With all plans completed, the Erie, Pennsylvania Club awaits the opening of the Perry Sesqui-Centennial Eastern National Open tournament on June 21-22 and 23 when Mayor Williamson will pitch the first shoe with the tournament queen, Gratia Hanson, looking on.

Qualifying fee for all classes will be \$5.00. An additional fee will be paid by those pitching in Class AAA and Class Aa. This fee will be \$2.50. Class A and Class B will not have any extra fee. Any pitcher desiring to pitch an extra 100 shoes in the qualifying round will have to pay an additional \$5.00. Qualifying times are as follows: Friday, June 21, 1 p.m. to 12 midnight., and Saturday, June 22, 9 a.m. until 11 a.m.

Class AAA will be made up of the first 16 high men. Class AA will have 16 men divided into groups of 8 men each. Class A, with 16 men in groups of 8. Class B will have an option set-up, that is, 16 men divided into groups of 8 men or 24 men divided into groups of 6 men each. All groups and classes will play round robins.

RULES OF TOURNAMENT:

- 1. Class AAA In case of a tie: SUDDEN DEATH! One game playoff.
- 2. Class AA, A and B Playoff 2 men picked by wins and losses or ringer percentage if ties occur. Ringer percentage will determine champion if tie again occurs in playoffs.
- 3. Important Rule Change: Players who fail to complete their full schedule, will forfeit their prize money. (Prize money will be evenly distributed in their respective class.) Games won and lost will count to time of player dropping out. Games not played will be considered forfeited and declared as losses.
- 4. An estimated prize list \$700.00 will be posted (64 men). This shall be done two hours before pitching commences.
- 5. Scorekeepers shall be paid \$0.25 a game. Qualifying scorers will be equipped with straight edge and measure all questionable ringers. Scorers shall not be from same area as qualifier.
- 6. Players will be allowed 15 minutes grace. Players being late for a game will forfeit that game only and will resume playing.
- 3 Trophies in each class. Plaque for Hi-Qualifier plus \$10.00 Sportsmanship Trophy. Best Dressed Trophy.
- 8. In the event of an interruption (rain, etc.), games played to the interruption will count. However, there shall be no interruption of a class time schedule.
- 9. Inasmuch as this Tournament is tied in with the Perry Sesqui-Centennial Sports Program, Medalions will be given as prizes by the Centennial Comm.






