




Special N.H.P.A. Recognition Plan

Four (4) N.H.P.A. committees: the executive council, regional directors, the by-laws committee, and the Hall of Fame, are considering plans to put a "special N.H.P.A. recognition plan" before the membership for their approval at the annual convention. Letters were sent to all members of these committees with preliminary "guidelines", asking for their approval and suggestions for affecting a good organized plan.

All four committees approved the plan in general and offered many suggestions. If the membership sanctions this plan to honor members of the N.H.P.A. who have been devoted to the sport for many years, it should be ready to go into effect about January, 1977. The plan would especially honor members who would perhaps never be inducted into a state Hall of Fame, or receive a local

award. We have many such members who deserve to be thanked.

The "starter outline" was in the July, 1975 issue of the Digest. Instead of the "V.I.P. plan", it will more than likely be known as perhaps "the N.H.P.A. sepcial recognition award". It is also planned to give the states the biggest hand in the function of this plan. A big factor to be decided on by the committees is to how long a member will be required to be an N.H.P.A. member to be eligible.

If the convention approved the plan the four committees involved will meet

that week to agree on the final details.

Although this plan was introduced at first by Bernard Herfurth and approved in general last year by the executive council, the Hall of Fame committee will have nothing to do with the plan once it is put into effect.

Score Keeping By The Players

1. A separate score must be kept at each stake.

2. One of the players does the recording of the score.

3. The other player is a witness.

4. It must be written on score keeping sheet as to who is the witness.

5. The witness must be the first to move his shoes but only after the score has been recorded, the pen discarded.

6. All games must be started from a designated side of the grounds. 7. There must be a judge on grounds to rule in case of controversy. FOR THE JUDGE

1. Check at opposite stake for the number of shoes pitched at that stake to locate the exact position the score should be recorded on sheet.

2. Check with the shoes to see that the correct score has been recorded. NOTE: The printing and space on score keeping sheet should be 3 or 4 times the present size.

A pen or permanent marker should be used.

Joe Goldstein Public Relations, Inc.

This will confirm the agreement between us as follows:

(1) We shall handle all general public relations and promotion nationally as to all aspects of the Event, (1976 World Tournament).(2) The National Horseshoe Pitchers' Association will pay to us the cost of

mailing, preparing releases, and any necessary long distance calls and travel expenses. There would be prior approval from you for any travel expense.

(3) The National Horseshoe Pitchers' Association will pay for our services hereunder other than as in paragraph 2 provided the sum of \$1,250 per month commencing with the month of April 1976 to October 1976, a total

of six months.

(4) Sponsorship would not be my principle role, but rather that of Mike O'Hara. However, if money came in from sponsorship, I would expect an increase in the basic fee. (Goldstein and I would re-negotiate with the

approval of the Council.)

(5) If the Event (World Tournament) is postponed, the National Horseshoe Pitchers' Association will continue to pay fee on a prorated basis. In case the National Horseshoe Pitchers' Association determines that the Event will not occur and the Event does not occur then we will be paid said monthly sum for each month up to the date we receive your written determination to cancel the Event.

(6) The payments under 5 above are exclusive of all disbursements for entertainment, travel for ourselves and press subject to prior agreement of the National Horseshoe Pitchers' Association, as well as all necessary long distance phone calls and other mailing and expenses in the normal course of completing the above contracted services, all of which shall be paid to

us in addition to 5 above.

Kindly confirm at the foot of the enclosed letter hereof, your agreement to the foregoing and return same with your check for \$1,250 for the month of April, 1976 payment.

The Future Of Horseshoe Pitching

It might seem to some that I'm 10 years ahead with my Ideas, but we are 50 years behind with too many ups and downs. I've been around horseshoe pitchers and their people for five years and I've seen no changes. Just more hard work from a few dedicated people and when they're gone there is nothing left. If we're lucky they will find someone else to take their place. I've seen this with my own eyes, year after year, the same thing.

I have had the privilege of working in promoting horseshoe pitching these past three years. And I have seen our so-called avid pitchers come and go and I've seen the real avid pitchers stop and look to see what horseshoe pitching

could really be. It doesn't take long to separate these sceptics.

The new trend in promoting horseshoes is to have it under personal supervision, which means, that the sport has to be put in the hands of people that care about its future progress and growth. People that take great pride in the quality of our equipment and in most cases, better locations. We need private enterprise. Someone that will take our sport and make it one to be recognized and not just a picnic or barnyard game. After all, it is one of the more difficult sports to master.

This trend, that I mentioned earlier, is going to come. I've seen this in different parts of the country. After all, how many Bowling Alleys or Golf Courses do you see in City Parks? If this is too fast for you, then you aren't

up on Horseshoe Pitching progress, and are many years behind us.

