AUTHORS' CORNER Something Nice To Know

Some things do happen fast. The one and only 1977 NHPA professional tour started on 29 July in Greenville, Ohio, and suddenly, nine days later it was over without even leaving town. Some tour! Not that it wasn't fun while it lasted. The one stop trip, better known as the world tournament, gave the NHPA veteran pitchers their usual yearly treat. In spades!! It truly was an exceptionally fine event. Made possible, of course, by the fine city of Greenville with its excellent park facilities and its beautiful and very functional park campsite; and by the Darke County Horseshoe Club, whose members worked long and hard to insure a successful tournament. Both Greenville and the Darke County Horseshoe Club lived up to their reputation, which was no small feat. What they did not do, is do Des Moines, Iowa, the host for the up-coming 1978 world tournament, a favor, as the show put on in Greenville will be a tough act to follow.

But still, a one stop tour is still only a one stop tour. When only nine days out of the year are used by the NHPA to run good money tournaments, it sure leaves a lot of open dates on the calendar. Which is that there will be again in 1978. Once more, the only real money event for 78 will be the world tournament. And frankly, it takes some stretching of the imagination to even call the world meet a money event. Clearly, the NHPA does not offer much in the way of money prizes to our top class pitchers; but as the officials have been saying for the last fifty years, "It takes time to get things rolling." Now, everybody fall down laughing.

Except the world class pitchers, who may be excused if they fall down crying. The financial rewards for being a top talent in tournament pitching is so minimal, it is almost sinful. Not that our professional level pitchers deserve any sympathy. The lack of involvement of the 70% and over pitchers, as a lobby group within the NHPA, is probably the main reason that the NHPA has not made more than a token effort over the years to offer good money tournaments and encourage development of attractive pitching facilities. The top echelon of tournament pitchers may consider it dignified and unselfish to stand to the side and not get involved with the politics of the NHPA. Which it is. But it is more than that. What it really is, is dumb. Not dumb, as in dumb dumb; but rather, dumb as in unsmart.

It is agreed that our world class group exert a heavy impact on the direction of the NHPA if not by action, then by non-action — then it can also be agreed that the best place to lose sympathy for the plight of the world class pitchers is at the world tournament. The coming together of the NHPA clan offers our top pitchers from across the States and Canada, a once a year opportunity to meet together and draw up, or reaffirm, a position of mutual interest. If this was done, then at the national convention the world class pitchers could send to the podium one of their more illustrious members to advise the assembled delegates of the views of the professional level pitchers. Nothing dramatic, nothing complicated, nothing obscene. Just a simple reading from a 'want' list, those things that the pros consider important to their role in competitive horseshoes. But this is not done. As a group, the world class pitchers make no statement and exert no pressure. It's all rather strange.

It is also rather sad. Failure of the world class pitchers to add their combined weight to influence the direction of the NHPA is the curse that comes from breeding and training. It may be alright for the casual, lukewarm pitchers to set down demands, and to raise 'holy hallelujah' about being under-recognized and overcharged, but our top pitchers cannot bring themselves to press for improvements that would improve the game because it would smack of being self serving. It would be interesting to hear what Billy Jean King of tennis would say to that. Probably, "#*&#*%."

To make matters worse, the non-involvement of our very best does not go unnoticed by the NHPA young potentials; those younger members of the world class, and the up-coming

junior spectaculars. There is much truth to the adage, "Monkey see, monkey does." So much so, that the heritage of world class people is passed from generation to generation. Always, the top pitchers understand that championship caliber horseshoes is just a pleasant pastime. A fun game, and never mind the rewards and recognition that the same level of talent brings in other sports. Which is not dumb, as in unsmart; but rather, which is dumb, as in real dumb!!

