Fund Raising For Publicity

The publicity program headed by the new NHPA Publicity Director Will Gullickson announced elsewhere in this issue will require financing in order to be successful and productive.

For many years it has been said by many with complete truth that the biggest need of the NHPA and the game of horseshoe was better press coverage and public relations. The problem has been discussed in every NHPA convention for years and each time the chief stumbling block has been a lack of funds.

Hiring a public relations firm or professional publicity director requires far more money than the NHPA has or can raise. Heretofore it has been left to the NHPA Secretary and President to do the best job they could in this field, but they are immersed in too many other details.

Now that we have in the person of Will Gullickson someone who is familiar with and dedicated to the game and is at the same time qualified to head a publicity drive we must take advantage of the situation.

Accordingly NHPA President Ralph Dykes announces the following twopronged fund raising program.

1. Individual donations with each individual listed in the News Digest. Many persons have indicated their willingness to donate to such a fund with amounts ranging from \$50.00 down to one dollar.

2. A horseshoe court registration whereby both individuals and clubs recister the courts in their area by means of a donation to the publicity fund. This listing of courts will also be carried in the News Digest each month giving the number, type and address of the courts. Horseshoe courts both private and those in public parks will be listed. There is no specified amount but it is suggested that \$1.00 per court be the standard.

All funds raised in this manner will be kept in a separate account handled by NHPA President Ralph Dykes and used exclusively for our Publicity Program.

Darke County, Ohio, Club Enjoys Winter Pitching

The winter pitching program of the Darke County, Ohio, Horseshoe Club is off to the best start ever at their winter courts at the County Fairgrounds. For the fourth year three courts have been installed in the 4H Building and the Club has handicap leagues operating four nights a week. There are seven pitchers in each league and they follow the 8-man schedule with one man sitting out each game.

All points are counted in the 50 shoe games and each man is handicapped at 90% of the difference between his average (for 50 shoes) and 120. Handicaps change each night as in bowling. This type of pitching has proven very popular as it gives the lower class pitchers a chance to compete against the best and, with a chance of winning. The N.H.P.A. Financial Picture

The unexpected action of the delegates at annual NHPA convention in Fargo last summer which raised the membership dues from \$1.00 to \$1.50 properly raises the question of why and also what is the financial picture of the N.H.P.A. HERE ARE THE FACTS:

1. The cost of playing horseshoe and the membership dues of the NHPA are far below that of all other sports and games.

2. There was no increase in the membership dues of the NHPA in the last 25 years or in the subscription price of the monthly magazine since it was established in 1956.

3. At the same time the costs of operating the NHPA and of publishing the magazine has increased tremendously. Postal rates have doubled and will increase again in a few months. The cost of printing and other items have gone up steadily.

4. Despite the increased publishing costs the size and content of our monthly magazine has doubled since 1956.

5. The revenue from membership dues and subscriptions is not enough to pay routine office expenses and the cost of printing and mailing the monthly magazine.

6. The revenue from entry fees and the bid of the local or host club is not enough to pay the expenses of the annual World Tournament.

7. The difference has been made up by the profits from the sale of game related items such as trophies, shirts, caps, horseshoes, scoresheets, etc. The sale of trophies has been the biggest single item, and these sales has enabled us to increase the size of the magazine, enlarge the World Tourney and pay the increased office expenses without raising dues or subscription rates.

8. The NHPA is solvent and has a policy of maintaining a reserve of approximately \$6,000.00 in order to meet any emergency which might arise during any given year. Except for this reserve fund all money the NHPA receives is put back into the organization's program.

9. The NHPA has no paid officials. The small amount allowed the editor of our magazine and the Secretary-Treasurer does not even begin to reimburse them for the travel and other expenses they incur.

10. There are two areas in which the NHPA needs more revenue in order to make it more effective. One is to increase the size and improve the content of our monthly magazine. The other is the need for a really effective publicity program which will improve the general image of the game.

