Mt. Pleasant, Penna. Open Tournament, July 23-24

The Mt. Pleasant Horseshoe Club of Pennsylvania announces they will hold an open horseshoe tournament on July 23 and 24. This event will be open to any player belonging to the NHPA and will be held at the Rainbow Gardens approximately one mile south of Mt. Pleasant on Bridgeport St.

Qualifying for this event shall consist of submitting any two sanctioned published tournament averages since May 1965. If a pitcher does not have two tournament averages since May 1965, he may submit his last tournament average, or if he doesn't want to use the averages he has, he can qualify by throwing 100 shoes at the following places: Erie, under Joseph Peters; Beaver, under Herman Boyer; Washington, under Robert Hummell; Dormont, under Mike Riedl; and Mt. Pleasant, under Robert Myers. A maximum of two attempts will be allowed. Ten ringers will then be subtracted from the qualifiers score to place him in the tournament. All entries must be postmarked by July 11 and sent with the pitcher's address and qualifying fee of \$3.00 to Robert Myers, 107 Liberty Avenue, Mt. Pleasant, Pa. 15666.


The tournament will consist of 40 men, 5 classes of eight. Each player will be notified of his pitching time and class. Should a pitcher not be able to make the competition, his entry fee will be refunded. Trophies will be awarded to the winner and runner-up as prizes in all classes.

From The Office of The President . . To All N. H. P. A. Members:

In a recent News Digest issue. I'm sure most NHPA members were shocked to read that Bob Pence, our National Sec.-Treas., was going to resign at the end of his term in 1966.

I have received many letters and much comment at various tourney sites, as to what a real dilemma the NHPA might be in by trying to find a re-

placement if he should resign.

The most surprising thing is that few members know what has transpired in the eight years Bob has been Secretary-Treasurer.

Bob's job as Sec.-Treas. has grown in scope to a point, where it is im-

possible for him to handle his duties properly.

To say the least, the whole NHPA has been suffering from growing pains, especially during the past five years, since the World Tourney site has been moving around in the U.S.

As a matter of record our membership will have almost tripled, since Bob was elected to office, eight years ago. News Digest subscriptions and news content have doubled in this same eight years.

A few years back the World Tourney was comparatively simple to run. Today the World Tourney has become far more complex. The "B" class has increased in size. New "C" and SENIORS classes have been added. There have been many more groups in the LADIES and JUNIOR classes. Although Bob has had some help with these tourneys, the real lion's share has rested on his shoulders to see that each one runs smoothly.

Bookkeeping chores have more than tripled, over eight years ago. His

present correspondence runs as much as 50 letters in a single week.

Bob has been handling most of the fund raising items such as horseshoes,

printed materials, and trophies.

To this end much needed help will now be coming from DONALD KOSO, 2124 WILSON ST., FALLS CITY, NEBRASKA who will take over the job of handling horseshoes and printed materials. (see notice elsewhere in the Digest). Bob will still handle trophy orders.

After a lengthy talk with Bob recently he stated the World Tourney is one big problem keeping him from getting more members and keeping closer harmony in the NHPA by working with State Secretaries, Park and Recrea-tion Departments, and other organizations. I have promised him help on this

by way of a committee to do the detail work.

On further conversation he stated that under the lighter work load, he was willing to be a candidate for the National Secretary-Treasurers job again, subject of course, to the election at the 1966 Convention at Murray, Utah.

As a final statement, I do not wish to prevent anyone from running for National Secretary-Treasurer or any other office of the NHPA. I do want to make it clear, why Bob Pence wanted to resign earlier this year.

Jim Woodson of San Antonio, Texas was a close winner over Jim Copenhaver of Bartlesville, Oklahoma in Class C. In Class D Davis of Tulsa took first and Holley of Okla. City took second.

Lewiston-Auburn, Maine Club Dedicates New Courts

Dedication Ceremonies and the First Annual L & A Invitational Horse-shoe tournament on June 5th attracted many spectators from all parts of Maine. Publicity thru several newspapers, radio and TV stimulated interest and, new members as well. Local and State officials took part in the inaugural program.

The courts will be made available for use by the Lewiston Recreation Department and the general public. The L & A Club's summer Handicap League will be played three nights a week. This league has proved to be very popular. The Maine State Tournament will be held here also in August.

