NEW MEXICO STATE WHEELCHAIR HORSESHOE PITCHERS CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT

Have you ever tried to pitch a horseshoe while sitting in a chair? Anyone who has pitched horseshoes can readily visualize the difficulties one would encounter in throwing the proper distance and in obtaining an open shoe. Well, it can be done and quite satisfactorily with enough patience and practice.

In the summer of 1977 the Albuquerque Horseshoe Club was contacted by Mr. Don Dagle, Recreation Therapist of the Veteran's Hospital. To make a long story short, he suggested a Wheelchair Horseshoe Pitching Tournament and solicited the aid of the AHC to make it possible. After several practice sessions in which the Wheelchair Pitchers were instructed in the fundamentals of the game by members of the AHC, the pitchers began to achieve a measure of success. It was quite evident from the very first practice session that these pitchers required a shorter distance than the regulation forty feet to pitch the shoes. Through trial and error, two divisions of pitchers evolved. They were:

- 1. Open Division Wheelchair confined paraplegic
- 2. Handicapped Division 8 Severe Multiple Sclerosis, Quadraplegic and severe spinal injury and/or disease.

The Open Division ptched twenty feet and the Handicapped Division pitched thirteen feet. Also, the method of scoring was altered so as to provide a more suitable method for recording points and determining a winner. (Several methods of scoring can be used, but for purposes of this article, it is not necessary to explore each one of them.)

With the foregoing experience as history, the State Wheelchair Horseshoe Tournament was held at the New Mexico State Fair on September, 17, 1977.

There were a total of eight entries. The winners were:

Open Division — Thomas Ed Fulton, Albuquerque, New Mexico, Champion. Al Aglialoro, Albuquerque, New Mexico, 2nd Place.

Handicapped Division — Thomas Bennett, Clovis, New Mexico, Champion. Vincent Michutka, Albuquerque, New Mexico, 2nd place.

This project could have not been successful without the expertise and hard work of Mr. Cisco Garcia, a University of New Mexico student, majoring in Recreation, who devoted a great deal of his energy and time to insure the success of this endeavor and the Elks Club #461 which furnished the trophies and finances for this tournament.

This was a unique tournament and was enjoyed by both the participants and spectators. Other tournaments of this type will be held in the future. It is truly a rewarding experience from the standpoint of everyone involved. Why not have your club check into the possibility of holding a similar tournament? You will like it; the wheelchair pitchers will like it, and the spectators will like it. Could you ask for anything more?

Missing: One horseshoe court, with stakes.

Bob Pence, national secretary of the World Horseshoe Pitchers Association for 14 years and now a resident of Lafayette, reports that a complete court-"evrything except the concrete walk"-was stolen from the fenced 24-horseshoe court area at Riverfront Park over the weekend.

"Someone really wanted a court badly as they had to work hard to do what they did," Pence said.

"They shoveled out all that heavy clay, and that stuff weighs almost like lead. They removed both staked, which are imbedded in big timebers, and took the rug covers and the heavy rubber covers.

He said the clay, a special type preferred by horseshoe pitchers, was brought here in 1975 for the world championship. The clay was in two pits each 3 feet by 5 feet by 1 foot thick. Reprinted from Courier-Journal, Lafayette, Indiana, May 25.

DID YOU KNOW THAT By Sol Berman

GUY ZIMMERMAN of Danville, California, won the 1954 World's Championship. The tournament was a 20 game tournament. He was one of the top pitchers ever, but only won one World's title because he refused to play in the 35 game endurance contest.

CARL STEINFELDT of Rochester, NY. The 1976 World's Champion, refuses to play in the 1978 World's Tournament because its scheduled for 7 games a day for 5 days.

The 1955 World's Tournament was a 35 game round robin followed by having the top four men of the 36 man round robin play a round robin for the Championship.

The 1966 World's Tournament-the 36 qualifiers were divided into three groups of twelve players. They played an 11 game round robin. The top 6 in each group made up the championship group. They played a 17 game round robin for the Championship. Curt Day was the winner.

First of all the Men's Championship class, only first because there are many more top qualifiers. Second the Women's Championship class. Third Jr. Boys & Jr. Girls championship class. All other championship classes and others such as B,C, etc. are nice. I like to see as many people as possible play, but these classes are not as important. My gripe is the Jr. Boys and intermediates. Friday is prime time and many spectators will be on hand to watch the pitching.