11. The increase in dues and the new Booster Membership plan will be used to improve the magazine and at the same time mount an effective publicity program headed by Will Gullickson who is a NHPA officer, player and also a newspaper sports writer.

I had copies made and sent them on to "Pop", which will make it easy for him to resume where Marvin left off.

All the members of the Committee were selected because of their many years of horseshoe pitching background, and can back to the earlier years as well as the present day participants. I also endeavored to select personnel that was either already in the Hall of Fame or one, to my own thinking, would not be likely to be a candidate to be elected this year.

Every NHPA member has the privilege of making his own selections. If you are going to make a selection, DO IT NOW. Your selection should be in the hands of one or more of the Committee members by March 1. There is a lot of work that has to be done between the time of the new electees to the Hall of Fame are elected and then inducted at the World Tournament at Keene, New Hampshire next August.

One of the next projects I have to tackle is to process the suggestions that were dropped in the box at Fargo and those that have been received in the mail since. Anyone submitting a suggestion (that signed their name to it) will receive a personal reply as to the action taken on it. Joe Abbott of Erie, Pennsylvania, Don Pickering of Keene, New Hampshire, Robert G. Pence of Gary, Indiana and myself will act on all of these suggestions.

I would like to thank everyone that sent me congratulatory messages on my election as NHPA president, also for the Christmas and New Year's greetings sent to us. We received many cards from people all over the country. In closing, may I extend to each of you my very best wishes for the coming

year and leave you with this thought . . .

Third Annual "Snowball Open" — Greenville, Ohio

The third annual indoor "Snowball Open" tournament, sponsored by the Darke County Horseshoe Club, will be held the weekends of February 17-18 and 24-25 in Greenville, Ohio. During the weekend of February 10-11 the courts will be open to those who wish to qualify for the tournament. Those not wishing to qualify will be placed in classes based on their results in the 1967 State Tournament in which they participated. Those who did not pitch in a State Tournament and who do not wish to come to Greenville to qualify may pitch shoes at their home courts. Their score, attested to by a Club Officer, should be sent in with their entry. The deadline for entries is February 11, 1968.

This will be a "trophy" tournament only with trophies awarded to the first and second place winners in each class. Lower classes will pitch the first weekend and all pitchers will be notified by mail when they are scheduled to pitch. The entry fee is \$3.00. Checks should be made payable to the Darke Country Horseshoe Club and mailed to Harold Anthony, RR 2, Arcanum, Ohio.

The tournament will be held at the Darke County Fairgrounds on U. S. 127 and Ohio 49 South. There will be a lunchstand at the courts with motel and restaurant accommodations nearby.

BOOSTER (non-playing) MEMBERSHIPS

Delegates at the NHPA Convention in Fargo last Aug. passed the following motion:

The NHPA will in 1968 on a one year trial basis issue an Honorary or Booster (non-playing) Membership card at \$1.00 each, the revenue to be divided equally between the state and National Associations, and the national share of this revenue shall be used by a Publicity Committee to promote and improve the public image of the game.

Therefore the NHPA will issue each State Secretary a supply of BOOSTER (non-playing) MEMBERSHIP cards which will be pink in color and not to be confused with the regular white membership cards.

These will be sold at \$1.00 each with the State Association retaining 50¢ in its treasury with the remaining 50ϕ being sent to the National office. There are provisions on the Membership & Subscription forms for reporting these memberships.

Bear in mind that the holders of these BOOSTER (non-playing) Member-ship are boosters only and will not be eligible to play in sanctioned tournaments which require the regular (white) membership cards.

However a Booster Membership card may be turned in at anytime for a regular membership card by paying the difference in the dues. This BOOSTER MEMBERSHIP GIVES YOU THE OPPORTUNITY TO

INCREASE THE REVENUE OF YOUR STATE ASSOCIATION. Non-players, friends, fans and the general public will be willing to donate \$1.00 for this Booster Membership. These same individuals might not be willing to pay the

The event will be one of the highlights of the Winter Show which runs March 1-10. A 32-man limit of pitchers last year included some of the area's leading tossers.

