I also feel honored to be succeeding your past chairman, Lou Siebenaler, who passed away shortly after the 1958 World Tourney while processing its film. Mr. Siebenaler, did one of the finest jobs in recent years of taking and processing the complete picture story in color, of our Worlds' Tournament so that others might be able to see it on film.


DIXON WINS IOWA-HAWKEYE TROPHY-PICNIC TOURNEY
