

MINUTES OF THE 1962 NHPA CONVENTION

The 1962 Convention of the National Horseshoe Pitchers' Association of America was held Friday morning, August 3, in the auditorium of the

Greenville, O., City Park.

President Harold Craig presided and 49 official delegates representing 22 State Chapters were seated. The following officers were present: President Harold Craig; Vice Presidents Vicki Winston, James Johnson and Elmer Beller and Secretary-Treasurer Robert Pence.

A minute of silence was observed by the convention in memory of mem-

bers who had passed away during the year.

Minutes of the previous convention were read by Secretary Robert Pence and approved upon a motion by Davis (N.J.) seconded by Hyland (N.Y.). The following financial report was submitted by Treasurer Robert Pence.

Also reported was an inventory of 500 NHPA auto plates, 300 NHPA decals, 300 sport shirts, 100 T-shirts, 30,000 scoresheets, 500 ringer percentage charts, 500 plastic ringer percentage charts, 50 Horseshoe Pitching Manuals, 20 horseshoe court blue prints, 900 round robin master schedules, 6 wooden horseshoe carrying cases, 150 metal carrying cases.

The Auditing Committee consisting of Fender (Ohio) and Dixon (Iowa) reported they had examined the books and found everything in excellent order and moved that the financial report be accepted as read. The motion was

seconded by Raskopf (Tenn.) and carried.

The Auditing Committee recommended that NHPA sales be separated from the general business of the Association as soon as practical and a

separate report be made.

The Membership Committee consisting of James Johnson, Vice-President, and all the Regional Directors submitted a report on a study of a multiple membership fee system and offered a motion, amended by Winston (Mo.) and

seconded by Manker (Ohio) as follows:

That in addition to the present full participating membership the NHPA offer for one year on a trial basis an Affiliated Membership for \$2.00 plus whatever amount each State Chapter desired to add for their own treasury. This membership to entitle the holder to participate in any sanctioned league, city, county or local type tournament inside the confines of his state and to receive two special issues of the monthly magazine, a spring issue devoted

exclusively to news and activities of local clubs and the fall issue containing all of the state tournament results. NHPA Certificates or insignias of Championship to be issued to all winners of sanctioned leagues, city, county or local type tournaments. Members can apply the \$2.00 Affiliated membership fee towards a full participating membership any time during the year.

Discussion of this motion brought out the interpretation that holders of the Affiliated membership would not be eligible for officially sanctioned State Tournaments or Open Tournaments. The motion passed with only one dissenting vote.

The Committee appointed to study the Davis World Tournament qualifying plan made a report showing four members opposed and three in favor. Following a discussion a motion was made by Davis (N.J.) seconded by Goodlander (Ohio) that the plan be tabled for one year with the recommendation the plan be tried by the NHPA in some large tournament involving a large entry list from a number of states such as the Eastern National or the Midwest "Ringer Round Up." The motion was carried.

Motion by Davis (N.J.) seconded by Tomlinson (Ind.) that World Tournament entries close by noon on the final day of qualifying and that the actual pitching of the 200 qualifying shoes must be started by 9:00 P.M. Motion was carried.

President Harold Craig appointed a committee of Ottie Reno (Ohio) and Marvin Chrisman (Ind.) to serve with himself in re-writing and bringing upto-date the NHPA Constitution and By-Laws.

Both Greenville, O., and South Gate, Calif., extended an invitation to the NHPA to hold the 1963 World Tournament on their courts. A motion by Raskopf (Tenn.) seconded by Dixon (Iowa) asked a poll of the delegates to guide the Executive Committee in making a decision. The motion carried and the poll showed 32 votes for South Gate and 17 for Greenville.

Upon a motion by Wilmore (Ind.) seconded by Allen (Colo.) the convention voted that Juniors who played in any of the Men's divisions of the World Tournament, even though they did not accept cash prizes, would be ineligible to compete in the Junior Division in the future.

A motion by Steinfeldt (N.Y.) seconded by Dixon (Iowa) to the effect the allowance of both the Secretary-Treasurer and the News Digest Editor be increased \$200.00 was passed unanimously.

Resolutions were approved expressing appreciation and thanking the Miller Brewing Co., the Greenville Area Chamber of Commerce, the Greenville Park Dept., the Darke County Horseshoe Pitchers' Association, the Housing Committee headed by Mrs. Brown, the Ohio, the Gordon and the Diamond Horseshoe companies and all individuals who did so much to help make the 1962 tournament possible and such a success.

The Nominating Committee consisting of Steinfeldt (N.Y.) and Davis (N.J.) recommended the election of the following officers: Secretary-Treasurer Robert Pence (Ind.); 1st Vice President Elmer Beller (Calif.); 2nd Vice President Glen Sebring (Pa.); 3rd Vice President Clark Bell (Calif.); and 4th Vice President Lucile Hopkins (Iowa). Dixon (Iowa) seconded the committee's motion and the slate was elected by acclamation.

