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




# **NHPA President's Message**

The 1975 Convention Agenda, Proposed Constitution and By-Law Changes and the Final Regional Directors Guideline are published elsewhere in this issue.

Thanks to John Walker and his committee for a job well done on the By-Laws and to those members who sent in the proposed changes.

In Keene, at the first Regional Directors meeting at a World Tournament, I suggested and appointed Donnie Roberts to prepare guidelines and duties for the NHPA Regional Directors. Donnie received many suggestions from the other directors and councils, and they were appreciated, thanks.

Bernard Herfurth suggested a 4-part plan. Bernard states that several States are going to use the plan. I also have received favorable comments. We appreciate this and hope other States will try it. If there are some who feel they don't have time, might I suggest you appoint a publicity chairman.

I hope many of you write to Jim Solomon and express your views and comments concerning his article in the March issue, "Aspects Of Our Sport". I have asked Jim to speak on his subject at the Lafayette Convention.

Again, to keep you informed, I requested that an advance expense check be sent to the following: Regional Directors, NHPA Committee Chairmen, NHPA Hall of Fame Committee and the Executive Council. The amount was from \$5.00 to \$10.00. They were told the advance was for postage and telephone calls on behalf of the NHPA. They were asked to keep records of same and when they totaled that amount, they were to submit receipts for another advance. Since this hadn't been done before, I felt these people should be reimbursed for these expenses incurred on behalf of the NHPA.

I personally feel that players who can average 80% in a World Tournament should automatically be qualified for the next year's World Tournament. If they do not participate, then they will be required to qualify for the next tournament they attend. Now PLEASE hear me out before you take sides. In bowling and golf, if you win a tournament, that qualifies you for their big tournament, the Firestone and the Masters respectively. So why shouldn't horseshoes award a player who can average 80% or more for 35 games. Another point is, I feel those players who are averaging 77-78 and 79% the first three nights, are REALLY going to be trying harder to get their average up to 80% those last two nights. Now, if they do, don't you think this will improve the competition and make for a more interesting and better World Tournament? I do.

Last year I mentioned receiving a letter from SPAIN; they were interested in our sport. In this issue is a follow-up letter from them, which sounds great. I will keep in close touch with them and keep you informed. So, if you horseshoe manufacturers receive a letter from Spain, I would appreciate if you would respond quickly.

Speaking of foreign countries, reminds me. Can you top this? I won my first horse-shoe award on July 4, 1945 in Czechoslovakia and it was for first place. It was during World War II while I was in the 313th Infantry of the 79th Division. I still have the inscribed silver medal.

# **Final NHPA Guidelines For Regional Directors**

#### INTRODUCTION

The concept of a Regional Director has been re-evaluated and the areas served by the NHPA redistricted in an effort to make the office a useful instrument rather will render a genuine service to the NHPA, and that they can be reimbursed for authorized expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. To the end that these Directors, the National Officers, the State Officers, as well as all local and Club Officers can work together as a cohesive unit for the betterment of the sport of horseshoes this document has been assembled.

SELECTION AND TERM OF OFFICE

A. The Chairman Regional Director, the Regional Directors, and the Assistant Regional Directors shall be appointed by the NHPA President with the approval of the NHPA Executive Committee.

B. These appointments shall be for two years. A person may be reappointed at the end of two years for another term. There is no limit on how many terms a per-

son can serve.

It shall be mandatory upon the NHPA President and Executive Committee to consult with the State Associations before appointing Regional Directors and Assistant Regional Directors. The same procedure shall be used in the dismissal C. of a Director.

DUTIES OF THE REGIONAL DIRECTOR CHAIRMAN

The Regional Director Chairman shall coordinate the activities of all Regional A. Directors, encourage and help them to perform the duties prescribed for them, and be liaison between Directors and the National Officers. B.

The Regional Director Chairman shall answer requests for information and shall inform the Regional Directors of the time and place of the Regional Directors

annual meeting.