Irv Koslofsky, manager of the Winter Show, is interested in having 1967 World Champion Dan Kuchcinski of Erie, Pa., either compete in the tourney or to make an exhibition performance.

or to make an exhibition performance. Koslofsky is going to meet with Red River Valley League officials from Fargo-Moorhead about the possibility of inviting other top-flight pitchers for the event.

Valley City is located 50 miles west of Fargo, which was the site of the 1967 World Tournament.

Meanwhile, pitchers in Fargo-Moorhead, Kindred and Minot are keeping their eyes sharp by pitching indoors. F-M pitchers are using the Red River Valley Fairgrounds pavilion in West Fargo.

Kindred has two courts in Edwin Overboe's warehouse and Minot has installed its first indoor courts in the Armory. Nine courts have been set up at Minot with league play to start Jan. 7. Officers are Ken Newman, Marlowe Johnson, Ron Newman, and Sid Hohman.



In Memoriam

Marvin Chrisman of 213 Vine Street, Connersville, Indiana 47331, one of the most valuable and highly respected N.H.P.A. members, passed away December 7, as the result of a coronary attack.



At the time of his death he was serving as Chairman of the Hall of Fame Selection Committee, a post he had held with distinction since the Hall of Fame was started.

Marvin was a real veteran of the game and a glance through the pages of the old Horseshoe World reveals that he was active in the NHPA not only as a player but as an organizer and promoter as far back as 1930. He helped form the Connersville

He helped form the Connersville Horseshoe Club and served as its President and business manager for 30 years. While he was not an officer of the club at the time of his death, he was regarded as its elder statesman. The club is one of the oldest continuous groups in the U.S.

He also served several terms as President of the Indiana State Association and was always on hand to help in administering the association's tournaments. He also directed several annual tournaments in his area such as the Fayette County Free Fair Tourney.

Those who attended the 1967 World Tournament at Fargo, N.D. will recall that he was the Master of Ceremonies at the Hall of Fame induction, one of the highlights of the tournament.

He was a familiar figure at all Indiana and Ohio tournaments for many years, his last appearence being in the Indiana-Ohio Open of last September. He competed in the 1960, 61, 62 and 1964 World Tournaments, placing in Class B of the 1962 event.

No one can match the love and dedication with which Marvin Chrisman served the NHPA and the game of horseshoe.

Publicity Program Underway

A program has been set in motion by NHPA President Ralph Dykes to give the game of horseshoe more publicity by bringing it to the attention of the daily press, radio and TV and thereby improving the image of the game in the eyes of the general public.

Will Gullickson has been appointed NHPA Publicity Director and charged with the responsibility of formulating and developing a program. No better choice could be made for in the ranks of the NHPA he is the only individual with the necessary tools in the way of background, talent and connections to do the job.

Will is not only a better than average horseshoe pitcher in tournament competition, he is an NHPA Vice President, Secretary of the Red River Valley Horseshoe League in Fargo and Minnesota State Association President.

More important he is a professional sports writer, holding down a job in that capacity on the Fargo Daily Forum. He knows the sports writing game in all its angles and therefore has the necessary contacts with the press as-sociations, radio and TV sportscasters and sports editors around the country.

Whatever else is said of the 1967 World Tournament all agree that the press, radio and TV coverage was the best ever and this was directly the result of our new NHPA Publicity Director's efforts.

His job now will be to not only publicize the 1968 World Tourney in Keene, N. H., but to also focus attention and publicity on the game in general in such a way that all benefit from local clubs up through the various state associations. Improving the general image of the game and stimulating the public's interest will make it much easier for local clubs and groups to im-prove their conditions and enable new groups to get started. A successful program will require more than the individual appointment of Will Gullickson or the waving of wand. Big NHPA Membership Gain in 1967

The NHPA had a big membership gain of almost 500 members in 1967, marking an all time high and the 10th year in succession that there has been an increase.

