Horseshoe Hall Of Fame Selection Committee

The 1971 selection committee of the Horseshoe Pitching Hall of Fame will consist of the same 11 members who served last year by virtue of their appointment by NHPA president Ralph Dykes. The committee will function under the direction of its chairman Carl von der Lancken.

Recommendations will be submitted by the committee to the 1971 NHPA convention next August for approval of selected individuals for induction

into the Horseshoe Pitching Hall of Fame.

The general membership of the NHPA is asked to participate by making nominations and sending in their ideas and suggestions to any or all of the committee members not later than June 1.

The report of the committee chairman, Carl von der Lancken, to the 1970 convention in South Gate stressed that there was a real danger a number of worthy individuals dating back to the pioneer days of the game would be passed over and entirely forgotten because players of the present era and immediate past are much better known and have built a voting advantage.

Accordingly NHPA president Ralph Dykes has instructed the committee chairman, Carl von der Lancken, to install a voting formula that will eliminate this danger and make sure that all worthy and qualified individuals from the distant past will be given due consideration.



COVER PICTURE This month we present one of Pennsylvania's outstanding pitchers, Clyde W. Martz of Pittsburgh.

Clyde won the 1970 Pennsylvania state title without a loss, which is no easy feat in Pennsylvania. His climb to the top climaxes an eighteen year struggle up through the C and B classes. He served notice of his serious intent with the very impressive 10th place finish in the 1970 World Tournament. Few pitchers have worked harder to achieve, and few could be more deserving.

In addition to being an active pitcher, Clyde is president of the Pennsylvania State Association. As evidenced by the admiring smiles of his wife, Connie, and his daughters, Susan, Holly, and Kathy, he is also a devoted family man. In his spare time he manufactures horseshoes, is an expert table tennis player, and likes music and photography. Clyde is a nuclear physicist for Westinghouse, where he deals with atomic research. The horseshoe pitching fraternity in Pennsylvania is proud to honor such a champion.

Minutes Of The 1970 N.H.P.A. Convention

The 1970 N.H.P.A. convention and annual business meeting was held Thurs., July 30, 1970, starting at 9:30 a.m. in the Municipal Auditorium of South Gate City Park in California.

The meeting was called to order and conducted by president Ralph Dykes. There were 32 states represented by 92 voting delegates. A moments silence was observed in honor of those members who had passed away during the year.

Secretary Robert Pence read the minutes of the previous convention which were approved as read upon motion by Davis (N.J.), seconded by Shepard (Mass.). Curt Bestul (Wis.) reported for the Auditing committee consisting of himself and Jim Weeks (Calif.). The report stated that the NHPA books of Treasurer Robert Pence had been checked and audited and found to be in complete order.

Secretary-Treasurer Robert Pence read the summary of the financial report that showed a balance of \$7,003.37 at the start of the fiscal year July 1, 1969, and a balance of \$6,463.71 at the end of the fiscal year July 1, 1970. Upon a motion by Winston (Mo.) and seconded by Cork (Nev.), the report was ap-

proved without dissent.

Reports of the NHPA officers and Executive Council; Hal Hanania extended a welcome to all players and members to come to Middlesex, N. J. for the 1971 World Tournament. Jerry Schneider thanked all the players, members, delegates and their families for coming to the 1970 tournament in South Gate, and extended the welcome of the South Gate club. Leo McGrath thanked the NHPA for its aid to the Greenville Ringer Classic which drew 257 entries for a weekend tournament.

President Dykes reported the disappointing response to court registrations

and the "You Pick the Winners" contest.

The report of the Horseshoe Pitching Hall of Fame selection committee was given by reading a letter from committee chairman Carl von der Lancken

(N.Y.) who was unable to be present. Motion by Anzaldi (Minn.), seconded by Dubie (Ga.) called for approval of the committee report and the induction of Vicki Winston (Mo.), Ellis Cobb (Ill.) and Blair Nunamaker (Ohio) into the Hall of Fame. The motion carried by a unanimous vote and president Dykes declared the three individuals official members of Horseshoe's Hall of Fame, observing that Vicki was the first woman to be so honored.

Allen (Colo.) discussed the foul line problems but no action was taken. West (Ore.) moved that the yearly subscription of the NHPA's monthly magazine be raised to \$3.50 to meet increased costs, expand and better the content,

and enable editor Ellis Cobb to an improved mailing system.

Discussion of this motion and the cost of the magazine and the mailing

problems followed. The motion passed unanimously.

President Dykes appointed Bob Pence and Clyde Martz as co-chairman of a committee to study promotion of the game of horseshoe and other public relations problems and make a report to the 1972 convention.

