



The NHPA has made arrangements with the Greenville newspaper to handle subscriptions for this period of time in order that our members may be kept abreast of the tournament results. Full coverage of the event including pictures has been assured by the sports staff of the paper.

Send 70 cents to the Circulation Manager, Greenville, Ohio Daily Advocate for a daily subscription August 1 through August 12 inclusive.

Daily results will also be sent out via the wire services, both Associated Press and United Press International, which will make the news available to your hometown newspapers. Whether your hometown newspapers use this wire service material is up to them. If they know there are readers in their area who are interested and want the news they will use it. If they think otherwise it will be consigned to the waste basket.

The NHPA urges all horseshoe clubs and all players to make known to the sports editor of the daily paper in their hometown or area that they want these stories in print.

Needless to say, the more requests the paper receives the more complete will be its coverage.

## 11th Annual Cornbelt Open Tournament, August 22-23

The 11th annual Corn Belt Open tournament will be held at Crapo park in Burlington, Iowa, on Saturday and Sunday, August 22 and 23.

A fee of \$2.00 will be charged for 100-shoe qualifying for the 48 man field. Those wishing to qualify on Saturday afternoon or evening may have an extra 100 shoes for an additional fee of \$1.00. There will not be any extra 100-shoe qualifying permitted on Sunday. All qualifying will close at 10:30 a.m. Central Daylight Time. Classes C-D and E, made up of 8-man groups divided into two equal squads of 4 men each playing a round robin. Top man in each squad will play-off for the trophy. Classes A and B will play 6-game round robins using 50 point cancellation method, starting at 1:30 p.m. There will be 7 trophies awarded, two for Class A, two for Class B and one each in Class C-D-E. There will also be cash to the top six men in Class A, as well as cash to the top six men in Class B. Merchandise prizes will be awarded to the other classes as far as it will go. A special prize will go to the "best dressed" player. To the high qualifier whose wife is also present, two dozen roses will be given. There will also be a \$10.00 grocery basket awarded to the highest qualifier. Class A players will pay an extra \$3.00 to play in the tournament; Class B players \$2.00; and Classes C-D-and-E an extra \$1.00. Steak dinners will be awarded to the top 6 high qualifiers. All additional cash from sales of horseshoes and drawing and other items will be added to prize lists.

Plan NOW to attend Iowa's biggest event of the season at beautiful Crapo park in Burlington, Iowa, August 22-23. Plenty of picnic area and playgrounds for the children. The tournament committee of Harold Darnold, Ernie Danielson and Andy Jackson extend a cordial invitation to all.

## Virginia State Tournament, Lynchburg, Virginia — Miller Park

At the end of regulation play, Robert Toney and Thomas Ballowe were tied with 11 wins and only one loss. In the single game "sudden death" play-off Toney outpitched Ballowe 50-45 to become the 1964 Virginia State Champion and at a later date, will be presented a handsome Miller Brewing Company trophy such as the one shown on the cover of the March issue of The Horseshoe Pitchers News Digest. Handsome second place trophy was presented to Thomas Ballowe. Robert Toney also received the high qualifier trophy, scoring 239 points while throwing 71 ringers out of 100 shoes pitched.

In accordance with a ruling instituted several years ago by the Illinois State Fair Association, **ALL ENTRANTS QUALIFYING** for the annual Illinois State tournament to be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, August 18 and 19, in conjunction with Illinois State Fair at Springfield, Illinois, **MUST PURCHASE AN EXHIBITOR'S TICKET** before they will be permitted to play in the tournament. Cost of this ticket is \$2.50 and player receives an automobile parking sticker and is entitled to **DAILY ENTRY** to the fair.

It is therefore urged that to get full advantage of purchase price, that players anticipating playing in the tournament should **PURCHASE THEIR EXHIBITOR'S TICKET IN ADVANCE** by sending check or money order, payable to **ILLINOIS STATE FAIR**, Administration Building, Springfield, Illinois. Indicate in letter that ticket is for Horseshoe Pitching Contest.

All contestants **MUST** be bona fide residents of Illinois and as this is an NHPA sanctioned tournament, all players must have a 1964 Illinois State and National membership card. Cards will be available at tournament. Tournament entry fee will be the usual \$1.00 plus NHPA card and State Fair **EXHIBITOR** ticket. Time: Qualifying begins at 8 A. M., August 18 until **NOON**. Best score of 100 shoes out of 200, as in previous years. Top 24 in finals.

The annual Boys' state meet will take place on Wednesday, August 19. Entry fee will be \$1.00. NHPA membership is not required. Qualifying starts Wednesday morning, August 19, at 8 A. M. Round robin at 1 P.M. All boys under 18 years of age are eligible.



