

### In Memoriam

Russell Johnson of Otterbein, Ind., vice-president of the Lafayette Horseshoe Club, died May 23 of lung cancer after a short hospitalization.

His loss is a blow to the Lafayette Horseshoe Club and the Indiana State

Association, both of which send their sincere sympathy to the family.

Coupled with the heart attack suffered by Bill Turner, Secretary of the Lafayette Club, the Joe Schilling Memorial Open scheduled for June 1 and 2 was cancelled and all entry fees returned.

### Kansas, Illinois Open Tournament — July 14

The Kansas, Illinois club will stage its annual Open Tournament, on Saturday, July 14 at their club courts located on Rte. 49 and Rte. 16, midway between Terre Haute, Indiana and Mattoon, Illinois. Entry fee will be \$2.50 and qualifying rounds will start on Saturday, July 13 and Sunday, July 14 until 12 noon. There will be four classes, with eight men in each class. Trophies will be awarded to the first three places in each class. Round robin play will start at 1 P.M. on Sunday, July 14.

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### **World Tournament Information**

Schedule of Events - for qualifying and round robin play was announced in the March issue of the Digest and will be followed unless weather conditions

force a change.

Men's Division - Entry fee \$10.00, Current NHPA membership card required. Qualifying — 200 shoes. The top 36 qualifiers will be placed in the Championship Class A, the next 32 in Class B and the next 32 in Class C. Ties for the last spot in any class will be decided by a 50 shoe pitch off. Deadline for entries will be 12:00 noon, Wednesday, July 31 and the first qualifying shoe must be in the air at that time. Players making Class A will pay an additional \$10.00 entry fee, Class B \$5.00 and Class C \$1.00.

Women's Division — Entry fee \$5.00. Current NHPA membership card required. Qualifying 100 shoes. Classes will consist of from eight to six players each depending on the number of entrants. Ties for the last spot in any Class will be decided by a 30 shoe pitch off. Deadline for entries will be 10:00 P.M. Tuesday night, July 30 and the first qualifying shoe must be in the air at

that time.

Senior Division - for players over 65 or who will reach their 65th birthday anytime during the 1968 calendar year. Entry fee \$5.00, NHPA card required. Qualifying — 100 shoes. There will be three classes consisting of from 6 to 8 players each. Deadline for entries will be 10:00 P.M. Tuesday night, July 30 and the first qualifying shoe must be in the air at that time.

Intermediate Division — for players between 60 and 65. Players who will reach their 60th birthday anytime during the calendar year of 1968 will be eligible. Entry fee and qualifying details the same as in the Senior Division.

Special note - Players may enter and pitch qualifying shoes in both the Men's Division and the Senior or Intermediate Divisions but they can pitch in ONLY ONE of the round robin finals. The choice of which of the round robin finals will be theirs to make.

Junior Boys Division — For boys who were under 17 at the start of the calendar year of 1968. No entry fee. Qualifying — 50 shoes. There will be three or more classes consisting of from eight to six players each. Deadline for qualifying will be 10:00 PM Tuesday night, July 30.

Girl's Division — for girls who were under 17 at the start of the calendar year of 1968. No entry fee. Qualifying - 50 shoes. Deadline for entries will be 10:00 PM Tuesday night, July 30. Size and number of classes will depend upon the number entries. Finals will be held Wednesday, July 31.

### Annual Eastern National, June 22-23 — Erie, Penna.

The Eastern National Tournament will be held at the Glenwood Park courts, Erie, Pa., June 22, 23. Class A (16 men) will pitch Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon. Other classes Saturday afternoon, evening and Sunday afternoon.

Entry fee \$5.00, plus nominal scoring fee. 100% entry fee returned in prize money. New camping grounds now open near private lake.

### New 36-Man World Tourney Schedule

A new 36 man round robin schedule will be used in the 1968 World Tourna-

ment at Keene, N. H. July 27 through August 6.
Qualifiers 7 through 36 will never play the top 6 qualifiers (commonly called "Murderer's Row") in successive games. These games will be spaced out

through the first 30 games of the 35 game schedule.

In the past, the old schedule called for everybody to play the members of murderer's row (the top 6 qualifiers) 6 successive games in one night. Now qualifiers 13 through 36 will not have to play the top 6 qualifiers more than 2 games on any one night. Qualifiers 7 through 12 play the top 6 qualifiers 1 game the 3rd night, 2 games the 4th night and 3 games the 5th night.

The new schedule is the same as the old schedule on the final night, when qualifiers 1 to 6-7 to 12-13 to 18-19 to 24-25 to 30 and 31 to 36 each play the

other 5 men in their own groups.

All 630 games are played on exactly the same courts as the old schedule.