Hopefully, the new generation of world class pitchers and junior fantastics will recognize the severe penalty that comes from non-involvement, and will somehow cause the top pitchers to band together. The sooner, the better. Right now, that marvelous minority of NHPA members who want better things for the NHPA — including the current leading spokesman for this group, Dr. Sol Berman, that mad medicine man from wilderness up there somewhere in New Jersey, and his small, merry band of East Coast malcontents — badly need support in the push to upgrade the NHPA game. We know that our world class pitchers are talented; we can only hope that they also understand. Understand!!

We will continue to give an extra \$100.00 dollars to the winner of the class A division over and above the normal prize, Wells promised. In addition, all lower class winners will receive \$25.00 dollars above the regular prizes, he added.

All entries will be \$8.00. Those who make classes A, B or C will pay 3, 2 or 1 dollar extra.

SCHULTZ TOPS CHRISTMAS CLASSIC AT HERITAGE (MASS.)

Joe Schultz swept eight games to win the 1977 Christmas Classic in Sutton, Mass. Two games in the 80's and steady pitching throughout the day turned the trick for Joe. Art Tyson and Ed Domey were runnersup. In other classes Paul Schultz won Class 2 with a playoff victory over Bill Rogers; Willy Paradis walked away with Class 3; Joe Grillo defeated Bill White for a playoff win in Class 4; Bob Martin finally pitched a tournament like his league average to handily win Class 5; Ralph Lacerte edged Harry Brown for Class 6 honors; with a sigh of relief Harry Schricker put seven solid games together to win Class 7; newcomer Cleo Breton won a three-wāy playoff in Class 8.

The Christmas Classic was a day of superlatives. Willy Paradis finished fourth in Class 1. The unusual part is that on the basis of past performance and lack of pitching, Willy was placed in Class 3, where averages are not usually above 50%. Because there was an opening in Class A, he was invited to play eight more games. He then average 67.4% and stonewalled Ed Domey with an 81.4% game, just one of his four 80 plus games for the day.

Formerly the secretary of the South Dakota State Fair at Huron and of the Heart of Illinois Fair at Peoria, Taylor has a keen knowledge of the fair operation and the importance of holding such an event as the World Horseshoe Tournament at his facility. Taylor tossed some questions of his own at me since he knew that I had been coordinator of the 1967 tournament held at Fargo, N.D., and that I have pitched and attended other tournaments at Keene, N.H., Greenville, O., and Salt Lake City, Utah. He realizes the importance of housing of participants and their families and need for camping areas near the pitching site.

Taylor said that Des Moines area pitchers are primed to serve as great hosts for the tourney. He said the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce is putting out the red carpet plus the cash

HERITAGE HANDICAP SINGLES LEAGUE - SUTTON, MASS.

With one quarter of the winter schedule played, Paul Bricault leads the Heritage Singles League with a won-loss average of .750, closely followed by Reggie Ploof and John Angus. Nineteen pitchers compete each week in four 50-shoe count-all games, using 100% handicap. Handicaps are kept current by using each player's average points scored for the last three weeks. Thus, an average game is 150 points.

Needless to say, some tight matches result. Statistician Barg Sargent has nicknamed John Cobb "Tie Cobb" because of his five ties in twenty-seven games. Among the more interesting statistics are: Ed Domey's high scratch game of 142; Most points for a losing player, 165, by Dick O'Brien, who lost to Mel Merritt 169-165; most points by both players, scratch-233 (Ed Domey 142, Frank Mitchell 91); most points both players, with handicap - 339 (John Cobb 187, Bud Ploof 152); least points by a winning player, 135, by Jon Cobb and later by Bart Sargent. John Cobb's 187 is a new high for the two years of league operation. High average is held by Ed Domey, at 74.7% ringers and 122 points.

This league has a couple of interesting features. Attendance is not mandatory. Players who show up become movers or stayers. The movers move over one court after each game. Bart Sargent keeps track of who has played who, and juggles the lineups each week to even out the matches. Players alternate first pitch and keep score themselves. The most common method is for the player who will pitch last to record the score from the previous inning, and hand the clipboard to his opponent before pitching his half of the inning.

