# President's Message

he weather has finally begun to warm up and the old rusted pitching horseshoes are being cleaned up for the start of a new season. Getting the body ready for the season generally takes a lot longer than the shoes, especially as we get older. For me, each year seems to take a bit more effort than the last and more time to get into stride. The aches and pains and blood pressure get tougher to control with each passing year. I hate to admit it but I'm beginning to feel my age. I wonder if being NHPA President has anything to do with that?

A year ago in this column, I wrote about the good effect *positive thinking* could have on your game. I was reminded about it by a couple of letters I received from members who wrote to say how my article of a year ago has helped them. Needless to say, I was happy to hear that my writing has helped, even a few, not only with their pitching game but with their daily life as well. Being the creatures of habit that humans are, it is very easy to fall back to old habits and ideas that surround us with a comfortable or secure feeling. To reach out and try something new, physically or spiritually, is sometimes too difficult for our normal mode of action or thought.

We all carry subconscious inhibitors that tend to

work against our ability to perform our best. As we age, these mental inhibitors gather physical support through the normal aging process. The body is just no longer capable of maintaining itself as it did when we were younger. But, the mind and thought process stays alert and active much longer than the body can maintain. How many times have you fallen into bed, the body exhausted but been unable to sleep because the mind is still wide awake and active?

Put this mental power to work for you in your daily life. Use it to lift your spirit and your pitching game to the performance level set by your conscious mind. The process is called Positive Thinking. What we hold in our thoughts we tend to get out. If you find it difficult to elevate your actual pitching game or feel the fun is gone, look into your subconscious. Do your utmost to rid the mind of the negative thoughts that bother you. We are all surrounded by problems in our daily lives. While an aging process is beyond our control, the thoughts about it and other daily problems are, to a great degree, controlled by our mental attitude. Clear the mind of negatives and elevate yourself to a happier level of acceptance. Who knows, the renewed positive mental attitude may also improve your pitching performance. If it doesn't, I guarantee you will have more fun trying.

# Dave's Court Report

aving just returned from Washington D.C. and a visit to the White House, I had hoped that the official White House Press photos would be available in time to make this issue. Such is not the case and the story shall then wait for the next publication. In brief, the visit went well and was really a lift for the sport of horseshoe pitching. In addition to myself and Donnie, President Bush invited nine current or former World Champions along with spouses from a list of 15 I was requested to give him. The day was bitter cold but we did get in some pitching on the President's new court. I hope all of you had a chance to view some of the brief TV footage which was aired by all the networks or read about it in the newspaper.

It has been noticed that some of you are showing up at tournaments with altered pitching shoes. In particular, it seems to be popular to remove the ringer break on the M&M horseshoes. Please understand that while this makes the shoe look like a modified version available in Canada, the shoe is not sanctioned in this modified form in the United States. While Canadian pitchers can use it here, U.S. pit-

chers cannot. Admittedly, this is a grey area in our rules that needs to be addressed. I have asked the Rules Committee to investigate and study the matter to see if a firm ruling on altered shoes can be published. In the meantime, no altered shoe is considered legal and you can be asked to replace them if pitching in a sanctioned event

For the record, junior pitchers or former juniors making the transition to adult are not bound by the new three sanctioned tournament requirement for World Tournament entry. Nor do Canadians have to pitch in 3 such stateside tournaments. However, Canadian entries do have to have 3 or more completed events under Horseshoe Canada jurisdiction or a combination total with NHPA events.

For those of you who follow the PBA or might be interested in the bowling progress of NHPA member Walter Ray Williams, Jr., some 1988 statistics provided me by Sol Berman are: PBA averages, #1 Mark Roth 218.04, #6 W.R. Williams, Jr., 215.36. The leading money winner is Brian Voss, \$225,485 while Walter Ray is #7 at \$131,465. Williams was runner-up four times during 1988.

On Friday, January 13, Karl Van Sant, the current Indiana State Champion attended Mary Miller Junior High in Georgetown, Illinois at my invitation. He conducted a clinic on horseshoe pitching for three physical education classes. He demonstrated the technique and mechanics of horseshoe pitching for approximately 250 junior high students. He was superb as he pitched nearly seventy-five percent ringers. He permitted every student a chance to pitch. The students were understandably impressed.

He donated his expertise and three hours of time to promote the game of horseshoes. Karl answered questions from our student body and all who attended departed with a clear understanding of the game. Most had little idea of the complexities of the sport. Some students inquired as

to tournaments for juniors and how to get started. Karl created a spark in many young potential pitchers.



# 1988 Ohio State Fair Governor's Open In Review

The Ohio State Fair was the first major horseshoe tournament to use 20 shoe count-all games. Play in each class consisted of 16 games with points being accumulated and a bonus of 10 points awarded for each win. All classes were set up to be 8 or 9 people. Women, men and juniors played together in mixed percentage classes. A total of 108 players entered the Open with 20 teams in the doubles. Hopefully, this coming year's event will attract a much larger field and a better representation from the state neighboring Ohio. Due to some unusually warm weather, which caused some players to take longer rests than anticipated between the many games, there were some complaints about the length of

play with a couple of players having to withdraw. One of the classes was even cut short due to rain.

Since the Ohio State Fair is one of the few tournaments that boasts a substantial cash prize, I was slightly disappointed in the low number of top players who entered the event. Money was distributed to each class based on the number of players in the class. There were also trophies given out to the top finishers in each class. As with last year, the top (4) players from the Open classes advanced to the remaining spots in the Invitational. The players advanced based on total points without bonus. The four players were Oscar Manns with 773 points, Elden Sarbaugh with 755 points, Billie Sue Pennington and Jerry Holt with 747 points each. Gary Roberts had 722 points to act as the alternate in case one of the sixteen had to withdraw during competition and earned an extra \$200.

The local Whetstone horseshoe club hosted a dinner and doubles competition for the invited players. They had an auction where local players bid for the right to play with the Invited players as their partners. It was a fun event for all players concerned and we didn't even get rained out. The doubles action was similar to the doubles competition we had earlier in the day with local celebrities, being based on count-all scoring with bonuses for winning your match. The players appreciated the Whetstone club for supplying the scorekeepers for the action on Saturday and Sunday.

The highlight of the tournament was, without a doubt, on Saturday the 20th of August when then Vice-President George Bush and his running mate Dan Quayle came to pitch horseshoes and were on national television showing their winning form. There was an estimated 80 photographers and reporters courtside with television and still cameras. There was a lot of excitement and all sixteen of the players in the Invitational met both Mr. Bush and Mr. Quayle. President Bush pitched horseshoes with Earl Vansant who was the tournament director. I had the privilege of pitching horseshoes with Vice-President Quayle. George Bush threw 4 or 5 ringers in his pitching session while Dan Quayle, who pitched for his first time, managed to throw one ringer.

On Saturday 20 games were played which left 8 games to be played on Sunday afternoon. All together there were 32 games to be played before the top 5 players would battle it out in a stepladder finals. In the final position round, the 32nd game, to decide who the

