation from his hero LeBron James, "His haters motivate him. He will do things automatically and when something needs to be done he will just go out and do it." When pitching Gunnar throws the shoe naturally and concentrates on getting more ringers. Gunnar has won the Wisconsin Jr. Boys State title three times, the Wisconsin Cadet's State title two times and has placed various times at the world tournament. This last year in Utah he took sixth in the Jr. Boys Championship class. His goal is to win State as many times as he can. Gunnar's current average is right around fifty-six percent. He plans to keep increasing his percentage this year at World in Buffalo, New York.

Along with horseshoes, Gunnar also takes trips with his parents to Michigan where they take care of lighthouses and watch the ships on the water. He also goes fishing where his prize thus far has been a 35 inch Northern that he caught at Mondeaux Flowage. When he is older and done with high school and college, Gunnar wants to be a welder just like his Dad as he finds it to be relaxing.

NHPA RULES AND BYLAWS By Dan Sanders

Proposed Changes

In recent issues of Newsline Magazine our Proposed NHPA Bylaws Changes for this year have been presented here for your information, and hopefully you have considered and discussed these proposals with your fellow pitchers and passed your opinions along to your Charter Officers and/or members who will be representing you at the Buffalo WT Convention as your Charter delegates. You may recall that there are a good number of proposed changes to be voted on this year, and in the next issue of Newsline, I will be including a summary of the proposed changes along with the voting results.

Next year, 2015, is the year for proposed changes to the RGS Book which includes our Playing Rules and Requirements, Guidelines, and Specifications for equipment and court construction. I have already received a few proposed changes and if you have any proposals, they can be sent to me any time before the December 31, 2014 deadline.

Some Recent Concerns

Since the last issue of Newsline I have received a phone call and an e-mail of concern about a couple of situations that have been observed on the courts during tournament play. Neither of these concerns is currently addressed in our Playing Rules, nor have they formally been received by me as a proposed Rules change, but they could be. The first concern was about the wearing of earphones during a game... the kind that nearly completely cover the ears. Should this be allowed? Certainly they would interfere with being able to hear and communicate with your opponent when discussing the call for each inning. And what about communicating the score to the score keeper?

The smaller and more popular 'ear buds' could pose the same problems, especially if they have the built-in technology for filtering out external noises. What do you think?

The other question/concern was about the use of electronic cigarettes on the courts. As you may know, we do have a rule about not using tobacco while in the confines of the court, but these new cigarettes do not contain tobacco and so 'smoking' them may technically not be a violation of our 'no tobacco' rule. This member reported as follows: "Personally, I have had a close encounter with one of these devices in our Winter league, and while I will admit there is no detectable odor, it still bothered me to have this visible vapor floating around my face." How about this one? Will this new technology result in a proposal to disallow the use of electronic cigarettes while on the courts? Only time will tell.

Training Sessions for Judges and Scorekeepers at Buffalo – an update

You may recall that in the last Newsline issue I had announced that training sessions for judges will be offered at the WT in Buffalo for those who are interested. This is to help insure that we are providing more qualified judges for this competition. In a recent meeting, it was decided that we should also offer a training session on Sunday before the tournament starts, and on Wednesday before the second session begins. Other sessions will be offered on Monday and on Thursday of the first week. If you will be in attendance and are interested in one of these sessions, please listen for announcements and/or look for signup sheets which will include details of times and locations for these clinics.

Walters-OH, and Mike Creek-PA. In the 30' division, two pitchers had only one loss, Joan Elmore-TN and Roger Vogel-KS.



Rife was #1 seed going into the tournament with an 82.5% average and finished in 3rd place with a 75.71%. Kenneth Tate-IL entered the 30' division for the first time as #13 seed but managed to score the highest game of the 30' division, 91.7%.