Analysis Of A Life Membership Plan For The N.H.P.A.

(This plan was submitted to the 1975 NHPA Convention by Carl. Delegates decided to table the plan until the 1976 Convention. It was suggested that I publish the PLAN in the Digest before the Convention so members and Delegates could discuss it before the Convention, —Wally Shipley.)

PURPOSE: To provide a new and substantial augmentation of income without any

diminution of income from regular dues sources. POTENTIAL: Reasonable sources of life memberships are:

(1) All top professional pitchers.

(2) Leading state tournament pitchers.

(3) Good organizational type pitchers who have the funds and love the sport enough to support it.

(4) Long time supporters, possibly retired.

(5) Business, union, or social organizations who can be sold a life membership

from a public relations "booster" basis.

FIGURES: Recent reports show that while the NHPA gained 294 members from 1973 to 1974, it was done the hard way . . . that is, by losing 1,648 old members and gaining 1,978 new members. Thus, it is observed that our membership is not as stable as it should be. Therefore the introduction of a life membership plan will in all likelihood **not** detract from the growth of regular membership but will actually encourage stability. The life membership base can be promoted separately, expanding on a year to year basis.

DUES: Many variables are possible. After analysis of other plans and the economics of our participants, it is suggested that the cost of a life membership in the NHPA be \$225. Every effort should be made to avoid complications, such as time payment plans or any variations in cost. It should be payable in one

lump sum.

PROMOTION: Realistically, solicitation of life members cannot be accomplished without state co-operation, and without accrual of benefits to the states. It is proposed that the National Secretary in co-operation with each State Secretary appoint a Life Membership Chairman in each state to promote the sales of Life Memberships. It is further suggested that every life member be granted life membership in both the State and the National associations . . . and that the \$225 dues be divided into \$150 for the National and \$75 for each state association. Life members would still pay tournament entry fees, but would receive the News Digest gratis. Either the National Secretary, or a special Life Membership Director of the NHPA could serve to co-ordinate the annual drives.

INCOME: If states took quotas equivalent to about 10% of their actual regular membership, this would approximate a first year drive to net at least 500 life members. This would bring \$75,000 to the National Office, and \$37,500 to be divided among the State Offices. Dues could be adjusted to economic conditions

in 3 years.

ACTION: The State Life Membeship Chairpersons should be in contact with all local club secretaries on methods of solicitation:

(1) Individual selling. (2) Dinners, dances, socials in honor of new life members.

(3) Contacting business organizations.

PUBLICITY: (1) Honor new life members by news releases, introduction at events, plaques, national certificates, and names eventually inscribed on a tablet or scroll in NHPA Office.

An interesting horseshoe personality . . .



Rick Lebel Ottawa, Ontario

Rick has been pitching horseshoes since 1964 and has had considerable success with his pitching. In 1974 he won the Class AA section of the Canadian Championships at Toronto. Since he is only 28 years old, he has plenty of time left to improve. And he knows that he must improve with men such as Elmer Hohl, Dean McLaughlin, and Ken Smith in the only class left above him!

As is often the case, Rick started pitching the flip, but had the good fortune to soon meet Jack Adams. Jack quickly convinced him that he would be far

better off throwing the 1%.

Jack and Rick had considerable success in doubles tournaments as soon as Rick mastered the turn. Doubles play, incidentally, is more popular than singles in the Ottawa Valley. Jack's move to British Columbia a couple of years ago was a great disappointment to Rick. (Jack is now Provincial Secretary in British Columbia and has been a great asset to horseshoes for many years. He never misses a World Tournament and competed in Class B in 1971 at Middlesex, New Jersey.)

During the winter, Rick bowls to stay in shape, and also has a keen interest in hockey. He averages 240 in 5 Pins, a fairly good score. In this game 450 is a perfect game — not 300 as in 10 Pins. He also finds time to collect coins and has a 1923 penny which has a market value of more than 200 dollars! In that

year few pennies were made, and this one is in perfect condition.

Fortunately for the Ottawa Valley region, Rick is not just a player, but an organizer, too. Since 1964 he has served as Secretary, Treasurer, and Statistician for the Ottawa Metro League. The Ottawa League now has 68 members, a number which speaks for itself! From time to time several men have done important jobs, but Rick, Rollie Lambert, and Dick Gagne have been the mainstays of the league.

