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

If they turn in an average that qualifies them for a class, they will pitch in that class. All classes will have eight entries, with Classes A and B pitching at 1:00 o'clock on Sunday. C and D Saturday night at 5:00, and E and F at noon on Saturday. It is felt that this schedule will allow a player to determine the approximate time he will pitch and make plans in advance. As there will be a limit of 48 players per tournament, the first 48 entries will be honored. Thereafter, beginning with the January tournament, tournaments are subject to change according to response. It is also requested that entries state preference as to prize money or trophies. Roy Smith Reclaims Michigan State Title!

Roy Smith of Muskegon, Michigan, after a two year absence is once again perched on the horseshoe throne of Michigan. The Muskegon tosser lost his championship in 1971 to Gerald "Doc" Maison, Warren, who successfully defended it in 1972. Tourney was held at Burr Oak, Michigan.

Smith out-lasted the 12-man field in one of the hottest Labor Day weekends, weather-wise, in recent memory. He eliminated Maison handily in the tenth round. He gained a commanding lead, over a tiring Maison, who succumbed to the extremely humid heat.

Mark Freeman, Lapeer, who placed third in the 1972 title quest, led Smith throughout the pressure packed final contest, but faded when Smith tied him at 45 points and was eliminated several pitches later on a 3 ringer 3 situation. He (Freeman) was runner-up.

Paul Janings, Marcellus, in his first year of Wolverine State competition, won 10 of 11 games to win Class B trophy. He averaged just under 60%. The other B winner was Dick Pelton of Horton who won the coveted most improved pitcher award by increasing his average about 16 or 17 points over last year, won 9 of 11 games. Paul Shafer of Monroe was victor in CC with Lou Gallup of Sturgis the other C champion, both with 9-2 records.

Rioux Wins First N. E. Ringrama Classic

On the 15th and 16th of September, 1973, the Lewiston - Auburn Horseshoe Club under the direction of Roger Bolduc, sponsored the first North Eastern Ring-rama Classic at their courts at Marcotte Park in Lewiston, Maine.



It was the first tournament of its kind in New England and only the twelve top players of the North East were invited to participate. A purse of \$1,000 was split twelve ways, the winner receiving \$250.00 and a trophy. The trophy was named The Phil Smith Memorial Cup in honor of a man who gave a lot of himself for the game of horseshoes and who passed away at the courts during a tournament in 1968. In order for anyone of the North Eastern states to retain permanent possession of this cup, it must be won three times by some player from that state.

The festivities started at 12:15 on the introduction of the players, their present and past records and their present ringer averages, and their state, At 12:30 colors were presented by Capt. Frank Hullett, Post 1603, V. F. W. Color Guard of Auburn, Maine, then all the people that help make a tournament successful, scorekeepers, court tenders, referees and statisticians. A letter from Maine's Gov. Curtis was read with regrets that due to a busy schedule, he would be unable to attend, but wishing the Lewiston - Auburn Club much success with the tournament. The Mayors of Lewiston and Auburn were introduced. His Honor, Mayor John C. Orestia of Lewiston and His Honor Mayor John R. Linnell of Auburn. They officially opened the tournament by throwing out the first two shoes.

Six games were played Saturday afternoon ending about 5:30 and at 6:30 a buffet supper was served to the players and their families at The Steer House Restaurant in Lewiston. The speaker of the evening was Russell L. Reilly, trainer and Intramural Sports Director at Bates College. His subject being, "Why Intramural Sports in College?"

At 12:00 noon, Sunday the 16th, play started again and the last five games were played. After the tournament was over and the final paper work done, an exhibition game was played between the present Junior N. E. Champion, Doug Kienia and the present Senior N. E. Champion Normand Rioux with Kiena winning 52 to 27 with a 83.3 ringer percentage to Rioux's 71.8.

Both Connecticut and Massachusetts have put a bid in for the tournament next year. It was estimated that over 1000 people came to watch the tournament in the two days.

To Progress Means Change

By Sol Berman

"There can be no progress without change." - Nixon

I believe we've reached a point at which the game of horseshoe pitching needs re-evaluation. There has been very little change in the game during the past 35 years. There has been no real progress in the game since 1937. We have more good pitchers and many more courts throughout the country, but we haven't made too much progress as far as recognition as a sport, except for the publicity during the Middlesex Tournament. The membership at present is at a peak but that's not much higher than our previous peak back in 1937.

What are our aims?

1. Recognition of the game as a sport.

To Progress — (Continued)

- 2. Increase its popularity as a sport.
- 3. Increase spectator interest.
- 4. Get young people interested in the game.
- 5. Attract sponsors and promoters, so that the game will take its place among the amateur and professional sports.

How can we accomplish these aims?

The game, tournaments and scoring systems must be streamlined to attract spectators, promoters and sponsors.

At present, the World Championship lasts too long. It must be streamlined so that it lasts only 5 - 6 days.