## 6th Annual Northwest (Penn.) Open Tournament

Jim Solomon of Uniontown, Pennsylvania, will be the defending champion when the sixth annual Northwest Pennsylvania Open tournament gets underway on July 25 and 26 at the Glenwood park courts in Erie, Pa.

There will not be any qualifying round as the ringer percentage of previous Northwest tournaments will be used. Players who have never played in the Northwest meet must send a copy of ringer percentage of any tournament played in during the last two years along with their entry fee which will be \$2.50. Players will be limited to seven games. Trophies for every five men entered.

Entries limited to 32 men per day (16 courts), therefore, entries will be accepted until spots are filled. By sending in your entry with fee of \$2.50 will guarantee you a place. 

The Westchester Horseshoe Pitchers Association for all future purposes recognizes the following classification of pitchers based on consistent ringer percentage:

Grand Master	70% and up	Skilled	30% - 40%
Master	60% - 70%	Talent	20% - 30%
Associate Master	50% - 60%	Novice	Up to 20%
Expert	40% - 50%		

1) The Westchester County Parks Department annual Horseshoe Tournament, held with the cooperation of the Westchester Horseshoe Pitchers Association, shall be held in three classes. Subject to change, as the abilities of pitchers develop, the championship class shall consist of pitchers designated in the "EXPERT CLASS" or above. The second class in tournament play shall be made up of only those players designated in the "SKILLED CLASS." The final class will be open to all pitchers up to 30% in ringers, including novices, the "TALENT CLASS" tournament.

Talent Class	August 15 - 16
Junior Class (up to 13, and 13-17)	August 22 - 23 (two age groups)
Championship, Expert Class & Skilled	September 26 - 27

2) A Classification board will be set up to designate pitchers in the various classifications by a certain date before the tournament. The Board will use all available data, including League records, as well as potential ability ratings. As the tournament time approaches, all pitchers in the tournament classes will be invited to sign up for tournament play. Any player who feels he has been underrated by the Classification Board may be upgraded on request so as to enter the tournament in the class he feels he should be in. Any player who is unknown to the Classification Board, and is a County resident, may be required to pitch a qualifying round of 100 shoes.

3) Participating pitchers in each class, provided there are more than eight (8) will be divided into two (2) evenly balanced seeded groups, by the Classification Board. Dependent on the number of entries, each of the two (2) groups in each class shall play a round-robin within itself of 24, 30, or 35 point games. The number of players entered, and the number of courts available shall determine how many points shall constitute a game.

4) The "finals" of both the championship class (expert) and the skilled class shall be 50 point round-robins of four (4) players, made up of the two (2) top players in each group bracket round-robin, in the respective classes. The same will be true of the Talent Class tournament. The Junior Class tournament rules will be adopted later. Trophies will be presented by the County Parks Department to four (4) places. The Westchester Horseshoe Pitchers Association will present the Junior trophies.

## World Tournament Rules And Schedule

### City Park, Greenville, Ohio — August 1-11

**Entry fees:** Men \$10.00, Seniors (players over 60) \$5.00, Ladies \$5.00, Juniors (players under 17) no entry fee. All must hold NHPA cards, (available at the tournament).

Seniors desiring to try for a place in one of the Men's other divisions will pay a \$10.00 entry fee instead of \$5.00.

Players who make the 36 man Championship Men's Class will pay an additional \$10.00 entry fee, those making Class "B" \$5.00 additional, those making Class "C" \$1.00 additional. These additional entry fees must be paid by 4:00 p.m. Thurs., Aug. 6th.

**Deadline for entries and qualifying:** Initial entry fees must be paid by 11:00 a.m., Wed., Aug. 5 and all qualifying attempts must be underway by 11:30 a.m., Wed., Aug. 5.

**Qualifying:** Starts at 12 noon Sat., Aug. 1 and at 9:00 a.m. Sun., Mon., Tues., and Wed., Aug. 2, 3, 4 and 5. No qualifying attempts to start after 10:00 p.m. any evening.

Qualifying shoes must be consecutive pitches, unless interrupted by weather, or some other unusual circumstance, in which case the player will resume as soon as possible where he left off, after an ample warm up.

Entries in the Men's division will pitch 200 qualifying shoes, the Seniors and the Ladies 100 shoes, and the Juniors 50 shoes. Seniors desiring to try for a place in the Men's division will pitch 200 shoes with the first 100 to count in the Senior division qualifying. Their choice must be made by noon, Wed., Aug. 5.

