

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

DAVE'S COURT R E P O R T

1989 promises to be a year of change and growth for the NHPA and horseshoe pitching in general. Newly-elected President George Bush is a true sportsman and an avid horseshoe pitcher. The NHPA has been asked to provide technical assistance in the installation of courts for President Bush at the White House and his residence. The mere fact that the leader of our country enjoys horseshoe pitching has caused inquiries at the NHPA office to more than double overnight. Promotion-minded people, the press and television are now showing a serious interest in our sport. I can assure you that the NHPA president and the secretary/treasurer are working overtime, following every lead and inquiry that might bring more recognition to our sport.

You are reading the first issue of *Newsline*. We have changed the size and the format of the previous *News Digest*. It was not an easy decision to make but comments from the membership over recent years favored change. It is my hope that the majority of current readers will like the change and encourage others to subscribe. I want *Newsline* to become the prime source of communication to the membership and the State Officers. The success of this goal depends a great deal upon your support and contributions from the various states. The thrust of *Newsline* will be toward more newsworthy items and less tournament results—which are best reported in state newsletters.

Newsline will be published 10 times annually. It is being sent by bulk postage rates. The address label carries the expiration date of your current subscription. It is the month that we will last send an issue to you. No reminders will be send, so check your label and renew early to avoid missing an issue. If you are late and want a back copy, it will cost you \$2.00 per issue, subject to availability.

INSURANCE UPDATE

The 1989 liability insurance binder has been paid with the balance of the \$20,700 policy due for payment this month. Charters will not be assessed this year but must collect \$2.00 with each NHPA membership and report it quickly. A credit or debit based on final 1988 membership will soon be sent to all Charter secretaries. 1989 certificates of insurance will follow shortly.

Il NHPA charter presidents and secretaries not on the subscription list are being sent a complimentary copy of this first Newsline issue. It is my hope that they will gain a new insight of the NHPA and our desire to communicate with the membership. Readership must increase. Newline is our latest effort to achieve that goal. I urge all state officers and the entire membership to become a Newsline subscriber.

There has been a change of assigned responsibilities among a couple of our vice presidents. The NHPA Hall of Fame, formerly under the direction of Barry Chapelle, is now the responsibility of the first VP, Earl Winston. Barry has taken over as chairman of the new Rules Committee.

Earl Winston advises that any new Hall of Fame nominations or updates must be received by him no later than March 31st. Earl recently visited a location in Iowa as a possible site to start displaying some of our Hall of Fame items. More on that in another issue.

Horseshoe Pitching has been getting some good press lately, what with our nation's leader an enthusiast. Several top publications have run articles, including USA Today and Sports Illustrated. Last year, in the July/August issue of "Mother Earth News", there was a great article of six full pages. Television has also begun to show signs of interest. ESPN has taped a spot for their regular Saturday program, "The Sunkist Kids." California Junior Boys Champion Kevin Kecskes of Fontana and a few other horseshoe pitchers were interviewed and taped at the Fontana courts in early December. We are told the tentative time of airing is April 15 on ESPN.

Rumor has it that a couple of sites are planning bids and a Spearfish presentation for the 1991 World Tournament. If your locale has a desire to present a bid, remember, it must be in the hands of the NHPA Secretary/Treasurer by April 15. That includes the 10% bid deposit money.

A recruiting project was begun in mid 1988 to inform and encourage clubs and individuals to join the NHPA Sanctioned Club Program. The project is being conducted by Robert Dunn, 6417 Georgia Ave., No. Brooklyn Park, MN 55428. Bob, working with Bev Born, informs prospective clubs of the program benefits and how to apply. All 60 charters have been contacted with the request to provide a list of their non-sanctioned clubs. Less than half the charters have responded — which again points out the need for better communcation. However, of those who contacted Bob, a list of 176 clubs was developed and all have been sent a packet of information. Support the NHPA and your fellow pitcher. Make sure they get the word.

Be Patient During Transition

Changing editors and changing from The Horseshoe Pitchers News Digest to Newsline are difficult tasks for the NHPA. The entire subscription list is now in my computer. All subscriptions come to my office. Each month, I will print a set of gummed mailing labels to use in mailing Newsline. When you receive Newsline, please look at your mailing label. Just above your name will be a date. The month listed in that date is the time your subscription expires. It would be my advice to you to renew about 60 days ahead of our expiration date. There will be no reminders or notices sent to you. We are depending on you to look at the expiration date on your mailing label and renew accordingly.

