Horseshoe Pitching And Jukskei An International Sports Exchange

Our American game of horseshoe pitching will soon go overseas and become a world traveler as part of an International sports exchange between the Jukskei Association of the Republic of South Africa and the National Horseshoe Pitchers' Association of America.

At the invitation of the Jukskei Association of South Africa, NHPA Secretary Bob Pence and Ottie Reno, author of the book "Pitching Championship Horseshoe", will attend the Jukskei championships in Kroonstad, South Africa.

In turn the Jukskei Association will send a delegation of Jukskei players to the 1972 World Tournament in Greenville, Ohio next August and demonstrate their game.

Ottie and Bob will be accompanied on the trip by their wives and also Jennifer Reno, Ottie's daughter who holds the Junior Girl's World title.

The group will leave for South Africa on March 25 and return on April 17. The Jukskei tournament will be held in Kroonstad April 3 through April 7. The group will demonstrate horseshoe pitching with movies and actual games, playing both singles and doubles at both the men's and women's distances.

Side trips have been arranged by the Jukskei Association to the world famous Kruger National Park and the Kimberly diamond mines.

Jukskei is a South African game very similar to and having much in common with horseshoe pitching.

It was developed by the Dutch settlers and early pioneers of South Africa at the same time as American pioneers were beginning to develop our present game of horseshoe.

Jukskei is an accuracy type game in which a four pound object is tossed at stakes inserted into sand pits with the purpose of knocking the stakes down or coming as close as possible. The scoring values are 1 and 3, the same as in horseshoe. The stakes are 18 inches high and the pitching distance for men is 52 feet.

Just as our American pioneers used readily available cast-off horseshoes in evolving our game, the South African Dutch pioneers, whose mode of transportation was oxen carts, used what they had available.

At the end of the day when the oxen were unyoked, the yoke was dismantled and parts of it served as stakes while other parts, called "skeys" were used as the throwing object.

The physical action in tossing the "skey" is identical to that used by horseshoe players in tossing the horseshoe. The contestants in official contests usually dress in white. Play is in men, women, junior and seniors.

1971 Membership And Subscription Report

The N.H.P.A.'s final figures for 1971 showed an overall gain in both memberships and News Digest subscriptions, the membership gain being a sizable but modest one while the gain in magazine subscriptions was so tiny that when the two year subscriptions received was taken into account there was no gain at all.

Both 1971 totals are the highest in N.H.P.A. history and continues a trend of yearly increases dating back to 1958.

As usual the picture by individual states is spotty with some showing gains and others showing losses or only holding their own.

The Ohio Buckeye chapter led the N.H.P.A. in both membership and subscriptions for the second straight year under the direction of its dedicated secretary Sam Goodlander. His passing away last December leaves a huge void in the administrative ranks of the N.H.P.A.'s top state chapter.

The Indiana Association ranks in second place. Indiana had led the N.H.P.A. in membership totals for years under the leadership of secretary Earle Wilmore who died two years ago. His loss was keenly felt, but Indiana showed a gain in its 1971 totals and may be on its way to the top again.

The largest membership gains were registered by the Northern California group under the guidance of Verdan Zelmar who is doing an excellent job and the state of Montana. Montana was divided into two chapters in 1971 — Eastern and Western — and the move paid off to the benefit of all players in Montana.

The various state secretaries are the workhorses of the N.H.P.A. and credit for progress should go to them. Therefore in the following lists of the leading state chapters in membership and subscription totals the names of the various secretaries are also given.

Richmond Of Minnesota Tops Sarasota, Florida Ringer Classic

On January 15th, 1972 the Sarasota County Horseshoe Pitchers' Association held its 2nd annual Ringer Classic Tournament at Bee Ridge Park. Although it was a rather dreary day with rain threatening, 43 pitchers showed up to try their skill at ringing the stakes.

Class A honors went to Marv. Richmond who finished the day with six wins and no losses and a ringer per cent of 62.5. John Rademacher of Plant City came in a close second with a ringer per cent of 63.2.

Opal Corbett of Orlando won the Class B event with six wins and one loss, pitching a mighty 44.5 per cent. Harvey Hostetler of Sarasota and Janet Cole of New York tied for second place with five wins and two losses. Harvey averaged 46.3 while Janet hit for 43.8.

