#### **NEW PRESIDENT'S COMMENTS**

The tournament went off very well, especially so, considering that we were using a new system. Thanks for that can be given to the Standards, who spent many long hours in preparation. Many new pitchers of outstanding ability were there. Exhibitions by Ted Allen and Guy Zimmerman were a novelty event and enthused the audience. More trophies than usual were presented. The usual banquet sponsored by the Murray Jay Cees, the Commercial Club and other Civic Organizations was well received. All in all, I believe it was a wonderful tournament.

The delegates at the Convention voted to use the same type of play next year. Double qualifying will be given a trial. Although \$3.50 will remain the National dues, the members will receive one years subscription to the magazine starting at the time they join the N. H. P. A. Therefore, no member will get less than 12 issues for his membership.

At a meeting of the new officers, they decided to send the next three issues of the magazine by first class mail. If it works as well as expected it may be continued permanently.

Commissioner Lamont Gunderson of the Salt Lake County Commission orally gave us a bid for the 1958 tournament. Plans have been discussed for holding a Class C tournament at Liberty Park in Salt Lake City at the same time Class B is playing on the Murray Courts.

As a token of our appreciation for their unselfish labors in our behalf without thought of financial reward, lifetime memberships in the N. H. P. A. were voted to Arch Stokes, Commissioner Gunderson, Katie Gregson, Archie Gregson, Ellis Cobb and John Gordon.

I have appointed several committee chairmen and more will be selected from time to time as needed. Archie Gregson is Tournament Manager for the 1958 event. Elois Standard is in charge of the Publicity and Trophy committee. Don Titcomb will head a group to study and present to us a handicap system of play that we can recognize and offer to interested clubs. Paul Rose, the busy man on the Salt Lake County Recreation Board, is in charge of Promotion and Public Relations. Our good friend Curt Day will look after the Membership angle and a newcomer to us in the western part of the country, Paul Focht of Ohio, will take care of the Resolutions. These chairmen would appreciate the help of pitchers from all parts of the nation.

The success of the recently completed tournament depended on the cooperation of many people. Due to ill health, Arch Stokes was hampered in his efforts but received very capable assistance from Mrs. Elois Standard. I hereby wish to thank her, the score-keepers, the judges, the workers in the cabin where the records were kept, the ground-keepers, the donors of special prizes, the members of the various civic groups and all others who helped to make the tournament enjoyable and one long to be remembered.

I am grateful for the staff of fellow officers voted by the delegates. Together we can make the coming horseshoe year even better than the last, providing that you members give us your help and encouragement.

Let us all give Arch Stokes a vote of thanks for his untiring and unceasing efforts in making Murray, Utah the horseshoe capital of the world. He justly deserves the well wishes of the pitchers everywhere.

### ALLEN DEFEATS TITCOMB TO RETAIN TITLE

### ISAIS AND C. WAHLIN, TOP QUALIFIERS IN WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP, AT MURRAY, UTAH

Fernando Isais of Los Angeles and Clive Wahlin of Salt Lake City who were tied with 546 points each in the qualifying round set the pace for the 36 contenders for the World's Championship Tournament as it got under way

Thursday, July 18 at Murray, Utah.

The following Monday night, found Ted Allen of Boulder, Colorado, defending champion, the only unbeaten pitcher. Isais started that same evening with a 17-0 record only to have it marred by Glen Anderson of Moline, Illinois, 52-45 and by Joe Zichella of New York City, 51-48. As the grueling contest wore on into the final 14 man round robin match play, Don Titcomb of Sunnyvale, California, and runnerup in the 1956 tournament, moved into the final four games of the tournament with nine wins and no defeats. At this point, Ted Allen had suffered one defeat at the hands of Titcomb. The next night found Allen and Titcomb tied with each having 12 wins and one defeat.

It is almost unbelievable that these two should meet again in the same

manner as they did in 1956 in repeat performance.

#### NEW ENGLAND HORSESHOE CHAMPIONSHIP DOVER. N. H. — AUGUST 31 - SEPTEMBER 1-2

ENTRY FEE — \$5.00.
ELIGIBILITY — All persons must live in New England and must have an N.H.P.A. card as the tournament will be sanctioned, cards will be sold at the courts, located at Henry Law Park off Tower Square, Dover, N. H.

QUALIFICATION — Entrant must pitch 100 shoes, using 50 shoes with highest total of points in try for finals. The 14 players scoring highest number of points in either 50 of the 100 shoes pitched shall enter the finals. In case of ties highest ringer percentage in 50 qualifying shoes will determine finalist.

