



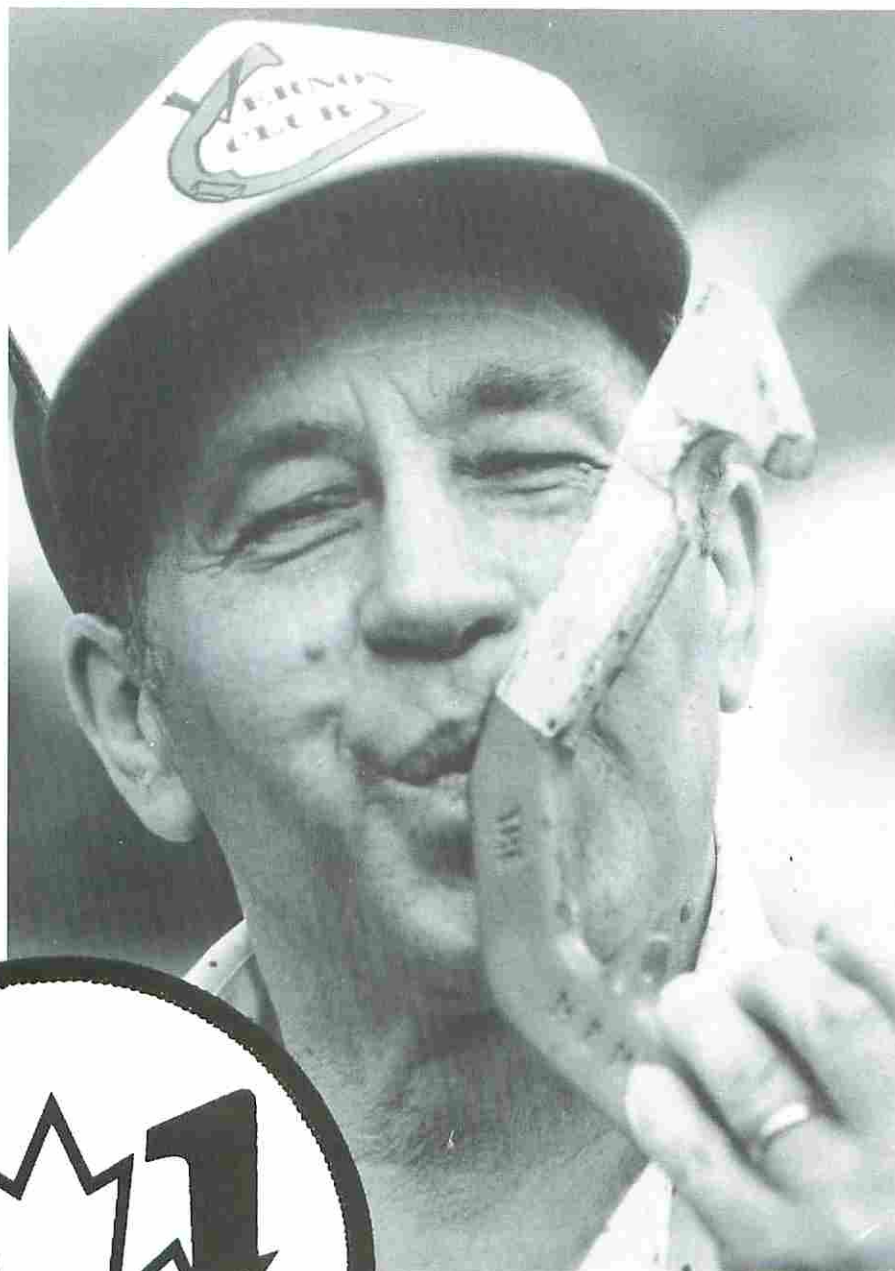

President's Message

The front cover and several articles tend to give *Newsline* a Canadian theme for this month. It is not by accident but purposely so, to give our U.S. membership a better idea of what is happening with our good pitching friends and neighbors, just to the north of us.

Horseshoe Canada is a well defined association with very capable leadership. They are the Canadian counterpart to the NHPA. While not yet our size in numbers, Horseshoe Canada has a proud heritage and can lay claim to some of the world's best pitchers, both past and present.

Recognized horseshoe pitching in Canada goes back more than 60 years. After a few years of play under the guidance of some outstanding organizers, the "Dominion of Canada Horseshoe Pitchers Association" was formed in late 1929. Shortly after World War II, the association changed its name by replacing the word "Dominion" for "Canadian." In 1967 a new Constitution was drawn up and the name again changed to "Canadian National." Finally, after experiencing some misdirected growing pains, the entire association was in 1979, reorganized and became known as, "Horseshoe Canada."

Much of the praise for the reorganization and subsequent direction must go to Jack Adams of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, who served as the first president of

Horseshoe Canada during the years 1979-1985. The work of Jack Adams was recognized on this side of the Canadian/U.S. border as well, for in 1984, Jack was inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame. While no longer president, Jack continues to serve Horseshoe Canada in many ways, one of which is the NHPA Regional Director for Canada.

Like the NHPA, Horseshoe Canada now finds itself in a state of rapid growth. While each association operates by its own Constitution and By-Laws, both face similar problems and goals. In 1988, Ed Murray became the 4th president of Horseshoe Canada. Under his guidance, Horseshoe Canada continues to improve and grow. He started a presidential newsletter which is issued four times yearly to each of the nine provincial associations affiliated with Horseshoe Canada. Copies are also sent to me while Ed and several other Canadian members receive *Newsline*. Both of us view the coming decade with optimism for our sport. We are beginning to share thoughts and ideas as we must do if our sport is one day doing to truly become "International". Along the way, let us work toward the day when the NHPA delegates award Canada the World Tournament. There is far more to our sport than just what we see in the U.S.A.

Dave's Court Report

■ The 1990 World Tournament registration form is printed in this issue. Copies are being sent to all Charter Secretaries and should be available for distribution by mid month. Note that the adult registration fee has been increased to \$50.00. This will all be returned to the pitchers in the form of larger cash prizes for each class.

■ You might also notice on the W.T. form, an option to list your five highest sanctioned tournaments in the 15 month period preceding the June 1, 1990 deadline or, your highest three in 12 months. This is because the NHPA Executive Council has tentatively adopted a plan to establish an NHPA pitching average for computer storage purposes. It is based on the five highest in 15 months where the high and the low will be thrown out and the remaining three averaged for your percentage. Full details have not yet been worked out so it is subject to change. We did however want to try it as an option this year.

