

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT... DAVE LOUCKS

The NHPA Executive Council has in recent years, been holding two business meetings a year. One is at the start of the World Tournament and the other has been just prior to the Las Vegas Event. As our sport and organization grows, so does the business and the need to keep better informed. This is not always so easy to do especially when the staff is primarily volunteers, there is a large and frequent turnover of Charter officers and, the majority of members do not read this News Digest. We do try, however, and the following is a brief of the main issues that were discussed in the 1987 meetings.

EAU CLAIRE . . . The newly revised NHPA year end financial report was reviewed and agreed to be the most complete and detailed one ever presented. The reaction of the delegates in convention seemed to support this feeling. SLOGANS, over 100 suggestions were submitted and the Council reduced these to the seven we felt were best. They were presented to the delegates for vote but none received a majority vote so, none was adopted. REGIONAL TOURNAMENTS were discussed and a proposed outline of play, prizes and bidding was presented to the delegates. There was much discussion and too much hesitation which resulted in 3 of 4 potential bidders withdrawing their offers. . . . DRESS CODE had come under fire by some members and the Council decided to put it to the delegates. We did and the overwhelming vote was to support as written and not allow sleeveless attire to be worn at World or Regional events. . . . SHOE SANCTIONS were questioned because some members were having a lot of breakage and felt the NHPA should hold some control over the warranties. We felt otherwise and voted to not get involved with the manufacturer's warranty. ... EAU CLAIRE WORLD TOURNAMENT was the main topic of discussion with many of the operational tasks up for discussion. Curt Bestul was in attendance representing the Host, and together we discussed things covering scorekeepers, judges, move-up format, trophies, awards presentation, contract obligations, raffles and general tournament coordination.

LAS VEGAS was the site of our second meeting in 1987, just a day prior to the start of the Hacienda Tournament. The prime topic of this meeting was the subject of NHPA Liability Insurance which the delegates in Eau Claire had mandated we pursue. Three firm proposals were presented with a Vice President representing one of the offers attending to discuss their proposal. When all was said and done, the Council voted to accept the proposal of Transamerica Insurance Co. through K & K Insurance Agency in Indiana. This spectator liability coverage went into effect in January of this year.

Other business discussed covered: SANCTIONED LEAGUE PROGRAM and the need to find a new director due to the sudden passing of Doc Dougherty. . . . NHPA Hall of Fame and the update and distribution of an information pamphlet. . . . NHPA calendar for 1988 has to be dropped due to insufficient orders, member deposits to be returned if requested. . . . WORLD

TOURNAMENT help must include more people so that those who do offer to help aren't worn out. Pitchers will not have to check scoresheets in 1988. We will use computers to do checking where possible. A proposed schedule of play with format and prize lists was tentatively approved. The outline of this was published in the February Digest. MAGAZINE COMMUNI-CATION was the subject of several letters from members and the 1987 State Officers meeting. Seems as though all feel we are not doing a good enough job. The council will discuss ways for improvement and try to put into effect by 1989. . . . STATE CHAMPION-SHIPS should not allow guest privileges to non NHPA members. Unfortunately, this apparently happened at a couple of State Tournaments in 1987 where it was assumed that the quest NHPA card could be used. . . . EAU CLAIRE video was judged to be a good documentary on our sport and meeting with the approval of most viewers. Some felt more pitching should have been included particularly of the top players.... LEGAL HORSESHOES will become a subject at the 1988 Pleasanton World Tournament where the shoes of all participants will be subject to an official NHPA check for proper weight and measurement. We have adopted a user tolerance that will permit a maximum opening on a used shoe of 35/8 inches. The maximum weight and width measurements as specified in our Constitution will also apply. Contentants be warned: do not expect to pitch illegal shoes. . . . REGIONAL TOURNA-MENTS are still a hot topic with interest from several parts of the country. We again discussed the possibility of setting the guidelines. Some council members wanted to wait until the next convention but, as NHPA President, I felt it was better to get the ball rolling than to put it off for another year. As such, I drew up a Regional Tournament Agreement form which spells out the conditions required to hold an official Regional Event. Initial response looks good for some 3-6 Regional tournaments in 1988.