At the same time subscriptions to the monthly magazine showed a gain, the highest since the publication was started in 1956.

The NHPA wishes to express its thanks and appreciation to those key individuals and the state and local associations whose hard work and cooperative effort has made this record possible.

Here in capsule form is a state by state report in alphabetical order.

Alaska — On the NHPA roster for the first time but has no state organization.

Alabama -- Has a small state chapter which is trying to expand under the guidiance of W. C. Jones in Robertsdale.

Arizona — Showed a small gain in 1967. Valley of the Sun Open in Mesa is always a popular event with out of state players each winter.

Arkansas — Has individual members but the NHPA has never gotten a chapter started.

California, North — One of our biggest and most active chapters. Had a small loss in membership but a gain in subscriptions in 1967. This is a well organized group and will be under the direction of new officers in 1968 with Herschel Morrison of Modesto as secretary.

California, South — Another large and active chapter which showed a small loss last year. Veteran player and administrator, Jim Weeks is doing a tre-mendous job as secretary in a chapter with many big sanctioned events. Colorado — Had a big 1967 gain thanks to the efforts of reliable Eino Tiilikainen, the state Secretary from Colorado Springs. Connecticut — Had a small membership loss in 1967 but is still above its

annual average. Ervin Van Dyne is a veteran and experienced secretary.

Delaware — On the NHPA roster for the first time and the NHPA hopes Willard Sammons of Seaford will get a state organization started.

Florida — Has a very active winter program under the direction of John Rademacher particularly in the Tampa bay area. Draws many northern players for winter tournaments. Needs more local talent, and Hal Porter's publicity efforts should help in that respect.

Georgia — Has no official chapter but there are enough individual NHPA members to form one. A few years ago we had no Georgia members.

Idaho — A small but active chapter with activity centered in Boise and Lewiston.

- Home of both the NHPA President and the editor of the "Digest" Illinois the state has a large membership which showed a gain last year. The annual state tournament is most unusual in that it is held at the state fair, under the shelter of a huge tent on a 12 court layout. All Illinois members are News Digest subscribers.

Indiana — Largest of the state associations for many years, it held its total in 1967 and showed a gain in subscriptions. The state has many big clubs and probably has more horseshoe courts than any other including layouts of 16 or more courts in Frankfort, Muncie, Kokomo, Connersville and Richmond. The club at Anderson is probably the leading group in the state at this time. The biggest problem is more tournaments and activities than is practical. President Walt Wilhoite and Secretary Earle Wilmore have done exceptional work.

Iowa — Always a hot bed of horseshoe activity the Hawkeye state had a big increase in membership last year. No state secretary is more efficient or dedicated than Lucille Hopkins.

Kansas - Also showed a good sized membership increase in 1967 and Secretary Roland Kraft, formerly a great player, expects even more in 1968. Kentucky — One of the real bright spots in the NHPA picture. A state

chapter was organized in 1967, a successful state tournament staged and the future looks good for increased participation in the Blue Grass State. Lavern Hawkins was the organizer and it now appears that many fine local clubs in Covington, Lexington, Frankfort, Louisville, Ashland, Georgetown and else-

where are working together to the benefit of all and at the same time retaining their own local programs where doubles play predominates.

Louisiana — On the NHPA roster with individuals only.

Maine — Here is a closely knit well organized group with the big 18 court layout in Lewiston-Auburn serving as base. Bill Hood and Roger Bolduc doing a great job as officers with good cooperation from the membership.

Maryland and District of Columbia — Horseshoe activity has been dormant in this area for some 15 years since the death of NHPA President Pop Woodfield, but now Allen Bertschey has things moving again in the nation's capitol, and NHPA membership has really increased here.

