



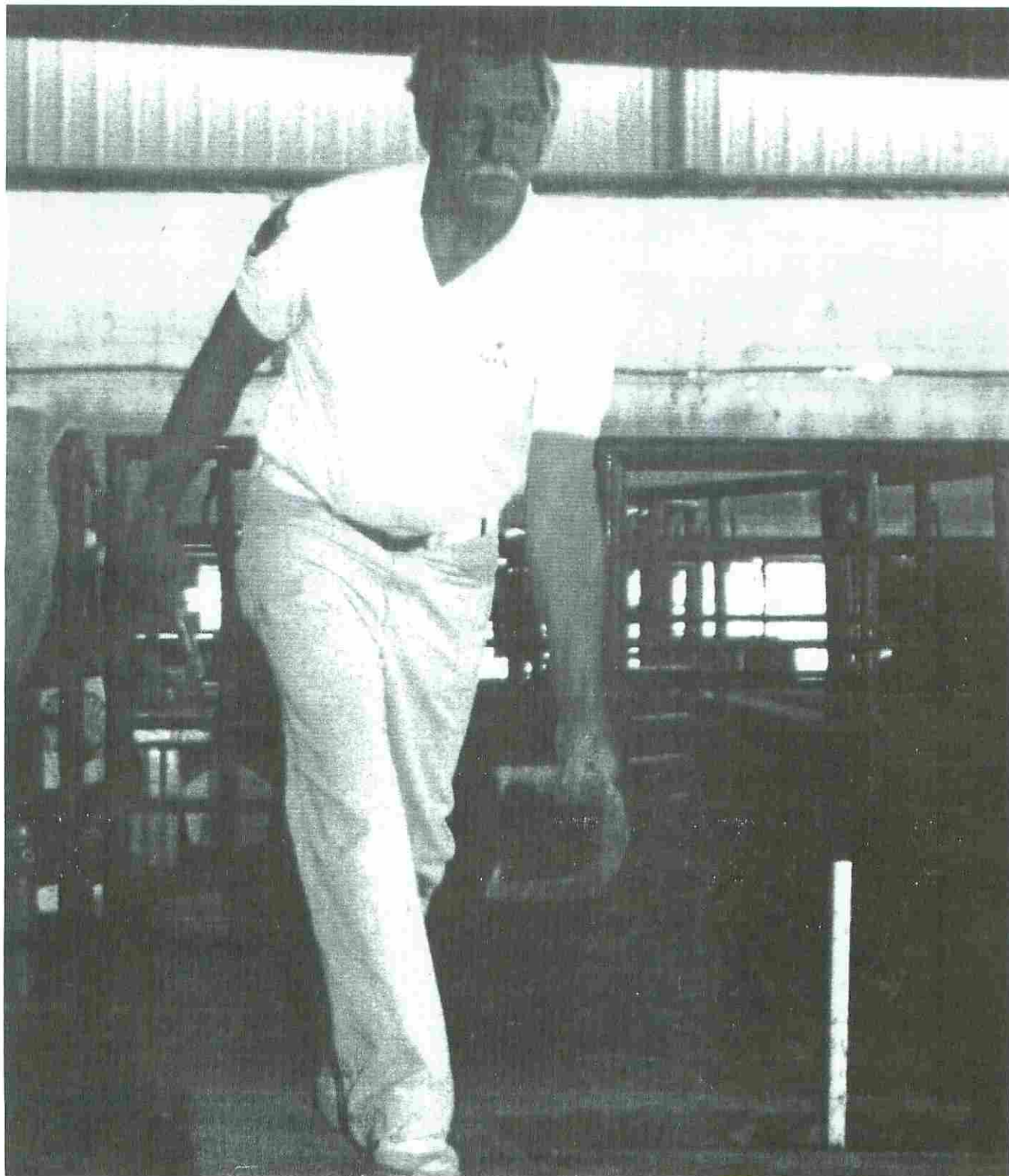

President's Message

The weather was beautiful and the hospitality great during my visit to the Mississippi Gulf Coast November 1-5. I had several meetings with the officers of the Mississippi Horseshoe Pitchers Association and the directors of the Coast Coliseum and Convention Center, site of the 1991 World Tournament.

The Coliseum is a large, modern, air-conditioned facility where 36 clay horseshoe courts will be intalled on the arena floor with elevated spectator seats completely surrounding the arena for great viewing. Our hosts are going all out to make this the best ever World Tournament. Certainly the facility, with space for up to 300 RV's on the grounds, offers the most comfort and amenities we have ever seen for a World Tournament. The coliseum is the site of many large spectator events each year and even while we pitch, other events will be taking place in the convention center, which is attached, but a different building.