The boys and girls are our future horseshoe pitchers. The finals in A Class should be when there are people around to watch them. I am sure at 9a.m. in the morning on a weekday there will be very few people around to see them except their own family and friends. This is not right. They need all the exposure they can get. How are you going to get other boys and girls interested in pitching if they are playing when the spectators are few and far between. These young people are very sensitive. Many of them feel they get pushed aside and there have been times when they have. As far as I am concerned, these young people are just as important as Class A man.

I realize it is very hard to make every one happy when making out a tournament schedule. I hope you will find a way to make a change in this schedule. Please keep in mind a jr. boy and girl will become World Champion, and to this boy and girl, it will be one of the greatest days of their lives, let them play at a prime time so everyone can enjoy it with them.

Dear Ellis:

I just want to comment in response to Steve Fenicchia's article in an earlier issue of the News Digest. He has the same ideas that I have been advocating for the past several years, being in favor of the 50-shoe game. I have been against the long marathon method (the cancellation method) for twenty-five years or more. We are never going to progress with other sports as long as we use it. The only way to get TV coverage is to go to the 50-shoe game or count-all method as they did on the "Challenge of the Sexes." We have to change if we are to progress.

In our 1974 Spring Warm-Up tournament, we played 50 shoe games and counted every ringer as one point, close shoes did not count, after all we were out there to throw ringers not points. It

shortened th game like it should be. We had six classes of six men each playing six men on two courts, in that way there were always scorekeeprs. When those keeping score got up to pitch they got 10 shoes to warmup. There was no fooling around to figure the percentages because they were right there. Thirty ringers would of course be 60 percent. All games ended about the same gime. No waiting for other games to end. We also used the alternate pitch. We also used total points in the total games.

This way the spectators knew more about the game and could watch several games at the same time. Score sheets and or scoring devices were used to make it easier for spectators to follow. In case of tie games, the sudden death method was used.

Cancellation throws your tournament all out of balance because there is too much time lost. The sooner we change the style of the game, the better off we will be, including the spectators.

Another point in contention is qualifying. I think all tournaments should be qualified. Why they changed it I don't know unless it was to save time. By playing two men to a court, 60 or 70 men can be qualified by using 12 courts. There would never be any doubt as to the points each man got as the other player can observe all the action and there would not be any problem. When we warm up there are generally two men to a court and using the alternate pitch, each player could get used to it.

I agree with Steve as to having more players in the top classes. If you have only eight men to a group, they will be more evenly divided. Then play the two top men in each group for the championship. There is a lot that can be done for our sport, if they would just do it.

We also have to have more prize money in our sport. I am not talking about \$10,000...I am speaking about thirty or forty thousand dollars. THINK IT OVER.

EXCERPTS FROM 1977 W.T. CONVENTION MINUTES

By Sol Berman

Russ Sweeney (page 55) — The executive council should be allowed to negotiate with the W.T. host with no restrictions and formulate a playing schedule that would be in the best interest of promoting the NHPA and yet be satisfactory to the majority of its members.

Our past and present methods of play in championship classes tend to create playing sessions that are too lengthy, especially in the men's classes. Many of our interested members find it quite tiring, as spectators, to sit through one full evening of play, not to mention five or six consecutive evenings. We continually have high hopes of attracting local spectators and the news media but never will with our present policy and offerings. Should we really expect the general public to be enthusiastic when, in fact, many of us find it difficult to be?

Championship play-offs consistently have been starting too late and running too long, after which the final presentations are made. Too few people are in attendance for the climax of this Tournament. Does that not disturb you? It should if you are interested in the promotion of our sport.

The past scheduling does not properly allow for inclement weather postponements, except for running beyond the scheduled dates.

Three game play-off (page 53) — Carl Steinfeldt — As long as they are now trying to get that last day down to a short amount of games, four or five games. I think it should be two out of three, rather than one game. Carl Steinfeldt (mage 152) — I think that the should be two games are set, the laster games we get the laster games we get the laster game.

Carl Steinfeldt (page 152) — I think that the shorter games we get, the lesser games we get, more people will be able to participate in this World Championship. Now, you have your championship class play seven games a nite, that is seven hours. You look at the

stands at midnight, and you let me know, outside of horseshoe pitchers, how many people are watching the game from the locality. Last year, Curt Day and I got thru at 1:20 a.m. I can guarantee you that there wasn't five people from the community outside of horseshoe pitchers, and most of them wouldn't have been there only they had to get their checks. That is the only reason.