■ The Minnesota Charter continues to show us innovative ways to promote the sport. Recently, several members, led by Bob Dunn and NHPA Regional Director, Len Lipovsky, were featured on the popular radio sports talk show hosted by the well-known, "Ray Scott." The entire show was devoted to horseshoe pitching and prompted two other promotional and fund raising activities. A week-long series of horseshoe events in behalf of the Minnesota Missing Children Organization got off to a start with Len pitching against the State Attorney General. It was scheduled to end with a celebrity team tournament

which brought a great deal of media coverage. Let's hope we can report more details on this in a future issue.

■ Iowa reports in their newsletter that fund raising activities for the "Putt Mossman" Indoor Arena got a real boost with a \$45,000 commitment from the Hardin County Board of Supervisors. Much of the effort toward this worthy project is led by Bob Walters and pitchers in the Eldora area. When realized, the Arena will be home to 12 clay courts in a 138 x 70 foot building and perhaps, the permanent home of the Iowa Hall of Fame.

■ If entries for the Stone Mountain W.T. reach or exceed those of recent years, we should be able to realize a total cash purse of \$100,000, the highest amount ever. The Las Vegas Showboat Open was just over \$25,000 to put them in second place for the year but what events would rank third through tenth in total prize money? The Ohio Fair isn't going to have an Invitational section this year so prize money will be reduced to \$5,000 for the Open section. Where will this place them? The Hermiston, Oregon Money Open will probably be in the \$5-\$6,000 range and the California State Championship is rumored to be in the \$10,000 range. Would this make them the third highest 1990 tournament in prize money? Let's have a little fun and see what tournaments around the country are paying out big prize money. All Tournament Directors who think they have an event that would make the top ten are encouraged to send me details. I'll publish the ranking and changes as details are made available.

Dear Editor,

We have all heard of or endured poor scorekeeping or a lack of scorekeepers. A scorekeeper must be as dedicated as the pitchers to sit out in various conditions for 50-cents a game.

Anyone attending the Las Vegas tournament in January couldn't help but notice how fast the scorekeeping chairs were filled. The \$1.00 scorekeeping fee solved a perennial problem! Why not have the \$1.00 fee at all the sanctioned tournaments? At \$2.00 per game, a few more pitchers might be encouraged to earn their scorekeeping fees back.

Perhaps now is the time to increase the fee and the ability of the scorekeepers. In a discussion among pitchers at the Valley of the Sun tournament, it was suggested that scorekeepers be approved (certified). In tournaments, the certified scorekeepers would fill the chairs first. A list of these approved scorekeepers should be maintained by tournament directors. A \$2.00 game fee should keep qualified people on the director's list.

Another problem is the pitchers having to dig in their pockets to pay the scorekeeper. A solution would be to increase the entry fee to include scorekeeping costs and have the scorekeeper receive his or her game pay when turning in the scoresheet to the tournament officials. Beats putting your hands in your pockets when they're covered with clay.

I just renewed my subscription to *Newsline*. I like the format and appreciate the time and work that it takes to put out such a good publication especially that I'm now the sports editor of our little local senior magazine.

I have a couple of suggestions that might make *Newsline* even better. I'd like to see more pictures; pictures of the officers, the players, the pits, the courts, etc. I'd like to see pictures of the ideal courts and pits. The city of Paso Robles just built ten new lighted horseshoe courts—they looked great but were not up to specifications and they had to be corrected at large expense. It would've been nice to have pictures of ideal courts to show the contractor.

Also, I'd like to see an instruction section in *Newsline* and also probably a profile of some of the players each month, like Walter Ray Williams, Jessie Gonzales, etc.

Also, I think that events like the World Senior Games in Utah should be covered. About 100 pitchers from 15 states, Canada, Mexico and from ages 55 to 80 pitched there last year, their third year, and more than doubling each year. The events were by age and by handicap, singles and doubles, men and women, and were well run by Dennis Ohms of Cedar City, Utah. The broader the coverage the better.

I'd like to see more events by age groups. Also clarification of the foul line and the 30 and 40 foot pitchers.

Reader Forum

Dear NHPA Members,

I would like to address an issue that has been brought to the front in recent issues of *Newsline*, but sprinkle a bit of common sense on them.

The whole idea of having people pitch from any distance between 30' and 41.5' is at best ludicrous. *Everybody* will move up to 30' instantly as in the case of a tournament held in Erie, Pennsylvania on October 8, 1989. When the opportunity arose, Walter Ray Williams, Jr., a 4-time World Champion at 40', immediately moved up to 30' and won the tournament. He obviously felt very confident that he could pitch as well, if not better, at 30'. If this former World Champion, who is still in his prime, felt that moving up 10' would help him score better, wouldn't pitchers of lesser ability see the advantage of moving up 10'. I started pitching horseshoes in 1987, if these rule changes were in effect then and I was told I could pitch anywhere between 30' and 41.5', I don't think it would have taken me long to figure out that closer is better.

We're always comparing our game to other professional sports. In the case of professional bowling and golf, you become a senior at age 50, not even legal retirement age. If we lowered our senior age limit at least to 62, we may develop senior classes on a local level. Players who have the ability to compete at 40' over 62 years of age should not ridicule those who have made the change. Are your clubs writing letters to high schools and youth organizations to develop Jr. pitching? Are your clubs approaching women's organizations or work places where a high population of women work to develop women's pitching? Let's take some basic steps to build on what we have instead of making changes in rules. The answer for *smaller or local* tournaments is simple, the NHPA has rules in place that state women, Jrs., and men over 70 can pitch at 30'. If there are not enough pitchers to have individual classes, either put all

these groups together and call it a 30' class or let them mix in with 40' pitchers where their percentages allow. Don't be a horseshoe pitching snob, these players can't change the fact they are women, Jrs. or seniors, let them play. With all the controversy being stirred up you would think tournaments were only being won by the few 30' pitchers that enter.

Thank you Mr. Loucks for allowing me the opportunity to express my opinion in the *Newsline*. The format of the *Newsline* makes a valuable contribution to horseshoe pitching by allowing all points of view to be heard.

Your *Newsline* is great. It is especially nice to know that horseshoe pitchers now have a means to express their views. Some of mine on recent issues published recently in *Newsline* are as follows.

About the 30' or 40' pitching distance controversy, the rule should be changed so that you can stand anywhere between this distance, regardless of age or sex. It is not clear to many people that 30' means any distance less than 40'.