What an exciting and fun-filled tournament it was! NHPF & THE NHPA HALL OF FAME by Casey Sluys

Building for the Future While Preserving the Past and Showcasing the Present

On May 3, 2014 the NHPF board of directors met at the Hall of Fame tournament in Wentzville, MO. We hope to make this an annual occurrence as the amount of goodwill created by board members walking around chatting with folks is immeasurable. This meeting proved to be a productive one as our newest board member Phyllis Quist was able to see some of the intricacies of the building and its environs.

We finalized the new brochure, which will include the brick order form for ordering a brick that would be placed in the Jack Freeman Memorial Plaza. We also intend on sending a supply to each Charter President for distribution to their Charter clubs. We also intend on using these brochures at rest stops along major highways into and around the St Louis area along with various tour groups and perhaps motels and businesses.

There was some discussion on creating an additional revenue stream by allowing other non-horseshoe related parties to rent the building provided that adequate supervision is maintained. NHPA members could rent the facility for birthday parties and such. Contract details are being worked out as we speak.

We were able to watch some of the engraving of the bricks. It's quite a process they use, first a stencil is created in their workshop, then it is determined where the brick is placed then the stencil is glued onto the brick, the surrounding bricks taped off with duct tape to avoid sandblasting the neighboring bricks. When sandblasting onto the stencil from about 6-8 inches away the effect blasts the letters into the bricks, they are then painted with a special paint that is rolled onto the stencil and forced into the letters; this special paint has a 30 year warranty. The stencil remnants are carefully removed and the remaining pieces are picked off, all other tape picked up, a little solvent to wash the glue residue off the brick and your brick is complete. Then the new batches of bricks are charted on the brick display panel located at the entrance to the

HoF building. Adjacent to this display is a list of all the engraved bricks purchased by each Charter.

Over the course of the last couple of years we incurred some expenses that were rather large. Fixing the various leaks in the roof proved to be a major undertaking with each fastener being inspected for tightness and all old silicon removed from each one. Then a new sealer applied to each fastener and all seams. The roof was completely coated with a coating call Puma xl. It carries an 18 year guarantee against leaks. We had some repairs and maintenance to the Geothermal Heating System. Two of the three systems pumps went out and needed to be replaced. There are six heating & exchange units in the building. In one of the six units we had to replace a compressor and evaporator coil. As you can see maintenance of a building such as this becomes a continued expense. Note: the building will be eight years old this fall, so we can expect some ongoing expenses.

That is where your donation will come in handy though and we sincerely appreciate your help.

The St. Charles County Parks Dept. is building a new road off of highway Z. It will make egress to the park much easier for everyone. Highway Z crosses Interstate 70 at a 90 degree angle and off of Highway Z it will be one turn into the park. Then about a one mile drive through the park to your Hall of Fame.



Quiet Please - Game is On

In most spectator sports, like tennis, golf and bowling, the spectators are quiet while the player is concentrating on his/her shot. In horseshoes, little respect is shown by the spectators (and most of them are pitchers!).

Pitchers are often talking with their friends about topics other than horseshoes. Little consideration is given to players on the courts. When the score is close and a pitcher is trying to block out all outside noise, it's harder to do if your opponent is talking to you or the scorekeeper, or if he has not taken the proper position behind you on the other side of the pit.

Horseshoes is a game of precision and perfection, and the mind must be able to concentrate. Something in the background can alter the shot. It may be unintentional, but it happens all the time. Let us all try to be more courteous to pitchers in tournament and even league play.

Whose Job Is It?

Horseshoe pitchers everywhere, who are serious about the future of the game and what they can to promote it, have had a number of

very good ideas throughout the years. I think one of the things that has hindered the popularity of the game is that it is not very spectator friendly. Think about it, the pitching courts are usually in rows, close together, which eliminates any seating or observation from the sides of the court, and out of respect to the pitchers, there are never any onlookers or distractions allowed at the ends of the court. The game simply can't be viewed very well from a distance, so the only people seeing very much are the competitors.