President Dykes reappointed the 11 members of the Hall of Fame Selection Committee with Carl von der Lancken to serve again as chairman. He further stated that a letter from the committee chairman pointed out that many oldtime players and pioneers of the early days of the game were in danger of being completely forgotten and instructed the committee chairman to revise selection procedures in such a way that those worthy candidates of the distant

past would not be ignored.

Backer (Utah), Shipley (Calif.), Martz (Penn.) and Davis (Utah) all commented and made suggestions concerning financial status and problems of the NHPA and World Tournament and the promotion of the game and the tournament. President Dykes stated that these and related matters were properly matters to be considered by the Promotion and Public Relations Committee he

had established previous and that a report and recommendations would be presented by that committee to the 1972 convention.

It was moved by Davis (N.J.) and seconded by Williams (Calif.) that any future World Tournament bid chosen which was lower than any other bids submitted be required to match the higher bid. The motion was defeated 88-2. Bids for the 1972 World Tournament were called for and the following were

presented:

(a) \$10,300 by the Redwood Empire Club of Eureka Calif., with the tourna-

ment to be played on 18 indoor courts with bleachers for 3500.

(b) \$6,500 by the Darke County Horseshoe Pitchers' Assoc. with the tournament to be played in Greenville, Ohio, site of the 1962 and 1964 tournaments.

(c) \$6,500 by the Erie, Penn. Horseshoe Club.

Ray Williams spoke on behalf of the California bid, Leo McGrath for the Ohio bid and Clyde Martz for the Pennsylvania bid and all three answered guestions by the delegates and members.

questions by the delegates and members.

The vote on the 1972 bids was as follows: Greenville, Ohio, 51; Eureka, Calif., 32, and Erie, Penn., 5., and president Dykes awarded the 1972 World Tournament to Greenville, Ohio.

Rademacher (Fla.), chairman of the nominating committee, nominated Robert Pence (Ind.) for re-election as Secretary-Treasurer; Wally Shipley (Calif.) for 2nd vice-president, and Cindy Dean (Va.) for 4th vice-president. Motions by Dixon (Iowa), Genevieve McNally (Calif.) and Hagy (Nev.) seconded the

recommendations of the nominating committee.

Nominations from the floor were called for and upon a motion by Manker (Ohio) and seconded by Rambo (Ind.), the delegates voted to close the nominations, and elect Robert Pence, secretary-treasurer; Wally Shipley, 2nd vice-

president, and Cindy Dean, 4th vice-president by acclamation.

The meeting was then adjourned upon a motion by Saari (Wash.) after president Dykes had expressed the thanks and appreciation of the NHPA for the work and cooperation of the South Gate Horseshoe Club, city and park officials and the Southern California Association.

These minutes and notes of the convention were kept by Ottie Reno of Ohio who acted as Recording Secretary by request of president Dykes and secretary

Pence.

1971 World Tournament Schedule Plans

The 1971 World & National Tournament will start with qualifying play on Saturday, July 31, and conclude with the final round of the championship 36-man division on Tuesday night, August 10.

The tourney will be played on the 24-court layout in Mountain View Park, Middlesex, N. J., and with additional courts available this year there will be some changes in the overall schedule of play.

There will be no changes whatsoever in the 36-man championship class and Class C of the Men's Division or in the schedule of the Senior men over 65 and the Intermediate men between 60 and 65.

Class B in the Men's Division will be increased from 32 to 36 players divided into three groups of 12 players each. Four players will advance to the Class B finals on Sunday, August 8.

A Class D will be added in the Men's Division this year consisting of 24 players divided into three groups of eight with two in each group advancing to the finals on Sunday, August 8.

Thus, a total of the top 132 qualifiers in the Men's Division will reach round robin play this year compared to 100 last year at South Gate. Class B qualifiers will play a minimum of 11 games and a maximum of 19 games this year compared with a minimum of seven and a maximum of 14 last year.

There will also be a change in the round robin finals of the Women's, Girls' and Junior Boys Divisions. In the past these divisions along with the Seniors and Intermediates all played their round robin finals on Wednesday afternoon and evening placing a terrific load on the tournament officials with some 20 round robins taking place in a short space of time and at the same time scattering spectator interest.

This year all classes of the Women and Girls will play their finals on Monday evening, August 2, thus focusing both spectator and publicity interest on the distaff side of horseshoe.

The Junior Boys will play all of their classes on the following night, Tuesday, August 3, and will receive the undivided attention of the news media and spectators.

Seniors and Intermediates will play all their class finals on Wednesday evening, August 4, the same as they have in the past.

Opening ceremonies and recognition of defending champions and all champions of the past will be held late Sunday afternoon, August 1, along with a Demonstration-Exhibition game between top players for the benefit of local fans viewing horseshoe competition for the first time.