**Round Robin play:** Top 36 qualifiers to be placed in the 36 man Championship division, the next 32 in Class "B" and the next 32 in Class "C". Both Class B and C will be divided into four groups of eight players each for round robin play with the two in each group advancing to a title playoff round robin.

Seniors — top eight in Class "A" and the next six in Class "B".

Ladies — the top eight in Class "A", the next six in Class "B" and if the number of entries warrant the next six in Class "C".

Juniors — the top eight in Class "A," the remainder being placed in six man classes as far as is practical.

Games won and lost will determine standings.

A player must complete his schedule to be eligible for prize money, unless withdrawal is caused by injury, illness or death in the family. A player will have to resume play in case of illness or injury before forfeiting, and will be allowed one forfeited game. A second forfeit will result in forfeiting all games including those already played and won.

**Breaking ties:** All first place ties will be played off using the formulas recommended in the Horseshoe Pitcher's Manual.

Ties for other than first place which involve trophies will be decided by total ringer percentage for the awarding of the trophies, but the cash prizes will be split evenly between the players involved in all ties. Ringer percentages will determine the published rankings for all ties except for the first place play-offs.

Ties in the qualifying round for the last position in any Class will be decided by an additional 50 shoes to be pitched at noon, Wed., Aug. 5th. It shall be each player's responsibility to be present at that time in case such a pitchoff is necessary.

**General rules:** All players must be neatly attired on the courts and wear identification giving name, city and/or state.

Profane, vulgar or abusive language and other unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated and any guilty player will be warned once and then ejected from the tournament if a second violation occurs.

All protests and complaints during either the qualifying or the games must be made to the tournament committee at the time situation occurs. This includes distractions caused by spectators or other players. The committee can not keep all 18 courts and several thousand spectators under observation

at all times. Decision can not be rendered at the conclusion of a game or qualifying round so it shall be the player's responsibility to call attention to the situation at once. While every precaution will be taken by the tournament committee to keep a reasonable amount of order it must be that large numbers of spectators and a big entry list is part of the tournament's competitive conditions.

Referees and scorekeepers have only the responsibility of deciding close shoes and measurements and tabulating the score. They can and should, however, call the tournament committee's attention to any unusual conditions.

The Tournament Committee shall render all necessary decisions and shall consist of all the members of the NHPA Executive Council present. Harold Craig will have charge of general administration, Bob Pence will be tournament director, Glen Sebring in charge of the Ladies' event, Lester Georgina in charge of Junior play and Elmer Beller the Senior division. Lucille Hopkins will be in charge of trophies and special awards and Maurine Cook in charge of special events.





## "TIP FROM THE TOP"

By DR. SOL BERMAN

In bowling, we know that it's important to keep the shoulders square or parallel to the foul line, also parallel to the floor. The same thing is true in horseshoe pitching.

Dropping the shoulder or keeping the back foot planted often throws the shoe off line as shown in diagram.



The heavy line shows what happens if the right foot remains planted. The shoulders are not parallel to the foul line and the arm moves in an arc instead of a straight line.

If the right shoulder is dropped, the arm falls away from the body and an arc delivery is the result.





## Canadian Member Designs New Scoreboard

Mel Campsall, a member of the Vancouver, British Columbia club and also an NHPA member has come up with a new idea in scoreboards.

This entire scoreboard is hinged in the centre so it can be folded together for easy carrying and the two disks are secured in the centre so they can be rotated. The numbers from 1 to 12 down the middle of the board or centre piece are used as the counting numbers and the numbers from 1 to 50 around the circular disk define the score. The score on this particular board in the picture is 49 to 6.

To start the game both the black arrows on the disks must line up with the numbers on the centre pieces. To give an example in a game of cancellation I will say the first 2 shoes from each player have been pitched and the count is 3 to 0. On one side of the scoreboard you would put your finger in the slot next to the figure 3 on the centre portion of the board and move your finger down to the black arrow on the centre piece which will automatically stop your finger from moving any farther, thus rotating the circular disk and adding the score automatically. The same procedure is followed on the opposite side of the board for your opponent's score. This procedure is then continued after each end until one player reaches the final score of 50 points.

## World Tournament Warm-Up Open Tournament

The Clinton County club of Wilmington, Ohio, will sponsor an Open tournament as a preliminary Warm-Up tournament for all those players on their way to the World tournament. This tournament will be held at the City park courts in Wilmington, Ohio, on August 1 and 2. Round robin play will start at 1:30 p.m. All classes will be completed on Saturday except A and B which will play on Sunday, August 2, starting at 9:00 a.m.






