Art Kamman Takes Arizona Valley Of Sun Open Title

When the wind died, the dust cleared, and the sound of horseshoe ebbed at Rendezvous Park this past weekend, February 22nd, Art Kamann of Mesa was the 1970 Valley of the Sun Open Tournament champion. He was victorious in the 12-man Round Robin with a field of classy pitchers, of which nine were from California, including its state champion. His only loss came from the former Kansas State champion, Marines Tamboer in a thrilling game 50 to 48.

Jonas Snyder of Southern California had the single high percentage game with 84.5% ringers.

John Pratt of Northern California took second place money, with Tamboer of Kansas third, and another Northern Californian, Lloyd Potter picking up the fourth place check.

In Class B it was Marvin Rehis of Kansas the winner. Curtis Wold of North Dakota had the highest percentage, but finished second, with young Jim McKissack of Phoenix a surprise third, and Mike McBride of Utah fourth.

Class C ended in a tie and there was a play-off between Verne Beard of San Diego and Bill Cork of Reno, Nevada. It went down to the wire with Beard the winner 50 to 48. Roger Branine and Al Cauchon of Kansas and Southern California finished third and fourth respectively.

Clark Bell of Southern California was winner in Class D without a loss, with Bill Hyde of Missouri the runner-up. Wally Shipley of Southern California was third and Ed McKay of Washington fourth.

A large crowd of spectators viewed the event both days.

Jim Knisley, genial promoter from Bremen, Ohio, invading the new Day-Bell indoor courts at Dayton, Kentucky, for the first time found them very much to his liking, however, he found plenty of competition as he pitched his way through 5 opponents to win the Day-Bell indoor invitational match.

In his game against Harold Anthony of Arcanum, Ohio, he was down by 20 points, but came back strong to win 51-48. Jim "Pop" Johnson from Cincinnati, Ohio was up on Knisley but lost out on the final 6 shoes.

By virtue of his 5 victories, plus his 77.8 percent ringer average, Jim took home the first prize money of \$100. Harold Anthony of Arcanum, Ohio was runner-up with a cool 76.9 ringer percentage. Bill Henn of Bellevue, Kentucky was third with a nice 71.8 percentage.

Shamrock Open — San Antonio, Texas — March 21-22

The formal start of the Texas pitchers' season will begin with the Shamrock Open on Saturday and Sunday, March 21 and 22 on the courts of the Lakeside Club in San Antonio, Texas. To make this opening tournament more exciting, the Lakeside Club hopes to have their Horseshoe Astrodome ready for this thrilling event. It is expected that the entire six courts will be covered with a curved type construction that will keep out the elements in case of inclement weather. Construction of this enclosed area was started in January and if the construction schedule is maintained, completion will be finished by the Shamrock Open. It will be the first structure specially engineered for horseshoe pitchers.

The Shamrock Open will again present lots of classy competition. In Class AA, Jim Woodson is the present holder of the Shamrock title. However, Rev. Burgess, 1969 Texas champion, Joe Robinson, former champion of New Mexico, Matt Bowers, Bob Graham, Archie Roach of Denton and many others are out to win the Shamrock. All divisions from AA to E will be open to horseshoe pitchers. Competition in the women's and boys divisions will also be scheduled.

Another feature coinciding with the Shamrock will be the extra good fishing for channel catfish in the lake at Lakeside Club.

Officers are: James Hilton — Georgetown, President; (served full term as 1st vice-president) Jimmy Noble, Louisville, 3rd vice-president; Mrs. Edith Hill — Frankfort, 4th vice-president; (re-elected unanimously).

Because of the election of our First vice-president to President it became necessary to fill that office and duly elected was Elmer Webb — Cold Spring, Kentucky to be First vice-president. Mr. Webb has served us well as our Third vice-president and has been our sole representative at the last two World Tournaments.

Oregonian Bob West Wins Western States Indoor Open Redwood Acres Fairgrounds, Eureka, California

The Western States Open tournament was held on the Redwood Empire Horseshoe Pitching Club's indoor clay courts at the Redwood Acres Fairgrounds Exhibition Building in Eureka, California on January 24th and 25th, 1970, and was promoted by the Redwood Empire Horseshoe Club.