It is my desire over the next few months to get all of your names, addresses, and other information on your mailing label exactly correct. If you have any errors on your mailing label, no matter how small the error might be, please drop me a note with the corrections.

In the past, many of you have paid your charter officers for the Newsline when you buy your membership card. I would suggest that you would be better off to send the Newsline money directly to me so the charter officers won't be under pressure to file a report with me to avoid delaying your subscription.

During the past two or three months, a lot of work has been done to create a very accurate subscription list in my computer. This was one from the information supplied to me by Ellis Cobb. Having worked with mailing lists in the past, I am smart enough to know that everything is not currently correct and that it will take a few months of your help to get it all in order. When the first issue is mailed in February, there will be people who won't get their issue; others will see an expiration date they don't agree with, and some will see errors on their label. I am prepared to make all the needed corrections and to get your subcription in proper order

Please drop me a note with the information I need to update and correct the list or call me at 216-650-2234.

Just one last reminder that may catch some of you off guard. In the past, Ellis Cobb has mailed you a *Digest* a month or two after your subscription expired. With *Newsline*, that will not be done. No extra copies will be mailed.

The Evolution of Newsline




The National Horseshoe Pitchers Association has had a publication for its members for more than the last 50 years. During that time, the magazine took on several face changes but the record shows only three editors. In 1938, the magazine was known as "The Horseshoe World" and was being published by the late Raymond Howard of Ohio. During his time, the magazine cover changed at least three times, as shown by the reproduction here of some old issues. Sometime in the late '40s, the publication was taken over by Byron Jaskeulak of New York and the name changed to "The Horseshoe Pitcher." No copies of this publication are in my files but it surely had yet another change in look and style.

In 1956, "The Horseshoe Pitchers News Digest" was introduced under the direction of F. Ellis Cobb. The size changed, as did the look. Under the guidance of Ellis, the News Digest became the flagship of NHPA communication. While it, too, saw some cover changes, the goal of the Digest, to report association activity, never missed a beat. Every month for more than 32 consecutive years, Ellis published the News Digest. It would be hard to imagine — let alone find — a longer continuous period of service to the NHPA. For his dedication and work, Ellis received the NHPA Presidential Award in 1987 at the Eau Claire World Tournament. All the NHPA

membership should applaud Ellis.


1989 brings a new NHPA magazine, Newsline. You might wonder why I have taken over the publication. The task of finding someone else to take over the reins was somewhat frustrating. How do you replace a legend? The answer is that we can't, at least not in the sense of longevity and dedication. Those we contacted were not interested in assuming such an important and time-consuming function. As time went on, my personal business in the field of sports publications and a reasonable knowledge of the printing industry had people suggesting me. With other contacts not interested and no one else in mind, I have accepted the challenge and

From Balsam Lake down to Platteville and across to Kenosha and back up to Marinette there are over a million horseshoes being pitched during the course of a year in the state of Wisconsin.

Thanks to many club presidents and bar league informants, I was able during the past month to comprise an overwhelming list of clubs, leagues and the horseshoe pitchers themselves in our state.

First, I would like to apologize to the clubs and leagues I may have missed in preparing this article. Should you feel left out, please inform this publication and we will be glad to add your name to our list.

Here are the impressive numbers: 6682 horseshoe pitchers in clubs and local communities, plus another 4556 horseshoe pitchers in so-called bar leagues for a total of 11,237 horseshoe pitchers in our state. Included in this number are 998 leagues from clubs and bar leagues.

In some sections of the state there are as many as 16 taverns along a 30-mile stretch of highway with two or more horseshoe courts. These make up the majority of bar leagues in existence. Likewise, with our 26 listed tournaments in our yearly schedule, there are over 30 unlisted tournaments.

There are also four inside horseshoe pitching places now in our state. The first and most popular, the *Pitchin' Palace* in Sturtevant, *Whipporwill Tap* in Dane, *The Barn* in Rhinelander and *The Big Apple* in Rockwood. Along with all of the above, there are 85 cities and towns which contribute to the game of horseshoes in the state of Wisconsin.