Class C honors were taken by Lester Hostetler of Sarasota with seven straight wins and a per cent of 44.1 ringers. Henry Spiess of Sarasota took second place with a six and one record, pitching a 44.4 per cent.

Class D went to Dick Ferguson of Sarasota who finished with six wins and one loss, hitting the stakes with a 37.7 ringer percent. Howard Wells and Ronnie Ronemus of Bradenton tied for second with five wins and two losses each. Wells hit for a 42.6 per cent while Ronemus had a 38.9.

Stan Bates of Sarasota won the Class E with a four and one record averaging 36% and Bob Graham of Bradenton held second on a fine per cent of 41.2 with three wins and two losses.

In the Class F division, Ed Drager of Ohio came home with a four and one record while tempting the stakes at a rate of 35.6%. Dean Grable of Michigan took second place with a per cent of 33.6.

EDITORIAL

Analyzing the financial picture of the NHPA and the membership and subscription figures it becomes very evident that one of the most pressing and important needs of the NHPA is an increase in the number of subscribers to our monthly magazine, The Horseshoe Pitchers' News Digest.

The magazine is all important to the organization as its only real means of communication and information binding players, local clubs and state associations together from one end of the country to the other.

Without the monthly magazine, the game and the NHPA and all local clubs would be much smaller and weaker than they are now.

The NHPA began publishing the monthly magazine in 1957 and since that time there has been a steady increase in membership and the scope of activities. Today NHPA membership is more than three times its total in 1956 and the level of tournament activity has also increased greatly.

The cost of printing and mailing the magazine has gone up steadily and much faster than its number of subscribers has increased. The percentage of subscribers compared to membership has dropped.

With another increase in postal rates coming up and knowing that printing costs will also increase, the only way to offset these expenses is by a greater number of subscribers.

For the good of the game and the NHPA, urge your fellow members to become subscribers. Tournament managers and club officials would do well to give News Digest subscriptions as prizes. State secretaries should work hard to increase the number of Digest subscribers.

Horseshoe Pitching Hall Of Fame Committee

The general NHPA membership is urged to contact any or all of the committee members and make known their choices for the Hall of Fame.



"Horseshoe Players New Membership Drive"

By ALLEN W. BERTSCHY

Obviously, it pays to advertise and conduct annual "Drives." The collection of numerous funds for the community, the advancement of sales projects, and the solicitation of members for various organizations, largely depend on promotional drives. These drives are as common as taxes and birthdays every year. Because of their popularity, and ability to meet ever-increasing goals, it can be judged that drive campaigns are very successful.

Projecting this idea into the world of the Horseshoe, it seems obvious that an investment in an annual new-membership drive merits serious consideration by the NHPA.

Although drive campaigns attribute much of their success to extensive background work, what they have most in common is the way their progress is presented to the public. Typically, a billboard showing a large bargraph is erected in a prominent place (like the city square) for displaying the growing final results. The sales strategy is to announce publicly a comparative progress report. A visible advertising commitment acts as a strong persuader for greater total involvement. Agencies, departments, and geographical area representatives are keenly sensitive to their relative status position in a totem-pole type of contest.

The gist of this suggestion is that a contest be conducted between the various states, Canadian provinces, and the District of Columbia. The geographic area gaining the most new members annually will be given a top value of 100%. Areas with lesser gains will have the percentage figured and plotted proportionately, while those without gains would not be included. Similarly, a drive campaign will also be effective in the promotion of the News Digest subscribers.

Advertising a drive in the Digest by graphically showing last years results would be an appropriate way for introducing the 1972 campaign. This could be easily arranged by requesting all state or area secretaries (via the Digest ad) to send a card to a designated address. The card will merely indicate the number of new members that were signed up for that area by the NHPA last year. To encourage solicitation of former members, it would be practical to consider them to be eligible as new members, if they had not been NHPA members during the past five years.

Availability of a campaign graph would be particularly useful for tournament and club officials. By having a copy, or better yet, an enlargement displayed at tournaments and meetings, officials will have something tangible for a "show and tell" conversational piece. Comparing "our new-membership position" on a National scale is highly competitive, and makes it much easier to sell recruitment of new members on both local and territorial levels.

