

#### NHPA PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

#### **By Wally Shipley**

The Third Annual LOS ANGELES COUNTY FAIR WORLD INVITATIONAL Tournament was a SUPER-FANTASTIC SHOW. The winner was Walter Ray Williams, Jr.

You wouldn't believe the fantastic long games even if someone told you. That's why I have asked Ellis to publish each game.

The first day (Friday) a round robin was played in both groups of six. The top three in each group formed the Championship Group leaving the bottom three to be group two.

Second day (Saturday) the second group started playing at 10:00 a.m. and played a round robin. They were playing for 7th to 12th playoff money.

The Championship Group played Saturday afternoon a round robin for the ladder position on the final day played (Sunday). They started playing Saturday at 2:15 p.m. and didn't finish their 5th game until 8:45 p.m. — six and a half hours alter. Why so long? They had 11 games out of 15 with over 100 shoes.

The longest was 172 shoes with Seibold the winner over Williams (his only loss). Simon and Steinfeldt both lost two games each pitching 84% and 85%.

On the final day (Sunday), my congratulations are to Al Zadroga of Pennsylvania. He moved up the ladder beating Titcomb, Seibold and Steinfeldt in that order. His game with Simon went 144 shoes and the score was 48 — 48 before Simon won.

Then Simon and Williams had a 2 out of 3 playoff for the Championship. Williams won the first game with a 54 - 18 score and pitching 60 out of 66 for 90.9%. The second game was unbelievable for it went 176 shoes and was won by Williams with a score of 51 - 33. Williams started with 48 out of 50. From the 74th shoe to the 176th shoe Williams only scored 12 points. Simon pitched 95 ringers out of the last 102 shoes in the game. They had 54 four deads (two ringers each). Williams pitched 92 % and Simon 88.6%.

The hard luck pitcher of the tournament was Ralph Simon of Iowa. He pitched 9 games out of 13 with over 100 shoes and 12 of those games were over 80%.

The Championship Group of six players in three days pitched a total of 72 games and averaged 80.8%.

I had the honor of announcing one game per round using the outstanding stats on each player furnished by Gary Kline. Thanks, Gary.

We had good news and TV media coverage. Even the LA Times had an article on Williams. The crowds were great!

The portable courts had outstanding clay and the platforms were even with the ground and they were under a solid roof. There were no wind nor weather problems.

Eight of the players were left handers with four World Champions and four past Junior World Champions.

My congratulations to all the players for SUPER SHOW. Thanks to the Committee, Amos Hudson and Eston Brown and all the workers for their outstanding efforts, hard work and support.

Seeing is believing — so feast your eyes on each game results following.


celebration. We'll get you a replacement patch, Matt.

## N.H.P.A. PUBLICITY PROGRAM

Bernard Herfurth will be in charge of NHPA publicity during the coming year on a trial basis for one year. There will be no publicity committee. It is thought that a committee, especially for publicity, is not practical with members being from distant parts of the country.

Herfurth will be responsible for obtaining "volunteer NHPA publicity workers" in each state to assist with publicity plans. He will be accountable to the Executive Council for his publicity program.

No demand will be made on volunteer workers. They will be asked to do only what they can when suggestions are presented. The NHPA publicity will be supplementary to any program the states may have. In the past year, Herfurth has received much information from the states and news clippings proving that many states are doing a good job with publicity for our sport.

Volunteers from all areas are requested to send their names to Publicity Director Bernard Herfurth, 17 Fort Street, Northampton, Massachusettes 01060. It is hoped that many members will volunteer that previously have not been involved in NHPA organizational work.

Each month suggestions will be published in the "Digest" with publicity suggestions being offered. If any volunteer does not subscribe to the digest, it is hoped that they will do so. If not, Herfurth will send out a special notice.

He received permission to carry out this volunteer program from the Executive Council at Huntsville. He will also present his 1981 "Novice Tournament Program" sponsored by the NHPA to the council. This program will act as a "membership drive" for the NHPA League Program and the NHPA membership. The council also approved changing "Pitch Horseshoes for Health Week" to the week of July 4th in 1981. Other plans include contact approaches to sports writers, radio and TV publicity, horseshoe books in public libraries, car plates, etc.