Due to the large size of the coliseum facility, with many rooms and corridors buried beneath the seats, logistics, with the timely flow of people and paper, become a major challenge. Only certain rooms are available to us and those tend to be spread out around the facility. While this presents administrative challenges for our working staff, it will also mean some tighter restraints on pitchers relating to movement after check-in and taking to the courts.

Entry to the coliseum will be controlled and limited to specific doors, to help the flow of things. No hand carried coolers will be allowed into the building. Permanent indoor concession stands for food and drink will be open during the tournament. The facilities are comfortable enough that

many will want to spend all day there. Those that want to spend some time outdoors will find some special installed practice courts among the trees and grass of the coliseum grounds. A few hundred yards away, the white sands and water of the gulf coast beckon.

I am encouraged and impressed with the fund raising activities to date. A further 20% bid deposit will be sent by the hosts in December. The coliseum is working on some major sponsors and I am pursuing a special incentive program that could be exciting if all the pieces can be pulled together. The Mississippi Association is also doing their part in fund raising and handling all the various details required at the local level. All NHPA Charters are asked to support the 1991 World Tournament by taking an ad in the program. Ads can be purchased for as little as \$45.00. Donations from "friends of horseshoes" are encouraged, as is the purchase of shirts, caps or other souvenir items advertised in this *Newsline* issue.

Make your plans to attend the 1991 World Tournament now! July/August is vacation time on the Gulf Coast and many motels are already booking up, especially the lower priced ones. The five motel/hotels advertised in this magazine have all set aside blocks of rooms for horseshoe pitchers. They are within one mile of the coliseum, three within ¼ mile. Call the toll free "Tourism Hot Line" 1-800-237-9493, for details on these or any of the other 10-12 motels that are located within two miles of the coliseum. When calling the hotels direct, be sure to tell them you are a horseshoe pitcher affiliated with the NHPA to get any NHPA discounts.

Dave's Court Report

■ J.J. and Shirley Steffen of Monticello, Utah sent in their *Newsline* renewal and included a \$40.00 donation toward the Georgia W.T. shortfall. Thanks, we very much appreciate your support and the previous donations from Minnesota and Arizona. No details yet on Georgia's position.

■ The Hibbing, Minnesota Horseshoe Club has plans to erect a 70' x 170' roof structure over their courts. They have received a \$30,000 grant to go along with \$10,000 expected from the city and \$11,500 already raised by the club. Future building plans call for a clubhouse.

■ The Idaho Charter has initiated an Association newsletter called *Four Dead*. Jim McCue of Idaho Falls is the editor and has just published their second issue. *Four Dead* will focus on state, national and local items.

■ Horseshoe pitchers are a pretty close knit group, generally showing respect for one another. But, we must have our share of bad apples. During the second day of play at the Illinois State Tournament, someone made off with \$760 cash in bundled envelopes, in a storage box, that was to have been the prize money for that day. While pitchers received their prize money by check from the ILSHPA bank account, the entire loss was covered by the

personal generosity of charter secretary, Robert Switzer.

■ It's much too early to determine the level of seriousness, but five different sites have indicated a bidding interest in the 1993 or 94 World Tournaments. Let's hope that at least two or more get real serious by the April 15th deadline. Competition is what the game is all about.

■ About this time last year, the NHPA began a serious feasibility study into the possibility of establishing a computer stat center that would gather and maintain averages on all members who pitched in reported NHPA sanctioned tournaments. Initial studies indicated costs to be too high, with several intangibles. The thought was put on hold. The passage of the 3 highest tournament rule for averages at this year's convention has brought another proposal which we are now studying for cost effectiveness.

■ Have you ordered or yet seen the video on the 1990 Stone Mountain W.T.? It's 2 hours long and includes interviews, shots of every class and extended viewing of the final championship games for the men and women. The cost, including shipping is just \$22.95. Dear Dave,

The issues raised in the August *Newsline* by E. Wayne Winston, Bob West, Stu Snyder and Rowland A. Rupp were timely. Debby Michaud, Carl Steinfeldt and D.D. Cottrell added to make this an outstanding publication.

These articles show that our players are analyzing the ancient game of Horseshoes. They are searching for ways to enhance the sport. Social conditions are constantly changing; Modern High Technology affects all sports. Horseshoe players are meeting the need to search for improvements in the game.

The suggestion to use a 2.88 inch opening, in the shoe, for persons pitching from 30 feet is on target. It should remove most of the arguments over the issue of fairness. We could become one of the first sports to have men and women, young and old, competing with each other. The sport needs the combined enthusiasm of both sexes and age groups. The idea demands serious consideration.

However, one problem remains. A shoe thrown from 40 feet will hit the stake at a higher velocity than one thrown from 30 feet. The likelihood of losing a well thrown ringer will be greater from the longer throwing

distance. The count all and alternate first pitch method for scoring will reduce the effect of velocity difference.