Along with the larger court layouts in Beloit, Eau Claire, Janesville, Marshfield, Goldendale, Combined Locks, Edgerton, Kewaskum, Green Bay, Mountain, Fond du Lac and Fillmore, there are other ones opening for next year at Necedah, Ye Olde Wayside Inn, outside of Mountain, plus more too soon to mention.

All in all, the sport of horseshoe pitching is growing at a rapid pace in the good old state of Wisconsin and it is all our jobs to keep promoting it for all of our good fellowship and fun we have in participating.

In closing, I have one question to ask: "Horseshoes, anyone?"

Showdown in the Pits

Barbara Bush said, "You'll have to wear a cowboy hat. No one with any self-respect plays horseshoes without a cowboy hat." She rummaged around in a closet just inside the front door of the Vice-President's official residence in Washington. On a top shelf sat an assortment of George Bush's hats. I tried on a few of the Western variety. His hat size is a lot larger than mine, so the hats tended to slide down my forehead nearly to my eyes. Was I being handicapped before going out to the horseshoe pits?

"These hats all seem to be the same size," I remarked, a somewhat lunatic observation because it suggested surprise that my host's head measurements don't vary.

I finally picked a tall-crowned model with the President-elect's name stamped in gold on the inside. I wore it out to the horseshoe pit at a curious, rakish angle so that I could see where I was going.

The Vice-President was waiting there with his oldest son, George Jr., who would also be playing. Two George Bushes to contend with! The President-elect stared briefly at my hat. His was decorated with a braided Indian cord that supplemented the hatband. He held out some horseshoes.

"You got a choice," he said. "The drop-forged eight or the 10."

"I'll take the . . . ah."

The President-elect laughed. He looked down at the horseshoes, hefting them to judge their weight. "I don't know the difference myself," he said. "They tell me the harder the metal the more it tends to be rejected by the stake."

Then he explained the rules—one point for the shoe closest to the stake and three for a ringer; the winner would be the first among us to reach 15. We took some practice throws. I threw my shoes so that they revolved, parallel to the ground, toward the opposite stake. This somewhat startled the President-elect since that is the style (though I was unaware) used by most topflight pitchers.

"Hey, what have we got here?" he asked. He prefers to hold the shoe at its closed end and toss it so that it turns once, ass over teakettle, as it goes down the pitch.

"You played this game before?"
"Not for 30 years," I said truthilly.

The game began. The two Bushes were supported loudly by the President-elect's granddaughter Jenna, 7, who sat at pitside bundled up in a bright orange parka. There was considerable chatter during play needling and a plethora of homegrown expressions, such as "power outage" for a halfhearted toss, "SDI" for a throw with a higher arc than usual and "it's an ugly pit" for those times when no one's shoe was close to the stake. Once, when it was impossible to tell which of two shoes had landed closer, the Presidentelect shouted, "The tool! Get the tool!" - a request that was echoed by those standing around watching.

The tool, which George Jr. fetched from the gardening shed, turned out to be oversized navigator's dividers. The President-elect knelt in the pit and brushed away the dirt from the two horse-shoes. He handled the gadget with great relish. In fact, all aspects of the game were carried on with great elan. On occasion he would turn to me and pose the rhetorical question: "Isn't this game great? Have you ever had a better time? Isn't this just great?"

I was having a good time. The iron felt cool and comfortable to the grip. I peered out from under the brim of my hat and, suddenly, after a number of one-pointers, threw a ringer. I found myself with 14 points and only one to go for the win. The President-elect had 13; his son, 12. Cries of alarm rose from Jenna's chair.

I began to worry about winning. What would it do to the President-

elect's confidence to lose to someone who hadn't thrown a horseshoe in 30 years? Would he brood? Slam the heel of his hand against his forehead? Stumble into the bushes in the Rose Garden? Talk loud to himself state dinners? Snap at Sununu?

I decided I would credit my victory to the hat. "Beginner's luck," I was going to say. "And this hat of yours. If it hadn't been for this cowboy hat...."

It seemed the perfect solution. Gracious. Self-effacing. Just the thing to say.