Suggestions to improve publicity will be welcome from the membership.

The NHPA publicity for the first time sent letters to all newspapers of all qualifiers informing them that they had a contestant from their area in the 1980 Huntsville World Tournament. Also, all winners of trophies, and the men's championship class, had letters sent. From reports received, this publicity plan was very good.

It is planned next year to notify the newspapers of all contestants in the six championship classes that they have a player from their area playing in a championship class. The names, addresses and phone numbers were included. With the newspapers calling and the members contacting their newspaper, it is felt that more newspaper coverage than ever was had for the world tournament. Much credit goes to Julie Higgins for sending out all the newspaper correspondence.

All volunteer workers are asked to periodically send in information regarding how they helped out on the publicity program.

My committee is trying to get the NHPA involved in the Sears-AAU Junior Olympic program. If we're successful, the AAU will give our Junior program a lot of publicity and help us

in increasing our Junior participation. Sears will supply all the prizes.

Ringer World Emporium is trying to work out a program with the NHPA so that game related items can be purchased in large quantities so that the NHPA members could get a reduction in price. # BERNARD HERFURTH WINS MASSACHUSETTES STATE TITLE FOR 4th TIME; BARBARA McNEILL NEW WOMEN'S CHAMP; SHELDON STEEVES TOPS BOYS; JANICE DOMEY REPEATS; FRAN NORMAN-BILL LAWSON TAKE DOUBLES CROWN

The quest for the Mass. state title was one of the tightest, hard-fought battles in years. Tengood men had earned a shot by virtue of their torrid pitching over the past year. All gave good account of themselves. In the end form prevailed as Herfurth, Domey, and Richardson dropped only a pair each and then battled some more via playoffs. Ed Domey took the measure of defending champ Charlie Richardson in the first game. Then Bernie did likewise to Ed in the final game, tossing a 76.3 percenter (in their regulation match it was Herfurth 79.2%, Domey 76.0%). This was Herfurth's fourth trip to the winner's circle as state champion. One can only admire a man of his age, doing what he does for the sport, and then finding time to lay it on his opponents with such authority.

The numbers everyone posted were almost as good as their taling. Gadoury tried to psych Herfurth with his tale of 22 consecutives in practice. Cushman reported that Herfurth was throwing all 80's in his back yard. Somebody said Richardson never looked better the previous week. Finally, Domey went over to court 11 Saturday night, threw for ten minutes, and said, "There's no point in practicing any more 'cause I haven't missed yet." When it counted though, nobody strung 22, hit 80, or had a perfect game. But Richardson had six in the 70's, Herfurth hade five, Domey and Bonani had four each, Gadoury three, Ahlstrom two, and everyone toyed with the mark. Bonani's 77.1 was good for "high game out of the money." Courville was disappointed with his average, but he stiffed Richardson with 67.6 in Round 5. Peloquin hit 69.4% in a gallant, albeit losing, comeback effort. Cormier paid back an "owesie" with 69.4 in his last game. Drowne had a fine stretch of games the second half of the schedule.

Young Sheldon Steeves surprised favorite Greg Rutkoski with how much he has improved the past year, went head to head with Greg in the final game, and came away with a 41-35 victory for the Boys state title.

What started as a 2-girl race between acknowledged champ Janice Domey and "token com-

petition'' Robin Gadoury eventually expanded to a four-girl race that included Brenda and Barbara (younger) McNeill. It didn't matter, for Janice easily proved her ability, capturing the Girls' title for the fifth time with a 57.3% average, missing her sister's record of 57.5% by just 0.2 percent.

Barbara McNeill topped the three-woman field by one game and one tenth of a percent to capture the Woman's state title. Barbara can take pride in her performance this year in that she, and her daughter Brenda, were the most improved womens' and girls' pitchers in New England.