DAVE'S COURT REPORT

It is most times difficult to accept when we learn of the passing of a friend or relative. The NHPA with its "one large family" image has been saddened by the recent untimely deaths of two hard workers. In November, we lost Terrence "Doc" Dougherty, the NHPA Sanctioned League Director. Now, the sudden passing of Pat Eaton has left a void in the hearts of the Wisconsin members and her many NHPA friends. Pat, many of you will remember, was the president of the Eau Claire Horseshoe Club and played a very active and visible role in the 1987 World Tournament. Eight times Wisconsin State Champion, Pat lost a two year battle with cancer on January 22, 1988.

NHPA Liability insurance is coming just in time for some States. We have been notified by some, who didn't think NHPA insurance was necessary, that coincidently, the cities of their largest clubs were requiring club provided insurance starting in 1988. It's good that we can now assist these clubs and if the truth were known, there's probably more local requirements for insurance than clubs realize. As of February 1st, 33 Charters had paid their assessment in full, 2 others had made partial payments and 23 had yet to pay with only 2 of these 23 even writing to inquire. Sixty percent response within the first month is quite good and indicative of the importance to and cooperation of the NHPA majority. It is only hoped that the balance of the Charters will follow shortly. Failure to do so will hurt their membership as they will not be eligible for sanctioned tournaments, including State, Regional and World Championships. Further, without a Sanctioned State Championship, a State puts its Charter Certificate in jeopardy. It would be a shame if even one pitcher is denied an opportunity to aprticipate because state officers somewhere don't realize that they represent the NHPA and the majority voice as much as their state.

NHPA REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Don Titcomb, Regional Director of Region #26 which includes Nevada, Utah, and Northern California, has received reports from several of his assistants reporting on the progress of horseshoes in the areas. Don Weaver reports from Nevada that he directed the Senior Olympics for the fourth year and also the Police regional olympics for the fourth year. Don was re-elected President of the So. Nevada association for the fifth time since it was organized five years ago. The Las Vegas area has eight courts at Sunset Park and nine new courts at J.C. Park. They hope to have three more courts and lights added this summer. In December of 1987 a new park was dedicated in the country and four new courts were constructed.

Bud Schardine reports from Utah that horseshoes is on a roll in Utah. In July a celebrity tournament was held in Salt Lake. The top sixteen pitchers in Northern Utah were pitted against sixteen celebrities. TV personalities, Sports writers, and well knowns, were invited to pitch and a lot of good media coverage was given. Cedar City sponsors the Utah Summer Games and St. George sponsors the World Senior Olympics annually. Both events have horseshoes and gave us good Statewide coverage. Jack Raymond reports that Deweyville, Utah, has recruited a "Ringer Slinging" group at Liberty Park. This has been a catalyst towards forming an NHPA League. South Jordan, Utah, has built ten fenced, ready for lights courts. Tito Artchuleta and Clarence Giles helped to install the South Jordan courts.

Don Titcomb reports that Northern California is a beehive of activity with the emphasis on preparation for the 1988 World Tournament in Northern California. Don is in the middle of a sponsorship drive and so far radio KEEN, a large country western station, has donated three weeks of commercials, one every hour for three weeks. Also KEEN will sponsor some trophy purchases. In addition to his work involving the World Tournament, Regional Director Don Titcomb holds several clinics and exhibitions throughout the year. These are held at the Salinas Rodeo, Golden Gate Field, and County Fairs. Some forty exhibitions with an audience of 500,000 people.

Les Burroughs, Regional Director of Region 25, reports that horseshoes is on the move in Hawaii. We now have two charters on the islands with a new charter being issued to the island of Oahu. They hope to hold their first ever State tournament this year. The Eastern Sierra Charter of California hosted the California State tournament in 1987 in Bishop. It proved to be one of the most successful State tournaments in history. San Diego, California, will host the 1988 State Tournament. Plans hav been approved by the city of Bakersfield for construction of twelve courts in their city park. The Arizona charters have been active with the Yuma Charter reporting that for the third consecutive year they ahve sponsored horseshoes in the Yuma High School outdoor sports program. YHPA also hosted a traveling league. Fourteen different parks participated in the league. Southern California will host approximately 65 tournaments this year from February thru November of 1988. These are all NHPA Sanctioned. In addition the fourteen Southern California clubs will hold club tournaments of their own.

