



The insignias of championship may be obtained in advance of a tourney or afterwards by a letter of request. These letters of request must be sent to Mrs. Charley Hopkins, NHPA Vice President, 124 South Cherry Street Ottumwa, Iowa 52501, who is in charge of this item for the National Assoc.

The number of sanctioned tournaments and the number of classes has increased tremendously in the past couple of years. The price of insignias has also gone up. Consequently a limit of one to a member has been placed on the awarding of these championship insignias regardless of how many tourney classes an individual has won during the season.

# Horseshoe Pitching Introduced In Keokuk, Iowa Senior

### **High School Gym Classes**

### By HERMAN GILPIN

Sometimes dates are difficult to remember, but I believe I will always remember Oct. 3, 1966.

On this date Mr. Bruce Van Dever and his assistant Mr. Terry Glasgow started their gym classes on pitching horseshoes. Mr. Van Dever asked me to come to the first class to help explain the game to the boys. He is going to use the NHPA rules and teach only the  $1\frac{1}{4}$  and  $1\frac{3}{4}$  turns.

He has a copy on Mr. Reno's book and the NHPA book How To Do It and Roy Smith's Science at the Stake.

Members, when you see such a program as this started, you can see what a need there is for good material along this line. Mr. Van Dever is to be commended for such an understanding.

Mr. Van Dever and Mr. Glasgow handle these young boys as only two men of their profession and skill can do. K.H.S. boys again prove their skill and training by catching on very well. Classes are 20 to 60 boys. None of the boys were allowed to handle the shoes until the safety rules

were explained around the courts. Then the 11/4 turn grip and swing were explained. Movements were made without throwing the shoe by the students. Then the same for the  $1\frac{3}{4}$  turn way. The students then took over the 5 courts and it was a picture to see these teachers walking up and down the line of boys helping with their problems. It could only have been done by two professional teachers as smoothly as Mr. Van Dever and Mr. Glasgow. The boys tell me they are firm, but fair, "We like them." As usual, I was the first to panic. At court 4 or 5 the boys really yelled.

I thought something serious had happened. And I guess it had. One young boy was pitching ringers on like Isais, but not nearly as often. It was amazing what a good start these boys started with.

If more of this kind of training were done in the schools, I am certain we would have a lot more good young pitchers.

The boys were told about conduct on the court. Now they know that this is one game where sportsmanship is the highest and that nothing is done to hinder the other man's pitching and a hand shake is almost always given -win or lose.

Back to the kids. At the end of each class, the shoes are placed in a certain area for the next class. Don't you older kids wish you were back to school at Keokuk Senior High?

As a lot of you know, there is a great deal of work in getting a program of any kind like this started.

We wish to thank Dale Dixon, Carl Steinfelt, Dr. Billy Williamson, George Collins and you, the pitchers of NHPA, too.

Mr. Peters, principal of Keokuk High School, was one of the first to see the need of a game like this, realizing all boys don't make football and basketball due to size, handicaps and etc. Yet here is a game of skill, science, psychology, and sportsmanship at

its best. Mr. Peters has long known and still believes there is something in all game besides winning. He too is to be commended.

When these boys progress a little more in the game, I am going to give the coaches a trophy to give a boy.

It was explained to me that some other clubs or members might want to give a trophy, book or something for this program. If you do, please write to Herman E. Gilpin, 1717 Johnson St. Keokuk, Iowa

### Indoor Courts Installed In Fargo-Moorhead YMCA

"The distance appears shorter indoors," one horseshoe pitcher observed. "It's just like daylight," said another. "And no rain or mosquitoes either," said still another.

These are the observations of horseshoe pitchers who have headed for cover for the winter in Fargo-Moorhead, Minnesota.

Two regulation clay courts with sideboards have been constructed in the basement of the Fargo-Moorhead YMCA. They are in use for six hours a week — every Monday and Thursday night. Interest in the indoor game has caught on fast with some of the pitchers switching their bowling nights to have an opportunity to keep their pitching arms in shape. "It's really going to help us for a fast start in the spring," Harold McDonald of Moor-head said. "I'll be down here every chance I get." McDonald and Gust Magnuson, also of Moorhead, along with Henry Wisness of Fargo went to work to build the courts after heaving of the possibility of having a place work to build the courts after hearing of the possibility of having a place to play.

Idea for the indoor courts came about as interest builds for the 1967 World Horseshoe Tournament to be held at the Fargo Park District's Oak Grove courts, Fargo, N. D., July 30 - Aug. 8, 1967.

A couple of the regular pitchers in the Red River Valley League have not joined the indoor league because of a fear their shoes might hit the 11-

hot joined the indoor league because of a fear their shoes might nit the li-foot ceiling or lights. Most of the pitchers have made the transition and seldom have a shoe leaving the box. It's a rarity when one of the shoes bounces onto the concrete after hitting the peg. Dick Sisler, general secretary of the 'Y' said he believes it is the first time horseshoe has been played in a YMCA in the United States. Horseshoe league members pay a club fee to the 'Y' or receive pitching privileges by becoming full-fledged YMCA members.



# Knauft In Successful Quest For Washington State Title

In his toughest game. he outmaneuvered John Monasmith, former world champion, throwing 105 ringers out of 124 shoes while Monasmith hit the peg for 103 ringers in the same number of tries. In that game they tossed 34 "four deads". They also set the best ringer percentage for a single game, Knauft, 84.6 percent, Monasmith, 83.0 percent. Monasmith set a new ringer percentage record by tossing 726 ringers out of 864 shoes for an average of 84.2 percent for 14 games. 