Having to throw shoes to a stake, contaminated by the opponent's shoes, does not help make the game more popular. The average player and spectators soon detect the unfairness of the, ringer cancellation and winner going first, method of play.

The game of Horseshoes, in several other ways, discourages the average players. They are the minority. This should be of concern to NHPA members. Further discussion in *Newsline* letters and articles is needed.

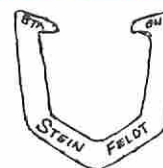

Life After The World Championship

DON TITCOMB, World Champion in 1960, recalls verbally on that outstanding tournament back in time when pitching was a physical marathon, a game prolonged by repeated cancellations, one ringer atop another, a score advancing slowly toward 50 points that marked an end to another game.

Outstanding was this deciding game, Titcomb vs Steinfeldt; so impressive to view. The score sheet reprinted here represents an enviable pictorial record. Referring to this game, Don said, "I didn't get tired physically, but I did mentally — pitching horseshoes is a game of concentration."

Is Don thinking as a nonchalant gentleman when he remarks, "To have won the Championship was nothing to gloat over; I never really accepted the fact that I was World Champion. There were so many over-80% pitchers in that day (twice as many as today) that the title could have gone to any one of us." To continue this discourse in his free-speech manner, he says, "The title had no affect on my life; friends didn't behave differently toward me, for I remained one among them — just plain old Don."

"To prepare for the strenuous grind of a World Tournament, I set a rigorous training program; starting in April I pitched 100 shoes a day, then 200 in May, 300 in June, 400 in July, then not one more shoe until the tournament in August. I say again, I never really accepted the fact that I was World Champion, it didn't seem real."

"My pitching career started when in Jr. High School, age 12. As a junior I won the California State Championship in 1940 with 50% (there were no Jr. classes then); entered my first World Tournament in 1947 and pitched 70%. In some twenty World Tournaments my lowest average percentage was 70.2 and highest 86.1 in 1957.

Trophies mounted by the bushel. At one time I had 40 cubic feet, two Mayflower moving crates full. To make room for more, I disassembled some and gave others away to Service Clubs, various organizations, and to schools. I kept those that were special to me, they sit around my house today."

Don didn't say these were collecting dust, but judging from the many trophies I saw adorning Ted Allen's home a few years ago, their sheen long since faded, yielded to nature's every-present dust of life, one cannot but expect that those sitting in Don's house have lost their brilliance too.

"My life work has been in landscape gardening, good outdoor work that has kept me in top physical condition. I'm now retired, but keep busy putting on some 60 shows a year before estimated audiences totalling 800,000 spectators, many of which are attracted to my performance because I've had the title "World Champion." Service Clubs, race tracks, state and county fairs, and schools are my most frequent audiences. Particularly, I enjoy demonstrations before kids (ages 6-19). They're so receptive and show enthusiasm to become pitchers themselves, hence they exhibit appreciation, which is doubly pleasing to me."

Don won the World Championship pitching Gordons with a 1 1/4 turn. In his demonstrations he pitches different makes of shoes, and throws with several different turns familiar to all horseshoe pitchers; flip, 3/4, 1 1/4, and 1 3/4. A wide variation of this nature indicates that not one make of shoe or one turn is better than another, but that his proficiency in throwing ringers is spread over a wide range of equipment.

Today, his favorite shoe is the new Steinfeldt, named after and also pitched by his erstwhile opponent of that Record-Setting game in 1960. That record, by the way, has since been broken.

To conclude, in



short, Don says, "There is lots more! It's hard to realize that I've won high awards for pitching. What I feel is now more important to me, is winning the NHPA Presidential Award in 1988 for dedication to the sport, for promoting the game to gain recruits through close association with youngsters in a teaching capacity.

TIPS FROM THE TOP

I hope by the time you have read this, you have practiced the stance and swing fundamentals mentioned in this column in the June *Newsline*. Push the arm out and above your sighting on the opposite peg, letting the arm swing as far back as it will go naturally, starting your lift at the bottom of the swing, and letting the shoe go when your hand is about at the level of the top of the opposite peg.

Practice this at home, with your shoe, in the living room until you are aware of the entire swing. You should feel the shoe during the entire swing, allowing the arm to do its thing without interruption. This is how your clutch shots are made; you are concentrating on your swing, so hard, you eliminate the negative thoughts, such as the score, the wins and losses, the weather, lights, court condition, your opponent's personality, etc. If he or she complains about the courts, the weather, the noises, the lights, etc. — agree with them. That means they are not concentrating on their game. Let them worry about those things, and get back into your mantra, your dark tunnel of concentration.

