

E. McChesney Front Runner In Baker, Montana Open

Ernest McChesney of Sidney, Montana captured the Third Annual Baker Open Horseshoe Tournament held at Baker, Montana with 7 wins and no losses. He also won the high ringer percent trophy for the tournament. There was a two-way tie for second place between Earl Brown of Miles City, Montana, the defending Champion, and Warren Hedman of Gascoyne, North Dakota, each with 5 wins and 2 losses. Hedman defeated Brown in the playoff game by a score of 52 to 37.

Phil Prescott of Poplar, Montana, who won the Montana State NHPA Tournament over Labor Day weekend at Fort Peck, Montana, placed fourth.

Ivan Miller, an up and coming horseshoe pitcher from Nashua, Montana took Class "B" with 6 wins and 1 loss. he pitched 40.1% ringers. Grant Burgess of Lambert, Montana and Norman Wolfgram of Rhame, North Dakota, tied for second place in Class "B" with 5 wins and 2 losses. Burgess defeated Wolfgram by a score of 52 to 43 to take second place.

Robert McChesney of Sidney, Montana took Class "C" with 6 wins and 1 loss. He pitched 26.1% ringers. Pat Plummer took second place with 5 wins and 2 losses.

Class "D" was won by Norman Stenerson of Baker, Montana with 6 wins and no losses as he pitched 25.4% ringers. Joseph Wagner of Nashua, Montana took second place with 5 wins and 1 loss.

A total of 31 players took part in the Tournament.

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In Memoriam

Joseph Schilling, Lafayette, Ind. died unexpectedly of a heart attack early in July and his loss creates an irreplaceable void in the ranks of the Indiana

State Association and his hometown Lafayette Club.

He served as Business Manager of the Lafayette Club and as an officer in the Indiana State Association for many years and has always been a key man in NHPA activities in the Hoosier state. He was instrumental in reorganizing the Lafayette club a few years ago and in getting eight lighted courts with a clubhouse built on private property as a new home for the club. These courts known as the Kingma courts were the scene of several team leagues each year and numerous tournaments directed by him.

Joe was also active in tournaments all over the state and under his leadership the Lafayette club was always well represented. Every year come January the NHPA could count on approximately 20 National members from

the Lafayette Club.

His death was a great shock to Indiana members and he will be missed both for his leadership and fellowship and good sportsmanship all of which were a part of his personality. The NHPA extends its sincere sympathy to Mrs. Schilling and to the Lafayette Club.

Dale Carson, Maryland Ace, Wins Annual Hill City, Va. Open

In a climatic show of skillful horseshoe pitching by both contestants, under the most adverse weather conditions, Dale Carson of Baltimore, Md., outpitched Ralph Maddox, Poca, West Virginia, 50-40 for the Miller Brewing Company trophy and \$50.00 first place prize money. The game went 100 shoes with Carson throwing 80 ringers, to 79 ringers for Maddox.

Other highlights of the tourney were Maddox throwing 35 ringers out of 36 shoes (97.2%) against Cecil Monday of Richmond, Virginia, and Tommy Ballowe's victory over Grover Anderson. This contest went 106 shoes, Ballowe pitching 85 ringers (80.2%) and Anderson recording 80 ringers for a 75.5%.

This tournament climaxed the current season and was played on the Miller park courts in Lynchburg, Virginia. Thirty-two pitchers qualified for the A, Double A and Championship divisions.

The tournament, which attracted some 50 pitchers from throughout the country, had state champions from W. Va., Florida, Maryland, Ohio and Pennsylvania. Winners each received a trophy, with top winners, each getting a cash award also.



So in 1963 I returned to the World's Tournament at South Gate, California with a "Rabbit's Foot A Mile Long" and it carried me to the title of World Champion, something beyond all expectations.

I use a set pitch, standing approximately 40 inches from the foul line and

pitch a one and one-quarter turn.

At this time I want to say "Thanks" to everyone for the telegrams I received and for the many letters and cards that are coming in every day.

Here again as in all my travels playing our favorite sport of Horseshoes, I met and made many friends and acquaintances.






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