The convention was then adjourned.

Paul Focht of Dayton, Ohio, New World Champ

Paul Focht, slender Dayton, O., ringer artist, fought his way through a pressure pack tournament at Greenville, O., to take home the huge Miller

Brewing Co.-NHPA trophy, symbolic of the 1962 World Horseshoe crown.

As the top players moved into "murder's row" on the final night a five or six way tie loomed as a possibility. First to drop was Ted Allen when he lost to Hohl, the Canuck champ. Next Curt Day eliminted Maddox. Hohl then lost to Reno and Focht in successive games to drop from contention.

Focht defeated Reno 52-37 in the final round to clinch the title. A Reno win would have produced a three-way deadlock between Focht, Reno and Day. The new champion won 32 games, losing only to Maddox, Martin and Ted Allen. Runnerup Curt Day lost four games early and then won his last

19 to finish strong with a record of 31-4.

The Canadian champion, Elmer Hohl, finished 3rd and had the highest ringer average for the tournament, tossing five games of 90 percent or better.

Defending champ Harold Reno won his first 25 games, but dropped games to Dugle, Allen, Maddox, Day and Focht in the stretch to finish fourth. Ten times champion Ted Allen was not the Ted of old. Nevertheless he

finished fifth and defeated three of the four who finished ahead of him.

Ralph Maddox of West Virginia finished 6th and was the "spoiler" for he downed Focht, Reno, and local favorite Wilbur Kabel. Kabel, a member of the local Greenville club, finished 7th and was in the running through the first four nights.

Glen Henton of Iowa, Art Dugle of Chicago and Roger Vogel of Illinois

rounded out the top ten.

In addition to the beautiful Miller Brewing Co. trophies which went to the first five finishers special clock trophy awards by the firm which supplies NHPA trophies went to Glen "Red" Henton of Iowa for compiling the best record by a first year entrant and to Gene Mendenhall of Indiana for showing the biggest improvement over last year's record. Henton won 23 and lost 12 to finish in the top ten. Mendenhall boosted a 6-5 record in Class "B" last year to an 11-24 mark in the championship division this year.

Curt Day of Indiana was awarded Sportsmanship trophy donated by the Ohio Horseshoe Co. by a vote of the players. Wilbur Kabel won the "News Digest" award for the "Neatest Dressed" player.

1962 WORLD TOURNAMENT HIGHLIGHTS

This was a unique tournament. To list and describe all the highlights and

"first time ever" items would fill a book.

Championship trophies from the Miller Brewing company created a sensation. Awarded to the place winners in all divisions of the Men's tournament they were the most outstanding group ever presented at the World Tournament. Al Wolf of the Miller Brewing Co. publicity department was on hand to assist the NHPA in that field.

Other trophies - those of the Gordon Horseshoe Co. which went to the winners in the Juniors, the Diamond Horseshoe Co. awards which went to both the Ladies and the Juniors, the Ohio Horseshoe Co. Sportsmanship award and the special NHPA trophies all combined to make an imposing collection.

The NHPA sales counter under the direction of Mary Craig did a huge volume of business in sport shirts, T-shirts, % charts, scoresheets and the like — completely selling out many items. NHPA shirts went like hotcakes and Mary Mays who sews identification on the backs of NHPA shirts was on

hand throughout with her sewing machine and was quite an attraction.

The Arch Stokes Memorial Award for the person who contributed the most to the game of horseshoe during the year deservedly went to Ellis Cobb, editor of the "Digest" and head of the Illinois State Association. All former winners, Mary and Harold Craig, Katie and Arch Gregson, Elmer Beller and

Bob Pence were also on hand.

Mary Stokes and Maurine Cook, wife and daughter of Arch Stokes, missed the event for the first time in many years, being unable to make the trip from Utah. Their legion of friends missed them.

Direct radio broadcasts from the courts were a feature, and Clancy, the sportscaster, was a familiar figure every day. It was not uncommon to see the fans in one section of the bleachers watching a big game in front of them and listening to the broadcast of another at the other end of the courts. Once Billy Crick (Calif.), scoring on court 5 was observed to be scoring his own game and listening via transistor a big game two courts back of him.

Capacity crowds filled the 3500 bleacher seats and every nook around the courts every night. The final night's attendance was estimated at 5000 and many could not get close enough to see. Once again these fans utilized Clancy's radio broadcasts.

Rain disrupted play Sunday night and three times on Monday making it necessary to cover the courts with the plastic coverings four times. This was a picturesque sight, but a lot of hard work. By Tuesday night the schedule of play was back on time.