The Regional Director Chairman shall keep the NHPA President, the Hall of Fame C. Committee, or any other appropriate persons informed of noteworthy achieve-

ments of pitchers and promoters.

The Regional Director Chairman shall prepare a quarterly report to the Executive D. Committee of the NHPA summarizing horseshoe activities and outlining any suggestions for the improvement of the sport of horseshoes. A copy of this report shall be submitted to the Horseshoe Pitcher's News Digest for publication.

**DUTIES OF THE REGIONAL DIRECTORS** 

A. A Regional Director shall coordinate the activities of the Assistant Directors in his Region with those of the NHPA.

B. A Regional Director shall maintain a schedule of tournaments and other activities in his region and keep the Assistant Directors informed as well as informing the chairman. C.

A Regional Director shall encourage States within his Region to pay their dues,

encourage membership in the NHPA, and encourage Digest subscriptions. A Regional Director shall attend as many major tournaments in his Region as possible and attempt to honor specific requests by State Associations for his D. presence either at tournaments or ceremonies.

E. A Regional Director shall be responsible for the distribution of NHPA Championship patches for the winners of all sanctioned tournaments according to procedures established by the NHPA Executive Committee.

A Regional Director shall work with Assistant Directors in his Region to eliminate conflicting dates to affect maximum participation by the pitchers.

G.

A Regional Director shall attempt to answer all requests for information.

A Regional Director shall report quarterly to the Chairman a summary of his activities. A copy of this report shall be submitted to each State Associa-H. tion in his Region and to the NHPA President. A Regional Director shall keep the Chairman informed of the noteworthy achieve-

ments of pitchers and promoters in his region.

A Regional Director shall attempt to bring together all officers of State Associa-J. tion and Assistant Directors in his Region once each year to discuss subjects of general interest. Subject matter covered and conclusions reached should be documented for publication to members within the Region, the Chairman, and the NHPA President.

A Regional Director shall seek out and attempt to enroll active clubs and pitchers K. not presently affiliated with the NHPA.

L. A Regional Director shall attempt to attend the World Tournament or name in writing to the chairman one of his Assistant Directors to attend in his place. M.

A Regional Director shall have a commitment to every State Association in his Region, not just to the State Association of his residence.

### Guidelines — (Continued)

A Regional Director shall assist clubs and tournament directors in finding ways to publicize their activities.

#### DUTIES OF THE ASSISTANT REGIONAL DIRECTORS

An Assistant Regional Director shall be directly responsible to the Regional Direc-A. tor and shall perform those activities requested by the Regional Director as well as those duties spelled out in this document.

B. An Assistant Regional Director shall maintain a schedule of tournaments and

other activities in his area and keep the Regional Director informed.

An Assistant Regional Director shall encourage support of and membership in C.

the NHPA in his area.

An Assistant Regional Director shall attend as many major tournaments in his area as possible and attempt to honor specific requests by Clubs or groups for D. his presence either at tournaments or ceremonies.

An Assistant Regional Director shall inform the Regional Director of the results E. An Assistant Regional Director shall attempt to answer all requests for informa-

of all sanctioned tournaments in his area. An Assistant Regional Director shall report quarterly to the Regional Director a summary of his activities. A copy of this report shall be sent to all interested clubs and associations in the area and to the NHPA President. An Assistant Regional Director shall keep the Regional Director informed of the

noteworthy achievements of pitchers and promoters in his area. An Assistant Regional Director shall attempt to attend the annual meeting called by the Regional Director in his Region.

J. An Assistant Regional Director shall seek out and attempt to enroll active clubs and pitchers not presently affiliated with the NHPA.

An Assistant Regional Director shall assist clubs and tournament directors in finding ways to publicize their activities.

An Assistant Regional Director shall work with and keep all tournament directors K.

in his area informed of current and future events.