Maine Association president Roger Bolduc, with the able assistance of L & A Club president Porter Clark, paved the way for the successful completion of this ideal pitching plant. Once planned the courts were constructed within the short span of three months in order to be ready for a June 5th Invitational tournament and dedication ceremonies. Club members kept costs to a bare minimum by working nearly every evening and weekends throughout the spring months installing pits, stakes, blacktop, landscaping, etc. Outstanding services were provided by clubmen Rosaire "Lefty" Tardif, Dom Pepin, Clyde Lane, Bob Sirois and Joe Pelletier. The Lewiston Recreation Department and its Director Frank Torrey were of invaluable assistance.

The courts cover an area 250 long and 100 feet wide on land provided by the City of Lewiston in the Marcotte Park area. Courts are encircled by a cyclone wire fence; have forty-foot black top walks extending between each pair of pits; has a combination concession and club headquarters building and three sets of bleachers for spectators. More than ample parking is available. A lighting system will be installed this fall.

Donations, subscriptions and a raffle provided the necessary finances for this project. Many local business firms donated generously — and in return received associate membership cards from the L & A Club. Special Certificates of Appreciation will be presented to all concerned in the near future.

The Lewiston & Auburn (Maine) Horseshoe Club membership soared from a mere 18 members in 1965 to over 100 members within six months. This overwhelming 550% increase, was due in part to the installation of 20 New Clay Courts.

A bright spot was the interest shown by women who wished to join the local club and enter competition in the near future. L & A Club officials expect to sign up another fifty members during the summer.

COVER PICTURE . . . Shown this month is the newly dedicated 20-court installation of the Lewiston-Auburn, Maine club. The courts cover an area of 250 feet in length and 100 feet in width. They are complete with blacktopped walkways, encircled with a cyclone fence, a club building and bleachers for spectators. The club president, Porter Clark is responsible for this new plant with the assistance of many of the L and A club members.

AAU Juniors Tournament - Kansas City, Mo. - July 30-31

Lauren Hill Winner of Hillsboro, Oregon Open

Lauren Hill of Portland, 1964 state champion, compiled a perfect 9-0 mark to win Class A crown in the first sanctioned open of the year at Shute Park in Hillsboro, Oregon, May 22nd. Bob West, five times Oregon champion, and inactive the last two years, was runner-up with a 7-2 record. Cool and rainy, with patches of sunshine, the weather held the ringer percentages down for most of the pitchers. The high ringer percentage game of the day was an 85.3 thrown by Bob West, but consistency paid off for Lauren Hill.

It has been noted that in some areas of the country that a total point system is being used to break ties for other than first place. Our pregame ruling was to this effect and the results may lift a few eyebrows. In Class A please note that the ringer percentage for Chapelle is higher than that of Hampton but Hampton's total points put him in third place. The same holds true with Miller and Petersen. Miller had more total points yet compiled 3% less ringers than Petersen. Davis and Burt were tied with games won of 3-6 for 7th spot. If Burt could have picked up only five more total points he would have placed ahead of Davis even though he had 8% less ringer percentage! In Class B the ringer percentage in ties would have made only one change. Voorhies would have taken 4th place from Sears with our regular tournament rules. The only reason I can see for using this total point system is when there is a lack of scorekeepers. We have been very fortunate here in in Hillsboro to have a good working group of men and women and have never lacked for scorekeepers. As long as this continues we will never again try this total point method for breaking ties.

Another point I would like to make is figuring ringer percentages. This is well explained in the book by Ottie Reno, The Story of Horseshoes, on page 124. I have skimmed over this many times but until I actually figured it out both ways (as in Class A true and false percentages) it never really struck home. Ottie's article says, "To determine ringer percentage for more than one game, divide the total shoes pitched for all games into the total number of ringers for all the games. I have seen many pitchers total the ringer percentage for all their games and divide this figure by the number of games. This would not give the correct ringer percentage unless all games lasted an equal number of shoes." The false ringer percentage shown in Class A was reached by adding the individual percentages of each game and dividing by 9 games pitched. Note that Chapelle's % turned out the same figured both ways. The others varied as much as 2.3% off. In most cases it appears that the false method of getting your ringer percentage gives you a higher average.

