They are particularly suitable for members in those states where only one license plate is required as the N.H.P.A. emblem can be used in the place of the second license plate, usually on the front of the car.

It might also be pointed out that they would be ideal for use at horseshoe courts where they could be displayed in a suitable location. # **1960 IN REVIEW**

The NPHA made a modest membership gain of slightly less than 200 dur-ing the year and staged the most successful World and National Tournament in history.

More tournaments, both sanctioned and unsanctioned, were held during 1960 than ever before and there was a huge increase in the number of in-

quiries concerning the game from various sources. Recreation leaders in parks, industrial firms, unions, fraternal groups and schools along with the organizers of local type horseshoe clubs flooded me with requests for information which resulted in the assembling of a Horseshoe Pitching Manual for distribution. More than 1000 such requests were received and answered.

The World Tournament at Heekin Park in Muncie last August drew a record breaking number of entries, attracted more spectators than ever before and the caliber of pitching was the best in history. The Muncie courts left nothing to be desired and the Muncie club, largest local group in the country, should be congratulated for its work.

For the record here are the champions crowned at the World tournament: Men's division — Don Titcomb, Los Gatos, Calif. Class "B" — Wilber Kabel, New Madison, Ohio Ladies division — Esta McKee, Royal Center, Indiana Old Timers division — W. O. Maxwell, Hicksville, Ohio

Junior division — Hal Brown, Mulberry, Indiana

Once again Indiana, Ohio Buckeye and Southern California chapters led the membership parade and all three showed healthy increases over their 1959 totals. Indiana soared over the 200 mark under the direction of Earle Wilmore aided by the big Muncie and Kokomo clubs headed by Harold Craig and Earl Van Natter. Jim Weeks and Elmer Beller made Southern California click, while Ohio, with Sam Goodlander sidelined for awhile by a heart attack, was

a team effort headed by Leo McGrath and Mrs. Paul Focht. Laurels for showing the biggest percentage of increase go to the Florida, Kansas, Michigan and New Hampshire chapters, all of whom more than doubled their 1959 figures.

The winter tournaments staged by Ray Woodrow at St. Petersburg and Charlie Stephens at Bradenton and new clubs at Ft. Lauderdale, headed by Ed Edwards, and Orlando by Frank Wise was responsible for Florida's showing

Howard White in New Hampshire did his usual fine job of promoting the game and received real aid from Lionel Cayer and the big Manchester club and the group at Keene where the Flagg brothers and others have made his-tory by the construction of 24 courts all in one line.

Roland Kraft, Perl Pepple, and Irwin Carlberg did excellent work in Kansas and Michigan.

Smaller increases in membership were in Minnesota, Montana, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming. Particular mention should be made of the work in North Carolina by Ran-

rarticular mention should be made of the work in North Carolina by Ran-dall Jones and in the Montana-Dakota chapter by Roger Barnaby and Wes Riml. These two groups were new chapters in 1959 and continued their fine work in 1960 despite the handicap of geographic isolation from other centers of membership. Players from Virginia, Florida, Ohio and Maryland appeared in North Carolina during the year and the Winston-Salem Open shows promise of developing into an outstanding event.

A new state chapter was formed in Virginia during the year with activity centered at Lynchburg under the direction of Marvin May and a good start was made.

Vermont was led back into the NHPA fold by Fred Butler of Bennington during 1960 and staged the New England States Tournament.

Canada increased its NHPA membership considerably in 1960 and sent a large delegation to the World Tournament at Muncie where Elmer Hohl made history by annexing second place. The Canadian group staged the big North American Open indoors in Toronto's Horse Palace during the National Ex-position in September with many American players taking part.

Small losses in membership were experienced in Northern California, Ill-inois, Maine, Nebraska, New Jersey, North Dakota, Tennessee and Washington. Tennessee has already more than made up the lost ground with a newly organized chapter guided by Chambliss Pierce and B. D. Raskopf in Knox-ville. Indications are it will become one of the most active and outstanding groups in the NHPA.

The most serious membership losses were suffered in Idaho, Texas, North Dakota and Pennsylvania.

The remaining states held their membership at the 1959 totals, but it should be mentioned that Massachusetts, Connecticut, Iowa, Missouri and Utah were among the most active chapters in the NHPA and the work of Ralph Forsstrom and Amos Whitaker (Mass.), Ervin Van Dine and Mickey Vecchitto (Conn.), Mrs. Hopkins (Iowa), Al Smith (Missouri), and Stan Hil-ton (Utah) was outstanding ton (Utah), was outstanding.