As is usual for devotees of the sport, snow is no detriment to showing up at Heritage Recreation Center. It's kind of fun to drive 50 miles in a storm like Dick O'Brien, Mel Merritt, and Bones Hastings do. Although last week Bones did tell Mel, "Let's go, it's snowing, and two inches of snow will bury Dick's car." League standings are as follows:

SAN DIEGO, CALIF. CLUB PROGRAM REPORT

By Les Robison

During 1977 the San Diego City Recreation Department required a monthly report showing daily activity at the Balboa Park Horseshoe Club which comprises eleven unlighted clay courts, a small clubhouse and two storage rooms. Information compiled from the report determines expenditures by the city for improvements, replacement of broken stakes and supplying a yellow clay for the pits. The average number of players each day (excluding occasional periods of rainy weather) was nearly 15, with week-ends showing stepped-up activity.

Each membership for the year cost \$2.00 and total paid was 52, with 18 club members also holding NHPA cards. Local club tournaments numbered 6 for the year, averaging 18 players per tournament; each entry fee was \$2.00. Free food and beverage was available for two of the tournaments in which charter members' birthdays were observed. Choice of either cash prizes or trophies for winners was popular. A typical club tournament was comprised of 12 players in the doubles group and 6 in the singles—each group playing five 50-point cancellation games, with first, second and third place prizes in doubles, first and second place prizes in singles. (Three nationally sanctioned two-day tournaments were also held at the facility in 1977.)

The year 1977 could well be considered the most successful ever for the Club, particularly from the standpoint of daily activity. The majority of members do not care to go out of town to play in tournaments, which would mean a round trip of about 300 miles. This probably tends to lessen the importance of formal play in tournaments or leagues, but rather emphasizes an informal ambiance at the Club, thus perhaps accounting for the popularity of casual doubles games which tend to go along at a leisurely pace.

Contributing factors toward the successful operation of the Club, then, are informality of play in general which seems to encourage a spirit of camaraderie and casual atmosphere, a rather simple arrangement of handicap for tournaments so as to limit confusion among less experienced players, and cooperation of members in the upkeep of courts.

Dear Editor:

Having moved around considerably in the construction industry, I find a great variety of soil types being used in the horseshoe pits. What I would like to do is find out the properties to look for in soils in technical language so everyone would know what to look for. In my work, we use the Unified soil classification brought forth by Professor A. Casagrande.

I find many people list clay as the best medium for the pits, but clays are far ranging and listed as lean or fat generally. They tend to be sticky when wet to putty-like consistancy. We list soild by different tests, dry strength or crushing characteristics when bone dry, Dilalancy (reaction to shaking) and toughness, which is consistency near plastic limit. Now I'm no expert and I don't want to snow anyone. What we need is knowledge.

Let me explain the plastic limit. Soils are solid when dry, plastic when wet, and liquid when enough water has been added. The percent of water in the soil is used as a guide to classify. The plastic limit is listed as the percent of moisture in the soil when tests say it is passing from solid to plastic (PL), and the liquid limit (LL) is when it is passing from plastic to liquid state. A sand is non-plastic, but clays and silts would have a moisture of maybe 18% at PL and 23% at LL. Thus it is plastic from 18-23% moisture or as we say a PI (plastic index of 5: 23-18 = 5). Generally when LL is 50 or more it is called a fat clay and very hard when dry.

I find that clay is usually very sticky in the West. I believe a plastic silt is what we need for good horse-shoeing. Murray, Utah and Albuquerque, NM was sticky. While observing the world tour at Lafayette, Indiana I brought some of their blue clay home and tested it. It is very good material. The PI was 9.6 with a LL of 28.1 which is a lean clay, but very close to a silt; dry strength is low, like silt. 14.2 percent was sand, very fine, maximum size #50 screen and was mostly retained on a #100 screen. This screen is 100 openings per inch and is very fine. This material dries on the hands readily and when dry feels slick to the fingers. It's good for release of the shoe.