Regarding the game's future, Rick has many ideas. He favors retaining the cancellation system and is an opponent of the 50 shoe game. He feels that a player having a bad game can sometimes become very discouraged with the 50 shoe system. 50-0 is bad enough, but scores such as 91-0, 86-3, etc., are just

a little too much. 35 point games, he feels, would be far better. Rick is pleased that this year's World Tournament will have 48 players in the championship class. He envisions the day when there may be as many as 60 players in the top class. He feels that more and more players are getting better and better and that, as in golf, the World Tournament will have to be structured in a way that will encourage a player to travel hundreds or even thousands of miles.

Publicity is another facet of the game which Rick feels needs to be im-

proved. He hopes that the leadership is giving this their full attention.

Rick's ambition is to improve enough to be able to challenge Canada's leading players and, also, to eventually play in a World Tournament. Good luck with your pitching, Rick.



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

AUTHORS' CORNER

The 1975 NHPA World Tournament

Finally, I understand what some have known since almost forever. That the NHPA world tournament is more than an oversized ten day pitching event; more even, than a contest to crown world champions. What this tournament is, instead, is a rare summer happening. Where the plain pumpkin, somehow, is touched by magic and turns suddenly into a golden coach. A delicious experience. A pure delight. Not for everyone, of course, but certainly for those who follow the NHPA through the Horseshoe Digest, and who rate competitive pitching as their favorite sport.

If this gushy enthusiasm is suspected of being a gross exaggeration, understand that I came to the 75 affair at Layfayette, Indiana as a novice. Fresh off the boat, so to speak. My background limited to the pages of the Digest, and to some story telling by NHPA members returning from the world games. The little I knew dealt mostly

with the glittering talents of our pitching stars.

Nobody lied about the talent of our top pitchers, I found that out quick. Whooee, were they good. Not only the men of the championship class, but the women too, and the junior boys and girls. In truth, the world class men pitchers were the least exciting. Somehow, they were too efficient, too professional. All who made the big class could stack ringers with regularity, of course, but in the pack of 36 was this famous, small handful of overkill specialists, who spoiled the suspense with their fearsome accuracy. It seemed wrong, somehow, to spend five days weeding down. No complaint understand, just an observation. The men's class has frequently caused comment, and I have no solution. Well, just one. A simple remedy that would level the class quickly. Against the wall stand Hohl and Day, and a few others quilty of that horrifying talent for throwing ringers, and shoot them stone dead. Admittedly, the idea has a few minor flaws, and knowing the nature of do-gooders, they would magnify these imperfections and nit-pick them to death.

What I did enjoy, especially, was the night set aside for the women and the juniors. More than I expected, really. It was an evening of suspense, and skill, and excitement. The ladies added a delicate touch of class and softness with their natural grace, and they all looked so very nice. Don't be misled by our weaker sex. There was not a pussy cat in the bunch when it came to putting on ringers. The junior girls were absolutely great. With their energy and enthusiasm creating a fresh kind of electricity. It seemed to me that their games were more fun then the others, and somehow, the feeling was

there that maybe everyone else was doing something just a little bit wrong.

Except the junior boys, because, honest injun, on that night in 75 hardly any junior did anything wrong. They were unbelievable, those junior kids were. It was almost unlawful the way they dropped on ringers. Watching them, it made me sad to see how good they got in such a short time, after all the years of work I put in just to get a mediocre badge. And watching them made me proud, because sometime, very soon, these same kids would be our new stars. I mean, how could they miss.

This then was the obvious specialty of the world tounament. The brilliant stars of the NHPA, in their element, putting on a show. But this was only one side of the mountain. For you see, the world tournament offers more than just a series of pitching contests to see who should wear the crowns. Really, the very best part of the

tournament was found elsewhere.

Take the crowd, for instance. That was something. I mean that overwhelming, suffocating, beautiful mass of humanity was really something. People everywhere. Filling the grandstand ten levels high to overflowing; making 15 minute lines for a simple sandwich, or a cup of coffee, for goodness sakes. And cars, and trucks, and campers jamming the parking lot so tight that it was hunt and search, scheme and plot, just to find an opening. At a horseshoe pitching tournament, of all places!! It was ridiculous. It was marvelous.

Even better was that exquisite period of time when everyone who wanted to pitch had to qualify. Some got off easy with one hundred shoes, but the majority had to endure the 200 shoe walk. Never have I witnessed such perfect suffering. Such extreme pain. Such mental anguish. It was not so much the actual 200 shoe trip itself that brought so much pleasure, but rather, the way each one suffered with their private fears before the test was actually faced. No one escaped the torment, from

the world class pitcher down to the pure novice. Some put up a good front with laughing and joking, and humming to themselves. Others invented secret tricks to ease the pressure. Drinkers drank. Smokers smoked. Some cried in private, I'll bet anything. The poor officials nearly went crazy trying to herd the pitchers on the courts to register their score. Few were ready. Instead, they wanted to practice, and fidget, and talk about terrible ailments that suddenly arrived on their bodies. And most certainly, they had to check the weather and test the clay. In the end, of course, none of these antics worked. Each had to take the walk and score those 200 shoes. After all of this, how long did it take to pitch 200 shoes with destiny hanging on each delivery? A shade short of eternity. At least that is what some claim.