To give you an idea of concentration, I have had photographers taking pictures and not noticed. I also remember playing Casey Jones, one of the greatest players ever. It was the first time I had played him, and I was nervous. We went over one hundred and twenty shoes, and I had around 85%. After the game I was sitting on a park bench with a hot dog, and an orange drink. Games then took about 45 minutes and some longer, so we had to wait for the courts to empty. Anyway, someone tapped me on my shoulder and said, "Don, may I have my shoes?" I didn't know what he was talking about. He then said, "You pitched my shoes when you played Casey." When I checked the horseshoes, he was right. My shoes were still hanging on the fence. The shoes I used in that game were a pair that I had tried once, but I didn't care for the design, didn't like the feel, and I didn't like the way they turned.

But during that game I threw them for 120 shoes, and never realized they were different. I guess that is concentration.

By the way, Fernando Isais was so mad at Casey for letting me beat him he shook Casey by the shoulders and said over and over again, "I told you to watch him...I told you to watch him." Of course I have never told this to Casey. He doesn't know to this day that I beat him with an oddball pair of shoes.

And that is another point. You can throw any model of shoes, if you believe you can. If you think negative that you can't, you can be sure you won't. Many times during my demonstrations I will ask for other shoes from the audience, and be able to make four ringers with four different shoes. You've got to believe in yourself.

GRIP...Now that you have your stance and swing, I normally will have a person hold a shoe starting on one side and working their hand down and around the shoe until they have held the shoe in every possible position. Swing and release the shoe from all these positions, not worrying about ringers, only finding out which grip allows the shoe to land open. This includes the flip. Most people will throw a natural open shoe from one of these grips. And if your stance and swing is as we have practiced, you will find that the pitch will fall into a rhythm, almost the same as you probably have for bowling. One, two three, four. One is the push away, two-three is the down and back swing and four is the forward swing and lift. This is the pendulum swing. Feel it, say it in your mind, or count while swinging the shoe. This all may seem too much to remember, but as you learn each step in stages, they will become part of you, and your mistakes will become fewer. Your main mistake will be the one you repeat most often, normally in the back swing, starting the arm forward too soon.

I've had people say I make it look easy. If so, it's because I've put

together a complete package. *Stance, Grip, Swing and Concentration*, from start to finish. I'm always more mentally tired after a World Tournament than physically tired. You become physically tired when you're pitching wrong.

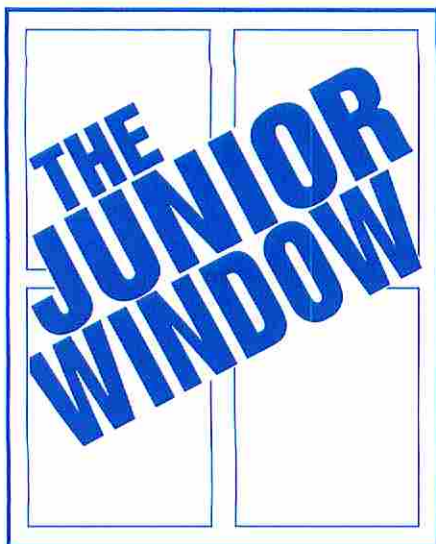

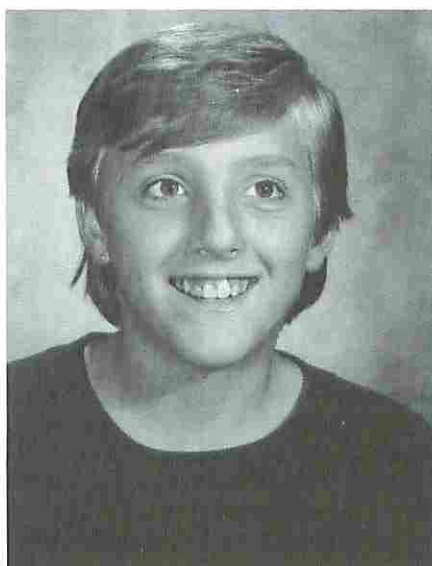
1990 Junior membership statistics are not yet available but here is an overview of the 1989 junior membership totals:

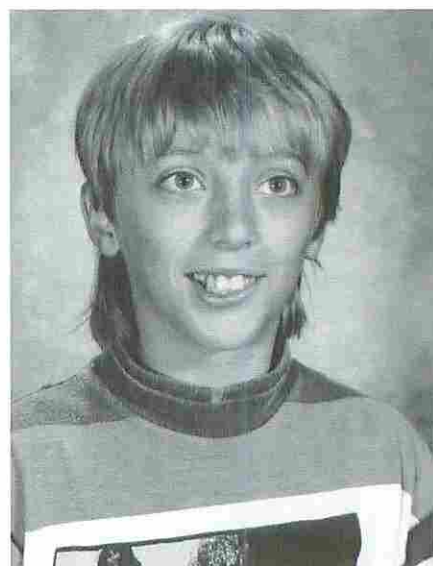

Junior Phenomenon In Badger, Minnesota

The town of Badger is about twenty miles from the Canadian border, and a population of 320. In this small northern town, live two up-and-coming junior pitchers with high hopes and already a string of accomplishments to marvel most pitchers' careers.