What I would like to see is good material like this tested and new or old pits could be upgraded to good material rather than "good old Joe has clay, let's go get a pick-up load." I am looking for information and am interested in hearing from others on this subject.

CLAUDE REPORTS FOR DELAWARE, MARYLAND NEW JERSEY REGION

DELAWARE — In Seaford there is a town recreation group which is now active in the promotion of horseshoes, largely through the efforts of Willard Sammons, Secretary of the Delaware Association; the Presidency is now vacant but hopefully, it will be filled in 1978. Seaford has 6 dirt courts which were started about 10 years ago and Willard feels that they are now starting to come alive! In Harrington, their Fire Department hosts an annual horseshoe tournament which features about 30 pitchers that use 8 dirt courts on the Fair Grounds; Willard also works with them. In Lewis, they are in the process of getting at least 10 members in order to get a Charter and get rolling; they hope to be active in 1978. Once the Delaware State Association gets off the ground, I am quite sure we'll see a big chance with Willard right in the middle.

MARYLAND — The Wicomico Horseshoe Club, Picnic Island, Salisbury, was started in 1923 with 4 regular courts and 10 pitchers; this club has grown throughout the years and in 1972 the City of Salisbury erected 18 well-lighted courts at its present site. They also have 4 courts set-up for Juniors and women, which can be used for either 30' or 40' pitching. This club has been increasing its members yearly until now its N.H.P.A. membership totals nearly 100. Parker Sturgis of Fruitland is President and Secretary of the Maryland H.P.A., and President of the Wicomico Club; Dr. Richard Bevans of Princess Ann, Vice-President of the Maryland Association, Jack Taylor, Salisbury, Tournament Director and Robert Bunn, his assistant. Willard Sammons, Seaford, Delaware, former President of the Maryland Association, is Secretary of the Wicomico Club.

Local Clubs are spinning up within this community and although they are pitching on dirt courts, I don't know of anyone who didn't start off this way. At Denton, they have 8 dirt courts where the Jaycees host a tournament each year at the 4H grounds. They are a great support to the Wicomico Club, who works with them. The Wicomico Club holds 6 sanctioned tournaments each year, 5 open and 1 closed. Doubles have greatly increased in popularity here and have approximated 2/3s or more of their entries each tournament, and at least once, in August, they had 36 pitchers in the doubles with only 35 pitchers in the singles! The junior and women pitchers, although coming in slowly nonetheless, are still growing, albeit, at a leisurely pace. They believe (hope) that these necessary pitchers, particularly the juniors, are here to stay.

They had a great year in selling N.H.P.A. items, which is good promotion for the National, and horshoes in general, plus helping to provide assets to their club. This club even has an active concession stand (food, drinks, etc.) which further supports them. I wish all horseshoe pitchers, particularly the appropriate officers of all local clubs and State organizations, would read the following: EACH AND EVERY ONE OF THEIR TOURNAMENTS ARE SPONSORED AND PROMOTED BY A LOCAL BUSINESS MERCHANT, WITH WONDERFUL RESULTS! In fact, Willard states that they have several companies waiting in the wings, anxious to be the next sponsor. I think that's just great!

anxious to be the next sponsor. I think that's just great! Willard Sammons feels that, in order to get more out of horseshoes, pitchers and spectators both should visit as many clubs in other areas and States as possible. A case in point is that, although I think we are doing just fine, at this stage, in New Jersey, I also know that Maryland has us beat (and probably a lot of other states, too!) on at least a couple of items which I am going to work on; I guess you have to know what other people are doing in order to properly evaluate your own horseshoe program. Willard, it seems, works closely with both Maryland and Delaware and seems to be giving a lot to horseshoes. Thank you, Willard, and a tip of the 'Halo Hat' to you and all who are working together with you!

