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

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT...DAVE LOUCKS

1987 WORLD TOURNAMENT — Eau Claire, Wis. Many of you planning to attend will be interested in the method of play. The following highlights will give you an idea of the format unanimously adopted by the NHPA Executive Council.

- 1. We have added Intermediate, Senior and Elder (70+) classes for women subject to a reasonable number of entrants.
- 2. Men's Elder Class will be divided into 30 foot and 40 foot pitchers.
- All women entrants plus men's Intermediate, Senior & Elders will be seeded by percentage into 24 to a class; 2 groups of 12. Class championships, A & down, will consist of 6 pitchers. Championship finals in all but Elders will be 12 pitchers.
- Men's Open Classes, A & below, will be seeded by percentage, 32 to a class; 2 groups of 16; 8 in the class finals.
- 5. The finals of each class, A & down, will be made up of the 2 group winners plus the next 4 or 6 best WON/LOST records.
- 6. All classes will have some move-up opportunity based on percentage.
- 7. All finalists other than Championship Classes will pay \$10.00 Entry Fee.
- 8. Each class finalist, A & below, will receive a cash prize plus trophy.
- The next 6 or 8 best won/lost records who do not make the class finals will receive a cash prize.
- \$600 in prize money will be awarded for each class of 24; \$800 for each class of 32. 50% of all pitchers in each class will receive a cash prize. 25% will receive a trophy.
- 11. No trophies will be awarded for preliminary rounds.
- 12. The Men's Championship Finals will consist of 24, the Women, 12 finalists.
- Championship finalists will pay a pro-rated entry fee. The higher the purse, the higher the entry fee.

I hope that all entrants will appreciate that we have tried to develop a format that will please almost all pitchers. We did our best to consider all your recommendations and we hope you will now do your best to accept them as being in the best interest of the greatest number of pitchers. Based on 1200 adult entrants, the total prize list will be about \$50,000. The actual prize list will be published in a later issue of the Digest.

DAVE'S COURT REPORT

While on the subject of World Tournaments, potential bidders for the 1989 tournament should be aware of a very important fact. By delegate vote in Ainsworth, the deadline for submitting future W.T. Bids, including for 1989, must be submitted by April 15th. There are also new minimum bid requirements, \$36,000 in cash prizes plus

\$4,000 toward trophies. Therefore, if your club or city is considering a bid for the 1989 tournament, you must act quickly.

All bids have to be in the hands of the NHPA Secy/Treas by April 15, 1987.

RINGERS REMEMBERED

In the 1955 World Championships Ted Allen pitched every game over 80%, the only time in history this has ever been accomplished. He went 35-0 and averaged 86.4%. The record for consecutive 80% games or better is held by Elmer Hohl at 44 straight games. The last 34 games of 1968 and first ten of 1969.

Mark Seibold became only the sixth man to ever pitch three consecutive 90% games. He achieved this in the 1986 World tournament by pitching 96.2, 90.9, and

93.2% in rounds 19, 20 and 21.

They say the caliber of pitching is not what it used to be, but going into the last five games of 1986 world tournament, four men were averaging over 80% and had it not been for the strong wind the last day and the wind and rain delay the first night there would have been more. That brings me to my next point. The record for most 90% games is 44 for a mens championships in a world tournament set in 1965 in beautiful Keene, N.H. with a 36 man field. This year's 32 man field had 40 games of 87.5% and better. That's a compliment to Ainsworth and the horseshoe pitchers. With next year's event in the wonderful Eau Claire indoor layout and all the top caliber pitchers appearing, I predict we'll see six men average at least 80% and at least four women average over 80%.

NHPA PUBLICITY

Since horseshoe pitching has evolved into an organized sport, there have been many pitchers who have complained about the lack of media

coverage-newspapers, radio and TV.

Having been in sports writing some fifty years now, I can recall when high schools had only three sports — football, basketball and track. There were only six professional hockey teams, 16 pro baseball teams, a minimum of pro football and basketball teams. The women and girls competed in closed competition (they wouldn't let us men in to watch).

In addition numerous independent sports like badminton, racquetball, softball, tennis and many others were not available so they did not take up any space on the

sports pages.

However, this trend has changed. We have over fifty sports trying to muster some

recognition in the sports media.

To get our share of coverage, the NHPA publicity committee is embarking on a program that might result in local, big city and national coverage we so desperately need.

