

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

Stockholm Wins New York State Championship

Al Stockholm of Cortland, with a 10 win — 1 loss record, became the 1972 New York State Horseshoe Pitching Champion, stopping the 18th victory bid by Carl Steinfeldt, of Rochester. The final day of the tournament was far less than ideal for horseshoe pitching, as a fine mist fell over the courts constantly. There was no break in the action but ringer percentages did suffer. Al managed the high game of 90% and his only loss was inflicted by the defending Champion.

In the Ladies Class A, Lorraine Thomas pitched a tournament average of 80%, winning all games to become the Ladies New York State Champion. Her high game of 86% was against defending champion, Ruth Hangen of Buffalo. The Tournament was held in Pulaski by the NE-OS-CO Horseshoe Club un-

der the direction of Paul Wilson. 50-shoe cancellation was used in all games except in the Junior Divisions.

Roy Larson Cops Northeast Nebraska Title

Pitchers from Newman Grove and Randolph won the three divisional titles of the first Northeast Nebraska Horseshoe Tournament held in Norfolk, Nebraska this past season.

A total of 24 competitors from 15 communities participated in the three classes of pitching. Roy Larson of Newman Grove won Class A, Isadore Gubbels of Randolph gained the top spot in Class B and Arnold Nelson of Newman Grove won the Class C title.

Eight pitchers competed in each of the three classes. Each player played 7 round-robin matches. Roy Larson won Class A with his 242 total points to 223 for Jim Troutman of Winside. Tom Durham of Madison was third.

Gubbels with 230 points in Class B won over Al Nelson of Wakefield with 219 and Everett Schuetz of Stanton with 217.

Arnold Nelson scored high with 245 points in Class C to whip a pair of Norfolkans in second and third spots. Al Dalger and Roy Bargarstadt, with 229 and 215 respectively.

Tourney directors L. E. Adams and Harley Stutzman plan to make the Northeast Nebraska tournament an annual affair.

8th Annual Snowball Open — February 3-4

The eighth annual indoor Snowball Open Tournament, sponsored by the Darke County Horseshoe Club and sanctioned by the Ohio State Buckeye Association, will be held on successive weekends starting February 3-4, 1973. All contestants will be notifield by mail when they are scheduled to pitch.

The tournament will be at the Darke County Fairgrounds on U.S. 127 and Ohio 49 South. There will be a lunch stand at the courts.

Bill Weathers Winner Of Turlock Open (No. Calif.)



Roger Vogel, the new president of PHA, has been busy in Colorado recently "practicing what he preaches" with some impressive results. Roger feels very strongly that in order for the sport of horseshoe pitching to achieve the status it deserves it must be publicized, not as a pastime, not as an oddity, but as a genuine and highly competitive sport.

The PHA president emphasizes that if this type of publicity is provided all over the country, horseshoe pitching will certainly climb by leaps and bounds toward its proper place in the world of athletics.

Horseshoes . . . It's Still Alive And Well . . .

By Loren D. Kelley

I have read with much interest some articles published lately in this magazine by some fine gentlemen, I'm sure, well schooled in the art of the sport of horseshoes. They all show a mutual concern for the game and have brought forward many fine ideas toward the furtherance and advancement of the grand old sport. If I may I would like to offer some inovations we have put into operation in the Omaha, Nebraska area in the past three years that have turned this area, we like to say, into one of the hottest, swingingest horseshoe areas in the United States.

One cold winter night in January, 1970, nine men met in the basement of a South Omaha place of business and formed a traveling horseshoe league, something that hadn't ever been attempted before. It has turned out, in three seasons, to be much more than we had ever hoped for.

I feel privileged when I say that I have been the President of the Platte Valley Horseshoe League since its inception two and one-half years ago.

During the early formation of the League, the charter members were foresighted enough to bring into the game some new innovations that have been entirely responsible for the league's total success. This I would like to pass on for what it's worth to all the members of the NHPA wherever they may be.

First, and most important, we have turned the game into a team sport and have gained the enthusiasm of participants as well as spectators that other team sports enjoy; yet we have done this without taking away the individual characteristics of the game.