NORTH JERSEY — Since serving in the capacity of Regional Director, I have become increasingly aware of the tremendous amount of work that has been put into the furtherance of the sport of horseshoes and the great amount of promotional and educational work done by various people throughout our area; yet, I am appalled when I think of what still has to be done although truly heartened, too, by the rich horseshoe soil I believe we have in New Jersey. Thanks to the publicity that has been generated by various newspapers, and due to the tremendous amount of work being done by dedicated people such as Hai Hanania, Walt Pruiksma, Paul Stille, Al Ward, Phil Zozzaro, etc., horseshoes are being taken out of the 'backyard' and are becoming a visible entity here.

My personal feeling, and that of many others, is that our scoreboards were the first major items to contribute immeasurably to this new awareness among people in New Jersey. Spectators are now able to identify with the players and follow the progress of the game at the same time. These spectators are now almost a blessed nuisance at a lot of our tournaments. Interesting enough, we also have people now who come forth and either ask for information or how to join our Association. This was almost unheard of just two short years ago! The second major contributing item to this new, continuing awareness of horseshoes among many people, is our "Jersey's Jargon." In order to help keep all of our members aware of the current events in our state, in March of this year I started a monthly newsletter and as so many people have attested to since, I too, now believe that this is also a vehicle that has served to help generate and maintain interest in the sport. This newsletter is mailed to our 100 members, plus those former members from the previous year, and interested people.

Thanks to the Hunterdon County Club for their annual promotion of horseshoe tournaments held at the Flemington Fair. Horseshoes are exposed at this event to more people than at any other time in our state; three days of tournament events gives thousands of people from various states an opportunity to see some of our top pitchers engage in competition. Clarence Moss, President, Donn Grady, Secretary, Director Jim Burd, along with all the members of the organization and with the help of members from the Middlesex Club, including AI Cherry, former State President, who announced the players on a daily basis for a period of three nights, have devoted their efforts to seeing that this exhibition runs smoothly. They have done an outstanding job and their work is greatly appreciated!

WHITE REPORTS — (Continued)

SOUTH JERSEY — There has been an emergence of newly-formed leagues in this area with Cumberland County now having six teams in their circuit and rapidly expanding. They recently concluded their First Annual Vineland Fall Horseshoe Pitching Tournament, using a 60% handicap system. There are about 70 pitchers in the area with only a handful of state members. They do receive pretty good newspaper coverage through the efforts of our Assistant Regional Director, Ed Severs, who is doing his best, along with others, to interest their people in joining the state. Until more join, we won't be able to form a proposed Northern and Southern Championship League where the winners in each class would pitch for the State Championship.

N.H.P.A. GUIDELINES FOR REGIONAL DIRECTORS

(Revised July, 1977)

INTRODUCTION

The concept of a regional director has been re-evaluated and the areas served by the N.H.P.A. re-districted in an effort to make the office a useful instrument rather than a list of names. The hope is that only interested people will serve, that they will render a genuine service to the NHPA, and that they can be reimbursed for authorized expense incurred in the performance of their duties to the end that these directors, the national officers, state officers, as well as all local and club officers can work together as a cohesive unit for the betterment of the sport of Horseshoes this document has been prepared.

SELECTION AND TERM OF OFFICE

- A. The chairman of the regional directors and the regional directors shall be appointed by the NHPA president with the approval of the NHPA executive committee.
- B. The appointment shall be for two years using the same fiscal year as the NHPA president. A person may be reappointed at the end of two years for another term. There is no limit on the number of terms one may serve.
- C. It shall be mandatory for the NHPA president to consult with the state association before appointing regional directors.

DUTIES OF THE REGIONAL DIRECTOR CHAIRMAN

- A. The Regional Director Chairman shall coordinate the activities of all Regional Directors, encourage and help them to perform the duties prescribed for them, and be liaison between Directors and the National Officers.
- B. The Regional Director Chairman shall answer requests for information and shall inform the Regional Directors of the time and place of the Regional Directors annual meeting.
- C. The Regional Director Chairman shall keep the NHPA President, the Hall of Fame Committee, or any other appropriate persons informed of noteworthy achievements of pitchers and promoters.
- D. The Regional Director Chairman shall prepare a semi-annual report to the Executive Committee of the NHPA summarizing horseshoe activities and outlining any suggestions for the improvement of the sport of horseshoes. A copy of this report shall be submitted to the Horseshoe Pitcher's News Digest for publication.

