NHPA President's Message

On Saturday, May 8 I met with Joe Goldstein at the \$60,000 La Costa Mixed Tennis Doubles Classic in Calsbad, Calif. He had part in promoting this tournament. Billy Jean King, Virginia Wade, and Terry Holladay were some of the players in this NBC televised event.

I was impressed with Goldstein and what he has done in the first month nd the direction in which they are trying to take Horseshoes. His progress as told to me is as follows:

"His first month has been spent in educating, soliciting, and interesting the media in coverage of the sport, particularly the World Championships in Levittown, Pa.

Contacts have been made with many publications and a favorable response has been generated at Sports Illustrated. They have approached various editors and expect to place stories in the sports, recreational and travel sections of the various newspapers.

In addition to the initial attempts, this month they will attempt to interest Television Networks in live coverage of the World Championships. They have introduced this idea to the news divisions of all the networks. Plans are to obtain coverage of the World Tournament from Philadelphia and New York television stations and stories on the event in Philadelphia, Trenton, Newark and New York newspapers. Joe admitted that it is not easy, because so little is known about NHPA and our sport. But he assured me that solid progress has been made in 30 days.

He indicated interest in running stories concerning women competitors."

Since Sol Berman is in Poe's area and they meet often. I have appointed Sol to serve as Goldstein's source of seeking information on the sport, organization and competitors.

Joe agreed to keep me informed on his progress and will inform me immediately when anything develops of a concrete nature.

The Executive Council has approved one of the bids on the new judging tool approved at the 1975 convention. It will be available as a New Game Related Item around July 1, 1976; price is \$2.50 each. Thanks to Dorothy Pinch for acqugiring all the bids and to Arnie Mortenson of Burbank, California for the idea and design. There are two important articles printed elsewhere in this issue, "The 1976 Con-

vention Agenda and World Tournament Bonus Fund Program." PLEASE READ.

I will again have meetings at the World Tournament with the Executive Council, Regional Directors, Hall of Fame Committee, and Publicity and Progress means change committees.

Reminder — all Association Presidents are to present in writing the names of your delegation to the NHPA secretary.

Clyde Martz, former Pennsylvania State Champion, won the man's championship in the Pike County, Ohio, April Indoor Open Horseshoe Tournament. Clyde went undefeated with a 78.2 ringer average. Gary Roberts lost to Clyde in a pressure packed game 50-49 to finish second at 6-1. Jack Rainbow and Clair Bruce also participated from Pennsylvania.

Gene Rice of Toledo, Ohio walked through Class B with a 7-0 record. He averaged a fine 57.5 ringer average. David Rose edged his father, Lester, 50-49 to capture second place at 6-1.

These sites will be reserved in order of payment received, so we urge all those planning to bring their campers to send checks payable to BTHPA, to insure one of these convenient sites.



Domey Wins Easter Ham Shoot At Heritage

As announced earlier, Carl Steinfeldt brought some pretty fair pitchers to the Easter Ham Shoot at Heritage Recreation Center, Sutton, Mass. Ginger Natale, Steve Fenicchia, Tony Sauro, and John Rustin. Add Heritage regulars Joe Schultz and Art Tyson and you have quite a New York contingent. Saturday night they and our best New Englanders were put in two groups of eight for round-robin play, with the top four from each group moving to the championship group Sunday morning, for four more games.

When the smoke had cleared Ed Domey found himself at the top with an 11-0 record, thanks to a final game 36-31 win over Carl Steinfeldt. Natale finished third. You could cut the tension in that last game with a knife, and the contestants must have felt it. At 25-24 they traded sixes! At 33-31 Domey, Carl's four dead attempt was perfect, but rejected, and that was the ball game in the 35-point contest. We all expected that the championship would be decided in that last game. The excitement heightened quickly Saturday night. In the first two games it was Carl ahead of Ed for high game 83 to 72, 84 to 81. Then Ed pulled ahead 92.5% to 89.4%. Those were the high games until Norm Rioux butted in Sunday with a 91.7. Sunday Carl's first three games were in the middle 80's while Ed struggled a little, but Ed reversed the statistics in that last game.

At the 1075 World Tournament, Dick Campbell of Florida, a non-player, presented me with a World Tournament fund raising promotional program. I sent copies to the Executive Council, Regional Directors, Hall of ame and By-Laws Committees and other VIP's in the NHPA for comments and approvals pro or con. Majority of the above groups approved the program. I then appointed a committee to write the guides. These have been approved by the Council.

We mainly hope to generate the bulk of the funds from pitchers and friends NOT in the NHPA. Notice this will be a separate fund: Harold Cook of Florida will be the Treasurer.

Would appreciate if all State Secretaries, Officers and ALL MEMBERSHIP could and would get behind this program and support it. If there are any questions contact Chairman, John Rademacher, 408 N. Pevitty Drive, Plant City, Florida 33566, any committee member or myself. Thanks to all who helped on this and especially to Dick Campbell for the idea.