If the strict division of distance is to remain, the foul line should then be changed so that it is even with the stake. However, a pitcher should have to keep both feet behind this line before throwing the shoe.

As to the question about how close shoes should count or cancel each other, I like it the way it is.

The 1989 W.T. video tape was very good. The best part was watching the World Champions who should be able to play for more prize money but the lower average pitcher should still be able to compete. I think one more rule should be applied to World Tournament play, especially the championship fight when on TV. The pitching shoes should be painted so they would look and show up better.

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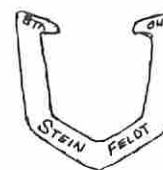

1990 NHPA Convention Preview by Dave Loucks

Stone Mountain, Georgia will be the site of our annual convention, tentatively planned for Monday, July 30th. As usual, delegates will be expected to come prepared and aware of the issues. This year's meeting will be longer than last because it is again the two year cycle when our Constitution and By-Law proposals are considered. Seventeen of them will be up for consideration this year, a couple of which will surely draw some heated debate. The 17 proposals are listed on the next page.

Three incumbents are seeking reelection. One new candidate has

created a bit of interest in the otherwise dull election campaign, by announcing her intent to seek the NHPA Secretary/Treasurer seat, a position that has gone unchallenged for many years.

The 1992 World Tournament site is also bringing more interest than we normally see. Four potential bidders have been in contact with us seeking information that may, or may not, lead to a bid proposal. Since the deadline for bid submission is April 15th, details on the possible sites will not appear in *Newsline* until the June issue.

Proposed Constitution and By-Law Changes

A majority of the Review Committee has agreed that the following have sufficient merit to be brought before the Delegates at the 1990 Convention.

1. Article II, Section 6 Change to read -

In order to constitute a quorum and have authority to transact the business of the NHPA, delegate spokespersons seated in convention must represent 51% of the total number of delegates authorized based upon the previous year's ending membership.

Reason - Article II, Section 6 presently calls for 20 delegates as a quorum. This was probably written in 1920 and submitted as part of our Articles of Incorporation when there were perhaps only 30 delegates in the entire U.S. Now, however, with over 350 delegates and the proxy vote, 20 delegates as a quorum does not make sense. Any president could call just one or two delegates together whose proxy votes totaled 20 or more...and pass anything he desired. Our Constitution has checks and balances. This is one which needs updating.

2. Article II, Section 7 Change to read -

Voting shall be by secret ballot, raised hand vote, ayes and nays or State roll call according to the discretion of the Chairman. The Chairman shall appoint an election committee to preside over all vote counting. The committee shall consist of at least five persons, two of which may be members of the executive council. Votes shall be counted immediately and made public as soon as possible. Voting by mail will not be allowed, nor shall substitution of a delegate/spokesperson representing a charter as a sole individual be allowed. Each State charter is entitled to vote its maximum delegates based on the previous ending year membership. States with no appointed delegates in convention will have no vote.

Reason - To speed up the counting.

3. Article III, Section 7 Add a 3rd paragraph to read -

The NHPA Rules Committee, appointed by the President, shall have the authority to make changes in the NHPA playing rules. Said changes need not go to the convention floor.

Reason - Let's give this committee the authority to do the job that they were appointed to do by our President.

4. Article III, Section 8 Change to read -

All Regional Directors and the Chairperson of the Con-

stitution and By-Laws Committee shall be informed of any Executive Council decisions pertaining to the NHPA Constitution and By-Laws.

Reason - We don't have a Chairperson for the By-Laws alone.

5. Article V, Section 1, Para 3 Change to read -

It is mandatory that all NHPA Council members, committee members, Regional Directors, Assistant Regional Directors, officers of State organizations and officers of individual charters be members of the NHPA.

Reason - To require Regional Directors to be members of the NHPA and since the Chairman Regional Director is the 5th Vice President, the Chairman Regional Director has become an obsolete title.

6. Article VI, Section 5 Change to read -

A charter responsibility is to hold an NHPA sanctioned State Championship yearly unless there is more than one charter in the state. Where two or more charters exist in the state, the State Tournament will be rotated unless otherwise agreed. The members from all charters within the state will be treated equally with regard to eligibility, entry fees and opportunity.

An NHPA member is eligible to pitch in the State Championships of only one state each year. The member must hold his/her NHPA card in that state.

Reason - There is nothing in our Constitution that now spells out the Charter responsibility to hold a sanctioned State Championship. Further, there is no provision as to how it is to be handled when two or more Charters are involved nor is a time frame for pitchers mentioned. This change would correct all that.

7. Article VI, Section 5, Para 2 Change to read -

An NHPA member shall pitch in the State Championships of only one state in any 11 month period.

Reason - The current rule has no time frame, so that technically a player cannot change states even after being moved for several years.

8. Article VII, Section 2 Change to read -

The winner of each division of the authorized World Tournament shall be declared Champion Horseshoe Pitcher of the World of their respective division, and shall hold the title until the next authorized World Tournament.

Reason - The rule should apply to all division champions.

9. Article VII, Section 3 Add a 3rd paragraph to read - Pitchers' averages must be based on his/her three highest percentage tournaments pitched during the year preceding the tournament date.

Reason - To standardize averages.

10. Article VII, Section 5, Para 2 Change to read - All World Tournament play-offs in all classes are to be included in total World Tournament statistics.

Reason - These stats should be included for all classes.

11. Article VII, Section 8, Para 3

Omit the last sentence that states if a Jr. does compete in the men's division of a sanctioned tournament he must pitch the men's distance of 40 feet.

12. Article VII, Section 10 Add:

A senior women's tournament may be held for ladies 60 and older.

13. Article VII, Section 12

Delete or move to Rules.

Reason - Count-all should not be eliminated as part of any state tournament where the state feels that it is a viable system and likewise for the World Tournament if it is someday felt that it is a viable replacement for the cancellation system in at least part of the World Tournament.

14. Article VII, Section 15 Change conditions 2 & 3 to read - "A minimum bid of \$40,000 in cash prizes plus trophies is offered."

Reason - To clarify the wording of the condition to apply as it has been understood and previously bid.

15. Article IX, Section 3, Para 1 Change to read -

A membership card is a combined State-National card with the *Newsline* publication included. To be entitled to this card and enjoy its privileges a member must pay the national dues of \$22 plus the amount set by his State Charter. Families with two or more NHPA members will have a special rate of \$30 plus the amount set by the State Charter.