This tournament was considered successful for many reasons. The fact that 72 pitchers were present to participate in this indoor tournament, and the weather did not keep these pitchers from traveling from the north, near the Canadian border, and from the south, near the Mexican border, also from the east in the Reno, Nevada area.

The Redwood Empire Horseshoe Pitching Club was confident that all details that could be controlled were taken care of. This was the case as the only problem that occurred was the weather. This, however, did not bother any of the pitchers after they arrived safe at the court area. Road conditions were not the best for the late arrivals and did delay the return trips of some for an extra night.

The indoor clay courts provided excellent playing conditions and all pitchers found that indoor pitching can be very enjoyable. For some of the pitchers it was a first experience to pitch on indoor courts.

The Redwood Empire Horseshoe Pitching Club was pleased and proud of the attendance of players and spectators. The crowd at times exceeded 250 people.

To accommodate the number of classes required and to allow all players a chance to pitch, tournament play was started at noon on Saturday and continued until 12:30 A. M. The final five games of Class A and B were played Sunday starting at 10 A. M. Group No. 5 of the men's pitched at noon Sunday, pitching in the club's permanent winter quarters which has six clay courts.

This indoor tournament is believed to be the largest indoor event ever held on the West Coast and even within the United States.

The winner of the Class A was Bob West of Scappoose, Oregon. Bob won 10 of his 11 games. His only loss was in his second game, when John Pratt of Sacramento, California defeated Bob 52 to 37.

Highlights of the tournament were: Bob's ringer percentage for the entire tournament was 75.2. Bob also had the highest single game percentage of 83.8. The final game of the tournament was between Bob West and John Walker, each having won 9 games and had only 1 loss. This game was a fitting climax to this tournament as Bob is the current Oregon State champion and John Walker is the current California State champion. This game was nip and tuck all the way with the score being tied four times at 13, 16, 19 and 48 points each. The lead changed eight times before Bob West finally won 51 to 48.

Class A had four games over 80% ringers. Bob West had three with games of 81.3; 81.9 and 83.8. Don Titcomb had a high game of 80.7%.

The longest game of the tournament was 102 shoes between Lloyd Potter, San Jose, California and Al Richardson of Independence, Oregon. Lloyd won this game 55 to 48.

There were 16 four deads in the game between Jon Snyder of Chula Vista, California and Jesse Gonzales of San Luis Obispo, California, this game went 88 shoes. The longest string of consecutive double ringers was 10. This was pitched by Jerry Schneider twice and Don Titcomb once.

The Class B title was won by Ron Miller of Woodburn, Oregon. Ron won 10 games and had only one loss. His percentage was 61.5. Ron's only loss was to Winnie Winetrot of Lummi Island, Washington. The score was 46 to 52.

Highlights of Class B were: the high percentage game was pitched by Fred "Flash" Lavett of Seaside, California, a game of 81.3. The longest string of consecutive ringers was six, and three pitchers made this list: C. Floyd Goldsmith of the local REHPC, Fred Lavett of Seaside, California and John Reedy

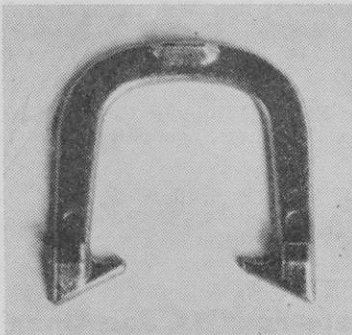

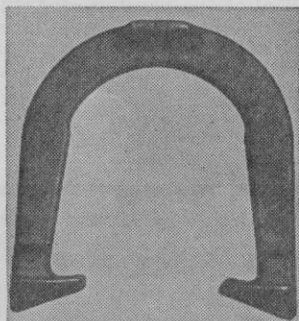

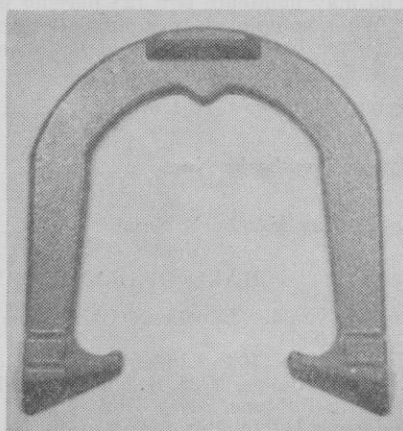