We are embarking on a program in every horseshoe pitching community to encourage State and club officers, tournament directors and publicity directors to

make a special effort to stimulate coverage in their areas.

First, it must be the duty of each State president and every Club president to appoint a publicity director, or take on the job himself. Publicity is not a monumental task. Collect all the information about your organization, acquire a schedule of events, check on past winners and important horseshoe pitchers and administrators in your community and take this information to the person in charge of your local publication, radio station or TV. It may be the sports editor, or a writer or the editor, but let them know who you are and that you will be in contact with them during the pitching season. In addition to results of tournament, you may be surprised that the media will use some feature material about you leading pitchers.

Now is the time to lay this groundwork for future coverage. Organization presidents are urged to send the name, address and phone number of your appointed publicity person. The presidents and publicity people will be sent material

immediately relative to the program.

Full cooperation is necessary from all groups if we are to complete a successful program. If the general public in every community starts reading about horseshoe pitching, we will obtain more pitchers and the top media people will realize that horseshoe pitching deserves local, big city and national coverage from them.

PITCHEROOS HORSESHOE CLUB, VICTORIA, AUSTRALIA By PETE MOON

I was meaning to write to the News Digest last year, on my return from the World Championships.

Not only to express my amazement at what I saw and was taught as to the conducting and organizing of such an event, but to see the Pitchers and their families, not counting the general people of the U.S.A., even the country itself. I felt at home after being there only a few hours; I guess all this comes from our old days of pioneering, both our countries more or less in the same era of the 1800's, but you

got your independence faster.

A quick word on that subject; we were both so busy on getting on with settling in our new lands that we had no time or means of meeting each other but nowadays there is no excuse, only the \$ situation, but it can be done if we all chip in. I proved that on my venture to go and learn as much as possible of horseshoe pitching, which I sure did. Every man and woman and child was so kind to me, even though my score at the World Championships was — one watering can, one shovel and one scorer's ankle. When I return some day, I would like very much to have that same guy scoring for me, just to prove that he is quite safe now.

Back to why I am finally writing to the Digest: really my arm has been twisted by the National officers of NHPA U.S.A. to write a few lines, also the "Pitcheroos" have

said, "Why don't Down-under get a mention in the Digest?"

After my name appeared in the 1986 September issue, that was the last straw. So here is a little news on Aussie Pitchers: really condensed, as I could fill your Digest with news from Down-under.

The "Pitcheroos" took off all events except the Juniors in the 5th Australian Horseshoe Pitching Championships 1986. We were runner-up on the 4th Championship 1985. After my trip from the States, we sure have kicked on — 'Australia Day' 26 Jan '87 will be the State of Victoria Championships and we will clean that up too — we only have seven States here, yet Australia is approximately the same size as the U.S.A. and five States have Clubs now, and a few backyard pitchers who will get into the act in the near future.

We are slowly becoming united in all ways. What we really need is a couple of "Dead-eyes" here to just show what can be done — yet they are surprized at my 25% game but really not good enough to promote the sport.

ASSAULT ON A PRISON

(Foreword: The NHPA has kept this story hidden for quite some time...but sooner or later it had to come out. This is what I discovered on my trip to the World Tournament.)

The 'Don's' territory extended over several states. By agreement with others, he worked strictly within his own territory. For quite some time, he had worked on a daring plan...an assault on the high security Kansas State Penitentiary at Leavenworth. There were 6 men inside those walls whom he wanted to wipe out.

"Yeah, I know. But how do we get our weapons past the electronic surveillance system? There just ain't no way!"

"Look. I said everything was fixed. A guard will shut off the system to let us pass through. Just carry your weapons in your cases. Don't hesitate. Keep walking."

"We're after 6 men, right? We're supposed to wipe them out. What exactly are our orders?"

"To be brief...no pity! These are the 'Don's' instructions. There'll be some resistance but each of you must crush it. Use your regular weapons. Don't use your straight edge unless absolutely necessary...because that makes things final. The Don wants a good clean job...no slip-ups."

"Yeah, I know...but some of those guys are pretty tough cookies...and they aren't going to be easy. Take Big John, for example. I've seen his record. He's really

tough!"

"Well, you've each been assigned one man and it's up to you to get him.