"Listen, we can't let this happen," the President-elect was saying as he stepped up to throw. He sighted down the pitch. "Remember Iowa!" he called out, in reference to his recovery from political adversity there. We watched the red horseshoe leave his hand, turn over once in flight, drop toward the pit with its prongs forward and, with a dreadful clang, collect itself around the stake. A ringer! Sixteen points and the victory for the President-elect. He flung his arms straight up in triumph, a tremendous smile on his face. From her chair, Jenna began yelping pleasantly.

I said as follows: "Nerts."

I can't recall the last time I had used that antique expression. The President-elect came toward me, his hand outstretched. "Isn't that great!" he said as I congratulated him. He wasn't talking about his win but the fact that the game had been so much fun. I agreed with him. Then I told him that the next time I was going to bring my own hat.

THE 1989 NHPA ELECTION CAMPAIGN

Incumbents Announce Plans

The delegates in Spearfish will be voting on four NHPA Council seats as the twoyear terms end in December. President Loucks and First Vice-President Earl Winston have announced their intention to seek reelection. Third Vice-President Vince Yannetti and Fifth Vice President Mary Van Sant have decided to step aside.

Dave Loucks will be seeking his third term as president. Under his direction, the last three years have brought the largest increases in membership growth, more sanctioned events, nearly a 200% increase in World Tournament prize money and many organization and administrative improvements. Dave asks for your vote and continued support.

Earl Winston is finishing his third term as 1st VP and seeks to win his fourth. Earl was inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame in 1988. Recently appointed by the NHPA President to chair the Hall of Fame Committee, Earl is now spearheading the effort to locate a site to house our Hall of Fame and bring together a great deal of memorabilia. Your vote for Earl would be greatly appreciated.

Vince Yannetti has held the office of third VP for three terms. He has made many contributions to the NHPA but will step down to pursue retirement and travel interests. Vince extends his sincere thanks to all NHPA members and delegates who have supported him during his three terms as third vice-president.

Mary Van Sant will finish her first term in office after being appointed in early 1988 following the untimely death of her husband, Gene. Having worked closely with the regional directors during Gene's prior term, Mary was a natural to fill the spot. Her dedication to the responsibility and the NHPA will be extremely hard to replace. Mary will continue to be involved in horseshoes at the local level and will assist the new fifth VP in any way possible.

New Candidate for Office

Two members have already announced their intention to run for the office of third vice president. Other members are encouraged to run for any of the four offices up for election this year. The first VP posi-

tion carries with it the Hall of Fame responsiblity, so any candidate should have an interest and knowledge of this area. The fifth VP position must take charge of regional director program and the various related sanctioning and reporting tasks. A current regional director or someone with good administrative skills is a likely candidate. The third VP position currently has no specific work responsibility but that will change with the new office holder. If the elected party is a current NHPA program director, he/she will carry that program responsibility into office. If the elected assumes office with no prior NHPA responsibility, specific tasks will be assigned. All candidates must announce their intentions in Newsline by the May issue. Two such announcements follow:

Beverly "Bev" Born, a candidate for third vice president

It is with a deep sense of pride and dedication that I announce my candidacy for the position of third vice president of the NHPA.

I have been very active the last seven years in the sport of horseshoe pitching and especially enjoy the organizational and promotional areas of the sport. It is important to me to encourage the growth of the NHPA and its sanctioned league program. In 1984, I was instrumental in the organization of our Sanctioned Club and the construction of the courts on which we now have weekly play.

My responsibilities include being the league and tournament director for my local club, the Oklahoma state secretary-treasurer and for the last year, the national director of the NHPA Sanctioned Club Program. What a "Day"

have always realized that Curt Day was a great horseshoe pitcher. I also realized that I really didn't know too much about him... so I decided to find out. In almost any gathering of the addicted, where our really great ones — our legends — are discussed, you will hear the names of Ted Allen, Elmer Hohl, Fernando Isais, and Carl Steinfeldt bandied about. But seldom, if ever, do you hear the name of Curt Day. I wondered why.

After looking at a few statistics, I decided that if a completely unbiased statistician would analyze the records, a case could be made that maybe Curt Day was the best of them all. I can hear you say, "No way. Certainly you are not saying that Day ranks on par with Hohl, Allen, Isais, and Steinfeldt?"

