


The tournament was held in conjunction with the annual "Family Picnic Day" for the Connecticut Horseshoe Pitchers Association. Games were regulation, using the cancellation system and 50 shoes per game. Paradis and Dunleavy each had 20 ringers for high ringer game and Vecchitto had the high point game of 63. Richard Dudek of Hartford and last year's champion failed to make the finals. Mickey Vecchitto who was in charge of the event presented trophies to the top three winners.