#### **B. R. SEIFERT INTRODUCES COUNT-ALL "300" HORSESHOES**

#### **Game Rules**

- 1. This is a game in which any score can be achieved up to 300 (perfect game).
  2. The game consists of 10 innings.
  3. An inning consists of two (2) shoes pitched.
  4. One or two "BONUS" innings are required to complete the game if

- ringers are thrown in the ninth or tenth innings. (See rules 5, 6, and 7). 5. One ringer in the tenth inning entitles player to one "BONUS" inning. (10-A)
- 6. Double ringer in the ninth inning, with no ringers in the tenth inning entitles the player to one "BONUS" inning. (10-A)
- 7. Double ringer in the tenth inning entitles player to two "BONUS" innings. (10-A and 10-B)
- 8. The game can be played by pitching to one or two stakes.

#### The One Stake Arrangement

- 9. Any number of players (usually not to exceed five) can participate in one game using Rules 10, 11, and 12.
- 10. The shoes are returned by conveyor or some other device or method designed for convenience of the players.
- 11. The shoes are removed from the court after each person has pitched two shoes. (See note No. 1).

Note No. 1: The removal of the shoes after each person has thrown two shoes, affords no disadvantage to the person pitching next.

12. The sequence of pitching is decided before the start of the game.

#### The Two Stake Arrangement

- 13. One, two or three players can participate in one game using Rules 14, 15 and 16.
- 14. One, two or three players can play a game by walking back and forth from stake to stake.
- 15. The shoes are removed at the end of each inning. The person pitching last has a disadvantage, therefore, the players will alternate first pitch after each inning and the beginning of each game.
- 16. To start the game when two or more players are participating, toss a coin, or any other suitable method can be used for choice of first pitch.

#### COUNT ALL "300" — (Continued)

#### **Even Number of Players**

17. Any even number of players (usually not to exceed ten) can participate in one game, with half of the players pitching from each stake using Rules 11, 12, and 16.

#### Scoring

- One ringer is five (5) points. (See rule 25)
   Double ringer is ten (10) points. (See rule 26)
   A shoe coming to rest with open end around the stake, from any direction, up to short of being a ringer is four (4) points. (See Note No. 2)

Note No. 2: To determine if a shoe is in the four (4) point area, the shoe can be measured with a thin rubber band or a No. 8 thread, stretched taut across both calks. If the stake causes the rubber band or thread to bow slightly, the shoe is considered around the stake in the four (4) point area. (See diagram)



21. A shoe coming to rest within a 2-inch radius of the stake is three (3)points.

- 22. A shoe coming to rest over 2 inches but within a 4-inch radius of the stake is two (2) points.
- 23. A shoe coming to rest over 4 inches but within a 6-inch radius of the stake is one (1) point.

24. A shoe coming to rest outside a 6-inch radius of the stake has no value. 25. An inning having one ringer equals five (5) points, plus points of close

26. An inning having on the original points of rest consecutive inning.
26. An inning having a double ringer equals ten (10) points, plus total points in next two consecutive innings.

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#### AN OPEN LETTER FROM DON TITCOMB . . . WORLD CHAMPION

The year of 1960 will always remain in my memory as one of the most eventful that any man could ever wish for. It was my good fortune after enjoying the fine hospitality of those wonderful people in Indiana and others to realize an ambition that I have been trying to achieve for many years, that of winning the World championship. Having the title has given me a finer understanding of the game and the players that participate in it. It has also given me more self confidence in myself as a person. I am thankful that I am able, in my own way, to be able to do something that others can enjoy, learn or participate in. I have been giving demonstrations at various schools and then watch them as they form and conduct tournaments. I have had many requests for return engagements. I have also helped the City of Los Gatos in the construction of 8 fine courts. Next season they will be among the other clubs of the city. I have also helped the I.B.M. company here in Los Gatos construct 16 courts at their plant. They are regulation having asphalt walkways. On their completion, I was asked to give a demonstration. Over 250 persons use them each day.

The makers of L & M cigarettes have asked me if I would be interested in a commercial for a television program to which I answered yes. They are waiting now for plans to develop. It would be great for our game to receive national coverage on TV.

I have received letters from all over the country extending congratulations and making inquiries and it makes me feel very humble. I am going to try and be in the best condition I have ever been in this coming season and try to be as good a representative on the courts as I can be. Our game can well be proud of the champions that we have had and it is my earnest hope that I can uphold that wonderful tradition.