"That's exactly what I'm saying."
"How can you possibly say that?"

"Because the records reflect it. Let's take a look. All four players pitched more W.T. games than Curt's 574, but Curt had the second highest winning percentage of all time — 86.23%. Isais's 88.11 was first, Hohl's 84.33 third, Allen's 77.95 fourth, and Steinfeldt's 77.74 fifth."

"Okay, that's a good point. What else?"

Well, if I asked you which of the five had the best ringer percentage for the 100's of W.T. games each played, whom would you pick?"

"Elmer Hohl."

"It's possible you may be right. It is so close that a complete search of the records would have to be made in order to say absolutely that it was not Elmer. But as the records stand today, Elmer was second with 82.28% vs. Curt's 82.48%."

"Okay. Another point. But does that make him

greater than Elmer?"

"Definitely not. Both men had enough times at bat so that a comparison can be made. However, Elmer pitched 205 more games, so his 82.28% for 779 games is a record. Curt's 82.48% for 574 games is also a record."

"How about World Tournament titles? I don't re-

member Curt winning too many."

"We all know that Allen, with 10, is the leader and that record will not be broken for a few years. Isais, with 8, and Hohl, with 6, are next. Then Curt, with 3. (Records before 1933 and after 1977 are not considered.) In those 3 W.T.'s, he averaged 86.2, 84.9, and 81.8. He won 93 out of 98 games for a winning percentage of 94.89. I believe these figures put him right up there with the best. What do you think?"

"I agree. Anything else?"

"Yes. After realizing that Curt had not received the credit due him over the years as one of our greatest, I wanted to find out more. So I interviewed him, asked him a lot of questions, and recorded the answers."

"What kinds of questions?"

"Here are a few . . . 'Curt, you threw a 3/4 reverse. Did you ever throw any other turn?'

"No man has ever won a W.T. with a regular 3/4 turn. Theory is that too many ringers are lost with this type of turn. You apparently did not lose too many with your reverse 3/4. Why would a reverse turn stay on better than a regular 3/4 turn?"

"I threw a hard shoe but it landed soft. I practiced throwing so it would hook the stake and I pitched from the right side. I seemed to have better alignment from the crossfire position. When I pitched from the left side, the shoe went on more perfectly, but I would

lose more ringers."

"In 1984, Sports Illustrated started an article on horseshoes with a two-page spread which showed a big red barn, and you, wearing bib overalls, posing in knee-high grass. The author started the article with 'by and large the game of horseshoes remains what it was. The stakes are out there behind the barn...'. This drew a lot of criticism and many thought it set horseshoes back 20 years because it gave to a million readers a very false picture of what the sport is today. Did you ever wear overalls like that when you pitched in a tournament? Were you paid for posing as the producer wanted?"

I received no pay. I have pitched in overalls, but never in a tournament. It happend like this. I received a call from Donnie stating a 'Jackie' was flying in to take some pictures. Jackie did take a lot of pictures. I didn't know which ones would be used. I should have asked

for more information."

"Curt, in reviewing your record, I have to say that you were one of the greatest of all time, especially during 17 W.T. years from 1959 through 1976, when you averaged over 80%. I note you didn't pitch in '68, '70, or '73. The last two were in California. Was it lack of money?"

"Yes. I felt the expense was too great."

"If I were to list the all-time top pitchers in the world, I would list Allen and Hohl as tied, Isais next, then you, and then Steinfeldt. What would your list be—not including yourself?"

Ted, Elmer, and Fernando were the greatest and I would rate them all even. However, if I had to pick one, I would give the nod to Elmer. I believe he had tougher competition to pitch against. Also, I pitched more games with Elmer and I know just how great he was."

"Who was your most dreaded opponent?"

"After I started averaging 80%, I didn't have any opponents I really dreaded. Of course, there were some who always seemed to give me trouble. Floyd Toole was one. He always gave me a good game — too good most of the time. Wilbur Kabel was another tough competitor — usually very relaxed. It's true that if there are 32 pitchers in the Championship Class, any one can beat you on a given day."

"Did you ever get butterflies before starting a

tournament?"

"Yes. Many times. I just tried to relax and concentrate on pitching ringers, hoping the butterflies would go away. I believe it helps to be a little nervous when you start your tough games — keeps you from being overconfident."

"Do you remember any particular game which

stands out above all others?"

"Do I? You bet. The 174-shoe game I had with Ted Allen in '57! I was pitching over my head. Both of us had 155 ringers for 89.08%. Late in the game, I had Ted 49-41. Then I pitched two perfect shoes, one on each side of the stake. Ted threw two. Score: 49-47. Six shoes later, I missed. Ted didn't. Score: 49-50. Out of 348 shoes pitched, only three single points were scored. This was 'The World's Greatest Horseshoe Game' at that time. There were seven new records established: 4 dead, 55 times; longest game: 174 shoes each; most ringers per pitch: 155; most combined ringers: 310; most doubles per pitcher: 69; most combined doubles: 138; and highest combined ringer average: 89%."

"You can be proud of that one, Curt. However, in digging through the *Digests*, I came up with a few other items worth mentioning. You won the Indiana State Championship 18 times, 14 of them in a row. In the '69 event, you threw 547 ringers out of 616 shoes for 88.75%; in '63 you won the Western Open with 84.4%; in '62, the Northern Indiana Open with 88.1%; and in the '65 W.T., you went 180 shoes with Harold Reno, winning 51-48 with 88.1. In '67, in the Midwest Ringer Roundup, you ended a game against Paul Focht with 56 consecutive ringers — giving you 98 ringers out of 104 shoes for a 94.2%. You then started your next game with 18 straight, a run of 74 consecutive ringers! These are pretty nice figures."

"Well, I guess they're nothing to be ashamed of."
"Curt, what brand horseshoes did you throw?"

"Guess I've tried them all but in 1963 I switched to Allen's and I've never looked back. Won three World Titles with them."

"I understand there was something special about the 1966 W.T. What was it?"

"In the first place, I was worried — not about the competition I'd be facing, but about my son, James, who was in Vietnam. The tournament was down to the last nine games. I looked up, and there sat Jimmy. No one will ever know the feelings I went through at that moment. It was as if a big cloud had lifted. The adrenalin started flowing and I felt I could beat anyone. I could — and I did — for my first World Championship." (Records show that on this night, Curt Day pitched three consecutive 90-plus percent games, the second man in history to do so.)

"I haven't asked you about your personal life but I do know you are now 71 years old, have 4 sons and 2 daughters still living, have 13 grandchildren, that you grew up playing basketball, softball, and were a good bowler. You served your country in WWII in the European Theater as a member of the 14th Armored Division and were honorably discharged. I think that about covers it except for one thing. You had to quit pitching due to some pretty bad health problems, such as having a total hip replacement in '78, the ball and stem replaced in '80, and finally, the socket replaced in 84. It's no wonder you gave up pitching. Do you think you'll ever return to competitive pitching?"

"I don't know, but if my health permits it, yes."

So ends this article on Curt Day, a man who was one of the very best, one of our legends, one who belongs with the greatest pitchers of all time. So I'll put him where he should be—among them: Allen, Hohl, Isasis, Day, Steinfeldt.

ALASKA

John Grohol, regional director for Alaska, reports that Alaska now has two clubs. The Chugiak-Eagle River Club was formed this past spring. In conjunction with the formation of a new club came the construction of Alaska's first indoor courts. Four heated indoor courts were constructed on property owned by the American Legion Post #33. Now that Alaska has someplace to play in the winter months we can look forward to some stiff competition from Alaska. They play every Tuesday evening and plan to start a new league in 1989. There are several tournaments planned for the new year, including the annual ice classic tourney, held in March and pitched on the ice.

ARIZONA

Sam and Shirley Finfrock, ARDs from Arizona, state they are doing some fine things in the high schools there. The Kofa High School has a handicap student program. The students were bussed to Kennedy Park Horseshoe Courts, where they worked with them for six weeks, giving awards and passing out NHPA literature. Also, Yuma High School has "Outdoor Sports Day" each year and Sam and Shirley hold horseshoe classes and pass out NHPA literature. They have done this for the past four years. The biggest problems they have in Arizona is having enough scorekeepers. They suggest that each horseshoe pitcher train a friend to keep score and then bring them to the courts.

Harry Perry, ARD for Mesa, Arizona, says that the Elks Club in Arizona is sponsoring horseshoe tournaments. Many of these Elk players have joined the NHPA. Bob and Louise Manning have renovated Pioneer Park courts with new-type stakes, new pits, allnew surface, new storage and new scoreboards. They have a new team in the Apache Trail League, now 19 teams play round-robins from November through March. There is a new tournament, the Monte Vista Open, under the direction of Paul and Judy Free.

ILLINOIS

She won her first tournament at the New Castle Fall Round-Up, in B Class. She averaged 15.5%. In 1984 she placed second in the Eastern Nationals, at Erie, PA. Her average for that tournament was 54.6%.

In 1984, she placed third in the PA state tournament at Ohiopyle, PA. In 1985 and 1986, **Grace** came in second in the PA state tournament. In 1987, **Grace** was unable to pitch because she had a back problem and her mother was very ill. In 1983, she placed third in the Coors Tournament of Champions at Fredrick, Maryland. - 8) Leo Wanner, 6815 Gardner Ave., Sacramento, CA 95828. Phone 916-383-5644. Leo is an assistant NHPA regional director, the NCHPA Constitution & By-Laws chairman, and gets to 30 tournaments a year.
- Don Gregson, Box 539, Crestline, CA 92325. Phone 714-338-2864 or work, 591-4861. Don is the new president of the So. California Assn. and the son of NHPA Hall of Famers Archie & Katie Gregson.

There you have what I consider a "Blue Chip" committee that will every quarter, or sooner, act upon the rules submissions from the membership. It will be their responsibility to review requests for new rules, amend or delete existing rules, interpret or clarify poor wording, and set the standards for compliance and enforcement of the published rules throughout the entire NHPA.

Any member of the NHPA, including members of this committee, can initiate a typewritten proposal for consideration. All proposals will be turned over to the chairman, who will make copies and, with his comments, mail them to all the Rules Committee. Like the NHPA Constitution, it will take a simple majority of eight to accept a new addition to the rules, but 2/3 or 10 votes to amend or delete. Printed pamphlets of the rules will be updated as the committee dictates. Support this committee. It has a lot of responsibility.

Regional Directors Continued. . .

UTAH

Bud Schardine, RD for Utah, reports that they held their meeting in December to start formulating a schedule for 1989. They had a representative from all the courts they use, also representatives from men, women and juniors from all classes of pitchers. They also reminded the pitchers that it is mandatory that you have your shirt lettered with your name, city and state in order to pitch in the World Tournament. They would also like to see more Utah pitchers wear shirts that are lettered at their regular meets.

WISCONSIN

Jim Haupt, regional director of Wisconsin, reports that there will be more sanctioned tournaments this year because of the three tournament qualifications for the World Tournament in Spearfish. In prior years, they only sanctioned their state tournament. They will explain the complimentary card program and have plans to deal with mixing 30' pitchers. Junior leagues are being introduced in a few areas, Jane Smith, ARD for Wisconsin, is active in the Junior League program and promotion.

WYOMING

In a report from Ed Archer, ARD for Wyoming, he stated there are two new clubs in Gillette, Wyoming, and in Sundance, Wyoming. They will hold the Gillette Open and the Sundance Open tournaments. He stated that Wyoming would like better communication with other surrounding states, namely South Dakota, Montana and Colorado. Possibly they could get together and hold combined tournaments.

LASS "A" . . . happy hunting ground for all new horseshoe pitchers, a goal they yearn for with shadowy realization of their chances of attaining it. What makes a CLASS "A" pitcher? Is it practice, practice, practice 'til callouses roughen the pitching hand? Answer this yourself!

You join a club, set up stakes in your back yard, participate in tournaments, pitch indoors all winter to get the jump by springtime on those who don't. By all this, have you made CLASS "A"?

It's nice to dream, and it's that dream that makes you try, and try again. And I use the word "try" advisedly, for you'd be a fool not to try - sure, I'll make it some day! CLASS "A", that is.

I'll be pitchin' before long like Clete Chapelle did, an Oregonian, master of a beautiful high shoe that most always found the stake. Clete was Ted Allen's opponent in the greatest game of Ted's life when in the 1951 World Tournament he set a still-unbroken record of 72 consecutive ringers for a game percentage of 97 while Clete countered with a strong 82.6. Mrs. Chapelle, in answer to my question at a game in Laurelhurst Park in Portland some years ago, said, "Yes, I saw that game. I was there hanging on the fence."

If I could just land 'em in there on the stake most all the time like those fellows I'd be happy — I'll keep practicing!

Really, guys and gals, if you'd only use practical reasoning and good sense, you'd see that just practice can't be the answer. Did Walter Ray Williams Jr., at age 11, practice and practice 'til he got to 90 percent? Of course not! He didn't have enough years back of him to have done that.

Some pitchers are born with a natural aptitude for pitching ringers-great is great from the start proper genes give the intuitive spark whether you're pitching horseshoes or baseballs.

I will digress here from horseshoe pitching to baseball pitching (there is a similarity) to state briefly the record and viewpoint of a worldfamous baseball player, Carl Hubbel. Carl (recently deceased), lived in Mesa, Arizona, and most every year attended the Valley of the Sun tournament there, where he sat as an interested spectator. I interviewed him a few years ago, and surely, he was reluctant to report on his boastworthy pitching days. Carl, the New York Giants all-time greatest pitcher; was said to have had the best control of any pitcher in the first century of baseball.

In 1933 Carl pitched 10 shutouts and hurled 46 consecutive scoreless innings — about equal to pitching 5 consecutive perfect games in horseshoes. In one 18-inning shutout he didn't walk a single hitter, so superb was his control.

Did Carl achieve his greatness by practice until he was blue in the face? No! He did pitch in high school, followed by five years in the minor leagues, then for three years signed to Detroit, where he didn't pitch one game, not even in exhibition. "That skinny kid can't pitch," lamented Detroit's coach. In spite of this inauspicious showing, John McGraw of the New York Giants bought his contract and from then on Carl pitched his regular position, setting records until retirement. And in doing so, made fools of his skeptics.

One particular remark from Carl impressed me and set me thinking: "Pitching control came natural to me," he emphasized, "I didn't have to work hard to achieve it."

This point is what I have been hinting at re horseshoe pitching. Some of you enjoy the good graces of having been born with impressive pitching ability. Special God-given genes set the pace, determine the outcome of a pitcher's success; determine whether or not the gate to CLASS "A" will open to him.

So, regardless of known facts about the rareness of those blissful honors bestowed on but a few pitchers by certain scarce specialized genes, genes sparingly distributed to horseshoe pitchers, a placement somehow made at random by the Creator; yes, regardless — pitchers shun from thought the great odds against them by this predetermined phenomenon beyond their control and show up on courts in great numbers to pitch for the joy of it, for fellowship with comrades of like ability, all pitching the best they can according to their special allotment of genes whether it be CLASS "A" performance or other placement along the alphabetical classification.

VEGAS DRAWS RECORD TURNOUT

by Dave Loucks

The sixth Las Vegas tournament held indoors at the Hacienda Resort Hotel and Casino paid some big prize money to those who came to enjoy the annual event, which was played on modified portable courts with new palladium turf. The bounce of the previous year's hard rubber surface was all but eliminated on the new turf covering. It took some adjustment to your game, but once the shoe was working right, most ringers stayed. On the whole, pitchers reported the new surface to be much improved over previous years and the percentages seemed to bear this out.

The December, 1988, event saw a record turnout, with 324 entries signed up representing 37 states and Canada. There were only a total of 8 dropouts in the nine 36-person classes which left 19 of the 27 twelve-person groups intact. This year, the 30-foot pitchers were separated into their own two classes, which seemed to meet with the

approval of most pitchers.

When it was all finished, 162 pitchers took home a total of \$21,240 in prize money. The top two finishers in the tournament were Loree Meier of Missouri, who won the 30-foot Class A, and Rich Pintor, from Colorado, who won the 40-foot Class A Championship. As before, the prize money in each class was the same which meant that the lower-class pitchers won as much as the top pitchers. All games were 40-shoe cancellation, Dutch Handicap, which is a 2/3 handicap. Each class of 36 had an eight-person ladder finals with positions 9-18 in each getting \$50.00. Final results do not include statistics for ladder play.