This year, you had over 600 entries, you have five hundred and some people going to pitch. If you would cut the Class A down, and if they would only pitch 3 or 3½ hours, that is all they ask of any athlete, you will be able to pitch everyone who comes to the tournament, because you will have more time for all your classes.

Clyde Martz — The point I want to make, and I want to get to it right now, is that if someone would—I don't know mathematically how to do it, but we have some smart people in this organization, and I would be glad to help. Instead of 38 or 48, we could start out with 60 to 100 people who really desire to shoot for the championship, you know, people who, if they don't make that 100, they have had that shot.

The point I am trying to make is, if you look at the major sports, and we are not a major sport—the way to become a major sport is you provide opportunity for the masses to come up thru the ranks. We don't have it. I made some steps in forming the PHPA that were too far in the future, I think, but I think you will find that

I made some steps in forming the PHPA that were too far in the future, I think, but I think you will find that many of the ideas we have will become second nature to you. You have already seen some of those, so when you talk about reverting back to the old ways as being good as to what they were for the past 200 years, be careful, the world is looking at us.

I have been involved with professional promoters where they have looked at us as a lower level peasant sport of lower economic class not willing to change, and whenever they would make a change, we weren't receptive to it. So I encourage progressive thinking.

I encourage you to open up that sanctimonious Class A to larger numbers of people like me, the Class B and Class C has the opportunity to fight for the championship.

EXCERPTS — (Continued)

I can count you ten guys in the B Class—five have already withdrawn their names—that would have had an opportunity to place within the first ten. Qualifying is obsolete, but there is no better way.

I don't have the answer, but you have some people here who are capable of thinking and giving you ideas which I haven't seen in the past ten years, so just be careful when you revert back to something where you were with no progress, and I personally would like to go to a World Tournament where at least 100 of us would start out with the opportunity to win the Championship.

The only think I would like to charge you with, and I have been silent in the NHPA for obvious reasons, is to please be careful when you revert back to something that is so conservative that it has been a failure in the past. Don't kid yourself by thinking that people are interested in your sport because they are not. You have to do something to create that interest; anything that allows the masses to come to your game and be a part of it and compete for the top prize as opposed to the club we have now. Don't kid yourselves. We have a closed club in horseshoes. There are 36 or maybe 50 of us that snub our noses at the rest of you, and that is the way of life.

Wally Shipley (page 183) — It has been moved and seconded that you put the 1978 World Tournament schedule in the hands of the Executive Council after we have discussed it, upon completion of this tournament, with those involved and also with Des Moines (Des Moines voted for the 26 game format). Van de Griff-Iowa (page 183) — I think Clyde Martz made a good suggestion in trying to get more people to

qualify. Instead of qualifying, say 100 people would be eligible based on percentage.

Russell Gadoury has served with distinction as Secretary-Treasurer of the Massachusetts association. He takes pride in performing his duties well, whether answering correspondence quickly, maintaining innumerable pitching statistics, preparing interesting and informative newsletters, or promoting the sport. He will attempt to perform equally well as one of your Vice Presidents.

Russ Gadoury was responsible for getting the league sanctioning program started—first as an article in the November 1976 News Digest; then as a proposal to the Executive Council.

A. The program the delegates approved at the 1977 convention was virtually the same as his original suggestions.

B. Over 200 people in Massachusetts, who had no previous affiliation with the nhpa, now do so. Donnie Roberts reports wide-spread acceptance of this program throughout the country. Thus one of the primary objectives of the league program is being met. Namely, greater visibility for the NHPA among a larger group of horseshoe pitchers.

C. A second objective, greater service to horseshoe pitchers, is also being met. The program is off to a good start, but it needs improvement. Russ Gadoury will help make those improvements.

Your Secretary, Donnie Roberts, has a tremendous workload. Russ Gadoury believes that load can and should be reduced by spreading the work around, where practicable, either to other members of the Executive Council or to a salaried part-time NHPA employee working under the direction of the Secretary, for the purpose of improving the efficiency of the NHPA organization and speeding up responses to requests.

Russ Gadoury invites your questions on his views and your suggestions on how horseshoe pitching and the NHPA can be improved. He asks for your vote at the 1978 convention.