Two days later. Five men sat around the same scarred table, talking.

"It didn't go off too quitely, did it?"

"Nope. There was a lot of yelling and screaming."

"Did any of you use your straight edge?"

"I did. I had a close call. There was just no other way!"

"Too bad about our leader. What happened?"

"Darndest thing. He was working his man over real good when another inmate swung a piece of steel, hit him in the arm, cut a gash, and completely obliverated the special code. He couldn't get out. He'll be there for life...however, he did his job...he wiped out his man."

"Tough! He was kind a nice guy!"

1986. World Tournament. I told this story to a fellow horseshoe pitcher.

"What was the name of the leader?" he asked.

"Larry Morton."

"Larry Morton? How can be in Leavenworth and be right out there pitching?"

"Haven't you ever heard of reincarnation?"

"Yeah, I guess so. But how about the 'Don'?"

"Oh, that's Don Koso, the NHPA Regional Director. Hey, I didn't forget to tell you the 'assault on a prison' was made by 6 NHPA members playing a horseshoe match with 6 prison inmates, did I?"

HOUSTON, TEXAS CELEBRATES FIFTH YEAR (SANC. 82A18)

The Greater Houston Horseshoe Pitchers Association has completed another year of sanction league. Beginning in March and ending in November, 6 eight-week leagues were played. On Tuesday nights and Saturday mornings, three 50-shoe games were pitched, totaling 144 games. Count-all points and 90% handicaps were used.

While Texas celebrated its sesquicentennial, the Houston Club celebrated its 5th year in sanction league competition. Ringer percentages, along with point averages, increased. It's a proven fact that pitching in leagues will help win in tournament play.

Two of our league members received the NHPA Top Ten Award: Bill Campbell, 6th Highest Point Game with 129.0 points/10th Highest Ringer Percentage with 64.1/Men's Division: 8th Highest Ringer Percentage with 64.1. Ronney Joe Bundick,

6th Highest Point Game Over Average with 186.2 points.

League Champions were: Betty Schroeder, Becky Simmons, Bill Campbell, Art Geyer, Frank Polak and Don Zobol. High Average Patches went to: Bill Campbell with 101.4 points, Art Geyer - 93; Dolores Zigrang - 90.9; Ken Mathis with 89.3 points. High Game Patches went to: Bill Campbell - 129.0 points; Art Geyer - 117; Dolores Zigrang - 110; and Ken Mathis with 108 points. High Game Over Average Patches went to: Ronney Joe Bundick with 186.2 points, Ron Maroon - 178, Becky Simmons - 178 and Art Geyer with 172 points. Most Improved pitchers of the year were: Betty Polak, Becky Simmons, Mary Zander, Pete Davis, Mark Sattler and Don Thompson, they received NHPA belt buckles.

The Rookie Patches went to our three juniors: Brandon Maroon, Scott Bartee, Brian Croft, also to three of our newest members, Virgil Miller, Mark Sattler and Don Zobol

The Sportsmenship Award was presented to Charlie Simmons at our annual Christmas party.

100 points and over was achieved by: Bill Campbell, Art Geyer, Ken Mathis, Bob

McCharen, Frank Polak, Betty Schroeder, Jerry and Dolores Zigrang.

Leagues cannot continue to be successful unless they are run by competent directors. We have been fortunate to have three of the best: Clyde Hetrick - and his helper - Robert Hetrick (Tuesday nights). Walter Zelezniak - and his computer - (Saturday mornings).

Our thanks and appreciation go to these three dedicated men.

SANC. LEAGUE, JR. LEAGUE & JR. SCHOLAR PROGRAMS By TERRENCE DOUGHERTY, DIR.

The Sanctioned Club & League Program, just finishing its 9th complete year, was again a success as a promotional program of the NHPA. In 1986 over 600 new members participated in the program, with junior participation also increasing, from 102 juniors in 1985 to 124 juniors in 1986, ranging in age from 7 years to 17 years, and a total 1986 Sanctioned League participation of 4,881 members, plus 148 unreported 1985 members, for an actual membership of 5,029 reported members.

In 1986 there were three (3) participating clubs with full Junior League activities, sanctioned with the NHPA, those being in Riverside, Texas, Independence, Missouri and Candor, New York. For 1987 over 10 clubs have already indicated to me they are

going to hold and run separate 'leagues' for their junior members.