Chris Harren, the elder, at 14 years old, has earned one state junior championship (1988), and is finding his younger brother, Vance, 12 years old, his toughest competitor. Vance has two state junior titles (1987, 1989), a 3rd place finish at the 1989 World and a 12th place at the 1990 World, already in his young career. As with most junior pitchers, it was their father, Al Harren, who started their interest in horseshoe pitching, and he surely did well in teaching the skills. Chris and Vance are the pride of Minnesota, and come state tournament time, create as much conversation and audience following as the Negaards, Lipovskys, Hughes and O'Connors.

Both Chris and Vance are honor students at Badger High School, with B+ grade averages. Their personal goals are quite similar, as both are striving to win a Junior World Championship. This will be interesting to follow for the skills are there and some of the stiffest competition

will be right within the family. Chris started pitching competitively in 1984, and has many 60% tournaments, including a 67% 1989 state tournament, and 63% in the 1990 Warren Open. He has finished 9th in both the 1989 and 1990 World tournaments, averaging 60% and 67.3%.

Vance started horseshoe pitching in 1985 and most recent top performances include a 67.3% 1989 World, 74.3% at the 1989 State Tournament, and 69.3% at the 1990 Upsala Open.

Win or lose, it is a pleasure to watch these two young pitchers perform and their love for the sport is already reaching beyond their own personal goals and involvement. They have been instrumental in promoting the sport in their area, and have started a Junior League in Badger that now has 10 junior pitchers. Surely their skills and enthusiasm will spread to the other new juniors coming into our sport. There may be a day when we all know of Badger, Minnesota and as the Junior Horseshoe Capital.

For A Healthy Pitch

There is something that does NOT happen at every horseshoe tournament that concerns me very much. When a medical emergency or problem occurs, there is not much available at the tournament site to treat the problem. This is true from the top tournament — the World Tournament — on down. I have known of three people who have died at horseshoe tournaments and two of them did not even receive basic life support, such as cardiopulmonary resuscitation, or CPR as it is better known. Many of you may have had a similar experience at some time. Aside from life-threatening occurrences, there are all the other problems that should be treated quickly, but are not because there is no equipment available. This concerns me for two reasons.

One reason is the aforementioned lack of equipment. It would be ideal to have a complete first aid kit at every tournament. From the smallest metal splinter in a finger to a badly sprained ankle or even cardiac arrest, there should be something available for treating problems, until they are stabilized and/or taken to a hospital for X-Rays or whatever is needed. In addition, there should always be a place for someone to lie down in a cool area and there should be some cool liquids set aside for the problems of heat exhaustion, etc.—a frequent problem. Any person who has ever had a problem in the heat really appreciated the first aid that they received or really wished that it could have been available for them. The personnel and the van that were always in attendance at the 1986 and 1987 World Tournaments did an excellent job and helped many people. The water coolers at Stone Mountain this year and the insulated water containers in Spearfish, South Dakota, were excellent, and much used. There have been emergency personnel at other tournaments also, but whether or not they are used should not be a guideline as to whether they should be available in the future. I feel very strongly that some kind of emergency facility should be available at every large tournament and that *every* tourna-

ment site should definitely have first aid equipment and a telephone to call an ambulance.

My second concern is that very few people know basic first aid and basic life support, or CPR. I know that it is very scary to think that someday you may be required to use it, and that you may even have to use it on a friend. We don't even want to think about the possibility that someone may need emergency care. It is very normal for us to deny that anything bad will ever happen to anyone in our family or in our presence. I know...I felt the same way for a long time, and I was a nurse in a critical care area, so I've watched many patients and families in total denial. However, as a nurse, I was required to take CPR and keep my certificate current. I also absolutely refused to believe that I would ever need it. Well, I have needed it, and now, of course, I feel much more comfortable about being able to do what I can to help out in an emergency. We all go through that

"denial" thing, some of us more than others. It is very natural. But at the same time, it is important that we force ourselves to learn as much as we can about first aid and CPR. As scary as it is to think that we may someday have to use it, it is ten times more scary — it is TERRIFYING — to watch someone who is ill and NOT be able to do anything. Remember, even if we are not perfect and do not do everything to the letter in a given situation, we are doing something. SOMETHING is almost always better than nothing. Think of it this way — when you are in an emergency situation, your adrenaline is working overtime and doing CPR will help use up your tension and energy.