#### COMPENSATION

- The Regional Director Chairman, the Regional Directors, and the Assistant Regional Directors shall be reimbursed for all approved expenses incurred in the performance of their duties to specifically include postage, stationery, and long distance calls. All expenses must be submitted to the NHPA Secretary-Treasurer A. who will submit such expenses to the Executive Committee for their approval prior to payment.
- B. The NHPA annual dues and subscription to the Horseshoe Pitcher's News Digest shall be paid or furnished by the NHPA.

#### **AMENDMENTS**

These guidelines may be amended by a majority vote of the Regional Directors present at the Annual Director's Meeting with the approval of the Executive Committee of the NHPA.

These guidelines were written by Donnie Roberts of Ohio and approved by the NHPA Executive Council February 1975.

After many hours of planning and negotiating, Mr. Walter Pruiksma of Clifton, New Jersey, arranged a meeting with Mr. James A. Daniels, Coordinator of Community Events, at the Rockefeller Center, Inc.

Mr. Pruiksma formed a committee of two additional members of the National Horseshoe Pitcher's Association: New Jersey Tournament Director, Alvin Cherry of Plainfield, New Jersey, and New York State Sec.-Treas., Lou

Gancos of Brooklyn, New York.

The meeting was held Friday, February 28, 1975, at 3:00 P. M. at the Rockefeller Plaza in New York. We met with Mr. Daniels and his assistant, Mr. Reed, about the N.H.P.A.

After discussing the horseshoe pitching with Mr. Daniels, we decided that the New Jersey and New York Horseshoe Pitcher's Association would present an exhibition or tournament on July 6, at the Rockefeller Center in New York.

Mr. Pruiksma presented Mr. Daniels with a silver horseshoe as a memento of our first official meeting. Mr. Daniels appreciated all the literature and pictures the committee had prepared for him. He also was overjoyed with the horseshoe souvenir that Mr. Pruiksma presented to him. Mr. Daniels asked the committee if it would be possible to put on an exhibition before July 6. We assured him that we could, but the date was not yet decided upon.

# Michigan Looks For A Big Year In 1975

There will be no lack of horseshoe pitching in MICHIGAN this year. The Wolverine State Horseshoe Pitcher's Association has scheduled 28 regular season district tournaments. In addition, one state championship, a national and an international tournament complete a 31 tourney slate for 1975. One major tournament format change was made. All regular meets will be of 50 shoe duration except the N.H.P.A. WATER WONDERLAND OPEN and the state championship tourneys. The WATER WONDERLAND, held annually at BURR OAK, MICHIGAN for many years, will be staged at STURGIS, MICHIGAN, JUNE 21-22 at SPENCE FIELD. This N.H.P.A. open will utilize 50 point game competition.

The LAPEER HORSESHOE CLUB landed two plums this year. They will host the state championship for the second time. It was also held there in 1972. The other event will be the third annual team competition between MICHIGAN and ONTARIO organizations. This popular event pits the 12 best available CANADIAN horseshoe tossers against MICHIGAN'S best. The matches will be held on JULY 12-13, at ONTARIO, CANADA, led by then world champion ELMER HOHL, who put it to the WOLVERINE players but good when they hosted the event at LUCAN last year.

ELMER HOHL was so pleased when the matches were concluded that he guaranteed to participate in 1975 at LAPEER.

Two clubs, BURR OAK and BRECKINRIDGE, failed to request tournament dates for this season. These places were filled by the JACKSON HORSE-SHOE CLUB on JUNE 7-8 and AUGUST 2-3, while the V.F.W. POST of KALAMAZOO received the dates of SEPTEMBER 20-21 for the first W.S.H.P.A. activity in that city.


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# Proposed NHPA 1975 Constitution And By-Law Changes

(Approved by the NHPA Executive Council)

NOTE: Any addition to the constitution and by-laws may be adopted when approved by a majority of the delegates at the National Convention. Any change to the Constitution and By-Laws must be passed by two-thirds of the voting delegates at the National Convention.

