# 1970 WORLD TOURNAMENT INFORMATION Saturday, July 25 Through Tuesday, August 4

### South Gate City Park, South Gate, Calif.

Entry Fees — Men's division \$10.00, Women, Intermediates and Seniors \$5.00 each. There is no entry fee for Junior and Girls.

Successful qualifiers in Men's division will pay an additional fee of \$10.00 in the championship 36 man class, \$5.00 in Class B and \$1.00 in Class C. Qualifying Round — 200 shoes in Men's division, 100 shoes in Women's, Seniors and Intermediate divisions, 50 shoes in Junior and Girl's divisions. Only one qualifying attempt will be allowed each entrant in all divisions.

Deadlines - The men's division deadline will be 10 a.m., Wednesday, July 29, and all qualifying shoes must be pitched by noon of that day. The deadline for entries in all other divisions will be 9 p. m., Tuesday, July 28 and all qualifying shoes must be pitched by 10 p. m., of that day. Men 's Division will consist of a 36 man championship Class A, a 32 man

Class B and a 32 man Class C.

Senior Division for players over 65 or who will reach their 65th birthday anytime during the calendar year of 1970. There will be an eight man Class A, a six man Class B and a six man Class C.

Intermediate Division for players between 60 and 65. Players who will reach their 60th birthday anytime during the calendar year of 1970 will be eligible. There will be an eight man Class A, a six man Class B and a six man Class C.

Special Note — Players may enter and pitch qualifying shoes in both the Men's division and Seniors or Intermediates, but they can pitch in only one of the round robin finals. The choice will be theirs and there will be no refund of entry fees.

Women's division will consist of eight players in Class A and six players in both Class B and C.

Junior Boy's Division for players who were under 17 at the start of the calendar year of 1970. Class A will contain eight players, Class B, C and D will consist of six players each.

Girl's Division for players under 17 at the start of the calendar year of 1970. Classes A and B will consist of four players each playing a double round robin schedule.

Special Note — If any division does not have enough entries to fill the scheduled classes the number of classes in other divisions will be increased accordingly to fill the gap.

### From Here And There

Of interest, is the fact that Mildred Kuhne, a beautician in Tacoma, Washington has held the women's title in that state and also the ladies' crown in the annual Northwest tournament staged in that area. Washington state has a very active group and plays winter horseshoes in league style.

### Eastern National Tournament — Erie, Pa., June 19-21

Pitchers wishing to play in the Eastern National Tournament to be held in Erie, on June 19, 20, and 21 will be required to qualify by pitching 100 shoes at the Erie Courts. Qualifying will be held on June 13, 14 and also Friday evening, June 19 and Saturday, June 20 until noon. Qualifying will terminate at noon and tournament pitching is expected to begin at 12:30 p. m. Saturday. Pitching will continue through Saturday evening and on Sunday until the tournament is concluded. Class A qualifiers will begin Saturday, at 6 p. m. and again on Sunday, so they may complete a 16-man round robin. Lower classes will pitch Saturday afternoon and continue as courts are available. ### Madison, Nebraska Spring Open Meet Set For May 3

The Madison Spring Open tournament will be held at the Madison fairgrounds in Madison, Nebraska on May 3. Supreme D (over 25 percent); Middle D (over 20 percent) and Low D (over 15 percent).

There will be 6-man round robins in each class. Ribbon awards will be given to every pitcher giving his percentage where he finished. Rubber courts will be used.

Qualifying will start on Saturday, May 16 in the afternoon. Scores may be mailed in together with the entry fee of \$3.00. Finals will be held on Sunday, May 17. There will be classes for all pitchers including a ladies class and a junior if enough are available. Trophies will be awarded in the men's classes. Also awards to the ladies and juniors. Marvin is 36, has a wife, Fay, and two sons, David, 12, and


In 1959 Marvin joined the NHPA and established the Virginia Chapter. He has been State Secretary ever since. He has done much to promote horseshoes in Virginia. So