In 1987 the Junior League Program is totally separate from the adult programs, with their own patches and awards, their own Top Ten Listing, set up in the same format as the adult program, plus the new NHPA Scholastic Honor Society for all youngsters who participate in a 'Sanctioned' Junior League are with a 'Sanctioned' Club or League, and maintain a scholastic average of B- or higher. This program is run in conjunction with the Junior Scholar Pitcher Award Program.

One point I want to make, and that is indicated 'sanctions' in the Digest. There are no sanctions issued by this office such as 83-100. Sanctions awarded within this Pro-

grams are always such as 83 C,A or L 100. 'C' indicates 'club,' 'A' indicates 'associa-

tion' and 'L' indicates a 'league' sanction.

The Junior Scholar Award Program was a great success for its first year of institution. At this time the only youngsters who are eligible MUST participate in a total 'Junior League' or with a 'Sanctioned' club or league. Of the 124 youngsters participating, only 55% were 12 years of age or older, and eligible for the award. Of the 68 youngsters eligible, 38 participated, or 56%, and of that 38 group, 33 made the NHPA Scholastic Honor Society of B- or better. In effect, 49% of the eligible youngsters made the Honor Society.

The 1986 Junior Scholar Pitchers both carried averages of A +, and for the boys, we had a tie with Steven Barnes of Missouri and Michael Morse of New. Since Steven carried the highest season ringer percentage. He was declared the 1986 Junior

Scholar Pitcher.

1986 GIRL'S JR. SCHOLAR PITCHER — Kerrie Marie Preisler, Riverside, Jr. H.L.

Texas; East Bernard Jr. High School; Age: 12; Scholastic Aver. A-plus.

1986 BOY'S JR. SCHOLAR PITCHER — Steven Anthony Barnes, Independence Jr.

H.L. Mo; Odessa High School; Age: 15; Scholastic Aver. A-plus.

These youngsters will receive an NHPA plaque indicating them as the 1986 Junior Scholar pitchers, a Scholar Pitcher Certificate of verification, two NHPA Junior Scholar Pitcher patches dated 1986, and a \$200 scholarship award which will be put in a trust fund by the NHPA in the local bank, with such acrueing interest until they are 18 years of age.

Those youngsters making the Junior Honor Society Listing each receive an NHPA Honor Society certificate and an NHPA Scholar pitcher patch. This patch is of a dif-

ferent design than the two top winners receive.

The new 4th edition Red Book is now available, and by the time this is printed, I should have the new 1st edition Junior League handbook. Anyone wanting copies of these books please contact me and let me know how many you want.

I want to thank the 138 Directors I worked with this year, they all did great jobs, and also the working relationship of the NHPA, especially Donnie Roberts, Dave

Loucks and Ed Domev...

that we never missed a night of pitching.

Most Improved honors went to Boone Wilkinson, who improved his average 7.1 points from 36.5 to 43.6. Not far behind was John Grundmeier who upped his average

Wil then went on to finish third in the lowa State Men's Championship, behind Glen "Red" Henton, and Harold Darnold respectively. (Incidentally, Red Henton captured his 17th State Championship with this year's win.)

Pat Simon, along with earning his first Iowa State Doubles Championship with Wil Foelske, also set a new mark for himself when he tossed 28 ringers out of 34 shoes for his first 80% game at the Iowa State Championships. An 82.4% effort boosted him to a very respectable 62.8% for the day and a perfect 7-0 sweep in Class A1.

So we have come to the end of another season of horseshoe pitching here in Waterloo, and it was a good one. Many good times were had by all of our pitchers and we all look forward to next year when we can do it all again.

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In Memoriam

It is with sadness that we report the passing of Walter Shackelton of New York on

December 1, 1986.

Mr. Shackelton was a professional fly fisherman and tied his own trout flies. He was recognized for his many outstanding accomplishments in the sport of horseshoe pitching. He won championships in Montgomery, Schoharie, Delaware, Sullivan and Otsego counties and was New York State Champion at age 16.

Walt Shackelton was a big, amiable man, soft-spoken and kind.

For years he was the premier horseshoe pitcher in the region, and most of the time he was near the top of the heap of those who toss shoes across New York state.

It was only fairly recently that he cut back on his pitching, but as late as 1981 at

age 70 he was still entering a dozen tournaments a year and placing high.

