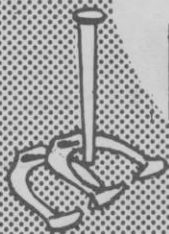

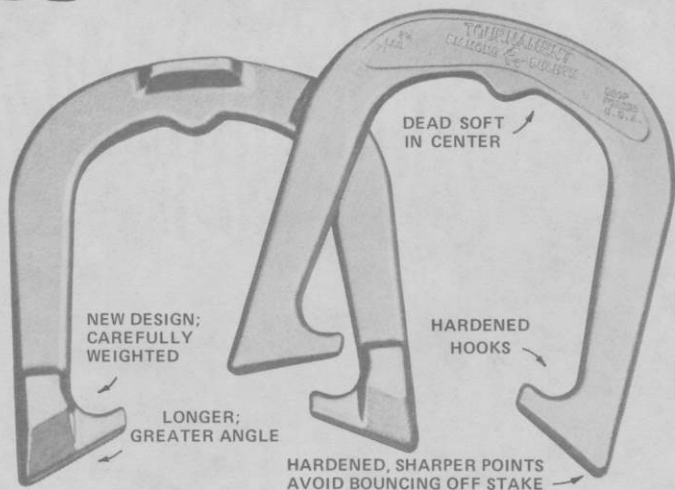

RESOLUTION OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL OF THE NATIONAL HORSESHOE PITCHERS ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA

Whereas, the NHPA has developed into a large and active organization; and
Whereas, the NHPA has provided much assistance and leadership in the promotion of the sport of horseshoe pitching in the USA; and

Whereas, many people have benefitted from the programs and activities sponsored by the NHPA; and
Whereas money is necessary to help the organization continue and thrive; and

Whereas, horseshoe pitching enthusiasts have indicated a desire to donate money to the NHPA;

Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Secretary-Treasurer of the NHPA open a savings account at the First National Bank of Waverly, Ohio, in the name of NHPA Contribution Fund for the deposit of donations received by the organizations.

Be It Further Resolved that no withdrawal be made from the account except for the benefit of the NHPA and by consent of the Executive Council.

Be It Further Resolved that both the signature of the President and the Secretary-Treasurer of the NHPA shall be required to withdraw funds from the account.

Be It Further Resolved that the executive council shall not authorize any withdrawal of funds in excess of \$1000.00 from the account without first obtaining the approval of at least two-thirds of the voting delegates at the annual NHPA convention.

NHPA TO DONATE \$\$\$ TO INVATIONALS AND LARGE SPECIAL TOURNAMENTS

Effective in 1980 and for one year on a trial basis, the NHPA will donate money toward Invationals and Special Large Tournaments if qualifications are met and approved by the Executive Council.

Invationals will receive \$1,000.00 and Special Large Tournaments will receive \$500.00. (Invationals means 6 or 8 players and are invited by the Host and NHPA.)

NHPA will input into each of the tourneys toward the distribution of all prize money and the conducting of the tourneys.

NHPA and Host will work together towards getting wide publicity. If some expense is necessary for obtaining publicity then the NHPA pays (within reason and with the approval of the majority of the Council) for this expense. NHPA representatives present will be recognized by the publicity and help in the awarding of prize money. NHPA will encourage the locations to also work toward raising additional funds to have larger cash prizes to assist in attracting more and better players and encouraging the news media to cover the event.

NHPA Executive Council must receive requests from interested locations.

With reference to applying for Invational or Large Special tournament contributions, applications should list:

Facilities

Past Attendance

Other States in Attendance

City Officials Interest and Backing

News Media and TV Interest and Backing

Amount of money your club will contribute

To qualify for Invational, the Host must guarantee \$2500.00 as their share.

Past records on weather conditions in your location must be given if the tournament is to be played outside.

Keep in mind up to \$5500.00 can be donated this first year. If it is worthwhile after we evaluate its success and value in promoting our sport, it can be enlarged in the number of tournaments or larger donations.

Please mail your applications to Donnie Roberts, Rte. No. 5, Lucasville, Ohio 45648 by November 1, 1979. The Executive Council will announce successful locations by February 1, 1980.

Publicity for the Statesville 1979 World Tournament was well covered. Mike Owens, Sports Editor, for the Statesville Record and landmark, sent the "Associated Press" two daily items. How far it was sent out was up to the "Associated Press". A few items were sent to "United Press International." Mike Owens was at the courts daily from early afternoon until closing. The NHPA thanks him very much for his interest and cooperation. The tournament was covered by five TV crews. Nationwide "P.M. Magazine" was at the courts three times. Parts of the tournament should be on "P.M. Magazine" sometime in September or October. Newspapers throughout the southeast gave coverage. I was on the local radio station for four mornings 7:00 to 8:30 with Joe Blevins, announcer. We talked up the tournament after playing a record. Wally Shipley and Ottie Reno were guests on the program station WSIC. We had posters in places of business with the schedule of tournament championships. There were also car bumper-sticks displayed.

Special rates at motels were most satisfactory at the Scottish Inn. Most of 103 rooms were filled to capacity during the tournament. Although the price was raised \$5.00 since last April the management did not pass on the increase to our membership. There were a few problems at the Days Inn but some members were able to get a 10% discount. With more motels to choose from in Huntsville, hopefully, we can obtain more special rates for the 1980 Tournament.

"Hardee" Hamburg fast food was most generous in giving a free dinner and french fries with each sandwich purchased. "Shaney's Big Boy" also ran a special as did "Bonanza" and "Pizza Hut."

Cinemas 1 and 2 offered movie discounts. There seemingly wasn't enough interest in arranging a bus trip to Charlotte. Next year for the ladies especially, we will plan at the site, bingo games, Yatze, and card games and also a sight-seeing trip. I will have a ladies committee plan entertainment.

I want to thank John Billiard for his part as assistant recreation director, pinch hitting for Jack Springer, any problems in the court area that was presented to John was almost immediately taken care of.

Jack Springer, local tournament director, was unfortunate to have a kidney operation two days before the tournament got under way. Jack had worked hard in behalf of the host committee in making the tournament a success. He received an achievement award for his hard work. He was taken on his hospital bed to the opening ceremony accompanied in the ambulance by the popular Governor Hunt. The Governor paid a lengthy visit during opening ceremony. He threw out the "Opening Shoes."

Most visitors enjoyed the Statesville tournament. Thanks to Donnie Roberts and his helpers and the host committee, the courts were put into fine shape. The Lakewood Park area was recently renovated during past two years. It was felt that if Statesville should want the World meet again in the not too distant future, most contestants would like to re-visit Statesville. The people of Statesville were most hospitable.

Donnie Roberts and his crew did their usual fine job in running the tournament. The regional directors had charge of running off qualifications. At his young age, it was unbelievable seeing Leo McGrath on his feet from early morning throughout the day running off qualifiers.

Congratulations are in order for Wally Shipley and Earl Winston who were re-elected president and 3rd vice president. This election makes Wally Shipley the only President to have been elected for 8 consecutive years.
