

MINUTES OF THE 1963 N.H.P.A. CONVENTION

The meeting, held in the South Gate Girl Scout Center was called to order by President Harold Craig with the following officers present: President, Harold Craig (Ind.); Vice Presidents, Elmer Beller (Calif.) and Clark Bell (Calif.); and Secretary-Treasurer, Bob Pence (Ind.).

The following voting delegates were seated: Arizona, 1; North Calif, 2; South Calif., 4; Colorado, 2; Florida, 2; Illinois, 3; Indiana, 5; Iowa, 2; Kansas, 1; Minnesota, 2; Missouri, 2; Nebraska, 2; New Jersey, 1; New York, 2; Ohio, 6; Oklahoma, 2; Oregon, 3; Utah, 2; Washington, 2; West Virginia, 1; Canada, 1; Argansas, 1. Total 49

Minutes of the 1962 Convention was read by Secretary Bob Pence and approved upon a motion by Davis (NJ) and seconded by Winston (Mo.).

The Auditing Committee, Backer (Utah) and Weeks (Calif.), reported that the books were in order and recommended that an annual physical inventory be taken at a consistent time each year, preferably during the winter, and this amount be added to the cash balance for a true report of assets.

Motion by Klunik (Ill.) seconded by Cook (Utah) that the financial report and the Auditing Committee's report be accepted and placed on file was carried.

Report of the Committee for revising the Constitution and By-Laws, Ottie Reno (Ohio),, Christman (Ind.) and Craig (Ind.), was read by Mr. Reno with time for discussion following each change.

Gregson (Calif.) suggested the rules include Junior and Senior play. Dixon (Ia.) brought up the foul line problem and suggested that the foul line be placed even with the stake and the players be made to start their pitching from back of this line. Motion by Backer (Utah) seconded by Winston (Mo.) that the Committee's recommendations be accepted was withdrawn in order that the playing rules be considered under new business.

Motion by Steinfeldt (NY) seconded by Klunik (Ill.) that the Dixon foul line proposal be accepted and made a part of the rules was discussed. Motion by Davis (NJ) seconded by Klunik (Ill.) that the question be tabled until the next convention in order that the foul line change could be tried in a tournament carried. It was moved by Pence (Ind.) seconded by Davis (NJ) that the change he tried in the Midwest Ringer Roundup under NHPA sanction.

MINUTES — (Continued)

A minute of silent prayer was held in memory of NHPA members who had passed away during the year.

Dixon (Ia.) reported on his portable courts using a rubber base in place of clay.

Discussion centered on NHPA finances and memberships. This discussion finally resulted in a motion by Davis (No. Calif.) seconded by Merino (Ariz.) that NHPA membership be sold at \$1.00 with the magazine optional at \$2.50 additional, this plan to be tried on a one year trial basis, with the present \$2.00 affiliated membership being dropped.

Further discussion based on this motion found the delegates concerned about the continued publication and sale of the monthly magazine with the general feeling that the proposed plan would have to result in a substantial increase in memberships and very little decrease in magazine subscriptions in order to be successful. The motion carried by a vote of 27-17.

Leo McGrath, President of the Ohio Association read letters from the Mayor and the Park Board of Greenville, O. and presented a sealed bid of \$3,000.00 for the 1964 World Tournament. Klunik (Ill.) stated that the Illinois State Fair was interested in the 1964 World Tournament but did not have a sealed bid to submit.

It was moved by Dixon (Ia.) seconded by Klunik (Ill.) that the Greenville bid be accepted. Motion was carried unanimously.

It was moved by Backer (Utah) and seconded by Weeks (Calif.) that the tabled motion regarding the revised Constitution and By-Laws be brought back on the floor. The motion was carried and the convention accepted the committee's recommendations. Bob Pence stated the revised Constitution and By-Laws would be printed in a winter issue of the monthly magazine.

Mr. Backer introduced Paul Rose, Director of Salt Lake County Recreation and Park Commission who presented a sealed bid of \$3,000.00 for the 1965 World Tournament to be held in Murray, Utah.

