



#### Zadroga Edges Out Victory In January Red Mill Open

Al Zadroga of Elizabeth, Pa. managed to defeat all of his opponents to win the toughest Red Mill tournament to date. Each individual in the Championship Class was either a present or former state champion within the past few years, and they all came to win. For the first event of the year, there were many highlights: Zadroga performing at an exceptional level, winning a crucial game over Martz after being behind 40 to 29; over half of all the games with the opponent scoring more than 40 points; Donnie Roberts overcoming Engle's lead of 40 to 28; Dale Carson pushing Engle to 114 shoes before Buck was able to win; Engle with 91 ringers and Martz 85 after 100 shoes, and then Engle finally winning 50 to 48 at 140 shoes; Zadroga's high game of 89.2% against Engle; Carson upsetting Solomon 54 to 47.

Class B ended in a tie between Chuck Semans of Pittsburgh and Gary Roberts of Ohio with both pitchers averaging over 60%. Ottie Reno had the best string in Class B shooting 27 perfect ringers out of 30 shoes. Class C was won by Pete Burkett and Class D by Herman Boyer; both players managing to go undefeated.

# 66 From Out Of The Mail Bag"

Dear Sir:

I was reading the results of the various state tournaments and noticed that many states use total points scored by the player as a means of deciding ties. I would like to point out that this is not only a poor method but also an

incorrect method.

The number of points scored by a player depends on how well his opponent

played and has little to do with how well he played.

For example: Curt Day is playing Elmer Hohl. At 50 shoes pitched Elmer has 47 ringers. Curt Day cannot score more than 9 points. He couldn't score more than 9 points irregardless of his ringer percentage which could vary from 64-100%. At this point in the game Elmer has 94% ringers. The total number of points that Elmer scores depends upon how well Curt Day is pitching. Elmer's total could vary from 0-50 points.

I believe our NHPA rules should not allow the total points method of break-

ing ties.

Dear Ellis:

Several of us went up to Letts, Iowa in January, to practice. We tried out something that I think we should adopt in horseshoes. We played fifty point games, but we played "live ringers", no cancellation. We counted all dead ringers one point. For example, if I had two ringers, and my opponent had one ringer I got four points, and he got one point. Close shoes didn't count, as you are pitching for ringers. We played a round robin, and counted total points in the five games. Similar to bowling. We also alternated the pitch is as it should be. Another thing, in the old way you were always digging your shoes out of the clay when the other man was ready to pitch. With the alternate pitch, the man who pitches last, lets his shoes lay until the other man has pitched, then he picks up his shoes and pitches, thereby not disturbing the other pitcher. Also you could pitch any number of shoes from ten to fifty, but never over fifty shoes. Why pitch seven or eight hours to see who has the most stamina. No wonder there are not more young pitchers taking up the sport. Just look at the new players you would get if you played shorter games.

We also qualified two men to a court and counted everything and alternated the pitch. Just look at the number of players you could qualify in two or three hours. All games would start and end at the same time or nearly so. I think it is high time we got the sport up on an even keel with other sports. Whether these old timers like it or not it is going to change. There are several states

already going to the fifty shoe games: Wisconsin, Massachusetts, Kentucky, Indiana, and several others are leaning that way. When I was up to LaCrosse, Wisconsin last fall, we played that way although they played cancellation on fifty shoes, and counted total points in the seven games. It would have been better to play the way I have mentioned. Then you probably wouldn't have ties to play off. If ties remain at the end of fifty shoes or whatever you play, you could have a "sudden death" play-off. I think a man should have what he pitches. Some of you pitchers think it over and maybe we can come up with pitches. Some of you pitchers think it over, and maybe we can come up with something besides cancellation.

I have gone to many a tournament where we never got done before seven or eight o'clock, whereas you could be done at four or five o'clock. Who has pitched more than I have, and I have never seen it change since they went to cancellation; maybe in the teens when Frank Jackson was champion. Of course you should qualify to get the men where they belong. Another thing I do not like is the idea of sending in your score; what you did two or three months previous is no indication of what you would do later. You do not have to change the scoresheets, or any of that. In pitching fifty shoes you would look up and know right away what your percentage was. Another thing, you could start qualifying as soon as two men were on the courts. Give them fifteen minutes to warm up and they will not be on the court for a long time. Well, that is my idea, let's hear from others.

At the same time, by reversing the placques you can use the above set-up for your Saturday games. To make it really easy, you should have all Staurday groups on one side of the placque to read:

A-D B-E C-F
1 1 1 1 etc.
G-J H-K I-L

12 courts now using the 48 placques should find using only 12 placques somewhat of a relief.