FINALS — Only 14 players can enter the finals. Nos. 1 to 14 in Class "A" and 15 to 24 in Class "B", and Nos. 25 to 34 in Class "C". Each player in each class will pitch all others in that class one game of 50 points by cancellation system, games won to decide prize winners. In the event of ties the winners will be determined by the highest ringer percentage, except first place which will be a play-off.

QUALIFYING TIME — Qualification pitching from 9:00 A. M. Saturday, August 31 until 12 noon Sunday, September 1. Finals to get under way not later than 1:00 P. M. Sunday for Class "B" and "C". The 14 man Class "A" championship will start at 6:00 P. M. on Sunday, September 1 and 2. Seven games on the 1st and six games on the 2nd. There will be floodlights on the courts for night pitching.

PRIZES — Class "A"—All 14 players will receive a beautiful mahogany chrome plated horseshoe plaque. In addition the winner and runner-up will receive cash prizes. Total prize money, \$400.

Class "B"-First-Beautiful 17 inch trophy, also trophies for 2nd and 3rd prizes.

Class C-First-Beautiful 17 inch trophy, also trophies for 2nd and

3rd prizes.

OTHER INFORMATION — A public address system will give a running account of the meet. It is requested all players be in white, with your name and address on your shirt.

If rained out, tournament will be held following week-end, September 6, 7 and 8.

The tourney was conducted by the Ohio Buckeye State Association and was sanctioned by the National Association.

The courts at Lakeside, near Port Clinton were much to Dale Carson's liking as he proceeded to defend, and before the meet was over, had successfully retained his title for another year. He hails from Baltimore, Maryland. He did not have it too easy inasmuch as he was tied with Paul Focht of Dayton, Ohio and Harold Reno of Sabina, Ohio at the end of the round robin play. Each of the three pitched 100 shoes to see which two played for the championship. The final two were Carson and Focht. In the two out of three match, Carson averaged 80 percent ringers to win while Focht put 78 percent of his shoes on the peg in a valiant effort to subdue the titleholder.


#### NEBRASKA STATE TOURNAMENT TO BE HELD IN SEPTEMBER

Horseshoe pitching enthusiasts will vie for honors when the Nebraska State Tournament gets under way on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, September 20-21-22, at Custis, Nebraska. The Curtis Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring this annual meet. \$100 in cash prizes is offered in addition to trophies which go to the winner of each class.

#### INDIANA ASSOCIATION NEWS MID-WEST "RINGER ROUND UP"

Ed Sharp of Indiana emerged as a Champion of Champions in the Mid-West "Ringer Round Up" held at Dorner Park in Frankfort, Indiana, July 6 and 7 over a stellar field of 82 players hailing from eight different states.

The victory was a popular one as it marked the first time the lanky Hoosier ringer artist had stood in the winner's circle after a major tourney, for Ed had five times been runner-up in the Indiana State meet as well as second place winner in many other affairs during the past six or seven years. Even so he was forced into a playoff by "Red" Brumfield who had defeated him in a similar spot in last year's State tournament.

High winds of gale proportion marred the qualifying hours and created a jam at deadline time, but perfect conditions prevailed during the round robin play, resulting in a sensational brand of horseshoes in all six classes.

Four players entered the last game of Class A tied for first place. Curt Day of Indiana, the defending champion who placed fifth, eliminated Glenn Anderson of Illinois in this round with an 84.1 percent game, while the new champion took care of Bill Neilson of Indiana with an 85.7 percent effort. Sharp and Neilson had a run of ten consecutive "four deads" in this game and Neilson had 34 straight ringers.

Jim Johnson of Kentucky defeated youthful Virgil Taylor in a playoff for Class B after the two had ended in a deadlock, Taylor's uncle, Earl Green of Indianapolis took third in this class and 77 year old W. O. Maxwell

of Ohio was fourth.

An unprecedented five way tie for first place resulted in Class C. Lateness of the hour forced awards to be made on a ringer percentage basis with Floyd Fowler of Indiana having the edge over Les Long of Illinois, and Walt Horner, Marvin Craig and Paul Van Sickle of Indianapolis.

LeRoy Clewell in Class D, Milt Tate in Class E and Nelson Vogel in

Class F, all of Illinois, were the other champions, Tate averaging 80.0 per-

cent ringers.

Glen Anderson of Moline. Ill. led the qualifiers with 391 points and 122

ringers in his 150 shoes.

Tournament prizes amounted to six trophies and \$536.00 in cash. Oris Harshman, Nelson Pickering and Tom Moon of the host club, who did such a good job on this year's meet, will be in charge of next year's affair.