DUTIES OF THE REGIONAL DIRECTORS

- A. A regional director shall appoint assistant directors and coordinate their activities in his region with those of the NHPA.
- B. A Regional Director shall maintain a schedule of tournaments and other activities in his region and keep the Assistant Directors informed as well as informing the chairman.
- C. A Regional Director shall encourage States within his Region to pay their dues, encourage membership in the NHPA, and encourage Digest subscriptions.
- D. A Regional Director shall attend as many major tournaments in his Region as possible and attempt to honor specific requests by State Associations for his presence either at tournaments or ceremonies.
- E. A Regional Director shall be responsible for the distribution of NHPA Championship patches for the winners of all sanctioned tournaments according to procedures established by the NHPA Executive Committee.
- F. A Regional Director shall work with Assistant Directors in his Region to eliminate conflicting dates to affect maximum participation by the pitchers.
- G. A Regional Director shall attempt to answer all requests for information.
- H. A Regional Director shall report at least semi-annually to the Chairman summarizing his region's activity and publish at least two Digest articles each year on his region. A copy of the report shall be submitted to each State association in his region.
- A Regional Director shall keep the Chairman informed of the noteworthy achievements of pitchers and promoters in his region.

GUIDELINES — (Continued)


- J. A Regional Director shall attempt to bring together all officers of State Association and Assistant Directors in his Region once each year to discuss subjects of general interest. Subject matter covered and conclusions reached should be documented for publication to members within the Region, the Chairman, and the NHPA President.
- K. A Regional Director shall seek out and attempt to enroll active clubs and pitchers not presently affiliated with the NHPA.
- L. A Regional Director shall attempt to attend the World Tournament or name in writing to the chairman one of his Assistant Directors to attend in his place.
- M. A Regional Director shall have a commitment to every State Association in his Region, not just to the State Association of his residence.
- N. A Regional Director shall assist clubs and tournament directors in finding ways to publicize their activities.

DUTIES OF THE ASSISTANT REGIONAL DIRECTORS

- A. An Assistant Regional Director shall be directly responsible to the Regional Director and shall perform those activities requested by the Regional Director as well as those duties spelled out in this document.
- B. An Assistant Regional Director shall maintain a schedule of tournaments and other activities in his area and keep the Regional Director informed.
- C. An Assistant Regional Director shall encourage support of and membership in the NHPA in his area.
- D. An Assistant Regional Director shall attend as many major tournaments in his area as possible and attempt to honor specific requests by Clubs or groups for his presence either at tournaments or ceremonies.
- E. An Assistant Regional Director shall inform the Regional Director of the results.
- F. An Assistant Regional Director shall attempt to answer all requests for information.
- G. An Assistant Regional Director shall report *quarterly* to the Regional Director a summary of his activities. A copy of this report shall be sent to all interested clubs and associations in the area and to the NHPA President.
- H. An Assistant Regional Director shall keep the Regional Director informed of the noteworthy achievements of pitchers and promoters in his area.
- An Assistant Regional Director shall attempt to attend the annual meeting called by the Regional Director in his Region.
- J. An Assistant Regional Director shall seek out and attempt to enroll active clubs and pltchers not presently affiliated with the NHPA.
- K. An Assistant Regional Director shall assist clubs and tournament directors in finding ways to publicize their activities.
- L. An Assistant Regional Director shall work with and keep all tournament directors in his area informed of current and future events.

COMPENSATION

The Regional Director Chairman and the Regional Directors shall receive \$50.00 each January to compensate for the performance of their duties. In addition each Director has a \$10.00 petty cash for postage, telephone calls and miscellaneous expenses. Receipts must be submitted to NHPA Sec.-Treas. to get their petty cash reimbursed. Larger expenses must have prior approval by NHPA officers before purchase or go ahead.