Guidelines — Effective 6-1-76.

WORLD TOURNAMENT BONUS FUND

PURPOSE: To promote and sustain the NHPA.

To increase funds for greater World Tournament prizes.

To locate future NHPA pitchers and Champions.

To generate funds mainly from pitchers not now in the NHPA.

METHODS: Local clubs within a state could hold amateur nights for non-members. Instructions could be given to groups or individuals, how to play the game, scoring, rules, sportsmanship and other matters pertaining to pitching horseshoes. "How To Do It" manuals would be given for donations of \$1.00 or more. (50¢ of each manual given would be sent to the NHPA.)

Individual members know of many pitchers, not now members of a pitching group. These could be asked to donate a dollar or more to the cause, and for this would be given a copy of our manual, reimbursement to the NHPA the same as above.

RECOGNITION: All clubs, members or others contributing \$5.00 or more to this Bonus Fund would be given recognition in the World Tournament brochure pertaining to same. Donors contributing \$10.00 or more would be considered sponsors with recognition as above. Monthly reports will be sent to the NHPA president. Periodic reports will be sent to the News Digest.

BENEFITS: The first World Tournament to benefit from this fund will be the tournament held in 1977.

Additional prize funds will help the host city and club provide a more successful tournament by attracting more of the top pitchers, and this in turn would create more crowd appeal. Future bidding for World tournaments will be higher and more desired with the help of these additional funds.

Note: The host club should not figure any direct benefit from this fund when making their bids as this is a bonus fund.

THE TEAM: State Secretaries or a person appointed by him or the State President would be requested to handle this project in their jurisdiction.

If person other than the State Secretary is assigned, his or her name should be sent to the Fund Treasurer, by the State Secretary.

Manuals will be sent and charged $@~50\phi$ each for action. Secretaries in charge of State programs should send funds to the Fund Treasurer with the names and amounts of donors.

1. Monthly statements will be sent to the NHPA President on monies received.

2. Funds will be kept separate from the NHPA Treasury.

- Two signatures will be placed in interest drawing account, thereby earning additional capital.
- 5. Collections made prior to June 30th each year will be withdrawn and forwarded to NHPA headquarters for disposition. Balance of \$50.00 to be left in account to sustain same.
- 6. Collections made prior to June 30th will be credited to the host tournament of same year. Collections after June 30th will apply to the tournament of the following year.



Earl Conway Of California Introduces Method Of Play And Scoring

By Stewart Snyder, Cloverdale, California

There is an increasing concern today over methods of play on the horseshoe court and the necessary task of scoring that is an integral part of the game. Rightfully so, for the desired result is to make the game more interesting to more people, to attract new pitchers and to hold marginal ones already participating.

Earl Conaway, Cloverdale Club Secretary-Treasurer, introduced a system of play and scoring that has become a favorite with our members; a 50 shoe, count-all handicap game. An 80% handicap factor is used to give maximum uniformity in scoring, if not in pitching ability. Handicap is determined by subtracting total game points from 100 and multiplying the result by 0.80. Contestants alternate first pitch, thereby leading off from the same stake throughout a game.

Each pitcher keeps his own score on a board at each end of the court. When a game is finished, total points and ringers are transferred from the scoreboards to the pitcher's accumulative record sheet. From this sheet a pitcher can tell his ringer percentage by a quick calculation (double the number of ringers), average points per game, handicap, and his standing — win or loss in relation to an opponent in a single game and to other pitchers in a tournament by comparing the summation of scores in the TOTAL GAME POINTS PLUS HANDICAP column.

Apropos of the well-intended features of count-all handicap play, the cancellation system without handicap has solid merits in tournament play when divisional championships are to be determined on pitching ability. See adjoining photo and sketches.

AUTHORS' CORNER

By SAM HAYES, Rawlins, Wyoming

It all started with the Flip Flop shoe then $\frac{3}{4} - 1\frac{1}{4} - 1\frac{3}{4}$ and it has taken a few years, all starting back in 1932 when I was eleven years old, it was in 1934 when I saw and met a World champion horseshoe pitcher, none other than Mr. Horseshoe himself. Ted Allen and Fernando Isais, they put on an exhibition here in Rawlins. There were no regulation courts at that time, so stakes were driven in the ground and a pick used to loosen up the ground and a little water was added. I did throw back and forth, but Ted used his foot, he was as accurate using his foot as most of the better pitchers in this area were by using their hand and arm; but to think of a man of this calibre to have time for a kid like me, gave me all the more reason to pitch horseshoes and to keep up with the game over the years, (Ted and I are mutual friends and see each other every once in awhile. I hope he can spare a day or so this summer and maybe we will go fishing out here in Wyoming.