So there you have it. Just a smattering of what took place in the summer of 75 at the fine town of Layfayette, Indiana. A poor account really, because so much has been left unsaid. Like the many friendships renewed and made during the annual meet.

But there is only one way to really understand the enjoyment that a NHPA world tournament offers. And that is to attend one, of course. So, why not make plans now to visit Levittown, Pennsylvania this summer. It's where the action will be.

Eberhart Reports For Delaware, Maryland And New Jersey

This report condenses my three reports for 1975 (which reached very few people) along

with the first for 1976.

This past year was one of real progress for both Md. and N. J. Maryland with more participation in tournaments with many more out-of-staters. They now have an active Junior group which pitched in the State Tournament, with Salisbury Recreation Commission backing in 1976. Tournaments cover a week-end with singles and doubles.

The Wicomico Club of Salisbury is the backbone of the State Association. State of-ficers are: President, Willard Sammons; Vice-President, Elwood Wheatley; Secretary-Treasurer, Parker Sturgis; Tournament Director, John Taylor. In addition, much business is conducted by an eight member Board.

President Sammons is a congenial, enthusiastic promoter of the game, who lives in Seaford, Del. We plan to work together in an effort to rejuvenate the faltering Delaware Association. He has spotted a couple of "oldfashioned" clubs which may offer an opening wedge. He attended one tournament where games were fifteen points. "store" shoes were required and he was not allowed to use his official shoes. This suggests that both an educational and selling job will be needed.

The Jersey season was very successful with fourteen tournaments on the State schedule (3 AAU, 11 sanctioned and 8 open). Our first use of required pre-registration, in spite of some dire predictions, produced the greatest tournament participation ever. In addition, our three most active clubs held a number of tournaments of their own including four invitational. These included a special celebration and tournament by the Hamilton-Wagner Museum at Clifton, the first tournament at Little Falls and again a two day invitational by the Flemington Club during the big Flemington Fair.

Of special interest was an invitational demonstration tourrament in May at the Rockefeller Plaza, New York City. This was sponsored by the N. J. and N. Y. Associations through Walter Pruiksma, Alvin Cherry and Lou Gancos (N. Y.) under the direction of Mr. James Daniel, Coordinator of Community Events at Rockefeller Plaza. A bigger tournament (12 man R.R.) was held at the Plaza July 5. These created much interest.

A very special event. Parks Council's Offbeat Olympiad, was held on October 15 at the beautifully renovated UYC Passenger Ship Terminal at W. 55th Street. Celebrities such as Howard Cosell, John Lindsay, Frank Gifford and many others attended. Six top N. J. players put on a beautiful demonstration before a large crowd. Al Cherry engi-

neered arrangements.

Articles and letters in the NEWS DIGEST World Tournaments, indicate that many of and discussions with players, particularly at our players believe change is necessary if our sport is to gain more popular acceptance. Here in Dr. Berman's state we try a few changes each year to see how well they work. For several years we have been using mostly 50 shoe games. This last year at one of our bigger tournaments we changed the scoring for the top two classes to count all, ringers only but at a value of 2 points/ringer. Thus at the end of 50 shoes a player's score was also his ringer percentage. In addition, players pitched from opposite ends of the court thus always having an open stake and each called his opponent's score before changing stakes. Many players likes this system once they were used to it.

Another N. J. innovation was the elimination of trophies in many of our tournaments. Just the trophy name plates (tournament, class, standing and date) were presented to the top three persons in each class. When anyone had won three plates he received free a lovely wooden plaque on which to mount

them. Reaction was mixed.

What is probably the oldest continuous tournament in the country is the Union County Parks Commission restricted to residents or those who work in the county. It is reported to have been held for 56 consecutive years. Dr. Sol Berman won it 25 years,

Al Cherry the last two.

The very successful N. J. State Association Annual Banquet was held November 9. Elections to the N. J. Hall of Fame for 1975, Arthur P. Scolari and W. E. Santoro, announced at that time. The following Association Officers for 1976 were introduced: President, Alvin Cherry; Secretary-Treasurer, Claude White, Jr.; 1st Vice President, Walter Pruiksma; 2nd Vice President, Al Ward; 3rd Vice President, Ed Brault; 4th Vice Presi-Ted Lewis; 5th Vice President, Paul Puglise; 6th Vice President, James Reed.
