



Happy to announce the Council has approved to reimburse Pete Shepard for his out of pocket expense for the extra money needed for the unfortunate mixed up NHPA party in 1976. In addition extra trophies were approved and had to be purchased by Levittown for the tournament of which Pete paid for himself. This amount was approved and refunded. Thanks, Pete, for your help. We have all learned a great lesson.

Attention all candidates for NHPA office. There is now a new section in the Judiciary section passed by the convention delegates. It reads as follows: "Issues pertaining to future kWorld Tournament sites, Candidates for office, and changes in the Constitution and By-Laws shall be submitted to the News Digest for publication several months prior to the National Convention."

In order to give the delegates ample time to decide on who to vote for I am suggesting all candidates be published in the April Digest. This should give all states time to discuss their wishes with their delegates attending the convention. The By-Laws changes will also be published in the April issue.

REG. DIR. BARRY CHAPELLE REPORTS FROM NORTHWEST

Since the position of Regional Director was created, I have noticed that several of the Directors, including myself, have not had publications printed in our national newsletter. Because the Northwest is well removed from the geographic hotbed of horseshoes and most people are not familiar with us, I would like to introduct

to the rest of the nation, "Horseshoes in the Pacific Northwest."

Our region is broken up into three states; Idaho, Oregon, and Washington. Idaho does not have a lot of activity, as its few members are scattered over a wide area, but they showed interest in a national charter in 1976 and we are hoping that they will have one in 1977. Major centers of interest are Lewiston in the northwest and Boise and Buhl in the southern part of the state. Many Idaho pitchers participate in tournaments in eastern Oregon and Washington. E.J. Wiley from Nampa pitched in the World Championship class many times in Murray, Utah and he is still active in the game. Probably the best pitcher in the state is Clarence Cummins.

The state of Washington is rich in horseshoe tradition and although their NHPA membership is down from previous years, they had 380 members in their state association in 1976, with half of those being NHPA members. Their NHPA membership is still in the top ten, and a few years ago, was number one nationally. The man most responsible for this was Herb Okeson, who was a recipient of the annual Stokes award and was also responsible for the NHPA Hall of Fame showcase. He resigned as Secretary-Treasurer of the state association last fall and suffered a severe heart attack shortly after but is now well on the road to recovery.

Washington boasts of three ex-Worlds Champions; John Monasmith in the men's division, Kelly O'Brien in the junior girls, and Francis "Winnie" Winetrout a two-time winner in the Intermediate division. Washington also claims the winner of the last years World Junior "B" division, Joe Bartlett. "Winnie" was "Mr. Horseshoe" in the state for many years and has been honored by having a series of tournaments named after him. Every year during the winter months, they have a series of six tournaments, held bi-weekly at Seattle, called the Winetrout Classic. After all six tournaments are held, special awards are given to the winners of the various classes. It's a fun event and a great tribute to a fine man. Monasmith was not active last year due to injuries and job commitments but we hope to see him again this year. Kelly finished third in last year's World Junior Girls' division. Also smooth-swinging Henry Knauft is a title threat in any tournament he pitches in. He is the current state champ and hopes to get to Greenville this summer. Other top pitchers are Ed Fishel, Bill Foss, Herb Criss, and Joe Krug.

Washington does a good job with inter-city and club competition. This helps keep interest at a high level and provides keen competition during the off-season months. Much of it is done on a handicap basis so all pitchers can compete equally. State President, Bill Owens, hosts much of this competition on courts on his own property at Mt. Vernon. He has four indoor courts and 18 outdoor courts. During the spring and summer months there are many fine open tournaments throughout the state. The only drawback with any of the facilities is that most of them are sand or sandy loam courts. It does keep their maintenance problem down,

however.

The state of Oregon is also rich in horseshoe tradition and ranks in the top ten in NHPA membership. Under the expert guidance of President Elmer Otnes, and Vice President Bill Hulshof, a variety of activities is offered its members. From April through September, there are twenty-one tournaments with all but two NHPA sanctioned. Included in this list is a state doubles tournament where the teams are seeded by percentage, which leads to very close competition; an unsanctioned "fun day" which has competition in seniors, intermediates and mixed doubles, plus a huge potluck dinner and lots of door prizes, and a weekend where the state has three sectional tournaments. Some of the clubs are working on challenge matches on a

home and home basis with neighboring clubs and this is adding to the fun.