The NHPA party at the Fish and Game Club found more than 600 people in attendance. Besides the eats and refreshments, music and dancing was enjoyed by all. Herb McBride, the "singing lumberjack" and NHPA member from Michigan furnished musical instruments and a lot of real talent was uncovered. Katie Gregson and Mrs. Henton at the piano along with Herb McBride, Red Henton, Randall Jones, Truman Standard, Earl Green, Charles Fortenberry and others on the various stringed instruments kept things lively both at the park and in the picnic shelter house back of the courts every afternoon.

Qualifying scores were the highest ever. Floyd Toole (Ark.) and Ralph Lackey (Ohio) tied for the 36th spot with 492, Toole winning the 50-shoe pitchoff after midnight, Thurs., Aug. 2. It took 451 to make Class "B" and 424 to make Class "C." This does not count the "Old Timers."

Gov. Michael DiSalle of Ohio visited the tournament, marking another first. He played an exhibition game with Harold Reno, losing 50-1, but he was a horseshoe pitcher — throwing an open shoe, 1¼ turn, and racking up three ringers. Fifteen-year-old National Ladies champ Sue Gillespie and 14year-old Gary Roberts also pitched an exhibition, the game going 50-49, both throwing 63 percent ringers — a great exhibition by two attractive teenagers.

French speaking players from Quebec attended — another first. Pierre Lemaire and Jean Roy are professional jugglers and acrobats as well as horseshoe players and gave a fine performance for the crowd during Monday's rain. Jean is a fine horseshoe player, but was handicapped in qualifying for until a year ago when the NHPA made contact with Quebec players the pitching distance there was 43 feet, the foul line being even with the stake.

Players from Tennessee, Virginia and North Carolina attended for the first time. Tommy Jones, son of Regional Director Randall Jones of North Carolina, arrived too late to play in the juniors, but showed he would have

been a real contender.

Charles Fortenberry of Tennessee lost his first 16 games and then broke into the win column against no less than Ted Allen. He ended with eight wins after switching from a 34 to a 114 turn.

Curt Day (Ind.) pitched the longest string of ringers — 44. Ted broke the record for the most shoes pitched in a tournament, 3064. Al Zadroga (Pa.) tossed 87 ringers in his first 100 shoes against Paul Focht and lost when Paul ended the game with 26 consecutive ringers. The Kabel-Steinfeldt game was the longest, going 164 shoes. There were three southpaws in the top 36 — Al Zadroga (Pa.), Carl Steinfeldt (N.Y.) and Glen Henton (Ia.). Elmer Hohl (Canada) tossed the best single game, 53 out of 58 for 91.4 percent against Stimac (Ind.) in his final game. Steinfeldt (N.Y.) threw



FOCHT WINNER OF CARLING SPORTS AWARD, AUGUST 14

The following is the text of an interview with Paul Focht of Dayton, Ohio, 1962 winner of the World Horseshoe Pitching tournament held at Greenville, Ohio.

Ed Krahling conducted the interview, he being the Sports Director of

radio station WONE, Dayton, Ohio.

The Carling Brewing Company and radio station WONE take pride

Tonight we are happy to present the sports award to a World Champion, a slight, quick-to-grin employee of Delco Kettering who August 8 realized a long-standing ambition on the horseshoe courts at City Park in Greenville, Ohio. The day was Wednesday. It was our winner's final match in the World Horseshoe pitching Championships. For ten days, he had been pitching in Qualifying rounds, and in the round-robin finals against 35 of the World's best Horseshoe pitchers. The final match pitted him against the defending Champion, Harold Reno, of Sabina, Ohio. A victory would mean the outright Championship. A loss, a possible multiple tie for first place. Tossing calmly under pressure, our winner defeated Reno, by a score of 52 to 37, and the Championship was his.

For his World Championship Victory, and his years of active participation in the sport of Horseshoe pitching, this Sportscaster, the Carling Brewing Company, and Radio Station WONE salute Paul Focht, of 1051 West

Dorothy Lane, as this week's winner of the Carling Sports Award.

WILKINSON REPEATS "OLD TIMER" VICTORY

Joe Wilkinson of Clinton, Ohio, repeated as king of the "Old Timers" division taking home a Miller Brewing Co. trophy along with 2nd place winner Carl Lundgren of Detroit, Mich., and 3rd place Joe Foster of Omaha, Neb.

Wilkinson's only loss was 50-46 to John Davis of Florida. His best game was 38 ringers in 46 shoes for a percentage of 82.6.

There was a four-way tie for second place, Lundgren and Foster receiving the trophies on the basis of higher ringer percentages than John Davis of Florida and Bert Lewis of Cedar Falls, Ia. All four had identical 8 and 3 records. Charley Hopkins almost made it a five-way tie with a 7 and 4 total.

Wilkinson will soon be 72, but shows no signs of slowing up in his ability to toss ringers.