Al Sandham, Regional Director of region #28, Georgia, reports that they had seventy-six adults and eleven junior NHPA members for 1987. This number has always seemed low for a state of this size and in order to interest new people into the sport the Georgia association has been putting on demonstrations and clinics at local craft fairs. Many new members have come from these fairs. Georgia has fourteen sanctioned tournaments held on five separate sights

including the State tournament at Dallas. The State tournament this year had the highest purse of any Georgia tournament with over \$3,300 in prizes and trophies. New courts wre constructed at Carrollton and their first tournament was held May 2nd. The prime motivator for horseshoe pitching in Carrollton, Elbert Allen, is in the process of forming a local league for sanction play. New courts are being built in the historic goldmining area of north Georgia mountain district. The town fathers of Dahlonega, Ga., are constructing twelve clay courts and play should be available for spring of 1988. Orville Dubie, son of the late Joe Dubie, was presented with the NHPA's 1987 Hall of Fame placque at the Georgia State annual meeting. The presentation was made on behalf of the NHPA by Al Sandham, Regional Director for Georgia. Georgia was represented at the World tournament by four pitchers and at the Las Vegas tournament by three.

NHPA PROMOTION COMMITTEE REPORT

We have two methods of scoring approved by the NHPA. At Las Vegas this year a 40 shoe cancellation format will be used. If all the games were scored using both methods, chances are that in the close games each score keeper would have a different winner.

Using the count-all system all ringers cancel each other and all close shoes (within 6") are of equal value and cancel each other.

Using the cancellation system, ringers cancel each other but close shoes do not cancel each other. This accounts for the chances of having two different winners in close games. If in the cancellation game, all shoes within 6" were of equal value, as they are in count-all, then we'd have the same winner regardless of which system is used.

The other advantages of using the rule, that all shoes within 6" of the stake are of equal value, is that we'd save much time not having to measure close shoes. We wouldn't have games in which a game is decided by a shoe that was 1½mm from the stake defeating a shoe that was 2mm from the stake.

At the world championship in N.D., Danny Kuchcinski and Ray Martin with 3-2 records and the game standing at 49-49, Martin had a double. Danny's first shoe was a ringer. The second shoe was 2 ft short, but rolled up against the stake. When his shoes were removed, Ray's second shoe had moved and had to be measured, and was found to be the thickness of a piece of paper from being a ringer. This gave Danny the point and game. They both won their last game. Thus the single point ended up by deciding the world championship.

If the rule had been changed prior to the championship, each player would be credited with a ringer and a single point, no score in cancellation, 4 each in count-all. The game would continue 49-49.

Note by changing the rule, the scoring in both systems would be the same.

Let's change the rule to read: All shoes within 6" of the stake are of equal value.

TV would never cover our sport live using our present cancellation scoring. They wouldn't tolerate a delay of game to measure two close shoes.

Several years ago Carl Steinfeldt and Kelly O'Brien appeared on live TV "Challenge of the Sexes." We were told that the scoring would be 50 pt count-all.

The Jan. 25 '88 Sports Illustrated Faces in the crowd included a picture and write-up on Sandy McLachlin, our new woman's world champion. It also mentions Diane Cantin and her new world mark of 54 straight ringers.

Walter Ray Williams Jr. made the TV finals in the first three PBA Tour Tournament, finishing fifth, third and second. He was the top qualifier in the third tournament.

Walter has selected Ebonite International Inc. as the company he will represent, endorsing their bowling balls, gloves, accessories, and bags exclusively.

Williams will represent Ebonite in personal appearances and exhibitions and will test new products.


In competition, Williams uses a variety of Ebonite balls, including the three Firebolt products designed for different types of lane conditions.



Pat served the club in many capacities, including being the president last year when the World Tournament was held in Eau Claire. She was also 2nd Vice President of the Wisconsin Horseshoe Pitchers Association at the time of her death.

NHPA DISTRIBUTOR DRIVES TO ALASKA TOURNAMENT By WALLY SHIPLEY

Last June Sally and I drove to Alaska to attend and help dedicate the Grand Opening of the Wendell L. Lewis Memorial Horseshoe Courts in Palmer, Alaska. Wendell was the main person to get horseshoes started in Alaska. He passed away in November 1986.

Guess there are not too many people who drive 4000 miles *one way* to attend a Horseshoe Tournament. It was a beautiful trip. We took 30 days to see it all. Stopped at a tournament in Redding, CA, and the Strawberry Festival Tournament in Lebanon, Oregon, on the way up. We toured British Columbia, the Yukon, Dawson City, Fairbanks, Denali National Park, Anchorage and Eagle River, Alaska.

We stayed with John and Mary Grohol in Eagle River. John is the NHPA Regional Director. I appointed him during my administration.

The courts are on the Elks Lodge property by a beautiful lake. It was a two day event. Most of us stayed over night in campers and RV. They had a big Barbecue Party Saturday night around a big camp fire, playing guitars and singing. At midnight it's daylight, so we just kept partying.

John came in first in his group, Sally 2nd in hers, Mary 3rd, and they didn't let me win one game. (I blame it on the party, ha, ha.) However, John and I were challenged at the American Legion Hall one evening in Eagle River at midnight. (That's an experience pitching at midnight, and it's broad daylight.) They had one court behind the club. Thanks to John I did win one game in Alaska.

Again, we want to thank the Alaska Association for all your hospitality. Appreciate the T-shirts with our names, belt buckle, food, refreshments and sleeping accommodations. You're all a great fun group.

So if you're in the Alaska area during their pitching season, I know you would be welcome. They even have an ICE Tournament in March. This March will be the 4th annual. Their regular season runs from May through September.

ELMER HOHLBy GLEN PORTT

Elmer Hohl was a quiet man . . . almost shy . . . but he had that certain charisma which drew people to him. That's the way it was with me. In 1968, I was stationed at Westover AFB, Massachusetts, when I saw a small item in the local paper stating the World Horseshoe Tournament was being held at Keene, New Hampshire. I went.

Not having pitched for nearly 30 years, it is an understatement to say that I was *awed* by what I saw . . . and what I later read. There is no doubt in my mind that I saw the greatest pitching performance the world had ever seen . . . or will see. The records made there may never be broken.

Elmer set a new qualifying record of 572 points out of a possible 600, went on to win the W.T. with a 35-0 record, and posted a new world record of 88.5% ringer average (later corrected to 88.2%). In his 35 games, he had *thirteen 90% gems*, and in those 13, he twice had three consecutive 90% games. Awed? I was . . . and I still am!

Although there are a few that will dispute this, I don't think we have a pitcher of that caliber in the world today. Yes, we have Lipovsky, Williams, Seibold, Knisley, and Steinfeldt . . . plus a few very promising newcomers . . . but, would you bet money that any one of them will average over 80% for 18 consecutive years in world tournament play? Elmer Hohl did! (Starting in 1988, Lipovsky and Knisley have only 17 more years to go.)

Is the competition tougher now? No way! Research reveals that during Elmer's string of 18, there was an average of 6.6 men per year who shot 80% or better. That was *his* competition. In the past few years, only 2-3 pitchers have been able to reach that magic number . . . and those figures were compiled in round robin play of from 23 to 31 games . . . not 35.

What were Elmer's best years? I found that the 6 year period from 1968-1973 were the ones. He averaged 85.35%! How does tht compare to the records of our other greats for their best 6 consecutive years? From 1954 thru 1959, Ted Allen had 84.9% while Fernando Isais's best were 1947 thru 1952 . . . 84.0%.