We maintain a franchised roster system and league playing schedule along the lines of professional baseball. Taverns and other businesses, for instance, in the area have purchased franchises and have installed fine lighted courts complete in every detail for spectators as well as players. We have had more than two dozen fine new multiple courts built in our league area in the last two years. We have added mercury-vapor arc lighting on eight 40-foot towers to our Omaha Dewey Park courts and now boast they are as fine as any in the land. The City of Omaha is installing new courts in nine more of its city parks. The City of Papillion is installing 20 new lighted courts in its city park and we are now planning a tournament next year for these courts with enough prize money to make everyone want to come and participate. The cities of Blair, Mondamin and Gretna have also put in lighted courts in their city parks.

Our league membership has doubled each of the three years it has been in existence. It now includes teams stretching over a radius of 110 miles. We now have a membership of over 450, more than twice the combined memberships of the Iowa and Nebraska Associations. We have the league split into three geographical divisions this year with a round-robin play-off between the top six teams for the championship in September. We have even given, in this day of prison strife and troubles, a participation sport to the Nebraska State Penal Complex that its inmates are excitingly enjoying. All home games, of course!

Our first open singles tournament last year drew 121 horseshoe pitchers from three states — the two-day event was the largest tournament ever held in the state of Nebraska. Our league has purchased a fine two-story brick building in South Omaha for indoor courts and has also added another in Blair. Olympics On A Horseshoe Court

"It's a ringer! Well, — not quite," glumly conceded a junior horseshoe pitcher as his opponent measured the shoe. A tournament was under way. The Olympic Games in Munich had a counterpart in Tacoma, for on Labor Day weekend Washington State Horseshoe Pitching Tournament was in full swing. Nearly half of the state's 353 N.H.P.A. membership was registered to participate, in one class or another.

Enthusiasm sailed high as contestants prepared to play; not for gold, silver and bronze metals, but for first, second and third-place trophies. First place in each of the divisions (junior and senior men and women) was good as gold, however, for with it went the State Championship, and there were four of these at stake.

Competition would be keen, the players knew. Title holders in 1971 would have to fight to reign again, for new aspirants have a way of coming from below to topple a onetime leader.

"Man, you sure did come to pitch," lamented one when the score was 23-3 against him. This represented the sentiment of many a contestant before the tournament ended.

Wright Park courts, site of this State Tournament, perhaps are the most beautifully situated horseshoe pitching courts in America. Four well-groomed fine-sand courts comprise the group and lie contiguous end to end in a grassy dell, arranged 4-4-6-4, separated by a chain link fence, a cedar hedge, a plot of grass. Sunshine filtered through tops of stately trees and spotted the courts with shade; good for comfort, sometimes bad for pitching, but frequent applications of white paint nullified the bad. "Don't worry," a less than 50 percenter joked, "The way I'm pitching that one coating of paint will last all day."

Horseshoe wives sat in shade, discharged duties of the recording booth and kept refreshments aplenty nearby.

Standing on a chair, the better to be seen and heard, with players all gathered around, a tournament official handed out player's cards with the admonition, "You'll play straight through, eat donuts and drink coffee."

A curtain of silence came over the courts, save the metallic ring of iron. Four dead is heard. Four x's jotted down. "Call 'em loud and clear and I'll write 'em black and bold," the scorekeeper replied with marked good humor.

First games over. Some played long, some short. Winners seemed to flaunt score sheets for all to see as they treked in jaunty pace to the recording booth. One fellow was heard to say, "Do you know, I had him 49-13 then he started coming on strong and I couldn't get another point, not one lousy point!"

One, accustomed to pitching championship caliber, this day off form, lamented, "I'm making a lot of players happy today! This is the game of horseshoes; the hope of doing better another time lures me back to try again."

On the sideline, one whose class had not yet started to pitch, visited with an erstwhile opponent. "I've signed quite a few new members in the N.H.P.A. this year; some don't pitch at all, some do a little. I think we all should go out of our way to make new people, new members, welcome on the courts; encourage them to come out to practice and not to feel humiliated with a low ringer percentage." He emphasized, "Every old-timer personally should take it upon himself to welcome new members, to give praise for their efforts and to encourage them in every way that will stimulate their interest in the game."