Secretary Bob Pence presented a letter signed by the Mayor, the Park Board and Keene, New Hampshire Horseshoe Slub bidding \$3,000.00 for the 1965 tournament. He also reported that Winston-Salem, N.C. and Topeka, Kan. were interested. Klunik (Ill.) stated he would like to present a tentative bid from the Illinois State Fair.

It was pointed out that the new constitution made it permissible for the convention to award the tournament two years in advance, but that information was of course not available to the interested parties. It was moved by Dixon (Ia.) and seconded by Klunik (Ill.) to table all bids for 1965 until the next convention thus allowing both Keene, N.H. and Murray, Utah to submit revised bids and for all other interested parties to be notified of the change in rules. The motion carried.

The Nominating Committee comprised of Steinfeldt (NY), McGrath (Ohio) and Gregson (Calif.) recommended the following slate of officers: President — Harold Craig (Ind.); 1st Vice Presoident — Elmer Beller (Calif.) for a two year term; 2nd Vice President — Glen Sebring (Pa.) for a one year term; 3rd Vice President — Lester Georgina (N.H.) for a two year term; and Lucille Hopkins (Ia.) for a one year term.

Nominations were called for from the floor. There being none Davis (Calif.) and Davis (N.J.) moved nominations be closed. Motion carried. Winston (Mo.), seconded by Dixon (Ia.) moved that the Secretary be instructed to cast an unanimous ballot for the recommended slate. The motion carried unanimously.

The delegates expressed gratitude and appreciation for all the fine work and co-operation of the City of South Gate, the South Gate Club and the Southern California Association, the Miller Brewing Co. and all trophy donators including the various manufacturers of horseshoes and all the individuals who had contributed to the 1963 tournament.

There being no further business it was moved by Winston (Mo.) and seconded by Dixon (Ia.) that the convention be adjourned. Motion carried.

WORLD TOURNAMENT AWARDS AND TROPHIES

A beautiful and dazzling array of trophies and awards were given out at the 1963 World Tournament.

The Miller Brewing Co. gave 15 outstanding trophies in the Men's division; five in the Championship class, four in Class "B" and three each in Class "C" and the Senior Division. In addition Miller's High Life gave a dozen zippo lighters in the championship division and rain bonnets to all the players in the Women's tourney. All the men received Miller caps which were quite popular.

Hal Leiber, who makes NHPA trophies, donated three beautiful clock trophies, including the first place trophy in the Ladies' division. Chuck Merrill of Calif. won the Leiber clock trophy for being the most

outstanding first year entrant after a close race with Howard Shatto of Washington which was decided on total ringer percentage. Other 1st year players included Ned Shaver, Don Peterson, and Bill Blexrude.

Frank Stinson of Minnesota won the Leiber award for the Most Improved Player. Frank won 14 games in the championship division and averaged better than 70% in comparison to a so-so record in Class "B" last year.

The Ohio Horseshoe Co. Sportsmanship award, another beautiful clock trophy, went to Jim "Pop" Johnson of Ohio by a vote of the players. The "New Digest"-NHPA Neatest Dressed award went to Marvin Craig

of Indiana. A committee of women made the selection.

The Gordon Horseshoe Co. again donated the top trophies in the Junior tournament.

The Ted Allen Horseshoe Co. gave gold plated shoes to the high qualifier, John Monasmith and place awards in both the Junior and Women's tournamet. Ted also gave a pair of horseshoes in each division of the tournament.

Lee Bennett, manufacturer of Lee Shoes, gave silver plated horseshoe buckles to all the Junior players.

Diamond Horseshoe Co. gave place trophies in the Ladies tourney.

The Ohio Horseshoe Co. through its representative Stan Manker donated several pairs of shoes as special awards.

Add the Stokes Memorial Award to this collection and the special Eddie Packham awards mentioned elsewhere and you have the greatest group of prizes ever given at a World Tournament.

In addition the NHPA prize money totaling more than \$5500.00 was the highest in history.

