The idea back of this new type of membership is to attract new and beginning players and the less active players who take part only in local club

programs

The reduced fee will make it easier for local clubs to sign up NHPA members and thereby obtain official sanction for their leagues, city, county and local tournaments. NHPA championship insignias will be issued to the winners of all such events.

This membership will bring you the monthly magazine for a full year

regardless of the time of year you obtain the membership.

You will also become eligible to enter any sanctioned open tourney auywhere in the U. S. as well as the World Tournament and your state

tournament and local tournaments within your own state and area.

2. Affiliated Membership, the pink membership card, \$2.00 plus state dues in those states with an official NHPA chapter. Most states have indicated the state dues will be less for this type of membership than the full Participating Membership as this is a new type of membership being offered for the first time on a one year trial basis in an attempt to attract new members into the game and organized horseshoe.

This membership will bring the holder two special issues of the monthly magazine. One a spring issue devoted entirely to news of local clubs and the

other a fall issue which will cover all state tournaments in full.

This membership will also make the holder eligible to enter all sanctioned leagues and city, county and other tournaments of a local nature in your area. This membership does not permit entry in sanctioned state tournaments, the big open tournaments and the World Tournament.

Otherwise the same privileges and courtesies are extended to holders of this membership as in the case of the Full Participating membership by the

NHPA and affiliated clubs.

The Affiliated Membership can be converted into a Full Participating membership at any time by paying the difference in dues.

Winston came upwith the high single game percentage of 83.9 Bob Bale threw the most ringers in the 11 game round robin, racking up 566 ringers.