There are CPR and First Aid courses offered in almost every community at least twice a year. Please sign up for one, and then go. You will not be sorry, and someone, somewhere, may be eternally grateful that you did.

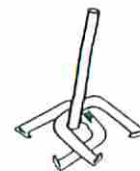

CALIFORNIA

September was a good month for Walter Williams, who registered an 87.3% to win the Group 1 at the Coors Open at Yolo, and followed with an 88% the following day.

Dave Loucks had a 60.8 in the A-1 Group at the Feather River Open September 1, then followed with a 62.8 on September 2.

Barak Wright, Williams and Sharon Paddock were one-two-three in the handicap A-1 division of the Lucy Hanlon Memorial Open September 15 at Sonoma County. Williams had the high percentage of 86.2%. Paddock had 73.4.

In the handicap A-1 Mayor Douglas Open at Vallejo on the 16th, Paddock was on top (6-1, 77.2) with Williams second with 4-2, 87.7.

Billie Sue Pennington nailed a 65.6 to top the Group A-1 in the Gold County Open September 23. In the Ernie Fairchild Open at San Jose September 23, Walt Robinson won the handicap A-1.

CANADA

The Nova Scotia Horseshoe Players Association elected Bob Richey from Halifax as their president at the 17th annual meeting. Boyd Oickle, Bridgewater, is the 1st vice president. Other officers are Jim Vickers, Dartmouth, 2nd vice president; Shirley Richey, Halifax, secretary; Clark Brown, Halifax, treasurer.

Directors are Jack Whiting, Dartmouth; Bill McNeil, Windsor Jct.; Barry Slaunwhite, Terence Bay; Cecil Fletcher, Mount Uniacke; Erick Otterson, Truro; Gus O'Quinn, Bridgewater; and Clarence Surette, Yarmouth.

Diane Cantin from St. Raymond, Quebec has won six Canadian titles in seven years. Only her niece, Sylvianne Moisan, has defeated her, a victory in 1988 at Calgary.

To top things off in Halifax, Diane pitched a perfect game — an all-time record for a woman. Her 88.0% average for the entire tournament is another record.

COLORADO

Rich Pintor of Idledale, won his third State title, defeating 9-time state champion Paul LaCrosse. Virginia Sandoval regained the women's Class A crown and Jimmy Bauer took the junior title.

Les Groenbach won the 30-foot Class A title in a best of seven match against Bob Jacobson. It is the first 30-foot championship in Colorado history.

Colorado dedicated its Hall of Fame building during the Rocky Mountain Open in Boulder, Saturday and Sunday, August 18 and 19. The Hall of Fame building houses many

items from State Champions, including a special display from the Ted Allen Estate.

Keith Thompson has been reelected President of the CHPA for the fifth consecutive year. Glen Robeck is the new vice president, Russ Bartle is the 1991 secretary and Ken McKenzie was reelected treasurer.

IOWA

The Frank Jackson award, in honor of the first NHPA Champion, is Iowa's highest award with exception of the State Champion. It goes to the person who has responded above and beyond the call of duty during the past year to promote the game of horseshoe pitching. Even the lowest percentage pitcher could capture the Frank Jackson award for service. Walter Bantz was the 1990 winner. In Hall of Fame selections for 1990, Wilbert Foelske was the State's selection. He is from Janesville, a fine pitcher and outstanding for service.

Last May Bill Vandegrill had 95 Fairfield high school physical education students out on the courts to learn the fundamentals of horseshoe pitching. One of the girls threw a double with her first two shoes. The students were taught the various styles of pitching and also scoring methods. Count-all was used to increase interest.

MICHIGAN

In the June *Newsline*, "Chatter" reported that Jean Swarthout had won the most State Championships in the Wolverine State. Well, it is true in one way. She has won the most using just one name.

SANDY Smith, SANDY Worgelmuth and SANDY Clark has won seven Women's State Titles...The same person. It is great she stayed with horseshoe pitching.

The Michigan-Ontario Friendship tournament was held in July, in Wellesley, Ontario. Ontario defeated Michigan, 172-152. Out of the total 324 games played, the difference was only 10 games. Next year's tournament will be hosted by the Chief Okemos Sportsman's Club in Dimondale, Michigan.

RD John Decker has reported he has appointed all new assistants. They are Bob Wells in the southeast, Boyd Stonerock in the southwest and Ron Kohn in the northern parts of the state.

Dean LeClair is the State Champion, 10-1, 68.2. Tom Williams was second, 8-3, 57.3.

MINNESOTA

Jack Loeffen is the new president for the State and Ken Anderson from Wadena is the new secretary-treasurer. It has been a banner year for RD Len Lipovsky. He won some of the better local tournaments, and then capped them off with the Intermediate World Championship at Stone Mountain. He received the Regional Director of the Year award from the NHPA.

A letter from Bill Grillo from the Hibbing Horseshoe Club to the Minnesota Ringer Digest states that the club is

focusing on a structure 70' by 170' and as of October 10 had received \$30,000 grant. The club has raised approximately \$11,500 and they expect \$10,000 from the city. The roof structure will be open on the sides with light panels and lighting.

Bev Nathe is the 1990 State Champion, edging Phyllis Negaard by one game. Phyllis nailed an 80.6, Bev 77.9. Dale Lipovsky is the men's title holder, finishing 7-0 with 78.8.

Missa Rosival was the junior girls' winner, 5-0, 44.4, with Vance Harren copping the junior boys' crown, 5-0, 72.4. Clayton Peterson, 5-0, 61.2 won the senior men's 40'-A, and Don Larson taking the Senior 30'-A.

MISSISSIPPI

The Mississippi Horseshoe Pitchers Association raised \$5,082 for the Mississippi Firefighters Memorial Burn Center during their third Annual Burn Center Benefit. It was a 2-day tournament that included MHPA members as well as several of the Ocean Springs city officials including the mayor, aldermen and chief of police. To date the MHPA has donated in excess of \$18,000 to the Burn Center.

The organization chose to support the Burn Center because it is in Mississippi and receives no federal or state funds.

World tournament officials report that both salt water and fresh water fishing is available to the Mississippi Gulf coast. You do not need a license for saltwater fishing. Fresh water fishing requires a non-resident license for a small fee.

MISSOURI

State statistician Stan Griggs has revealed some interesting figures on things that happened over the last 50 years. He has compiled the State Champions in Class A at intervals.

The 1940 State Champion fifty years ago was Bob Bales, Kansas City with a 15-0 record and 76.1. Twenty-five years ago the Missouri Champ was Paul Lattray of Webster Grove. His record was 11-0, 71.2. In 1970, twenty years ago the title was won by Lillard Pinion from Stewartville with 11-0 won-lost and 66.8 percentage.

Ten years ago in 1980 Dave Baker from Wentworth took all the marbles with 6-1, 71.1. Charles Killgore, who finished second in 1980, took the top spot in 1985 with 7-0, 75.9. He is from Plattsburg.

The 1990 Champion was Alan Francis, the World Champion in 1989. In fact Alan has won 11 straight Missouri titles, six as a junior pitcher and five men's championships. His 1990 percentage was 75.6.

Randall Grady of Sikeston made and donated the first place trophies for the men's, women's, junior boys' and junior girls' divisions for the World Tournament at Stone Mountain, Georgia. He also donated first place trophies for one of the World Tournaments at Huntsville, Alabama.

NEBRASKA

Bill Turechek, of Gordon, won his fourth straight State Title, besting two former champions, Don McCance and Dale Seybert. Turechek finished with a 10-1 record, one game in front of McCance. Bill closed with a 59.3 percentage, which was low due to the heat and humidity during the Labor Day State tournament in Fremont. Bill's high game was 83.3.

In other tournaments Dick Hanshew won the Class A division in the Oregon Trails tournament, Turechek captured the Western Nebraska Open with 6-1, 66.3, one game in front of Colorado's Jim Tulk.

Other Class Winners in the Western Nebraska tourney

were Dan Martinez (B), Al Martin (C), Don Wild (D) and Julie Romero (E).

Rich Pintor won the Tri-State Open at Scottsbluff with 7-0 record and 67.5 percentage. Arnie Fankhauser took the Don Randall Memorial Tournament at Bridgeport with an even 50% and 6-1 record. Turechek was second.

NEW JERSEY

Bill MacIntyre of Somerville is the first NJSHPA horseshoe pitcher to compete in the men's world's championship class three times. He finished 12th at Stone Mountain, Georgia. His three year record is 48-41.

"Big Mac" set a new state record 76.9 percent for the tournament as he won the New Jersey championship. His high game was 83.9 as he went 11-0. Louis Durango, who finished second two games behind, teamed with Tom Skinner to repeat as doubles champions.

The New Jersey publicity committee has had over 40 articles published in local papers this year. A scrapbook will be presented to the Association at the 1990 awards banquet November 10.

Ron Vogel was re-elected president of the NJSHPA. A profile of the late Larry Mahoney appeared in the Autumn issue of the *Jersey Jargon* newsletter. Mahoney was inducted in 1972 and won the state title in 1934 through 1940 and won again in 1947 and 1948. He recorded the first 80% ringer average for a New Jersey Tournament. In 1938 he defeated World champion Ted Allen in a best two-out-of-three match averaging 82%.

