#### **ROCK RIVER VALLEY OPEN TOURNAMENT**

The 7th annual Rock River Valley Open Tournament will be held at the Lawrence Park courts at Rock Falls, Ill., on Labor Day, Sept. 3rd. Qualifying will start on Sunday, Sept. 2, at 2 p.m. until 10 p.m. and resuming at 8 a.m., Monday, Sept. 3, closing at 12 noon D.S.T. All entries will pitch 100 shoes for qualifying with the privilege of an additional 100 shoes on payment of an extra \$2.00 fee and resuming qualifying within 15 min. Tournament will be sanctioned by State and National Associations which requires contestant to have 1962 N.H.P.A. card. Cards will be available at courtside. Roger Vogel of Manito, Ill., will be the defending champion.

There will be two classes of 16 men in each class; Class A with 16 men divided into two groups of 8; likewise with Class B. Qualifiers will be alternated into each class so that all groups will be evenly matched. Winners of each group will play for the class championship. The runners-up in each group will play-off for 3rd place in each class. Trophies will be awarded to two top men in class after play-offs. Wilma Long and Mary Wuebben will be head scorekeepers with Bill Porner acting as official umpire and referee.

These same courts will be the scene of another tournament on Sept. 1 for players within a radius of 60 miles of Sterling-Rock Falls. The Iowa and Wisconsin lines will be the north and west borderline and extending 60 miles to the east and south. Qualifying starts at 8 a.m. and closes at 12 noon. Round robin play begins at 1:30 p.m.

#### ALBERT ZADROGA - 1962 ALLEGHENY COUNTY HORSESHOE CHAMPION

Albert Zadroga of Elizabeth, Pa., successfully defended his title of Allegheny County at the Dormont courts, Sunday, July 15. The championship was not decided until the final game of the tournament in which Zadroga met Oscar Engle of Beechview. Both men were undefeated in the competition going into the final round. Zadroga won the crucial game 51 to 34, throwing 70% ringers as opposed to Engle's 63%.

In Class B the round-robin competition ended in a tie for first place between Clyde Martz of Whitehall and Joseph Ehrlich of Mt. Oliver. Ehrlich then defeated Martz in a 50 point game. Class C was won by Jake Fiore of Wexford defeating everyone but Mike Churley of Swissvale. Class D ended in a tie between John Regan of Mt. Washington and John Gallagher of Dormont. In the pitch-off, Regan defeated Gallagher.

#### In Memoriam

The Wisconsisn state association has suffered a great loss in the passing of Art Klement of Fort Atkinon, Wisconsin on July 2. He was 74 years of age. Art, as he was affectionately known, served the Badger association as its president for 36 years and was the driving force in the launching and operating of the Ft. Atkinson club. He conducted the state tournament at the Wisconsin State Fair each year. In recent years he was part-time employee of the city of Ft. Atkinson, taking care of the horseshoe and shuffleboard activities at Jones park in that city. He is survived by two sons and several sisters and brothers. The sympathy of the Wiconsin association and the NHPA membership is extended to his family.

#### **EASTERN NATIONAL TOURNAMENT**

World Champion Harold Reno took the Miller trophy and retained his Eastern National crown against one of the classiest groups of pitchers ever to assemble. Barrelling games of 55 for 58, 54 for 58 and 76 for 82, Reno rewrote the book as he threw 1014 ringers in 1166 shoes — an average of 86.96%. Paul Focht extended the champ to 122 shoes only to lose a 44-50 lettle. (Page 105 ringers Each 108)

Class C trophy went to George Dilgard and D to Lester Rose who swept their respective fields with superb pitching efforts. Unfortunately the weather forced a schedule change and the many fine pitchers in these groups were inconvenienced. Notable, however, was their fine cooperation throughout, and it is this response to a tough situation which will be remembered far longer than the won-loss record of the top pitchers.

Elmer Hohl was awarded the sportsmanship trophy, while Ellis Cobb of Aurora, Illinois, was awarded the "best dressed" plaque.

## Turning Back the Pages of Time.

#### THE 1922 NATIONAL FALL TOURNAMENT

By LELAND MORTENSON

Third Installment

Frank Jackson had watched that particular state tournament with attentive interest. More especially Frank Lundin who was pitching exceptionally well; in fact, he was playing better than any other man had pitched up to that time. Jackson was also well pleased because of the spectator interest which made the horseshoe tournament one of the State Fair attractions. Whether he was worried about his chances of beating Lundin is not known.

Frank Jackson was born on a farm near Kellerton, Iowa, in 1870. He learned to pitch horseshoes as a boy. In 1907 he won a tournament sponsored by Manhattan State College at Manhattan, Kansas. In 1909 he won the World championship at Bronson, Kansas. It is believed that Jackson talked the promoter of a colt show into promoting this tournament. Jackson always claimed that a World tournament was held every year after that and that he had won all of them until 1919 when he lost the title. It is still presumed that Jackson was responsible for these tournaments being promoted. So far as is

Jackson was responsible for these tournaments being promoted. So far as is known there are no records available.

Jackson has often been called "the father of horseshoes." However, this is not correct. The game existed long before Jackson was born. D. D. Cottrell, former National secretary, once wrote a history of horseshoe pitching and among other things stated that a British General once said, "The colonial war was won on the village greens by pitchers of horses hardware." Early artwork showed men pitching horseshoes but it was never known just where

the original artwork was.

In addition to helping to start national tournaments, Jackson is believed to have been an inspirational force in the organization of horseshoe pitching associations.

associations.

Jackson and both of his sons were adherents of good sportsmanship and displayed it on every occasion. When one of them was playing a game, the other one generally stayed away from that particular court. They never boasted about themselves or made alibis when they were on the losing end. It was quite natural that as Jackson prepared to play Lundin for the first time and to defend his state title, he most certainly wanted to win. He did not wont to be embarated by losing to enother Lower and recoveries.

did not want to be embarrassed by losing to another Iowan and, more especially, in front of the Iowa horseshoe fans. Also, because money was a little he needed the \$50.00 prize money.

Like Lundin, Jackson was in superb physical condition. He had pitched for many years at long periods of time out in the hot sun and had worked and lived outdoors. He was strict in his habits. Jackson was always accom-

panied by his most gracious wife who shared her husband's joys or disappointments whether it was victory or defeat.

Jackson and Lundin were scheduled to play their two out of three match for the Iowa state championship August 30, 1922, but due to rain it was played the following day. On that day many of the entrants for the National tournament to be played at the Fair had begun to arrive. Jackson and Lundin cash started to practice about an hour before the match was to start. To the each started to practice about an hour before the match was to start. To the each started to practice about an hour before the match was to start. To the observer, it could be detected as to who was the best pitcher. There were several hundred spectators present when the champion and challenger were called to the selected court. As had been previously expected, the outcome was all for the young man from New London, Frank Lundin. In the first game, Lundin soon had a 38-0 lead and won 50-10. He had 24 ringers out of 38 shoes. In the second game, Lundin got away to a 43-0 lead winning 50-17. Thus, Jackson bowed out to this hitherto unknown youth, Frank Lundin, who, from that time on, was to be the star attraction. Lundin had made a great impression on all those who had come to compete in the 1922 National. However, C. C. Davis remarked laughingly, "We'll take him in the National." The records show that Frank Lundin became a World champion.