Reason - This way the *Newsline* would reach every member of the NHPA and this would keep all our members better informed.

16. Article IX, Section 6, Para 1-4 Change to read -

1. All NHPA Officers shall receive an annual compensation derived from a base amount paid the NHPA Secretary/Treasurer.

1.1 The annual base paid to the Secretary/Treasurer shall be \$10,000 plus 50 cents per adult NHPA member up to 25,000 members.

1.2 The NHPA President shall receive 30% of the Sec/Treas. total.

1.3 All NHPA Vice Presidents shall receive 5% of the Sec/Treas. total.

1.4 The NHPA Magazine Editor shall receive 20% of the Sec/Treas. total.

1.5 The NHPA Publicity Director, if not a Vice Pres., shall receive 3% of the Sec/Treas. total.

1.6 The Sanctioned Club/League Director shall receive 15 cents for each adult member in the Sanctioned Club/League program.

1.7 The Regional Director Chairman shall receive 5 cents annually for each adult NHPA member.

2. NHPA Regional Directors shall annually receive the greater of \$100.00 or 25 cents per NHPA Member in their region based on the year-end report of the NHPA Secretary/Treasurer.

3. All NHPA positions listed in 1.1 through 1.7 above, who attend the World Tournament, will receive a travel allowance in accordance with the current Standard Operating Procedures (SOP's) guide of the NHPA. Those with dual responsibilities can receive only one travel allowance.

Reason - Current NHPA compensation allowances are out of date and grossly below anything reasonable for the work required of today's NHPA Officers. Tying compensation to a common base allows flexibility without the need to later come back to the delegates. As the membership grows or declines, so will the work responsibility and compensation will vary accordingly.

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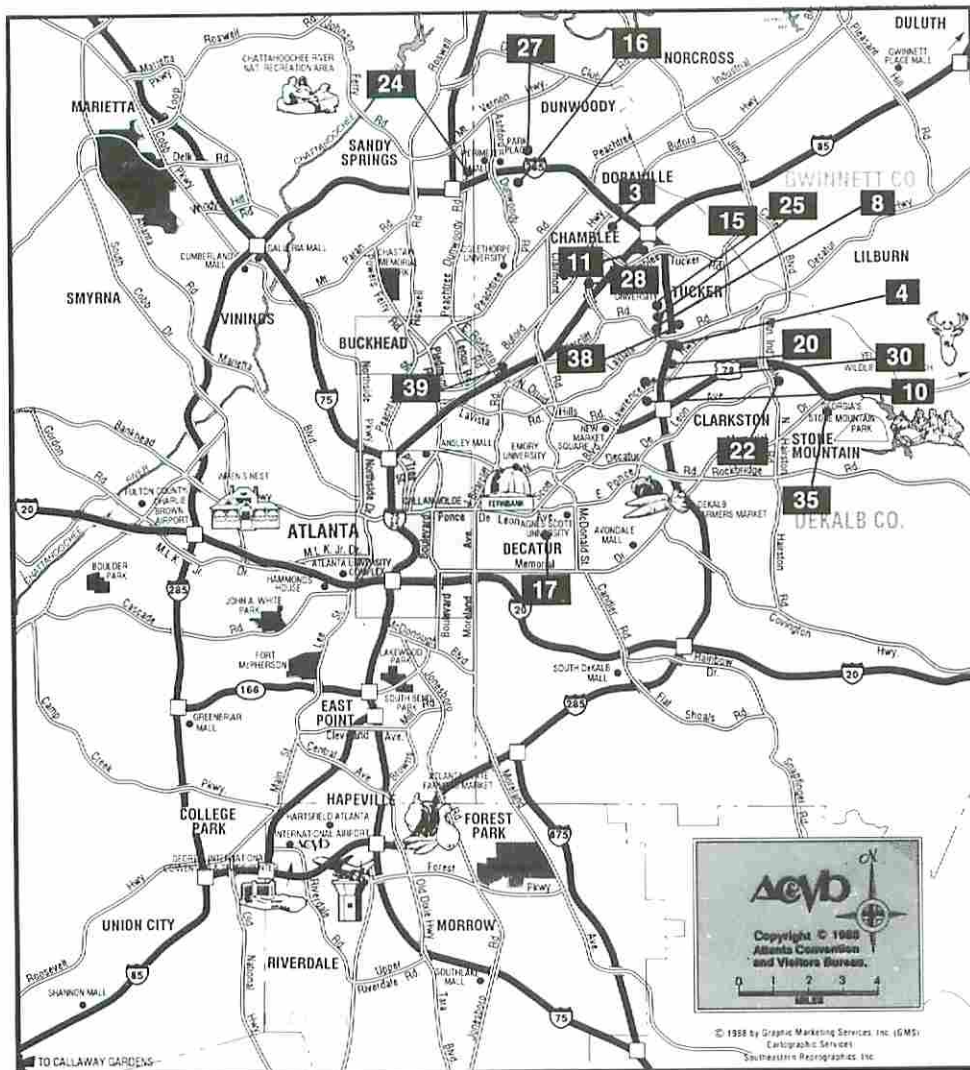

For A Healthy Pitch

by Debby Michaud

Fluid - We all drink fluids every day of our lives. Most of us probably drink more fluids when we are active and, for many horseshoe pitchers, that definitely means that we drink more fluids during a horseshoe tournament. However, there are some pitfalls in our approach to hydrating ourselves (getting liquids into our bodies).

The first pitfall is that the thirst mechanism in our otherwise very well balanced body is one of the poorest systems that we have. By the time we feel thirsty we are probably already "a couple of pints low" as a mechanic might say. Our bodies just don't warn us soon enough that we are dry. Because of that, we have to **plan** how much to drink according to our activity and the weather, and then we have to **make** ourselves drink that much (or more to be on the safe side). Figure it this way; we can always get rid of the extra but we cannot manufacture more out there on the horseshoe court!

Another pitfall is what we've learned in the past. Many of us learned from coaches or parents that we should not drink any liquid, especially anything cold, while we are exercising. That was never true, but at one time it was thought to be true, sometimes with dangerous outcomes.

What should we drink and how much? A good rule of thumb is to drink at least 12 ounces of water before we even start competing and then to drink about 8 ounces of fluid every hour on a cool day or every half hour on a hot day.

Finally we must consider what to drink. This is not going to be what some of you want to hear BUT! - We should NOT drink anything with alcohol or caffeine before or during competition. Caffeine may raise our blood pressure and our pulse rate and the competition is already doing that! Enough already! Caffeine also constricts our blood vessels, which means that they get narrower, and that means less blood supply to all parts of our body-our heart, kidneys, muscles, etc. We need as much blood supply to all of those parts while we are pitching as possible.

Now the one cup of coffee that we normally drink every morning is OK, I'm sure, but more caffeine than that, even in the form of colas and tonics, is not really advisable. As far as alcohol, that is a depressant that may dull our reflexes and our eye-hand coordination. In addition, both alcohol and caffeine have a dehydrating effect. Our bodies just do their utmost(s) to get rid of these things and, in the process, we lose a lot of fluid that our kidneys would otherwise conserve. Save your caffeine and beer for after the match.

Probably the best thing to drink for almost everyone is just plain water. If you drink juice or some of the commercial sports drinks, you may want to dilute them to get more plain water in your system while avoiding that "high" that some of us may feel after a soda or juice. The problem with that "high" is that it may be temporary for some of us (me, for instance) and we can suddenly come down to a level of even lower energy than we had before. Another thing to do is to drink cold

fluids: these are absorbed into the system faster and also have a cooling effect on the inside of the body, a very important factor on a warm day.

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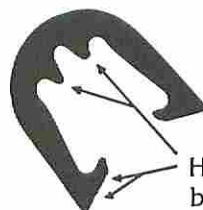
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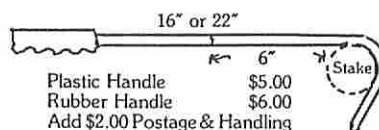
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A Handshake Across The Border

East is East, and West is West, and never the twain shall meet." This famous quotation, borrowed yet another time from a poem by the celebrated Rudyard Kipling a hundred years ago does not fit Canada's horseshoe pitching world today, (if it ever did), for a close coordination of effort exists across Canada from Coast to Coast. Canada's nine Provinces with one hundred affiliated clubs East and West, are united through one National Organization—*Horseshoe Canada*.

Edward H. Murray of Vernon, British Columbia, a former Saskatchewan cattle rancher, now semi-retired Security Guard, is President of *Horseshoe Canada*, the sole governing body for horseshoes in Canada. Ed has been a paid-up member of NHPA and the Canadian Association for fifteen years. He was inducted into Saskatchewan Horseshoe Pitchers' Hall of Fame in 1982, and into Canadian Horseshoe Pitchers' Hall of Fame in 1989.

Accomplishments attributed to Ed Murray in the last twenty years clearly indicate that he is highly qualified to head Canada's horseshoe pitching world. Here are some highlights: Organized horseshoe clubs in Saskatchewan—Sports Columnist for a local newspaper with weekly write-ups on horseshoe pitching—Founder and Editor/Publisher of "Canadian Horseshoe Pitcher's Yearbook," an annual issue—Historian, photographer and recordkeeper for Horseshoe Pitching in Canada including all provinces East to West—Formed horseshoe clubs in British Columbia and served on Executive Committee of B.C. Horseshoe Pitchers' Association—Edits and publishes a Horseshoe Canada Newsletter four times a

year. In addition, (in spare time) he worked behind scenes as Constitutional Advisor for newly formed Provincial Associations, namely: Nova Scotia, Alberta and British Columbia.

"There is much, much *more*," Ed claims, catching a second breath. Among the *more* worthy achievements, surely realized with assistance and cooperation from leading members across Canada are: Created a National Hall of Fame; Established Court Supervisors; Developed a Nation-wide membership card and a National Awards Program. Has some Statisticians that now work with computers, and he witnesses a greater paid membership than ten years ago.

Lest it be overlooked, here's yet another Murray *more*. Four years ago Ed initiated a horseshoe pitching program in Vernon, B.C. High School—the only one of its kind in Canada—it's strictly a local arrangement

through Physical Education teachers of the school in coordination with Vernon's Horseshoe Club. Each school year, fresh from summer vacation, this program starts with coaching and instruction provided by Vernon Club members on their home courts. Forty-seven top players met in final playoffs in 1989 to determine High School Champions.

Canada's National total paid membership is 3,035, of these Western Canada claims 1,229. Segregation of age classes are: Men Intermediate, 60-65; Seniors 65 plus, and a Senior class favored by a foul line to thirty feet. Women's Intermediate, 55—no Senior class. It is said there are 10,000 horseshoe pitchers in Canada who are not members, but play regularly in various clubs and leagues that have no affiliation with their provincial association—none of these enter sanctioned tournaments.

Western Canada takes in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. Eastern Canada consists of Ontario and Quebec plus three Maritime Provinces; Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Newfoundland, like North West Territories and Yukon, are not affiliated with *Horseshoe Canada*, nonetheless, have many pitchers who compete in their own local tournaments.

Canadian National Championships, open to all Club members of the country, alternate each year, one in Eastern Canada, next year in the West—1989 games were held in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Next year's tournament is scheduled for Portage La Prairie, Manitoba. This alternation method not only promotes game equality in all parts of the country, but gives equal game exposure every-

where. In this rotation system, each province, which must bid for the tournament, is given equal chance to host it. Canada's system does not call for an East-West playoff. One official Horseshoe Canada National meeting takes place yearly at this national tournament.

Many other big tournaments take place each year in Canada, but only two Regional Championships, Western Canada and Maritimes Provinces including Ontario and Quebec. Each province has its own association, its own affiliated clubs, statisticians, awards programs, etc. Executive members of each province meet once a year to determine when and where the Western and Eastern Championships will be held. A host province runs the tournament following agreed-upon guidelines.

Regional Western Canada Championship games are called "Western Canada Classic," using the word Classic because it is open to all Canadians and U.S. pitchers if they wish to enter; if someone from the U.S. should win, he/she would be named Western Canada Champion; none yet has won it.

In the East, a half-dozen International Class A Open Tournaments alternate locations annually to attract pitchers from both sides of the border—by name these are: Elmer Hohl Ringer Classic; Elmer Hohl Memorial; Sandy McLachlin and Frank Weaver Invitationals; Hamilton, Ontario, mixed 65% Doubles; Ontario-New York Friendship games; Games with more description follow:

Michigan U.S.A.-Ontario Friendship Tournament

An annual International affair for the past 15 years, sponsored by Ontario Khaki Club of Wellesley, and Kalamazoo and adjacent-area Clubs in Michigan. These games alternate locations to host this popular horseshoe pitching event.

Minnesota-Ontario International Peace Tournaments

Arranged on a local basis between high schools with annual games played for team honors only (no individual awards). These well-attended games are looked forward to with enthusiasm to demonstrate, yet another time, results of coaching and instruction received during the year. Many busses loaded with students make this trip, some to pitch, some to cheer, according to observations by Paul Carriere.

Canadian Senior Games

Cover many sports, including horseshoe pitching, a favorite in Eastern Canada, in Maritime provinces, and in some Western provinces. These games are sponsored by Provincial Departments of Health and Recreation outside the realm of *Horseshoe Canada*.

Paul Carriere, in the East, continues his tireless activity for horseshoes by demonstrations and coaching from place to place on demand. His recently prepared Sports Governing-Body Technique Manual for horse-

shoe pitchers has been favorably accepted throughout the Provinces.

Canada has little chance to engage in wintertime horseshoe pitching unless it be indoors. Only a few places are reported to have year-round heated facilities; they are in Alberta and Ontario.

Promotion of horseshoe pitching in other countries is encouraged by *Horseshoe Canada*. "We must set examples by showing how we do it at home, act as advisors and give encouragement." Following this dictum, two of Canada's leading pitchers accompanied a group of U.S. enthusiasts to demonstrate horseshoe pitching in Japan late in 1989. In Paris, France, horseshoe pitching demonstrations were held in 1988 at the big French Sports Festival—exhibitions were given by Andre LeClerc, a many-time Quebec Champion.

A cooperative, reciprocal agreement exists between Canada and U.S. in that pitchers from either country may cross-border and pitch in tournaments sanctioned by their National Associations on presentation of a home-country paid-up membership card; all can be grateful for this—a handshake across the border!

Sandy

Hardly a sound could be heard. The crowd was tense...its attention hanging on every shoe pitched. Even the wind gently stirring the surrounding trees seemed to have subsided...and the nearby rippling stream could barely be heard. The 1989 Women's World Horseshoe Pitching Championship was about to be decided.

The final game, under a 40 shoe format designed specifically for television, was being played. Old pro Phyllis Negaard with 5 world titles had fought her way to the top...and the right to meet number 1...Sandy McLachlin. Sandy, with her 13-2 record in regular play vs. Negaard's 12-3 would ordinarily have been declared the champion. But this was a new day...a new era...television had entered the picture. Our sport had to progress. The champion would be determined by this one final game.

The pressure was there. Even the spectators could feel it. Early in the game, Negaard, *missing both shoes* handed Sandy a 9-3 lead...but came fighting back to go ahead 21-15 after 34 shoes. She then missed one ringer. Sandy, by throwing two, could pull to within 3 points...and with 4 shoes to go, could still win. But it was not to be...*she missed both shoes...*giving Negaard 4 points and a 25-15 lead with only 4 shoes left. Sandy's chances appeared hopeless. They were. A heartbroken 18 year old walked off the courts struggling with her emotions. Was there a tear in her eye? Maybe. But if so, not for long. After all, a girl whose heredity came from Scottish, English, Dutch and Belgium grandparents was made of tougher stuff than that. Besides, her grandfather had once told her *McLachlins don't cry.*

Talking to her later, I asked, —

Do you feel you should have won the championship under the previous format?

Yes and no. As long as it's done this way every year, *whether we have television or not*, it's O.K. I wanted to win but I have to look at it this way...Suppose Phyllis had finished first in our regular 15 game round robin...and then I came along and won the championship *in just one game.* I know she would be hurt, just as I am. If the tournament goes back to our previous format, then I feel I have a right to be upset...even though I know it won't do any good.

Sandy, you're only 18. You've come a long way in a very short period of time. Before you finish your horseshoe career you will win a lot of big tournaments and world championships. Now, I'm going to ask you a few questions

which our readers (and your fans) would like to know. The first one is this... After winning the Junior Girls' World championship in 1986 with 67.3% ringers, you astounded the horseshoe pitching world by entering the women's division the next year at age 16, winning the world championship, and setting a world record by averaging 88.2% ringers. How do you account for this tremendous jump in your average?

I had always thrown a *flip shoe*, but early in the spring of 1986 I decided to go to the *one and a quarter turn*. I was throwing Elmer Hohl shoes. The week before the W.T. I pitched my *first 60% tournament*...then hit the 67.3% at Ainsworth. I came back from there, pitched 74% in a women's event and two tournaments later, that first magic 80 percent. It seemed like after that *first 60% tournament*, everything else was easier. I never looked back. As I became used to the 1¼ turn, my confidence took a giant leap upward.

Things You Should Know

Do you still throw Elmer Hohls?

No, my brother's shoes, the M&M Specials came out late in 1986, so I changed over to them. It was my brother, Kevin, you know, who started me playing when I was 13. We played at 'Happy Hills'...a campground located near London and my home.

Let me get a little personal...What about your education and your goals in life...other than winning more W.T.s?

I went to Dawn Central Public School near my home and finished in June 1988. In September, 1989 I enrolled at St. Clair College, Chatham, Ontario on a part time basis because I work for an accounting firm as a book-keeper and receptionist. My career objective is to become a CGA (Certified General Accountant).

Who would you list as your toughest competitor?

Diane Cantin...without a doubt. There are many tough pitchers out there, but Diane seems to be the most consistent and is always a threat. I can guarantee that if you want to win a game against her, you'll have to pitch extremely well...and throw an awful lot of shoes. Diane lives in Quebec...a long distance from me...so I don't get a chance to play against her except at the W.T.s.

Sandy, you always look calm and collected and not under any stress when you're pitching. Are you really that way...or do you feel tension at times? If so, how do you combat it?

I may look calm but it's only a few times that I really am. The biggest thing I try to do is to think of something else...and keep my nerves as steady as possible.

Sandy, I know of no one in women's horseshoes who has a brighter future in our sport than you. There are many mountains out there to climb...and from your record to date, you'll reach the top of every one. Good luck!

The National Horseshoe Pitchers Association of America and Horseshoe Canada have some agreements they live by as relates to tournament entry in the two countries and the pitching of certain horseshoes. I will try to explain them for the benefit of charters, provinces, members and the tournament directors involved.

If a pitcher from the United States travels to Canada to pitch in a Canadian tournament, the Canadian tournament director will honor an NHPA Membership card and will not require the U.S. pitcher to purchase any kind of Canadian card. The Canadian tournament director absolutely will not honor a state card, which isn't supposed to exist in the first place. and will require that person to purchase a Horseshoe Canada card to compete in that event.