His exploits in that year earned him the honor of being inducted into the New York State Horseshoe Pitching association. He bagan pitching shoes way back in 1924 and by 1928 earned the right to pitch in the amateur horseshoe pitching tournament for the state under the state association, and he won the championship.

In 1962 he promoted a tournament at the Delaware County Fair and it has been a

fixture since. He helped start tournaments at Afton and Morris fairs, too.

The sympathy of the N.Y. Association and that of the NHPA is extended to his loving wife and family in their hour of sadness.

The passing of two members of the Kansas State Association has been reported. Willard Challender, a faithful member of the NHPA, following heart surgery. Also Charles Bliss following a brief illness of lung cancer. He had competed in the Kansas State tournament this past Labor Day.

Two North Dakota horseshoe pitchers died recently — Larry Veitch, 80, of Fargo; and Carl Weber, 78, of Havana, N.D. Weber was a longtime Havana League pitcher and competed in many open and state tournaments. He was named to the state hall of fame. Veitch was an officer in the Red River Valley League.

The death of Herman C. Torrence of Lynchburg, Virginia on November 22, 1986 was a sad day for the Virginia Horseshoe pitchers and all those who knew him. We wish to express our deepest sympathy to his wife, Clara and his family. He was 75 years of age and had been a long time friend and supporter of the Virginia Horseshoe Pitchers Association. He was a member of the Hill City Club of Lynchburg, a charter member of the Virginia Horseshoe Pitchers Association, and a member of the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association. He has won many awards from clubs in and out of the state, not only for pitching but for his help and sportsmanship. He was young at heart and generated enthusiasm and happiness to all those around him.

It is with deep regret and sorrow that we of the Lockport Leagues report the sudden passing of two of our beloved members. Mark Sylvester passed away at the age of 52 of July 21, 1986.

The first week of September, Kim Sylvester presented a plaque in her father's memory to the Men's League prior to her going to the hospital for minor surgery. She lapsed into a coma and a week later passed away at the age of 21. She was a talented singer and musician and a pitcher in the Lockport Women's League.

The sudden loss of Mark, followed so closely by the death of Kim, shocked and

WW II. Iowa Jima...Kwajalein...Tarawa...Okinawa...and 100's of other islands, all basically the same...lush seacoasts and valleys with sharply rising hills and mountains in the interior.

Okinawa! The GI's of the 77th Infantry Division advanced slowly taking advantage of every bit of cover they could find. They stared uneasily at a long narrow valley with forbidding mountains on each side. They knew what those innocent looking mountains held in store for them. Going over was impossible. Going around was just going into another valley with the enemy also firmly entrenched in caves and bunkers on the hillsides. Even though the Army Air Corps had given close ground support by raking the sides of the mountains with machine guns, rockets, and bombs...each GI knew what had to be done. The area had to be 'mopped up.'

'Mopping up' meant digging the remaining enemy out of the caves and bunkers...with flame throwers and machine guns...a tough job by anyone's standards...but someone had to do it.

Many never made it back. One NHPA member did...but only after surviving the effects of a mortar shell which hit close by ... wiping out several GI's close to him...and leaving him 70% shot up.

This man is a good horseshoe pitcher. He had games of 84.4, 85.2, and 85.5% in Class A of the 1973 W.T. at Eureka, CA. This year he pitched in the under 70 Seniors

and finished third.

Fred 'Flash' Lavett was there. He earned the Combat Infantry Badge...and that says it all!

As a former secretary to the Northern Illinois Horseshoe Club at Elgin, Ill. during the 70's, I agree with Kevin and Harvey Ringers Only is the way to go.

At that time we changed from a scratch play to the Ringers Only Handicap

System. It would serve as well for Ringers Only Scratch also.

Players keeping their own score at one end of court 2 frames at a time. Player shooting last recording score. Very easy to keep track of 2 frames at a time.

This not only eliminated the need for scorekeeper but simplified record keeping and made for a uniform time schedule and also good for spectator interest. It took only a few minutes at the end of play to add score and determine scratch and handicap percentage for final result.

This is not the only advantage a player can tell whether he is up or down on percent at all times and can put forth more effort if necessary in time for results.

So let's all give this some thought and keep the ball rolling.

After all, ringers is the "art." Points are only a "part." (No pun intended.)