Listen to one disillusioned participant: "Oh well, I just play for fun," was the self-consoling comment from a lower classman who meant to allay the ignominy of defeat. "I couldn't put nuthin' together that game. I think the trouble is my shoes got right-hand threads, and the stakes got left-hand ones.

A lefty, newly up in a higher class, but still unsure of himself, boasted, "When my one and one-quarter shoe stops working right I'll switch to one and three-quarters, and vice versa."

Then there was the unshaven cowboy in from the eastern plains, devilish and sinister in appearance; rough boots, big-bronco belt buckle, blue jeans and purple silk shirt. A Texas-size black felt hat shaded the stubble of an equally black one-day beard, but he pitched horseshoes with a reckless abandon that overwhelmed his opponents.

"Four dead," giggled a junior girl at the other end of the courts; "Oh Oh, that's never happened to me before," she beamed.

Mod clothes were in vogue on men and women, on the old and on the young. Frankly, anything goes these days, it seems, from patched jeans, faded shirts and tennis shoes to Esquire stripes and blended colors snugly fit.

A gentleman's gentleman rolled a dead cigar in his mouth as he made a pitch; no need to worry about running short — six more cigars bulged the pocket of his gay pitching shirt.

Many players, men, women and juniors alike, proud of their home towns or of their horseshoe clubs, wore colorful shirts that bore names in lettering stitched on the back — Greater Seattle, Lumi Island, WSHPA, Morgan Acres Club, Spokane Horseshoe Pitchers Assn....

Women in sunsuits, slacks, and jeans pitched from the thirty-foot mark, as did the juniors. A man watching play was heard to say, "I could take a lesson from what I see here, and it might do me some good, too."

"It's dead and one; we've already started," reported a lanky blond youth with mod haircut and red tennis shoes. The scorekeeper had not yet finished counting up the previous game.

"They sure fight, these junior boys, for every point, don't they!" proclaimed an adult witnessing a series of four deads. No hesitation, no apparent tension, no obvious freeze; just up and throw with alignment the envy of most adults.

Pitched shoes spin, flop, float, drive, dive; some go high, some low. The spin can be three-quarter turn, one and one-quarter, or one and three-quarter, and occasionally one sees a flip-thrown shoe. Any one can be good and effective in its own way, representing the inevitable style of the pitcher. Some take an easy, smooth flight as if spinning about a central axis and, as one old-timer said, "Come in well when they're working for me."

Beauty, too, can be seen in the flight of a pitched horseshoe. One, a most fascinating shoe thrown by a championship-class performer, arched high in a flat spinning pattern, then ten feet ahead of the stake it seemed to break over, change planes of flight and come down onto the stake, symbolic of a bird of prey maneuvering in on its next meal. It was said, "This remarkable shoe travels in two planes. It perhaps is the most beautifully thrown shoe in the entire tournament."

"New members from east of the mountains are taking home a nice share of the trophies," remarked an old westener without a trace of resentment in his voice.

Horseshoe pitching is for everyone. An oldster with deep-furrowed face, bent and pained with the ravage of age, winced on every throw. A younger man was heard to say, "When I get his age, and if I'm in his shape, I hope I'll have the guts to come out and pitch."

No beer was seen. No "rattlesnake medicine" anywhere, — a good clean show all the way. Not a dissenting word was heard, yet disappointment took its toll. Reconciled defeat was all around. "I wore myself out today. I couldn't get the shoes off the horse," a tall guy snickered. Another retorted, with disgust, "I wish somebody would invent a new joke!"

Playing late under lights on the first day a familiar refrain was heard. "We started off with four dead, but that was my only double. I was bushed. I couldn't hold him, but I had to go on and play off the first-place tie." If the impressive weight of numbers were to be significant, then defeat

If the impressive weight of numbers were to be significant, then defeat triumphed over wins, for one hundred players left the courts without trophies, fifty-eight carried home hard-won souvenirs, four of these represented state championships.

On the third day a church-tower clock across the park quietly chimed 4 P. M. The tournament had ended. Tired players headed homeward; some elated over winnings, others still eager to try again another time.