SOUTH GATE PLAYER WINS SENIOR DIV.

A home town player, Ralph Navarro, won the Senior Division for players over 60 years of age at the World Tourney in South Gate.

Formerly called the "Old Timers," Navarro becomes the 3rd player to hold this title. Joe Wilkinson of Akron who won the event for the past two years was unable to defend his title because of an ankle injury, while W. O. Maxwell, 1960 champ and now 82 years old, is inactive for the first time in his career because of serious illness.

MONASMITH IS NEW WORLD CHAMPION

John Monasmith, 47-year-old hod carrier and former railway worker from Yakima, Wash. won the NHPA-Miller Life Trophy symbolic of the World Horsesehoe Pitching Title at South Gate, Calif. thus becoming the 16th to win the crown since Frank Jackson annexed the first one back in 1909.

Elmer Hohl, Canadian National champ finished 2nd to go wth the 4th, 3rd and 2nd place rankings he has gained in the past three meets.

Carl Steinfeldt, left handed Rochester, N.Y. star placed 3rd, his best record to date.

1961 champ. Harold Reno of Ohio placed 4th and defending champ Paul Focht 5th. Three former titleholders, Ted Allen, Fernando Isais and Don Titcomb tied for 6th.

Marines Tamboer of Kansas and Jerry Schneider of California rounded out the top ten.

Monasmith chalked up a 32-3 record with 82.3% ringers and was toughest when the going was roughest. His three defeats came at the hands of Hohl, Tamboer and Focht. He had close calls with Schneider, Reno and Marv Craig. Right at the start he served notice by taking high qualifying honors with 90%ringers.

The Schneider-Monasmith tilt went 142 shoes, longest of the tourney with the new champ hitting 122 ringers and Schneider 121.

Reno tossed the highest single game percentage, 94.7, with 72 ringers in 76 shoes. Moefield was the victim and he saw 59 ringers in the first 60 shoes. Steinfeldt hit Marv Craig with 34 consecutive ringers and then started his

next game with four more for the longest string of the meet.

Monasmith and Isais tossed ten consecutive "four deads" for a near record.

FIFTH WORLD TITLE FOR VICKI

Vicki Chapelle Winston of Lamonte, Mo. won her fifth World title, making her the third to annex that many crowns in the Ladies' division. The others accomplished the feat many years ago, Mrs. C. A. Lanhan of Bloomington, Ill. and Mayme Francisco of Columbus, Ohio.

This was Vicki's 2nd title as Mrs. Winston, her other three coming as Vicki Chapelle while living in Portland, Ore.

Wanda Ditmer tied with Vicki in the round robin, but the Hoosier was defeated 50-25 and 50-22 in the playoff, Vicki averaging 68.3 percent ringers.

Defending champ little Sue Gillespie edged Ruth Bennett of Ohio for 3rd place on the basis of ringer percentage, but never struck the pace she set in winning last year. She lost to Wanda 50-47 in her final game thereby missing a spot in the playoff.

TOURNAMENT HIGHLIGHTS

South Gate had a beautiful set of courts with excellent lighting and the easiest clay to work this observer has ever seen. Outstanding feature was the double fence which cut down traffic interference to a minimum when players finished a game.

Spectator interest was somewhat lower than at Greenville and Muncie in recent years, but it picked up as the tournament progressed and the crowds the final two nights were near capacity. Bleacher accommodations were excellent.

The eournament schedule went off smoothly and play ended much earlier than usual each night. California weather helped for there was no threat of rain. One lighting failure held up activity during qualifying.

It was suite warm in the afternoons but at sundown it turned very chilly each night making heavier clothing a necessity. The sudden change in temperature each evening undoubtedly handicapped some of the players who started with T-shirts and then had to switch to sweat shirts.

Publicity in the South Gate, Long Beach and Huntington Park news-papers was excellent, but the Los Angeles metropolitan dailies almost ignored

Tournament officials could not have functioned without the help of others who pitched in and took care of the numerous jobs necessary to a big tournament such as this. Hats off to:




