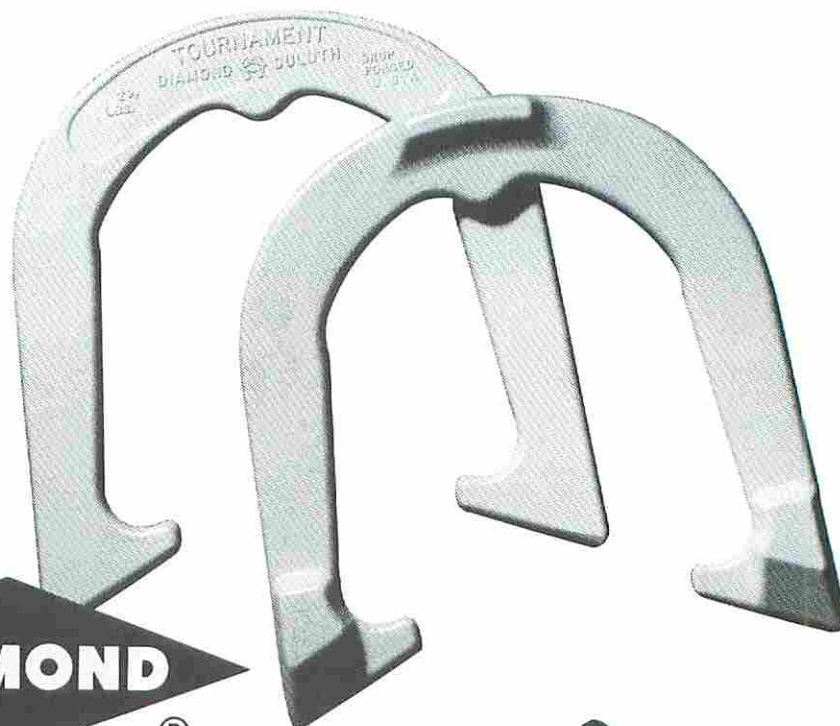

President's Message

We have received two written bids for the 1991 World Tournament. Each will be presented to the delegates in detail at the Spearfish convention.

In brief, the Douglas, Wyoming Area Chamber of Commerce and the State Fair have submitted a bid deposit to cover their offer of \$40,000 to bring the 1991 event to Douglas. They indicate a plan to install 36 permanent courts on the Fairgrounds which adjoin the North Platte River. No stranger to hosting large events, Douglas has been the site of the National High School Rodeo Finals and they are excited about the possibility of welcoming the NHPA to their Wyoming community.

Also submitting a deposit to cover a \$40,000 bid is a joint effort of the Mississippi State Horseshoe Pitchers Association and the Mississippi Coast Coliseum and Convention Center. Located in Biloxi on the beautiful Mississippi Gulf Coast, the proposal is for 32 indoor courts in the air conditioned complex of the coliseum. With the white sandy beaches of the gulf just a few hundred yards away, the NHPA is invited to share in some sincere "Southern Hospitality."

Dear Dan,

I have received your letter concerning the 1989 Kuchcinski Classic. I have other commitments that week and will be unable to attend. Noting that all participants must join the RUJA, I would ask who are the officers of your association? I see no names other than your own. Do you have a published Constitution and By-Laws? Are your rules in print for distribution to all members? Probably the biggest question is why another horseshoe association? You seem very proud of the fact you are a 3 time World Champion. You even printed it on your letterhead. Without the NHPA, would you be able to claim those titles? I think not. Neither would I be able to claim my 10 World Championship titles, of which I am also proud. Without the NHPA, no one would have ever heard of Dan Kuchcinski or Vicki Winston.

Just browsing through your material, I can see nothing new that isn't already being done through the NHPA, with the exception of the word professional.

The NHPA is a governing body of amateur pitchers, similar to what the ABC and WIBC do for bowling. As with other sports, an organization should not dabble in both amateur and professional activities. There is a need for a professional organization if big money tournaments and a pro-tour could someday be possible. There is not a need for two separate amateur organizations. It would be best if an amateur and a pro group were compatible and followed the same basic rules. I see you choose to allow 7" for close shoes. I know of no 7" measuring device, and as brands of horseshoes vary in width and are allowed up to 7¼", this distance seems hard to measure accurately using your method of measuring with a horseshoe.

You have mentioned leagues. The NHPA League Programs have been in existence for over 10 years. There are men's, women's, mixed, junior, scratch, handicap, singles, doubles, team, etc., complete with awards and patches for various achievements. The NHPA Junior Scholar Award is coveted by the younger set and Missouri was privileged to have the winner a couple of years ago. This fall he enters Harvard, after turning down an all expenses paid education at another university. Although our young man was an excellent pitcher, this award is given based on scholastic ability. Any junior league member is eligible, regardless of pitching average.

The thought of big money will attract some. Actually, very few persons in the world would have the ability to win it. It takes no genius to figure out that your prize fund is only the total of 504 registrations, at \$100 each, minus a few dollars. The pitchers are paying for all of it. Incidentally, yours is not the "Richest Horseshoe Pitching Tournament" ever held. The prize list for the 1988 World Tournament totaled over \$52,000. With the addition of a corporate sponsor, 1989 should be even higher.

Count-all, accumulative scoring and bonus points have been a part of events sanctioned by the NHPA for many years. The 20 shoe system which you plan to use, was devised by Walter Ray Williams, Jr. and has been used at certain NHPA sanctioned tournaments for the past few years. All of these systems must have merit if others are wanting to copy them. You know, after reviewing these few items of information for you, it sure makes me proud to say I've been a member of such a progressive organization since 1953.

If I am in error in any part of this letter, I stand to be corrected.

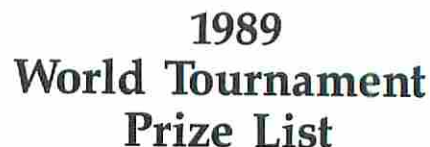

RULES

After careful deliberation we have made the following decisions.

Rule 6 Sec. D - This rule has been discussed many times but there is never enough support to change it. The wording will be changed slightly but there will be no change in the application. It will read:

In delivering a shoe, the pitcher must remain on the pitchers platform and behind the foul line until the shoe has left his/her hand.

This means that a pitcher can still follow through over the foul line *after* the shoe is released.

Page 1 Sec. A the second paragraph. We will retain the warning. The wording will be changed slightly, but there will be no change in its application. The second paragraph will now read:

All fouls (stepping out of the platform or over the foul line while delivering a shoe) shall be called by the referee. A warning shall be given on the first offense and any subsequent offense shall be penalized by removing the shoe from play for that inning.

Rule 4 Sec. E has been changed. It shall now read:

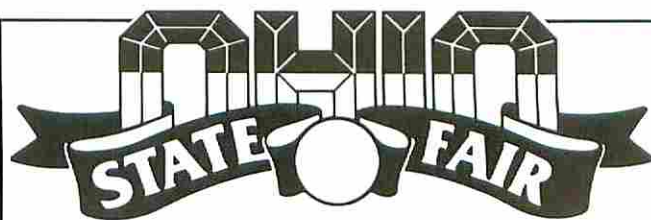
The material in the pit shall be watered (if necessary) and leveled by the contestants before a game begins. (Contestants may have someone do this job for them). During a contest, contestants cannot mash or move the material around the stake and the material cannot be shoveled unless approved by a referee. The only exception to this rule is for courts with sand or sandy loam material. They may be leveled, as needed, throughout the course of a contest.

Sand and sandy loam material is easily displaced and a large hole can quickly form around the peg, so leveling, when necessary, will be allowed. This change will go into effect immediately.

One note concerning these rulings— we often get complaints at the World Tournament about fouls not being called on a consistent basis and differences in court maintenance. The rules very clearly state what the accepted procedures are. In order for them to be properly enforced at the World Tournament with a minimum of confusion, we need to practice the same enforcement in our local tournaments throughout our organization. We urge each charter officer and tournament official to enforce these rules. If they are done right at home, we will have fewer problems at the World Tournament.

A poll is being taken to determine how the NHPA charters are dealing with having to mix classes (both sex and distance) because of not enough entries in a particular class. Right now, the main objective is to make sure that everyone gets to participate. We will make legislation on this issue (if necessary) after the results are in. We are also still deliberating on Section G of page 1 regarding the settling of ties. We know this is a sticky issue in some cases because of time and court availability factors.

Thank you for your correspondence and interest. We have some more ideas and suggestions for changes, etc. They will be presented in the next report.

Reader Forum

Sirs,

We wish to respond to Barry Chappelle's comments regarding mixed pitching in sanctioned tournaments. Namely, 30 foot pitchers with 40 footers. He states that those who oppose this arrangement are either *selfish* or *chauvinistic*.

I am surprised that a person in his position would use the word "Chauvinism" so loosely. This French word has evolved in our society to mean a person who thinks women are inferior. Barry must think women do not have the eye-hand coordination men are blessed with. Therefore, he desires a massive Affirmative Action program to reinforce his belief. We pitchers who oppose 30 foot pitching think our ladies can be competitive at 40 feet.

Ladies are going to remain second class citizens in the horseshoe pitching world as long as they remain at 30 feet. This is a travesty of their ability. They should demand, and lobby the NHPA to phase out 30 foot pitching, possibly over a period of time. Get a good pair of pitching shoes and perfect a 1 3/4 or 1 1/4 turn from 40 feet. I'd bet the farm that in a few years some of them will be competing for a World Championship against men.

Our charter first encountered the 30 foot problem about three years ago. An adjoining state had a World Champion 70+, 30 foot pitcher. Since he had caused a great deal of dissension in his home club and was feeling not wanted, he started entering our tournaments. At first, we were the kind, compassionate host. Our position soon changed when our players started complaining. We observed that the NHPA solved their dilemma when the 70+ players complained by creating only 70+, 30 foot classes. We do not have that luxury of numbers. Our players are not selfish, but think all adults should compete on equal terms. A percentage based on 30 feet is not the same as one based on 40 feet. Our position is very simple...If an adult wants to pitch horseshoes, get a good pair of shoes and go to it at 40 feet.

Girls, nationally, use a smaller

basketball than boys. Here in Tennessee at the high school level, if a girl plays in a boys golf tournament, she uses the same tee as boys. Are these boys and rule-makers chauvinistic?

We resent Barry's indictment and may add that this country is in trouble with the liberal mind set of *Affirmative Action* and *Quotas*. We place the 30 foot question in the same ball park.

Rebuttal - Barry Chappelle

I am glad that Mr. Bastian spoke his beliefs and that Dave Loucks printed his letter. Although I do not agree with his stand, the point is that we all love the sport of horseshoes and if we have ideas we think will better the sport, then we should speak up. With that in mind, I will make comments on some of the points in Mr. Bastian's letter.

First of all, in terms of hand-eye coordination, women are probably equal to, if not more adept, than men. My sister is a ten-time World Champion in our sport and one of the finest natural athletes I have ever seen. My daughter can type over 100 words a minute. Few people can do this, and most of them are women. But it is my feeling that the coordination issue is not the point. The real issue at point is the physiological difference between the male and female body and also the physiological difference between a male in his "prime" years and a male who is 70+ years of age. I know that there are many 70+ men who are still very sound and healthy in body and choose to compete at 40 feet, but it is also true that many 70+ gentlemen have lost some strength and coordination and can no longer compete as they once did. However, they still want to compete. The rule now says that a 70+ man can compete anywhere from 30-40 feet, just as a woman or junior can. It was passed at an NHPA convention by a vote of NHPA delegates - peers of Mr. Bastian and myself. As chairman of the

NHPA Rules Committee I am not trying to reinforce my beliefs. What I am trying to do is stand up for the rights of our NHPA members who have a right to compete at a distance less than 40 feet, whether they be juniors, women or 70+ men. The poll I sent out to each charter was to find out what methods are being used to allow equal participation for all NHPA members, knowing that most "local" tournaments do not have enough women, junior, and 70+ 30 foot participants to form their own classes. The poll is about 70% complete. Some charters said they have some complaints but that they allow "mixed" pitching for the good of our sport (so that everyone can play). Many said that mixing groups has caused few or no problems. Only two charters (of those reported) have refused participation to some members, and one of them is now looking into changing their ways.

To get back to the physiological argument regarding the difference between the male and female body, I cannot think of one competitive sport where a female can compete evenly with a male. That is not a put-down of the female, it is just the plain and simple truth. Males are physically stronger, they can jump higher, run faster, throw farther, etc... The true travesty of their ability would come about if females were forced to pitch 40 feet and a mixed World Tournament was held. It is quite likely that Mr. Bastian would lose his farm. Our forefathers in this sport saw this inequity many years ago and compensated for it by allowing women to pitch 30 feet.

The statement about a % based on 30 feet is not the same as one based on 40 feet is false. People argue, and maybe correctly, that a 40 foot pitcher will lose more ringers than a 30 foot pitcher, but ringer percentage is figured on shoes that stay on, not shoes that come off or weren't on in the first place. Given proper conditions, a game between two pitchers of the same percentage is essentially an even game, regardless of age, sex or distance.

Finally, according to Webster, a chauvinist is one who expresses excessive or blind partiality to an idea or cause. NHPA rules, and my argument in this case, take into account the physiological differences of juniors, women and older gentlemen and try to get them to be as

nearly equal as possible with the "normal" adult male. It is my argument that to not take into account and recognize these differences is selfish and chauvinistic.

Dear Dave,

Upon reading the "Rules" report in the April issue (p. 8), I put together a logical argument that should support "Mixed Pitching". I've convinced several persons with this argument. Perhaps if the attached article is published prior to the 1989 Convention, we can convince opponents of mixed pitching that it is a *fair* thing to do.

Mixed Pitching

There has been some reluctance in certain quarters and of some NHPA members to accept mixed pitching. In talking to several persons against this issue, I find that their position is due to a misunderstanding and the mixing of factors involved.

This issue involves two factors—a *performance* factor and a *mechanical advantage* factor.

For mixed pitching, the *performance* factor is the *only* factor to consider for *fairness*. Regardless of distance, the lady, the man or the youth has competed and practiced their game at their distance to establish a performance index, that we call ringer percentage. The fact that it may be easier to pitch a shorter distance is irrelevant, as long as the percentage is an honest index of that persons ability at that time.

The *mechanical advantage* factor is common to all events where alignment of delivery-point and target is coupled with distance. As the delivery departs from perfect alignment, the projectile (horseshoe, ball, bullet, etc.) will have a greater displacement from the target as the distance from delivery to target is increased.

Thus, the same archer will have a better score at 25 yards than at 40 yards; the same marksman will have less lateral displacement at 100 yards than at 150 yards; a basketball player will prefer to take a shot from inside the key instead of outside the key; a golf shot of 150 yards may remain in the fairway, but a 250 yard drive on the same line may be deep in the rough, and so forth.

A person who pitches 55% average at 30 feet probably established this average with games between 40%

ringers and 70% ringers and tournaments between 50 and 60% average. The same is true of a 55%, 40 foot pitcher. Thus when they pitch against each other it is anyone's game based on *performance*. The difference in distance is "incorporated" in their ringer percentages.

Dear Dave,

Add my voice to those who are enthused, both by *Newsline* and by what is happening in the NHPA. A lot of news and food for thought in the April issue, and I would like to make several observations on items in it. (Page numbers refer to the April issue).

One of the advantages to the old *News Digest* was knowing that the State Tournaments results always appeared in the November and December issues. So it was a matter of 10 minutes or so for me to find, in the December 1982 issue, that Stan Smith of Del Rio won the 1982 Texas Mens' title with a percentage of 65.1. Bob Champion might relay that info to the curious Arlington Ironbenders (p. 15).

It took me longer to find the letter I sent to Donnie Roberts on Sept. 19, 1982 seeking recognition of the World Record set by Linda Pateneau and Debby Michaud (pg. 14). The delegates at the 1982 convention voted new rules to recognize world records, but apparently no one ever followed through on the policy. Perhaps it is now time for the Council to implement that policy.

Bev Born asked for opinions on two cards in the Sanctioned Club/League program (p. 19). I was always of a mind that eventually there should only be the one, full-membership card. After 11 years it would seem to be time to make that change. The two pages of Sanctioned Club news got me to thinking how the program has grown since I turned it over to Doc Dougherty, and now Bev Born. They did/are doing things with the League program that I could hardly conceive of doing when starting it 11 years ago. There were no West Coast clubs in the program when I gave it up; now there are several. But I see that some of the original clubs are still in the program, so we must have done some-

thing right.

The excerpt of letters commending *Newsline* set me thinking about the *News Digest*. Ellis Cobb without doubt did everything possible with the assets available to him. *Newsline* looks good and is certainly easier to read (as I discovered when researching the Texas question). But I think that in the *News Digest* we had more opportunity to develop our writing skills when we wrote about tournaments.

Barry Chappelle's committee is exploring changing the rule about stepping over the line with the trailing foot (p. 8). Aside from the fact that I was one who did that on occasion when my timing was shot, it raises the possibility of inadvertent fouls being called when pitching last; many a time both pitchers are well on their way to the other stake before the fourth shoe lands. I can't see any good reason to change this innocuous practice. I have heard arguments that cite bowling's rules; bear in mind that bowlers don't walk to the other end of the alley. Baseball pitchers can take more than one step from the rubber too, for that matter.

Keep up the good work.

Regional Director's Report

Bob Walters, Regional Director for **Iowa** reports that an all out effort of the Eldorado Horseshoe Club of Central Iowa and the Hardin County Fair Board is under way to build the "Putt Mossman Indoor Arena" on the Harding County Fairgrounds. If their drive is successful construction will start this spring. The building when completed will be used for the County Fair, 4-H, family and community groups, horseshoe tournaments and league play. Putt Mossman, a long time horseshoe pitcher, was a native of Harding County. The Eldorado Horseshoe Club is offering a life-time membership to players for \$100.00 in order to get the fund started. They are selling advertising in blocks as in ball parks on walls to get revenue. Horseshoes is on the rise in Iowa.

Les Burroughs, Regional Director for **Southern California, Eastern Sierra and Hawaii**, states Rodney Nahina, Assistant Regional Director for Hawaii has 140 full NHPA members. They hold a monthly meeting in the public library and conduct their meetings according to the Roberts Rules of Order. They are in the process of electing new officers for the year. Hawaii conducts several tournaments a year, some for charitable organizations as well as community projects. They are now waiting for final approval by the State Department for a facility with 32 courts, fenced in area and facilities to accomodate everyone.

Donna Wyrill, Assistant Regional Director for **Southern California, San Diego** area tells about having eleven Balboa Park Club members participate in the First Annual Horseshoe Challenge tournament with the proceeds going to the Children's Hospital and Health Center of San Diego. They were also well represented at the annual Blind Draw Doubles Tournament held at the Eastern San Diego County Junior Fair. The proceeds from this horseshoe tournament go to support the Eastern County Junior Fair in

Lakeside, California. You can pitch horseshoes most every week-end at Balboa Park, either league play or sanctioned tournaments.

Norm Rousey, is the new Regional Director for **Alaska**, replacing John Grohol. John had to resign because of a change in his working hours and days off in the middle of the week. John has been Regional Director for many years and has done much for horseshoes in Alaska. Norm, a Class A pitcher in Alaska, has been pitching horseshoes since he was 15 years old and competed for the first time in a World Tournament in Pleasanton, finishing seventh in Class A, averaging 61.1%. Norm has some big shoes to fill, but with the cooperation of all the pitchers in Alaska, he will do a fine job.

Earl Van Sant, Regional Director for **Ohio**, states that Ohio membership led all NHPA charters in total membership for the year 1988, but they are still not satisfied as they do not have all that play belonging to the NHPA. They have several new clubs starting in 1989 and they hope this will help. It is impossible to get to all the tournaments sanctioned even in your own district. Earl's goal is to get all clubs to play under sanction approval and have all members hold NHPA cards. Ohio publishes a book, showing all the 1989 tournaments to be held, location of the courts, whom to contact, league information, as well as league results and averages. This book is presented to every player attending the 7th Annual Tournament at the indoor courts in Newbury, Ohio. There will be 44 sanctioned NHPA tournaments in Ohio for the year 1989.

Rick Rebman, Regional Director for **Idaho, Oregon and Washington**, reports that according to Warren Stutzman, Secretary for Idaho, the 1989 pitching season will get underway the first part of May. They will hold 10 sanction tournaments this year. Idaho has elected their new officers as well as reappointing their statistician. Twin Falls was selected

as the sight for the 1989 State Tournament and will be held August 26-27, one week prior to the Labor Day weekend.

Sue Johnson, Regional Director for **Arizona**, reports through Secretary Ester Williams, that again the AHPA had a very lively season. They held six tournaments with approximately 750 pitchers. As usual, the pitchers were from the West, Mid-West, North and East as well as their own Arizona members. The Valley of the Sun drew the most pitchers, with about 200 entries. The Pioneer Park horseshoe courts were renovated last summer and in spite of a few problems, most pitchers like the new courts. The AHPA executive board wishes to thank all the people that helped make the tournament a success: the scorekeepers, judges, clerks, and especially the ones who helped put out the scoreboards, chairs and other items necessary to get things going.

John Loughery, Regional Director of **New York**, states that the newly elected president presided over the delegates Spring meeting held on April 8th in Holland Patent, New York. Among the proposals passed by the delegates were: all pitchers participating in the State Tournament are required to wear shirts with their name and city or town imprinted thereon; the Men's championship class for the State Tournament will be an eight man double round robin, with the present State Champ seeded #1. Pitchers will have to pitch in two New York tournaments to qualify for the State Championship Tournament, this will become effective in 1990, no league averages will be accepted. Effective with the 1990 elections, mailed-written ballots will be used for the first time for State elections. The 1989 New York State Tournament will be held at the Canton Sportsman Club, Canton, New York, over Labor Day weekend. This will be the first indoor State tournament New York has ever held.

Charles M. Bunner

Charles has been instrumental in making Fairmont and Marion counties the horseshoe pitching capitals of his state. He has coordinated the construction of permanent courts in Worthington, East Marion Recreational, Bunner Ridge parks and the Marion County YMCA, along with three portables for inside play at the YMCA.

Having served in the U.S. Army from August 1954 till September 1974, retiring as a Master Sergeant E8, during which time he received many military-related awards, some of which were the Bronze Star for meritorious service, Army Commendation Medal with three oak leaf clusters and Vietnam Service Medal with four Bronze Stars. In 1979 during Vietnam Veteran's Week, Charles received "The President of the United States of America Outstanding Community Achievement Award".

Employed with the Fairmont, West Virginia Post Office since August of 1975 and involved with organized horseshoes since 1977 when he and fifteen others formed the first club in Marion County. This club became a part of the sanctioned CL/LG program in May of 1982, with Charles as their League Director. This year will make his eighth year in this position, showing his dedication and support to the club's members, the sanction program and the NHPA, always with timely and excellent filing of all reports.

Charles has even had the song "Shoes of Steel" copyrighted. A ballad involving a novice pitcher competing against a champion.

With committed people such as Charles, the sport of horseshoes can only see growth and improvement in it's future on the local, state and national levels.

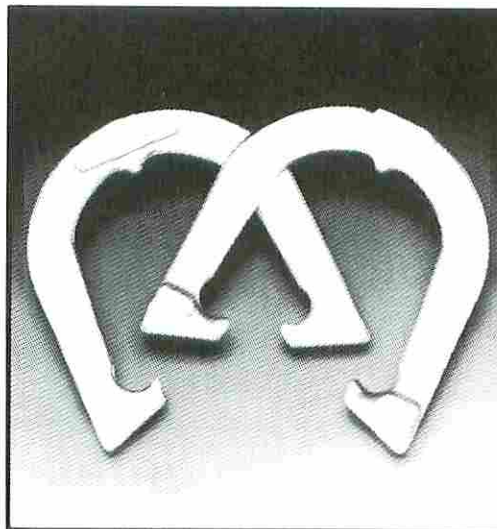

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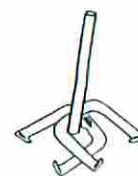

CALIFORNIA

Chuck Seal decided that his town, Reedley, California needed horseshoe pitching facilities. He started to beat the boards for interest and money...his goal was enough money to build one or two courts. The Kiwanis put up \$150 to build the first court and the Lions and Elks donated another \$150. Then a generous gift from a group of retired employees of the phone company, The Independent Telephone Pioneers Association, came up with \$1,000 more that enabled the group to construct nine more. They are off and running...I'll bet the retired employees will form a league before too long. The courts were built in C.F. Miller Park, complete with all the necessary facilities for a complete operation. They have planned four tournaments to date.

COLORADO

The Colorado Association Hall of Fame building, a 10x40 foot mobile home, is located in Boulder at the entrance of the San Lázaro Mobile Home Park. The walls have been drywalled, the hardwood floors are almost completed and by June the committee hopes to begin displaying memorabilia.

To date 33 have signed up for the World and we expect many more before the June 1 deadline.

In computer figures just released, State Champion Rich Pintor topped all averages with 68.3 in eight tournaments. Former State Champion Paul LaCrosse closed with 60.3, Jerry Comstock 59.6, Jim Tulk 58.4, Floyd Holmes 54.5, Don Schneck 53.6, Kent Anderson 53.3 and Robert Engel 51.2.

INDIANA

Horseshoe pitchers in Indiana will be busy again with 29 scheduled sanctioned tournaments beginning in April and closing with the Annual State Tournament.

The end of the year percentages elevate Karl Van Sant to the top with 75.1. Former World Champion Mark Seibold had 74.8, Clarence Bellman 71.4, Dale

Henry 70.4 and Chuck Grothe 67.9 to round out the first five.

Sue Snyder's 79.4 was high for the women followed by Bonnie Seibold 70.7, Ruth Ory 66.4, Martha Chanley 58 and Amy Tipton 57.7.

The Corydon Club has outdoor courts where they pitch over a little spring-fed creek. The water is cool and there is shade which makes for very good pitching during hot weather. They built bridges to walk across but a spring flash flood gave them a job to replace the walkway before resuming action.

IOWA

Horseshoe pitchers in Iowa have been working on the "Putt" Mossman Indoor Arena, a 12-court facility which will be the largest indoor arena in the state. The building will be called the Hardin County Fair Exhibit Hall and Putt Mossman Indoor Horseshoe Arena.

Mossman, a Hardin County native now living in Arizona, won the World's Men's Championship in 1924 and 1925.

If the drive for money was successful they will begin construction soon. They are offering pitchers a lifetime charter membership for \$100 and are looking for 125 members. They are also selling advertising in blocks in ball parks on walls to raise money. Plans were to complete the fund drive by May 1. Estimated cost of the new facility was \$60,000. \$12,000 was the goal for horseshoe pitching donations.

Bowling and horseshoes do mix. Tom Smock and Jim DeLong came in first in the Iowa State Amvets Bowling Tournament.

KENTUCKY

Kentucky has 18 scheduled tournaments, 14 clubs and a total of 260 sanctioned members. Approximately 40% of the total membership pitch in each of their tournaments. There are four clubs who pitch at least one night per week during the winter.

Seventeen pitchers have been inducted into the State Hall of Fame in the three years of its existence. 1986 - Elmer Webb, Wilder; James Johnson, Cincinnati, Ohio; Bill Benn, Bellevue; Christine Kelly, Lexington; Harry Henn, Cold Spring. 1987 - Danny Webb, Alexandria; Don Moore, Bellevue; Ezra Sanders, Millville; Omar Blacketer, Louisville; Norma Johnson, Frankfort. 1988 - Joe and Lillian Minnich, Shelbyville; Jake Jacobs, Millville; Bob and Jane Simpson, Nicholasville; and Vern Hawkins, Burlington.

MAINE

One of the 1989 NHPA membership report forms dated March 5 from the State of Maine lists the following card holder: George Bush, Kennebunk Village, Kennebunk, Maine....The President's card number is 8321.

MINNESOTA

Horseshoes as an Olympic sport? It's true. Horseshoes will be one of the more than forty sports and competitions that will be a part of the Star of the North State games June 16 through 25. The horseshoe competition will be hosted by the Bloomington Horseshoe Club at the Valley View Courts June 17 and 18 in place of the normally held Valley View Open this year only.

There will be classes for men, women, juniors and seniors providing there are enough entries to fill an eight person class. TV coverage from some of the local cable stations will be available.

NEW JERSEY

The State's busy 31 tournament schedule covers seven months from April through September.

Art Tyson went 7-0 to win the January Super Bowl Tournament beating Bill MacIntyre in the final game, 35-10. In February's George Washington Tournament, also at Pottersville, MacIntyre defeated John Forti in the finals.

There are 110 courts available in the state headed by the 24-court layout at Middlesex. John Gitonne Park in Cumberland has 16 courts, Branchbrook Park in Essex has 12.

OHIO

Elden Sarbaugh of Adamsville posted a 6-1 record, 75.3% to win the Indoor Ohio State Championship held in April at Hickory Lake Inn, Newbury. Oscar Manns of Painesville pitched the high ringer percentage game, tossing 33 ringers out of 36 shoes for 91.6%.

Shirley Spiesman, also of Painesville, posted a 6-0 record and 66.7% to win the ladies division.

In March, Manns had a 7-0, 71.4% to win the Hickory Lake 7th Annual Open. Former World Champion Walter Ray Williams, Jr. tossed 39 ringers in 40 shoes for the tournament's high game of 97.5%.

Approximately \$3100 was given out in prize money earned by area clubs by selling tickets and ads in a book prepared annually which lists local tournaments, club information, advertising, etc.

OKLAHOMA

At the Spring State Meeting April 1, two horseshoe pitchers were inducted into the Oklahoma Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame. They were Janet Walrod of Yukon and the late Loy Ross of Tulsa, both for pitching excellence.

In the last 15 years Janet has won the State title 10 times and has been runner-up four times. She is the first lady inducted into the Hall of Fame.

Ross was a perennial contender for the men's State Championship in the 1940s and 1950s. He won six championships, 1948 and from 1951 thru 1955. He then moved to Missouri.

OREGON

Ben Weidrich and Bob West tied for first place in the March Wren Winter Tournament. Both at 5-1 records, with Ben finishing with a 69.6%, Bob with 69.3. Lowell Davis was third with 4-2, 65.0. Sam Williams copped the Class B title with 6-1, 40.8.

After the State Winter meeting of the OHPA several members departed for the nearest bowling lanes to roll a few. Phil Tyler had two 200 plus games, Jerry Gorton nailed a 222 and Doug Spillum had a 220.

TEXAS

From March through November the Texas Horseshoe Pitchers Association has scheduled 23 tournaments, 13 of them sanctioned. Shorty Fry is the president of the Association. Geri Macha is the secretary.

Officers for the Marble Falls Highland Lakes organization are as follows: Lewis Crowell, president and secretary; Russ Dyer, vice president and Donald Wendler, Tournament Director and treasurer.

Area Texan winners in February were Ray Sander and Ben Seeker, Washington County; Brenda and B.J. Engelhardt, Fort Bend County.

WASHINGTON

Summer League play in Spokane began early in May with the 7pm Wednesday play continuing through August 30.

Results of the Winetrout III at Everett are as follows: Peter Clark (A) 6-2, 64.2; Dave Barnes (B) 6-1, 44.29; Dan Leary (C) 6-0 47.52; Mac Huson (D) 6-0, 37.5; Mike Ordos (E) 2-4, 29.58.

Winetrout IV--Art Sperber (A) 6-1, 63.21; Les Spilseth (B) 6-0, 52.08; Dave Barnes (C) 7-0, 48.57; Len-ny Richards (D) 6-0, 30.42.

Winetrout V--Peter Clark (A) 8-0, 72.5; Earl Kuper (B) 7-0, 40.83; George Richards (C) 6-1, 35.2; Mike Ordos (D) 5-1, 28.33.

WEST VIRGINIA

Betty Bell, 7-0, 69.2% won the women's title. Carol Fortner was second with 5-2, 58.1. Brian Rice won the boy's title, going 5-0, 39.2%.

Parkersburg is planning to roof their facility before the State Tournament is held there. Huntington has completed their brand new NHPA sanctioned courts and held their grand opening in May.

Eighteen tournaments are scheduled for the state in 1989.

The Tri-County Horseshoe Club of Fairmont held an NHPA sanctioned tournament late in May. The tournament was sponsored by the Central Coca-Cola Bottling Company - \$2,000 plus trophies. Charles Brunner was the Tournament Director.

WYOMING

Fifty-six hardy souls braved the cold building to compete in the Sundance Open Winter Tournament in January. Several South Dakota pitchers crossed the border to compete. The Class A winner was Carl Ness, from the state scheduled to hold the World Tournament this year.

Many Wyoming and South Dakota pitchers are gearing up for the World. Wyoming hopes to send about 100, and South Dakota will be well represented, as the host state.

Pitching's Future

Our Junior girls and boys have received extremely little publicity for their efforts. We know very little about them...their thoughts...their hopes. I decided to find out.

The Junior Girls

Alana Johnston, a 17-year-old 12th grade student from Quesnel, British Columbia, plans to participate in the '89 Junior Girls W.T. event. Alana, who finished second behind 4-times World Champion Debbie Bestul in '88, has been an NHPA member for 5 years, plays in a sanctioned league, throws a flip using Diamond ringer shoes, and is currently averaging 58%. She is the '88 British Columbia and Canadian Champion and loves swimming, bowling and baseball. Her favorite subject is computers and she plans a career in Business and Hotel Management. She believes she has a good chance to win the '89 Junior Girls World Championship. The game she remembers most? The one for the World Championship against Debbie Bestul in the '88 W.T. She lost 41-32.

Julia Walters, age 12, Troy, Ohio, grade 6, throws a 3/4 turn and uses Diamond Tournament shoes. An NHPA member for 4 years, she pitches in a sanctioned league and manages to participate in about 10 tournaments each year. In one year ('88), Julia won the Ohio Ringer Classic, the Ohio State Tournament, and placed 3rd in the W.T. (Not too bad for an 11-year-old.) Her hobbies are ice skating, bowling, swimming and basketball. Her most memorable game was in the 'Bucky Walter' tournament (named after her grandfather) when she beat brother John by tossing a 60.2 game. She shyly admits she hasn't beaten him since. (Although Julia didn't mention it, she was the one who upset Debbie Bestul in the '88 W.T. with a 60.2 gem and a 42-28 win which threw the championship into a playoff. Neither did she point out that she lost one game by only 1 point...and if she hadn't lost that one she'd have been in the playoff...and who knows what might have been?) Julia practices at 'Grandpa's' courts. Her favorite subject is Math and when asked if she had chosen a career, she replied, "Hey, I'm only 12!"

Jennie Walters, 16, 10th grade, is a sister to Julia. She averages 45%, up from the 5% of four years ago. A 5-year NHPA member, she throws a 1 1/4 and uses Deadeye NT's. She practices at Grandpa Walters, reads the *NEWSLINE* there, averages about 10 tournaments a year and pitches in 3-4 states other than Ohio. Jennie's trophies include the Ohio Ringer Classic in '85 and '86, the Ohio State Championship in '87 with a 38.6%, and the '88 North Carolina Dogwood Festival with 45.5. Her favorite subject is Algebra and she plans on being a veterinarian. The one game she remembers most vividly is one against her brother Jim when she pitched 50%...but did not win. *I really wanted to beat him.* (What is this thing about sisters wanting to beat their brothers?)

Celeste Polak, 13, a 7th grader from Wharton, Texas finished 5th in the '88 W.T. with a very credible 42.9% ringer average. Celeste throws a 1 1/4, uses Deadeyes, is presently averaging 45%, and pitches in 12-15 tournaments per year. Her tournament wins include the Texas State Championship in '87 (32.0%), in '88 (40%), the Shamrock Open (52.5%), and the Scholarship Tournament (48%). Her favorite subject is Science and she is presently leaning toward astronomy or being a science teacher. Her hobbies? Listening to the radio (her favorite rock group is 'Poison' and her favorite song is by 'Guns n' Roses'), reading, playing basketball and belonging to her 4-H group. Her most remembered game? The one against Julia Walters in the '88 event. "Here I was pitching 43.2% against an 11-year-old who just kept poppin' ringers." (Records show Julia threw 62.4%).

I asked each of the four specific questions. Here are their composite answers.

What do you like best about going to a World Tournament?

Seeing old friends, new sights, and competing against other good pitchers.

When adult women get together, they often discuss the great women pitchers...Winston, Negaard, Michaud, McLachlin, etc. What do you girls talk about?

Sightseeing we've done, our hometown, our state, Debbie Bestul, school teachers, and sometimes boys.

Who do you think has the best chance to win the '89 Junior Girls title?

Each of us would like to be the one but any one could win. Last year our averages ran 42.9-49.6...and that makes it too close to call.

Who do you think was the greatest Junior girl pitcher?
Debbie Bestul...because she is the only one who won it 4 times.

How often do you practice and how do you practice?
Four times a week...using 2 shoes...for 1 1/2-2 hours.

How did you get started pitching and at what age?
Our grandfathers and dads started us at ages 8-11.

Many pitchers quit pitching at age 18. Why do you think this is?

Juniors quit pitching because they get so involved in other things such as going to college, sports, jobs, cars, boys. They just don't have the time for horse-shoes. Besides, their contemporaries at that time in life don't pitch...so they do what the others do.

Do you plan on pitching as adults?
Yes.

What would you like the NHPA to do for Juniors?
The NHPA should pay at least the first 3 places in the W.T., put the money into the trust fund and should increase the amount. They should give juniors more publicity, schedule more events, and try to get schools to make horseshoe pitching a regular sport.

The Junior Pride of Texas

Doug Macha, 13, the Texas State Junior Champion for 1985 through 1988, considers the game he pitched against Michael Davidson of Oklahoma in the '88 W.T. the most important game of his life. He threw 30 ringers out of 32 shoes for a 93.2% ringer average...just short of Walter Ray's junior mark of 96.9% established in 1971. Does Doug think *that* mark will ever be broken? Definitely yes. He thinks the present top rated juniors consisting of Edward Neeb, John and Jim Walters, and himself all have a chance...because they have all thrown games in the 90's.

Doug hails from East Bernard, is in the 7th grade, uses Deadeyes and throws a 1 3/4. He takes *Newsline*, pitches in a sanctioned league, has his own courts, and would like to be a professional bowler. The best thing about horseshoes, he says, is the competition and just getting to meet new people...as well as having a small reunion each year with his old horseshoe buddies. He plans on pitching at Spearfish and taking in the many sights that area has to offer.

How does he keep his game sharp? Doug says he doesn't practice very often unless he is getting ready for a tournament. His competition is generally his dad, Daniel, who has his own machine shop, and works a 28 acre farm. Doug proudly points out that his mother, Geri, works for a computer firm and is the Secretary/ editor of the Texas Horseshoe Pitchers Ass'n., and that he has two sisters who also pitch horseshoes.

He believes the NHPA should do much more for Junior pitchers in the way of awarding scholarships or savings bonds for 2nd and 3rd places in the W.T. and perhaps the Sanctioned League program.

Doug is a busy boy. Besides horseshoe pitching, he belongs to the local baseball ass'n., goes to church regularly, and helps his folks farm maize, cotton and catfish. He also has a pet dog, whose name is "Ringer." What else?

Those Walter Boys

Jim and John Walters from Troy, Ohio are two brothers we will be hearing from for quite a long time to come. Much like Walter Ray and Jeffrey Williams, these juniors are already pitching in the 75-80% range at the tender ages of 12 and 13, are intense competitors and love to go head to head against each other. In a tournament in September, 1988 at Union, Ohio, one game both will long remember was John's 89.2% gem in which there were 18 4-deads with John ekeing out a win. In March, '89, pitching in their Junior Winter League, Jim had some measure of revenge. Both boys threw 42 ringers out of 50 shoes...but Jim won the game by one point...134-133.

These two juniors became interested in pitching horseshoes about 5 years ago while watching their dad and grandpa Bucky Walters. A club member, Jim Hurst, helped them and

gave them a lot of encouragement, especially when they were pitching in the 5-15% range. Soon, they were off and running. They've never looked back. John and Jim are members of the NHPA, the Troy Horseshoe Club, pitch in a Junior league belong to the 'Say No To Drugs' club at their school, and are active in intramural sports. Just All-American kids!

Traveling with their parents, Ken and Mary Walters, Jim and John are able to pitch in 4-5 different states each year. Of course, their two sisters, Julia and Jennie, outstanding junior pitchers in their own right, are also along for the competition and fun. Jim says the most important game he ever pitched was when he won the Carolina Dogwood Festival in '88 by defeating the Virginia Jr. State Champion, Lenwood Conner with an 85.3% game. He finished the event with an overall 81.7. He is the current Ohio State Jr. Champion, having won the event in both '87 and '88.

Do they think that Walter Ray's single game 96.9% mark will ever be broken? Definitely 'yes'. Both boys believe they have a chance. (In the '88 W.T., Jim came close with a 40 out of 42 shoes with one shoe bouncing off for a 95.2% game, 'it could have been'...a 97.6%.) John and Jim are looking forward to the W.T. in Spearfish, to seeing old friends, making new ones, to seeing the many sights, and to the competition they both expect.

And what do the Walter boys think should be done for junior pitching? "We think there should be more mixed pitching allowed as this gives women and juniors more opportunity to pitch with much better competition. The NHPA should give prizes for the first three places in the W.T. and some type of certificates should be presented to Juniors at the award ceremonies...representing any scholarship or trust fund they may have won."



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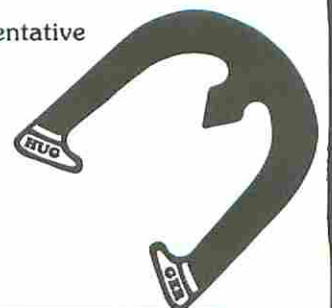
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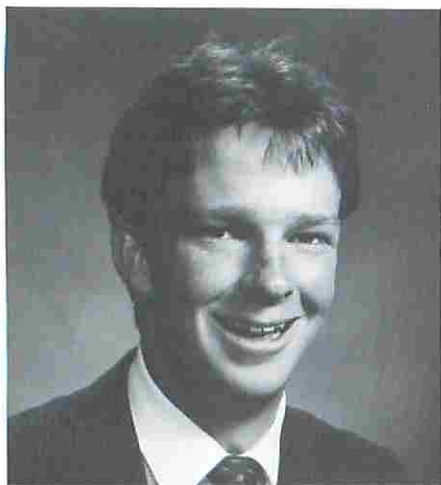
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No Longer A Junior



Steve Barnes, 18 years old, home in Modessa, Missouri is just one of a number of junior boy pitchers who have to cross the line and pitch with adults at 40 feet...if he decides to continue pitching. Most 18 year olds have to make the decision of joining the labor force or taking the 4 year college route with its many activities which

give them very little time for horseshoes.

Steve, you have a fine record as a junior pitcher. You won the Boys' Missouri State Championship three straight years, 1986-88, and had a very impressive 88.5% ringer average in the '87 event. Those same years you won the Missouri State Fair junior championships. You are now 18 and no longer eligible to pitch in the juniors. What are your plans after graduating from high school?

Well, first, I do plan on pitching in the men's division in the World Tournament in Spearfish. I am practicing at 40 feet and although not pitching well ...only 48%...I realize that it takes a lot of time and practice to adjust. I think many juniors quit because they get discouraged in trying to adjust. However, I am not going to quit, because I feel that with time and practice I will improve. After the W.T., I plan on going to Northeast Missouri College and major in Political Science even though my favorite subject in high school is calculus, which doesn't have too much to do with my career choice, does it?

What are a few things you most remember about your years as a junior pitcher?

First, I think I will always remember the friends I have made pitching in the World Tournaments. Second, I'll never forget the game I pitched against Doug Macha in last year's W.T. I had 96 ringers out of 110 shoes for 87.2% while Doug had 91 for 82.7%. I was lucky to win because Doug lost quite a few ringers. Third, I was playing against Jeff Hart for the Missouri State Championship in '86 and we were both 6-0. We had a great game but I won, for my first state title.

Who do you think was the greatest junior pitcher?

Alan Francis. I don't say that because he is from my home state but because his record 4 consecutive world championships with an average of 84.1% for 44 games pitched speaks for itself.

Do you plan to continue pitching throughout your life?

Yes.

Thanks, Steve...and good luck to you in your 18th year and beyond.

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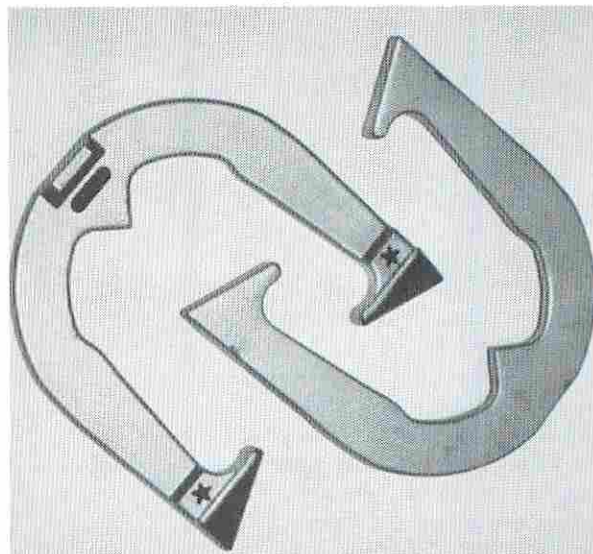
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NHPA Champions Christen White House Court

Now I'd like to have the both of you come to Washington and help christen my new White House court."

As we spoke, it was apparent that time was short. In just two and one half weeks, the President wanted us to visit along with 6-8 of the top horseshoe pitchers in the world. He was going to have an informal gathering of dignitaries and an outdoor barbecue. We were to pitch with many of his invited guests. The President asked me to prepare a list of about 15 top horseshoe pitchers with addresses and brief highlights on each. This list was to be given to his personal secretary the next day. He would make the choice of who to invite.

As there are many top pitchers around the country, the decision of

who to include on the list appeared to be a cause for concern as there were surely to be some hurt feelings. Since addresses and phone numbers were required, I contacted Donnie to get this information and advised him of how the list would be established. We would provide President Bush with a list that was comprised of current or former World Champions, all who had pitched in Pleasanton and/or the Ohio State Fair Governor's Open. This gave the President the initial list he wanted and it was now up to him to decide the names of the 6-8 to be invited.

Early in the following week, a call from the White House revealed the names to be invited. In addition to myself and Donnie, invitations would be extended to Jim Knisley, Dale Lipovsky, Diane Lopez, Sandy McLachlin, Phyllis Negaard, Mark Seibold, Don Titcomb, Walter Ray Williams, Jr., and Vicki Winston. The total of nine was a bit more than initially mentioned by the President.

Invitations to a White House party are, in a sense, like invitations to any other party. If you go, you make and pay for your own arrangements. Since it was now only about 10 days before the visit, time was tight for travel and lodging arrangements. Some might have a problem getting away on such short notice and a possible financial hardship existed. To ensure the best possible turnout, I authorized the NHPA to pay one way travel allowance and one night's lodging in Washington. Everybody agreed to accept the invitation and we all met at the Holiday Inn where I had made arrangements on Friday, March 31.

Saturday, April 1, was very cold in Washington, about 38 degrees. Leaving the hotel at about 10:30 a.m., we all traveled, some with spouses, in 3 autos to the appointed security gate at the White House. By 11:15 a.m., we had gone through

two check points and were ushered to a reception room where all signed in. In a matter of minutes, we were introduced to Don Rhodes, the President's personal assistant and escorted through a part of the building and out onto the White House grounds. After a brief walk past the Oval Office, we approached the area of the swimming pool and horseshoe court where the President was waiting. Mrs. Bush joined us a few minutes later.

After presenting the President and Mrs. Bush with matching jackets beautifully embroidered with their names and town by Ronn and Phyllis Negaard and accepting a large framed picture from the President, we began to warm up on the new White House horseshoe court. With a large contingent of press and photographers present, the President pitched for a few minutes and then turned the court back to the NHPA champions who were pitching in doubles. The President, his family members who were in attendance and some other guests who were now beginning to gather, seemed very impressed by the skill displayed by our champions.

With the Navy Country and Western Band playing in the background, the smell of hamburgers and hotdogs on the barbecue grill and more and more guests coming to view, the festivities warmed up as the President, several Governors and other dignitaries began to pitch with us. By 2 p.m. a truly memorable affair was at an end. Throughout, the President and Mrs. Bush had worn the jackets we gave them. We were all very impressed by the genuine warmth and down home kindness shown us by the President and Mrs. Bush. For a while it was difficult to maintain the thought that we were in the midst of this country's most important person.

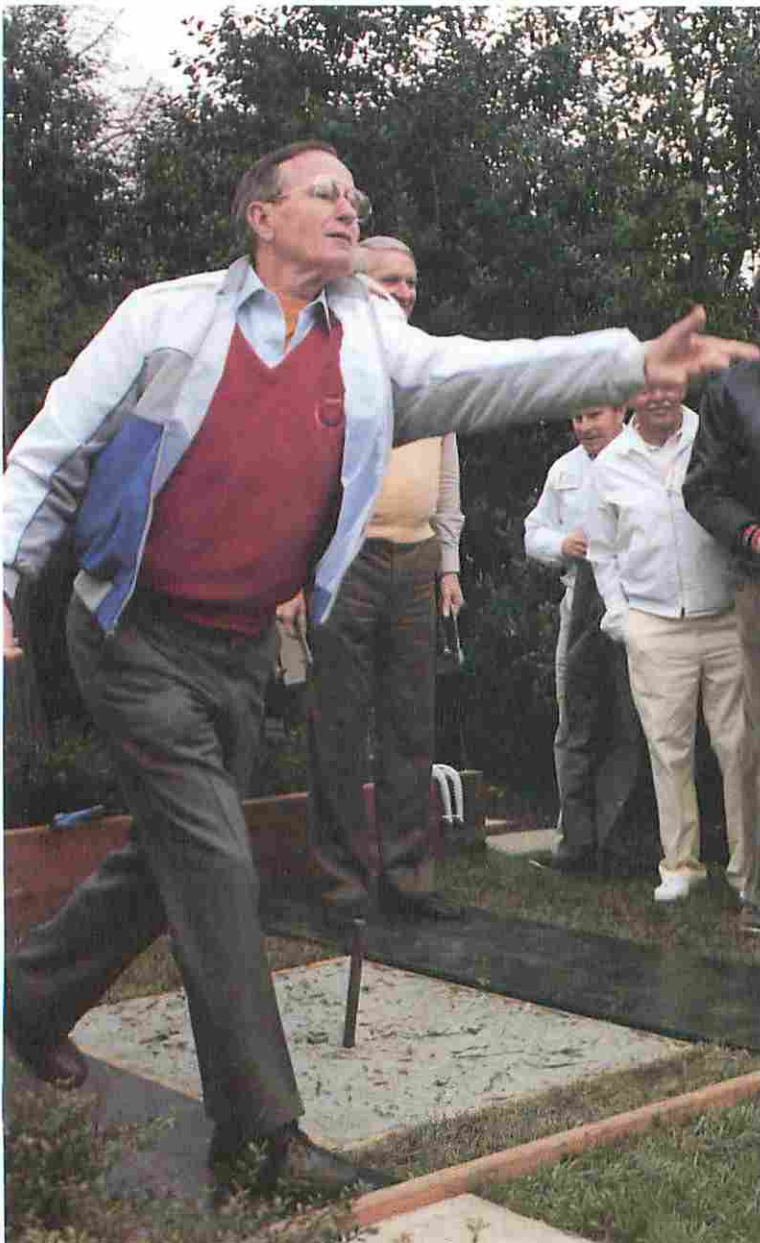

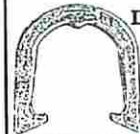

Please select your candidate and submit your reasons for the nomination.

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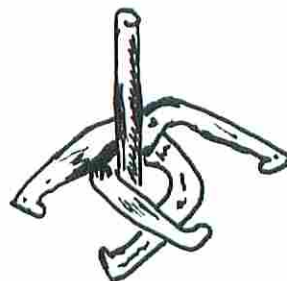
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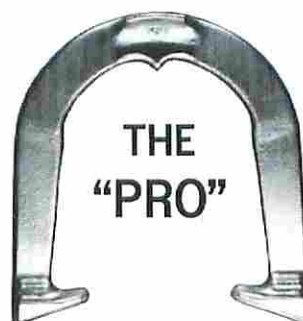