NEW YORK

He's not close to Carl Steinfeldt's record 22 New York State titles as yet, but Mike DiMartino of Churchville made his sixth championship look almost as easy this year as some of those from the Steinfeldt era.

DiMartino, who finished ninth at Stone Mountain pitched 78.04 percent ringers to go undefeated in nine games with a first place playoff over Labor Day at the covered courts of the Canton Sportsmen Club in St. Lawrence County.

Along the way he tossed a 90.9 game against Chris Jackson of Gansevoort and allowed no more than 28 points in any of the 40-point games.

Art Tyson of Mt. Vernon and Joe Schultz of Brentwood were in the playoff with the winner. Tyson was fifth at the World, Schultz 15th. After Tyson had defeated Schultz, DiMartino bested Tyson, 40-28 in the finals.

Ruth Hangen successfully defended her title after she had tied with Sue Twyman, Carrie Carpenter and Charlotte Reigles in a playoff. All had tied at 5-2.

Next year's tournament will return to the Falconer Horseshoe Club, an 18-court facility where the state tournament was last held in 1986.

Statistician's Report on Perfect Games

by Walter Ray Williams, Jr.

The following is a list of perfect games pitched in NHPA sanctioned tournaments. The list is hopefully as accurate as possible, but is obviously missing many details. It would be nice for the NHPA to have a copy of all pertinent scoresheets, but they do not. If you have any information regarding any of these games which are lacking in complete information, please contact me.

I would like to thank all of the people who have sent information to any of the past statisticians or to myself via an NHPA officer. As you can see by this list we have recorded 65 sanctioned perfect games: 35 by men, 16 by junior boys and 14 by women. I would like to categorize them by the different divisions used in the World Tournament, but I don't think it would be fair to the players whose age I didn't know.

I believe the oldest player (40 ft.) to have a perfect game was Willard 'Spud' Napier at 73 years of age. I believe Alan Francis was the youngest at 11 years of age when he pitched his first perfect. Pitching as an adult, Sandy McLachlin was 16 when she pitched her first perfect to be the youngest woman. The youngest man to be perfect for a game — I pitched 56 straight to record the longest perfect game at the age of 17.

Since most of the perfect games have occurred since 1980, someone might think that the players have improved dramatically over the players of the past decades. Though this is true of the women's division, I am positive that the reason for the increase is due to the shorter games compared to the longer games played before the 1980's. I think that this is a good thing in that it makes a perfect game an attainable goal. There are many great champions who don't have any sanctioned perfect games and I think that is a shame.

If you know of someone, maybe yourself, who has pitched a perfect game, please send me as much information as possible with some sort of verification. I find it difficult to give credit to a player just because they say they pitched a perfect game. In some cases the game may have been in an unsanctioned event. If you have any other information regarding WT. records or other records please write to me and I will try to correct any

mistakes which have been overlooked or made. Thank you. Walter

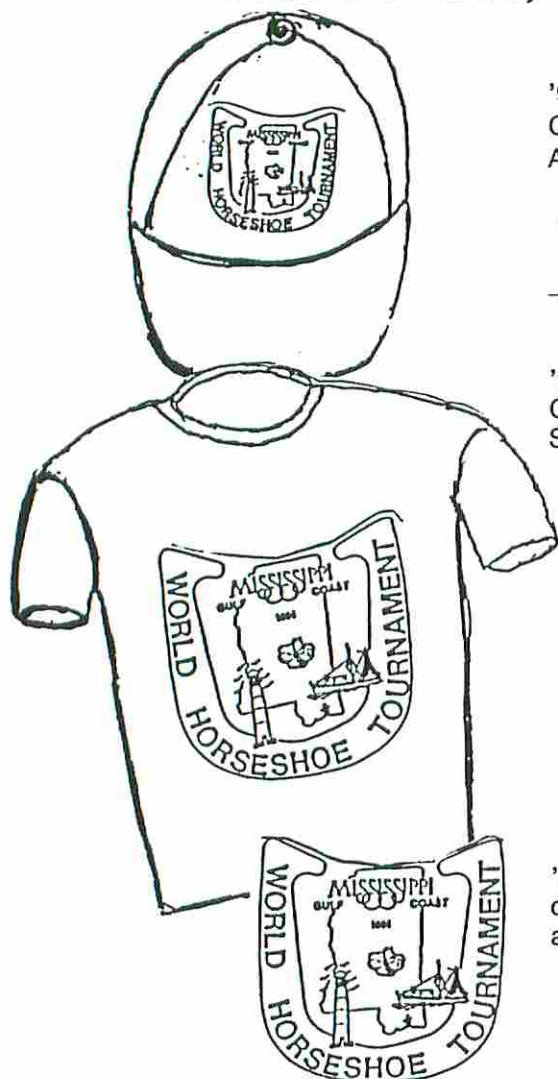