The big names in Oregon are familiar to most horseshoe pitchers. Sarah Byers, now deceased, won the Worlds Women's title in 1950 and 1951. Bob West is a definite contender for the World Championwhip whenever he can attend and finished seventh last year. Vicki Chapelle Winston, although now married and living in Missouri, started her brilliant career in Oregon in the early 1950's. Her father, Cletus Chapelle, has done more for the NHPA in the Northwest for the last 25 years than any other person and served as NHPA President for a year in the 1950's. He has pitched in every Oregon State Championship Tournament since 1940. Some names that bear watching are current state champion Ridge Leggett, who averaged over 80%; Jim Burke, who pitched in Eureka in 1973 and has now recovered from a heart attack and consistent Lowell Davis. Howard Peterson, who would be a threat for the Senior's title if he could attend the World Tournament, and Sandy Bartel, a fifteen year old young lady who averaged over 60% twice last summer. Speaking of names, here's an interesting bit of trivia, Ted Allen won the Oregon State Championship in 1932.

Several items of interest have evolved over the years in the Northwest, and are worth sharing. A few years ago, the state of Washington started an award system that eliminated giving trophies in Men's Classes A and B and Women's Class A. Most of the winners in these classes already had several trophies and were looking for other kinds of awards. From this groundwork, a beautiful wooden plaque in the shape of the state was designed and is now awarded to the winners of these classes. Once a plaque is won, any future finish which merits an award is rewarded with a plate inscribed for that particular tournament to be mounted on the plaque, which will hold eighteen plates in all. The beauty of this system is that a pitcher can have his whole list of tournament achievements on just one piece of hardwood. The plaque mounts easily on a wall and is an attractive conversation piece. The state of Oregon, after studying Washington's system, has adopted a similar awards system which will be inaugurated this year. Naturally, their plaques will be shaped like the state of Oregon.

Another item worth mentioning is a team match between the top eight players of Oregon and Washington. This event has been held for the past three years with fairly good success, but is questionable this year because of sponsorship problems. We hope to continue it if we can, because it has been an enjoyable and very competitive event. It is scored on a team basis, and after every member of Oregon has played every member of Washington (eight rounds of eight games each) the wins are totaled up. The winning team splits

the prize. This type of competition is ideal for neighboring states to try.

CHAPELLE REPORTS — (Continued)

Each year, the area wraps up its summer season with the annual Pacific Northwest Open, held in Yakima, Wash. This tournament was started in 1946 and has been held every year since then. Cletus Chapelle, who helped found the event, has pitched in every one of the tournaments. The tournament annually attracts over one-hundred entrants from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Canada, and occasional participants from other areas. It is a truly fine way to finish a season.

Both Oregon and Washington put out excellent newsletters to their members. Washington puts out a magazine every month and Oregon has about six a year, from March to November. Both states have also

established their own Halls of Fame.

One of the few weaknesses in our region is the lack of an outstanding facility which could host a world tournament. Although nothing has appeared in the immediate future to remedy this situation, we are hopeful to someday have a world tournament in our area. Almost one of every ten NHPA members lives in the Northwest, and we would like to give them a chance to pitch in a World Tournament someday.

FRANK ALSLEBEN OF MINNESOTA MOST ARDENT HORSESHOE FAN

Frank "Ace" Alsleben of Moorehead, Minn. is believed to be one of the most ardent

horseshoe pitching fans and followers.

The art of watching others pitch and compete in leagues and tourneys was taken up by "Ace" about 30 years ago. While he watches and follows softball, baseball, bowling and other sports with interests also, horseshoe rates as his favorite. It is not unusual to see him on the sidelines watching the pitchers at the Fargo and Moorehead leagues every summer evening. Tournaments bring him out and he watches with feverish interest from the first and last pitch.

"Ace" has become a close friend of hundreds of pitchers around the nation. He is a long-time subscriber of the NHPA News Digest and other publications on the sport. He became a close friend of John Monasmith of Washington when he pitched in the 1967 World Tournament at Fargo. Frank Stinson, the late Art Engebretson and other Upper Midwest pitchers consider

Alsleben a great friend and booster of the game.