If a pitcher from Canada travels to the USA to pitch in an American tournament, the American tournament director will honor a horseshoe Canada card and will not require the Canadian pitcher to

purchase any kind of American card. The American tournament director absolutely will not honor a provincial card and will require that person to purchase an NHPA card to compete in that event.

When a pitcher from the United States travels to Canada to pitch, he is permitted to pitch any brand of horseshoe that is sanctioned in the United States or any brand that is sanctioned in Canada. When a pitcher from the United States pitches in the United States he can only pitch a brand of horseshoes that is sanctioned by the NHPA.

When a pitcher from Canada travels to the United States to pitch, he is permitted to pitch any brand of horseshoe that is sanctioned in Canada or any brand that is sanctioned in the United States. When a pitcher from Canada pitches in Canada he can pitch any shoe sanctioned in the USA or in Canada.

Failure to follow the above is a violation of the rules and agreement set down by the NHPA and Horseshoe Canada.

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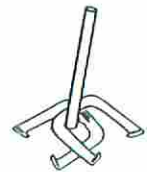

Calgary, Alberta will be the host city for the Canadian Seniors Games in Canada for the first games in the summer of 1991. Horseshoe pitching is included and the games are open to Canadians age 55 or older.

The Illinois "youngster" goes out daily by himself and pitches 50-60 shoes. He throws 50 per cent or better.

NEW ENGLAND

The new courts in Hanson, Maine, courtesy of the hard work by Bob Gratton and the new courts at Shrewsbury, Massachusetts, courtesy of the hard work of Bill Lawson, Vinnie Mattus, Harry Schriker and Dave Martin will rival any courts in New England.

Roy Robertson of Carver, helped build horseshoe courts at the MCI prison facility.

MARYLAND

Glen Keilholtz of Frederick, came away with top honors recently as the first tournament of the year was held at Pat and JJ's indoor courts in Annapolis. Other winners included George Hopkins in Class B, Jim Annadale in Class C, and Frank Dove in Class D.

This marks the beginning of the 1990 pitching season in Maryland which for the past three years, starts with the "3 in a row" tournaments in Annapolis. The two indoor courts are owned and

operated by Pat and John Clow of the Davidsonville Horseshoe Club and have provided a place to "take off the winter chill" during January, February and March each year for many horseshoe pitchers.

MICHIGAN

America's most famous senior citizen horseshoe pitcher resides in the White House.

The World's best Senior pitcher is from Wakefield. Ray Hill of Pike Location defeated Red Henton of Iowa, a former Senior's Champion, for the 1989 title at Spearfish, S.D. Down 36-16 in a playoff, his comeback included 27 ringers in 30 shoes closing with a 78% game. It was Hill's second championship in the 65 and over division. He won his first title at Eau Claire in 1987 with a record percentage of 76.6. He was second in 1988 at Pleasanton.

Hill pitches locally in the Range Horseshoe League. In 1989 tournaments he finished first in Marshfield, second at Eau Claire and third at Duluth, Minnesota.

MISSOURI

Some exciting things are happening in Kansas City concerning a World Tournament bid for 1992. We hope to hear more in a later *Newsline* issue.

Vicki Winston, 10-time Women's World Champion starts 1990 as her fifth decade as a participant in our great sport. She started her career in the early 1950's and still is one of the outstanding horseshoe pitchers in the World.

Husband Earl Winston is 1st vice president of NHPA and brother, Barry, is the 2nd VP and chairman of the NHPA Rules Committee. Earl is chairman of the Hall of Fame Committee.

The Chapelle name became known July 26, 1955 when Vicki and Barry's father, Cletus, a fine Oregon pitcher, became the victim of Ted Allen's World Record 72 ringers in a row. The score was 9-9 when Ted started his string. During his 72 straight, Cletus had 24 doubles and shot 82.6% to Ted's 96.7.

OREGON

Officers for the coming year are Elmer Otnes, president; Rick Rebman, 1st vice president; Lowell Davis, 2nd vice president; Bill Graham, secretary-treasurer; Barry Chapelle, statistician and Ethel Davis, Editor, *Oregon Ringer Review*.

As most state people know, Ben Wiedrich is the top pitcher in the state. Last year he won 65, lost 8, finished first nine times, second twice. The Oregon City native has been the top pitcher the last three years and in 1989 scored 2811 ringers in 3830 shoes for a 73.39 percentage. His high game was 91.18.

Ridge Leggett of Roseburg finished 2-3-2 the last three years. In 1989 he closed with a 69.64 percent with a high game of 88.63. Third place went to Marge McLeod, who moved from 10th to 7 and then third with a 66.58 percent and high game of 85.29. The second high game for 1989 was pitched by Lowell Davis of Creswell with a 90.74.

TEXAS

Most of use know that Coke Bowker and Roger Vogel are the "Stars" in Texas, but did you know that back a ways, E.J. McFarland won 13 titles in a row

from 1945 thru 1957. He got off the 13 mark in 1972, then added three more titles in 1974, 1975 and 1977...Then the "Youngsters" took over...McFarland was from Houston. Marvin Burgess of Ballinger was the next "hot" pitcher, winning 10 titles.

Jerry Babb of Del Rio, was listed as the early women's champion, winning 10 titles from 1977 thru 1986. In 1976 Eddie Posey is listed as the first junior Boys champion, taking the crown also in 1977 and 1979. Brenda Engelhardt was the first junior Girls champion in 1986.

SOUTHERN UTAH

Loren Condie was the top money winner last year with a \$299.00 total. Second on the list was J.J. Steffen with \$255.00. Condie was also the top percentage player with a 51.5%. G.C. Dodds was the leading game winner with 124. In second was Glen McAllister with 118. Jenifer Sorensen won 51 to top the juniors, finishing second (18.7) behind Jake Ashcraft with a 24.7 high percentage.

Most improved last year were Chuck Humphreys (6.7), with Kent Pendleton, McAllister and J.J. Steffen tied for second with 5.5% improved. Jeffrey Coulter topped the juniors in the improved division with 8.3 increase. Jenifer Sorensen was second with 8.1 over average.

Gabe Ohms was the top junior pitcher with a 42.05 figure.

Larry Lowitz will be taking over as editor of the WSHA Newsletter. First vice president Ed Tveden was the former editor and he did a great job with the publication.