#### ADMINISTRATION

ARTICLE 2 - SECTION 1 (Change) — The word state in this constitution applies to all political and geographical divisions commonly known as States, to all territories and possessions of the United States, and all countries of the world.

ARTICLE 2 - SECTION 4 (Addition) — A delegate to the National Convention must be at least 18 years of age on or before the day of said convention.

ARTICLE 2 - SECTION 8 (Change) — One member of each NHPA charter designated as a voting delegate at the National Convention. He would vote the total number of votes that his charter was entitled to according to written in

total number of votes that his charter was entitled to according to written instructions from his charter.

ARTICLE 2 - SECTION 9 (Addition) - The officers of the NHPA shall consist of a President, Secretary-Treasurer, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Third

Vice-President, Fourth Vice-President and Chairman of Regional Directors. The Chairman of Regional Directors shall be appointed by the NHPA President.

ARTICLE 2 - SECTION 10 (Addition) — The officials, consisting of President, Secretary-Treasurer, four Vice Presidents, and Chairman of Regional Directors, shall be the Executive Council of the NHPA.

ARTICLE 2 - SECTION 12 (Addition) — 1. Pledge of allegiance to the flag. 2. Prayer.

#### JUDICIARY

ARTICLE 3 - SECTION 1 (Change) — The National Convention will be held during the World Tournament. The Executive Council will determine the day and the time. The newly elected officers will take office at the completion of the tournament.

ARTICLE 3 - SECTION 10 (Change) — The Secretary-Treasurer shall receive an expense allowance of one thousand dollars \$1000.00 per year, plus 10c per member to compensate for personal expenses incurred in the performance of

his duties.

ARTICLE 3 - SECTION 11 (Change) — The Managing Editor of the organization's monthly magazine shall receive an expense allowance of \$600.00 annually to compensate for personal expenses incurred in the performance of his duties as long as the magazine is in existence.

ARTICLE 3 - NEW SECTION (Addition) — All Regional Directors shall receive an expense allowance of \$50.00 annually to compensate for personal expenses in-

curred in the performance of their duties.

ARTICLE 3 - NEW SECTION (Addition) - The Executive Council, all Regional Directors, and all Committee Chairman, shall have their dues and Digest subscription

tors, and all committee Chairman, shall have their dues and Digest Subscription paid for by the NHPA.

ARTICLE 3 - NEW SECTION (Addition) — The fiscal year of the NHPA has been established as April 1 through March 31. It is the responsibility of the Secretary-Treasurer, Managing Editor of the News Digest and all persons appointed or elected to handle game related items, to submit their books and records to the NHPA appointed auditor for review and audit. Those completed audits are to be published in the June issue of the News Digest each year.

ARTICLE 6 - SECTION 1 (Addition) — When qualifying for the World Tournament, the qualifier may start on the pitch of his or her choice.

qualifier may start on the pitch of his or her choice.

ARTICLE 6 - SECTION 1 (Change) — Qualifying to be 100 consecutive shoes. Pitcher

may throw a second 100 shoes but must pay an additional qualifying fee.

ARTICLE 6 - SECTION 2 (Paragraph 5 - Clarification of Existing Ruling) — If a Junior competes in a men's division of a sanctioned NHPA tournament, he does not injure his Junior standing, unless there is a Junior division conducted in the same tournament. But if a Junior pitches in a men's division and there is a Junior division being played in the same tournament, then he has made his choice and can no longer pitch as a Junior.

ARTICLE 6 - SECTION 2 (Change) — If a Junior pitches in an adult tournament that has an entry fee or qualifying fee they will no longer be eligible to compete as

a Junior.

ARTICLE 6 - SECTION 2 (Addition) — To insure the amateur status of a Junior, there shall be no qualifying fee or entry fee charged in any NHPA sanctioned Junior tournament.

ARTICLE 6 - SECTION 2 (Addition) - All pitchers competing in World Tournaments must have their name, their state or country which they represent, on the back of their shirt.