A collector of sports record books, "Ace" is seldom stumped on trivia questions. He has a stock of record books on all sports. Remembering names has always been a long suit for the 57-year-old Moorehead sportsman.

Now is is waiting for the 1977 horseshoe season to roll around. He will be on the sidelines watching the quarter-turns and the three-quarter turns sail through the air at Oak Grove Park in Fargo and at the Moorehead Park Board-Legion courts.

ARNIE MOSNESS WINNER OF FIRST WESTERN MONTANA INDOOR OPEN

On the night of November 13, 1976 Western Montana held their first Indoor Open Tournament. The response was somewhat overwhelming but with the help and understanding of all hands, things went well. Forty-nine pitchers showed up and we played for nine hours on twelve temporary courts. Arnie Mossness was the winner.

The tournament was held in the Showbarn at the Bozeman, Montana Fairgrounds. This building is 200 by 60 feet clear span with a dirt floor with excellent overhead clearance. It is heated throughout, bleachers on one long side, a kitchen and heated restrooms. In short, a super place to play horseshoes in the winter.

All games were 60 shoe with a last point option. Like all states we have differing opinions on the merits of the limited shoe game versus the 50 point game but nearly all tournaments in western Montana are 60 shoe, last point option.



The Utah Association pays tribute to memory of one of its most ardent and enthusiastic pitchers and promoters, Dr. Gilbert C. Moesinger of Ogden, Utah. "Doc" as he was known by all his friends and associates, passed away on December 30, 1976 of a kidney failure.

He was a perfectionist in everything that he undertook. During his scholastic days he was a top athlete and on graduating from Utah State University became a top high school coach with his teams winning many high honors. "Doc" was always looking for new challenges so he took up the study of medicine serving some time in the Armed forces. In 1954 with two other physicians settled in Ogden, Utah and established the Weber Clinic serving the community very well. He was admired and loved by all.

"Doc" loved the game of horseshoes and could be found on weekends on a court somewhere in Utah. He served in many ways from being just "one of the boys" to being a good sport and

finally being president of the Utah State Association.

When it became difficult for "Doc" to play due to his condition and having cataracts on his eyes which kept him from seeing the peg, he would still come out standing behind the fence and listen and then the way the shoe landed and say "it sounds like a ringer."

He is survived by his wife, 3 sons and a daughter to which the sincerest and heartfelt sympathy of the Utah Association, the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association and countless friends is extended in their hour of bereavement.

The Wyoming Horseshoe Pitcher's Association lost one of its dedicated members in the death of Sam L. Hayes of Rawlins, Wyoming. For more than 30 years he participated in tournaments and sold horseshoe pitching in the Rocky Mountain Region. Sam was a friendly person. His keystone for the future popularity and success of horseshoe pitching was vigorous and unrelenting action on the part of dedicated pitchers. Sam is eulogized by his forthright convictions that horseshoe pitchers must energetically support the NHPA and thereby reap the benefits of all for one and one for all. This loyal supporter and pitcher, despite his handicap in late years, was the motivating force in getting 12 modern courts installed at Rawlins and to initiate the sanctioned Cowboy Open tournament.

To his bereaved family the sympathy of the Wyoming Association together with that of the National Association is extended.

At ceremonies held on Labor Day weekend in Erie, Pa., John Fulton and Michael Reidl were inducted into the Keystone State's newly established Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame.

John Fulton was selected as one of the greatest pitchers in Pennsylvania history. He has won more state championships than any other player — a total of ten (10). He was the first state champ to average over 70% when he posted 75.5 in the 1949 state tournament.

Michael Reidl was inducted into the Hall of Fame on the basis of serving as a faithful promotor-organizer for more than thirty (30) years.

The Hall of Fame Committee consisted of Clair Bruce, chairman; Joseph Mancini, Clyde Martz, and Jack Rainbow. The Committee is indebted to Bernard Herfurth of Massachusetts for his guidance in creating the Hall of Fame, which is patterned after the National Hall of Fame.

Credit for the Hall of Fame display goes to Jack Rainbow and Dave Baker. It is a beautiful handcrafted portable display made of maple and walnut complete with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Coat of Arms.
