Miller, Mauzey And Manitone Dominate Santa Rosa Class B (Northern California)

Northern California's most improved pitcher of 1975, Millard Miller of Turlock, mangled mighty Bob Mauzey; manipulated a marauding Pete Manitone and swept seven straight 50-shoe games on the Sonoma County Fairgrounds in Santa Rosa. Mauzey had the best percentage and high game of the day (66%), but lost one close tussle to place second.

Don Wheeler took a pressure-packed play-off game from Ken Woolery 41-31 to pace Group II. Don also chalked up the high Group II game of 60%.

Well-traveled Walt East displayed his usual tenacity to emerge as top dog in Group III, with Frank Cravalho finishing second.

The Sacramento club achieved the 2nd hat trick of the season, finishing 1, 2, 3 in Group IV. John Hintzman racked up 6 opponents, let one get by, but did manage 54%.

Dale Lipovsky beat Jack O'Connor and they really put on a great show. This made Dale's straight State Victory in the past four years, his fourth State Title.

This year was also our first Ladies State meet. Phyllis Negaard, from St. Joseph, Minn. is our first Ladies State Champion. We are proud to have had two classes of ladies and hope to get more next year.

With the largest State Tournament ever held in Minnesota we owe a big thank you to the Blue Earth Wells Federal Club for being host. It's a lot of work to run a tournament this large and they did a fine job. Thanks Blue Earth. There were 192 men, 14 ladies and 16 boys in the tournament, a total of 222 entries.



New Emphasis Needed In The NHPA

We are now trying to publicize our sport. Why? In the hope that we will grow, especially in membership. Will it happen? I think not. Why? For the same reason we haven't grown in the past. What is that reason? We are locked into a tournament mentality. We think tournaments alone will sell our sport to those on the outside. Are there any other reasons? Yes. Two. They are the high cost of dues and the lack of any benefits to the pitchers.

Forget for the moment any unknown pitchers, those who buy the millions of horseshoes sold each year. Merely survey the members of clubs and leagues who do not join the NHPA. How many clubs can boast of having even half of their members in the NHPA? Any promotion that the NHPA can devise is bound to have the effect of benefitting local clubs more than the NHPA. This is good for the clubs, but not for the NHPA.

The NHPA must completely change its priorities as to what is important, if it is to grow. For too long all too many NHPA members have believed that the skill of our best pitchers is the best way to sell our sport. The "work your way to the top if you want any glory" and "if we could just get Day, Seibold, and company on TV, people will flock to us" thinking. The only "glory" we now give are tournament or class champion patches. The World Tournament has provided considerable exposure to our best players. Have the host clubs noted any dramatic increases in their memberships because of this exposure? I doubt it.

What are the new priorities needed? They are three. First, reduce the price of admission (dues) to a more acceptable level. Second, expand the Awards Program. Three, get the NHPA involved in league play, leagues that have weak pitchers as well as good ones. The Awards Program is the carrot to attract league pitchers.

First we must reduce the dues. The 1974 dues increase was justified by saying we need more money to promote. The result has been more money but a reduction in membership. It seems obvious to me that we should explore other ways to gain the added income. The following price structure could be used.

- 1. Reduce NHPA dues to \$3.00, juniors \$1.00.
- 2. Charge players in sanctioned tournaments ten cents. If sixty entries, \$6.00 is sent to the NHPA.
- 3. League sanction fee, \$4.00. Tournament sanction fee, \$4.00.
- 4. Court registration fee, \$1.00 per court, \$12.00 maximum. Registration good for a two-year period. Payment of this fee by clubs or individual (back yard courts) pitchers entitles them to be listed in a National Directory of Courts. The directory would be updated every two years. A certain number would be distributed free to state and league officials and additional copies provided for a very small fee.

Second, we must greatly expand our Awards Program. We must start recognizing accomplishments by a large range of pitchers, not just class champions. Such awards as: Most Improved Pitcher; perfect games; pitching various numbers of consecutive ringers; pitching X amount over average; league champions; and others. These awards need not be emblems. We could issue Most Improved Pitcher belt buckles. A merit badge could be given for four consecutive ringers. Bars would be issued that could be attached to the basic badge, for greater runs of ringers. The top pitchers might disdain such an award, but a 10 or 20 percenter would appreciate the recognition by the NHPA. The point is, such awards should be available. You earn it, you get it. An Awards Program will help the NHPA gain high visibility.

Third, we must begin sanctioning leagues. I strongly advise we do not attempt to insist on uniformity in the conduct of leagues, any more than we demand uniformity for tournaments. The primary purpose of the Awards Program and the reduced dues is to make the sanctioning of leagues an attractive idea at the local level. Of course, to obtain a league sanction, all league members must be NHPA members.

In the November 1974 News Digest, Ronald Lundberg, secretary of the "C"

league in the Minneapolis Horseshoe Club, wrote of his concern that the NHPA had raised the dues from \$1.50 to \$5.00. He had pushed mandatory membership for his 80 members in the past but could not see how he could justify this at \$5.00. He said, "Maybe the NHPA should give the game back to the guy that only plays in the league one night a week or one tournament a year." I say that, for all intents and purposes, this one night a week guy never had the game, so far as the NHPA is concerned. IT'S ABOUT TIME WE START-ED!

The one point we must recognize is that the vast majority of horseshoe pitchers pitch for recreation only. One night a week is enough. They do not like to travel or disrupt their weekends for tournaments. To them, leagues are fun, tournaments are work. You doubt this? The St. Moritz Horseshoe club in Massachusetts has about 30 of its 50 members in the NHPA. That is probably the highest ratio of any club in New England. The largest league in our state, the Twin County League, has at most half a dozen NHPA members. The rest are content with their league play, have no interest in tournaments, and have no good reason to join the NHPA. The NHPA must begin to take an interest in these people if it is to grow. The Preamble to our Constitution reads in part, ". . . promote establishment of leagues . . " Let's start promoting, in a way that will benefit our sport and the NHPA.

The only way this new priority can come about is if the Executive Council knows that you, the horseshoe pitchers, want the change. They won't know unless we tell them. Will each of you do me a favor? Will you drop me a line, even a postcard will do, and tell me three things? 1. Whether you agree or disagree with me. 2. If you agree, and this plan were implemented, would your league consider obtaining a sanction? 3. What league or club you belong to. If you care to add comments or suggestions for improvement, feel free to do so. Especially your ideas on other awards and types of awards to be used.

There is a deadline. Changing the dues and other fees means a change to the By-Laws. Proposed changes are supposed to be in the hands of the By-Laws Committee by February. Write to me now. I'll let the Executive Council know what you think. Thank you. Russell Gadoury, 44 Edward Rd. Watertown, MA 02172.



He was jokingly embarrassed at this because his pitching shirt has five consecutive yearly emblems arranged in a semi-circle.