WISCONSIN

Brian Repinski dispelled the axiom that a tournament director will perform better in someone else's tournament. After losing his first 35 point game to the state champion, Don Kangas, Repinski went on to pitch all wins and become the first Class A Champ in his own house, Royal Wood. Six large courts with that dustless synthetic clay spread across a volleyball court provided the cleanest indoor layout these pitchers have ever seen. The long balcony above the near bank of pits was a perfect viewing area...a somewhat new and unique way to watch the game of horseshoes.

PLAYER OF THE YEAR-POINT LIST. This new award, to be presented at the 1990 State Tournament, is based on a point system for WHPA approved tournaments between August 1, 1989 and July 31, 1990. Singles tournaments only. POINTS AWARDED: 3 for each tournament entered and for each 3rd place; 5 for each second place, 10 points for first. All points double for state tournament.

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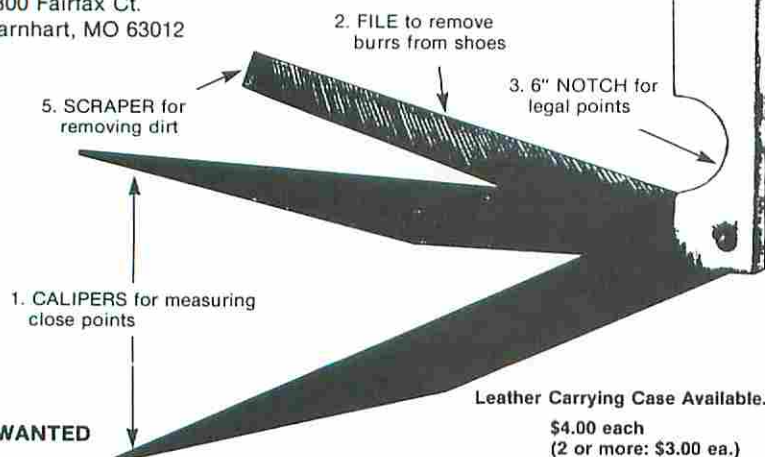
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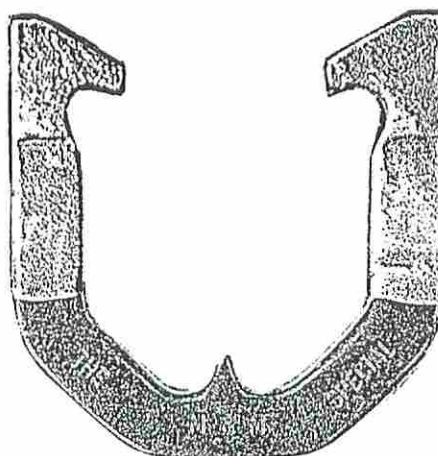
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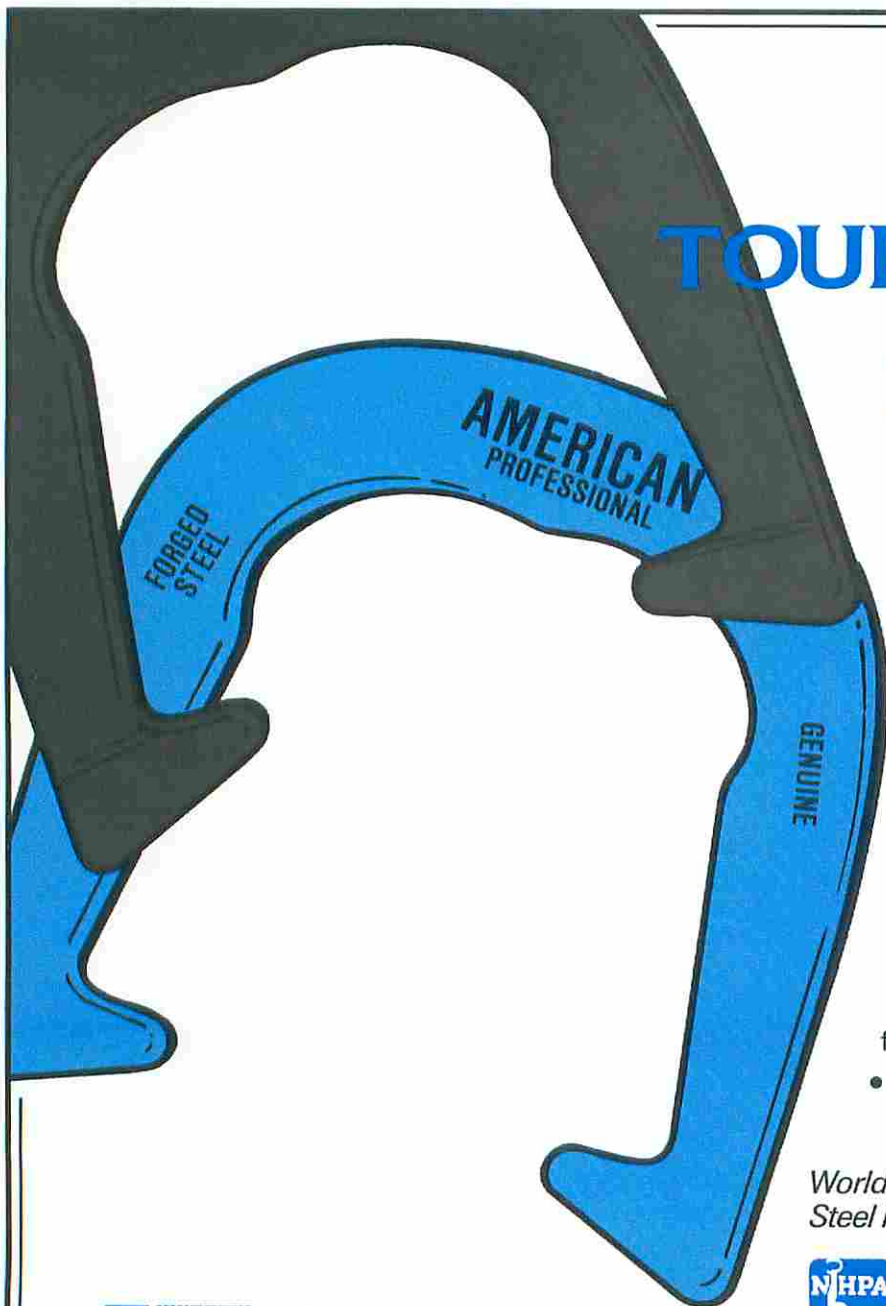
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