An annual drive is one incentive for rekindling more spirit among horseshoe enthusiasts. It must be emphasized that locating just one (1) new member is all that is necessary to qualify an entire area, to be eligible for being posted on the bargraph scoreboard. With last year's record on exhibition, everybody is committed to the challenge to surpass it.

Join the Drive — Sign up a pitching friend and help accelerate a vital growth of Horseshoe Pitching during the year 1972.

There was another large increase in the number of members competing in NCHPA tournaments over 1970 (201 in 1971 compared to 167 in 1970). This is an 100% increase in participation over the 1969 figure! The leading clubs in membership were: Sonoma County (36), Livermore (30), Santa Clara County (26), followed by Eureka, Vallejo, Mosswood, Stanislaus C., Arroyo Viejo, Sacramento, Seaside, Golden Gate, and Grass Valley. Stockton, Sutter Butte and Rio Dell-Scotia became new members of the NCHPA in 1971 and will be heard from in 1972! Jesse Gonzales, pitcher of the year (again), won 11 tournaments including 10 in a row. He won 103 games and lost only 9! Fred Lavett made the comeback of the year by jumping his per cent from 54.1 to 62.4 in 15 tournaments. Alvin Vinsant jumped from 23% to 58.6% in three tournaments for honorable mention. Roy Hildebrandt won the most exciting new pitcher award by upping his per cent from 23% to 38.4% in 12 tournaments; honorable mention to Ray Nelson and Jim Saunders. Andy Olivero won the most improved pitcher award by moving from Class B to Class AA and increasing his per cent from 45.4 to 63.5. George Greeott was the most consistent pitcher in 1971. George never finished lower than third in seven tournaments; won two class championship tournaments, and two group titles. Herb Rushing not only pitched in the most tournaments but tossed 9520 shoes (12 tons plus of tempered steel). Also interesting is that Class AA increased from 9 in 1970 to 17 in 1971. Class C jumped from 34 to 53; Class D from 35 to 47; and Class E from 37 to 50.

Communication — Key To Northern California Ass'n Success

Let the left hand know what the right is doing, appoint competent assistants, establish lines of communication between the pitchers and their club secretary-treasurer, and between the association secretary-treasurer, and you'll have a successful season. This system has been used in the Northern California Association (NCHPA) the past two years and the results have been gratifying. Membership increased 100% in two years, reaching the 258 mark this year. More important is the number of Northern California Association members competing in tournaments this year; 201 competed in the 51 sanctioned tourneys compared to less than 100 in 1969. This ratio of members competing should go up even more rapidly in 1972 as the NCHPA adopted no-qualifying competition for the 1972 season.

The rapid growth of the NCHPA during the past two years is due to the complete communication within the organization and has been implemented as follows: By mailing all tournament results to each participant and to each club secretary-treasurer within a week after the results are received by the association secretary-treasurer; by utilizing the Executive Committee (elected officers) to help generate policy on internal problems; by appointing capable association members to assist the NCHPA secretary-treasurer in his duties; and by inviting all association members to voice their opinions and offer suggestions.

My thanks to all the association members that helped during the past season and especially to the following: Thanks to BILL FULWIDER, Chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee for his terrific job of updating and rewriting the association constitution, and to his assistants for their help; Thanks to ACE KOEHLER, the association jack-of-all-trades, who acted not only as social secretary to send cards to sick and ailing association members, but for his help in ramrodding other special projects, the most important of which was the securing of a club location map from each club and distribution to all member clubs; Thanks also to my family, who helped address, stuff, stamp, and seal approximately 2,700 envelopes; Thanks to ANDY POWERS and SAM JENSEN, the very capable association vice presidents who responded promptly on all policy making questions; Thanks to President LLOYD POTTER for his able direction, appointing of key individuals, and for his outstanding job during the past three years; and a special thanks to the Northern California ladies for their invaluable help throughout the season as scorekeepers, club statisticians, the preparation of all those delicious lunches, and for their unswerving loyalty and moral support.



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
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
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