# Proposed Changes — (Continued)

#### BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 5 - SECTION 1 (Addition) — A Junior player will not be required to pay any National dues, but he or she must obtain a NHPA membership card from his or her state charter in order to participate in sanctioned NHPA tournaments. Card to be labeled as Junior player.

#### OFFICIAL RULES FOR HORSESHOE PITCHING

ARTICLE 6 - OFFICIAL SHOE (Addition) — Where all measurements are specified as maximum, there is no minimum.

# Local Clubs

COMBINED LOCKS, WISCONSIN — Horseshoe pitching in Combined Locks, Wisconsin had its start in 1960 on one sand court at Jerry Kamp's Tavern. The following year another court was added and more in successive years, until there were eight clay courts. The Combined Locks Horseshoe Club was organized in 1967, but the big year was 1971 when Jerry Kamps, owner of the property, had the court covered with a steel roof measuring 50 x 94 feet. The club members all pitched in and poured yards of concrete walks between the pits and enclosed the court with a 4-foot chain fence. A blue clay and sand mixture (just like putty) makes pitching a pleasure. The courts are lighted by four 1500-watt Quartz lodine lights so, rain or shine, it's horseshoe time at Kamps Kovered Kourts. Much credit is due Jerry Kamps for promoting the sport here, but it also takes real active members to make it a success.

The Combined Locks Club has 243 members, 168 men and 75 women. President of the club is John Rietveld, Vice-President is Ray Schommer, Treasurer is Richard Ristau, and the Secretary is Joanne DeGroot.

In 1974 there were ten leagues: Men's singles scratch league, four men's doubles leagues, four couples leagues, one women's league, all with handicap. Would you believe a league pitching at 8 o'clock in the morning after the fellows worked the 11 p. m. to 7 a. m. shift in a paper mill? Such was the case this past year when Appleton Papers sponsored two leagues and fifty-eight players were tossing at the stakes on alternating Friday mornings. Many of the fellows never had a shoe in their hands before. They shot three games of 50-shoes each and had a good and badly needed handicap. Some players were able to accumulate only seven points in fifty shoes. However, at the end of the season, most members were averaging 30 points or better.

Our club has conducted a number of tournaments; the State, Mideastern Wisconsin and Club. The Club tournament is the favorite of all members, men and women alike. It is held at the end of the season and using their league average places them in a class of their own caliber. There seldom is an unevenly matched contest. We think it would be great if all tournaments could be set up this way, with no qualifying to worry about.

All league pitchers must be members of the Horseshoe Club and pay \$1.00 yearly dues. There are two meetings annually, one in December and one in April. There is no charge for playing but league dues which range from \$4 each to \$4 per couple, depending on the league, are used for trophies, prize money and secretary fees.




# From The Far Northwest — Washington

# From Out Of The Mail Bag"

Dear Ellis,

In recent months there seems to be a proliferation of articles on changing our sport's rules, regulations and scoring procedures. Although only a member of NHPA since 1957, I am a student of the game's history. Hopefully, most changes will come in tournament organization and not in the basic game.

There are two aspects to our game which have withstood the test of time and are essential to its integrity. I sincerely hope that we do not give these

up only to make tournaments shorter or for easier scoring.

1. The single point: Without it, we've reduced options to scoring to only ringers. We need diversity of scoring. All successful sports have several options

to scoring. Also beginners can score.

2. Cancellation: The chance to come from behind, to put pressure on the leader, the opportunity for a "mental" game rather than a routine, mechanical game is possible through cancellation. You have a chance to come-back! It's like the last two minutes of a football game; time is running out, but you still have a chance to control the game and fight back with improved performance.

In the last 50 years, we've attempted to be accepted in the Olympics (1928) tried to go professional (PHA) and let's face it, an 80 percent pitcher will

always beat a mediocre, rule-changing pitcher. The game has received a lot of blame for extended tournaments, which really is the fault of poor organization and direction.