top 5 players would be, some exciting matches were set up with some dramatic results. Separating Sandy McLachlin and Vicki Winston was 14 points, so with the bonus of 10 points for a win, if Vicki could beat Sandy by 5 points, Vicki could have taken over the top spot for the stepladder finals. It turned out that Sandy won the game to remain the top seed for the finals. In a fight for fifth spot, Walter Ray Williams, Jr. was 10 points ahead of Carl Steinfeldt, 16 points ahead of Jim Knisley, and 23 points ahead of Kevin Hollister. This pitted Williams against Steinfeldt and Knisley against Hollister. With the bonus system, Williams needed at least a tie to stay ahead of Steinfeldt and Knisley needed Steinfeldt to win and beat Steinfeldt's score by 6 points. Hollister needed a minor miracle to make the top 5. Steinfeldt looked like he had locked up 5th place by beating Williams 53-51 (85%-80%). Steinfeldt and Williams had finished their game about 6 shoes before Knisley and Hollister so both players watched Jim Knisley finish his game without a single miss to score only the third perfect game of the tournament to edge Steinfeldt out by 1 point and Williams by 3 points. Truly a remarkable performance by a great pitcher who just one week earlier won his second World Championship. The other two perfect games were pitched by Sandy McLachlin in the second game of the tournament against Kevin Hollister and by John Kapnis in the fifth game against Walter Ray Williams, Jr.

Special thanks goes to Earl Vansant and his staff of Shirley Spiesman, Francis Asher, Bernard Davis, Dan Sanders, and Elden Sarbaugh who also helped design and build the new score machines. Other helpers were Billie Sue Pennington, Robin Deckert, Jeannie Manns, Oscar Manns, Joe Mazzurco, William Johns, Gary Roberts, Donnie Roberts, Rita Sarbaugh, Charlie Jones, and Sharon Jones. The Whetstone Horseshoe Club under the direction of Charlie and Jean Myers was a tremendous help in keeping score, judging and help in general. We would like to give our appreciation to Mr. Jack Foust and Sande Haldiman for without them there would have been no tournament.

#### Power of the Press

In 1964, the New Jersey Horseshoe Pitching Association voted to donate copies of Ottie Reno's book *The Story* of Horseshoes to eight public libraries in New Jersey.

Hal Hanania of Middlesex, NJ pitched horseshoes in his yard with friends. They decided to form a club and run some tournaments, but they needed more information about horseshoes. Hal found a copy of Reno's book in the Plainfield, NJ library. He contacted Robert Pence, the Secretary/Treasurer of the NHPA, whose name was listed in the book. Bob referred him to Lee Davis, the New Jersey state President.

Lee invited Hal to one of our state meetings. We arranged to hold a tournament in Middlesex in 1966.

Hal went to South Gate, California for the 1969 World Championship. He put in a bid for the 1971 World Tournament and was successful.

In 1970, he held the National AAU Championship in Middlesex on their 24 new courts.

The 1971 World Championship was, in many respects, our most successful tournament. We had 3,000 to 4,000 spectators every night and excellent newspaper and TV coverage.

Walter Ray Williams, the World Junior Champion, appeared on a talk show.

The income from the tournament was large enough so that the dinner was free for the participants and their families.

Middlesex put in several bids during the 1970's but was never able to get the tournament again.

Copies of *Pitching Championship Horseshoes* and *Film Fact & Fun* are being donated to the Palm Beach Gardens and Lake Worth, Florida public libraries.

If each charter would donate copies of the books to libraries in their state, I'm sure you would stir up interest in horseshoes in many areas.

Ed Domey has many copies of both books. I have donated copies of *Horseshoe Film Facts & Fun* to all members of the Lake Worth, Florida Horseshoe Club who join the NHPA (about 30 to date).

Al Sandham, Regional Director of Georgia writes that the Paulding County Horseshoe Pitchers hosted the closing tournament of 1988 season at their courts in Dallas, Georgia. There were contestants from all corners of the state plus four neighboring states, Tennessee, Alabama, South Carolina and Mississippi. Al reports that work is under way for Georgia to host the 1990 World Tournament at Stone Mountain. The courts, frames and accessories are already under construction. Camping, Hotel and Motel arrangements and contracts have all been executed and information will appear in "Newsline" when required. In 1988, eight new courts were built in Dohlonega and two tournaments were hosted in this scenic mountain area of Georgia. The Columbus courts were reactivated and two tournaments were held on these courts. # Are You A '1'...or a '2'?

own through our horsehoe history, we have all read about certain fundamentals we should follow if we wanted to be a good horseshoe pitcher. Few of these have ever been challenged. In a previous article, I questioned the advice to 'release your shoe at eye level or higher' because after watching some of our really great pitchers via one-frame-at-a-time VCR video, it was abundantly clear that the shoe was released somewhere near knee height...from a little below to slightly above. If you think this is not the correct area for release, just try hanging on to your shoe until it passes eye level. The advice should probably have been something like 'release your shoe naturally but be sure to follow through to at least eye level.'

I also questioned the advice to 'step straight toward the stake' when releasing the shoe. Is this good advice? Maybe...maybe not. For the purpose of this discussion, I am going to label those pitchers who step straight toward the stake as 1's; those stepping parallel to the pitching slab at 2's.


Let's take a look at the 1's. When they step straight toward the stake, if their arm swings parallel to their two feet, then obviously their shoes are going to the right of their target (solid line 1). How do they compensate for this? They compensate by not swinging parallel to their two feet. They swing their arm away from their body on the backswing in order

to get a straight line to the stake and in order to clear their front foot on the forward swing (dotted line 2). The 1's often fall to the right after releasing the shoe.

How about the 2's? A '2' steps straight forward, parallel to the pitching slab. Because he does not have to pitch around his front foot, he can bring his arm straight back from the stake and then straight forward, directly at it. He does not have to compensate...his alignment is better...and he is seldom off balance. If you are a '2', you are in good company...in fact, some very exclusive company...Jim Knisley, Carl Steinfeldt, Dale Lipovsky, Mark Seibold, Kevin Cone, and others. Carl, Dale, Mark, and Kevin step to the outside of the platform...not to the inside as the 1's do. Their shoes go over the inside front corner... right where the 1's feet would be. Jim steps down the center. The front foot of these pitchers is never in the way of a straight line delivery to the stake.

"But," you say, "Aren't there some good pitchers who are 1's?" You bet! Some of the best. Walter Ray Williams, Sandy McLachlin, and Debbie Michaud are three who come to mind. There is no way you can fault their results even though they pitch around their front foot... and sometimes fall to the right.

"Are there some pitchers whom you would classify as kinds in-be-



tween...such as 1½'s?'' Vicki Winston, Phyllis Negaard, Ruth Hangen, and Paul Focht could almost be called 2's but are closer to 1½'s. Even though not 2's, their front foot is *never* in the way of their swing.

"I can see that 2's have a better line to the stake and generally should be more consistent because they don't have to compensate. Why do you think the 1's mentioned above can still compensate and be as good as they are?" I don't know. Just natural ability, I guess. There are hundreds of examples in the sports world of athletes who broke all the basic rules in their sport...yet were outstanding stars. As one famous coach put it, "They're stars not because they violated the principles of their sport...but in spite of it!"

"But the 1's mentioned above follow the rule...they do 'step straight toward the stake'." That's correct. So who is right...the 1's who follow the advice which has been with us for ages...or the 2's, who found a new way to the stake?

"Which method do you think is the better?" I lean strongly toward the 2's. Why? Because I am probably the world's worst '1'. I am always falling to the right to get around that front foot...which far too often strays much too far to the right.

Readers...are you a one or a two? Try sprinkling some white flour on your pitching platform and after a few throws, take a look.

P.S. This may interest you: Walter "Dead Eye" Williams an 11-year-old boy who stands 5 feet tall and weighs only 85 pounds won the Junior Worlds Championship at Middlesex, New Jersey.

He had 302 ringers out of 350 shoes for 86.3%. WOWIE. He defeated the defending champion—Bill Holland of Indianapolis who is 16 years old by a score of 50 to 30. In this game he had 83 ringers out of 94 shoes for 88.3%. The 7 boys only scored a total of 42 points on him. Three of the boys got 1 point—another 1 point and another 5 points. Looks like he is a comer in a few years.

# Bob Champion's Charter Chatter



It is encouraging that about a third of the charters have responded to my request for a list of State Champions through the years. But there are several more needed to complete the records.

Information gathered from the lists, Charter newsletters and just plain notes from the charters will be used in future columns under "Charter Chatter." Please make a special effort to send those news notes and clippings.

As soon as NHPA records in all categories are completed and we have heard from those who hold the key to the correct records, items of special interest to our readers will be published.

#### **ALABAMA**

State Champions in Alabama since Ottie Reno ran his string of 15 straight titles to 1977 have been Bob Stowe, Mobile, from 1978-1980, James Johnson, Huntsville, in 1981, Walker Shaneyfelt six straight years from 1982 to 1987. Shaneyfelt is from Oxr. The reigning champion is Jack Henderson from Eva.

#### **CALIFORNIA**

Don Titcomb, who hails from San Jose, the Ambassador of horseshoe good will in the Golden State staged another spectacular event on St. Patrick's Day at the Golden Gate Fields Race Track. The winner could leave the track \$250,000 richer.

Through a random drawing of those who registered at the track, they selected five finalists to pitch a regulation horseshoe 47 feet toward the stake. If one of the finalists tossed a perfect ringer, they'd win \$250,000.

If no one wins the big prize, the finalist whose pitch is closest to the stake still gets \$5,000. Any pitch inside the 10'x10' square won \$1,000...and the finalists got \$500 just for tossing the shoe...

#### COLORADO

Ray Heim of Boulder topped all men in the Most Improved Category for action from 1987-1988. Ray raised his average 18.6% due to the fact that he has retired and is spending most of his time pitching horseshoes. Janie Thompson, wife of CHPA President Keith Thompson went up 7.4% to lead the women. Junior Steve Olson improved 14.7% in four tournaments.

One of the special tournaments to help some league pitchers to qualify for the World was won by Rich Pintor in a playoff with Jerry Comstock. These two will be top contenders along with Paul LaCrosse for the 1989 State Title.

Colorado Springs will have a league a weekend tournaments this year after being off the circuit for several years.

#### HAWAII

The Hawaii Horseshoe Pitchers Association completed its first year affiliation with the NHPA in a very successful manner. They signed up 164 NHPA members, sent their first delegate and contestants to the Pleasanton World Tournament and had several pitchers fly to the mainland for the annual Las Vegas Tournament.

In 1989, four tournaments have been sanctioned including the State Championship. Under the able direction of Assistant Regional Director, Rodney Nahina and State secretary Ethel Nahina, the charter continues to grow in members and its support of the NHPA.

Last year, James "Kimo" David became the first State Champion taking the title with an 8-1 record and a 41.9 percentage. Kimo is from Waimanalo. Ed Shaw of Kona was 2nd while Ben Fields, formerly of Colorado, was 3rd.

#### KENTUCKY

The Hankins Family, Tony, Randy and John will be found in the Class A division in Kentucky horseshoe circles in most tournaments in the State. Tony finished second in the Blue Grass Games behind Tib Turner, second behind Ron Powell in the Boone Woods Tournament and finished eighth in the State tournament.

Powell went 15-0 to win the 1988 State finishing with a 72.1 percentage. It was his third straight championship win. Lois Webster won the women's title for the first time. Brian Collins repeated as the junior boy's winner and Becky Kemper took the girls crown. Powell and Bob Hudnall won the Class A Doubles title.

Ron topped all averages last year with 73,84, winning 47 games and losing only one during the season. Webster was 64.79 (49-3), Collins 53.76 (18-1).

#### MARYLAND

Annapolis Lodge 296 horseshoe pitchers were well represented at the 1988 International Pool Tournament in Orlando, Florida. The Lodge horseshoe club presented a special award to Howard Meck, a long-time supporter and founder of the Annapolis Lodge Horseshoe Club.

#### **MINNESOTA**

The 1989 State Tournament will be hosted by the Brooklyn Park Horseshoe Club at the Brooklyn Park Community Center. Facilities used will be the Ice Arena and a recently constructed National Guard Armory.

Chairman Ev Marcotte, Dennis Carlson and Gordy Schmidt compose a committee to investigate the possibility of purchasing a computer.

There at 16 NHPA sanctioned clubs in Minnesota. The Rockford Ringers League is a new one this season, the first year they have sanctioned their league play.

They have 28 members and 23 of these are new state members.

Bob Dunn, a Minnesota vice president has been working on a recruiting project for the NHPA Sanctioned League Program. Give him your cooperation.

#### **NEBRASKA**

Nebraska has scheduled 15 sanctioned tournaments for this year beginning April 30 with the Arbor Day Tournament at Nebraska City and closing with the Annual State Tournament scheduled this year at North Platte.

Many states are sending out their Constitution and By-Laws to their members. Some include them when they sell NHPA membership cards. Nebraska is one of those efficient states.

Also, it is helpful to NHPA if the newsletters include a form encouraging members to subscribe to their newsletter and to the NHPA Newsline.

Nebraska officers for 1989 are: Merle Alswanger, president; Marty Craig, secretary-treasurer; Don Koso, 1st VP; Fat Kapke, 2nd VP; Sally Grooms, 3rd VP; and George Wolfe, 4th VP.

#### **NEVADA**

State Tournament records for Nevada date back to 1980. Prior records are reported to have been destroyed or not posted.

Foster Kenton of Schurz is the current men's champion with 7-0 record and 48.5%. The state posted women's champions in 1980 — Etta Toby, Reno; 1981-Elsie Bracken, Fallon; and 1982-Yoski Palmer of Carson City.

Cas Bower, Reno, was the first recorded men's champion in 1980. Subsequent winners have been Don Gore, Reno, in 1981; Dick Hucke, Fallon, in 1982; Byron Cork, Shoshone, in 1986; and Harold Holbrook, Carson City, in 1987.

The highest winning percentage was recorded by Cork - 55.0.

#### **NEW YORK**

A future highlight of the Pioneer Club of Syracuse will be the hosting of the National Senior Horseshoe Tournament in 1991. Although it might be a little early, Dave Harnden of the Club wishes to invite the seniors to come on over to Syracuse.

Art Tyson, who finished eighth in the World last year, also won the New York 3rd Annual Open Tournament. Art had only one loss to dethrone defending champion Carl Steinfeldt. Art averaged 76%, Carl 79% and Kevin Hollister from New England 74%. Last September Art won the New York State title at Camden with over 75%.

Steinfeldt has thrilled young and old alike with his annual Open horseshoe clinic. He stressed the importance of relaxing, timing the step with the swing and following through.

#### OHIO

Guy Wills of Cleveland posted an 8-1 record and 69.1% to win the men's Class A Division in the Joe Raico Memorial Tournament in February. Guy also pitched the high percent game for the tournament, 32 ringers out of 40 shoes, an 80% game.

Shirley Spiesman of Painsville had a 5-1 record and 53.1% to win the ladies crown.

Oscar Manns of Painsville, a regular in the top 32 pitchers in the world, won the John Kovach Memorial Tournament in January with an 8-1 record (71.1%), pitched the highest game of the tournament, 35 ringers out of 40 shoes for an 87.5% game. Regional Director Earl VanSant from Chardon also tossed a lifetime high of 82.5%--33 ringers out of 40 shoes.

#### **OREGON**

Twenty sanctioned tournaments are scheduled for Oregon this season. The Phoenix tournament will be boosted with \$1,000 from Budweiser, and Salem will receive \$300 from the Salem Horseshoe Club.

Ben Wiedrich, Oregon City, led the Oregon Horseshoe Pitchers League in points with 180 with an 88-13 won-lost record. Ben also copped the high ranking by percentage with 73.28. His high game was 88.88.

Lowell Davis, Creswell, had the second best percentage with 67.95, .07 in front of Ridge Leggett of Roseburg. Barry Chapelle, Portland, was fourth with 65.86, Bob West followed with 65.63.

Two other players had games of 88% plus. Davis with 88.70 and Leggett with 88.33. Chapelle's high was 86.11%.

#### PENNSYLVANIA

The Western Pennsylvania Horseshoe Pitchers Association is proud of one of their senior members. On April 16, Ed Blum of Darlington was inducted into the 14th Annual Beaver County Sports Hall of Fame. Ed is 70 years old now, but has pitched horseshoes for 60 of those years.

The champion will receive \$300 (minimum) plus a beautiful trophy.

uring the last year or so, the NHPA and Thousand Trails have been building a bridge between the two organizations as our members share several common interests. Primary, is our common interest in horseshoe pitching.

Several regional rally's by Thousand Trails have been supported by NHPA people who have given clinics on horseshoe pitching, holding tournaments at camp preserves, installing regulation courts, the benefits of joint membership and the goodwill support of each other.

This year, in addition to the rallies, we will exchange advertising in our monthly magazines and strive to build a better awareness of each other's organization. To this end, we just completed a TT clinic and NHPA tournament in Laughlin, Nevada that Thousand Trails sponsored to the tune of \$1500.

On Monday, April 3, on the grounds of the Riverside Casino in Laughlin, myself, Don Titcomb and Don Weaver put on a clinic and fun tournament just for TT members who enjoyed horseshoe pitching but did not pitch in NHPA events. Some 96 men and women took part in the event whereby for a TT coupon, they could pitch 16 shoes for a count-all score. They could take up to 3 attempts to better their score. The top six point totals from this prelim play gathered late in the day to pitch two more rounds with the top point maker in this group of six receiving a \$500.00 check from Thousand Trails.

On the two days following, an NHPA sanctioned tournament was held for members who had preregistered due to the limited courts. We had only six portable courts that were specially built and transported to the site by Don Weaver. Set up in the parking lot,

They hope to host the 1989 State Tournament at Parkersburg under a roof Labor Day weekend.

the hot strong winds with high temperatures began to quickly prove the advantage of pitching a shorter distance in mixed play. The wind, for both days, was so strong that everything except the pitchers was blowing over and even then, some of the lightweights had trouble maintaining their position.

Over the course of the two days, not one pitcher could equal their entering percentage though a 20%, thirty foot pitcher came close. For the most part, it was a task to pitch ½ your entering average especially if pitching from 40 feet. The new Vegas style rubber pitching surface didn't seem to hold the shoes in the hot sun as well as they did last Fall indoors at the Hacienda. When it came time to determine the 16 finalists for the two handicap ladder finals, it was apparent that the 30 foot pitchers would be hard to contend with. In fact, the Class A ladder was won by Joe Zoglman of California and the Class B ladder by Florence Morton of Canada. Both pitch from 30 feet.

Due to the extreme conditions, results are not published here. However, since the event was sanctioned, if needed, it can count as one of the three for World Tournament registration. Any reported percentage will have to be the entering average, not the actual pitched in this event.

Several NHPA members in attendance are also TT members. Many helped with the tournament especially during the first day clinic. A special thanks to Don Weaver, Norm Herring, Don Titcomb, Gary Minnick and my wife Cathie who spent the entire 3 hot days with me running the events. Also, thanks to Thousand Trails for their sponsorship and George Lanegraff for his support. The weather conditions may not have been ideal, but we did have fun.

Seems my horseshoes, like myself, gain weight and get rusty from lack of exercise, but we're out there trying again, as our league/tournament season is now in full swing (wish I was). W.T. will be here so soon, time sure does fly, when you're having fun!

