
"Snowball Open" Tournament

The Darke County Horseshoe Club's 1st indoor tourney will be held on weekends starting February 12, 1966. The weekend of January 22-23, 1966, will be open to anyone who wishes to qualify. Scorers will be at the courts both days. Those not wishing to qualify may send their 1965 State Tournament qualifying scores. There will be a ladies class if enough entries are received. Entry fee of \$3.00 must accompany qualifying scores. The deadline for entries is January 30, 1966. This will be a trophy tournament, two in each class for 1st and 2nd places. Players will be notified by mail the day and time they will be scheduled to pitch and all players are urged to be prompt.



NHPA Qualifying Committee Makes First Report

Mr. Harold Craig appointed a committee to study the problem of qualifying at the World Championship. Dr. Sol Berman of New Jersey was appointed as chairman, Marvin Craig of Indiana and Pat Marino of Arizona are the other members of the committee.

Dr. Berman spoke to as many contestants, spectators, and horseshoe pitchers as he could at the world's tournament.

The following objections were voiced against the present method.

- 200 shoes are not sufficient to establish one's average, thus eliminating 1. several good pitchers each year from the championship class. (Paul Focht, Landry, Dale Dixon).
- 2.
- Qualifying takes too much time; four full days were used at Keene, N. H. The qualifying judges don't all follow the same procedure, some meas-ure all close shoes, others don't measure any shoes. Many pitchers qualify well and play poorly in competitions, while others 3.
- 4. qualify poorly and play well in competition. (Lowest qualifier in Class B won the class at Keene, N.H.).

The committee would like to have each chapter bring up the problem at their meeting, discuss the following suggestions. Vote for the one they like best, or send me a suggestion of their own.

- 1. Retain the present method but instruct all judges to measure all close shoes.
- 2. Instruct all contestants at the World's Championship tournament to bring their ringer percentage with them. (The average of their best 3 tournaments during the season) (this eliminates tournaments held on poor courts or under adverse weather conditions). Place the entries into six groups, then form Round robin groups consisting of one player from each group.

1. 80% & Up.	If one group is too small move up
2. 75 - 80%.	a few players from the next larger
3. 70 - 75%	group. For example if group 2 is
4. 65 - 70%	too small, move up some 74%
5. $60 - 65\%$	pitchers from group 3.
6. 55 - 60%	

The winners of each round robin group plus second place finishers also some third place finishers with the highest ringer percentage bringing the total up to 36 qualifiers.

Increase the number in the championship class to 54 players. (3 groups 3. of 18 each) Each of the 3 groups to play a round robin (17 games). The top nine in each group to play the top nine in the other two groups for a total of 35 games. The winner being the one with the greatest number of victories.

The only difference between the last set up and the one used in the past is that the 27 top pitchers play only 35 of the 54 qualifiers. The lower 27 players only play 17 games.

World Tournament Dates Set For 1966

Dates for the 1966 World Tournament to be held in City Park, Murray, Utah, have been set for Monday, August 1 through Wednesday, August 10. There will be no competition of any type on Sunday, August 7.

A specific time schedule for the various phases of the event has not yet been arranged but an attempt will be made to shorten the amount of play in the 36 man championship division. in an effort to minimize the endurance factors now present in the round robin schedule. A number of plans are under study, including some forms of group play, but no change will be made until all factors have been carefully considered. The World Tournament has been held in Utah, 12 different times in past

The World Tournament has been held in Utah, 12 different times in past years, the last time being in 1959, so it will be almost like returning home in 1966.

The state association and the people of Utah have always been wonderful hosts and the courts are located in the middle of a beautiful scenic area.

The climax of the season was the arrival of "Big Time Horseshoe" as Keene hosted the world tournament. Although hexed by the weatherman, the small determined Keene horseshoe club showed the value of proper planning combined with a fine spirit of cooperation.

combined with a fine spirit of cooperation. Typical of other localites which have hosted the tourney, the Keene Horseshoers encountered both skepticism and lukewarm interest in some areas. However, the influx of families from all sections of the country and Canada, their deportment, the fine competition, and the effect on business has resulted in enthusiastic interest in a return of the tourney. Don Pickering of Keene topped New Hampshire pitchers for the second straight year. Art Wayne of Manchester and "old pro" George Buskey of Verse required the chief encestion to Dons' more the the chempionehin

Keene provided the chief opposition to Dons' march to the championship.

The Keene club sponsored the New England meet which saw popular, perennial Ed Landry of Fall River, Mass. once again pitch his way to the top. Art Wayne of Manchester showed that he needs only "tourney" experi-

ence to become one of New England's leading pitchers as he romped to the Manchester city championship. Newcomer Don Sawyer showed steady form to best such Nashua club pitchers as veteran Norm Durand and last year's champ, Fred Juknevich.

The state association held its annual meeting at Nashua and elected the following officers for the coming year. President, Frank Washer, Keene; Vice-President, Norm Durand, Hudson; Sec'y-treas.; George Buskey, Keene.

Nashua's bid for the 1966 state tourney was unanimously accepted. Innovations approved for next year will be a junior and women's meet as well as expansion of the men's "A" class to sixteen players. New Hampshires state dues will continue at 50¢ for 1966.

As New Hampshire hangs up the horseshoes (the courts are already snow covered) we'll be impatiently waiting for spring and depending on that old friend "The News Digest" to carry us thru the winter. Again, many thanks to all the visitors to New England and Keene during

the past season.

Donnie Roberts Wins Fish and Game Farm Tourney

1967 and 1968 World Tournament Locations Needed

The location of the 1967 World Tournament will be chosen by a vote of NHPA convention next summer during the 1966 World Tourney on the basis of sealed bids presented to the delegates. The convention also has the power to award the 1968 tournament on the basis of sealed bids, but the 1967 site will be the first order of business.

For a bid to receive consideration NHPA officers and delegates must be assured beyond all doubt that the proper facilities will be available in the form of 16 to 18 regulation courts equipped with good clay, proper stakes, and a suitable lighting system for night play. Bleachers to accommodate the spectators, facilities for posting the results and some type of shelter to provide office space for the tournament officials are also necessary. Another item is a place for the NHPA to hold its annual convention and business meeting.

Under normal conditions the NHPA considers that \$4,000.00 is a minimum for the financial portion of the bid. This money will be added to the entry fees to provide approximately \$6,700.00 in cash prizes and to pay other NHPA expenses in connection with the tournament. Total cost of the tournament for the NHPA averages around \$7,700.00 with the difference being made up by the NHPA from its treasury. This money from the NHPA funds comes not from memberships but from the sale of game related items such as trophies, scoresheets, percentage charts and the like.

Any bid which is presented should be a responsible one in order to merit consideration and not just words and promises on paper. In other words the NHPA officers and delegates must be assured beyond all doubt that the facilities and financial provisions will be met.

Now is the time to lay the groundwork in preparing to make a bid for the 1967 and 1968 tournaments. When this groundwork has progressed to a reasonable point an NHPA official should be called in to meet with the responsible parties. This will enable everyone concerned to proceed with more understanding and assurance.


