



CANADIAN ASSOCIATION NEWS

At our recent membership and executive meetings, it was decided that all tournaments would be held indoors to avoid any possible conflict with weather conditions. Also, that a new scoring system would be adopted for all tournaments which were conducted by our Association. This scoring system was devised by George Schummer who put a great deal of time and effort into perfecting the details of handicapping. The Schummer system has several advantages with the primary ones being that there will not be time lost in qualifying, the games on all courts should finish at relatively the same time and, most important, it permits the forty and fifty per cent ringer players to have a fighting chance of defeating the seventy and eighty per cent ringer players at any tournament. Consequently, tournament play should result in far more competitive play and greater interest for all players. This new scoring system is too complex to describe in this notice and the best way to observe and judge its merits is to come out and participate in our tournaments.

Mauker and Anthony were the top qualifiers in the 54 man tourney, each scoring 80%, 260 and 259 points. Top ringer game in the Championship Class was Knisley's 85.9% effort against Bob Redding.

topped this division.

Awards included trophies to top 2 men in each class, a new pair of horseshoes to each class winner and Knisley took home the Carl Young travelling trophy.

Pence, Hohl and Day to Be

National Secretary-Treasurer Robert Pence, World Champion Elmer Hohl, and former World Champion Curtis Day, have been selected to be enshrined in the Hall of Fame this year at Erie, Pennsylvania. For the first time all of those named are from the modern day era. Although it is felt there are many "old timers" who deserve the honor of being enshrined in the Hall of Fame, it is indicative of the esteem held for the accomplishments of those named, that they should be selected at this time.



BOB PENCE must, without doubt, be possessed with an undying love for the game of horseshoes. No one person, anywhere, has done more to promote the game than Bob. He is a prolific writer of articles of interest to horseshoe pitchers, and travels thousands of miles each year as proof of his untiring efforts in boosting his favorite sport. When Bob is conducting a tournament you can believe everything is going to run smoothly.

Bob has been associated with the promotional part of the game so long many do not know he has also been a good horseshoe pitcher, averaging better than 70% in tournament play. He pitched in his first tournament in 1927 and joined the NHPA in 1928. This year he will be eligible for the Intermediate Division.

Bob was Secretary of the Indiana Association for five or six years before being elected Secretary-Treasurer of the National Association in 1958. Since then he has been largely responsible for many beneficial changes in the Association such as holding the World Tournament in different sections of the country, resulting in an increase in the number of entries and membership in the Association. A record number of entries (351) was established in 1967 at Fargo, North Dakota. He also added to the World Tournament Classes B & C, a Senior Division, an Intermediate Division, and additional classes as necessary to the Junior Boy's and Junior Girl's Divisions. He also started the NHPA handling sales of game-related items and the treasury balance has increased from \$3000 to approximately \$7000. Since he has been Secretary the News Digest has doubled in the number of subscribers and most important, the membership in the Association has been tripled.



ELMER HOHL really gave our game an international flavor by becoming the first foreigner to win the World Championship. The likable Canadian first won the World Tournament in 1965 and repeated in 1968. And how he repeated! First he broke the qualifying record for 200 shoes with 572 points and 186 ringers. In tournament play he had 14 games better than 90%, including one perfect game, won 35 games without a loss, and broke another record by averaging 88.5% for the entire tournament. This eclipsed Casey Jones' record of 87.5% which had stood since 1948. This phenomenal average was nothing new to Elmer as he had averaged 88.9% in the the Eastern National Tournament and 88.4% in the Greenville Classic. Elmer entered his first world tournament in

Enshrined in Hall of Fame

1960 and has never finished worse than fourth. In 1962, although he finished third, he had the highest ringer percentage (83.2) of any player in the tournament. Elmer has won the Canadian National Championship nine times in the last 10 years. The thing is, he is still pitching, but what can he do for an encore?



CURT DAY is one of the best horseshoe pitchers in the Nation today. He consistently has a ringer percentage average in the mid-eighties in all tournaments he enters. He was Indiana State Champion in 1953, 1955, 1957 and 1959 through 1968. He has won the Midwest "Ringer Round-Up," one of the large open tournaments, 10 times out of the last 13 years it has been held. He has pitched in the World Tournament since 1956. In 1957 at Murray, Utah, he pitched the great game with Ted Allen, losing 50-49 with 155 ringers in 174 shoes for a ringer percentage of 89.0, including 69 doubles and 54 "four deads." Allen also had 155 ringers. In World Tournament play since 1960 Curt has finished fifth twice, fourth twice, third once, second twice, and in 1966,

with a high ringer percentage of 86.6, he won the Championship. He also had the highest ringer percentage in 1964 with 84.4, and again in 1965 with 86.0%. Curt had some sickness last year and could not compete in the World Tournament. However, he was able to come back and retain his Indiana Champion-ship and Indiana-Ohio Championship. So, like Elmer Hohl, he is still pitching, and undoubtedly there will be more to come.

There have now been nine players and seven non-players voted into the Hall of Fame since its inception in 1966. Former players selected were Ted Allen, Fernando Isais, Frank Jackson, Putt Mossman, Guy Zimmerman, Casey

Jones and C. C. Davis. Former non-players were Archie Gregson, David D. Cottrell, Raymond B. Howard, Arch Stokes, Elmer Beller and Harry Woodfield. Other players receiving votes this year, listed alphabetically: Dean Brown, Fred Brust, Dale Dixon, Paul Focht, Chas. Gerrish, Sue Gillespie, Roland Kraft, Mrs. C. A. Lanham, Frank Lundin, George May, John Monasmith, Blair Nunamaker, Harold Reno, Jimmy Risk, Carl Steinfeldt, and Vicki Winston. It is interesting to note that four women received votes, so perhaps we may

soon have a lady in the Hall of Fame.


