WORLD TOURNAMENT DATE - JULY 18-26

July 18 to July 26 inclusive has been set as the official 1961 World

Tournament dates by Reinhard Backer, NHPA President.

This is earlier than last year's tourney and reverts back to the dates used at Murray, Utah for so many years. The NHPA would have preferred to stage the event slightly later in the month but a conflict with the Delaware County Fair in Muncie. Ind., made the above choice of dates necessary.

The tourney will, of course, again be held on the wonderful courts at Heekin Park in Muncie and the City Park Dept. has made plans for improvements the lightly courted to the cou

ing the lighting system, moving the scoreboard in order to make room for more bleachers and renovating the court facilities in general.

"We were caught short last year," Bob Abbuehl, City Recreation Director stated. 'The tourney was a far greater attraction than our department had estimated, but arrangements are being made for ample bleacher accommodations for the 1961 meet and Muncie looks forward to being the hosts once more."

Succeeding issues of the "News Digest" will carry specific plans and regulations for the tournament. The dates include qualifying time. Under consideration is a new qualifying method advanced by the Director of Regional Directors, Lee Davis of New Jersey, and the addition of a Class "C." Otherwise the tourney will follow the 1960 format.

HARD — COLD FACTS

Elsewhere in this issue are details concerning the NHPA auto add plates, windshield decals, T-shirts and horseshoe court registration plans.

Some may offer the criticism that these are money-making schemes, but these facts should be realized.

- These plans are entirely voluntary, and no person profits from them.
- No organization can function effectively without some means of revenue over and above the bare necessities.
- Horseshoe and the NHPA have always suffered from a lack of adequate financing.
- 4. The game has never been able to obtain recognition or support from commercial, business or industrial sources.
- The \$3.50 national membership dues is barely enough to publish the "News Digest" and pay our minimum expenses.
- Therefore it is necessary for the NHPA to find some means of making itself self sufficient to a degree that permits it to establish the World Tournament on a firm basis and promote the game through every means possible. If this can be done both the NHPA and local clubs will find it much easier to promote and obtain backing for their activities.

Several thoughts come to my mind which I would like to pass along here. Before I do, first, Mr. Ellis Cobb, editor of this fine magazine, must be congratulated, both for his neat looking "News Digest," and also for the excellent pitcher that he is. How many readers have noticed his ringer averages in the past issues? I like the idea seeing the results of the 1960 World's Tournament used for the first time in the magazine. It should be printed each year so that all N.H.P.A. members can see for themselves those remarkable ringer percentages. Another fine feature are the pictures that are appearing each month on the front cover.

Come this April, I'm happy to say that the Middletown Savings Bank has offered their large window to display to the public about horseshoe pitching. The bank is noted for their display of various items, such as, art collection, hobbies, health information and many other worthwhile subjects of interest. I am gathering interesting articles that will help the average person to understand the game better. I have drawn charts on the construction and regulation of horseshoe courts, demonstrating the 1¼ and the 1¾ turns while the shoe is in flight. Also how to score, the regulation horseshoes, The Horseshoe Pitcher's News Digest magazine will be shown. Several photographs, including the new courts at the Veteran's Memorial Park. Some trophies won by Charles Sokolowski, Ken Chase and yours truly will be added. This certainly is going to help and boost the sport, the display is shown for one month to the public. Wouldn't it be great if other cities could do the same? I sure would like to see it happen.

In the January issue, I read about the NHPA emblems, decals and T-shirts that are available. This is wonderful and I urge all members to place their orders now for the coming season. This surely will advertise and promote horseshoes and help to get more new members into our organization.

My congratulations and best wishes to Don Titcomb, World's Horseshoe Champion, and Steve Fennicchia, New York standout horseshoe champion, for achieving a bowler's dream — hitting a PERFECT game, a great honor, indeed. Speaking of bowling, I have taken a survey of top horseshoe pitchers in the New England area that also bowl (duckpin bowling) during the winter season and the question put before them was, "Which sport is the more skillful, horseshoes or bowling?" They all agreed that tossing the shoes requires more skill. I hope I'm not misleading any bowler or fan, but my curiosity got the best of me. Yet, there is no comparison at all of the closely related sports. Millions of people go bowling throughout the country and many of the top bowlers earned a good living at it. Not so in horseshoes. What is wrong? Perhaps the game needs to be revised; made more eye-appealing to the general public. I was studying the B. R. Seifert Count-All "300" Horseshoes in the January issue, which is similar to the bowling scoring system. I really think this different type of playing deserves some serious thought. This new method of scoring could speed up many large tournaments. This experiment should be tested to see how the players feel about it. In the 25 years that I have been associated with horseshoes, in my opinion, the sport hasn't made too much forward progress.

In closing, I would like to mention here that I have sent to the United Nations Building a drawing showing the map of the world and the handshake for peace and the letters, "u" "n" in the form of two horseshoes. The drawing was received and acknowledged.

"I Don't Believe It"

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TAR HEELS ARE FASCINATED AS RENO WINS THIRD ANNUAL WINSTON-SALEM OPEN

More than 1,000 spectators turned out to see the most spectacular horseshoe performance ever seen in North Carolina. The performance of Harold Reno of Sabina, Ohio, will be the main subject of discussion when the Tar Heel enthusiasts get together for many years to come. In the qualifying round Reno hit the peg for 92 ringers out of 100 shoes for 281 points. His 82.7 ringer average carried him through a field of 8 finalists with ease. He suffered his only loss over the two-day span to his fellow Ohioan, Harold Wolfe, in the first round.

Jesse Durham of Baltimore, Maryland, finished second with an excellent record of 72.7 per cent. Darrell Eller of High Point, North Carolina, finished in fifth place behind teammate, Melvin Howard. We believe that both Howard

and Durham are two of the most promising young pitchers in the country.
Rodney Luck took Class B honors by defeating Roy Hooker 52-46 in a play-off game, while Waylen Stinson, Jr., was defeating Conrad Murphy 50-21 in a play-off for the Class C title.

There was a field of 42 players from four states, Maryland, Ohio, Virginia and North Carolina. The success of this tournament indicated to us that in the years to come the Winston-Salem Open will be the top attraction in the southeast and may even become one of the top tournaments nationally. We sincerely hope that more of the top players will find their way to Winston-Salem in 1961.

We extend a vote of thanks to the wives of the North Carolina players who prepared and served a most delicious fried chicken dinner to all the

players and their families.

SAM FOOR WINS SENIOR HOLIDAY TOURNAMENT

The younger pitchers and other horseshoe fans were treated to some interesting horseshoe games between Christmas and New Year's in a tournament held at Rendezvous Park in Mesa, Arizona.

To qualify for this meet, the pitcher had to have been born in the 1800's.

The seven qualifiers totaled 504 years. The average age was 72 years.

At the end of regular round-robin play there was a tie for first place between 77-year-old Charlie "Kid" Carson of Mesa and 74-year-old Sam Foor of Indiana. Young Mr. Foor came off on top in the play-off 50-46. Foor averaged 47.5 for the tournament while Mr. Carson compiled at 45.4 average for the course. Fred Brown of Mesa finished in third position losing only two games.

PLANS LAID FOR ANNUAL "ST. JOE OPEN"

The annual "St. Joe Open" tournament will be held Saturday and Sunday, June 24-25 at Noyes Field, 28th and Edmond Streets in St. Joseph, Missouri. Qualifying rounds will start at 1 p.m. on June 24th and continue until 11 a.m. June 25th. Round robin play will start at 12:30 p.m. June 25th. Entry fee will be \$3.00 per man.