It seems to me, for the game to really "catch on" with the general public, it needs to be witnessed in person, or on television. That, I think, is the way that we will be able to perk the interest of the viewing public and give them the true appreciation of the talent and skill required of the participants. They will also witness how challenging it is to score points in a game of competitive horseshoes between two outstanding players.

All this being said, picture in your mind's eye the following: there are so many cable sports networks on the air today, all going 24 hours a day, seven days a week, which makes for a lot of air time to fill, much of which they currently fill with reruns. Suppose one of them offered the NHPA to put up the money to sponsor either an exhibition, or the men's or women's World Tournament Championship class competitions. Imagine the top pitchers in our sport going head to head with a gallery of spectators lining both sides of the court, watching along with a national television audition. Imagine the cameras catching every angle of the competition, even the flight of the shoes in slow motion, all the way to the stake. Imagine the body

language, and the pressure packed facial expressions, all caught on camera. The telecast could be interspersed with world class pitchers giving tips and demonstrations on how to pitch, as well as teaching the viewers the rules and etiquette of the game. The prize money could be very substantial and dispersed among all the competitors.

Like all sports, horseshoe pitching has its stars and superstars, and with the added pressure of the crowd and the spotlight, who knows, they may eve miss a few more ringers, which would only add to the drama.

The exposure that something like this would bring to our game could be tremendous, and I'm sure the ripple effect would be felt all the way down to our local clubs. Television certainly had impacted other so called "minor" sporting and non-sporting events such as bowling, gymnastics, curling, hunting, even chess matches. Of course, the key to the whole idea is how television executives would envision horseshoe pitching and how well it would translate to our television screens. Would it be compelling enough to draw and entertain the viewing audience? If the answer to those questions is yes, horseshoe pitching could be in for a whole new rebirth of popularity such has not been seen in the game for decades.

Diana here ... we've got a huge number of people involved in our sport from all walks of life and professions. Maybe, just maybe, someone is in the broadcasting field and can take Jerry's idea and run with it. What a difference that could make!!!

FOUR DEAD

I just got back from a month long trip. This was the first message left on my phone. "Pappy died this morning. I know you were a good friend of his. And might not have known." My heart was heavy at those words, though I knew his end was coming on. Pappy's kind old heart was just too big, and his earthly giving was now all done.

"Four dead," was often heard in a tough tournament, just after those horseshoes hit. That meant no score, but you could expect no more, as all shoes were ringers on that last pitch

His shoes flew low and with high speed as they circled round that peg And few players could match him even when he was getting up in age

Pappy was the best horseshoe pitcher in the State, and the champion on those courts. He was just as good at darts, pool, ping pong, and just about any sports. He encouraged young and old, and taught as much skill as we could absorb. It changed the lives and attitudes of a lot of us, and we could ask for nothing more

"Four dead," was often heard in a tough tournament, just after those horseshoes hit. Pappy'd grin and called it "breakin even;" "still countin," as two of the ringers were his. His shoes flew low and with high speed as they circled round that peg. He coined the silent ones that didn't clang, what we call "sunday shoes" to this day.

Pappy was not my dad, that was just what he was called By hundreds of close friends that loved this big guy that gave so much to all. He was strong and tough yet kind and good, and ready to help, in any way he could. His example taught us sportsmanship with honor, that sort of made us all feel good.

Four dead, was heard today up at St Peters pearly gates on that I'd make a bet. As Pappy joined his wife Blanch, their young son John, and Blanch's brother Les. They were all good pitchers in their own right, and all were good as gold. Now Pappy's warmly joining them,, a sharp witted 88 year old.

Pappy was a hero in the Big War, shot down several times in France. He'd pick the daylights of of his old Martin guitar, didn't sing, but he could really dance. He was the best mechanic you could find, and he would help his friends for free. He never looked for trouble but could clean a bar of any bullies, that's only if need be

Four dead, was heard today up at St Peters pearly gates, on that I'd make a bet. As Pappy joined his "Cajun Queen," their young son John, and Blanch's brother Les. They too were all good pitchers in their own right, and all were good as gold. Now Pappy's more than "breakin even", as his life's score is totalled.