Massachusetts — Had a good sized increase in membership and subscriptions and a very active program thanks to the efforts of Secretary Ralph Forsstrom, who has been the hand behind the wheel in New England for many years.

who has been the hand behind the wheel in New England for many years. Michigan — Ranks 4th in NHPA membership and showed another gain in 1967. Had the largest representation at the World Tournament in Fargo. Has the best indoor setup in the country at Ray's Recreation in Dimondale and the largest set of privately owned courts in the country, 18 in the backyard of Dyke Cowell in Weston, equipped with lights and clubhouse.

Michigan Peninsula — Too far removed to be a part of the Michigan State Association, but there is lots of activity here in the form of doubles leagues. The NHPA hopes to assist in the forming of an overall organization and Regional Director Earl Grable has laid the groundwork.

Minnesota — There is lots of horseshoe played in Minnesota which had a big increase in NHPA membership last year. John Yernberg has succeeded Andy Paglarini as secretary. There are many fine local clubs and leagues in the state. Alexandria has a very active Women's league. Duluth's Municipal League is 100% in NHPA membership and one of the largest in the country. "Hots" Anderson heads this club.

Mississippi — Has only a few individual members, but a Gulf Coast group is interested in obtaining an NHPA charter.

Missouri — Another good horseshoe state had a good sized increase in membership in 1967. H. P. Heidel of Rosebud is secretary, and the state has many fine open tournaments.

Montana — Was represented at the World Tourney for the first time in many years. The state has an active NHPA chapter headed by Herman Jensen of Culbertson. Geographic distances are a big handicap.

Nebraska — Don Koso is doing a fine job as NHPA regional director and state secretary and membership should show a steady increase here. The new group at Crete is very very active.

Nevada — Has individual members only, but the NHPA hopes to get a state chapter started.

New Hampshire — Will be the scene of the 1968 World Tournament at Keene next August. Has a large membership with big groups at Keene and Manchester. Don Pickering, George Buskey, Mal Georgiana, Freddy Melvin and others working hard for the big tournament.

New Jersey — Has a big increase in membership last year. The Middlesex club headed by Hal Hanania and state secretary Ronald Vogel has things moving and is in the process of expanding. Hopes to land the World Tourney in the near future.

New Mexico — Had a good increase in membership and activity in 1967. Albuquerque has the biggest club, but other activity at Morarity, Gallup and elsewhere is on the upswing. Jim Gibbs is secretary.

New York — Another state showing a good 1967 increase with more to come from some new clubs and leagues being formed. Lockport with a fine women's league is probably the outstanding local club. West Chester county, Hornell, and Corning also have fine clubs, as has Jamestown. Joe Pollock of Binghamton has been secretary for many years.

Binghamton has been secretary for many years. North Carolina — New officers headed by Hugh Hampton and John Corns brought an increase in membership. They took the place of Randall Jones who bore the organizational burden for many years, but had to give it up because of personal business commitments. There is real horseshoe potential

in the Tarheel state. Winston-Salem, where Joe White of the Park Dept. is

In the Tarheel state. Winston-Salem, where Joe White of the Park Dept. is very cooperative, is the horseshoe hub with fine courts in Miller Park. North Dakota — Horseshoe activity is growing by leaps and bounds in this area thanks to the impetus of the 1967 World Tourney in Fargo, the influence of the Red River Valley League and the individual efforts of Will Gullickson, Henry Wisness and others. The club at Kindred headed by Rudy Lykkens has a wonderful layout in a beautiful park and is probably the best small town club in the country. Jamestown, Minot, Grand Forks, Bismark and other cities already have NHPA affiliated clubs, or are in the process of forming one.


Ohio Buckeye - The second largest NHPA chapter had an increase in 1967 membership and is probably the best organized of all the states. Leo McGrath, Sam Goodlander and the Fochts are hard and dedicated workers, who get things done, and they have a lot of outstanding horseshoe players and clubs to work with.

