Ohio State Championship, Greenville, Ohio-Sept. 1-2-3-4

The Darke County Horseshoe Club and the City of Greenville have again invited the Ohio Buckeye State Association to hold the 1972 Ohio State Championship tournament at City Park, Greenville, Ohio over Labor Day week-end. (For the 16th consecutive year).

All entrants must be Ohio residents (1 year or more) and, except for the Junior, hold a 1972 NHPA (Ohio) membership card. (As usual, cards will be made available at the courts).

ENTRY FEE AND QUALIFYING: Entry fee \$5.00; qualifying 100 shoes begins Friday afternoon, September 1st from 2 to 9 p. m., and continues on Saturday morning, September 2nd until 12 noon, the deadline for entry in Men's division. (See below for Ladies and Juniors).

CONVENTION: The annual meeting of the Ohio Buckeye State Association will be held Saturday afternoon, September 2nd, as soon as possible after all entrants to the tournament have been qualified. Attendance important for election of officers and other business.

MEN'S TOURNAMENT: Round robin begins with the lower classes Saturday afternoon, September 2nd, after the convention, continues on Sunday, September 3rd, and finishes on Labor Day, Monday, September 4th. Classes will be arranged according to qualifying scores, and the starting time posted.

LADIES TOURNAMENT: Saturday afternoon, September 2nd. Entry fee \$5.00, no qualifying. Deadline for entry 11 a. m., September 2nd. Classes will be arranged by the tournament committee. NHPA card required.

JUNIOR TOURNAMENT: Both boys and girls (If 17th birthday occurs on or after January 1, 1972), and the tournament will be on Saturday afternoon. No entry fee, no qualifying. Classes will be arranged by the tournament committee. NHPA card not required. Entries close at 11 a. m., September 2nd.

AWARDS: Trophies and cash prizes in addition to NHPA felt patches in the Mens and Ladies division; trophies and patches only in the Juniors.

IN GENERAL: Wilbur Kabel is the defending men's champion; Katherine Harrison for the ladies; Doug Riffle for the junior boys; Jenny Reno for the junior girls. Greenville cordially invites the players, their families and friends.

Charles C. Davis, 88, world champion horseshoe pitcher of the 1920's, died at a nursing home at 7001 Cleveland. He lived at 3322 Campbell, Kansas City, Missouri.

Davis who was inducted into the National Horseshoe Pitcher's Association Hall of Fame in 1968, won championships in 1922, 1924, twice in 1927 and in 1928.

Born in Linn County, Kansas, he began pitching at the age of 33. He retired when he was 55 years old. He not only perfected a horseshoe pitching technique, but designed and sold shoes and was said to have revolutionized techniques of the game.

He had lived most of his life in the Kansas City area. He also was a retired interior decorator.

He leaves a stepdaughter, Mrs. John W. Zeitler, 6614 Wabash, Kansas City, Missouri.

Bob Sheppard of Rushville won the title with 6 wins and 1 loss. His only loss was to Wilbur Kabel, New Madison, Ohio. Kabel and Chet Reel, West Middleton, tied for second place with Kabel placing second with 68.6% average over Reel's 68.1%. Sheppard had an average of 62.6%.

In Class A, Estil Bills, Connorsville won after defeating Ishmael Rookstool, Syracuse, and Claude Estelle, Indianapolis, in a playoff. All three men had won 6 games and lost 1 game. Class C was won by Harold Land, Crawfordsville, after defeating Bill Tom, Elkhart, in a playoff. Junior Division was won by present Junior champion John Passmore of Richmond. 





Mr. Domey and Mrs. Ruth Hangen, current ladies' World Champion put on an exhibition before a large audience.

Mrs. Hangen started with her first 34 shoes encircling the stake. However, Mr. Domey got right to work with 31 of his first 34 shoes hitting for ringers. At this point he was hitting 91.2 percent ringers with the score 9-0 in Mrs. Hangen's favor. This sensational game ended over an hour later with Mrs. Hangen winning 50-35 averaging 90 percent ringers and Mr. Domey 85 percent.

The audience was quite impressed with this demonstration of skill.

The pioneers in this trend towards indoor courts were the Garfield Park layout in Chicago, Ray's Recreation near Lansing, Michigan, Jim Knisley's courts in Bremen, Ohio and the well-known Day-Bell set-up in Kentucky where Don Moore put his heart and soul into the project. Another very recent addition was the indoor courts put in by Bob Shepard in Rushville, Indiana which are first class in all respects.

But it remained for Ed Domey and Pete Shepard to come up with a layout which can only be described as a horseshoe palace in Sutton, Massachusetts.

One must see to believe and words cannot describe this deluxe set-up of eight indoor courts on a six acre plot of ground. It cost \$65,000.00 to build. A beautiful new beige colored building 60 by 122 feet in size. Neat, attractive, clean as a pin both inside and outside, it is horseshoe in a country club atmosphere.

Built on the banks of a pond with excellent fishing which can be used for ice skating in the winter, the grounds have plenty of room for picnic and playground facilities and for outdoor courts, all of which are already under construction.

The eight indoor courts are in two groups of four with back to back bleachers being installed in the middle. The building also contains an excellent and modern snack bar, tables and rest rooms.

The NHPA cannot stress too strongly the need for all players to support this new indoor set-up in New England, along with those in Rushville, Indiana, Michigan, the Day-Bell courts in Kentucky, Knisley's courts in Ohio and other indoor facilities.