TOLL OF TIME

George Greeott 1910 – 2014

George Greeott left us only days before his 104th birthday. Far too soon for a man who epitomized the joyous enthusiasm of eternal youth.

George was a renaissance man whose intelligence, and passion, for learning, inspired work ethic, creative talents, and kindhearted spirit endeared him to all who were honored to know him.

George was born a mere five miles from my house on Alpine Road in Santa Rosa on April 30, 1910. His family ran a winery for many years until prohibition dried up the vino. George's father bought a ranch in 1928 in Healdsburg, a town just eight miles north of where he was born. George's siblings left the ranch, but George stayed and leased the ranch from his father in 1935. In 1950 George purchased the ranch from his father and began improving the irrigation, the slopes, and almost anything that would make the ranch less work. He became a forerunner of what are now called conservationists.

George and his wife had four children although none stayed on the ranch. George was fond of saying he belonged to the PGA, Prunes, Grapes and Apples, because that is what the ranch produced.

George become an excellent woodworker and made an assortment of things, most were decorative items. They are mostly stored in the Windsor Historical Museum for all to enjoy. His collection of antique bottles was something to behold also. George was so innovative that he kept everything and eventually found a use for it. He was also a welder of some renown. When he welded a broken shoe it would not break at his weld. He welded a few pair of my Ohio "Os", they lasted through many tournaments. Those shoes, when ground and painted, could not be recognized as welded shoes. He kept a selection of tools that he used on the ranch, and carved wooded replicas of each. The whole box in the picture took him 500 hours of work.

During the early 50's George rediscovered horseshoe pitching, a game he had enjoyed in childhood and would take to new heights as an adult, winning tournaments, breaking records, and becoming a highly respected champion. Always pursuing excellence, he invented a widely acclaimed horseshoe, the Greeott Grabber.

(Three pair were pitched at last years World Tournament, all were courtesy of George given to me from one of my visits to him; they were pitched by South Africans and Namibians.) In 1982, at the age of 72 he was inducted into the Northern California Hall of Fame. While some may have rested on their laurels, George did not; he continued to pitch horseshoes well into his 90's. He attended the 2002 World Tournament in Red Deer, Alberta, Canada becoming the oldest person in attendance. He became an instant celebrity when the news media held interviews with him.

George pitched primarily at the horseshoes club in Santa Rosa, but used to travel to each club in his prime. He did not move to short distance until he was 80, and then bragged that now he was going to pitch his age! I do not believe he ever attained that 80%, but it certainly was not for lack of trying. His biggest disappointment in his horseshoe career was not being crowed Sonoma County Champion. There were many good pitchers in this club in the years that George was pitching his best.

In horseshoes, George won and lost many games and was as gracious with a loss as he was a win. If you beat him he simply said, "you played better than I did." If you lost to him he'd say, "you pitched a good game, I got lucky." He had a positive word for anyone he met.

We held our George Greeott 104th Birthday Tournament in early April, but he always asked that we hold it closer to his actual birthday of the 30th. He attended his 103 birthday tournament and walked from the car to the gathering of people holding a cane in both his hands, saying, "The Dr. suggested I use a cane, so here it is." He would not use it as one would imagine, he simply carried it along. George stayed for about two hours watching and talking, had a piece of cake and went back to his ranch.

George is honored with a display called "horseshoes and art" in our National Hall of Fame in Wentzville, MO. He is also one of the \$500.00 donors and has his name on a plaque recognizing individuals who have achieved that status. He was a 50-year lifetime member of the NHPA

He lived a long fruitful life, but we in the Sonoma County Club will miss his kind and gentle manner.