### Preparations Made For Annual Missouri State Tourney

Plans for the largest Missouri State Tournament are under way. We are including a class for Junior boys in the 1968 Tournament to be held on August 23, 24, and 25th at the Missouri State Fairgrounds, Sedalia, Missouri. No qualification will be required for youths under 16 years of age by tournament date. We plan to pitch the Jr. boys class on Saturday evening August 24 at approximately 5:00 P.M.

All Missouri pitchers will be qualifying for the State Tournament on July 13th and 14th at five district areas. They are Kansas City, Springfield, Sedalia, Owensville and St. Louis. In case of rain can qualify anytime 3rd week of July up to July 21, 1968. Entry Fees and scores should be sent to Earl Winston, Route 1, LaMonte, Mo. 65337. Will have 9 classes.

Hats off to three excellent pitchers in the Class B section. Richard Maroni, Frank Kilinsky, and Clair Bruce ended the round-robin in a tie for first place, with all three shooting over the 70% mark. Richard then defeated both men to

win the championship.

Class C saw John Fulton, many times Pennsylvania State Champion, pitching better than he has for some time. All of us that saw him expect to see him have a great year in 1968.



Two all time great pitchers, Charles "Casey" Jones and Charles Court "C. C." Davis, along with one of the most likeable promoters in the game, Harry "Pop" Woodfield, will be enshrined in the Hall of Fame this year at Keene, New Hampshire.

CASEY JONES, while still a teenager, pitched in his first World Tournament in 1935, finishing in a tie for 6th place with Frank Jackson. Until 1954 Casey pitched in nearly all the World Tournaments, finishing in the runner-up spot many times. During this period, along with Isais, Zimmerman, and Allen, he was rated as one of the top four pitchers in the World. It is almost unbelievable that he was not fortunate enough to have won the championship at least once. Casey has been Wisconsin State Champion 16 times, but he is probably remembered best for the world's record he established, which still stands, during the 1948 World's Tournament. Thirty-two players participated in this tournament and he averaged 87.5% ringers for the 31 games. In 13 of these games he threw 90% or better. After 1954 Casey left horseshoe competition and took up bowling. He has also made a great record in that game, and now owns a bowling establishment in Plymouth, Wisconsin. Recently he bowled on TV (WBAY in Green Bay) for 16 consecutive weeks, averaging 233+ pins per game. In the roll off for the championship he had a 730 series. Casey is expected to be at Keene for the Hall of Fame presentation ceremonies.

C. C. DAVIS was considered one of the most colorful personalities in the horseshoe world in his time. He pitched a very wobbly one and three-quarter turn shoe, wore knickers both on and off the courts, and they were almost considered a trade mark of his. He has traveled into practically every corner of the United States playing exhibition matches and doing trick pitching. He won his first World Tournament in 1922, repeated in 1924, won both the winter and summer tournaments in 1927 and won his fifth World Title in 1928. In the 1928 tournament he was the first pitcher to average better than 70% ringers for an entire tournament. In the 1933 World Tournament, at the Chi-

cago World's Fair, he tied with Ted Allen for the title but lost in the play-off. Mr. Davis was a carpenter by trade, and is now living in Kansas City, Missouri.

POP WOODFIELD served as NHPA President from 1941 to 1948 and was credited with being largely responsible for holding our organization together during those trying years. He also edited and published a mimeographed booklet when we had no other means of communication. He was a very successful promoter of the game in the Washington, D. C., area where the Washington Daily Star sponsored an annual tournament at Monument Park in co-operation with the Park Department. As NHPA President he contacted President Harry Truman, helped install courts at the White House, and arranged for several exhibitions featuring Jimmy Risk. Admiral Nimitz was also interested in,

and played, the game. Pop passed away December 6, 1950.

These three will now join those others who were previously selected to the Hall of Fame: Ted Allen, Fernando Isais, Frank Jackson, Putt Mossman, and Guy Zimmerman as players; and Archie Gregson, David D. Cottrell,

Raymond B. Howard, Arch Stokes, and Elmer Beller as non-players.

In addition to the three selected, twelve players and eight non-players were nominated. These listed alphabetically were Curt Day, Dale Dixon, Paul Focht, Chairman of the selection committee was James Johnson, Cincinnati, Ohio.

Other members of the committee were Elmer Beller, Bellflower, California, Eino Tiilikainen, Colorado Springs, Colorado, Carl von der Lancken, White

Plains, New York, and Lee Jacobs, Belleville, Michigan.



A special Tartan rubber manufactured by the 3 M company in St. Paul rested on a partially inflated inner tube in the box. This was especially made for the exhibition by Carl Gaetke of the St. Paul Club, who believes he will eventually have a marketable product to be used for indoor pitching.

The Tartan substance is used for many indoor college fieldhouses and outdoor tracks and has been a big success.

Red Roland, the ambitious horseshoe promoter from Billings, Mont., sends along the idea that a college scholarship fund be set up for Danny Kuchcinski. Roland took a fancy to The Kid while Danny was on tour in Montana.