I had often asked myself why Elmer quit pitching in the W.T. and why he didn't join the Seniors. I wanted to know . . . so I asked him. He just smiled, shook his head, took another puff on his ever present cigarette, and never really answered. I can only guess that like a lot of others who were the very best in their sport, who'd been to the top, that he just didn't feel comfortable pitching 70-75% . . . unlike most of us mortals who would be extremely happy with those figures. His trademark was his cigarette. Perhaps when smoking on the court was prohibited, he made the decision to "give it up." Who knows?

Many say, unequivocally, that Elmer was the greatest horseshoe pitcher who ever lived. Few will argue with that. He was a "legend in his time" . . . and he will be a legend from now on.

So say goodbye . . . say goodbye to Elmer Hohl . . . one of the greatest ringer artists who ever walked the horseshoe courts of America. Say goodbye to the pleasure he gave you. His song has ended . . . the music has stopped . . . but his memory will be with us forever.



We have never before had insurance of any kind. I spoke at the Charter annual meeting about the Sanctioned Club Program and stated that Sanctioned Clubs will now be covered with insurance. I believe that the insurance will be a great incentive for clubs to join the program. I suggest that the NHPA use the insurance to help promote the Sanctioned Club Program.

I would like the NHPA to hold an annual meeting every year at the World Tournament with representatives from all Sanctioned Clubs similar to the annual meeting held with representatives from all Charters. 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
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1987 ILLINOIS STATE TOURNAMENT (SANCTION NO. 11-87-050)

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
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1987 AMERICAN ROYAL TOURNAMENT—SANC. 15-87-046

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
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"From Out Of The Mail Bag"

Also listed are errors in books and Digests. There are three pages listing all New England players regardless of class. And finally the 1986 averages for all players in the championship class, thanks to Kevin Cone who sent me the scoresheets.

NEVER LET THEM SEE YOU SWEAT By LARRY MORTON

A while back the Digest published something I wrote about a method of practicing that should surely be of benefit. Now I want to tell you that there are three things you never want to do when pitching against a tough opponent.

Never panic.

Never try to throw a ringer.

And never, never let them see you sweat.

Personally, I'm not very good at doing any of these things but I'm working on it. Let me explain.

Never panic. You're in a tight game and it's coming down to the wire, just a few points away from winning or losing. If you are a person who's going to panic, now's your time. Most folks who panic just tighten up, get real tense and very deliberate with their pitch. If you ever learn to relax in these situations and throw your shoe the way you do in your back yard, you'll have a better chance of it beinga ringer. Your opponent is feeling the same pressure you are . . . let him panic. I once saw a person that got so tense in these situations he'd throw the shoe straight up in the air. If you see a person running aorund the courts waving his arms and

pulling his hair screaming, "I can't stand it, I can't stand it," don't worry about it, he'll be all right. He's just panicing.

Never *try* to throw a ringer. That doesn't sound quite right, does it? Same situation, close score down to the wire. You're not panicing and have pretty good control fo your emotions but your opponent just laid a double on in front of you. All you can think about is that you've got to throw a ringer, two if possible. You toe your spot and get set, still thinking, "I have to throw a ringer." This is the wrong thing to be thinking about. Everybody talks about how important concentration is. This is what they're talking about. Your thoughts at this time should be now about throwing a ringer but only about throwing your shoe in such a manner that it has a good chance in *resulting* in a ringer. You can probably think about two things while actually throwing that shoe. My own favorites are "Get it up . . . follow through." Others may be "Keep it smooth, step straight, reach out. I'm sure you have your own most important ones. Nobody throws them all on so just do your best and trust your pitch to be where you want it.

Never let them see you sweat. Now I don't mean the kind of sweating you do when it's hot outside, or the heavy glistening the ladies do. I'm talking about the kind you do when you're struggling and nothing you do makes it better. If your opponent sees this he is going to jump on you like fleas on a dog and there is going to be quite a point spread before you recover. Haven't you ever noticed that when you are pitching bad your opponent never seems to miss? Just be patient, your game will come back and it will feel much cooler. Like I said, I'm still working on these three things and if I ever master them, I believe that I will be a better pitcher. I hope you will too. Good luck and have a good summer.