Fran Norman and Bill Lawson teamed up to capture the Mass. Doubles title undefeated. This is no mean feat when all partnerships are limited to a combined percentage of 80. The title game was between the winners of Groups 1 and 2, with Norman-Lawson outdueling Janice Domey and Bob Steeves. An amusing sidelight to the competition was that after 7 rounds in Group 2, Domey-Steeves were tied with Barbara and Brenda McNeill. Both teams were advised that should a tie exist after 9 rounds it would be broken on total point differentials (earned and yielded). Domey and Steeves promptly won the next game 35-0!

Dear Mr. Cobb:

I am the founder and organizer of the Goldendale Horseshoe Club in Germantown, Wisconsin. After I retired in 1971, I started to build four modern horseshoe courts with lights. I finished them in 1972 and formed a club and had a coupls and some men's leagues playing each week.

We had our first open tournament that year and with entries from all over Wisconsin and Illinois we ended up with about 86 players including Juniors that became a first in Wisconsin tournaments.

We had the tourney scheduled for Saturday and Sunday and used the 50 point cancellation game.

We started at 8:00 a.m. each morning and had our classes timed to finish at 10:00 p.m. Our schedule held out alright for a few classes but then we started losing time. It wasn't a matter of minuted but then it became a half hour or more between classes and had to start the last class around midnight. That did it, so in 1973 we used the 50 shoe cancellation system and were able to hold our schedule to a few minutes either way and we still do.

The world tournament and other clubs still use the point system that most of the old timers like but what about the future?

Now it is my opinion that we are way out of line with other sports. What we need is one standard scoring system and I don't mean the point game. Where would other sports be today if they didn't have a standard way of scoring?

Example: Bowling, 100 pins wins the game. Football, 21 points; basketball, 100 points; and so on for other sports that didn't have innings quarters, frames or rounds.

Our club leagues the 50 count all handicap because of the difference in the players ringer percentage of beginners and experienced pitchers.

I have been pitching for 50 years so I am an old timer also, but it doesn't take much sense to know that hoseshoe pitching has to have one standard scoring system to get up with the other sports whether it be cancellation or count all shoe games.

# ART TYSON REGAINS NEW YORK STATE CROWN; LADIES' TITLE GOES BACK TO RUTH HANGEN; PIKE TOPS BOYS

Art Tyson of Mt. Vernon won all his games with little trouble and became New York State champion for the second time at the 50th annual New York State Championships in Canton over the Labor Day weekend.

Tyson, averaged 70.2 percent in compiling an 11-0 record over 11 others in mens class A. Defending and 22-time champion Carl F. Steinfeldt is now a legal resident of Clearwater, Florida, and was ineligible, although he attended the tournament and helped with clinics and awards presentations.

Tyson, who defeated Steinfeldt for his other title in 1977 in Pulaski, was the only one in Class A to average 70 percent. It was the lowest winning percentage since Steve Fenicchia of Rochester won in Jamestown in 1963. Joe Schultz of Brentwood, who was state champion in 1978, finished second at 8-3 and 65.7 percent. Fenicchia was third.

Ruth Hangen of Getzville outlasted her perennial foe, Lorraine Thomas of Lockport, to regain the Class A women's title. Hangen went 7-0 with 70.5 percent ringers and handed Thomas her only defeat. It was Hangen's eighth state championship since the division was formed in 1963. Thomas has won the title nine times.

In the juniors, 11-year-old Robert Pike of the host club upset defending champion Steve Crandall of Hornell, then defeated Bob Deuster of Hampton Bays in a playoff. Deuster had defeated Pike in the regular round-robin play and had the division's best ringer percentage, 58.2.

Class A pitcher and former state secretary/treasurer Lou Gancos of Brooklyn and longtime competitor George Hale of Jamestown were inducted into the New York State Horseshoe Hall of Fame in ceremonies on Sunday afternoon. The tournament attracted a record 233 entries at the 16-court layout at the Canton Sportsmen's Club.

Canton tournament director Jack Townsend was elected president of the New York State Horseshoe Pitcher Assn., replacing Walter Hooley of Montrose.