The World Tournaments are well conducted. The only just way to shorten class A is to limit the number of pitchers in the final round-robin. Has any qualifier below No. 20 ever won the championship? Below 18? Below 16?

Let's sit back and take a good long look at our game before we ruin it for the sake of "time". I believe what we really want out of horseshoe pitching is found in the following poem.

#### For Pleasures Stake

Spinning, arching:

but open at the clay, iron shoes of the hoof zero-in their way.

Clink! Clang: Seldom stobs are ringer-free! Oft' stacked-to-four, a sight to see!

Between the matches, pros do prat of turns and shoes and stance on mat, of ringers lost, a game decision, of tempered steel, of champ's precision. But, for years, riches we have sought, of fame and fortune, but pleasure naught. Of change or rules, of strategies, of the dollar: to raise the fees.

Surely, surely,

'Tis a family game; Days of pleasure but little fame.

Why? Why? Doth

fame you quest? Pitch from a child until laid to rest.

Dear Mr. Cobb:

In the March issue of the Digest was listed a schedule for the 1975 World Tournament. This is very helpful but, for me, it was disappointing. It appears that women and juniors, some of them potential world champions, will have to quickly catch a few hours of sleep after travelling for many hours and then qualify on Sunday or get one full night's sleep, qualify on Monday morning, if there's time, and then, if they qualify for the championship class, compete that very same night! Not only might they be tired but they will be playing while others are still qualifying and perhaps even before some people have arrived. I was told by one Class A man's wife that when they arrived two years ago in Eureka, the women's championship division was all finished.

This schedule also tends to perpetuate the long, drawn-out, and unnecessary 200-shoe qualifying for men as they will have until Tuesday afternoon to qualify on all courts. Besides that, it seems as if the organizers want to get all the women and juniors out of the way by Wednesday afternoon in order to concentrate on the serious pitching. The fallacy in that is that the women and juniors are pitching seriously or they wouldn't spend so much time and money in practicing for, and attending, a World Tournament in which their chances of monetary and emotional rewards are small.

The 1974 World Tournament in Keene afforded a maximum number of different people the opportunity to see a maximum number of different classes. To take that one step further, if qualifying were completed by Monday evening, i.e. if men were only required to throw 100 shoes to qualify, each follow-

ing night could spotlight a championship class in each division; Junior girls, Junior boys, Senior men, Intermediate men, and Ladies Division. All B and C classes could be held during the day and Sunday would be a day for awards,

Closing ceremonies, a rain date, or an early start home.

There is one more point I'd like to make. It surprised me after the turnout of boys in 1974, that there are not more or bigger classes for them. If the list of the top 20 boys is any indication, there are certainly enough boys to make an exciting championship division of 12 boys with 8 boys in each of the lower classes. Hopefully, in a short time this will also be true in the ladies' division. If the tournament play starts on Tuesday, semi-finals to narrow each group of 12 down to a final 6 could be held during the day before the finals with very little strain on the courts.

Perhaps it is too late to consider these things for 1975 but many people

would probably appreciate it if they were considered in the future.

Unquestionably, there are many horseshoe pitchers with beautiful, smooth deliveries. But, according to several veterans I have spoken to, when he was

right, nobody could release the shoe more gracefully than Joe Zichella.

Joe started pitching when he was about twenty-five and has always thrown the 11/4 turn. It all began in a little park in lower Manhattan when a "farmer from Pennsylvania" who was visiting his family caught Joe's eye. Joe copied his delivery and has been throwing ringers ever since.

Interestingly, as with many pitchers, Joe bowls during the winter and carries a 179 average. However, Joe says, "Horseshoes has bowling beat a mile. You can't beat the outdoors, the walking, and the game itself!"

In 1957, Joe reached his peak. At Murray, Utah he finished in eighth place in the World Tourney with a 76.7% average. He managed to nose out the incomparable Fernando Isais 50-49, his greatest thrill as a pitcher!