There was a man by the name of Art McNeil, who lived in Cheyeene, Wyo., who was State Secretary and we organized a Club here in 1936; it was the first year I held a card. In 1938 we were granted permission to turn the Tennis court into a horseshoe court which was behind the Catholic Church. Everything went well until one Saturday night, unbeknown to any of the horseshoe pitchers, some one threw a bunch of empty beer cans over the fence into the Priest's yard, that was the end of the courts and horseshoe pitching faded out; then the second World War started and that was the end of horseshoe pitching.

While on temporary duty in Washington, D. C. another great horseshoe event happened to me and that was to pitch with the President of the United States, Mr. Harry S. Truman, he was an ardent fan of horseshoe pitching. Another great man I met and received a national card was Mr. Arch Stokes. I met him at the courts in Murray, Utah while I was stationed at Kearns, Utah. I spent many evenings on the courts in Murray during the summer months; Mr. Stokes was the secretary. When the war ended I returned to Rawlins and served my apprenticeship and then went to Embalming College in Chicago. While there I pitched in a park located on Ashland and Washington and met some fine pitchers who invited me to pitch in the Cook County Fair. In 1948 I returned to Rawlins and on January 9, 1949 we had a new aggressive mayor whom I approached with the idea of building a horseshoe court in the City Park. He said "Sam, draw me a plan and I'll do my best." This he did and we started with 6 courts and lights with a four foot fence on both sides. We began putting in our bid for the State tournaments and soon we were putting them on. Mr. Art Rugg, formerly of Wheatland, Wyo., was our State President. He was the father of Mrs. Shell Patton of Saratoga, Wyo., whose husband was four time winner of the state championship. Having tournaments is mighty nice, but you have to have people and different classes to make an interesting tournament. Speaking for our part of the country, where there is likely to be a contest, one has to drive at least 100 miles one way. It seems as though we like our own grounds to pitch on and very few of us ever return the visit and believe me I sure hope there is no other state that has this problem.

My pitching is terrible, I know it — but — I personally feel it is the cleanest game of all sports and every person is really on his own. It is a game of skill, concentration and endurance and by proper qualifying, everyone is on equal terms. I feel that the game has come a long way. The tournament director or committee should set the rules for which system is to be used, whether it be a 50 point or 50 shoes or whatever is best for each tournament due to different conditions that come up — weather, time, number per class, etc. If there is to be any extra points given, how about X number of points be given for sportsmanship on the courts or to a loser; also extra points on the person's attire, neatness, wearing of name and home town, and wearing of the N.H.P.A. insignia. Many of our readers will wonder what kind of a person is writing this article; well to put it plain there is nothing wrong with the way the game was meant to be played — but — do we as a National organization give it our best, such as other sports do by making it something of color and uniform, and less contrast. How about having a paid audience, what other major competition does one see for free? Food for thought — we as players have cheapened the game for too long of a time. There are many more rip-offs than this if this may be the thinking.

I wrote of sportsmanship, if a player should have a protest to make it **must** be understood by everyone before a contest starts that all protests shall be made at the time

an infraction has occurred, not after a game or sometime later on during a meet. During the years that I've been around, this has happened and a lot of us have never read the rules or have forgotten, but I think this should be stressed at every meet before it starts by the Director in Charge, otherwise ill feedings may be created and then it interferes with the management of a tourney.

Many of the area directors may remember of receiving a brochure from me last year for an open tournament I had, with high hopes that this would be annual. I know very well it should not be dropped after the first year for it would turn into a large tournament and this was nothing that was just decided upon, although on a rainy day in Greeley, Colo., I did make the proposal in 1974 that we do away with the Tri-State and have a Cowboy Open in Rawlins, Wyoming, because of the location and the 12 courts we now have, the conditions were ideal, but due to lack of communication and not wanting to take the burden by myself, it was necessary for me to tell our Area Director to forget about Rawlins. I am sure many of you folks will agree that it takes a lot of planning and committee work to make a tournament, and believe me I have in my scrapbook a letter written by Ted Allen, June 14, 1955 when I came up with this idea to him one day while I was visiting him in Boulder, Colo. after he thought it over in his mind, he thought it was a good suggestion, so, it took 20 years for my dream to come true and 6 months to see it go down the drain. I am sorry to all and especially to all of the wonderful pitchers that came to Rawlins last July 4 and 5, because everyone seemed to enjoy themselves and felt it was a great event.

seemed to enjoy themselves and felt it was a great event. I've tendered my resignation to our local secretary as President of the club and maybe someone else will make a better leader and carry the load.

I may add this if anyone doesn't think I love the game, when we had the six additional courts built, old Sam footed the bill for the laying of the concrete in the amount of \$378.00, besides being on City Property. I have no regrets, for this is my game and the best people I've ever met in my life have been on a Horseshoe court and I want to be among the rest of you in Levittown, Pa. this summer, God willing.

This is a mighty long note, but after 44 years in the game, one must have some thoughts and inner feelings — Right?