The Darke County Club at Greenville is probably the best local group and the NHPA hopes the World Tournament will soon return to this spot where such outstanding tourneys were held in 1962 and 1964, probably the best in our history. In addition to the annual state tournament this club annually holds two of the biggest open events in the country, the Greenville Open the first weekend in June and the Ringer Classic on the 4th of July Holidays.

Oklahoma - NHPA membership held about even in this state. Activity is higher than it was a few years ago.

Oregon — Another state with a fairly large NHPA membership held its own

in 1967 and is a little higher than it was a few years ago. **Pennsylvania** — A really big horseshoe state both in talent and in the number of players, especially in the western half. The Erie club is truly one of the

very top local clubs and will host the 1968 World Tourney. It is the home of the present world champ, Danny Kuchcinski. Regional director Herb Pinch of Sharon is secretary and Joe Abbott of Erie is president.

Rhode Island — The NHPA still has a number of longtime members in this our smallest state.

South Carolina — The NHPA sells trophies to a group in the state but has never been able to enroll members or form a state chapter.

South Dakota — Had a very large membership in both 1966 and 1967 and is almost always the first to report each year. Leigh Dunker, a veteran southpaw pitcher, is a reliable state secretary and it looks as if the state will exceed its 1967 membership.

Tennessee — A sudden change in officers resulted in a decrease in membership during 1967, but it is still one of the largest in the NHPA. Ben Haskopf, who retired as secretary, built a good foundation and his successor, Dexter Stallings, promises more activity in 1968. Knoxville, Elizabethton, Cleveland, Oakridge, Jefferson City and Piney Flats all have active groups. Most horseshoe is in the eastern end of the state.

Texas - Had a nice increase in 1967 and prospects for the future are bright. The Lakeside club in San Antonio is the leading local group and Jim Woodson of that club is now state secretary succeeding Matt Bowers of Houston who along with B. E. Sipple of Houston had kept the Organization going for many years. State champ, Rev. Marvin Burgess of Ballinger is also a big booster. The new blood and vigor being supplied by Woodson and the San Antonio club should bear fruit in the future.

Utah — Illness of Reiny Backer was a handicap in 1967. Nevertheless the game is still flourishing in the Beehive state, thanks to the efforts of Maurine Cook. Given the proper help and cooperation, Utah horseshoe will regain its former position at the top.

Vermont - Showed an increase in 1967 memberships and with the World Tournament in its backyard prospects are bright in 1968.

Virginia — After reaching an all time high in 1966 membership there was a drop in 1967 membership, but activity has increased. The new Winchester club has provided a shot in the arm to give some much needed aid to the Lynchburg and Richmond groups.

West Virginia - Membership increased in 1967. Bernard Hull of Parkersburg is the new secretary, succeeding Anna Lindquist, who did the work so well for so many years. Wisconsin — A new Wisconsin organization gave the NHPA its biggest

membership gain of the year and is covered elsewhere in this issue.

Wyoming - Despite the handicap of distance between cities in the Big Sky country, Wyoming had an increase in membership. The new group at Riverton, home club of the national Junior champ, Ferron Eiseman, is a shot in the arm. In the last few years the Laramie club has come to the front.

Canada — NHPA memberships north of the border held steady after reaching an all time high in 1966. The prime need in Canada is to get the various goods in the different provinces together. The North American Open staged indoors in Toronto was a noteworthy event, the best tourney ever held in the Dominion, but it still lacked players from the western provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. There are many players there and good ones. The NHPA has members in all of them along with Ontario and Quebec.

Wins and losses are figured on a 5 point system. Each team has four players. All games are walking games of 50 shoes each. At the end of each game or round the scoresheets are collected and added together to see which team won the round. Total points for the night's play decides who gets the fifth point.

Some of the highlights have been several games in the high 70's. As yet no one has managed to break 80 percent. Don Coy of Beresford had a high game of 78 percent. Many have hit 76 percent. The Vermillion club had a team average of 62 percent on one evening for all games played. Players come from a distance of 50 miles, which speaks well of the league, being what the South Dakota winters are.