Would like to request a special, little favor from all clubs that may be planning their awards presentations during the last two weeks of July or first week in August. To help avoid disappointments of not receiving your patches, etc. in time, please send your final stats and material request forms early enough for me to get these items in the mail before Bev's husband and I leave or postpone your event date a couple weeks or so, to allow time for mailing after our return home. I will be out of this office from the 14th of July until approximately the second day of August. If you could make allowances for this, I would be very grateful.

I have this strange feeling sometimes upon receiving membership reports that some of you are still issuing CL/LG cards to "full" NHPA card holding members. Managed to catch it on some last year and sent them refunds. Am not sure on others. Please pay close attention to this as we don't want any club or individual overcharged. CL/LG onlycard is \$5.00 adult and \$3.00 for juniors. These fees include sanction dues and insurance fees in full. "Full" NHPA members of your club no charge!

No member is to have both cards, under any circumstances. I would still like to hear from all of you about the proposal to make the "full" NHPA card our one card and do away with the CL/LG card. I am in favor of this myself due to my strong belief in and support of my state and the NHPA and also that it should eliminate one area of confusion in this

program. Although, I can understand the reasons that some wish only to participate in our sport on the local level, and are perhaps unable to travel to tournaments, having just the "full" NHPA card would in no way obligate them to change but would show their sincere dedication and support to the entire NHPA.

A few points about the use of league average as one of the three needed to enter W.T. These averages can only be used if:

- Established while pitching in a league as a member of a sanctioned club/league.
- All required reports, fees and final stats of that club are on record in this office.

Therefore, if you submit a league average and your club does not have an official certificate of sanction in this program, that average will not be valid. All averages used will be verified.

There are numerous clubs that in the past have not sent in final stat sheets (high game and national awards stat sheet). It has never been mandatory to do so, although it really should be done. These stats are necessary:

- If you want your members to receive their earned high game percent patches (a good incentive for improvement).
- If any member wishes to use a league average to enter W.T. or state tournaments in some states (this average is allowed in Oklahoma as one of the three needed to enter state championship tournaments).
- 3. If a member's name is submitted for a top ten award (for verification, to break ties, etc.).

All columns must be filled in if your format is 50 shoe countall. Percent columns only if format is ringers only or cancellation.

Top Ten Form: anyone being submitted for an award must be listed on this form and it must be in no later than December first of each

year. The form must be filled out completely, regardless of what format of play is used. If ringers only or cancellation, you must still fill in the total shoes and total ringers. For any number, thirty, forty or fifty shoe countall -all columns must be completed. Starting this year all incomplete forms will be discarded or returned. It would also be appreciated if you would write on the form what format was used, even though there is not a specific space asking for this. If you are not sure how any of these forms should be done, please ask. Only good correspondence and having questions answered will make this program run smoothly and the paper work easier for all of us. "No job is finished until the paper work is done." Starting this year -anyone that pitches less than thirty shoes per game will not be eligible for top ten awards in any division or category.

News release forms are no longer required. If you have a newsy article of your club's league activities that you would like to see published, send it to me. It must be typewritten and doublespaced. Give highlights of your season, not too lengthy, as space is limited and must be received within thirty days after your league has ended. Include league activities only. Do not send state news or NHPA sanctioned tournament results to me.

With sincere congratulations, the 1988 Director of the Year Award has been proudly presented to Susie Pritzlaff of the Goldendale Club 78C24 in Germantown, Wisconsin. Susie has been their director for eleven years. Always with timely, neat, complete reports for eight leagues of sixty to seventy members. She has truly shown her sincere dedication to the sanctioned club/league program and NHPA.

# Don'ts...For the Horseshoe Pitcher

**DON'T** pitch a better game off court than you do on court.

DON'T fail to shoot first once in a while.

**DON'T** pitch short, unless in sand.

DON'T let opponent heckle you.

**DON'T** argue with competitor over 1-2-3-6 points...call judge.

**DON'T** get nervous if audience should boo your off-pitch.

DON'T keep asking score—or how many more shoes.