Each game is too long to maintain spectator interest. It lasts too long to be suitable for television. The scoring is too complicated to hold spectators' interest. The paper work is too time consuming.

The World Championship involves 36 players playing 35 games; that's 630 score sheets or 1260 games to check. The 36-man championship class is the same as we had in 1947 when the 36th qualifier had 431 points. At present 431 wouldn't make Class B. There must be something wrong with a qualifying system that keeps men like Martin, Martz, Maddox, Kabel, Focht, Knisley, Smith, Stevenson and Toole out of the championship class.

I have a plan that would eliminate all scoring sheets, would cut down the length of the tournament to 5-6 days, would hold spectator interest, would permit twice as many players to play in the championship class and would be suitable for T.V.

New Plan.

All players would carry a ringer percentage based on 5 tournaments of 7 or more games. The World Championship average would count as 5 tournaments. The top 60 pitchers arriving at the World Championship would automatically qualify. The other players would qualify for the next 12 spots. The 72 players would then be divided into two groups of 36 each. Each

The 72 players would then be divided into two groups of 36 each. Each group would play 35 games, (50 shoes) using the count-all system with only ringers counting one point. After the round-robin is completed, the top 15 men of group 1 would play the top 15 players in group 2 for a total of 50 games. The player winning the most games of the 50, wins the World Championship.

The advantages of this type of tournament.

- 1. Two to three days of qualifying are eliminated.
- 2. Only 2500 shoes are pitched. Our present tournaments go 3200 to 3500 shoes.
- 3. Only scoring machines are necessary, since all players throw 50 shoes. The score on the scoring machine gives the score and ringer percentage. Example: 40-37 final score. Ringer percentage 80 to 74. Scores are handed in and recorded on a master sheet. The tournament director has practically no work.
- 4. Spectators immediately know the score, ringer percentage and number of shoes pitched.
- 5. Ringer percentages have a meaning. A 100% game means 50 straight ringers. At present it could mean 18 to 80 or more ringers.
- 6. A player winning a game will always have the higher ringer percentage.
- 7. The winner of a game must have at least one ringer more than his opponent or what would be 3 points under the present system.
- 8. If the game is on T. V., they know how long the game will last. The scoring board has all the information on the game at a glance.
- 9. The World Championship could be run off in 5-6 days.

To Progress — (Continued)

- 10. With 72 men in Class A many more top players would go to the tournament, since they would be sure to play in the Championship Class.
- 11. An improved format would attract sponsors and possible television coverage.

The 1971 tournament got excellent T. V., radio and newspaper coverage. It gave the game a tremendous surge forward. The 1972 tournament had no coverage to speak of. We must hold our national tournament in cities where we can get good T. V., radio and newspaper coverage. We must raise money for publicity. We must hire a promoter - publicity man.

About ten years ago, Matt Nieson, Chicago sports promoter brought horseshoes to T. V. On 10:30 Wednesday nights, in color, from WNBQ-TV in Chicago. He had a program for cash and glory, with the winner returning to compete again the following week. The game was a 25-inning contest. The game I saw (I have pictures of the contestants) was Milton Tate vs Curt Day.

With money, I'm sure we can hire a man like Matt Nieson, Eddie Elias the promoter of bowling, or Mike O'Hara the promoter of the ABA, WHA and International Track Association.

A promoter with contacts could get us sponsors, arrange for T. V. appearances of our top players, arrange for exhibitions at resort hotels and motels, boy's summer camps, colleges, between halves of basketball games. The Harlem Globetrotters would be an excellent group to get tied up with.

Rodgers of New York, a former Globetrotter and horseshoe pitcher could probably make the contact.

I'm sure we could get men like Lee Davis, Dale Dixon, Curt Day and other retired horseshoe pitchers to work with a promoter.

I attended an AAU meeting in Munich, Germany during the Olympic Games. I was told that 26 countries must compete in a sport before it can be considered for Olympic competition. A tournament could be arranged through the AAU for exhibition purposes prior to the Montreal Olympics. A 1976 World Championship in Montreal in 1976 would be nice.

How can we raise money for publicity and for hiring a promoter-publicity man?

- Tax all NHPA members \$1.00 or more dollars. A \$2.00 tax would raise \$10,000.
- 2. Sponsors.
- 3. Incorporate and sell stock.
- 4. Tax all tournaments. Have each contestant at all tournaments pay 10ϕ in addition to the entry fee. Several thousands of dollars could be raised in this way.
- 5. An NHPA ring similar to the ABC ring for bowling a 300 game. The ring could have the NHPA seal plus the words State Champion on it. Each state could buy the ring to be presented to their state champion. Former state champions could be given the opportunity of buying a ring.
- 6. An NHPA Directory containing information on all NHPA members. The directory to have rules included. The number and location of all courts with information on lights and location (indoors or outdoors). List of State Champions, etc.
- 7. A movie of many of the top pitchers in slow motion with instructional narration. Trick shots, comedy, etc. Copies could be rented. A promoter could get it on T. V.

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
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