A discussion among some of the players has been the 30 ft. pitching distance for ladies and juniors. We have only 12 courts here so can not afford to have any of them at only the 30 ft. distance. Consequently we have a yellow painted board imbedded 10 ft. in front of the pegs. Some say that this board is the foul line and some say they are allowed one step in front of the board. If the peg were at this board spot, it seems that one step in front would be allowed. I believe the rules should be clarified and specifically state that the

board be placed 13 ft. in front of the existing pegs (on 40 ft. courts only of course) and show this board as the foul line. Of course, if in national tournies, they must play only on 30 foot courts and the pegs are placed only at that distance there would be no need for clarification as they would be entitled to that one step beyond.

Our forty man turn-out for this tourney, was excellent for this early in the year. It appears that we may have at least six men from Oregon who are going to Murray this year. With warmer weather now just around the corner most of the ringer percentages will jump up about 8-10% and we should make

Qualifying round to start at 9:00 a.m. and close at 12:30 p.m. Match play to start at 1:30 p.m. There will be four classes: A-B-C-D. Each class will consist of six men who will play a round robin to determine the winners of that class. Trophy to champion in each class, also premium awards in each class, thru sixth place.

All games shall be for 50 points. All participants are eligible to two qualifying rounds at an entry fee of \$1.00 for each round. The 24 qualifiers for the four classes are required to pay entry fee of \$1.00 each to participate in

the finals.

All contestants not qualifying for the official matches will be eligible to participate in a consolation match. Premium checks for winners will be mailed promptly after the tournament if preferred. Paul Focht of Dayton, Ohio, is defending champion.

All entries will pitch 100 shoes for placement. A \$2.00 qualifying fee will be charged. Players may qualify from 2 p.m. until 10 p.m. on Saturday August 20th. and from 7 a.m. until 10 a.m. on Sunday August 21st. DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME. All players qualifying on Saturday afternoon or evening may pitch a second 100 shoes by paying a \$1.00 additional fee. This second 100 shoes must be pitched immediately following the first 100. The highest score will be used.

There will be 12 players in Class A, including the defending champion. Class A will have two groups of six men each. The top man in each group will play for the 1966 "Corn Belt Championship." All games will be 50 point cancellation. In the event of a tie for any position in the group round robin, total points will break the tie. If the points are tied, ringer percentage will

be used.

This is a rule of the Illinois State Fair Board. It entitles holder to admission to the fair each day of the fair. Cash premiums will be awarded as in the past together with trophies for winners in each class including the boys.

Boys' tournament will play on Wednesday, August 17, beginning at 8 a.m. Entry fee will be \$1.00. NHPA card is not required for play. Each will pitch 50 shoes for qualifying score. Top 8 will play in the finals.

The sympathy of the Ohio Association and the N.H.P.A. is extended to



Henson Winner Of Warm-Up Meet Held In Washington, D. C.

An informal spring warm-up horseshoe tournament was held on May 15,

1966 for the metropolitan area of Washington, D. C.
The District Recreation Department represented by Mayo Pittman and Allen Bertschy promoted this tournament to develop interest in the game and to learn of local players. Although a group of 30,000 Viet Nam demonstrators assembled near and marched by the courts, the tourney proceeded successfully in spite of traffic and parking restrictions.

The tournament was played on 12 courts, using 24 players who were divided into 4 groups of A, B, C, and D Classes. Each class was given a chart with a 6 man round robin schedule and the players did their own score keeping on a win or lose basis. A registration plan was substituted for qualifying (because of late arrivals) which aided in classifying the players and also in learning of their playing desires by answers to these three questions:

(1) Do you play horseshoes several times a week, month, or year?

(2) Would you be interested in playing in 2, 4, or 6 tournaments a year?

(3) When you pitch 10 horseshoes, do you generally average 2, 4, or 6 ringers?

C. C. Henson, several times state champion of Virginia won the tournament. Also participating in the Class A group was John Burnam who at the age of 74 plays horseshoes daily. The District Recreation Department cooperated by printing the announcement and furnishing 4 medals and 1 trophy. We plan to have more tournaments this year.

as reported earlier in the "Digest."


Nebraska under the leadership of Don Koso has already exceeded its

The old standbys of Indiana, Ohio, Southern California, Iowa, Illinois and Pennsylvania have all made a good start.



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
